Upcoming plans, according to Lisa, include implementing more special events, such as music and story telling workshops, museum displays, etc. "We want to be a resource for adults," said Lisa as she refers to the activities, learning tools and opportunities available at the center.

Livingston man dies in crash

A former Livingston man died Monday in U.K. Hospital following injuries Saturday in a vehicle accident in Pulaski County.

Arnold Allen Brown, 25, of Eubank, died of a "severe closed head injury," according to the Fayette County Coroners office.

Brown was reported traveling East on Ky. 70 when his truck left the road, struck an embankment and overturned. He was thrown out.

He was born in Rockcastle County July 17, 1966, the son of Arnold Lee and Marieta Evelyn Hayes Brown.

In addition to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Lee Brown of Rt. 5, Livingston, he is survived by three brothers, William Lowell Brown of Berea, James Logan Brown of Brodhead and Eldon Lee Brown of Livingston and a sister Virginia Arlene Pheanis of Livingston. Also surviving are his maternal grandparents T.C. and Mary Payne Hayes of Mt. Vernon and several aunts, uncles and two nephews.

Services will be Thursday (Today) at 1 p.m. at Skaggs Creek Baptist Church with Bros. Ed Gibbs and Billy Medley officiating. Burial will follow in the Skaggs Creek Cemetery.

Dowell and Martin Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Council seeks policeman

A special meeting of the Livingston City Council was held on Tuesday with hopes of hiring a new policeman.

After receiving a resignation notice effective May 1, from current policeman Sam Stallsworth, the council has been accepting applications.

Although the council has received two applications to date, motions were made to make a final decision after proper advertisement of the position was made.

Other business discussed included the cancellation of the city's flood insurance due to an unpaid bill. The council opted to reinstate the insurance.

The council discussed a citation against the old water plant as well. Details concerning the specifics of the citation were unavailable at this time, however, according to council members, the citation will not be of great concern due to the construction of a new plant that is taking place in upcoming months.

KU plans rate hike

Kentucky Utilities will seek a rate increase next year -- the first increase since 1983.

The planned increase was announced yesterday by John T. Newton, president and chairman of the board of KU energy Corp., KU's parent company.

The amount of the increase has not been determined, he reported. It will have to be approved by the state Public Service Commission and probably would take effect in 1994.

Newton said KU's rates were "the lowest of any investor-owned utility in Kentucky or surrounding states." The shareholders meeting was marked by protests from a statewide construction union, which accused KU Energy of charging a long-standing policy and switching from union to non-union labor in its construction projects.

Drunk driving cases down

Rockcastle County has 32 drunk driving cases pending in District Court, accumulated since a concerted effort was made to clear the docket several months ago.

Chief Justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court Robert Stephens said that 90 days is long enough for a district judge to resolve a drunk driving case.

A report released Thursday by the administrative office of the courts

shows that in many Kentucky counties some cases linger even after 90 days.

Commercial licenses valid

Circuit clerks across Kentucky are redrawing newly issued commercial drivers' licenses to correct a supposed design flaw, but a state official said yesterday that was unnecessary.

"The Kentucky-issued CDL (commercial drivers' license) is official and valid," said Laura White, spokeswoman for the Transportation Cabinet. "The format was approved by the federal highway department."

The federal government required the license as of April 1 for operators of trucks, buses and vans weighing more than 13 tons or hauling 15 or

more passengers. Information from the license is entered into a national computer that tracks driving offenders.

White said the confusion stems from the lack of a "D" notation on the license showing the operator is also licensed for ordinary automobiles. She said officials have learned of at least three Kentuckians who have been cited in other states for driving on a commercial drivers' license.

White said drivers can mail citations to the cabinet to be dismissed.

State budgets money for Renfro Valley museum

A million dollars to purchase the museum at Renfro Valley for a Country Music "Hall of Fame" is in the 1993 fiscal year state budget, according to Glen Westbrook, treasurer of the organization.

The money is actually in the \$100 million State Park Bond Issue.

Local money totaling \$300,000 has been raised. Renfro Valley folks suggest the group purchase the museum for \$1 million instead of building a new structure for \$2 million.

The museum will be the old museum log structure which has been renovated and enlarged to 17,000 square feet. The building is elevator equipped and handicap accessible.

"We are also seeking an allocation of \$135,000 from the state this year for the adaptation of the building and

an architect to build the exhibits and supervise the management of the museum this year," Westbrook said.

