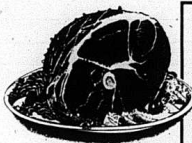

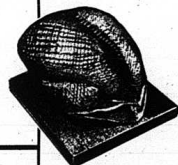

## Rockets baseball season begins; have 35 game schedule

Following a rain-out Monday baseball season got underway in Rockcastle County as the Rockets hosted Lincoln County in their season opener.

Committing five errors and limited to only one hit after the second inning the Rockets fell to Lincoln, 17-9, in seven innings.

Of the 17 scored by Lincoln, 12 were unearned.

"Every error we committed came at a crucial time," head coach Ryan Riddle said.

Errors plagued the Rockets from the start as they committed two in the first inning to allow Lincoln five runs.

Hurler J.D. Bussell was the recipient of the fragile defense and was eventually charged with the loss.

The Rockets got the bats going in the bottom of the first inning. Jason Payne made up for his error in the top half of the inning with a three run blast over the left field fence to conclude a five run spur to tie the game.

Their bats continued in the second inning with consecutive hits for

four more runs and a 9-5 lead.

But thereafter the Rockets' bats silenced. Bussell connected for the only hit through the remaining five innings while Lincoln capitalized.

Lincoln nabbed one in the third, two in the fifth, one in the sixth and eight more in the seventh to roll over the Rockets.

Reliever Gregg Goff finished the final one and a third innings and was charged with one run. Bussell left the game with four earned runs.

For the Rockets: J.D. Bussell went two for two with two walks and two

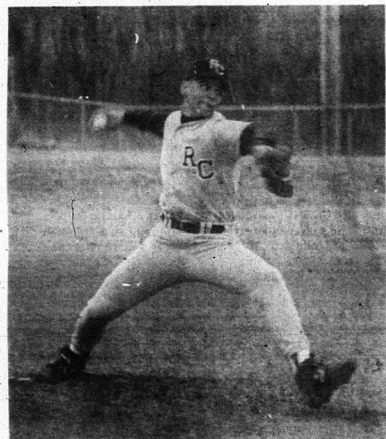

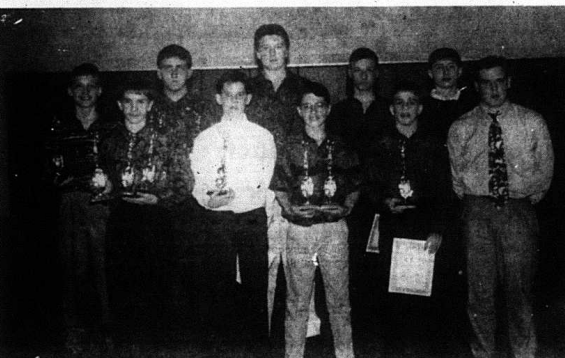

## Free hunter education course available

A free Kentucky Hunter Education course will be held on April 15 and 16 from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. and April 17, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Rockcastle Agricultural Center.

The 10-hour course, sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and Rockcastle County Extension Service and Rockcastle Sportsmen Club will include classroom instruction in hunter ethics, wildlife identification, outdoor survival, first aid, firearms, bow hunting, and ammunition. The last session will include actual range fir-

ing and an examination.

Upon successful completion of the course, a graduate card will be issued which is valid in any state where such certification is required. Attendance at all sessions is required for certification.

Effective March 1, 1991, all hunters born on or after January 1, 1975, shall, while hunting, must carry a valid hunter education course graduate card in addition to the appropriate Kentucky hunting license requirements. A bow hunter not in possession of a firearm may carry a "Na-

tional Bowhunter Education Program" course completion card in lieu of the hunter education card. Children under age 10 and persons exempt from purchasing a hunting license are not required to possess the card while hunting. Children under age 10 shall be accompanied by an adult of at least 18 years of age while hunting.

