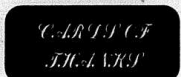

Tobacco hit hard by hail, wind storm

A vicious hailstorm crossed northern Rockcastle County Monday night laying waste to crops and damaging property before moving into Jackson County to reek similar havoc.

The one to three inch hail reportedly began in Garrard County, crossed to the Conway-Snyder area, moved on to Scaffold Cane, Climax and Three Links, lasting about 30 minutes.

The area affected was about two to three miles wide. Hail was reported in Mt. Vernon but there was none. It did rain .18 of an inch at Cox Funeral Home weather station.

In some areas the hail piled up four and five inches deep, and where wind carried it against buildings it reached 12 to 18 inches. There was still some on the ground Tuesday.

Every growing thing in its path was stripped. Tobacco bore the brunt of the hail ripping off and tearing apart leaves leaving only stalks standing. Corn was somewhat damaged, but tomatoes still in the field were destroyed.

"Most of the crops were shredded," reported Harold Ballinger at the ASCS office who toured the area Tuesday with Extension Agent Tom Mills. "I've never seen anything like it. Many people lost their entire tobacco crop in a matter of minutes."

Ballinger lost about half an acre of sugarcorn (sorghum) cane. "It just blew it over and stripped it," he said.

Even electric lines were damaged causing a blackout in areas of Conway and Snyder and some areas around Brush Creek.

It was the third storm this year to damage crops in the county. Two heavy rainstorms earlier this year flooded crops in the south area of the county. Wind also knocked over corn and tobacco during those storms.

Ballinger estimated a total of about 125 acres of tobacco was lost. Some had only damage. Below is a partial list of those who lost tobacco or had damage. The individual acreage is estimated. Some may have had larger losses, others less.

Western gets \$778,500 for improvements

Grants totaling \$377,000 to upgrade the Western Rockcastle Water Association system has been announced by Gov. Wallace Wilkinson.

Also a total of \$381,000 will come from the Kentucky Infrastructure in the form of a loan at 3.2 percent interest rate, and \$20,000 for administration bringing the total project to \$778,500.

A pleased County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins said the upgrading will relieve the drain on Mt. Vernon city water storage.

"It should correct a pressure problem throughout the Western. Service area and hopefully lead to the lifting of a ban on line extensions in those areas where development is being held up," the judge added.

The proposed project will add no new customers. The sole purpose is to provide an increased water supply and increased pressure for the existing 1,450 customers of the Western district. Judge Mullins stressed.

In March 1990, the Western Association was notified by the Kentucky Division of Water that a water line extension ban was in effect until Western could demonstrate it could adequately supply the water needs of its customers.

Customers signed a petition complaining of water outages and low water pressure, especially at distant areas of the system.

Hydraulic studies performed in September 1989, and August 1990, indicated that the primary problem was a lack of water pressures and volumes at the point of supply.

Mt. Vernon is the sole supplier of public water for Rockcastle County from its water plant at Renfro Valley. The average production at the treatment facility is 908,000 gallons per day, roughly 51 percent of design capacity.

The hydraulic studies found no major deficiencies within the WRWA distribution system such as broken mains. It was evident that consumer demands equal storage supply volumes, thereby preventing storage tanks from filling enough to provide adequate system pressures. As a result of these factors, it has been determined that additional storage is needed at the point-of-supply in order to satisfy the demand for a dependable supply of water.

In order to increase the amount of storage and increase water pressures, the proposed project would construct a 200,000 gallon water storage tank and a 150 gallon per minute pump station, which would be connected to an existing 100,000 gallon tank with an 8 inch transmission line.

The route of the 8 inch transmission line would intersect with existing distribution lines, thereby increasing the volume of water available and increasing water pressures throughout the entire distribution system. Two dead-end lines would be linked by construction of 4 inch distribution mains.

There's not too much sand left on the beach down there for when Sam got home, Ruth made him shake out his clothes since he'd been playing on the beach with the grandchildren.

Joe Abney lives in Disputanta about the center of Clear Creek. It is said a team of wild horses couldn't pull him off the place and has been proved to be right.

As most hill country people do, the family of Joe and Ruth depend on mountain products to furnish them a living.

Now Joe has this thing about blackberries. Big, juicy, sweet berries which are made into jam (a mountain standby) and jelly which is so good it's only brought out when the preacher eats there. Eaten with hot biscuits and churned country butter makes you think of heaven, blackberry wine for the sick (?) and man, you don't know how many people use it to get well on Clear Creek (elsewhere in the county too, I hear).