With this allocation the architect can begin accepting collections and building the exhibits to have the museum opening in the spring of 1993, Westbrook continued.

The museum has a sheet music collection dating back to the late 1700s that needs preserving.

Westbrook related "during the publicity and fund raising campaign this past fall we learned of some Kentucky artists we hadn't known before, of music collections and of research which indicates a strong correlation between Shakespeare's sonnets and Kentucky's early music."

All must be preserved for future generations to appreciate.

Sue Bennett offers degree

Sue Bennett College's license has been extended by the Commonwealth of Kentucky to include the offering of the bachelor of arts degree.

With this license, the College officially becomes a four-year degree granting institution.

"This is a milestone in the history of Sue Bennett College," said Vice President of Academic Affairs, Sandra F. McLendon. "The new four-year degree in business greatly improves the educational opportunities that we can offer students in this area."

But this is only the beginning of the academic expansion planned at Sue Bennett College. "We are currently in the process of obtaining a license

for a four-year degree in nursing," said McLendon.

The advanced nursing courses will be included in the curriculum next fall and clinicians will be added in the 1993 - 1994 academic year.

Another tragedy struck a Rockcastle family last week when an eight-year-old Brodhead Elementary School student was killed on Highway 150.

According to police, Merle Dee Marcum, 8, apparently rode his bicycle into the path of Linda Leager, of Mount Vernon Road, around 7:10 p.m. near the Mount Vernon Plastic Factory.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said the youth was dead on arrival at the Rockcastle County Hospital.

No charges were filed in the incident.

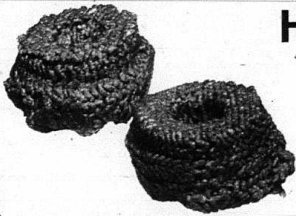

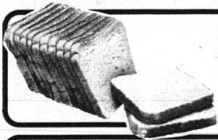

Jerry Hammond, executive secretary of the state building and construction trades council, an AFL-CIO affiliate, said the council had been getting letters from KU officials for almost a year asking them to agree to the change. He said the policy was similar to one Toyota Motor Manufacturing Co. asked for in 1985 for the Camry assembly plant at Georgetown.

"It's called a peace-and-harmony agreement," Hammond said. "It's a non-union agreement is what it is."

Hammond said the company had "ceased to do their major construction under the agreements that we've been using for decades."

KU Energy has \$688.8 million in construction projects scheduled in the next five years, much of it geared toward compliance with new federal clean air standards.

Work is expected to begin this fall on a "scrubber" for KU's coalburning Ghent 1 plant. KU will spend \$146 million installing scrubbers, expensive pollution-control devices, at its

plants to comply with the first phase of the clean air standards by 1995.

KU spokesman Ed Van Hook said a contract was awarded to Babcock and Wilcox, a construction contractor based in Copley, Ohio, "to furnish and erect the scrubber" at the Ghent 1 plant. He would not say whether the work would be done with union labor, but he said there would be other contracts involving the scrubber.

judges that they need to address these problems.

A 1991 law requires the Administrative Office of the Courts to report every three months to the Supreme Court and the attorney general's office the status of drunken-driving cases, Mothers Against Drunken Driving pushed for the law.

Yesterday's report was the first under the new law. It showed the status of drunken-driving cases in 38 counties, those in which judges have a computer system.

The report showed some counties with only a few cases pending — such as Bourbon and Campbell with only

one. Scott and Hopkins counties had none.

The state's most populous county, Jefferson, had 317 cases pending. Fayette, the state's second most populated county, had the most — 392.

Stevens said he was not judging any county's record of dealing with DUI cases and that he plans to offer assistance to judges that need it because of circumstances beyond their control.

But he said some judges need to become better managers of their dockets.

"It's not for me to say what is good or bad this time," he said. "There may be a lot of valid reasons. The idea is to call this to the attention of judges."

"I want to get these dockets cleaned up and I'm going to see that they are cleaned up."

In surrounding counties the report showed Pulaski had 27 and Madison, 38.

