Just plane fun

In the early 1950s Merlin Kindel, a soon to be fifth grader at Knapp Hall elementary in Berea, was on a flight back to the U.S. with his parents Ersal and Dorothy Kindel, who had been working as missionaries in Kenya. They made several connections at different airports before crossing the Atlantic. Merlin was fascinated at different airports before crossing the Atlantic. Merlin was fascinated with the whole atmosphere of airports and airplanes. When he got home he began reading every book he could find about aviation. He had a dream that someday he

during his 25 years of commercial flying. I asked Merlin how much time the co-pilot actually got to fly the plane. He answered, about 50 percent of the time. The captain will usually fly the first leg, then the co-pilot will fly the second and so on. But he said, "The cockpit is not a democracy, but a monarchy. It has to be that way." I also asked, who makes the go-no-go decisions, and does the airline influence your decision in any way. He said that weather, mechanical or political situations can enter into the decision process, but the captain has the final word

carrying extra airport equipment, to insure the safety of the flight. As captain Merlin is required to attend school twice a year for two days of ground school and one day of simulator training. It's not something he enjoys, but believes it's necessary. I asked Merlin to tell me his worst and best experience. He was hard pressed for a worst experience, but did say once he had a total engine failure in one of his three engines, but the 727 can fly with only one engine.

This, in almost 15,000 hours of flying time. One of his favorite flying experiences was flying a Munich to Paris to Zurich route for 30 days. Because of usually short layovers, he isn't in any one place for very long. Still he has been able to piece together some great memories of places like Athens, Greece and London by visiting a different attraction each time he goes there.

Merlin doesn't think flying commercially is for everyone. Sometimes he will fly for 14 hours with only a ten hour layover, and dinner at McDonald's. Overall though he describes his job as an "incredible opportunity." He has seen a lot of interesting places, met a lot of great people, flown major league ball-teams, and college football teams.

Merlin now lives in St. Lewis, Missouri, but still calls Berea home. He was here visiting his parents when he spoke. As I listened to the 49 year-old Merlin describe his experience, I saw a man who had achieved his lofty goals after a lot of hard work and perseverance. But you could still see the gleam in his eye that a little boy with a dream to fly once had.

would be a pilot. Anyone can wish on for a dream, but it's a special person who is willing to pay the price to make it happen.

When Merlin was a senior in high school he was out cruising one day when he came across a small airport he didn't know existed. He was excited to find Lackey's Airport, and soon began taking flying lessons there. He soloed on October 10, 1959. It's a date which has a double meaning for Merlin, because it is also the date in 1984 that he first flew as captain for TWA on a Boeing 727. But let's not get ahead of ourselves. "Billy would over train you so you would pass an extra tough check ride," said Merlin.

Merlin graduated from Berea College with a degree in industrial arts. He then got a job in Dearborn at Ford and enrolled at Burnside-OTT Aviation Training Center near Miami, Florida. With only 110 hours flying time he began training for his commercial, instrument, multi-engine, and instructor ratings. Miami served as a hub for commercial aviation, so he was in the right place when TWA came knocking.

He was hired by TWA in March 1966. Merlin was put through a highly concentrated training program with highly motivated students. It consisted of six weeks of ground school, three weeks of simulator training, and then two weeks operating as flight engineer with someone watching over you. He became a crew member in July, 1966 as flight engineer.

Merlin had to bide his time in order to become captain. He has flown on 747's and 707's as well

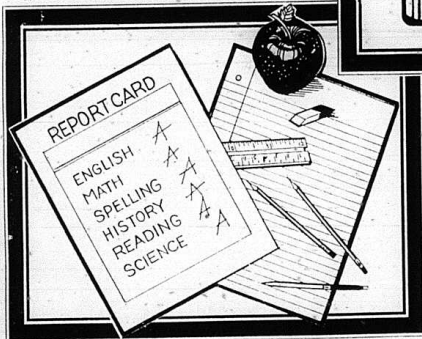
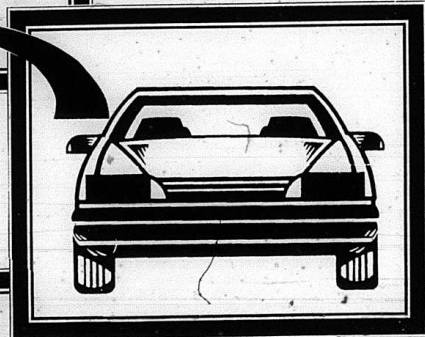

Wyatt taken prisoner again while excavating Ark

For the second time, the son of a Livingston couple is believed to have been taken prisoner in the Middle East.