Joe has the name of a man who picks his berries twice, like the time he came out of the field carrying two full, large buckets of berries, tripped coming down the hill behind his house, then spent some time picking

up the berries.

That's why Joe has the name of a man who picks his berries twice.

Ruth complained of the dirty berries but Joe said, "Oh, cook them up anyway. It will help fill up Hubert (his brother) when he comes over from Berea, eats with us, and tells me why I should move to Berea."

Now that all happened a few years ago but the latest of his blackberry tales has caused me to laugh until my sides are sore.

If you suffer any pains from laughing when you read this, no suing me nor this paper.

Joe began his story to me. "The fellows used to call me the man who picks his blackberries twice but now I'm known as the streaker on Clear Creek."

"Several weeks ago, I got up about the first crack of daylight and told Ruth I was going to pick up some berries before it got too hot. "I put on a pair of bib overalls so there was nothing between me and the overalls but just air and that felt good.

"After I climbed the hill behind the house, the land lay level with berry bushes around the field.

"I pasture my cattle on that bench but the only water they get is from a small spring into a large water trough that I built up there for the stock."

"Little did I know that the cow watering trough would sometime or other almost save my life.

"I ate the first handful or two of the berries for they were the best I had seen or tasted.

"It was so early the night owls were screaming still, while other birds began to wake up.

"It was so cool and peaceful I was feeling almost like I was in heaven and by a few minutes later, I wished I was.

"I hadn't noticed the ground around me nor the big hump as if it was home but I soon found out.

"I was tramping on a yellow jacket nest and they began to pour out of there making straight for me. Hundreds it seemed crawling up my pant legs, down my naked back and anywhere they could get to me, stinging as they went.

"Man, I tell you I never had so much pain in my life.

"The army uses fighter planes and names them after animals. They should call one the Yellow Jacket for it bites, sinks its stinger into you and bores down into your skin with what seems like liquid fire. It's the worst pain I've ever had in my life.

"Well, I beat and thrashed around my overalls but I couldn't get any relief so I started getting out of the overalls and ran or did a "streak" across that pasture to the water trough with a string of yellow jackets behind me.

"I'll tell you there is no language to be found in a Sunday School quarterly that I used. I was trying to get

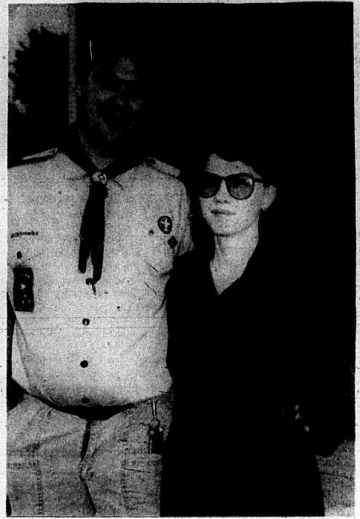

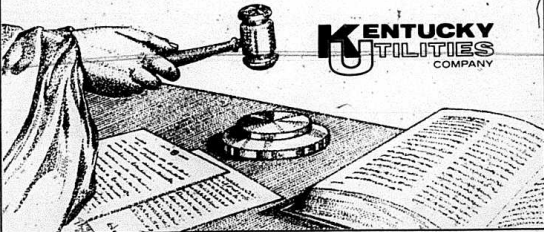

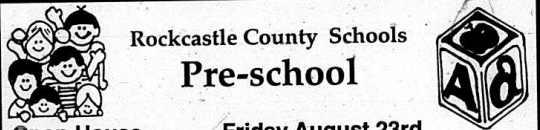

NASA astronaut visits Parker Seals Berea plant

Employees of Parker Seals Berea facility played host to a future space man Tuesday, Aug. 20.

Major Charles F. Precourt, with the United States Air Force and more recently with NASA's astronaut program, shared information about the program with Parker Seals personnel before being taken on a tour of the facility.

Jerome Eaton, quality assurance manager for the facility, said last week he was very excited about Precourt's visit, and presentation. It helped emphasize the team work

that existed to make the space program work.

Precourt, in an approximately 90-minute presentation, also placed emphasis on team work. The presentation was given in what Eaton called the cell, a work area dedicated exclusively to the "O" rings used in the space program. The reason for the designated area, he said, was for quality control.