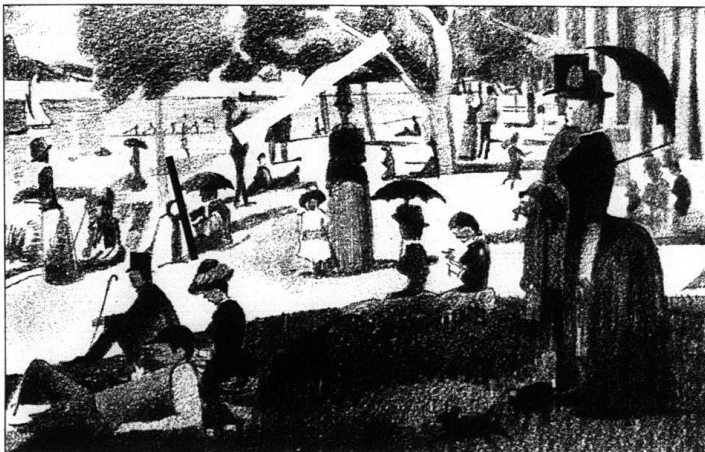

After the game went scoreless through two innings, Jackson broke the shut-out with one run in the top of the third and another in the top of the fourth.

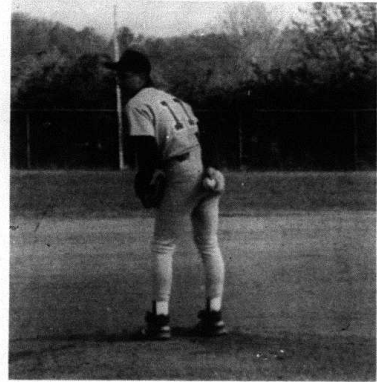

The relay team of Kent Mullins, Brian Carter, Sherman Collins and Michael Forbes finished sixth in the 3200 relay.

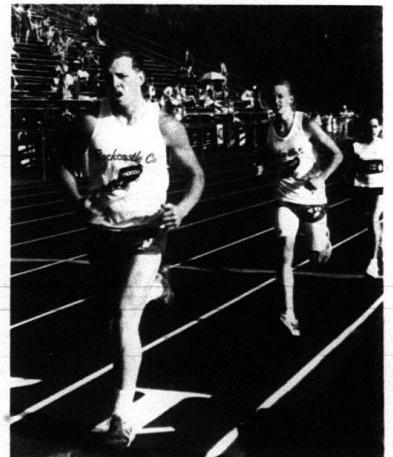
The 1600 relay team, consisting of Michael Forbes, Brian Carter, Sherman Collins and Brian Carter finished with a fifth place.

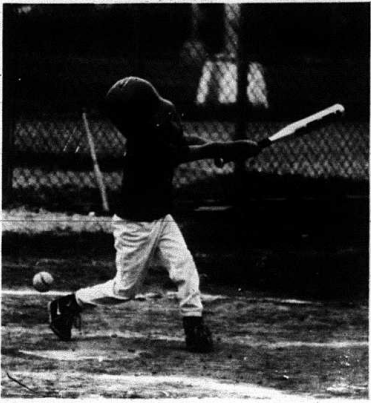

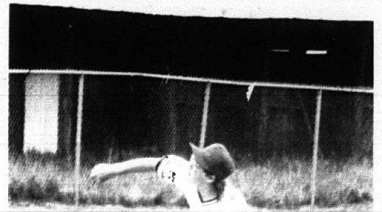

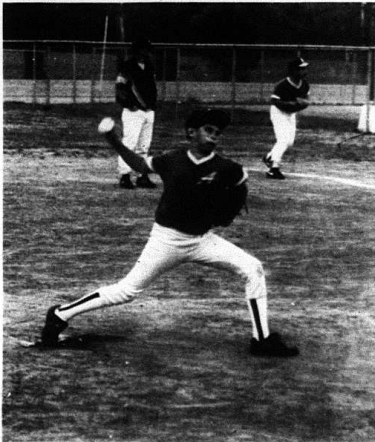
Max Saylor takes a swing during the Braves tee-ball game against the Dodgers Saturday.

only hit of the game.

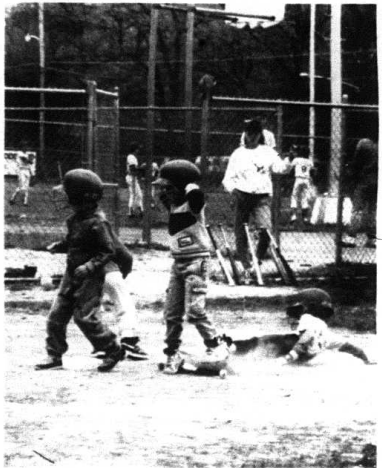
The Cardinals destroyed the Twins, 16-1, in the second game of the day. Highlighting the game was a two-run homer by Cardinals' catcher Blake Childress.

