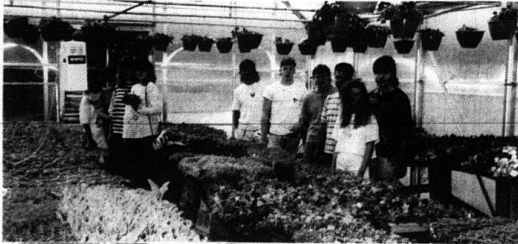

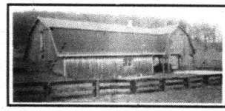
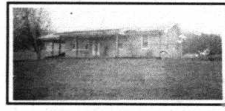

## Protective Parenting

Since I wrote about consequences, logical and otherwise, last week and mentioned "grounding" in the process, an article in a parenting magazine on the subject caught my eye: "Does Grounding Work?", by Dr. Thomas Orlowski. What he had to say made a lot of sense. Me and my dad decided to pass it along paraphrasing as I go.

He defines discipline as a training process, analogous to athletic training. If the primary goal of discipline is to teach responsibility rather than evoke obedience, you must help your teenagers understand that all of life's choices -- getting home on time, studying for exams, driving safely -- have outcomes that they must be accountable for whether you are there to check them or not.

Teenagers should be involved in setting up guidelines for their own behavior and setting consequences when they cross those lines. If he or she sets an 11 p.m. curfew and gets home at 1 a.m., a reasonable punishment may be to curfew two hours earlier the following week. What grades do you expect to make... and what if you don't? What household chores should you be responsible for and when should you do them? These are questions that should elicit a thoughtful response without putting the child on the defensive. Parents need to lose their apprehension about "losing control" in order to feel free to negotiate about rules. After all, your child is not the enemy!

Discipline is most effective when it is done calmly. The heat of the moment is apt to cause parents to over-react and set too harsh a punishment. When this happens they are trapped into making one of two bad choices. One is to stick with the un-mingling and anger. The other is to change the consequence, which sends a message to the child that their parenting doesn't mean what they say. Apologizing for hasty words is fine in occasional instances, but when a pattern of parents making such decisions develops they lose their credibility.

Remember that the length of the sentence is not the issue. There must be a meaningful relationship between the violation and the consequence. A short grounding directly related to the violation can be effective, but a lengthy restriction can cause continuing arguments which overshadow the incident for which it was intended. I tasked several RCHS students what they thought about grounding when they thought about students who are in all of it was stupid. They also thought the Blue Room is stupid, and are in favor of padding because they prefer it to the Blue Room! The ones I talked with were unable to come up with any not-so-stupid consequences, but they did say that they wanted to have a chance to tell their own story because they felt they were often punished unfairly. Loosely interpreted, I believe the valuable message I sorted out from all this is that whenever parents (or teachers) choose for consequences, it is probably a good idea for the sake of the relationship, and to maximize cooperative living with the child in question, to spend a reasonable amount of time talking with him and listening to his feelings as an important part of teaching him responsibility. Remember, blind obedience is not the military goal except, perhaps, in the military.

Dr. Orlowski summarizes with these ground rules:

1. The law of diminishing returns applies; grounding too often or too long is counter-productive.
2. Consider the benefits that may result, before grounding... go like who will drive him where he needs to go if he is "grounded" from riding with friends or using the car.
3. Realize that parents need to play "warden" in order to enforce a grounding. This is not always practical or desirable.
4. Be prepared to deal with a grounded teenager who commits another violation. At some point you have to become creative in figuring alternatives, and how to deal with the anger and boredom that will be expected from a caged young person.

## Cash resigns from board

School board member Clayton Cash has resigned from the board effective with official notification by state commissioner Thomas Boyesen.

In his letter to George M. Poynter, chairman of the Rockcastle County Board of Education, Cash said he will regret "leaving this team."

"I believe we currently have a firm direction and good board teamwork and I am confident that the positive work of the board will continue."

Cash reported he will be applying for a teaching/coaching position in Rockcastle and surrounding counties.

"I want to help ensure there is no actual or perceived conflict of interest," he wrote. "So I hereby submit my letter of resignation."

Cash has continued to complete his college education and acquire his teaching certification. He received his degree in December and certificate to teach in February. He served three years and four months on the county board.

"I have attempted to guide and make decisions which best serve our children," he noted. "This experience will help me have a positive impact on our children's future, as a classroom teacher."