Precourt, speaking before Parker Seals management and selected personnel and visitors from other Parker Hannifin Corporation entities, praised Parker Seals employees for their dedication.

The astronaut, he said, were the ones who got the glory, but it was a team operation for the space program to work. He is a candidate for astronaut pilot in the 13th group of astronauts in NASA's space shuttle program. A total of 95 individuals make up the group, 32 of which are pilots.

Born June 29, 1955 in Massachusetts, Precourt holds a bachelor of science degree in Aeronautical Engineering from the USAF Academy and a master of science degree in management from Golden Gate University. He is married and has three daughters.

Precourt has twice been awarded the Air Force Meritorious Service Medal and was named the outstanding graduate of his pilot training class in 1978.

Following graduation from pilot training, he flew as an instructor pilot in the T-37, and later as a maintenance test pilot in the T-37 and T-38 aircraft.

From 1982 through 1984, he flew an operational tour in the F-15 Eagle at Bitburg Air Base in Germany. He does not minimize the necessity for testing and retesting, and being as certain as possible that what works on paper also works in the air.

He brings some of the caution developed from his years as a test pilot to the astronaut program.

"Test pilots are pioneers, but skeptical ones," he said. If astronauts have a question on benefit versus safety, "astronauts can ask for redesign."

He praised NASA's recently re-instated safety verses maintaining a time schedule policy for the space program. Caution was more important than speed, he told the group. "Astronauts are constantly brain storming to have a way out of all situations," he said. It was easy for something to work on paper, but "I've been around long enough to know there is a Murphy's Law that what can go wrong will go wrong" out there. I'm glad to see people raising hands and questioning what has been done in the past."

Precourt expressed a belief that medical and technological break throughs would result from the space program. He is also a candidate for involvement in the proposed space station and a possible moon base. The United States Space program is looking toward putting men back on the moon in 2005, and men on Mars by 2019.

Data accumulated in the program also lets us know how fragile our own planet is, he said. Showing a slide of an orbital sun rise, he pointed to a narrow rim of light over the earth's surface. Noting that was the earth's atmosphere, he said

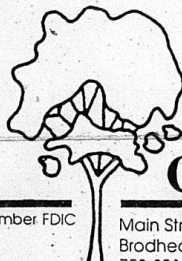

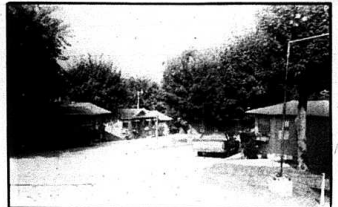
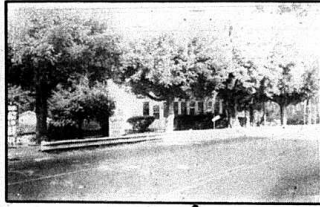

Doc makes tradeoffs for war Combat was no day at the office

For the first two days of the Persian Gulf war, Dr. Daniel Hurst, son of Rev. and Mrs. Charles C. Hurst of Mt. Vernon, watched CNN coverage of the air strikes from a USO tent in Frankfurt, Germany. Days later, he would not be able to watch from afar.

There would be no "off button" in Saudi Arabia for the pediatric neurologist.

Within weeks, he would be engrossed in the United States' fight to liberate Kuwait. His place in the massive three-month war would be 10 miles south of the Iraqi border - well within the enemy's firing range.

As a member of the U.S. Army Reserve, Hurst's duty began Christmas Day. He eventually was transferred 17 times until he set up camp at the 312th EVAC Hospital near Hafar Al Batin on Feb. 1.

There he traded his white lab coat and a fifth-floor office at the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center for chemical gear and all the Saudi Arabian desert he could see.

His hospital treated a third of the 7th combat casualties - 900 admissions and 12,000 outpatient visits - which made it the most active hospital in the war, he said.

"The desert hospital was a designated prisoner-of-war hospital. And when the Iraqis began filtering in they greatly outnumbered the wounded Americans," Hurst said. One ward was filled with Americans; Iraqis occupied four wards.

Inadequate military equipment resulted in many of the Iraqi injuries. Americans had strong helmets and protective vests. Most of the shrapnel injured the Americans on their arms and legs, whereas the Iraqis were splattered with it.