Ronald Wyatt, 58, of Madison, Tenn., was excavating on the site of Noah's Ark when he was taken prisoner by the Kurds, a Moslem religious fundamentalist group whose homes are in Turkey and Iraq.

"We have no idea who they were, or why they have been kidnapped,"

Hobert Wyatt said, "and neither does the Turkish government. All we can do is hope the kidnapers will contact authorities and turn them loose."

Three Australians who were also working at the site were taken.

Even the U.S. State Department did not offer much help. In a letter to the Wyatts, the department expressed its concern but said "As you are already aware the official policy of the United States government is to make no

concessions to the terrorists holding Americans hostage. The government will not pay ransom, exchange prisoners or change its policies. We pray that your son and his colleagues will be released soon."

The group was excavating the site to learn more about the ark. Wyatt has been a frequent visitor in the Middle East in search of religious artifacts.

Wyatt and his two sons, Danny and

Ronald, were taken prisoner in 1985 in Saudi Arabia and were accused of spying. They were released 76 days later after negotiations by the U.S. State Department and the Saudi Arabian government.

In a 1985 Signal article Hobert Wyatt recalled that Ronald Wyatt had been an adventurer from an early age. He and his older brother would explore caves around Livingston, the old battlefield on Wildcat

Mountain, and the land around the Rockcastle River. They found a scabbard you put your sword in and I guess that's where he got the idea of trying to find different things."

About six years ago, Wyatt took up archaeology as a serious hobby and began to fulfill a lifelong dream. In a booklet, he wrote and was published in 1980, "Noah's Ark Found," Wyatt stated: "It has been my determined desire since an early age to do something during my life to express my gratitude to my loving God for His personal integrity and all enduring kindness toward myself and our kind."

Wyatt was concerned about how he could help prove God the Creator of the world, and after praying he made a decision. "The first of five projects was to locate the remains of Noah's Ark and to prove its existence beyond reasonable doubt." The sum-

mer of 1977 found Wyatt and his two sons "hurling along the poorly maintained roads of eastern Turkey" in search of the remains of one of the oldest religious relics: Noah's Ark.

After two trips to the mountains of Anatolia, a hair-raising escape from a band of Turkish outlaws, and the exhilarating find of a boatshaped object, Ronald Wyatt felt certain he had located the legendary Noah's Ark. His suspicions were further confirmed when the measurements of the boat matches those given by the Bible for the ark and when samples of the boat were tested at Galbraith Laboratories in Knoxville, Tenn. that found it to be a wooden object.

The last time Mr. and Mrs. Wyatt saw their son was on Aug. 8 when he attended the Laurel County Homecoming.

Weaver gets more "help" than needed

When James Weaver asked the Sheriff to investigate a shooting on his property he got "more than he bargained for."

When Deputies Darrell Doan and Ronnie Roark walked on the property on Brushy Ridge they found 17 marijuana plants and a bag of fertilizer.

Deputy Doan said he asked Weaver if they were his plants, he replied "yes."

Weaver was charged with cultivating marijuana.

Emergency Loans available to farmers from FmHA

Governor Wallace G. Wilkinson was notified by letter Tuesday that the Farmers Home Administration would make emergency loans available to farmers in 36 Kentucky counties, including Rockcastle, where storm damage in July damaged farm buildings and crops.

"Our farmers were hard hit with storms and flooding during the period between July 8 and 12. During those four days some counties suffered severe thunderstorms, tornadoes and flash flooding. Farmers not only lost crops, but a number of them reported the loss of farm buildings and fencing. I am pleased that the Farmers Home Administration has declared these counties eligible for loans."

Wilkinson sent his request to the Federal government in early August, when damage assessments were completed.

In addition to Rockcastle, other counties are: Bourbon, Clark, Garrard, Harrison, Laurel, Madison, Owen, Robertson, and Scotts.

Twenty six other counties are eligible for FmHA EM loan assistance. Included in nearby counties are Jackson, Clay, Lincoln, McCreary and Pulaski.

Applications may be made until April 20, 1992 for assistance. FmHA officials are at the ASCS office from 9 a.m. to noon on Wednesday.