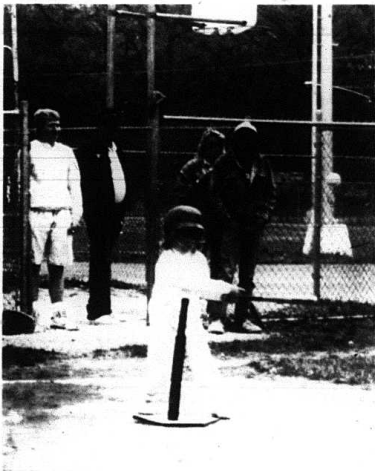

Timothy McIntosh slides in safe for the Dodgers tee-ball team Saturday.



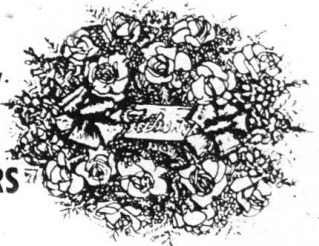

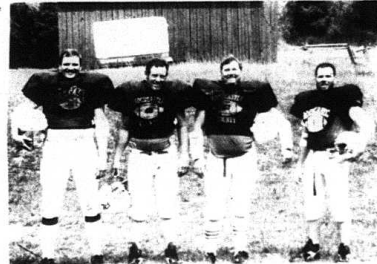

Betty Adams has used everyday experiences to continue her education

For Betty J. Adams, learning didn't stop with the school bus, nor when she was raising a family, tending to family illness or working. "I've never stopped learning," she said. "I'd go to the library a lot of times and study subjects like physics to keep my mind alive," she said, "because one day I knew I'd have this opportunity. I didn't know how though."

Betty's opportunity came to her in 1987 when she began with the Family Life Center School, working toward her life-long goal of becoming a Clinical Psychologist. Spurring a high school diploma, class of 1956, Betty set her first goal at the center toward passing her college entrance exam, or ACT. She continued with her studies at the school from July until November, 1987.

Due to family illnesses and other uncontrollable circumstances, Betty did not return to the center until March of this year. According to her, the important thing is that she did return.

"I feel like a new person," said Betty. "I've had to put my career on hold for 30 years. Until now."

"Sheer determination" is how she credits her academic continuance. She says that staying in school was not an easy task back in the 1950's. "I had to work all summer just to get through one year of school," she said.

While some adults would declare their age to be a hindrance toward learning, as opposed to a college or high school age student, Betty declines that idea. "I've never felt threatened by learning. Being an adult never even entered my mind. I just did what I wanted to do."

Betty is thankful for her learning experience at the school as she says it is "conducive to study." She says she's tried studying at home, but often becomes distracted.

When asked if she ever gets discouraged, Betty said that sometimes, when she has a problem that she finds difficult and her teachers explain them to her, she finds herself thinking, "I should have learned this years ago."

"The teachers are brilliant. They teach at my level," said Ruby. She continued by alluding to a time when she first came to the school. Anxious and hesitant, Ruby didn't want to take her test inside one afternoon. Her teacher let her go out onto the porch to take it. "They know how to meet my needs, and it's different for everybody."

Ruby not only credits her success to her teachers, but her husband as well. She says he encourages her, as he brings her to work, to school. Ruby drives, yet her husband tells her with all the things she does for him, he chooses to make sure she gets where she's going on time and safely.

But soon after, her determination shines through. "You have control over your emotions if you're a strong minded person," she said. "And, I have my religion to fall back on. I believe that is what has kept me going."

She exhibits the determination to follow through with her goal through the aid of good teachers and encouraging friends and family.

A 61-year-old student

Ruby Alcorn says she's never wasted a day in her life. Spend a few minutes with her and you'd see why. This energetic 61-year-old not only studies daily for her GED, but works as a tour guide at Renfro Valley, tends to her household chores,

and to top it all off, she cares for her disabled husband.

The trick, according to Ruby, is time management and careful organization of her work schedule with her daily routine. She gets up at 4 a.m. every morning, finishes her housework, then commences on her studies.

"People say I don't have time to do that. I've done it, and up until last year, I kept care of a grandson since he was three months old," she said. Ruby's situation is quite inspirational. At the age of 16, she was involved in an accident which resulted in severe memory loss. "I did go to school after the accident, but seemed I never could learn," she said.

