Two percent salary increase approved by school board

Following a closed hearing which resulted in the expulsion of a seventh grade boy, a two-percent increase in salary for all school employees was approved by the school board at Tuesday's meeting.

The salary hike was determined with the understanding that the reforms have put extra stress and duties on school employees and they need some extra compensation.

Superintendent Bige Towery stated, "I feel that a slight raise would be appropriate due to the mass restructuring and reform. It will help compensate for their effort and work toward the implementation* of KERA."

He continued by saying how salary competitiveness is important to attract good teachers.

Pursuing annexation into the city limits of the property that was purchased to serve as the site for the new high school was approved. Board members were pleased at the possibility as it will provide fire and police protection as well as a sewage system.

Committees throughout the county, comprised of principals and teachers, submitted a professional development/school calendar plan for the school year 1992-93.

Professional development day, or inservice days, are required by law for each school district. Schools are normally allowed five, however, new legislation passed that will allow up to five extra days per district for the next two years. In a vote, the Rockcastle County teachers voted to take three of the possible five extra days, making next year's calendar have a total of eight professional development days.

In addition to having more development days, all employees, both certified and classified, will participate in the activities of professional development days.

The proposed calendar consists of a total of 185 days, 172 of which are instructional days.

A new chairman and alternate were appointed by the board to serve on the advisory appeal panel. Larry Hammond was chosen to chair the panel with Shelby Reynolds as alternate. The panel serves as a means for teachers to appeal evaluations if they believe the evaluation is inaccurate.

City Council puts West Main road work on the shelf

A street-widening project from Dowell and Martin Funeral Home to Rockcastle County High School has been put on hold, the Mt. Vernon City Council was told Monday night.

The council had a quorum and got down to business.

Mayor Gary R. Cromer said no funding for the West Main Street project was available at this time. A study had to be made and application submitted for federal funding.

He said he would inquire if a left turn lane could be installed.

A housing project on old U.S. 25 with a Community Development Block Grant has been cancelled until final plans have been made for a water project.

The Postal Service has told the city that all their work has been done on street addresses and sent to the Lexington District.

Later, they will notify the city and householders will be informed of their street address.

The city has been asked by Gene Philbeck to take into the city the Helton Property in West Mt. Vernon, off West Main Street.

If all property owners sign and the area is according to city specifications then the city will approve.

A motion to go with the annexation was approved by the council.

Police Chief Bill Mink reported eight privilege licenses for businesses have not been paid. The council approved a citation be issued and if necessary followed by court action.

The council approved purchasing a fax machine for the city at a probable cost of about \$685.

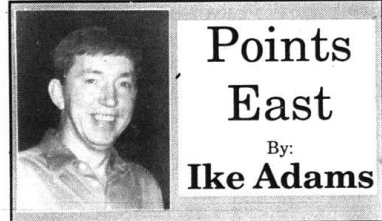

At least once a week, on average, and I suspect it's more like 200 times a year, someone from out of state calls me up for a recommendation on where to stay while they are in Kentucky.

I don't get any kickbacks or commissions. I seldom get the kindness of a basic "thank you" from the pro-prietary even though I frequently tell guests to "tell them that I sent you." But what the heck?

Boone Tavern, in Berea, assumes that folks like me who know about their quality are going to spread the word. They also assume, incorrectly as far as I'm concerned, that we don't keep up with how much business we're sending them. The Tavern, could just as easily have lost about \$8,000 over the last six months if I had suggested that folks stay elsewhere. But the truth of the matter is that if you're coming to Berea and you can afford to spend a few extra bucks, very few at that, you can live awfully high on the hog by staying at Boone Tavern. It's a class act. Probably the best buy on lodging in the state if "class" is important to you.

So I keep telling people to stay at the Tavern if they're coming to central Kentucky and I keep tabs on the ones who take my advice. Sooner or later, I'm gonna hand over the list to one of the tight wads in accounting at the college, ask them to check my list against old registers, and then promise that I'm sending my business to a motel on the outskirts of town if I don't get invited to a fine dinner. It may not work but like I said before, what the heck?

