Last weekend, Kentucky won two games in the NCAA tournament and will play in Philadelphia, one of only 16 teams left in the country that has a chance to win it all.

Last Friday night East Tennessee State sent Chris Mills and Arizona to the house.

Monday night Eric Manuel, banned to a lower level of competition by the NCAA, and his Oklahoma City team won the Division II crown, again.

The only thing that could have made last weekend any sweeter for this U.K. fan, would have been a loss by Eddie Sutton's Oklahoma State Cowboys. Of course you punish his players when he is the one that I would have liked to have seen lose.

The reason for the above comments, U.K.'s problems that were brought on by Sutton's recruitment of Mills. Those recruiting problems brought on the eventual U.K. probation, Sutton's resignation and Manuel's banishment from Division I basketball.

Nevertheless, after it came crashing down, Sutton resigned. Mills rode off into the sunset to

Arizona, totally unscathed, although he was the player getting cash to come to Kentucky, and then center LeRon Ellis transferred to Syracuse. Big deal.

What was left were three Kentucky boys and Sean Woods. They may say they didn't transfer anywhere because they were loyal to Kentucky and that is no doubt the real reason, but chances are when these guys were sophomores they weren't considered major talents and probably would have had a tough time making another Division I team. So they stayed. Although they were banned from post season play, live television and facing the wrath of a new coach, whom they didn't have any

idea who it would be, they stayed.

Now, with the help of coach Rick Pitino, they have brought Kentucky basketball back to the level that only a few programs in the country enjoy each and every year. This U.K. team is led by four seniors who deserve to win the National Championship. The basketball gods would be justified in allowing U.K. to beat Duke in the finals of the East Region, advance to the final four and defeat Bobby Knight again this season for the title. (Or even better, Eddie Sutton). The title would help erase a lot of bad memories for these seniors and this is one fan that thinks U.K. has got a chance against Lactner and boys.

Of course, there is usually a silver lining in every cloud and in this case, U.K. got a much better coach out of the deal and we didn't have to watch Sean Sutton try to play for two more years.

Crippling cuts to vocational educ. in eastern Ky.

vocational education offices in Kentucky. Four out of eight of these offices to be closed are located in Eastern Kentucky. It was recommended by Senator Berger that this office be closed and moved to Hazard to be combined with the Hazard Regional Office. This is very hard to understand when the real unemployment rate in some counties is more than 42 percent. It is very important that training be provided, more so in Southeastern Kentucky than any other area of the state. It seems unrealistic to cut back on vocational training and to move these regional office people, who promote training, further away from Southeastern Kentucky. To reduce unemployment, industry is needed and to attract industry into this area; a trained work force is needed. Over one hundred short term industry training programs are developed each year by the regional office. Direct industry training programs were developed with industry utilizing the staff at this regional office. Over one hundred community service programs are developed each year, working with the fire stations in Southeastern Kentucky; EMT classes with the ambulance services of each county; Mine safety training classes, which are necessary prior to employment in the mining field; Special programs for handicapped students;

Special summer programs for disadvantaged students and Surface mining programs for those already employed in the mining field. How could an already overworked staff at the Hazard Vocational Regional Office continue the development of these programs. There are some programs that are particular only to this region that were developed by staff in this London regional office. No other regional office and especially not the Hazard office can show interest in these particular classes. One of these programs is the trucking program which generates enough funds to pay for the teachers' salaries and maintenance on the trucks with no cost to the taxpayer. Every student graduating from this

program can be placed on a job paying \$25,000 or more a year. There are seven trucking companies waiting on graduates. The equipment training program is closing the scars of these mountains by reclaiming abandoned strip lands. They are putting the contours back to original and reseed these areas. This class buys its own equipment at no cost to the taxpayer. Two agriculture programs in the region work closely with farmers in this area and have received awards for having such programs in Southeastern Kentucky. This program alone generated more than a \$1,500,000 income for farmers involved. This London office has developed partnership programs with Southeast Community College and Somerset College, whereby students in some programs receive technical training from the schools and the general education courses required by colleges for an Associate degree. This makes the students very employable. This office has developed twenty one teachers and programs with the community college systems to receive these associate degrees. No other region has developed programs of this type. No other regional office

Purcell gets inside view of legislature

A University of Kentucky student from Brodhead is among the 22 students receiving a first-hand look at Kentucky's political process in action by serving as a legislative aide during the 1992 General Assembly. Alan Purcell is a senior majoring in political science and works with Rep. Larry Clark. Purcell, who receives academic credit for his efforts, handles con-

stituent mail as it requests, does research, tracks bills, attends committee meetings, and does other tasks assigned by the legislators.