Family Life Center School offers opportunities for those that didn't finish

Christian Appalachian's Family Life Center School at Renfro is continually making a difference in lives throughout a five county area which includes Rockcastle. The school not only encourages and assists residents in obtaining a GED or learning to read. The center has experienced recent increases in those requesting help toward preparing for college or an equivalent, and they're getting it.

A building block to higher education, the center offers a wide variety of learning tools and instructors who organize their time

and energies toward educating each student individually.

The school is dedicated to not only offering individualized help, but ensuring that learning is convenient to the student. Teachers are available both at the school as well as School on Wheels teachers, who visit students at home.

Kaye Cameron, a six year veteran Family Life Center School teacher, says that she enjoys working with the students as they are often self-motivated and have already set goals for themselves. "They sometimes, keep me motivated," she said.

"I know it's hard for anyone to come in and say, 'I dropped out of school.' Here, we're very lax, we work on an individual basis and remain one on one and very private."

According to Kaye, the school on Wheels teachers average 35 students each week. "The large majority of all our students do stay with us and also realize the need for something more than a GED." She continued by saying that many of the students go on to a vocational school or to college.

Beverly Sexton Carter is master storyteller

"When the family came in from Indiana and other places, everybody would congregate at Grandpa's, and he'd tell stories. He always told scary ones, though, and I'd always cry."

Telling stories comes naturally to Beverly Carter Sexton. She is the product of generations of mountain storytellers. With Cherokee blood inherited from both sides of her family, she grew up listening to yarns that had been re-told for many lifetimes. Small wonder that this Kentucky girl became a "Teller of Tales."

Beverly is also a writer and has had several short stories published. A graduate of Berea College, she fills the time between storytelling appearances by working as a substitute teacher. Of course, every group of students has one request: "Tell us a story!" It's the same request Beverly always had when, as a small child, she went to her grandpa's house.

"My grandpa, Isaac Bowman, was a great storyteller," says Beverly. "When the family came in from Indiana and other places, everybody would congregate at Grandpa's, and he'd tell stories. He always told scary ones, though, and I'd always cry. Grandma would say,

'Isaac! You're a scarn! these younguns to death!' One time, I even hid in the closet! But when the story was finished, we'd say, 'Tell us another one, Grandpa!'"

"My grandpa, Cleo Abney Bowman, told stories, too, but

her's were true ones. She'd say, 'Now, this person lived next to my mother and things like that. When she told a tale, she'd jump up and run around. I'm really active in my storytelling, and that's the way Grandma was. I think maybe that's where I get my energy.'"

"Mommy (Ollie Carter) tells stories, too. When she was growing up, they had to work hard, and they didn't have TV or anything, so they'd get together and tell stories. She tells me stories of them telling stories...stories about her grandpa telling stories."

Beverly has entertained church groups, festival participants, college students, kindergarten groups, and many more with her storytelling. She has appeared on TV and radio programs, and she has received letters from fans all over the United States. But she never knows ahead of time just what she will tell.

"I don't try to memorize my stories," she says. "I keep the basic story line in my head, but sometimes, I change the ending to suit the listeners. My stories are always a little different each time I tell them. I have gotten half-way through a story and realized that I have left something vital out. That's when you start thinking, making a quilt, so to speak, putting in the patches, and it turns out to be something you never intended it to be. Sometimes a child will say, 'that's not the way you told it before!' but none of my stories are just like they were before. They have to change."

Beverly likes the idea of carrying on a family tradition, but her views differ sharply from those held by many traditional storytellers and collectors. "I feel like it's important to keep the story alive," says Beverly, "but I don't feel the same way some

scholars did when they first heard stories from the Appalachian Mountains. They thought they were hearing something that had been brought, word-for-word, from the old countries. So they descended on Appalachia and tried to get these stories down to preserve them.

"I don't think that's the way it was. People brought the stories with them, all right, but they changed them just like I do. Their idea wasn't to preserve some English tradition, or some Irish tradition, that they'd brought with them. The stories were adapted to their condition. In England, the story may have had a king in a castle. Well, when somebody told the story in Kentucky, it may still have had a king, but he lived up at the head of the holler in a log house!"

"I use the old words that my grandparents used, and I talk in my native dialect, not because I'm trying to preserve

a language, but because they give people a glimpse into the past. You know, we all are a little nostalgic. We all want to go back to when we think things were better (even if they weren't). Through stories, we can go back to those days and that time."

