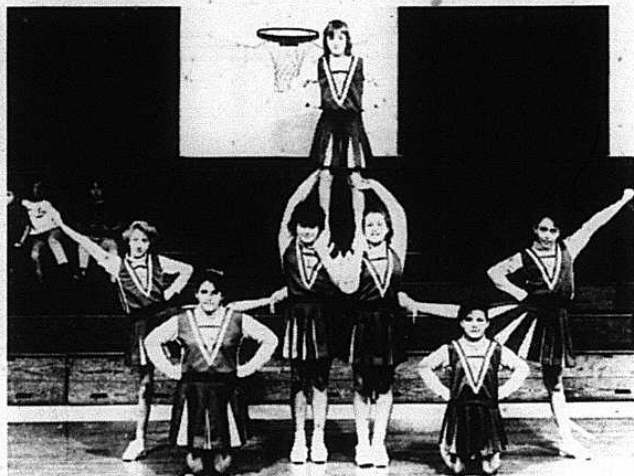

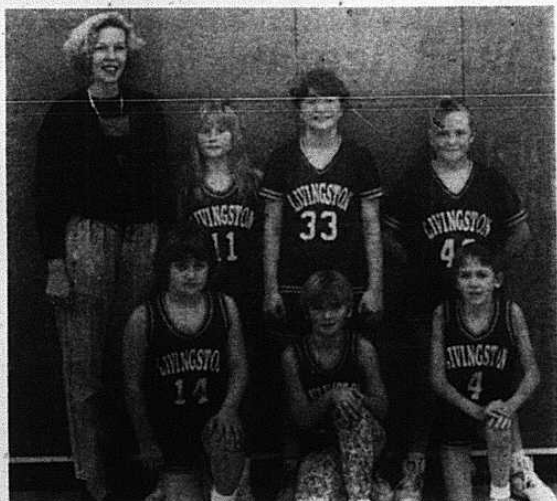

team can pass the ball great. "I've emphasized teamwork ever since I first came, and they are finally coming around with that portion of the game, now we just have to put the ball in the basket," Beaver said.

60 pounds Marijuana found in Brogan car

If Betty Brogan had not drowned in the Dix River last week she could have ended up in jail.

When Brodhead Policeman, Joe Bussell, and Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan finally met all requirements for opening the trunk of her car, they found 21 bags of marijuana, (63 pounds) estimated with a street value of \$150,000, more or less.

The story became a little more "interesting" when the car in which Brogan died was taken to Policeman Bussell's house.

Police became suspicious when two strange men were seen near the car before the trunk was drilled open. Later, someone saying they were Detective Hopkins from Lincoln County asked police to come to Lincoln County to help with an arrest.

A check with Lincoln County showed no Detective Hopkins was an employee nor did they even know the name.

Suspicious, Bussell drilled the trunk open and found the marijuana, probably usable since it was in plastic, or most of it.

"I just think someone was trying to get us away so they could get the marijuana," Bussell said. "We just didn't fall for that."

Speculation is that Brogan was a hauler for someone from somewhere else and had made the mistake of trying to cross Grassy Creek when it was rising during the heavy rain.

The car was swept into Dix River on Dec. 2. It was found Dec. 4, two miles down river. Dozens of persons converged on the area to help search for the victim.

Emergency agencies will receive \$10,954 for food

Rockcastle County will receive \$10,954 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the county.

A local board, made up of County Judge Executive Roland Mullins, the Red Cross and others will determine how the funds are to be distributed. The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive

these funds and any additional funds available under the phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local governmental or private voluntary organizations chosen to receive funds must: 1) be non-profit, 2) have an accounting system and conduct an annual audit, 3) practice nondiscrimination,

4) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs and 5) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying organizations are urged to apply.

Jones dies in Lexington, wife charged

Mrs. Elizabeth Jones, 50, of East Bernstad posted a \$50,000 bond in District Court Monday for her appearance Dec. 18. She is charged with the murder of her husband.

Gene A. Jones, 54, died Saturday morning in the University of Kentucky Medical Center Monday after a .38 caliber gunshot wound to the head he suffered Dec. 3 at their Shell Service Station at Renfro Valley.