As the only neurologist, Hurst examined scalps for pieces of shrapnel and determined whether brain surgery was needed. "Sometimes the shrapnel was as small as pieces of pencil lead. That would be hard to figure out."

Few bullet wounds were treated. Many soldiers were injured by stepping on land mines.

Many of the injuries were caused by soldiers who wanted souvenirs of the war. After a souvenir cluster bomb injured a civilian and soldiers' night-vision bombs were turned in and one was found in the females' latrine in the camp of 400.

When the physicians weren't treating war injuries, they treated the soldiers' other medical problems. Blowing sand, heavy combat gear and fluctuating temperatures caused many of the same illnesses he found stateside.

"The helmets weighed 1 or 2 pounds. If you had a tendency to get a tension headache, this would cause it. I saw people all the time with headaches."

"Neck and shoulder pain was common from cramped sleeping quarters and truck drivers bouncing over those bumpy roads. The ophthalmologist always saw people with sand in their eyes, and the asthmatics had trouble with the dust storms."

"Many American soldiers died in traffic accidents, something others found hard to understand."

The Saudi Arabians had built a shoulder, which was intended for passing. Because soldiers traveled 45 mph, the two-lane road with its shoulders was used as four-lane road, and the civilians passed each other on the outlying dirt, creating six lanes. Tanks often traveled outside the six lanes, adding two more, he said.

Before the war, few soldiers complained of illness. After the war, the physicians became busier. "Before you'd be busy, say, 'Cleaning your gun. You were preparing for war. People would come in with minor problems sometimes and wanted to go home."

"On the other hand, one woman who clearly had all the beginning stages of multiple sclerosis performed all her duties adequately and never complained. It was not until after the war that she came in."

Although physicians - several of whom were from Lubbock - weren't involved in actual combat, they were at risk, Hurst said. At least four physicians died, he was told. One "was killed in a traffic accident; another was stabbed by a POW in the hospital and two were blown up by land mines."

Although many of the news broadcasts showed American doctors treating Iraqi children, Hurst's hospital treated only eight. One child, whose hand was severed, would not let anyone touch him until Hurst gave him a cookie.

A picture of the boy will remain in Hurst's possession as will many memories of the war.

"His work was rewarding, but he tells people he didn't volunteer. 'I'm not happy or upset. I went and did my duty,'" said Hurst, who returned Aug. 20.

"I'm not sure war is anything to be proud of. A lot of Iraqis are getting them, I can't identify them as an enemy. I certainly didn't treat them medically different."

The most difficult part of adjusting was realizing that life in the United States went on without him. "Things happened while I wasn't here. I don't feel like it's time to start the summer of '91."

"As a wife's comment after I returned was that I seemed more laid back. Over there, you're so vulnerable. All I had to do was have a Scud land on me and that was it."

SDFP is directed and controlled by dairy farmers and there is no cost to join. All operating expenses will be paid from over-order premiums obtained by SDFP. Producers will maintain their relationship with their current milk buyer.

Members will have a voice in SDFP policy and operations through elected representatives. In each region where there are both cooperative and independent producers, both will have at least one board member.

SDFP was formed in response to the current dairy crisis that has seen a more than 25 percent drop in farm milk prices during the past 12 months. Because the southeast is a milk deficit region, SDFP is expected to have the ability to raise prices above those set by the various Federal Milk Marketing Orders. It would do so by diverting the delivery of milk from a handler failing to pay the price determined by the Federation Board of Directors.

The Kentucky General Assembly's Interim Joint Subcommittee on Agriculture recently approved a resolution endorsing SDFP.

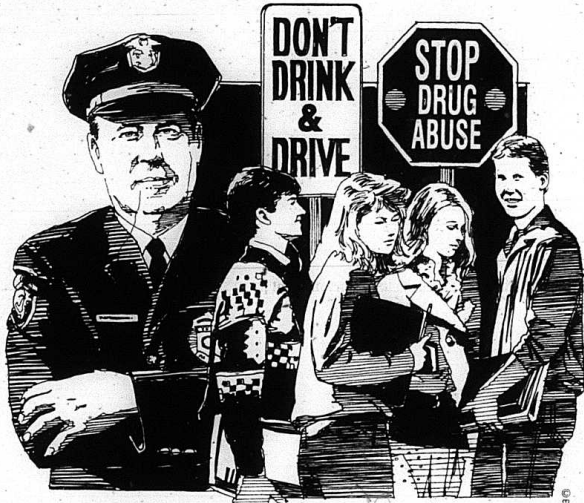

Fair Housing Ordinance

In the City of Livingston, Kentucky

As Summarized

Section One: **Definitions**
Definitions are provided in section one as they apply to the intent of the Fair Housing Ordinance.