UK students have been serving as legislative aides in Frankfort since the 1970s as part of a program in UK's political science department. Penny Miller, a UK political science professor who supervises the program says it has steadily grown in popularity. This year's group of students is the largest yet, and was selected from more than 50 applicants. Most, but not all, are majoring in political science.

"The students are getting an understanding of the practical political process—applying some of the things they've learned in the classroom to the real world of politics," she said. Each student works with two or three legislators. Once a week the entire group meets with Miller to discuss what they have been doing. One sacrifice the legislative aides must make is no spring break. "This program is a great learning experience for students," said Miller. "It gives them the opportunity to experience the dynamics and reality of the Kentucky legislature."

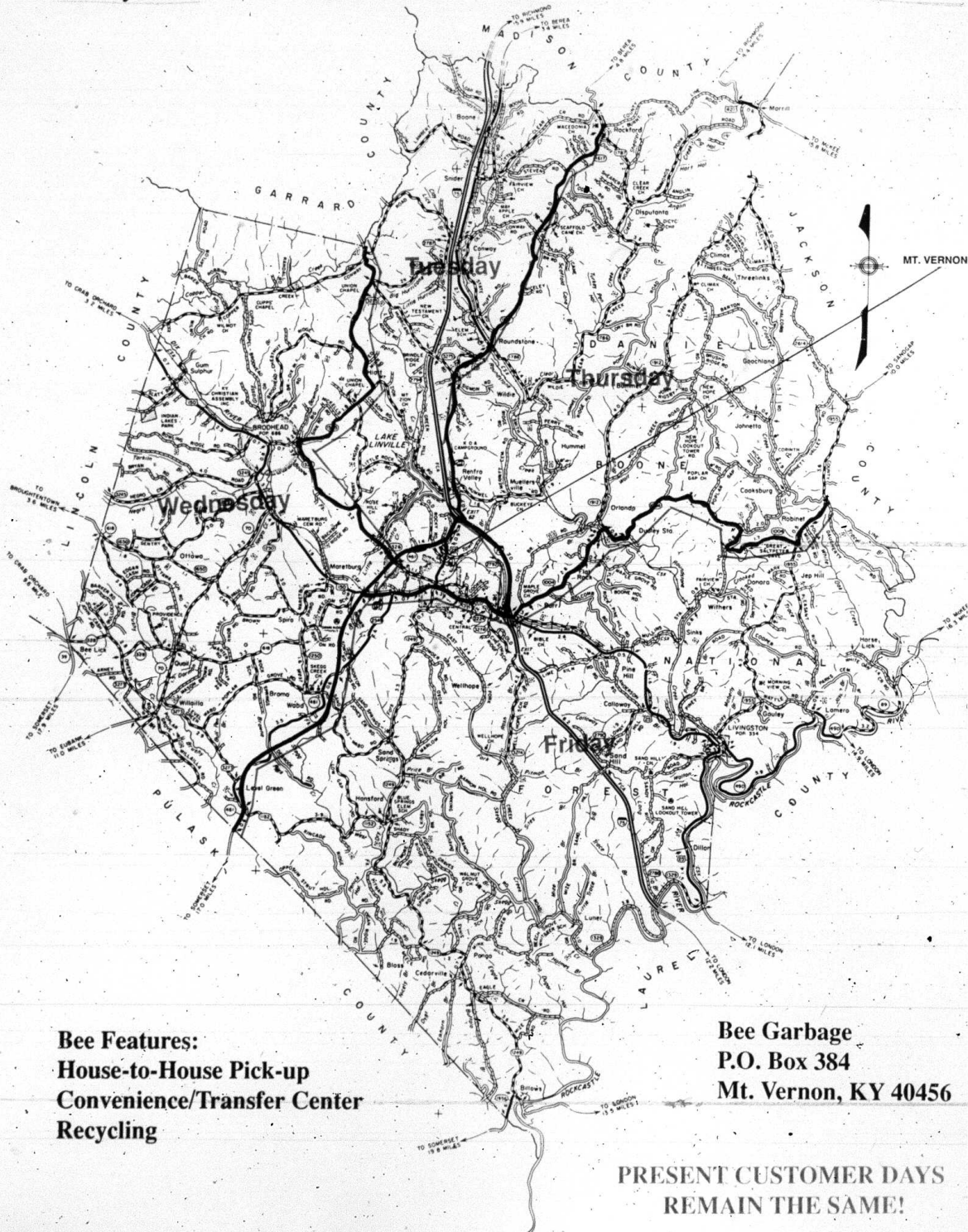

West found competent for "revenge murder" trial

Michael West, 23, of Barbourville Road, London, has been found competent to stand trial for the August 7 "revenge murder" of a Mt. Vernon woman.

West, who allegedly killed Margaret Louise Alcorn, 30, of Mt. Vernon, by walking into the Family Dollar Store on Main Street in London and firing a .25 caliber pistol seven times at close range as Alcorn was stocking shelves in the middle

of the store, was found competent by a psychiatric evaluation performed by the Kentucky Corrections Psychiatric Center.

However, West's attorney, Tom Kimball, told circuit judge Rod Messer that he was not given an opportunity to give other key evidence to KCPC at LaGrange that may have been pertinent to West's evaluation.

That evidence included that West may be suffering from a neurological disorder, had seizures as a baby, and was in special classes while he was in school.

Messer ruled that Kimball would be able to enter the evidence to KCPC, and set a trial date of April 27 for West. That date may be changed if the KCPC determines that West should undergo an additional evaluation based on Kimball's new evi-

dence. Messer also sustained a motion that West be tried separately from Lana Johnson Curry, 33, also of Barbourville Road, London, who has been charged with complicity to murder after she allegedly provided West with the gun, motive and transportation to the crime scene.

