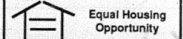

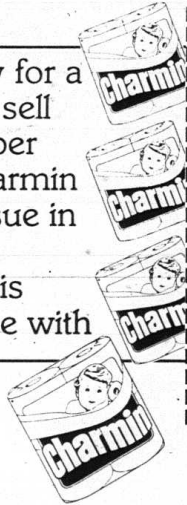

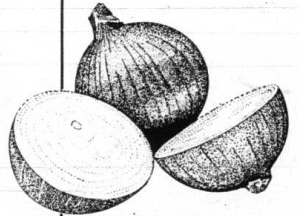

Bush, Clinton win in state and Rockcastle

As expected Republican President George Bush and Democrat Bill Clinton won easy victories in Kentucky in Tuesday's primary, with 100 percent of the vote counted. Bush got 75,347 or 75 percent of the vote.

Republican uncommitted votes were 25,714 or 25 percent.

In the Democrat primary, Clinton got 206,950 votes or 56 percent, with 103,500 or 28 percent uncommitted.

Jerry Brown got 30,633 or 8 percent.

In Rockcastle, Clinton got 245, Brown, 28; Tsongas, 11; Harkin, 3; Kerrey, 2, and uncommitted, 32.

In the Republican vote in Rockcastle Bush got 502 and uncommitted 105.

In the Republican race for U.S. Senate, David L. Williams was the winner. The Burksville Republican will face incumbent Senator Wendell

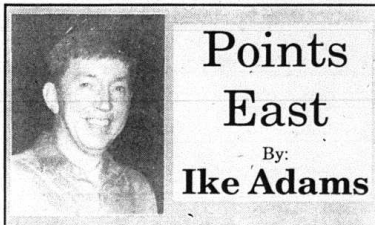

I used to pride myself on promptly answering all the mail that this column generates. Back in the early 80's I'd often get as many as two or three letters a month from folks who had gone to the trouble of calling whatever newspaper and tracking down my home address so that they could correspond without having to have it published on the editorial page. And I answered those letters with volumes of information and appreciation. It was then, and still is today, very flattering to know that someone reads the drive that your newspaper so generously distributes on my behalf.

I could fill several paragraphs with the names of folks that I now count among my friends and with whom I became acquainted because they contacted me as a result of the column.

Now the letters come in at the rate of two or three a day on average. And sometimes I'm gone for more than a week and don't have time to garden and fish as much as I'd like to. Every time I start the tiller or pick up a fishing pole, I start feeling guilty because I have three shoe boxes full of unanswered mail. It's a miserable feeling.

I've thought about putting together a form letter that would basically be a thank you note, for writing, with some space near the bottom where I could pencil in a personal bit. But whenever people do that to me, I feel cheated. I'd much rather they let me know that they are up to their tails in alligators and that they are so busy trying to drain the swamp that they don't have time to write as much as they'd like to. Maybe that's what I ought to do. It sure fits.

I've just about planted my garden with seed that folks from all over Kentucky and several surrounding states have sent to me. I also have at least two dozen varieties of stuff that won't make it into the ground this year because I don't have space enough to fit them in. One section of my freezer is sectioned off for flower and vegetable seed and I have the names and addresses of the folks who sent them dutifully attached to each zip-lock bag.

I have drawn a diagram of my garden and I have labeled the exact location of the seeds I have planted so that I can write back to the folks who sent them and let them know how they fared. And I'm still planting. I have watermelons that should grow to a hundred pounds, bushel gourds,

23 row sweet corn, and beans, beans, beans. I have carrots from Minnesota, Spinach from Wisconsin, marigolds from California, asters from Maine, and blue bonnets from Texas. I have squash from Ohio and Indiana, beets from Michigan and Tennessee, all over the east coast.

I have three varieties of fall beans and a fourth on the way and you can bet your bottom dollar that those will make it into the ground. This afternoon I discovered that Dorothy Amburgey (from Sally's Branch in Laurel County) has genuine old-fashioned snap peas that go back for generations and I aim to get some of those. She also has genuine Lazy Wife Fall beans and I am most anxious to compare those to the ones I have received from Smiley King (Knott County) Edward Bendy (Pike County), Gerald Baker, (Montgomery County) and shade Crase, (Woodford County).

When someone sends me fall bean seeds, I generally do get back in touch that day.

