Two percent salary increase approved by school board

Following a closed hearing which resulted in the expulsion of a seventh grade boy, a two-percent increase in salary for all school employees was approved by the school board at Tuesday's meeting.

The salary hike was determined with the understanding that the reforms have put extra stress and duties on school employees and they need some extra compensation.

Superintendent Bige Towery stated, "Ifeel that a slight raise would be appropriate due to the mass restructuring and reform. It will help compensate for their effort and work toward the implementation of KERA."

He continued by saying how salary

rtecontinued by saying how salary competitiveness is important to attract good teachers.

Pursuing annexation into the city limits of the property that was purchased to serve as the site for the new high school was approved. Board members were pleased at the possibility as it will provide fire and policie protection as well as a sewage system.

Committees throughout the county, comprised of principals and teachers, submitted a professional development/school calendar pfan for the school year 1992-93. Professional development day, or

inservice days, are required by law for each school district. Schools are nally allowed five, however, new normally allowed five, however, new-legislation passed that will allow up to five extra days per district for the next two years. In a vote, the Rock-castle County, teachers, voted to take three of the possible five extra days, making next year's calendar have a total of eight professional develop-ment days.

ment days.

In addition to having more development days, all employees, both certified and classified, will participated in the activities of professional development days.

The proposed calendar consists of a total of 185 days, 172 of which are instructional days.

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

Two more of Kentucky's **Natural Symbols**

Since "Kentucky's Natural Symbols," one of the fish and wildlife department's most popular publications, featuring the cardinal, gray squirrel, Kentucky bass, glodenod and Kentucky coffee tree, hasn't been available for some time due to budget constraints, this column is being used to fill the gap. When the publication is again available (and we're not sure when that will they, the revised edition will include the state butterfly, the viceroy.

Kentucky (spotted) bass (Microp-Kentucky (spotca) tosas (witrop-terus punctuatus) was designated the state fish in 1956 by a joint resolution of the General Assembly. One of four black bass species found in Kentucky waters, the Kentucky bass is primar-

ily a stream fish.

Although Rafinesque, a naturalist
who worked with Audubon classifying wildlife in Kentucky, wrote the
original description of Kentucky bass in 1819, it was not until the redescrip-tion by Carl L. Hubbs in 1927 that this fish was accepted as a separate and distinct species by ichthyologis Rafinesque's work was disregarded because his description was brief and uncritical, and perhaps because the

man himself was eccentric.

Similarities among the three major-black bass species sometimes con-fused anglers. Kentucky bass and smallmouth bass have similar body proportions while Kentucky bass share similar coloration with large

The term "spotted" is used to describe numerous scales with dark bases which appear as small spots on the lower sides of a Kentucky bass Olive and dark green patches along both sides run together creating the appearance of an irregular, lengthappearance of an irregular, length-wise stripe. Irregular patches of dark green appear above the stripe, and the greenish body becomes paler toward the belly which is pearl white. This member of the sunfish family has a moderate size mouth and a promi-nent protruding jaw. The tip of the upper jaw is just below the eye. But (Cont. to A-7)

When I run into children in the When I run into children in the supermarket two or three weeks after-school is out for the summer, and ask them if they are enjoying their vacation, more often than not they say they re-bored. Yes, these are the same children who are eagerly removing the numbers each day from the count-down posters in their classrooms, but somehow, about mild-June, school sounds nertly rood.

sounds pretty good. Underneath that lazy exterior, kids actually eraye some structure in their days. They also crave interaction with other kids, and having something to talk about (even complain about) and look forward to. Surely kids need time to be left alone, and daydream... but too much "free" time is like too much of anything else we think we

There are at least two excellent nexpensive, and under-utilized ummer camp opportunities avail-ble for the kids in our community: 4-

H Camp, run by the County Extension Service, and Camp Andrew Jackson (AJ), run by Christian Appa-Jackson (AJ), run by Christian Appa-lachian Project. Three amendments will face voters



in November general election

Succession, modernizing state government and charity gaming to be on ballot The measure would also require

Three constitutional amendments -- among them a far-reaching government-reform proposal allowing governors to succeed themselves in office -- will be up for voter approval on the November general election ballot.

Voters will also decide the force of the control of the contro

Voters will also decide the fate of an amendment to abolish or make appointive several minor statewide offices, as well as a proposal to allow Kentucky lawmakers to enact chariable-gaming laws.

Perhaps the most significant amendment is Senate Bill 226, which modernizes aspects of state and local government. Its key provision would allow statewide officials to seek one additional term, beginning with those elected in 1995. Current office holders would not be eligible to succeed-themselves.

(In 1981, a succession amendment
was approved by the General Assembly but rejected by voters largely
because the measure applied to the
sitting governor.)

The measure would also require candidates running for governor and licutenant governor to run as a slate, much as candidates for president and vice president do. It would also remove the licutenant governor as premove the licutenant governor as and allow the legislature to set the office's duties. The governor could also delegate responsibilities to the licutenant governor.

candidates running for governor and lieutenant governor to run as a slate, much as candidates for president and vice president do. It would also remove the lieutenant governor as pre-siding officer of the state Senate, and allow the legislature to set the office's duties. The governor could also delegate responsibilities to the lieutenant

governor.

As a cost-saving measure, elections for Commonwealth's attorneys,

years, beginning in 1998. This would
make every foorth year in Kentucky
election-free, and reduce state spending for elections by about 25 percent.

The process proposed in the amendment would require the attorney general to petition the state Supreme Court to declare the governor incapacitated. The governor could be removed by unanimous consent of the court, a stdeguard against invoking this provision unnecessarily or improperly.

amendment removes the constitu-tional provision that the governor must relinquish power to the licuten-

ant governor upon leaving the state. Senate Bill 226 is what is known as a "cluster amendment," in which several different sections of the constitution are changed at the same time. The courts have upheld the validity of cluster amendments as long as all the revisions relate to a

The amendment would abolish the offices of railroad commissioner, register of the land, and superinten-dent of public instruction. The first dent of public instruction. The first two positions have had no real duties for years, while the latter was rendered essentially dutilets in 1990 when the Education Reform Acturansferred most of its powers to an appointed commissioner of education. The amendment would also make agriculture commissioner and secretary of state appointive rather than elective positions.

elective positions.

House Bill 725 would amend section 226 of the Constitution to allow the General Assembly to permit charitable organizations to sponsor

lotteries and other gift enterprises as a way to raise money. The measure was proposed largely in response to numerous church organizations wishing to use bings and other games of chance in fund-raising. The amendment requires the legislature to defenite what constitutes a chariable lottery, determine what types of games will be allowed and establish an accounting mechanism to ensure that funds are expended for chariable purposes only.

Kentucky so constitution is one of the most difficult in the nation to amend, because of the limited number of amendments that can be proposed at any time and the requirement that amendments be approved at regular legislature sessions only. erous church organizations wish

Not including the three current amendments, a total of 64 constitutional changes have been approved by the General Assembly, Only 30 have met with voter approval, a suc-cess rate of less than 50 percent and an indication of how reluctant voters

A proposed change must fig. 82 approved by three-fifths of the finemeters of each chamber of the legibature. 23 votes in the Senate and 60 in the House of Representatives. Subsequently, the amendment must be ratified in a voter referendum.
