

When rain strikes the bare ground, it carries some of the topsoil down the slope with it.

Forests help prevent una a struc-tion of the land by erosion.

The leaves of the forest trees break the fall of rain. The roots of grass and matting of decayed leaves form a soil which absorbs much fo the water.

The water sinks into the ground This prevents floods as well as ero-sion. Some of the absorbed water finds its way finally to springs and streams feeding them continuously. Forests and forest products have

always been important to man. We need forests to provide food, fuel, transportation and building materi-

Forest fires do more than dama

Forest fires do more than damage rees. They change the whole forest for many years to come. Fire often removes the layer of decaying matter from the forest floor, wijning out the seedlings there and weakening the roots of mature trees. A serious fire may even descript the soil in a forest. Flames may burn the humust (decayed organic matter in the soil) as well as the trees. The soil then dries out and can easily be blown and washed away. In Rockeastle County alone, forest fires are becoming a major problem.

"We believe that the unit of care is the patient and the patients family," said Stolte. "When you come into Hospice, it means that the disease has won. What wetry to do is see that the person is comfortable as possible on a medical level, and on a psych social level and to help them and the families have as full a life as possible."

Hospice wants to help the family as well as the client. That Hospice brochure says that 'Through the Hospice program, a tremendous amount of love is both given and received. \*The best prevention is being alert to the conditions that cause an accident. If you are driving in an area where animats may be near or crossing the highway, slow down. Look as far alead as possible and be prepared to deal with an animal on the road at any moment.

\* If you see an animal in your lane, squeeze the brakes rather than applying them hard and skidding. Braking hard causes the front end of cars to din and laneaceach between the state of the skidding. dip and increases the chance an animal will come over the hood and through the windshield.

\* If you hit an animal, pull safely off the side of the road and turn on your hazard flashers. If the animal is alive, it may be dangerous. Send for help (Kentucky State Police or other law enforcement agency) and warn oncoming cars. If it is dead and block-ing traffic, move it to the side of the road where it won't cause another

An Ordinance Establishing Rates for The Livingston Municipal Water System and Repealing All Inconsistent Ordinances

WHEREAS, the city is in the process of upgrading am refinancing the water system through federal grant and loan monies

WHERPAS, it is necessary to adjust user rates to provide for debt service on the use of loan funds from the Farmers Home Administration, a previous bond issue and maintenance of general operations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City of Livingston, Kentucky, as follows:

Section One: Monthly Water Rates

2,000 gallons @ \$12.00 - Minimum Bill 3,000 gallons @ \$ 5.00 - per 1,000 gallons 5,000 gallons @ \$ 4.00 - per 1,000 gallons 10,000 gallons @ \$ 3.50 - per 1,000 gallons Next All Over

Section Two: Uses of Revenue

The revenues generated by this Ordinance shall be used for the payment of long-term debt obligations, payment of operating costs and general repairs and improvements to the system.

Section Three: Repeal of Inconsistent Ordinances

All Ordinances, or parts, sections or subdivisions thereof, inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall become effective upon passage and publication as prescribed by law.

#### Lindgren addresses students

County /Destination Graduation Tutoring Program at Rockeastle County High School, John Lindgren, Channel 36 news anchor, stressed the value of a good education and a high school diploma for Kentucky high school students today. Lindgren told the students, 'This year nearly one million tiens will drop out of school, to a life of frustration and unrealized dreams."

"Dropouts get menial, low paying os and have no future. Skills for the 1990's labor market require workers to learn new skills for a good job. Fierce competition from goods duced in other countries is expe to hurt the American uneducated work force," he told the students.

Lindgren went on with more grim statistics. "Kentucky is last in the nation with number of adults 25 and with a high school diploma

older with a high school diploma."
Kenucky is last with only 53
percent of the population having high
school diplomas. More than 800,000
people in Kentucky have less than an
eighth grade education. Dropouts go
on to be heads of households, and go
on with the cycle of poverty.
"More dropouts," he said," are on
welfare. Eighty to ninety percent ret

welfare. Eighty to ninety percent get aid to dependent children. Two of three prisoners in Kentucky are drop-outs and it costs \$15,000 to maintain risoner. People who dropout are orer health and are dissatisfied

one passessing poor health and are usessing poor health and are usessing poor with their personal lives.

Lindgren emphasized the importance of getting the best education possible. He said students should not failures hold them back, when Pick possible. He said students shoutd not let past failures hold them back, "Everyone experiences failure. Pick up and make it right. Students who choose to dropout bear the conse-