In addition to the Shell Station, the Joneses own the new Ft. Sequoyah on the I-75 Livingston interchange. According to reports, Mrs. Jones came to the service station and rammed her car into a double bay door, shot two times into the station then went inside where she shot again, striking her husband.

An earlier \$100,000 bond, set by Trial Commissioner Robert Robinson was reduced by Judge William T. Cain to \$50,000.

Carlos Carloftis dies suddenly

Carlos Carloftis, 76, founder of the original Fort Sequoyah, died Wednesday, Dec. 11, 1991 at Marymount Hospital in London.

A director of the Bank of Mt. Vernon at one time, he came to the Livingston area in 1954 and started a souvenir business near the Rockcastle-Laurel County line which he operated successfully for many years.

He was taken to Bowling Funeral Home in London where arrangements are incomplete. A family member said the funeral may be held at the Livingston Baptist Church but that was still undecided.

Towery announces McKinney new BES principal

Brodhead assistant principal Mark McKinney has been hired as the new principal at Brodhead Elementary school.

McKinney, of Brodhead, will take the position effective Jan. 1, 1992, according to Rockcastle School Superintendent Bige Towery Jr.

Current principal Tom Payne, will retire effective December 31. The selection process was completed by Towery with the aid of the School Effectiveness Advisory Committee. The group interviewed and voted unanimously to hire McKinney, who was the only applicant for the job. Superintendent Towery said Wednesday that he would fill the vacancy created by McKinney's appointment as soon as possible.

Larry Hammonds, supervisor of student services, briefed the board on the current attendance status. Although attendance has decreased this

week, the fluctuation does not present a problem that would cause the school system to close down for illness as surrounding counties have done recently.

The program also presented an attendance incentive project that would encourage schools to increase attendance percentages. Since budgets do rely on daily attendance figures, it is important to have a high number of pupils attending daily.

The program allots money to schools who achieve an average monthly attendance of over 96 percent present. The money is figured on the following formula: the number of percentage points over 96, multiplied by the number of students, multiplied by the days of attendance. This money will be given to the schools to be used as they wish, for things such as pizza parties and field trips.

Christian Appalachian Project presented the school board with awards of excellence and appreciation. CAP representative, Glen Taul, presented the awards. He stated that the school has been considered in being chosen as a Family Life Center, which is at the Family Life Center for women.

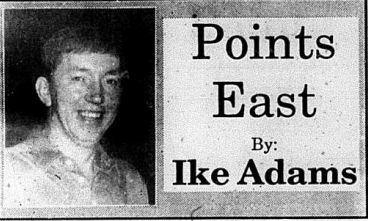

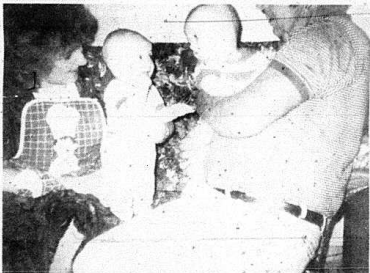

Drugs is an emotional-laden subject. Guilt and denial enter into almost any discussion about drinking or drugging, and when you talk to your children about drugs they often feel they must stand up for the behavior of their friends and peer group as well as for themselves. So it is a topic that is often avoided. It is important that parents not only are clear where they stand on the issue of drugs and alcohol, but it is important that they band together with other parents in the community so that the peer group is getting a consistent message. Research shows that one major factor involved in high-risk alcohol use is that those in-

involved have received mixed messages. If your church teaches abstinence, but the family drinks, even in moderation, the child is confused. If that same family can be honest enough to discuss openly their choice to drink, and how it meshes with the church's teaching, the child has some foundation upon which to base his own decisions. The fact is that one or two drinks do not have physically adverse effects on adults who are not predisposed by heredity to the disease of alcoholism. On the other hand, any drinking is risky for children because their brains and nervous system are not yet fully developed, (until about age 21) their judgement is more easily impaired, and addition is more likely to occur in youth. Lecturing and making rules that you cannot enforce don't work with children who are rebellious by nature. (See last week's column) or clearly stating your feelings.

