Since I wrote about consequences, logical and otherwise, last week and mentioned "grounding" in the proc. so, an article in a parenting magazine on the subject caught my eye. Does Grounding Work!", by Dr. Thomas Olkowski, What he had to say made a lot of sense to me so decided to pass it along paraphrasing as I po.

as I go.

He defines discipline as a training process, analogous to athletic train-ing. If the primary goal of discipline is to teach responsibility rather than is to teach responsionly rather than evoke obedience, you must help your teenagers understand that all of life's choices — getting home on time, studying for exams, driving safely—have outcomes that they must be accountable for whether you are there to refere them or no!

to enforce them or not.

Teenagers should be involved in setting up guidelines for their own behavior and setting consequences when they cross those lines. If he or she sets an 11 p.m. curfew and gets when they cross those lines. If he or sees as an I I a.m., a reasonable person may decide on a curflew two hours earlier the following week. 