According to earlier reports, Curry had a vendetta for Alcorn's murder.

Curry is to face a separate trial Nov. 16 for her role in Alcorn's murder.

Alcorn had been charged with murder in the case. However, a deadlocked jury temporarily freed Alcorn, who was to be retried for the murder Sept. 10 of last year.

Lone gunman seizes building on Berea College campus

The building was evacuated as the police force surrounded the area. Mundy then apparently moved to the Danforth Dormitory during the evacuation and was not noticed by police.

However, the area was surrounded and Mundy had no place to go. The Berea Police Department tried several tactics to talk Mundy into giving himself up to officials. Mundy's mother was transported to the scene and allowed to talk to him through police vehicle's public address systems.

During an emotional plea, his mother begged him to come out of the building expressing her love for her son, but still there was no response.

Many more attempts were made

by police officers as negotiation experts attempted to get Mundy to call their special phone line for discussion.

Still Mundy did not respond. The large crowd of students stood waiting for a move from Mundy until about 5:30 p.m. when Mundy darted to the Theatre Building still carrying his gun.

Berea police and local S.W.A.T. teams surrounded the Theatre building and again tried to contact Mundy through loud speakers.

This time however, Mundy responded and called campus security. The call was re-routed to a special phone available to the Berea Police Department.

Chief Brandenburg answered the call and convinced Mundy to have a meeting with the chief of police. Part of the bargain included Mundy would place his gun on the floor.

After a few moments of negotiations, Mundy stated that he would give himself up to police if all cameras and reporters would leave the area.

As soon as the media left the site, Mundy and Brandenburg exited the building and entered a waiting police car.

Mundy is in custody in the Madison County Detention center and charged with terroristic threatening, wanton endangerment and 4th degree assault.

Several months ago, a Laurel County firm was buying them and had put a container at the quarry so residents could put their old refrigerators, stoves, washers and dryers, but someone shot the container full of holes. The Laurel firm took the container away and would not buy them any longer.