TO ALL INTERESTED AGENCIES, GROUPS AND PERSONS:

On or about April 23, 1993, the above-named COUNTY will request the Kentucky Housing Corporation to release Federal funds under Title II of the National Affordable Housing Act of 1990, HOME Investment Partnership Act Program, for the following project:

PROJECT TITLE: Rockcastle County Elderly Rehab Project  
PURPOSE: Rehabilitation of four single-family dwellings  
LOCATION: Rockcastle County, Kentucky

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and, accordingly, the above-named COUNTY has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190).

The reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

1. The site is located in an area that has previously been disturbed.
2. The structures are not eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

An Environmental Review Record respecting the within project has been made by the above-named COUNTY which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying, upon request, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

No further environmental review of such project is proposed to be conducted prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the COUNTY to the COUNTY JUDGE EXECUTIVE. Such written comments should be received at the above address on or before April 23, 1993. All such comments so received will be considered and the COUNTY will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

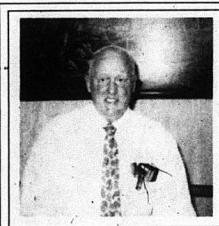
The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will undertake the project described above with HOME funds from the Kentucky Housing Corporation (KHC) under Title II of the National Affordable Housing Act of 1990. The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court is certifying to the State that Roland Mullins, in his official capacity as COUNTY JUDGE EXECUTIVE, consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making, and action, and of the certification is that upon its approval, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court may use the HOME funds and the KHC and HUD will have satisfied their responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. The Kentucky Housing Corporation will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis:

- (a) The certification was not in fact executed by the County's Certifying Officer.
- (b) The COUNTY has failed to make one of the two findings pursuant to 58.41 or to make the written determination decision required by 58.47, 58.53 or 58.64 for the project as applicable.
- (c) The COUNTY has omitted one or more of the steps set forth at Subparts F and G for the preparation and completion of an EA.
- (d) No opportunity was given to the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation or its Executive Director to review the effect of the project on a property listed on the National Register of Historic Places, or found to be eligible for such listing by the Secretary of the Interior, in accordance with 36 CFR Part 800.
- (e) Objections have been made by a Federal Agency.

Objections may be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to the Kentucky Housing Corporation, 1231 Louisville Road, Frankfort, Kentucky, 40601.

Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by the State. No objection received after May 10, 1993 will be considered by the Kentucky Housing Corporation. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (24 CFR Part 8) requires the provision of access to the hearing impaired through telephone Telecommunication Devices for the Deaf (TDDs). As a result, an 800 number has been set up to provide access for deaf persons to CDBG Program information. This TDD number is 1-800-247-2510. An "interpreter" will connect the caller with the requested person.

### Boaters can find cold water deadly

That lake or river you find so inviting, so blue and glistening, can kill you.

The temperature is climbing, the days are getting warmer and boaters are thinking of flocking to the water. But beware, boaters—that water that looks so warm is probably ice cold, and can be deadly, according to the Kentucky Water Patrol.

The air temperature may be warm but the water is still cold, and the shocking effect of cold water on the body is instantaneous and immobilizing.

Persons who fall into cold water may disappear without a struggle, the Water Patrol warned. Those who survive the initial plunge may not be able to move their arms and legs to get out of the water. And as a person's body temperature drops, uncon-

sciousness and drowning occur.

The solution? Wear a Personal Flotation Device, especially in the early spring while the water is still cold. PFDs keep people afloat until help arrives. And as usual, boaters shouldn't forget to take buddies with them. They can save lives, too.

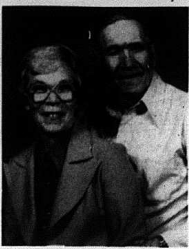

## City Council approves natural gas survey

A natural gas survey was proposed and approved by the Mt. Vernon City Council at its April meeting Monday night.

All the council was present, something that hasn't happened recently. Lee Keene, hospital administrator, told the council it is time to get natural gas in the area, and that Delta Gas Company, is willing to come to the county if approved.

He said industry would benefit from it and the new school could cut costs of heating if the gas was approved before construction starts.

He said industry likes natural gas and more would come to the area if approved.

He reported the county would be asked to contribute financially to the program, but he did not disclose the amount that would be needed to encourage the company. He noted the county and city would have to help Delta with the costs.