On the other hand, Kentucky State Parks spend hundreds of thousands of dollars advertising themselves in one brochure or magazine or another nationally. I'd bet even money that I've sent a thousand guests to State Park accommodations over the last two years - guests who never saw an advertisement - and I'd bet short odds that the advertising they get from me, for free, generates more business than say, a \$10,000 spot in the magazine of your choice.

Call me Rodney Dangerfield. I don't get no respect from state park folks.

Two more of Kentucky's Natural Symbols

Since "Kentucky's Natural Symbols," one of the fish and wildlife department's most popular publications, featuring the cardinal, gray squirrel, Kentucky bass, goldenrod and Kentucky coffee tree, hasn't been available for some time due to budget constraints, this column is being used to fill the gap. When the publication is again available (and we're not sure when that will be), the revised edition will include the state butterfly, the vicroy.

Kentucky (spotted) bass (*Micropterus punctulatus*) was designated the state fish in 1956 by a joint resolution of the General Assembly. One of four black bass species found in Kentucky waters, the Kentucky bass is primarily a stream fish.

Although Rafinesque, a naturalist who worked with Audubon classifying wildlife in Kentucky, wrote the original description of Kentucky bass in 1819, it was not until the rediscovery by Carl L. Hubbs in 1927 that this fish was accepted as a separate and distinct species by ichthyologists. Rafinesque's work was disregarded because his description was brief and uncritical, and perhaps because the

man himself was eccentric. Similarities among the three major black bass species sometimes confused anglers. Kentucky bass and smallmouth bass have similar body proportions while Kentucky bass share similar coloration with largemouth bass.

The term "spotted" is used to describe numerous scales with dark bases which appear as small spots on the lower sides of a Kentucky bass. Olive and dark green patches along both sides run together creating the appearance of an irregular, lengthwise stripe. Irregular patches of dark

green appear above the stripe, and the greenish body becomes paler toward the belly which is pearl white. This member of the sunfish family has a moderate size mouth and a prominent protruding jaw. The tip of the upper jaw is just below the eye. (Cont. to A-7)

its most distinguishing feature is a rough patch of "teeth" on the tongue. The patch is easily felt by rubbing a finger over the tongue.

Kentucky bass prefer large pools and flowing streams with moderate currents. Living in and around structures on the bottom, these fish wait in hiding for unsuspecting prey. Diet includes shad, minnows, bluegill,

small bass, crayfish, nightcrawlers, insect larvae, small snakes, frogs and bugs.

Prior to spawning, Kentucky bass move upstream into shallow water or coves where nests are built by the male. He fans the bottom with his tail creating a saucerlike depression measuring between one and two and one-half feet wide. The male then drives the female to the nest where she deposits her eggs. Four-year-old females produce between 4,000 and 5,000 eggs per pound of body weight.

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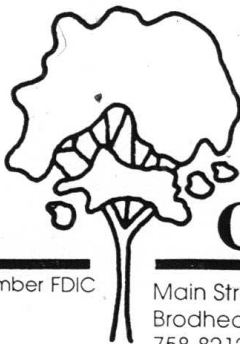

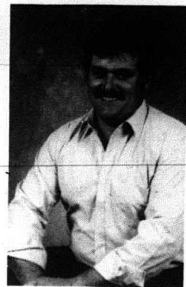

When I run into children in the supermarket two or three weeks after school is out for the summer, and ask them if they are enjoying their vacation, more often than not they say they're bored. Yes, these are the same children who are eagerly removing the numbers each day from the countdown posters in their classrooms, but somehow, about mid-June, school sounds pretty good.

Underneath that lazy exterior, kids actually crave some structure in their days. They also crave interaction with other kids, and having something to talk about (even complain about) and look forward to. Surely kids need time to be left alone, and daydream, but too much "free" time is like too much of anything else we think we want.

There are at least two excellent, inexpensive, and under-utilized summer camp opportunities available for the kids in our community: 4-

H Camp, run by the County Extension Service, and Camp Andrew Jackson (AJ), run by Christian Appalachian Project. There are various church camps, as well, that welcome children of any denomination. As a child, I never did go to camp, and never cared to, but as a college-age camp counselor, I found out what I had missed growing up.

