

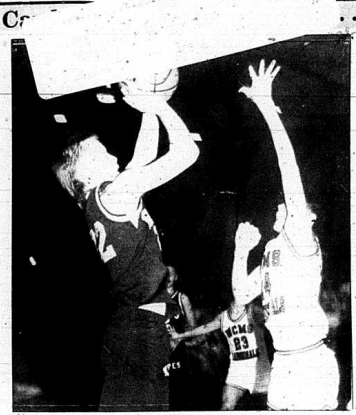

## Tobacco sales have resumed

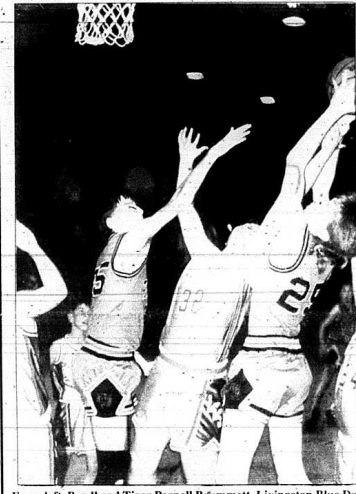
With the holidays behind, tobacco sales resumed Monday, lower in most markets.

## Board to visit potential school sites before vote

The Rockcastle County School Board has yet to make a decision concerning the site for the new high school. At Tuesday's meeting, the school board decided that before making a final decision, they will tour each site before casting final votes.

On Saturday at 9 a.m., the board will gather to visit each site. The board will make a decision following in-depth studies of statistics, visibility, utility availability, and many other characteristics that will determine the best site.

Richard Bray, Assistant Superintendent, discussed the need for road frontage in whatever property was chosen. He stated that if the district was going to spend the estimated 8 million dollars to build a new school, then "we need to build a showcase. It needs to be in a conspicuous place with a lot of road frontage."

Four properties will be viewed on Saturday. They include the following:

- \*56 acres, belonging to Dr. Orson Arvin, behind Drubler's Restaurant.
- \*65 acres, belonging to Clarence Carter and Ford Brothers, located across from the industrial park on Hwy. 461.

- \*139 acres, belonging to Clyde Payne, located off Hwy. 461, behind the Carter/Ford property.

- \*65 acres, belonging to the Industrial Authority, located off U.S. 150 across from the industrial park.

The acreage is a total figure. On all four sites, there are limits to how many of the acres can actually be utilized as a building site. Various landscape characteristics hinder utilizing the total plot.

Superintendent Bige Towery, Jr. stated that one consideration in the board's final decision needs to be large enough to accommodate all sports facilities and future growth.

## System to test effectiveness

Superintendent Towery and Instruction Supervisor, Shelby Reynolds, met with the Director of Effective School Instruction to discuss the fact that Rockcastle County Schools may be the first national pilot site to measure school effectiveness improvements based on performance based assessment.

With many states rejecting standardized testing, Kentucky is leading the way.

According to Bige Towery, Jr., the standardized tests that are given at Rockcastle County are not just multiple choice, fill-in the bubble tests, but they test writing skills and performance skills.

## Poynter re-elected board chairman

George M. Poynter, chairman, and Kenneth Adams, vice-chairman, were re-elected Tuesday night's school board meeting.

Since last year's meetings were frequently changed due to other obligations of board members and school officials, the board decided to change the meetings to the second Tuesday of each month. This will also allow for bills from previous months to be approved within a week or so after the board receives them.

The board approved an application for the construction of the new high school. The application defines the projected construction costs, and will be submitted to the state director of finance and facility management office.

One component of Kentucky's Education Reform includes implementation of Extended School Services, which Rockcastle County has gone beyond the required services. The services include tutoring for at-risk students to promote passing grades and reduce the amount of drop-outs.

Mt. Vernon Elementary School applied for a grant to extend the service, and received \$37,151. The board will contract a co-ordinator to oversee the project.

Two assistant coaches were hired as para-professional, non teaching employees. Jason Couger and Benny Blanton were both hired during December, as reported in the Superintendent's Personnel Action Report.

## Voters should prepare for change in districts

Rockcastle voters should begin thinking of changes in the state's voting districts following reapportionment of the state by the Kentucky General Assembly.

Just last week, for example, Rockcastle now in the 27th Senate District instead of the 15th, got a new senator, Democrat Walter Blevins, Jr. Avon the 27th District Seat defeating Republican Richard White in a special election by over 2 to 1.

The election is for one year to fill the seat vacated by Sen. Woody May.

Rockcastle and Jackson county voters did not cast ballots but will in the May Primary when both Blevins and White will be candidates for a full year including, most likely, several others.