Section Two: **Prohibited Acts, Exemptions**
(1) It is an unlawful practice for a real estate operator or for a real estate broker, real estate salesman, or an individual employed by or acting on behalf of any of those among other things, to discriminate against an individual because of his race, sex, color, religion, or national origin in the terms, conditions or privileges of sale, exchange, rental or lease of real property or in the furnishing of facilities or services in connection therewith, or to otherwise deny to or withhold real property from an individual because of his race, color, religion, national origin or sex.

(2) **Exemption Nothing in Section Two (1) shall apply**

(3) It is an unlawful practice for a financial institution or an individual employed by or acting on behalf of a financial institution to discriminate against an individual as provided for in Section Two (1).

(4) **Block Busting It is an unlawful practice.**

(5) **Agency No Defense** It shall be no defense to a violation of this ordinance by a real estate operator, real estate broker, real estate salesman, financial institution or other person subject to the provisions of this ordinance that the violation was requested, sought or otherwise procured by a person not subject to the provisions of this ordinance.

Section Three: **Local Human Rights Commission**
(1) **Membership** Membership shall consist of five (5) members who shall be appointed on a non-partisan basis and shall be broadly represented.

(2) **Powers** The Livingston Human Rights is authorized, among other things, to receive, initiate, investigate, hear and determine charges of violations of ordinances, orders or resolutions forbidding discrimination adopted by the City of Livingston.

(3) **Enforce of Orders of the Livingston Human Rights Commission**
The procedures to enforce an order of the commission is set forth in Section Three (3).

Section Four: **Severability.**
Adopted this nineteenth day of August, 1991.

The festival will be countywide this year and will be held on Main and Church Streets in Mt. Vernon. Last year it was a Fall Festival and limited to Mt. Vernon.

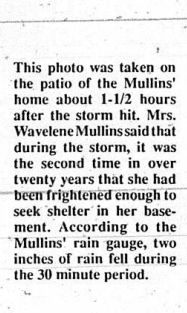

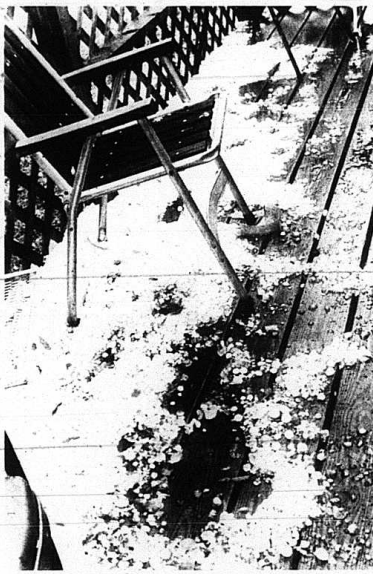

Indictments returned against West, Curry

A murder case was among the 36 indictments returned by the grand jury Friday in Laurel Circuit Court. Michael Wayne West, 22 and Lana Ruth Johnson Curry, 32, both of Barbourville Road, were indicted in the fatal shooting of a Rockcastle woman in London Aug. 7.

Both West and Curry, who have been held in the Laurel County Jail since their arrests several hours after the shooting, pled not guilty during their arraignments Friday morning.

They are scheduled to appear Dec. 20 for "call" only in circuit court. Circuit Judge Charles R. Laker, who had allowed no bond until now, set West and Curry's bonds at \$500,000 apiece, fully secured.

West was indicted for the alleged murder of Margaret Deborde Alcorn, 30, of Mt. Vernon in the London Family Dollar store, where she worked.

West allegedly walked into the store on North Main Street around 2 p.m. Aug. 7 and shot Alcorn seven times in the head, right side, and abdomen with a .25-caliber automatic handgun.

Alcorn died around 10:30 p.m. in Lexington's UK Medical Center from the wounds she sustained.

Curry was indicted for complicity to commit murder. She allegedly provided West with the gun and drove him to the store.

Police believe revenge was the motive for the alleged shooting.

Alcorn was scheduled to appear for trial in Rockcastle Circuit Court Sept. 10 for the alleged murder of Curry's 6-year-old daughter, Elvina June Curry.