Parents must stay in control. This requires being calm, because if you lose control of your own emotions, you have lost control of the situation. Scaring the child into submission is a short-term solution. Teaching the child what control is all about will enable him to control his drinking/drugging choices in the long run.

Clearly explain the family's views on drinking preferably long before a crisis occurs. "I better not ever catch you drinking!" is an ineffective threat. Be ready for some common arguments.
 "The Bible says Jesus and His disciples drank wine."
 "Everybody has a few beers and nobody's ever gotten hurt."
 "Smoking pot's no big deal... just be glad I don't drink."
 Be informed. An excellent booklet for parents about drugs is avail-

able free at the new Youth Services Center office across the street from the Board of Education. Stop by and pick one up. Staff is also available there to talk with you about services available for youth and parents.



An Ordinance Establishing Rates for The Livingston Municipal Sewer System and Repealing All Inconsistent Ordinances

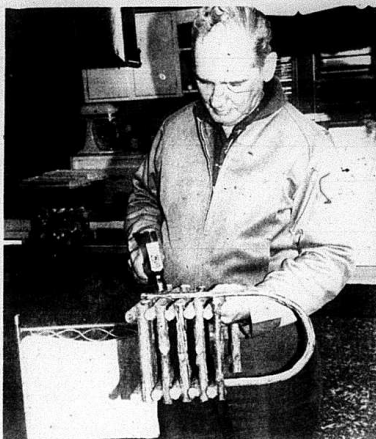
Russell is willow branch genius

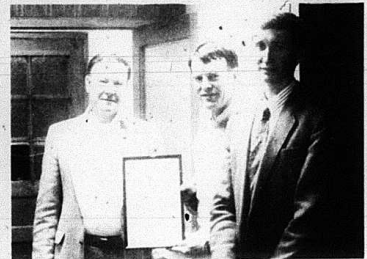

Hospice program is important for the terminally ill patient

"The dying person is a living person," says Tammy Kipp, Kipp a Berea College Senior, is a Hospice volunteer and the SFA Hospice Coordinator. She works with Annrieta Stolte of the Richmond office Hospice of the Kentucky River Inc.

November is National Hospice Awareness Month. Hospice helps people who have six months or less to live. They do not turn anyone away regardless of whether or not they have insurance.

Clients who receive the services of Hospice live within the organization's geographic area. This area includes the counties of Estill, Jackson, Lee, Madison, and Rockcastle. The program requires that there be present an in-home care giver.

Hospice uses a team approach. "We believe that the unit of care is the patient and the patient's family," said Stolte. "When you come into Hospice, it means that the disease has won. What we try to do is see that the person is comfortable as possible on a medical level, and on a psych/social level and to help them and the families have as full a life as possible."

Hospice wants to help the family as well as the client. The Hospice brochure says that "Through the Hospice program, a tremendous amount of love is both given and received. There is a special awareness that comes from the experience. There is an unparalleled assurance felt when the family is able to say, 'I

did everything possible for the one I loved."

SFA's involvement in the Hospice Program was first initiated by Lisa Perkins. Last spring the program had five volunteers and people are becoming interested in serving others. "In the last two weeks," Tammy Kipp said, "I've had six people ask me when the next training was for new volunteers."

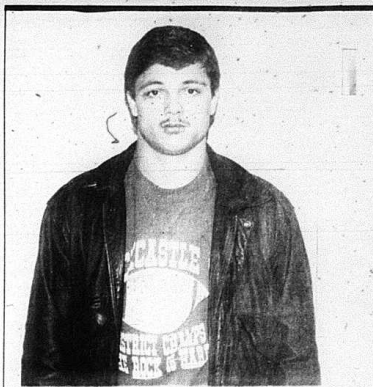
"Hospice provides the opportunity for clients to be with their family in their own home, and have familiar surroundings," Kipp said further.

The program serves anyone with a terminal illness. Persons with cancer are clients that Hospice serves, but the program is not exclusively for cancer patients. All persons who are dying can be served by Hospice.

According to the Hospice brochure, "Hospice meant originally an inn, or a place of refuge for weary travelers."