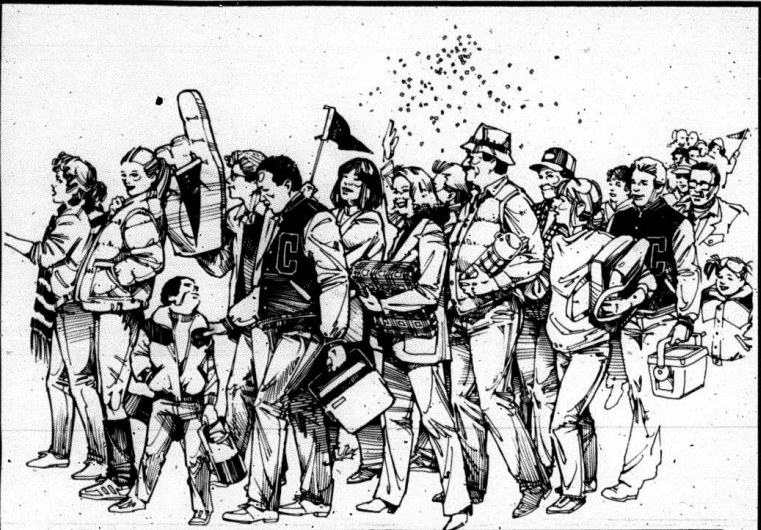

Many people won't fly, though it is statistically the safest mode of travel.

It is important to let children take risks. That is how they become confident and self-sufficient. Bravery is the quality that has built and protected our nation. Disciplined risk-taking is central to success, and over-protected children never get a chance to experience it.

I wish my mother had let me go sledding with Bobby and Joe. She could have insisted I bundle up, and made me promise to sled only on the closer hill, and be home by noon. But I wish she had let me go. Parents sometimes need to swallow their own unwarranted fears in order to encourage their children to meet life head on without fear of crashing.

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Sweet and Sour

It is strange how the habits of a lifetime can come creeping back when it is most unexpected. Or another way to put it is when senility comes creeping in and causes us to do things we had thought were in the past for good. Like today, when something triggered my memory of when there was a need for plenty of food to be ready for consumption at all times. And in a dream-like state of mind I went to the kitchen and began pulling pots and mixing bowls out of their hiding place. A big old bread pudding was what I had in mind so my search for old biscuits and stale bread as well as any old bits and pieces of leftover cake that had been frozen for this very purpose began. While rummaging for these I found a bowl of frozen pinots and a bag of sliced chicken or turkey breast, all of which were begging for the chance to be warmed up and made into a meal for hungry people.

Finally it dawned on me there were no hungry people in my household any more. There was only me. And the reason all this food had been put there in the first place was because I couldn't eat it and I couldn't coax anyone to come and help with it. Aloneness has many disadvantages and the cooking and eating habits are one of them. It isn't like it once was when there were children, and then grandchildren, to cook for and a hungry boy or girl could always do away with whatever was left over and back when my children were small or teenagers the leftovers were what they had to eat instead of the junk food of today. Then there was never cold chicken chicken to throw onto a pot of sor beans to be given to the dogs. If this happened to be any pinots left over they could be made into a good pot of chicken was good with a cold but an odd time. All the leftover biscuits

from breakfast was put back for bread pudding and if a piece of light bread (a loaf from the store) happened to be left it also was put in the pudding along with any stale cake that had escaped having searching for a treat. At least once a week we had bread pudding and there never was a complaint that it was served too often for it was a treat to have a big slice of hot bread pudding filled with plump moist raisins and pour over it sweet cream skimmed from the top of the jug of milk that had been cooling in the spring house all morning. Those were the days when there was no time nor need for loneliness and eating three well balanced meals a day was a natural thing to do.