Instead of looking for old fence

wire for them to grow on, I have ordered 375 feet of five foot fence wire from a place in Lexington. It's going to cost me just over a hundred dollars, but I'm going to cut it up into fifty five foot lengths and spend another hundred dollars on steel posts so that I can hang it in my garden and other locations around the farm. I've learned enough about fall beans to know that they will cross with one another if you plant them very close together, so our front lawn will have some fence wire strung across it and we'll hope it looks presentable.

In the meantime, if you have written to my home address and received no reply, please bear with me. Please do not feel cheated and please know that my guilt complex is peaking out. I do, in fact, love to get mail. The best thing about writing this column is hearing from readers who want to take me to task or share some information. Just be patient if you expect a reply.

Lots of folks have written to ask why we haven't been putting garden-

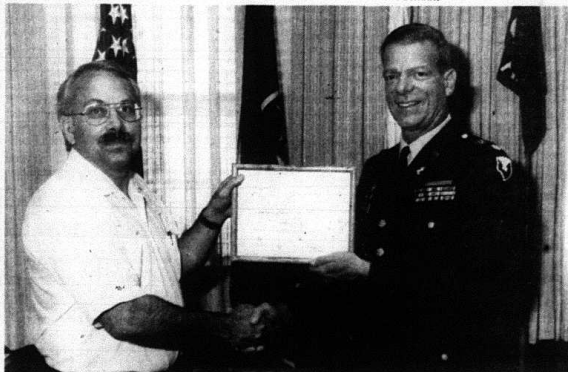
Volunteer of the Year

As a child, Memorial Day was not a day I looked forward to. It was a time when Mother, Dad and I, and other assorted children who might be home for the occasion, would pile in our many years old car and head to Casey County to decorate the graves of Mother's and Dad's parents, sisters, brothers, and I surely don't want this to make us personal enemies. But everyone must understand that rules sometimes need changed, not enforced, to solve a dispute or a problem.

I didn't look forward to it for a couple of reasons and the two that come first to mind is the racking car sickness I always endured and the frequent stops this entailed. Second, I was a tall child for my age and I got very out with mother introducing me to childhood friends as her "baby" and always ending the introduction with, "and she's a big one isn't she?" Mother was only five foot tall so my 5'3" height at an early age impressed her. Naturally, at that age I wanted to be little and petite and cute and instead had to live with long, tall and gawky.

Anyway, this tradition continued until I married and managed to break it somewhat in that I only went when the guilt trip Mother laid on me was sufficient to get me there but I made Jim and the children go along and I made sure that I sat in the front seat so at least the car sick part was in my absence. And, thank the gods, that be none of my children were afflicted with it until Travis came along and he hasn't been asked to make the trip yet).

The last time I went was 1971 and the reason was my Dad had been diagnosed with cancer in February of that year. He had been undergoing radiation treatments and, while they made him deathly ill, he had managed to seemly sufficient strength

to make the trip in May that he knew Mother so looked forward to every year. I decided to take the children and go because I knew in the depths of my heart that it would be the last time Dad would make the trip and I wanted to be there with him.

It was a hot Memorial Day and I can see Dad clearly now as he waited for mother to make her rounds of the gravesites and the meetings with friends seen once a year. He felt terrible, but he didn't complain except once when I asked him why he had put himself through the trip this year and his answer was, "Your Mom wanted to come as usual." I was pretty angry for a while until I realized that Mother was in denial of how seriously ill Dad was and was desperately trying to pretend that everything was as it had always been. Dad died on Sara's birthday that year, July 25, and it took me 16 years to be able to make the trip again without the memory of Dad's last trip being too painful to bear.

My oldest daughter, Jamie, her daughter, Kayla, my youngest daughter, Allison, and I were the ones who made the trip, along with my brother, Ralph, and his wife, Janice. It was a cold, miserable day and by the second of the three cemeteries we visited, Jamie was refusing to get out of the car and I didn't blame her. We went to Caney Fork Cemetery where my grandmother, Perlina Long and

grandfather, Charlie, are buried. Yes, I have my grandmother's name and, although I have spent my life lamenting the fact that I wasn't a Patty, or Lisa, or Jennifer, I passed the name along to Allison as a middle name. I pointed out the name on the stone, which used to carry pictures of my grandparents in heavy plastic but which have long since fallen off in the 51 years they have been there, and Allison wasn't impressed, missing part of her name carved in granite. She has picked up from me my complaints about the name over the years and has decided at this point that she really would rather not one knows about her own involvement with it. She was incensed however when my brother pointed out that with Kayla, my granddaughter, Jamie, her mother, myself, my uncle, Noah, killed in WWII and buried alongside my grandparents, and my great grandparents two rows away that we had six generations in the cemetery at that time. Allison was upset that she wasn't included in this litany and didn't understand when I tried to explain that this is of the same generation as Jamie, even though she is only 20 months older than Kayla, and, since she has no child cannot be counted in the generation lineage.