Blevins, 41, a Morehead dentist defeated White, a former Rowan County Republican chairman, 6,343 votes to White's 3,024.

Blevins carried all the counties in

the district except Lee and Owsley. The addition of Rockcastle and Jackson to the district will add Republicans to the heavily Democratic district.

Counties in the district in addition to Rockcastle and Jackson are part of Breathitt, part of Magoffin and all of Elliott, Lee, Menifee, Morgan, Owsley, Rowan and Wolfe.

The change in districts deprives Rockcastle of State Sen. John Rogers of Somerset. Sen. Rogers remains in the 15th Senatorial District which includes Pulaski and Whitley counties.

Blevins called his election a "great win." "I lost all the counties I expected to have a tough time in, but I'm pleased because I had little time to get out and campaign," Blevins concluded. Blevins lost Lee and Owsley counties.

"I'm disappointed," White explained. "I really thought I could win, but I'm going to jump on it and keep on fighting."

If someone in Rockcastle should file for the seat, it must be done by Jan. 28 with the Secretary of State in Frankfort. The primary is May 26.

## Cass presents plan for industrial park

Getting an industrial park ready to show a prospective client can be costly and complicated, but in the end, it could be profitable for the whole area.

That was indicated at a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court last week when Jim Cass of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District came to the court with a construction estimate for the proposed industrial park property on old Ky. 461, now Ky. 2549, and U.S. 150 known as the Henderson property.

That property is owned by the county and is one of two sites under consideration for a new Rockcastle County High School.

Cass brought along two estimates of the cost of preparation. One estimate was \$371,809. The other was \$673,616. The larger amount calls for a lined retention pond costing an added \$80,586 and an added contingency of \$8,000.

Other items listed that were contained in both estimates were:

- Clearing and grubbing, 11,400; garthwork-roadway, \$42,000;
- 12-inch DGA base, \$42,977;
- 3-inch bit base, class 1, \$20,548;
- 1-inch bit surface, \$8,086;
- 10-inch water line, \$141,000;
- Gate valve, \$7,200;
- fire hydrant, \$2,000;
- 6-inch force main, \$48,000;
- lift station, \$50,000.

- Eight-inch gravity sewer, \$36,900;
- sanitary sewer manhole, \$6,000;
- culvert pipe, \$2,400;
- two 4-inch gas lines to site, \$41,320;
- seeding, \$2,193;
- contingency, \$45,202 (changed in

other estimate); engineering, \$49,582; administration, \$25,000.

Cass told the court he would continue to work on plans for the park and report to the court in March.

## Rockcastle River under study

Little by little, the Rockcastle River is becoming a "no no" for commercial or residential development along its banks.

The National Forest Service has decided to study six rivers to determine if sections should be set aside under the National Forest scenic Rivers system in order to preserve their natural beauty.

Several sections of the Rockcastle River will be studied mostly in Pulaski and Laurel counties.

Others include Cumberland River in McCreary and Whitley counties;

It was not discussed how the park work would be funded, but likely from some kind of grant, and/or, low interest loan, or both.

## Indictments

Eleven indictments for crimes ranging from unlawful transaction with a minor to trafficking in marijuana were handed down by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury last Friday.

Sandy "Bisty" Cope, of Carter Ridge Road in Mt. Vernon, was indicted on two counts for a December 27th incident in which she allegedly gave a Mt. Vernon minor a small amount of marijuana. Cope is currently lodged in jail awaiting her January 24th arraignment.

Through his attorney, Morgan said that he was only shaking in the air.

Wednesday in Rockcastle District Court, Anita Smith's parents, who had signed a complaint against Morgan asked that all charges against him be dismissed. District Judge Walter McGuire did not dismiss the charges and continued the case. Morgan is free on bond until his next court appearance.

In a totally unrelated case, Morgan was indicted last Friday by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury for burglary in the second degree and assault in the fourth degree. He is accused of unlawfully entering the home of Peggy Stanley and hitting and choking her. Stanley shot Morgan during the altercation. He will be arraigned on those charges January 24.

So they figured out that a safer plan would be to flush it down the commode. However, one little boy spoke up and protested that THEN the Ninja Turtles might get it!

The vision expressed by this bright little fellow brought peals of laughter to the room. He was the hit of the day. His creative sense of humor pulled us together in a moment of shared merriment. What a gift is a quick mind that can see the light side of things and make people laugh with poignant comments.

here are actually better.

I hope President Bush's trip to Japan wasn't as much a failure as many people think it was, and that foreign markets will loosen their trade barriers to allow more American products, but I can't help but believe that we have caused most of our trade problems and what is even more scary than anything I'm not sure if anyone has the answers to correct the problems, they may be too deeply rooted.