"Hospice is really a very special way of caring, hospice brings hope and caring attitudes of support into a situation that is not hopeful," Stolte said.

There is a way for people to get involved in the program. People can volunteer by calling the Rockcastle County Hospice service at 256-3577, the Richmond office at 624-8820, or by calling SFA at 986-9341 ext. 6561. If you would prefer there is a fund-raising effort in the Richmond Mall. It is called the Snowflakes of Life. Proceeds from the fund-raiser will directly help the Hospice client.

It was a big week for Kentucky basketball.

Doubts reign after the NIT loss to Pittsburgh and remained with the Wildcats for 12 days. It was not the 12 days of Christmas during the Pitino practices.

Kentucky rebounded against a good Massachusetts team which won the Great Alaskan Shootout and is the preseason favorite to win its conference. Still, those doubts remained because the next opponent was big, had Indiana on enemy soil.

It was the Hoosierdome in Indianapolis and Bob Knight's team was a seven point favorite. National television coverage and 35,000 fans created a Final Four atmosphere.

I didn't say Big Four (and who misses that tournament anymore?) It was always should have been the Big Two.

Once again, and this sounds like a broken record, but the difference in the Wildcats' 76-74 win was the three-point shot. Kentucky was on the mark 11 of 23 times while the Hoosiers fired six blanks. An overwhelming difference at the free throw line kept Indiana in the game.

If you can't shoot the three point shots, your team is limited. Kentucky shoots it, Indiana does not. Many Hoosier fans bemoan their lack of good outside shooting. Listen, if Pitino coached the Hoosiers, they would all be expert marksmen.

Did you notice how the Wildcats switched between the zone and man defense against the Hoosiers? or how they backed off the Indiana guard during their shoot the three? For an Indiana fan that was a glaring weakness. Knight is a great coach, but he must adjust his style to at least have a legitimate three point threat.

There is not enough space in this column to commend the place of Jameal Mashburn. It was perhaps his best game as a Wildcat scoring 21 points and grabbing eight rebounds.

The sophomore center put it all together both inside and outside. His between-the-legs steal and layup made all the national highlights. He is dangerous everywhere on the court, but needs to stay inside more to make a bigger impact. The way Mashburn played against the Hoosiers was exactly the way Pitino likes it, with a combination of quickness and power.

This was a pivotal game for the Wildcats and their confidence level. Travis Ford, still injured, is getting better and will make a bigger impact as the season progresses.

John Pelphrey, who goes through a slump every year, is mixed in one now but will shoot out of it soon. Sean Woods played well in his hometown.

The injury to Jeff Brassow was crippling to the Wildcats. The 6-5 junior is a tenacious defender who had the ability to guard big guards like Todd Day and Allen Hussen. Look for Ford and Woods to pair together in the backcourt times, with Woods playing two guard on defense and the point on offense.

Regarding the center position, look for Aminu Timberlake, Andre Riddick and Gimeal Martinez to play 8-10 minutes each.

The two-ho-gum games this week are against Southeast Texas State and Morehead State in Louisville. Since the NCAA banned preseason scrimmages across the state, this game and the Ohio University game in Cincinnati are great ideas.

The Arizona State game on Saturday night should be good, as Bill Frieder's team knocked off New Mexico on the road last week. The Rupp Arena crowd should play a factor.

Watch for deer!

Love knows no boundaries, even highway boundaries, when mating season begins for deer this month. Blue Grass AAA Foundation for safety cautions drivers to be especially watchful for deer crossing highways during November, one of two peak months for deer movement (the other is May). Last year 2,842 cars hit deer on Kentucky highways, often causing car damage and injuries.

Nationally, more game is killed each year by cars than by hunters. The Foundation offers these driving tips:

- * The best prevention is being alert to the conditions that cause an accident. If you are driving in an area where animals may be near or crossing the highway, slow down. Stay aware of your maneuvering options. Search both sides of the road for animals or signs they may be near. Look as far ahead as possible and be prepared to deal with an animal on the road at any moment.

