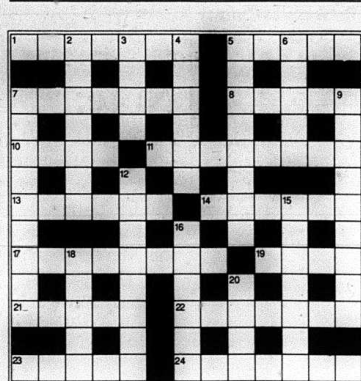

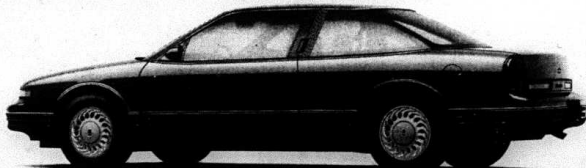

The break-in was found when she opened the business on Monday.

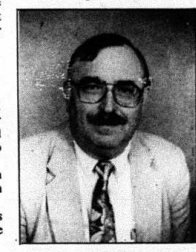
Several wrecks in county Ed Sowder, 85, dies in wreck near home

Judge says money is tight

"Funds during 1993 as usual will be very tight"
So predicted county Judge/Executive Roland Mullins, "and the county will continue to need alternate funding for community development efforts."
The county judge pointed out, "Improved Western Water District distribution should take pressure off Mt. Vernon and Brothead, and lifting of the water ban should increase housing starts."
Considering water, the judge said Woods Creek water at Livingston will allow for expansion throughout that area and subsequent growth.

A look back by Ralph Griffin

Early mechanical devices in Mt. Vernon

Rummaging through old Signals, we came across a story by the late Ralph Griffin, Mt. Vernon merchant and historian of cars. He was discussing early mechanical devices in Mt. Vernon and having fun with it.

In looking through some old clippings by Col. James Maret, a few nights ago, I ran across a list of mechanical devices and the dates of their introduction into Rockcastle County. There was a threshing-machine mentioned, an organ, a piano, telephone, printing press, gasoline engine, brooch-loading shotgun and just any number of late inventions, but strange to say, he made no mention of the automobile. Looking at the date of this article I realized that this was not just an omission upon the part of Col. Maret, for the first automobile had not then arrived. It is a moot question whether the most of us would not be better off had its arrival been delayed for another century, but be that as it may, it is hard to realize that cars are comparatively late-comers in Rockcastle.

I am still young enough to be wearing my own teeth, but I had been shaving and trying to court for some time before I had my first automobile ride. A few hardy adventures had passed through here at various times, in cars of the type which are now seen only in museums, long before our country had begun to dream of good roads. It is still a mystery how they ever got over the stretch between Mt. Vernon and Livingston, for a man had to be cold-sober before he could get over that road on horseback.

Nevertheless, every three or four years some furrier would try it, usually on a bet, some of them would get as far as Cayley Mountain before forfeiting the bet and shipping the car back home by rail.

Bill Krueger brought the first automobile to Mt. Vernon, and I believe that it was the first to be owned in the county. In what is presumed to have been a moment of weakness, Bill purchased this contraption in Stanford and it was shipped into Mt. Vernon via box-car. When word was passed around that the car was upon the siding, the whole town turned out to help unload it. A runway was built out of cross-ties, and in the matter of a couple of hours Mr. Krueger's very poor investment again rested upon terra firma.

As I recall it now, it was a beautiful thing, painted a brilliant red which would knock your eyes out at a hundred yards. A Peerless, I believe was called. Mr. Peerless had failed to equip his machine with any of the comforts, or some previous owner, of which there had apparently been many, had removed them. Anyway, there was no body upon the thing; only the running-gear, a steering-wheel and some works which the more learned of our citizens declared to be the engine. Few of us knew that an automobile was supposed to have a body, however, so it was not missed. A floor was soon laid out of planks, a few assorted soap-boxes nailed on for seats and she was ready for service.

There then arose a pressing need for some party who could start the machine, preferably someone who

could stop it as well, should the occasion arise. A canvass of the crowd disclosed the fact that Fred Owens was the only man present who had ever attempted to operate anything more complicated than an eggbeater, so Fred was elected. As Fred began to tinkered and crank, all but the most fool-hardy withdrew to the surrounding knobs, but as time passed and nothing unusual happened, quite a number of people professed before some mental giant suggested that the thing might need fuel. The gasoline tank was soon located and the top unscrewed, whereupon several bats and moths flew out, and the tank was found to be quite dry and dusty inside.