How can parents cultivate humor and creativity in their children? Laughing together as a family is so essential...just letting your feelings bubble out when you are amused by something. Young children are so often amused that it is easy to

Word games while the family is driving along encourage creativity and quick thinking. Playing games together as a family and encouraging children to make up games and put on neighborhood shows give opportunity for creative expression. Watch shows together, go places, and be sure to comment on and discuss what you are seeing. Comment on the passing scene, verbalize as much as you can. Allow your children and yourself to laugh at your own mistakes. Look for the funny side of every situation; there always is one. Young people who have found that joy comes

from within, rarely look for it in a bottle. Joking should never be at the expense of someone else. If some are not finding a comment amusing then the humor is perverse. Mimicking, calling names, uncontrolled silliness for attention are not funny and should be discouraged. Children need parents' calm guidance to help them distinguish good humor from bad. "Marc, you and Stevie are laughing but Sara is in tears because you put her doll in the microwave. I'm disappointed when you use teasing as a way to have fun, what else can you and Stevie think of to do that won't hurt somebody else?"

The Ninja Turtle qualifier made it into the final copy of the second graders' Medicine Safety Rules and is now posted in several bathrooms in Mt. Vernon. Many, many lessons are soon forgotten, but I feel confident that these youngsters will always remember about flushing outdated medicine down the commode. The same magic works in households where training and discipline are seasoned with a sense of humor.

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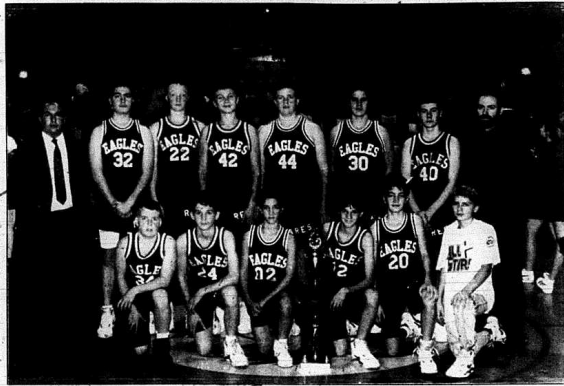

In first round action, the Roundstone Eagles defeated the Mt. Vernon Red Devils, 51-46.

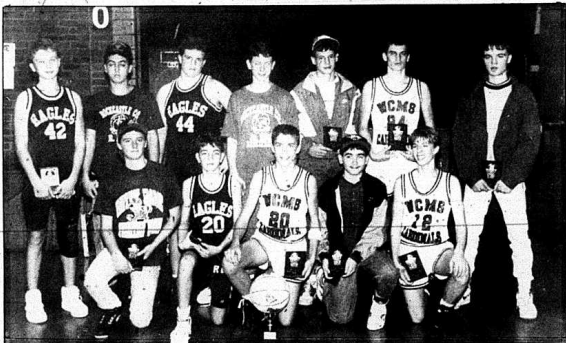
The Red Devils jumped on the Eagles quickly and took a 26-19 lead into the locker room at halftime.

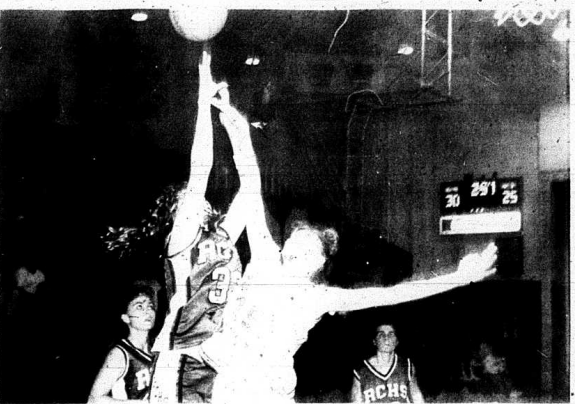

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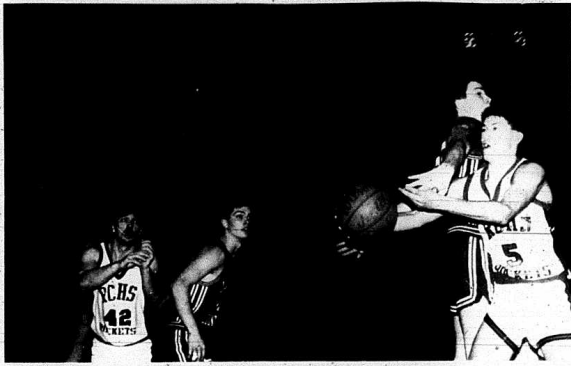