The Signal on two occasions took surveys on natural gas several years ago and both were heavily against the project.

At that time, and Monday night, it

was pointed out that the cost to bring gas to the area was estimated at that time to be about \$3 million.

The cost would be for a major line from Crab Orchard, through Brodhead, and on to Mt. Vernon, plus the costs and damage it could cause in the distribution to houses and industry, particularly dug up streets and yards in Mt. Vernon and Brodhead.

Also the line could come from Berea, a decision for Delta.

On a motion to conduct a survey was made by Councilman Lee Keene, seconded by Bob Bailey, the council voted unanimously in favor of the motion.

In other business, the council voted to allow the state to make a third lane to permit a turn lane between Daily Street and Ky. 461 so as to prevent a traffic bottleneck at McDonald's Restaurant now being constructed.

City Attorney John Clontz re-stated his intention to resign pointing out again the Supreme Court opinion that a city attorney cannot represent defendants in local district courts if the city police are involved in the case.

The council decided not to hire a city attorney but to use Clontz, as needed and available.

Mayor Gary R. Cromer told the council Renfro Valley Folks has a few days to post a bond in its entertainment tax case. He said the city will actively pursue collecting the tax which Renfro has appealed to the Kentucky Court of Appeals and is required to post the bond.

Clontz told the council a contract with Western Water Association is all that's left.

Mayor Cromer announced that city Detective Eddie Delaney, has been named Assistant Police Chief. He complimented Delaney on his work on the police force.

The mayor also announced the city will be reimbursed by the federal government for snow removal in the recent snow storm. He said the city would receive about \$1,500 but he wasn't sure of the amount.

The March police report is as follows: complaints 306, assists 34, motorist assists, 5, traffic accident investigations 15, cases opened 8, Mt. Vernon Fire Department, made 17 runs. Livingston Fire Department made 8 runs.

## Mayor says he'll run again

Gary R. Cromer, Mayor of Mt. Vernon since 1987 announced Wednesday he will be a candidate for reelection in the Nov. 2 general election.

City elections in Rockcastle are non-partisan and candidates do not participate in the May primary.

The mayor said, in his opinion, "the city has made good progress in many areas, and there are several projects which are still in progress which I feel I am best qualified to complete."

He is a graduate of Mt. Vernon High School and Eastern Kentucky University with a degree in business administration. He owns and operates Appalachian Medical Equipment in Mt. Vernon.

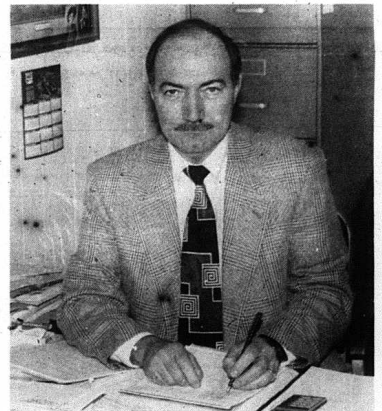

## Points East

I had planned to wait until the championship game was over around midnight on this dreary April evening and then I was going to write a celebration piece. But that lunch of "uncoached," "streetball playing," "undisciplined," etc. kids from Michigan spoiled all that.

Former coach Joe B. Hall was quoted in the New Orleans Times Picayune late last week with a prediction that Michigan simply didn't have a chance against Kentucky. I don't remember his exact words but I believe they included things like "devastation," "embarrassment" and other references to the Wolverines to imply they were no better than second rate compared to the Wildcats.

But as Paul Harvey would say, "now you know the rest of the story." So as the game begins tonight I'm sitting in my office putting the final touches on this particular bit of drivel in some sort of hopes that North Carolina will prevail before I get home. I have friends in Michigan who have attempted to call but I've had the kids answering the phone with instructions to let callers know that I've gone away and they don't know when I'll be home. They are implying that it may not be until early summer.