We will pass hurriedly over the delay occasioned by a search for gasoline, and say that two gallons were eventually located at Mr. Adam Bryant's grist mill. Supplied with the necessary fuel, the old Peerless responded, and picked up a fast second to none ever before known in these parts. Clouds of smoke arose and horses broke their tethers a mile away. The crowd dispersed with great singleness of purpose, several hanging up new records for the hundred yards which Mr. Peerless had crunched. Some of the spectators dropped these impediments, ran a quarter of a mile in nothing flat, then hurdled a ten-rail fence. He couldn't get back, though, until his tethers were carried to him. Swore that he didn't run-the-thing, "just blowed him that way."

To shorten a long story, Fred Owens eventually conquered the Peerless and throttled it down to a dull roar. Boys

were sent down Main Street to shoo the cows and hogs out of the way and Mt. Vernon's first home-owned automobile lurched painfully but majestically down the street, to the accompaniment of hearty cheers.

The afternoon was yet young, so a general holiday was declared by common consent. It had as well been declared early that morning for business was at a complete standstill. Stores were closed and every body had his first automobile ride. Many willing hands and some hasty engineering made Main Street fairly passable from the Rockcastle Hotel corner down to Uncle Billy Poynter's store, a sixteenth of a mile if it was an inch. The gasoline gave out before everyone had had his ride, so some of the boys went to Brodhead on a hand-car and got three more gallons from the pump-house.

The kids mooched a lot of extra rides, of course, but everyone had his turn and it was just more fun than a camp-meeting. The only thing to mark the occasion, as I recall, was a series of delays to let the engine cool off. The delays were bad enough, but some leading citizen always took advantage of them to make a speech. There was no elective office in the town which Mr. Krueger could not have had by unanimous vote. And Fred Owens - why he just became the town's idol.

Nobody had suspected that he had a man right in Mt. Vernon who could run one of them newfangled contraptions. Thinking back on it now, I doubt if Fred himself had suspected it until that day.

It's getting close to the first of the year and any day now we're going to get reminders from the IRS about how much money the government has taken from us this year and how much it still wants.

Several months ago I wrote a column about the Research Triangle in North Carolina and how that area has prospered in the past few years. Education leaders land major industry over the years.

Several weeks ago I received a press release from Toyota Manufacturing. It details a recent study commissioned by Toyota and made by a member of the University of Kentucky faculty.

Toyota opened in 1988 and has far exceeded the original expectations, according to Charles F. Haywood, author of the study.

Construction was announced in 1985 with the original expectation that 3,200 people would be employed.

At the time both major newspapers in the state blasted the project, saying that the incentive program given to Toyota was not justified in bringing the company to Kentucky.

Thatsincentive package, which was about \$147 million, included funds for job training, infrastructure improvements and land acquisition.

By the end of 1992 some 4,350 people will be working at the Toyota plant, with projected employment increasing to 6,000 by 1995.

The growth of the project has more than paid for the cost of the incentives, according to Haywood's study, which said that the state got an estimated \$16.1 billion in extra tax revenues, which recoups and exceeds the 1985 incentive package.

During the 20-year period, according to the study, the total payback will reach \$93.4 million.

In all, the far-reaching effects of the Toyota plant have been felt all across the Commonwealth, with 96 percent of current employees coming from Kentucky and 112 of Kentucky's 120 counties represented.

In terms of indirect or spin-off employment, some 17,883 jobs have been created.

That figure includes jobs in the

construction industry to companies that supply the Toyota factory as well as the effect of Toyota employees spending in the area.

During 1992 some 230,000 Camry sedans and station wagons as well as four-cylinder engines for export to Japan and other countries will come off the line.

Construction expanding Toyota will allow the company to manufacture 400,000 vehicles and 500,000 engines, including V-6 engines. The production will be reached by the end of 1995.

Other facts include:

- total annual payroll will reach \$185 million, far exceeding the original projection of \$90 million.
- Toyota's total investment in the plant will exceed \$2 billion, upsharply from the original plan for an \$800 million investment.
- by 1996 the Toyota plant will be directly and indirectly credited with the creation of 92,000 jobs nationwide, of which 22,000 will be in the state of Kentucky.
- domestic content of the Camry is about 75 percent with purchases of parts and materials from 174 U.S. suppliers.

—since 1985 56 automotive parts and materials plants have located in Kentucky with a labor force of some 10,000 workers.

All this has projected the state of Kentucky into a major role in the nation's motor vehicle industry.

In all, the state of Kentucky has seen growth due to Toyota, which according to many is an ideal corporate citizen.

When I wrote my column several months ago it was not intended to demean the role Toyota has played in bringing jobs and industry to the state of Kentucky.

I would still contend that industrial and business growth depends on
