





Three Australians who were also working at the site were taken.

Even the U.S State Department did not offer much help. In a letter to the Wyatts, the department expressed its concern but said "As you are already aware the official policy of the United States government is to make no

concessions to the terrorists holding Americans hostage. The government will not pay ransom, exchange pris-oners or change its policies. We pray that your son and his colleagues will be released syon."

Ronald, were taken prisoner in 1985 in Saudi Arabia and were accused of spying. They were released 76 days later after negotiations by the U.S. State Department and the Saudi Arabian government.