That was the days before it was a health hazard to eat fresh eggs from the hen house and ham from the smoke house, and biscuits made with lard for the shortening and gravy made from the fat left from the ham or fresh sausage and all of it served with homemade blackberry jam or jelly, and apple-butter along with big bowls of freshly churned butter. I wonder how any of us has survived all this abuse to our bodies. Then on top of all that we had potatoes and beans, sometimes green beans and sometimes pinots or navy bean soup seasoned with all things a piece of salt-side or home cured bacon. And cabbage or kraut cooked with backbones or ribs. Then there was all the vegetables from the garden, carrots, turnips, including the green leaves, tomatoes and corn and on down the list of all the things country people have eaten down through the ages. Yep, we had a balanced diet and then some. I know many people did not eat all the things that were put before them but what they did eat usually balanced out in the long run. A raw carrot nibbled on, a ripe tomato eaten while it was still warm from the noontime sun, a crispy cucumber, or slices of raw turnips still cool from the earth, all these things were a part of the every day diet of most farm people and I have never found a reason to believe those folks didn't eat pretty well.

It was thoughts of these things, of the good times I have had in my kitchen creating dishes of food for my family not only to nourish them but for them to enjoy as they grew into manhood and womanhood on a farm where we had to raise what we ate and it was up to the woman of the house to create that it was healthy, tasty and filling, that became a reality in my kitchen. The phone was handy and only a phone call away was someone who could share in the results of this urge to run back the magic circle around the table so once again I had remnants of my beloved family sharing remnants from my salvaged leftovers.

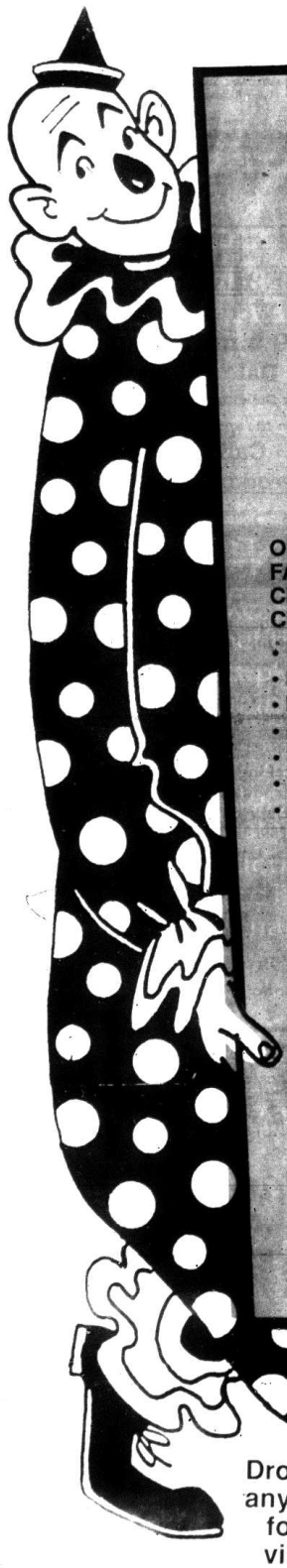

Pritchard Committee forms traveling caravan

In an effort to gain public awareness toward the characteristics and guidelines provided by the Kentucky Education Reform Act of 1990 (KERA), a group known as the Pritchard Committee has formed a traveling caravan.

Thursday, March 19, the group, known as KERA Karavan, met at the high school to further explain and answer questions about both Rockcastle and Laurel Counties. Such individuals as former superintendents and current classroom teachers addressed the crowd with overviews and success stories about the implementation of KERA and advice on how to make the transition smoothly.

The "Karavan" panelists stressed the importance of community involvement and giving each student a fair and equal chance at an education. "KERA emerged from a concern about equity," said Bob Arvin, who works in administrative functions. According to Arvin, the concern stemmed from the fact that some places simply had more money, creating more organizations and better school equipment than some other school districts.

He continued by saying that

children often have needs that extend beyond educational needs, such as help with personal problems, family problems, etc. The Family Resource Centers and Youth Resource Centers can provide Kentucky's children with the special attention they need. These centers are a part of KERA requirements and one which Rockcastle has successfully implemented.

Ungraded Primary
During a question and answer session, the item of greatest concern to the audience appeared to be the implementation of the ungraded primary, also known as primary school.

A Laurel County primary teacher, Ella Nicholson, who was among the panelist, addressed the questions by assuring the questioners that this system will work.

"The primary unit is very successful not for a few children, but for all children," she stated. According to Nicholson, who has been teaching in the ungraded primary situation all year, the ungraded primary, unlike the graded, does not allow for students to "fall through the cracks." She continued by saying that

all of her students were excited about learning and she often has to remind her students that it is time to go home. Nicholson continued by explaining that although students were mixed together at various academic levels, the older, third grade level students matured socially as they took on roles as leaders in the class.