Right there is what I try to do with my storytelling, for a space of 30 minutes or an hour, people can forget their cares and their troubles and be set free, just for a little while, in a make-believe world. My stories take them there."

Beverly says that no one writer has influenced her storytelling, but she does admire Ray Hicks, a fellow storyteller from North Carolina. Mr. Hicks has attracted the attention of National Geographic, Appalshop, and others. "He reminds me of Grandpa," says Beverly. "When I first saw his videotape, the newspapers on the wall, the chew of tobacco, the way he tells his story, I thought, 'Oh, gosh! That's just like us!' There's no gimmicks. He's real."

"Most places you tell a story now, they want a performance," Beverly tells us. "Mundane things just don't excite people anymore. I dress sort of flashy when I tell a story. I wear lots of clothes, gobs of earrings, scarves...whatever I've got, I stick it on. But to me, that's part of the fantasy. I can't go to Mommy's closet and dress up anymore, but when I go out to be a storyteller, it's legitimate! I've got a valid reason to play dress-up."

Beverly admits that her worst critics are her own family. "My husband, Marion, and my daughter, Chastity, don't get excited about my storytelling," she says. "I know they are proud of me, but to them, I'm Wife and Mother." They don't know this

person they see on stage. But my son Ellis goes right along with it. I think he's going to be a storyteller."

Wherever Beverly goes, she talks about Rockcastle County. Her stories are filled with the people, the places, the sights and the sounds of Kentucky. "I've just made a tape," she said, "and it starts off here in Rockcastle County. I have Rockcastle County people in my stories - not real ones of course. I want people to know I'm proud of where I'm from! Young people, especially, try to run from it. I think they don't want to be identified with the stereotype. Then, when they get older, they realize just how special their roots are. I want, through my stories, to help them feel that pride early."

Beverly sees story telling not only as the answer to some of the problems of Appalachia, but also those of the whole world. "Everybody has a story to tell," she says. "I think one of the problems in the world is that we've quit telling our stories...mainly because people have quit listening. Fear, or whatever, has made us build little walls around ourselves, and we're afraid to share our feelings and let anybody know who we really are, because that makes us vulnerable."

"I think that's sad, because everybody's life is a story, and yet we don't share them anymore. If I had a magic wand, what I'd do is just touch everybody, so they'd tell their stories again."

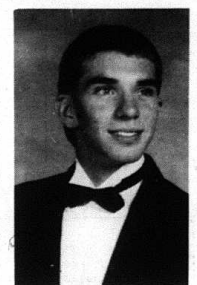

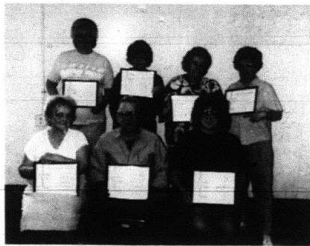

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN TO: All residents of Kentucky herein called the "Private Pensioner Class", who after April 15, 1987, have been paid, or will be paid any private, non-governmental, retirement annuity or pension benefit income, which has been taxed, or is subject to tax, pursuant to the Kentucky individual income tax statute KRS 141.010 et seq.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN TO YOU that Plaintiffs in this action have filed suit in the above entitled Circuit Court of the Commonwealth of Kentucky on behalf of themselves and all members of the class herein addressed.

By order dated April 15, 1992, the court in this action determined that the action should be maintained as a class action under the provisions of Civil Rule 23.03 (2) of the Kentucky Rules of Civil Procedure, and directed the within notice be given to class members, for purposes of that rule and to notify class members that application will be made for expenses and attorney fees pursuant to KRS 412.070.

Notice is further given as follows:

1. The Plaintiffs' Complaint alleges violations of Kentucky and Federal law by Defendant which they contend has caused and continues to cause damage to the private pensioners class, for which recovery is sought herein, in that the Defendant, Revenue Cabinet, has unlawfully discriminated against the class of private pensioners by assessing and collecting the Kentucky income tax imposed by KRS 141.010, et seq., upon the private retirement annuity and pension benefit income of the private pensioner class while exempting from the said Kentucky income tax the retirement annuity and pension benefit income received by all local, state, and federal government retirees, contrary to the United States and Kentucky Constitutions, particularly Section 59 of the Kentucky Constitution. Defendants have denied any wrong doing and have denied any liability to Plaintiffs or any member of the private pensioners class.

2.