Probably the most valuable aspect of going away to camp is that it satisfies the sense of adventure that stirs and stimulates all children. Often children have insecurities that hamper them from taking the risk of

venturing too far from the familiar, but it is a rare child who doesn't gain a sense of accomplishment and survival after a week away from mom and dad. Surviving a strang bed and shared accommodations with unfamiliar faces, children gain the courage to sample other opportunities that will help them grow to like themselves and enjoy life more fully.

Camp life is steeped in opportunities to learn new skills. Kids love to accomplish things and show off what they have done.

tude of shared experiences and an ability to form deeper friendships grows as campers must rely on one another for some of the support that families ordinarily provide. Kids who have huddled together in their cabin during a mid-night thunderstorm, or learned to paddle a canoe in unison, or even shared jokes about the camp food, have gained a new understanding of "community" and "team work."

A fringe benefit is that even the most ardent camper returns with a deeper appreciation of home. Even brothers and sisters that were previously perceived as the enemy, look pretty good after a week of being apart. One week at camp is a "safe" amount of time for a child to try his wings, even if he needs a little nudge to get out of the nest.

Applications for camps are available at the schools, the Extension Office, various CAP agencies (including the Teen Center) or through churches. Scholarships are available and will be explained by the agency involved. Encouraging your child to expand his boundaries will enable him to grow in confidence and competence, qualities which will enable him to act responsibly when faced with challenges and temptations.

Pamela L. Martin, seventh and eighth grades, Brodhead Elementary School, and Florence Winstead, 11th grade, Rockcastle County High School.

Clark was taught at Mt. Vernon Elementary since 1982. She has also taught at Brodhead Elementary School.

She is married to Donald J. Clark, Mt. Vernon, and they have one son, Trent D. Clark. Her parents are Paul D. and Mary Lou Bullock, Brodhead.

Martin has taught at Brodhead Elementary School since 1978. She is married to Roy A. Martin, Mt. Vernon, and has two children, Roy Steven and Gina L. Martin. Her parents are Alfred L. and Vivian R. Cummins, Berea.

Winstead has taught English at Rockcastle County High School for 20 years. She has two children, Clint Winstead and Nora Ross. Her parents are Ollie Ponder Hoskins, Brod-

head, and the late Henry C. Hoskins. Lois Adams-Rodgers, deputy commissioner-chief of staff with the Kentucky Department of Education, as guest speaker, called the program a "tremendous" one.

"I commend Campbellsville College for your work in developing innovative programs responsive to reform (the Kentucky Education Reform Act (KERA) of 1990).

Former Livingston teacher indicted

A former Livingston teacher and Harlan school board member has been charged with theft and forgery in connection with school purchases in 1990.

Harlan County interim Superintendent Grace Ann Tolliver and Harlan florist Gary Henson, who resigned his seat on the school board in December, are accused of charging the school district for \$2,289 for Christmas decorations and passing them off as teaching supplies.

Henson is accused of faking an invoice from another florist so that he could be paid \$510 for flower arrangements for a high school cafeteria despite laws against school board members doing business with the school system.

Mrs. Tolliver taught school at Livingston from 1967 until 1972 when she went to Harlan.

Both Tolliver and Henson have denied any wrongdoing.

The indictments are the first from an investigation of school finances

that started last fall and that Harlan's Commonwealth Attorney Henry Johnson said is months from completion.

Johnson said Tolliver and Henson were charged with acts of white-collar crime that "involve not only a theft but a betrayal of a public trust."

He praised Kentucky State Police for "assigning sufficient resources" and a "detailed, time-consuming in-depth investigation." Johnson said it is helpful that the chief investigator, Detective Denny Pace, grew up in Harlan County and graduated from Cawood High School, because it gives him "added insight."

The criminal investigation grew out of an investigation by state education officials but developed into a wide-ranging look at the Harlan County school district's purchasing practices.

Many Harlan County teachers and residents criticized the indictments as an example of picking on Eastern Kentucky and inappropriate interfer-

ence.

Martin Carr, Harlan County's new school superintendent reported Tuesday Mrs. Tolliver will return to her old job as director of special education "for the present time."



Grace Ann Tolliver was interim superintendent for seven months.