The new standardized tests given to all Rockcastle County students was also of concern as the panelist explained that these tests had higher standards than previous ones and included written assessments. One Rockcastle senior, April Thorpe, addressed the panel to thank them for including written questions in the exam which allowed each student to express an opinion. She continued by stating that the tests were educational and led the student learn from them, and to express creativity.

Stating an opinion as a teen wasn't a lot to us," said April. "You don't do these tests due to filling out dots. It's enjoyable." Questions concerning the new reform regulations can be answered by the Pritchard committee by calling 1-800-928-2111.

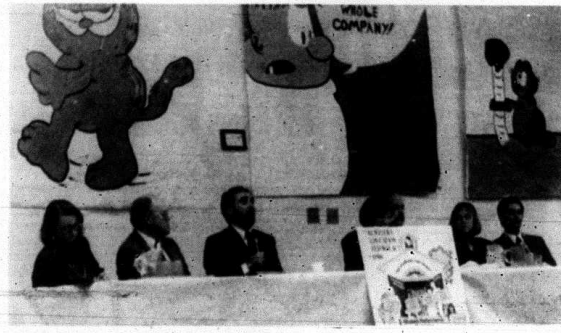

A Mt. Vernon man and a 17 year old male from Orlando were indicted last week for allegedly releasing the brakes on a parked railroad car located at the Kentucky Powder Plant, causing its derail and dump ammonia nitrate into Roundstone Creek.

According to KSP trooper Gilbert Accardo, following the release of the brakes, the railroad car suspendedly rolled into a derailer, overturned over Mullins Station Road, over an embankment, and landed in Roundstone Creek.

The railroad car contained 198,000 lbs. of ammonia nitrate which leaked much of the chemical into the creek, contaminating the main water source for the City of Livingston.

James Robinson, 19, and the juvenile were charged with criminal mischief and general prohibition against pollution for the incident

which took place on March 7. He was released on bond.

In addition to Robinson, the Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down four other indictments.

Mike Sturgill, 23, and his wife, Shirley, were charged with burglary in the first and second degree, theft by unlawful taking over \$100, and criminal mischief, 3rd degree for a March 7th incident.

The two allegedly entered the homes of both Timothy DeBorde and Edward DeBorde, stealing guns and miscellaneous items over \$100. In addition to the robbery and unlawful entering, the Sturgills reportedly destroyed a door belonging to Tim DeBorde, causing damage less than \$500. They remain lodged in the Rockcastle County jail.

Roger D. Bullock, 25, of Eubank, was charged with theft by unlawful

taking after allegedly taking miscellaneous items from a car belonging to Terry Paul Zapf. According to KSP Detective Jim McWhorter, witnesses saw Roger Bullock in the back seat of the victim's car, apparently removing the stereo speakers.

The stolen items from the car included radar detector, stereo speakers, sunglasses and a stuffed animal.

The property was later recovered in the possession of Charles E. Reynolds, 18, of Eubank. He was indicted for receiving stolen property over \$100.

Reynolds and Bullock were both released on bond.

All five defendants were scheduled for arraignment on March 27.

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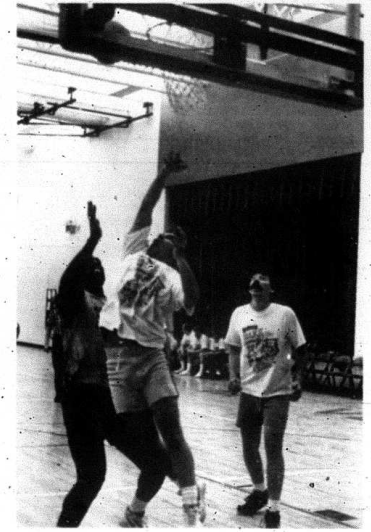

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Tobacco Road. Still, the loss of their point guard with a separated shoulder hurts. Indiana to the finals of the West versus UCLA, which should knock off New Mexico State in Albuquerque. Don MacLean and Tracy Murray are two tough bookend forwards. Still, playing in the home state of New Mexico State will not be an easy task. More on that later.