The day was comforting in that the older you get the more interested you are in your roots and want to be





As a team, the Rockets went to the plate 27 times and scored four runs on five hits while drawing only one walk.

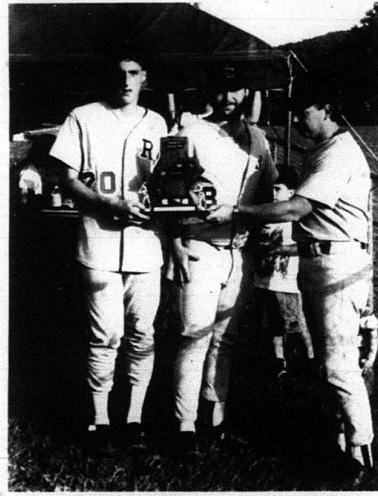

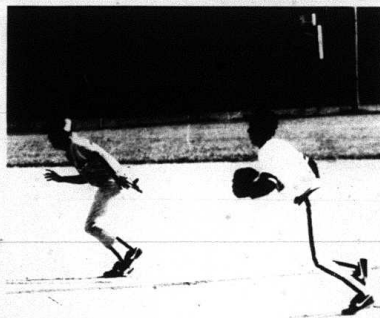

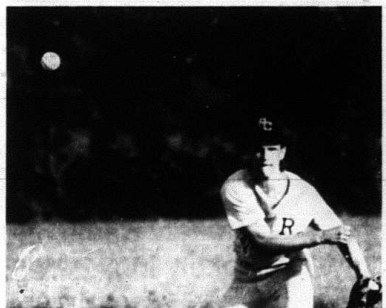

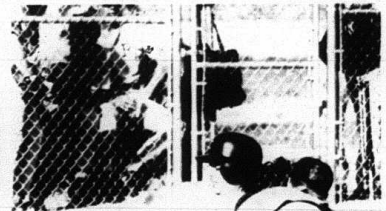

One doesn't usually associate play with the work on the farm in the spring and summer. For too many of us that is the time of year for work, period. Or, by our old fashioned standards of work that was what it was. I wonder if there is anyone else who remembers the spring time work load

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of trying to find enough dry weather to get the plowing done then find out wet weather to get the tobacco set?

Those were also the days when setting tobacco was done by hand. And we had to have wet weather to do it. The ground prepared for the tobacco had to be wet enough to assure the plants would live and the only way for that to happen was for it to rain. After a rain in May or early June every field where tobacco would be raised would have every work hand available either pulling plants out of the beds or on their hand and knees crawling through the rows setting the plants in the muddy earth. Some of the workers would have to put the tobacco plant in but many would use a plain sturdy stick to do it with. And there were a few of us who preferred to just use our hand as an instrument. You bet it was messy and hard work but it had to be done, and done it was.

When this was accomplished there were other things of like importance, or maybe even more important, to do while the sun and rain were preparing the earth for harvest.

The gardens had already been planted and by now ready for the final tending before the canning season began. There seemed to be no time for rest or pleasure so we had to make our own pleasure out of the work. How does one make work fun, you may ask? Well, have you ever been to a community working where everyone shares the load, then when the job is completed joins in the fun of playing games and selling tall tales? Let me tell you of one such instance.

It was mid-summer and our bean crop had been a bumper one. We were too far from market to sell the surplus so we did the next best thing, canned them. The job of picking them, and preparing them for canning was overwhelming for our small family. There was only four of us and we had already been worked to a frazzle. So, I came up with the idea of an old fashioned bean stringing. I knew everyone else was in the same fix but none-the-less I invited all the neighbors in for an evening's entertainment of stringing beans. They all seemed to be glad of a break from the routine of working alone. We were

up early on the day of the "entertainment" and began picking the beans with zest. Before the day was over we had picked twelve bushels and had carried them to the spring and thoroughly washed them in readiness for the stringing. Neighbors began to arrive in early evening and before long the emptied tubs were being filled again with beans ready for canning. The laughter and joking that took place filled the house with merriment that had been absent all too long. The young people of course had to have their breaks to take walks to the spring or simply stroll around the yard.