Three amendments will face voters in November general election

Succession, modernizing state government and charity gaming to be on ballot

Three constitutional amendments -- among them a far-reaching government-reform proposal allowing governors to succeed themselves in office -- will be up for voter approval on the November general election ballot.

Voters will also decide the fate of an amendment to abolish or make appointive several minor statewide offices, as well as a proposal to allow Kentucky lawmakers to enact charitable-gaming laws.

Perhaps the most significant amendment is Senate Bill 226, which modernizes aspects of state and local government. Its key provision would allow statewide officials to seek one additional term, beginning with those elected in 1995. Current office holders would not be eligible to succeed themselves.

(In 1981, a succession amendment was approved by the General Assembly but rejected by voters largely because the measure applied to the sitting governor.)

The measure would also require candidates running for governor and lieutenant governor to run as a slate, much as candidates for president and vice president do. It would also remove the lieutenant governor as presiding officer of the state and allow the legislature to set the officer's duties. The governor could also delegate responsibilities to the lieutenant governor.

The governor could also delegate responsibilities to the lieutenant governor.

As a cost-saving measure, election officials, Commonwealth's attorneys, circuit clerks, judges and mayors would be moved to even-numbered years, beginning in 1998. This would make every fourth year in Kentucky election-free, and reduce state spending for elections by about 25 percent.

The amendment also clarifies what should be done if a sitting governor becomes disabled and cannot perform the duties of the office, something not now specified in the state charter.

The process proposed in the amendment would require the attorney general to petition the state Supreme Court to declare the governor incapacitated. The governor could only be removed by unanimous consent of the court, a safeguard against invoking this provision unnecessarily or improperly.

Another section of this lengthy amendment removes the constitutional provision that the governor must relinquish power to the lieutenant

governor upon leaving the state. Senate Bill 226 is what is known as a "cluster amendment," in which several different sections of the constitution are changed at the same time. The courts have upheld the validity of cluster amendments as long as all the revisions relate to a single subject.

Probably the best-known use of that approach was a 1975 amendment that restructured the state's entire court system by amending 33 different sections of the constitution.

A second amendment, Senate Bill 262, would clean up the state charter and streamline government by eliminating offices that no longer have significant duties and making other minor offices appointive.

The amendment would abolish the offices of railroad commissioner, register of the land, and superintendent of public instruction. The first two positions have had no real duties for years, while the latter was re-elected essentially during the 1980 when the Education Reform Act transferred most of its powers to an appointed commissioner of education.

The amendment would also make agriculture commissioner and secretary of state appointive rather than elective. House Bill 725 would amend section 226 of the Constitution to allow the General Assembly to sponsor charitable organizations to permit

lotteries and other gift enterprises as a way to raise money. The measure was proposed largely in response to numerous church organizations wishing to use bingo and other games of chance in fund-raising. The amendment requires the legislature to define what constitutes a charitable lottery, determine what types of games will be allowed and establish an accounting mechanism to ensure that all proceeds are expended for charitable purposes only.

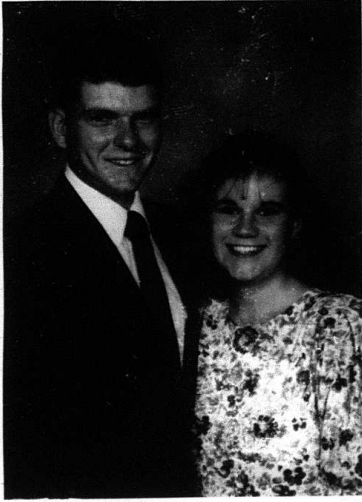
Kentucky's constitution is one of the most difficult in the nation to amend, because of the limited number of amendments that can be proposed at any time and the requirement that amendments be approved at regular legislative sessions.

Not including the three current amendments, a total of 64 constitutional changes have been approved by the General Assembly. Only 30 have met with voter approval, a success rate of less than 50 percent and an indication of how reluctant voters have been to tamper with the 100-year-old state charter.

Amending the constitution is a two-step process. A proposed change must first be approved by three-fifths of the members of each chamber of the legislature -- 23 votes in the Senate and 60 in the House of Representatives. Subsequently, the amendment must be ratified in a voter referendum.