I suppose the thing that bothers me most about this defeat is the absolute arrogance of the Michigan team. If that same bunch of players were at UK spending as much time yelling insults and displaying the height of disrespect for all life forms other than themselves, I'd be trying to get tickets so I could sit in the visitor's cheering section. It seems to me that sportsmanship should be part of the game, perhaps the major part. And it bothers me more than some to see a winning team hold it in total disregard.

These are not the kind of kids that I want mine to look upon as heroes. They do and it bothers me that they will get up grumpy tomorrow morning because they stayed up an hour and a half past their bedtimes tonight to watch them.

The only thing appropriate about this defeat is that UK took it at the hands of Michigan. I respect Rick Pitino's coaching ability but if anyone in this state deserves a bit of concupescence now and then, Pitino has to be the leading candidate. I literally seethed when he was quoted

in the Lexington paper a couple of weeks ago ridiculing the thousands of basketball fans who listen to and participate in the "sports talk" radio programs across the state. The gist of his remarks was that he felt some sort of pity for such people and he couldn't understand why they weren't watching television.

I suspect that his remarks might have had something to do with the fact that basketball fans have no business at all in questioning his strategy. Pitino obviously believes that folks other than himself have no business studying the fine points of the game and that he alone has any inkling about how it should be played.

I've listened to his own 30 minute broadcast as one fan after another calls in to make an observation and the coach makes a point of chewing them out for being obviously ignorant. On the other hand, he has done a magnificent job of teaching his players to display sportsman-like humility. Several places are selling green-house started celery plants this spring. Celery seed is very difficult to sprout and start yourself because it has to be dampened for a week or so in the frig and still be in the ground for up to 30 days before it will come up. But once you have the plants it is very easy in grow.

I dig a trench about ten inches deep

and set the plants about ten inches apart in the bottom in just enough compost and rich soil to cover the roots. As the plants grow, I use a mixture of dried grass clippings and sawdust to fill in around them every few days. The end result is the purest of pure white stalks that can be harvested from late summer until frost

and they are much tastier than anything you will ever buy in a supermarket.

I found containers with ten plants each for \$1.50 at Wal-Mart over the weekend and I've been told they are even cheaper than that at other places so shop around and give a try. It's a beautiful plant to grow and more than worth the effort.

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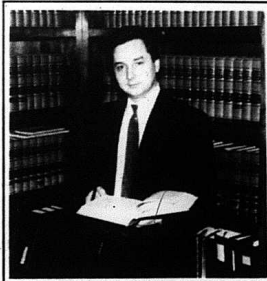

What Marvin didn't know was that I am a member of the "Pumpkin Raiders Gang" who went wild when I saw so many nice ones. I held Marvin up-

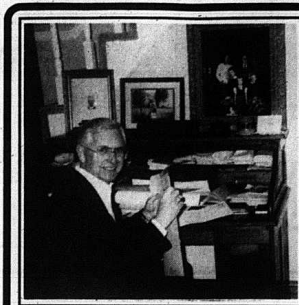
er-I mean I stopped him as I asked to buy one. To my surprise, he said, "No, I won't sell you one."

## Reducing the Risk program conducted at high school

"Some people believe it is useless to try to change things, but we think differently," Ms. Sexton said. She is referring to the high teenage pregnancy rate in Rockcastle County and the attitude some have expressed that nothing can or should be done about it. The health department and the school system recently completed a program where they worked together in an effort to educate teens about the risk of sexual involvement. "Many young people are pressured into becoming sexually involved by their peers. They are afraid they won't fit in if they don't do what everyone else is doing, the fact is, however, the majority of teens are not having sex. We provided teens with the facts and encouraged them not to believe the myth that 'everyone is doing it.' When they realize they are not different from most of their peers if they are not sexually involved, they will not feel as pressured by those few who are. In addition to dispelling many of the myths, we taught the students refusal skills. Many teens are afraid of hurting someone's feelings or losing their boyfriend or girlfriend. This leads the teen into compromising what he or she really wants to do and they often give in to the pressure. We provided them with the skills necessary to effectively give a strong, clear refusal, yet at the same time communicate their feelings toward the other person."