The evening ended with a watermelon fest. Mat had gone to town especially to get several of them for the occasion. At that time watermelons were hard to get in our area and were a real treat.

The evening ended on a happy note and the job that had been shared by many had not been a job at all but a time of pleasure for the whole neighborhood.

The canning of those beans is another story. We worked all the next

day and night to get them in their jars and processed. Cold packing in those

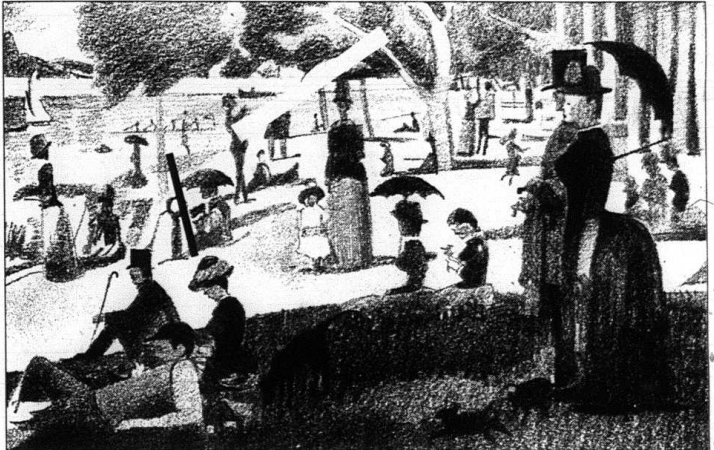

But this is what makes meeting the challenges of parenting so rewarding. The natural tendency of children, like our lawns and gardens, is to be unruly. Left to their own devices children are by nature very limited in-
dearing qualities. Oh, they are cute and beguiling (so are buttercups!) but they lack the substance that only comes with cultivation. Parents, like gardeners, must take a very active

role in the development of a quality product. Parents are necessary.

During the past couple of weeks, I have administered the Pride Drug-Awareness Survey to children in the grades four and above. One of the items on the survey is: My parents make me follow certain rules _____ never, _____ sometimes, _____ a lot. The answer sheets are anonymous, but in leafing through I see a significant number that indicate lax parental supervision. Rules aren't everything, but certainly a parent who makes certain that limits are set and

enforced, and require something of their children demonstrate caring.

Parenting is an active job. To carry on with the gardening analogy, consider what happens when you leave your garden for a week or two in the warm, moist season. Weeds all but choke out that which you intended to produce. And so it is with children who are allowed to fend for themselves. There are abundant weeds in our society that prey on untended children and very quickly obliterate the blossoms and fruit of parents' efforts. Youngsters may survive, but their potential will be limited.

I am confident that my store-bought flowers will bloom in due time. They are perennials and I guess they are busy putting down firm roots before they produce petals. I need to be patient. It is much easier to be patient with my flowers than it was to be patient with my children. But, by golly, when I look at my three beautiful young adult-children, I am very glad I didn't settle for the weeds. Parents reap what they sow and nurture.

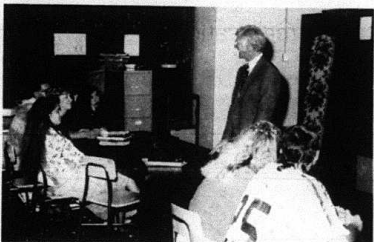

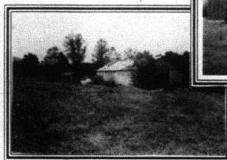

The new summer hours will be from 12 p.m. to 6 p.m. Monday.

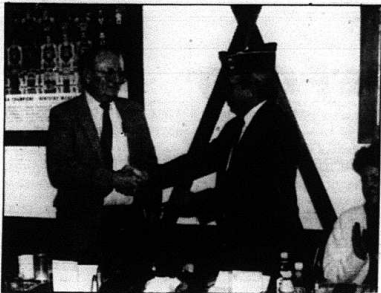
Chautauqua presents Jesse Stuart "Kentucky's Poet Laureate"

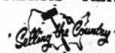

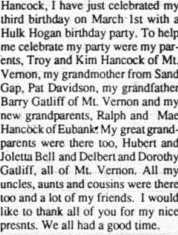

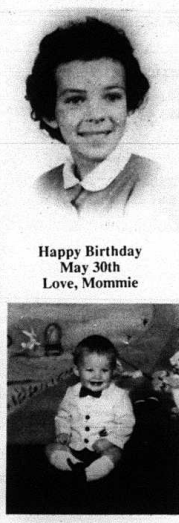