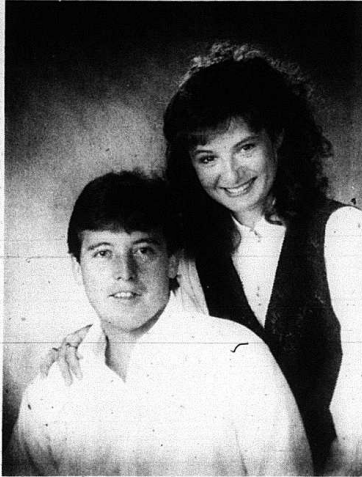

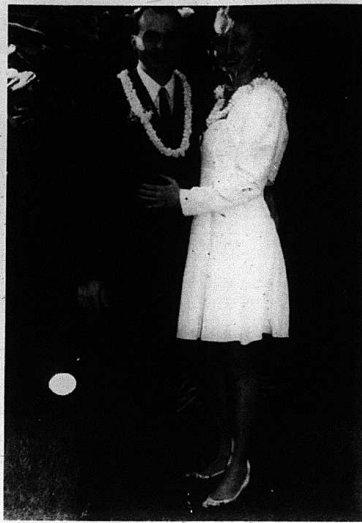

Teen Center Perspectives

Raising a child to be independent does not mean that he will grow up, move away, and give little thought to his family or community. It means that the child will be able to make choices, state his needs, and walk with confidence wherever he goes. It is achieved by exposing the child to a wide variety of experiences, refusing to hover over the child and protect him from his mistakes, and consistently allowing him to make choices and state his opinion on everyday matters.

Last week at the Teen Center the ten or twelve teens present were asked to go out on a service project for about an hour. Those who worked would get a free meal when they got back and they could go home, within reason, what they wanted to eat and help prepare it. So they were asked who wanted to eat and what they wanted so the food could be bought. Only two raised their hands. The rest just looked blank even though the offer was reiterated; so the two changed their minds. An hour later when they returned, they were hungry. The staff decided to go ahead and feed them (this time) to reinforce the [fellowship of cooking and eating together. But the astounding thing is the teens' inability to state a simple decision. Expressing ideas at Teen Council is equally difficult. Activities that will constitute their program should be decided by the teens. But time after time teens show up at the last minute because they are unable to make a decision in advance.

Every day family life must continually include setting goals, planning toward goals, and giving children opportunities to state their wants and needs so that these can be worked in with the family plans. Teens' ideas and opinions must be heard and respected, and they must be allowed to make mistakes. Consequences may

be set for mistakes, but unless they are truly dangerous, mistakes must be allowed to happen. Teens must experience the cause and effect relationship in their decisions and actions.

The CAP Teen Center provides a full schedule of activities for ages 12 through high school. If you have questions about any activities or transportation, phone 256-4919.

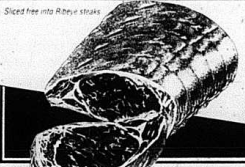

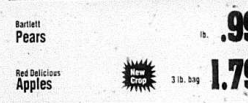

Parents may nominate themselves or another parent for election by submitting the name, in writing, to

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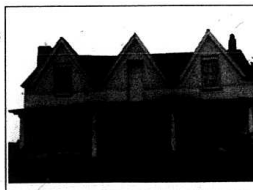

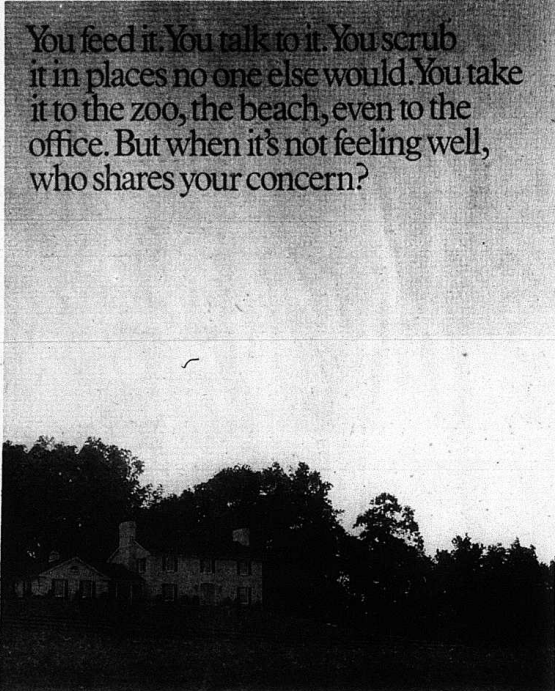

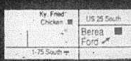

Strike force hitting marijuana growers hard

Between Jan. 1 through Sept. 6 a total of 667,864 marijuana plants have been destroyed by the Governor's Strike Force.

A total of 236 alleged growers have been arrested.

In Rockcastle, the Strike Force has destroyed 6,784 plants, up slightly from the previous reporting period.

In the Cumberland Valley Area Development District the total now stands at 158,746 plants second only to Kentucky River-ADD which reports 265,041.

"The effort is continuing with the same determination that personnel from the program's 15 participating agencies have shown all year," said Strike Force Chairman Gary Faulkner. "We will be cutting down

marijuana plants as long as they can be found."