"We used activities that led the teen to ask him or herself pertinent questions," said Ms. Sexton, "such as: 1. What are my moral and religious views about sex before marriage? Have I talked about my sex, and understand how pressuring me makes me feel? 5. Am I willing to take the risk of becoming or causing a pregnancy? What about the risk of sexually transmitted disease? What will happen if my parents find out?"

The Reducing the Risk program was conducted in the Biology classes at RCHS. Ryan Riddle, Health-Biology instructor at RCHS said, "The RTR classes have been effective and delivered in good taste in all my classes. My compliments to Ms. Sexton, the health department, and the school administration for carrying out a vital service for young people."

"I appreciate the input and cooperation of everyone involved in the success of this program," said Ms. Sexton, "the instructors whose classes RTR was taught in, Mr. Riddle, Ms. Cindy Witt, and Ms. Cash, were very helpful and I want them to know how much I appreciated their input. I also want to thank Mr. Cox, assistant principal at RCHS, and Youth Services for their help in getting the RTR program started. But most of all, I want to thank the students for their honesty and willingness to learn. I hope we have provided the teens with skills needed to make decisions they will feel good about tomorrow and in a month and in a year."

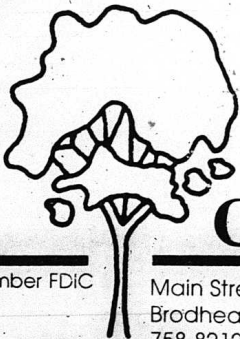

**'Easy Cheese Lasagna'**

Lasagne has long been a favorite for many Americans, but can take a great deal of time to prepare and can be loaded with fat. This recipe uses low-fat cheeses and is easy to make because all the ingredients are ready-to-use and you don't even have to pre-cook the noodles.

In this lasagne, mild-flavored, reduced-fat cottage and mozzarella cheeses are combined with full-flavored Parmesan resulting in a dish that not only tastes good, but is also good for you. Each serving is loaded with bone-building calcium and with only 27 percent of calories from fat.

This recipe yields 6 generous servings, each containing 425 calories, 28 grams protein, 425 milligrams calcium and only 13 grams fat (27 percent calories from fat). It can be made a day or two in advance, covered well, refrigerated and reheated in a conventional or microwave oven.

Leftovers freeze well, too. Browned ground beef can be added to the tomato and spaghetti sauces for a

meaty lasagne. The meat will add some fat to the dish.

- Ingredients:
- 1 can (15 ounces) tomato sauce
- 1 jar (14 ounces) spaghetti sauce
- 1 container (16 ounces) lowfat cottage cheese
- 12 cup crupd Parmesan cheese
- Butter for baking pan
- 9 lasagne noodles, uncooked
- 1 package (8 ounces) shredded reduced-fat mozzarella cheese
- 1. In a small bowl combine tomato and spaghetti sauces; set aside.
- 2. In another small bowl combine cottage and Parmesan cheeses; set aside.
- 3. Butter a 12x8 inch baking pan; line bottom with 3 uncooked lasagne noodles.
- 4. Cover with 1/3 of the sauce, 1/3 of the cottage cheese mixture and 1/3 of the mozzarella.
- 5. Repeat layering 2 more times with noodles, sauce and cheese.
- 6. Cover tightly with foil

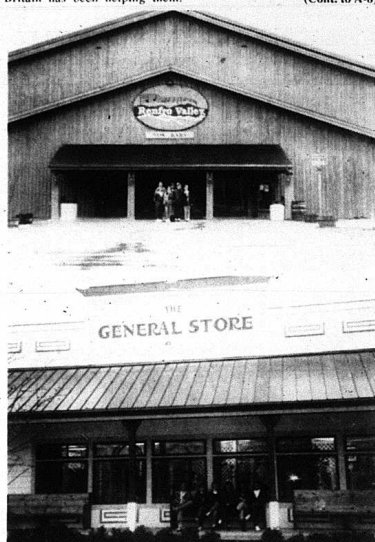
In some ways I feel like a coward not going to war, but some of the men had to stay behind and look after the women and children.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) is taking applications for the 1993 Wheat and Feed Grain programs now until April 30.