- * If you see an animal in your lane, squeeze the brakes rather than applying them hard and skidding. Braking hard causes the front end of cars to dip and increases the chance an animal will come over the hood and through the windshield.

- * If you hit an animal, pull safely off the side of the road and turn on your hazard flashers. If the animal is alive, it may be dangerous. Send for help (Kentucky State Police or other law enforcement agency) and warn oncoming cars. If it is dead and blocking traffic, move it to the side of the road where it won't cause another accident.

An Ordinance Establishing Rates for The Livingston Municipal Water System and Repealing All Inconsistent Ordinances

WHEREAS, the city is in the process of upgrading and refinancing the water system through federal grant and loan monies, and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to adjust user rates to provide for debt service on the use of loan funds from the Farmers Home Administration, a previous bond issue and maintenance of general operations,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City of Livingston, Kentucky, as follows:

Section One: Monthly Water Rates

First	2,000 gallons @ \$12.00	- Minimum Bill
Next	3,000 gallons @ \$ 5.00	- per 1,000 gallons
Next	5,000 gallons @ \$ 4.00	- per 1,000 gallons
All Over	10,000 gallons @ \$ 3.50	- per 1,000 gallons

Section Two: Uses of Revenue

The revenues generated by this Ordinance shall be used for the payment of long-term debt obligations, payment of operating costs and general repairs and improvements to the system.

Section Three: Repeal of Inconsistent Ordinances

All Ordinances, or parts, sections or subdivisions thereof, inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

This ordinance shall become effective upon passage and publication as prescribed by law.

Lindgren addresses students

Last week, in an address to students participating in the Rockcastle County Destination Graduation Tutoring Program at Rockcastle County High School, John Lindgren, Channel 36 news anchor, stressed the value of a good education and a high school diploma for Kentucky high school students today. Lindgren told the students, "This year nearly one million teens will drop out of school, to a life of frustration and unrealized dreams."

"Dropouts get mental, low paying jobs and have no future. Skills for the 1990's labor market require workers to learn new skills for a good job. Fierce competition from goods produced in other countries is expected to hurt the American uneducated work force," he told the students.

Lindgren went on with more grim statistics. "Kentucky is last in the nation with number of adults 25 and older with a high school diploma. Kentucky is last with only 53 percent of the population having high school diplomas. More than 800,000 people in Kentucky have less than an eighth grade education. Dropouts go on to be heads of households, and go on with the cycle of poverty."

"More dropouts," he said, "are on welfare. Eighty to ninety percent get aid to dependent children. Two of three prisoners in Kentucky are dropouts and it costs \$15,000 to maintain one prisoner. People who dropout are in poor health and are dissatisfied with their personal lives."

Lindgren emphasized the importance of getting the best education possible. He said students should not let past failures hold them back. "Everyone experiences failure. Pick up and make it right. Students who choose to dropout bear the consequences."

The Rockcastle County School System and Eastern Kentucky University are continuing a partnership tutorial program. This program, Destination Graduation, allows Eastern Kentucky University to recruit EKU students who are natives of

Rockcastle County and pay them to serve as tutors in the program. The Destination Graduation tutoring program begins this fall and will be in its fourth year in partnership with the Rockcastle County School System.

The Destination Graduation program provides tutorial assistance primarily to ninth and tenth grade students to build academic skills in math, language arts and study skills. The tutorial assistance is provided by Rockcastle County Eastern Kentucky University students of sophomore standing or higher with a GPA of 2.5 or higher.

The 1991-92 Rockcastle County/Destination Graduation tutors are: Angie Carl, Joyce Cummins, Jennifer Isaacs, Rhonda Johnson, Danny McNew, Tonya Parrett, Melissa VanHoose, Liddell Vaughn and Rebecca Warf.

The tutors also serve as role models to the Rockcastle County High School students, whom they tutor, as examples of Rockcastle County natives who have graduated from high school and who are successfully attending college. The tutors work with the students one hour a week for twelve weeks during the fall and spring semesters. For their assistance, the EKU students tutors are paid \$5 an hour per student.

Training for the tutors is provided at the beginning of the semester with follow-up monthly training on Saturday mornings during the fall and spring semesters.