The 667,864 marijuana plants destroyed in Kentucky to date this year represents an increase over 1990's 536,262 plant total. Faulkner credited the 131,622 plant jump to the cooperation shown daily by the Strike Force agencies.

Governor Wallace G. Wilkinson created the Strike Force last year to combat marijuana cultivation within the Commonwealth. Fifteen agencies unite their eradication efforts into a program. In addition, the people

Connection fees priority for district

An effort to get more customers to come up with advanced water connection fees for a proposed line in the Brush Creek, Three Links, Climax areas is a major priority for the Rockcastle County Water Association.

Jack Crawford, engineer of the county project, told association members at a meeting, that only 40 percent of the householders in those areas have committed to justify the lines. 80 percent are needed for the estimated \$490,000 project.

Two officials from the Kentucky Department of Mines and Minerals took samples of spring and well water in the Sand Springs-Pongo areas for testing. Some water was clear, some milky.

They also obtained information from residents concerning their water source and sicknesses in the fam-

ily.

The test will determine if a detailed study is needed. If needed, the study will indicate if an engineer should be hired by the county with his expenses covered by a 100 percent grant.

Should the water prove contaminated the state would fund a water line throughout the area. Contamination would likely come from old abandoned mines in the area.

The association voted to have Crawford perform a preliminary study and application for funds for the Red Hill-Lamero-Sand Hill area to provide water. That project is tentatively estimated by about \$500,000.

Association officers were re-elected for the coming year. They are: Harold Ballinger, president; Geraldine Mize, vice president and money Ed Cummins, secretary/treasurer.

Jones and campaign spending reform

A few weeks ago Democratic gubernatorial candidate Breton Jones was in Renfro Valley for a get acquainted and fund raising event.

During a short question and answer session Jones said that it was a must that the next Governor's administration tackle campaign reform. He said that he was in favor of limiting contributions to candidates because it had simply gotten out of hand in our Commonwealth.

And then a couple weeks later the Lexington Herald-Leader ran a story revealing who some of Jones' contributors have been and how much they have donated to his campaign.

The main point of the Herald-Leader's story was that fact that Jones had received a lot of money from the horse industry. Myself I don't see that as any big deal. Jones is a horse man and it is only logical that friends and business associates are going to support his campaign.

But, what I did find interesting was the amount of some of the contribution. Many of Jones' contributors gave the maximum amount granted by law of \$4,000 a person. And Jones, who says that we have to get a handle on campaign finance, has raised over \$4 million dollars for his gubernatorial bid.

At Renfro, Jones pointed out that Larry Forgy was indeed right in making an issue out of campaign finance in the primary and that it was getting impossible for the common man to get elected to state-wide public office.

In the primary Forgy invoked his own finance reform and did not accept any contribution over \$300. He did not have to have the

state legislature tell him to do so, he simply knew that it was not ethical to accept large amounts of money from special interest groups. Latest statistics show that 19 percent of Jones' contribution came from out-of-state interests.

Rockets claim second victory; beat Metcalfe County 36-0

The Rockcastle County Rockets football team captured their second victory in as many tries Friday night with an easy win over Metcalfe County, 36-0.

In what seemed to be a lopsided game for the Rockets, head coach Tom Larkey felt his team was not ready to play. "We weren't up for the game at all," he said Tuesday afternoon. "I feel the trip a lon and i just wore us out," he added.

Ready or not, the Rockets did manage to score every time they had possession of the ball in the first half.

With just 5:44 left in the first quarter, J.D. Harris scored the Rockets' first touchdown of the game from Metcalfe's 44 yard line. Harris completed the two-point conversion and the Rockets had an eight point

lead. Metcalfe County started their next drive from their own 28 yard line and eight plays later, they were first and goal on the Rockets' one yard line. But, on the next play, the Rockets not only denied the end-zone but the Rockets' stripped the ball from a Metcalfe player and sophomore J.D. Bussell was there to recover the fumble.

"We got whipped the first quarter, they just kept knocking the ball down our throats," Coach Larkey said. "But I had confidence they couldn't stop our offense," he added.

The Rockets next drive started on their own one yard line and 10 plays later, J.D. Harris scored the second touchdown from inside the five yard line. Curtis Cotton's extra point attempt was good and with 9:49 left

in the first half, the Rockets were leading 15-0.

This 99 yard drive by the Rockets consisted of runs by Harris, Johnathon Saylor, William Bullens and a 36 yard pass from Scott Parkey to William Hellard.

"I was real pleased with Scott Parkey's performance at quarterback," Coach Larkey said, "he passed the ball well and directed his team down the field well."

The Rockets scored their final touchdown of the half when Parkey completed a 35 yard pass to Jason Kirby. The Rockets scored their third touchdown in three possessions and had a comfortable 21 point lead going into halftime.