To qualify for target price protection and price support loans participants must reduce their acreage bases by at least 10 percent for corn, and 5 percent for grain sorghum. There is zero reduction for wheat, oats, and barley.

Target prices are as follows: Wheat \$4.60/bu, Corn \$2.75/bu, Grain sorghum \$2.61/bu, Barley \$2.36/bu, and Oats \$1.45/bu.

Estimated deficiency payment rates are: Wheat \$1.05, Corn \$0.72, Grain sorghum \$0.70, Barley \$0.52, and Oats \$0.15. Producers may request

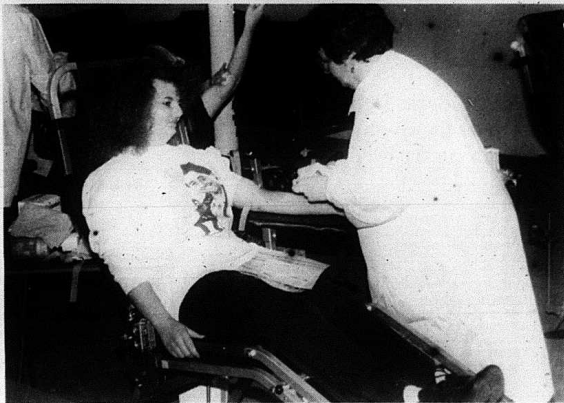

## Troubled families find hope at Family Life Services

A remarkable reunion took place in March.

Employees and families who have been associated with the Christian Appalachian Project's (CAP) Family Life Services program near Renfro Valley, for the past five years gathered to celebrate and reminisce about experiences and victories.

"They have always been there for me," recounts Alfredo Abney, a native of Rockcastle County.

It's a new life, a whole new ball game," for Reha Osborne.

Women with children, living in poverty, in abusive situations, or both, and wanting to find a way to leave and change the direction of their lives, but are fearful because they do not know how to make it on their own nor do they know where to turn for help.

"They came with no sense of self-esteem, no sense of self-worth," said Jo Roberts, a former Family Life Services staff person.

During the two years she worked for Family Life Services, participants strove for independence, and worked for life changing goals.

The Family Life Services program was started five years ago so women in impoverished, abusive situations could have a second chance.

Participants live in a highly structured residential environment which fosters independent living skills, teaches communication skills, and teaches them how to change self-destructive behavior and how to live in community.

When Abney arrived in April 1988, she was divorced, pregnant, and living with an uncle.

Abney wanted to continue her education, to improve her reading skills, to learn how to manage her money, and to find a home. She had her high school diploma and was working. Her physician recommended Family Life Services.

Family Life Services taught her how to love herself and discipline her life. The staff set up appointments for her with a baby doctor in Somerset and gave structure to her life by forming a daily schedule, which included chores around the residential facility, parenting skills classes, counseling, and training in budgeting.

Abney, who works at a restaurant in Mt. Vernon, remained at Family Life Services until her son, Cody, was born.

The support did not end then. The staff gave support during the two

years of Cody's illnesses and eventual death.

Osborne came to Family Life Services via CAP's Family Life Abuse Center.

For her the experience at Family Life Services was "like being born again. I found Jesus and met good people."

Osborne had been molested as a child, and was married to an abusive, alcoholic husband in another eastern Kentucky county.

I wanted to commit suicide," Osborne says.

Under a structured program tailored for her needs, Osborne learned to have respect for herself.

Sherry, a staff member, challenged her with the question: "How can you love others when you don't love yourself."

This mother of three girls is now working on her GED and working as a volunteer in CAP's Elderly Program.

Families stay an average of six months, according to Liz Phelps, manager of Family Life Services.

Although the program is highly structured, it is flexible to meet the needs of each participant. It may include budgeting, health care, child care, transportation, additional education, training in being a parent, abuse counseling, or supporting participants when they appear in court.