The Rockcastle County Destination Graduation tutoring program directly supports the Kentucky Education Reform Act, Section 27, which advocates that continuing education be provided for those students identified as needing additional time to achieve the outcomes required by Section 3 of KERA '90.

Destination Graduation is funded through the Council on Higher Education to serve at-risk high school students in the Fifth and Seventh Congressional Districts with monies provided by University Partnership

Program, and the Kentucky State Legislature

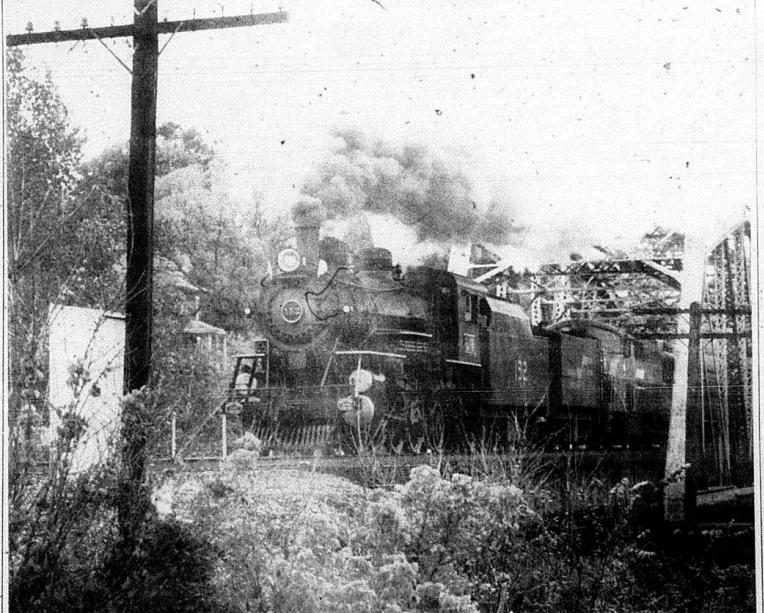

Rockets "shoot" for winning season

Head coach David Perkins is beginning his seventh season with the Rockcastle County Rockets with what he claims is a very young and very inexperienced team.

Returning only two starters, Micah Parkerson and William Bullens, Perkins is having to re-build his starting five around senior, juniors and some sophomores.

"Right now the starting five is very competitive, the slots could go to anyone," Perkins said.

His goals are to get better as the season goes on, to have a winning season also go to the Region. 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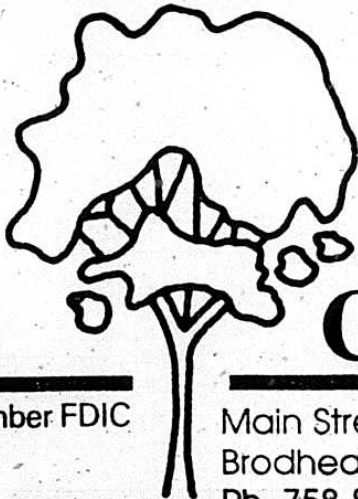

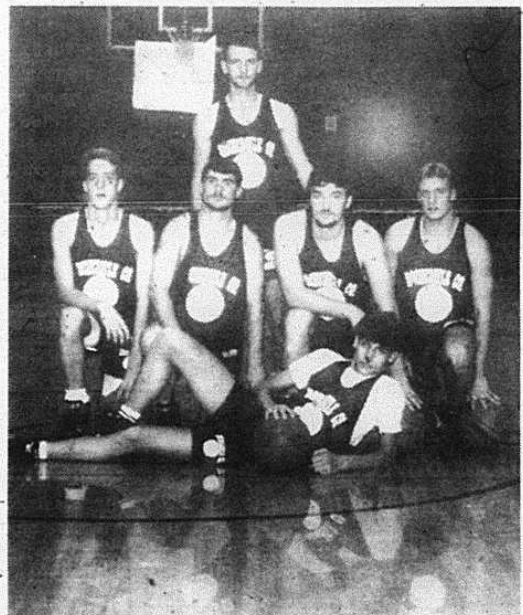