When the commissioner receives the letter, accompanied by a letter from school Superintendent Bige Towery Jr., the resignation will be effective.

The commissioner will appoint a three-member non-local panel after notice is published. Anyone can nominate someone from District 2 for the position, even themselves. Application forms will be made available to the public.

The panel will screen the applicants, conduct interviews and recommend three applicants. The commissioner will then choose the final applicant who will serve until the November election with the winner taking office in January.

## Easter Day Tragedy here

A Sunday afternoon family gathering ended in tragedy when a 19-year-old Ottawa woman was thrown from a horse and eventually died.

Mildred Bullock was riding with other family members on a blacktopped road at Cove Branch when her walking horse apparently got excited and threw her off the horse backwards.

Mrs. Bullock hit her head on the blacktop, causing severe head trauma. She was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and later flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center, where she died Monday afternoon.

According to authorities the Easter Sunday accident occurred about 2 p.m. near the home of Mrs. Bullock's father, Glyn Bullock.

Ironically, Mrs. Bullock's sister, Dr. Karen Saylor was the physician who treated her at Rockcastle Hospital. Dr. Saylor was not with other members of the family when the accident occurred, but was planning to attend the family get together later. (See obituary on Page A-12)

## Sheriff's Department to receive forfeitures

Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith's office will get \$1,563 as a result of administrative and judicial forfeitures coordinated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

The Somerset Police Department will get \$21,890 in the same case. Also, the Kentucky State Police will receive a forfeited 1990 Chevrolet Beretta last valued at \$10,600 and will place it into official use.

Deputies Libby Smith and Karen Alcorn attended the news conference.

On March 6, 1992, the Somerset Police Department, Kentucky State Police, and the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Office executed a state search warrant at the Mt. Vernon residence of Jack Douglas Hensley and Betty Hensley. This search resulted in the recovery of 40 pounds of marijuana, over \$31,000 in U.S. currency, and 15 firearms. Most of the money and some of the marijuana were initially taken by Jack Hensley and another man who fled the Hensley residence into nearby woods when the search began, but which were recovered later.

Jack Hensley, prosecuted by the U.S. Attorney's Office in Federal Court, later was found guilty of drug violations arising out of this investigation.

The FBI administratively forfeited the funds under federal law authorizing seizure and forfeiture of drug proceeds. The Chevrolet Beretta was

forfeited by the federal court after it found it had been purchased by the Hensleys with drug proceeds.

## Owens not guilty in Cope's trial

It took a Rockcastle County Grand Jury only 35 minutes to return a not guilty verdict Tuesday afternoon against a Rockcastle man accused of shooting another local man to death.

Local defense attorney Jerry Cox told jurors, during the three day trial, that Floyd Wayne Owens shot Dale Kelly Cope in self-defense.

Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham, however, painted a totally different picture of the night that Cope died, telling jurors that Owens shot Cope in cold blood.

Cope died on September 22, 1990 after Owens shot him in the back with a 20 gauge shotgun.

Witnesses testified that Cope and Owens fought before the shooting took place. Apparently, the two men and several people had been drinking heavily at the home of Willie Mink when the shooting occurred.

A mistrial was declared the first time in the case when it was revealed that someone had tried to influence a juror. That trial was held a year ago.

Police say that speed did not contribute to the accident.

The child was pronounced dead at the Rockcastle Hospital by Rockcastle Coroner Bill Dowell. The mother was flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center where she died about 11 p.m.

The two had been staying at the Family Life Center in Renfro Valley.

Also, 156 complaints were checked, 42 motorists were assisted with breakdowns, 15 traffic accidents reported, 13 criminal investigations were made, 15 criminal arrests, and 30 persons attended a safety program.

(Cont. From A2) miles south of Jamestown and looked at more than a dozen photographs of fish that had been taken that day. Striped, trout, smallmouth and the aforementioned Walleye. We've been doing business with these folks for so long that we know their honesty is the reason they have become the premier fishing supply headquarters on the lower end of the lake. When the fish ain't biting they tell you just that. When they are, they tell you what they're biting and they have very reasonable prices. Over the years they have saved me many a trip just by letting me know it would be a waste of time. Most other bait store owners would encourage you to come on down in the middle of a blizzard. But the fish were biting and they had proof.