Job training was recently added to the program. This program includes testing for employable skills, instruction on how to prepare resumes and

## Cumberland Valley Economy to take a hit

tobacco-related wages and salaries in wholesale/retail trade and in manufacturing.

About 2,900 families in the Cumberland Valley Area are targets.

This number represents nearly as many paychecks as were provided last year in Kentucky by Reynolds Metal Co. and American Greetings Corp.

The actual targets are tobacco farms -- 2,909 of them in 1992 -- in Bell, Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Rockcastle, and Whitley counties.

If you don't raise tobacco and don't smoke cigarettes, however, why should farm numbers matter to you? Because among your region's 80,400 households, one in 33 earns some or all of its family income from tobacco farming.

And statewide in 1991, tobacco generated one in 16 jobs in farming, wholesale/retail, and manufacturing -- or 6.3 percent of the Commonwealth's total work force.

But the Cumberland Valley relies even more heavily on tobacco than farm numbers indicate, because laboring in the fields isn't the only way to earn money from the crop.

Tobacco's Broader Reach

In 1992, the region's eight counties were allotted 9,320 burley quotas to farmers who actually raise the crop.

Statewide last year, 147,299 burley quotas were in effect, or one for every 10 households in the Commonwealth.

Not only are farms and quotas being targeted in your region, so too are

Statewide in 1991, compensation from all of these sources totaled \$1.35 billion or 4.1 percent of all wages, salaries, and farm proprietors' incomes in the Commonwealth.

Since the bulk of that billion-plus came from tobacco auctions, other targets in your region's local economies are the annual warehouse sales.

In London, for example, 1992 burley auctions introduced \$18.57 million into the county's economy.

Compared to Laurel County's total, annual, spendable incomes for all its households -- which was \$428.3 million in 1992 -- London's burley sales brought \$1 of \$25 into the county.

Taking aim at these targets, of course, is Washington's tax to impose an additional \$2 excise tax on cigarettes.

Industry analysts expect the \$2-a-pack increase to reduce tobacco sales statewide by \$300 million a year.

That statewide loss equals over 16 years of incomes at 1992 levels for all its households -- which was \$428.3 million in 1992 -- London's burley sales brought \$1 of \$25 into the county.

Can these farmers -- your neighbors -- withstand such a blow?

And given your region's dependence on tobacco dollars, can any business?

The numbers argue no. So if excise taxes skyrocket, the impact will be sizeable. On everyone in the Cumberland Valley Area.

## April begins season of tornadoes in state

Spring in Kentucky brings two things -- April showers and the inevitable season of tornadoes.

Tornadoes have caused substantial property damage in Kentucky, as well as claiming many lives.

"We can do little to prevent a tornado from occurring," said Tom Priddy, Extension agricultural meteorologist at the University of Kentucky's college of agriculture. "However, there are ways of minimizing the chances of injury or even death."

Becoming more knowledgeable about tornadoes is one way to be prepared. A tornado watch, for example, means that tornado development is possible.

"During a tornado watch, keep an eye on the sky for threatening weather and stay tuned to the radio and television for weather bulletins," Priddy said.

A tornado warning is more serious because a tornado has been sighted or indicated by radar. Priddy suggests to seek shelter immediately during a tornado warning.

The best types of shelter during a

tornado include: storm cellars or pre-designed shelter areas, steel-framed or concrete reinforced underground excavations, basements, and interior hallways on lowest floors.

If these ideal types of shelters are not available, there are alternatives for protection.

If the building is not reinforced by steel or concrete, Priddy suggests to go to a nearby one that is, or take cover outside on low, protected ground. If there is not time to escape, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine.

"In homes, seek shelter under sturdy furniture, in the center part of a house, or in a small room (such as a closet or bathroom)," Priddy added.

There are specific rules to follow to insure safety:

Stay away from windows  
Stay out of auditoriums, gymnasiums, or other structures with wide free-span roofs.

Do not try to outrun a tornado.  
Avoid mobile homes, especially those not secured by cables anchored in concrete footing.

Move away from the tornado's path at right angles.

