Tobacco hit hard by hail, wind storm

*A vicious hailstorm crossed northern Rockeastle County Menday night laying waste to crops and duning property before moving into Jackson County to reck similar have.

The one to three inch hair reported by eagin in Garard County, crossed to the Conway-Snyder area, moved on to Seaffold Cane, Climax and Three Lirks, lasting about 30 minutes.

The area affected was about two to three miles wide, Hail was reported in Mt. Vernon but there was none. It did rain .18 of an inch at Cox Funeral Home weather station.

In some areas the hail piled up four and five inches deep, and where wind carried it against buildings it reached

carried it against buildings it reached 12 to 18 inches. There was still some on the ground Tuesday. Every growing thing in its path was stripped. Tobacco bore the brunt of the hail ripping off and tearing apart leaves leaving only stalks standing. Com was but tomatoes still in the field were destroyed.

destroyed.

"Most of the crops were shred-ded," reported Harold Ballinger at the ASCS office who noted the area Tuesday with Extension Agent Tom Mills. "Yes never seen anything like it. Many poolp lost their entire to-bacco crop in a matter of minutes." Ballinger lost about half-an-acre of sugar (sorghum) cane. "Lijust blew it over and stripped it," he said.

Even electric lines were damaged causing a blackout in areas of Concausing a blackout in areas of Con-

causing a blackout in areas of Conway and Snyder and some areas around Brush Creek.

It was the third storm this year to It was the flirid storm this year to damage crops in the county. Two heavy rainstorms earlier this year flooded crops in the south area of the county. Wind also knocked over comand tobacco during those storms. Ballinger estimated a total of about 125 acres of tobacco was lost. Some had only damage. Below is a partial

The route of the 8 inch transmis sion line would intersect with exist-ing distribution lines, thereby increas-ing the volume of water available and increasing water pressures through-out the entire distribution system. Two dead-end lines would be linked by construction of 4 inch distribut

not totally climinate the water supply

Know risks involved with fall seeded alfalfa crops

Fall seeding of alfalfa crops has some significant economic advan-tages. Weed pressure is lower during the fall as opposed to spring and next year's growers can expect a full production year. However, there is a significant risk to fall seeding and that is Selerotinia crown and stem rot

of alfalfa. Sclerotinia crown and stem rot is a fungal disease which attacks the crowns and stems of alfalfa and can ause plants to die. Fall seedings of

cause plants to die. Fall seedings of alfalfa are at particular risk. There are farmers who are suc-cessful seeding their alfalfa in the fall. Conversely, each year we see major stand losses and sometimes complete stand losses in the spring following fall seeding. This is very often the result of Sclerotinia crown and stem rot.

complete stand losses in the spring following fall seeding. This is veryoften the result of Selerotinia enwind stem rot.

There are two factors which make the fall seeded stands susceptible to this disease. First, the seedlings of alfalf are susceptible to infection by Selerotinia whereas established plants are not resistant. Second, tiny orange mushrooms found only in the fall produce airborne spores causing the infection. When a crop is seeded in April it has had ist or seven months to grow and is no longer susceptible to the disease by the time Selerotinia spores are produced. However, acropplanted in September has grown only for a month or two by the time the mushrooms are produced, making the cop susceptible to Selerotinia infection.

Some furmers are susceptiful with

Some farmers are successful with Some farmers are successful with fall seeding and have not had a prob-lem with Sclerotinia crown and stem rot. This may indicate that those particular fields are not infested with the fungus. It is difficult to predict where severe infestations will occur. However, infections are common around old pastures or hay fields. It commonly occurs in or near pastures because clover is host to the Sclerot-inia fungus and in hay fields because alfalfa also is a host.

Recommendations are for no-till alfalfa not to be seeded in the fall into old pastures. Farmers can simply avoid the problem by not seeding any alfalfa in the fall.

If a farmer is willing to take the risk of fall seeding alfalfa, we sug-gest planting as soon as possible in the fall seeding window. This means

planting the crop in mid-August and allowing the crop plenty of time to grow.

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

Fair Housing Ordinance In the City of Livingston, Kentucky As Summarized

Section One: <u>Definitions</u>
Definitions are provided in section one as they apply to the intent of the Fair Housing Ordinance.

Section Two Prohibited Acts, Exemptions
(1) It is an unlawful practice for a real estate operator or for a real estate tooker, real estate salesmani, or an individual employed by or setting on behalf of any of those; among other things, to discriminate against an individual because of his race, sex, color, religion, or national origin in the terms, conditions or privileges of sale, exchange, rental or lease for property or in the furnishing of facilities or services in connection therewith, or to pherwise dept up or withhold real property from an individual because of his race, color, religion, national origin or sex.

(2) Exemption Nothing in Section Two (1) shall apply

(3) It is an unlawful practice for a financial institution or an individual employed by or acting on behalf of a financial institution to discriminate against an individual as provided for in Section Two (1).

(4) Block Busting It is an unlawful practice.

(5) Agency No Defense It shall be no defense to a violation of this ordinance by a real estate operator, real estate broker, real estate salesman, financial institution or other person subject to the provisions of this ordinance that be violation was requested, sought or otherwise procured by a person not subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

Section Three: Local Human Rights Commission

(1) Membership Membership shall consist of five (5) members who shall be appointed on a non-partisan basis and shall be broadly repres

(2) Powers The Livingston Human Rights is authorized, among other things, to receive, initiate, investigate, hear and determine charges of violations of ordinances, orders or resolutions forbidding discrimination adopted by the City of Livingston.

(3) Enforce of Orders of the Livingston Human Rights Commission The procedures to enforce an order of the commission is set forth in The procedures to Section Three (3).

Section Four: Severability.