Elvina was killed Feb. 1, 1990, by a single shotgun blast allegedly fired by Alcorn.

Alcorn allegedly fired the gun into the back seat of the car the Currys were riding in following an argument with Mrs. Curry, according to testimony at Alcorn's November 1990 trial.

Jurors at the original trial were deadlocked after 3 1/2 hours of deliberation, causing Circuit Judge Daniel J. Venters to dismiss them.

Alcorn was free on a \$20,000 property bond while awaiting the new trial.

Curry also faces additional charges in a separate, apparently unrelated case.

Curry and her father, the Rev. David Eddie Johnson, 64, also of Barbourville Road, were charged with receiving stolen property over \$100 and defrauding a creditor Wednesday after police recovered Curry's reportedly stolen car from the basement garage of Johnson's home.

According to London Police Detective Bill Justice, Curry had reported the 1990 Mustang stolen in November.

London Police, assisted by a sheriff's deputy, recovered the allegedly stolen vehicle from Johnson's garage around 4:15 p.m. after obtaining permission to search the property. Justice stated.

The additional charges against Curry were made at the Laurel County Jail, where police also lodged her father.

But the charges involving the car were not brought before the grand jury, so Curry and Johnson were not indicted Friday in that case.

So far, the car charges have only been handled in Laurel District Court.

Lightning causes fire in Brodhead

Lightning struck a clothes line at the home of Homer Jones on Ky. 1505 in east Brodhead early Sunday and the charge carried into a storage building setting it afire.

When Brodhead firemen arrived the flames were threatening a neighbor's garage and the Jones home. The garage had minor damage. There was no damage to the home.

Enrollment up as school begins in Rockcastle

Enrollment is slightly up as Rockcastle County Schools opened Monday for the 1991-92 school year.

2,933 students are enrolled this school year, according to Rockcastle County school officials, who said that is about a two percent increase from a year ago.

Several new teachers have been hired and others were transferred, according to Superintendent Bige Towers Jr.

New teachers include, Linda Roark who will teach in the primary block at MVES, Lora Lee Lambert, who is teaching in the preschool program at Mt. Vernon, Paula Phillips will teach at Livingston Elementary, David Penzol was hired to teach and coach at Roundstone and Scott Adams will teach math and coach at RCHS.

Lisa Johnson was transferred from Brodhead to Roundstone, Darla Reams was transferred from Livingston to Roundstone, Charles Bullen was transferred from Roundstone to Livingston, Kathy Reynolds was transferred from Roundstone to Brodhead and Kateka Cash was transferred to Brodhead from Livingston.

Due to some overruns on cap sizes at least one more teacher and

maybe two will be hired this week, according to Towers.

Sen. John Rogers files for Chapter 7 bankruptcy

State Sen. John Rogers of Somerset has filed a petition for Chapter 7 bankruptcy.

The petition filed in the Corbin Division of the U.S. Bankruptcy Court, showed his debts total about \$980,000 and his assets between \$500,000 and \$1 million dollars.

A court appointed trustee gets certain assets that are not exempt from creditors' claims and sells them to pay off debts as described in a priority system.

Rogers serves Rockcastle in the

Kentucky General Assembly. The bulk of his debt came from a business decision in 1978 that resulted in a "manageable loss" and a political decision in 1980 to enter the 5th District Congressional race, which left him with "a large, but manageable campaign debt."

He explained that he assumed the debt of a business partner who went bankrupt, and "that forced assumption... more than doubled my loss."

In June of last year, Citizens Bank of Somerset filed suit in Pulaski Circuit Court against Rogers and his wife, Debra, claiming he owed nearly \$400,000 in principal and interest on two loans. It also sought foreclosure on three tracts of land he owns just west of Somerset on Ky. 80 and his home in Hillandale subdivision.

Subsequently, cross-claims were filed by First State Bank of Manchester, First and Farmers Bank of Somerset, Bank of Mt. Vernon and Mutual Federal Savings Bank of Somerset, all claiming interests in property held by Rogers that he had

pledged as collateral for loans that were allegedly in default. One of the properties also targeted for foreclosure was the home of his late mother, Beulah, on Ky. 870, which was willed to him.

Circuit Judge Daniel J. Venters removed himself from the case in May and transferred it to Taylor County Circuit Court.

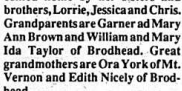