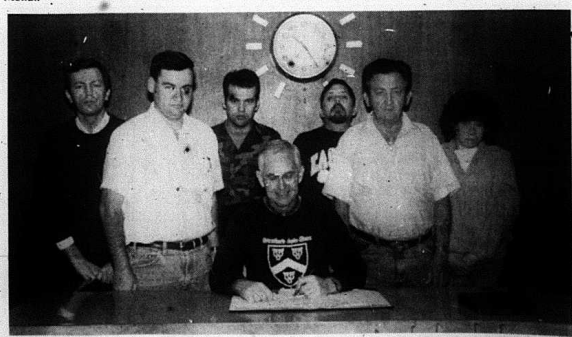
## April is Clean-Up Month

## Rogers introduces Legislation to repeal veterans co-payment for certain prescribed medicines

U.S. Rep. Harold "Hal" Rogers has introduced legislation to repeal the \$2 co-payment charged to veterans who need medication for non-service connected disabilities.

"For veterans who live on fixed incomes, the co-payment is an unfair charge that many cannot afford," Rogers said. "I have heard from veterans in Eastern Kentucky who are being forced to choose between buying groceries or medicine."

"The brave men and women who served our country so valiantly should not be forced to make such a choice," Rogers said.

The \$2 co-payment on 30-day supplies of outpatient medication prescribed for non-service connected disabilities was passed by Congress in 1990. Rogers has been fighting ever since to have the co-payment repealed.

"In the name of fairness, I believe that the co-payment should be repealed immediately," Rogers said. "Instead of requiring veterans on fixed incomes to bear the deficit reduction burden, our government should be living up to the commitments it has made to the former soldiers of this nation."

Land used as set aside acres must be land that has been devoted to a row crop (corn, peppers, burley, etc) one of the last five years, or have been used as set aside acres in one of the last five years. The cropping history of the fields used as set aside must be on file in the office by means of crop report.

Producers who participate in the program are required to file an ASCS-578, crop report to certify to the acres planted and used for set aside purposes. Crop reporting will be June 1 thru July 15.

In each part of the job training program, as is the whole approach of Family Life Services, helping the individual build self-esteem and positive motivation is an underlying foundation.

About 200 families, have used Family Life Services during the past five years to re-direct their lives, according to Phelps.

"We have had five families with two parents and children," she said. "There has even been a single dad with children."

The program is available to eligible families all of eastern Kentucky's counties.

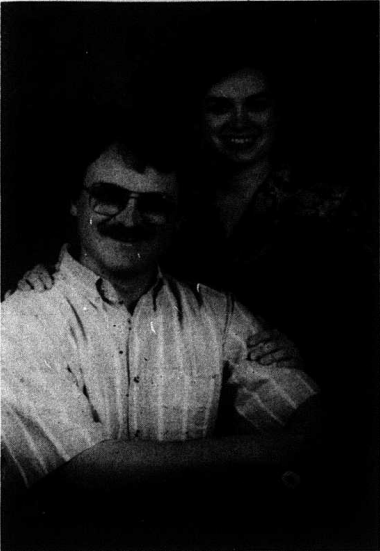

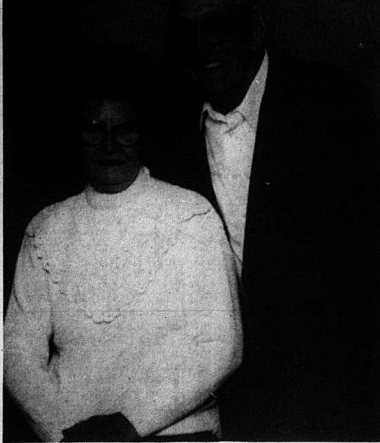

The grief for these two was shared by a family of loving kin so was not as hard to bear. I sincerely hope I have not depressed you dear readers by asking you to share my bitter cup of tea.

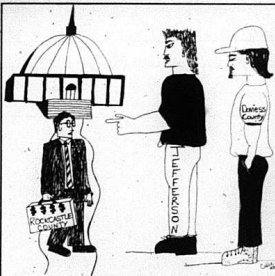