If you catch a good fish or stringer of fish, Liz or Raymond Camp who own and run the store will make a nice polaroid photo of it for you to take home and one that they will keep in the store with your name on it. And they don't charge a nickel. They had pictures lying on the counter that weren't even completely dry when we pulled in. So we bought somewhere in the neighborhood of 1000 various sizes and species of minnows, shad, small trout, shiners and the like. And it was three days before they took another photograph. When Chris and I got to the river the fish stopped biting. Don and Josh arrived and we fished both the river and the lake without so much as a nibble.

We were back at it on Thursday morning before daylight. The weather was perfect. Upper seventies and sunshine. Don caught a ten pound striper around mid morning and that was the only bite anyone got before dark that day. Chris and Josh managed to catch five or six little stock trout just before bedtime and we fried them up so that the campground would, at least, smell like somebody was catching fish. By late Friday afternoon, we were sunburned, tired of taters and grumpy. We tore down the tent and headed home about as disgusted as I know how to get.

Chris aggravated me all the way home. "Where are we going to go tomorrow? What are we gonna use for bait? What time do you reckon we'll get started? Reckon what we'll catch?" etc. More than a thousand times, about 8 per minute, he reminded me that he had to go home on Sunday.

Saturday afternoon found us about five miles from home wading Silver Creek and catching smallmouth after smallmouth. Chris caught a fine stringer of big red-eyes. Sunday, after he left, I went back and caught limited of both and released more than a hundred fish while I grieved over all the money we had blown on Lake Cumberland. On Monday, however, one of my neighbors came home from the lake with 60 crappie and five big walleye that he had caught out of a hole we fished for three days. He had the fish and a photograph taken at the Lake Cumberland Country store.

If you want to know how the fishing is on Lake Cumberland. If you want expert, reasonably priced Stripper guide service, call Liz or Raymond Camp at 502-34-2055. They'll tell you the truth, but if you tell them that you're bringing me, they may offer you a good sum of money to cancel your trip.

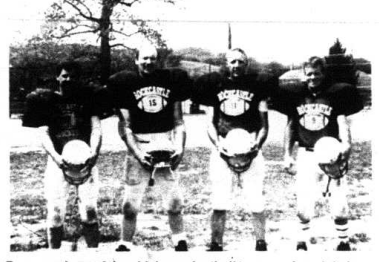

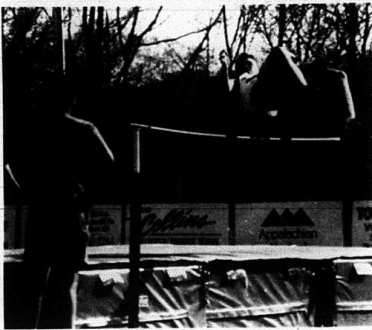

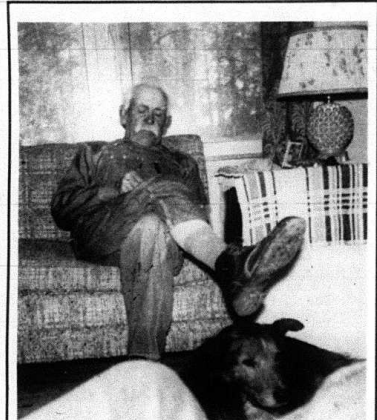

### Five indictments returned

A total of five indictments were handed down by the Rockcastle County grand jury this month.

Two men were charged with second degree arson for an incident that took place on November 1. Donald R. Jones, 36, of Mt. Vernon and a 36 year old Livingston man allegedly started a fire with intent to destroy in a barn as well as a home belonging to E.B. Allen.

The two were reportedly paid to commit the crime and the jury also indicted Donald E. Collins on two counts of complicity to commit arson.

24-year-old Michael Sturgill of Mt. Vernon was charged with second

degree burglary and theft by unlawful taking over \$100 for allegedly entering the dwelling of Sherri Rowe and taking a class ring that belonged to her.

—Vickie Lynn Meadows of Berea, faces charges of custodial interference for an incident that occurred on March 22.

Meadows allegedly failed to return Doris Amanda Meadows and Rodney Dewayne Meadows to their custodial parent, Johnny Meadows.

While Sturgill and Jones remain lodged at the county courthouse, the rest of the defendants were released on bail. All five will face arraignment on April 24.

The money will go to engineers to go house to house, check water supply, and discuss water problems with home owners.

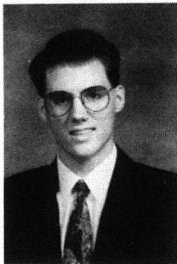