The Hoosiers will make their first trip to the Final Four since their national title in 1987. Indiana is playing well. Calbert Cheaney looks like the all American that he is.

Now to the East. Duke has a difficult game with Seton Hall. The Pirates matchup well with the Blue Devils and this will be a physical game. Still, the greatness of Duke should be the difference, but look for a five point game.

Now the best for last. Kentucky has a rematch with Massachusetts, a team that it defeated by 21 points in December at Rupp Arena. The Minutemen, however, just got off a plane from Alaska, where they won the annual pre-season tournament. Kentucky was 46-41 at halftime before knocking the game open in the second half. That game was 12 days after a devastating home court loss to Pittsburgh and Rick Pitino used that time span to prepare the Wildcats. Now 30-4-1, Mas has a chance to avenge that loss to one of its graduates, Rick Pitino. The Wildcats are a better team than UMass just in December and while I expect a close game, look for UK to face Duke in the regional finals in Philadelphia.

Duke has all the weapons, both inside and outside; They can defend the three point shot as well as they shoot it. An All American, Christian Laettner patrols the middle. Quickness and team cohesion can make this a team on a mission to become the first team to repeat as national champions since UCLA in 1972-73. Duke will have that opportunity in Minneapolis with a victory over the courageous Wildcats.

The big losers of the tournament? How about Arkansas, Arizona, Kansas and the Big Eight? The winners? How about Cinderella stories like Georgia Tech, UTEP, Cincinnati, UMass, New Mexico State and Memphis State? Or the four teams still alive from that ACC or the three from the Big 10?

How about the misguideds? How about the injustice of having a Duke playing in the Westchester last week or New Mexico State playing in Albuquerque or UMass playing in Worcester? And just think, Kansas could have played the Midwest regional in Kansas City? The NCAA does not allow teams to play on their home courts, but the above examples are dangerously close. Ask Tom Davis of Iowa, or Jim Boeheim of Syracuse or Jim Harlick of UCLA.

Stop the disadvantage now and fix it in time for 1993. This year, all the NCAA had to do was switch the first round sites of the East. Put Duke and Kansas in the Westchester last week and its in Greensboro. New Mexico State should have been in another regional, while Kansas could have been flipped with Ohio State. The home court (or fads in the thousands) should not be a factor in the tournament, but sadly, it still is.

Known as a staging area, the EPA said the area should be cleaned up fairly regularly.

"It would have been," the judge said. "It was a matter of finding a buyer, but we couldn't. But we couldn't let it stay the way it was. I doubt if the junk will sell for more than it takes for us to take it to Crab Orchard."

The old quarry was once the storehouse for rock in Rockcastle. It was owned by the A.B. Sparks family who ran the quarry until it closed about '30, or more years ago. At its peak, hundreds of tons of rock were crushed each week. It is now owned by South Kentucky trucks, a Somerset firm.

D.U.I.'s in London Post area

The Kentucky State Police made 1,168 driving under the influence arrests in the seven counties under Post 11 in London during 1991.

Rockcastle, 116 arrests for DUI with 106 made and 10 female. Court dispositions shows 49 were guilty, one was not guilty, five were amended, five were dismissed Deaving 56 pending.

Bingo

If the Kentucky Senate approves, there will be tighter controls on bingo.

Supporters said House Bill 831 would preserve the charitable games of churches and civic groups while cracking down on unscrupulous operators.

"We're not trying to get rid of anybody" who operates proper charitable activities, said Rep. Bill Dornemeyer, D-Belleue, the bill's sponsor.

Many non-profit groups offer bingo and other charitable games to raise money for schools, the poor and many other worthwhile causes.

The bill passed 83-5 and advanced to the senate.

The bill would: Prohibit a charitable organization from hiring a management company to conduct its activities. Require charitable organizations to

have a presence in a county for at least a year before operating a charitable game there.

Impose a \$5,000 daily limit for bingo prizes.

Require that all cash payments and receipts be handled by the charitable organization's officers or employees.

Allow the attorney general's office to investigate allegations of wrongdoing involving charitable activities, giving it access to financial records.
