## Rogers says tax would hurt

U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers and former Defense Secretary Richard Cheney made a series of stops in Southern and Central Kentucky yesterday.

At Lexington's Blue Grass Airport, Rogers, R-Somerset, expressed concern about the tobacco and cigarette tax and the energy tax proposed by the Clinton Administration.

Rogers said the taxes would devastate two of the state's biggest industries - tobacco and coal.

"We're doing all we can to fight them.... But at the moment, there are no concrete proposals that have been laid before us legislatively so we're skimming before the main battle."

Cheney said the United States should not send ground troops to Bosnia in the former Yugoslavia. He said, however, that the country should consider lifting the arms embargo to allow the Bosnian Muslims to acquire more weapons.

"That would, I think, have a positive effect in terms of slowing down Serbian aggression, but it would also send a strong signal to the Serbs," Cheney said.

Rogers and Cheney later appeared at the Somerset airport and at a Lincoln Club banquet at North Laurel High School in London.

## "What Saith the Scriptures"

In 1 Cor 6:9-11 he said, "Know Ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God? Be not deceived, neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind, nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God. And such were some of you: but ye are washed, but ye are sanctified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God."

Paul tells us in these verses that the unrighteous, unjust, shall not inherit the kingdom of God. He did not say, "might not," no, he said, "Shall not." You can not go to Heaven and be guilty of any of the above activities. Paul said not be deceived, or be not deluded, tricked. Do not be fooled about what he says. A lot of folks are being tricked and fooled on these matters. People are being deceived, thinking these kinds of things can be made right, by calling them other names or using a lot of vain words to convince people that they are acceptable in Heaven.

Let's look at a few examples: Fornication: people will say it's okay, if a couple "loves one another" or if they plan to get married. Not so, sex before marriage is sin. Adultery is called having an "affair," now a days. People are unscripturally divorcing the spouses and marrying another, but the Bible says if adultery, Mt. 19:9 Km. There are so many vain words that are spoken to justify unscriptural marriages. Homosexuals are called "gays" are just living an "alternate lifestyle". They claim they were born that way, but God said that they "got that way through lust, Rm. 1:26-28:

Drunkards are no longer responsible or guilty, for they have a "disease." The truth is, the only disease these people have is the disease of sin. Dear people, don't be tricked or fooled into thinking that you can live in such activities and go to Heaven. You can't. These are things that will send you to hell. But there is hope, you can be forgiven. Some of the Corinthians were guilty of these sins; but they were washed, justified, and sanctified by Jesus Christ. You can too, be forgiven, if you obey the gospel of Christ. Believe in Jesus Christ, 1 Cor. 15:1-4; Repent, Ac. 17:30; Confess your faith, Rm. 10:9-10 and be baptized, Ac. 2:38, Mk. 16:16; and live faithful unto death, Rev. 2:16.

Eric Smith and Jr. Smith won first place in the tournament with a 3 1/2 lb. crappie.

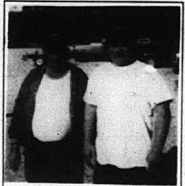

## Spring Crappie run coming on

Expert fishermen on Kentucky and Barkley lakes estimate the start of the spring crappie run in Kentucky is about two weeks away.

While anglers are already catching lots of fish, the true migration of crappie to shallow water spawning areas is running a little behind normal. Usually, spawning gets started right at the beginning of April, but weather conditions have kept water temperatures from warming as quickly as usual this spring.

Kentucky and Barkley lakes are two excellent choices for spring crap-

pie fishing, although numerous other reservoirs also offer good crappie. Anglers who can locate shoreline brush in the creeks and tributaries that feed the major lakes can usually connect with crappie all month long. Just before the spawn, submerged brushpiles, stump rows and drop-offs in water 5-15 feet deep often hold crappie. These spots are also productive when the spawn is completed.

Although dunking a minnow is the standby crappie-catching method, casting or vertically jigging artificial jig-and-twistertail combinations also work well. Anglers should experiment with different color jig heads and bodies to determine what the fish are most in the mood for on any given day. Tipping a lead head jig with a minnow and working it through the

cover is one other proven method, and during the spawn, often crappie will be taken in one to three feet of water.

In addition to crappie on the major lakes, Kentucky farm pond anglers are starting to find large mouth bass becoming active, too. April is a great time to throw a spinnerbait or small rattling crankbait for bass. Many fish will be very close to the bank during April, searching for warmer water, where it's not only more comfortable for the bass, but also attractive to baitfish.

Lastly, all anglers, including those fishing private ponds or lakes, should remember that size and creel limits apply to all Kentucky waters. And, that fishing on private land requires landowner consent.

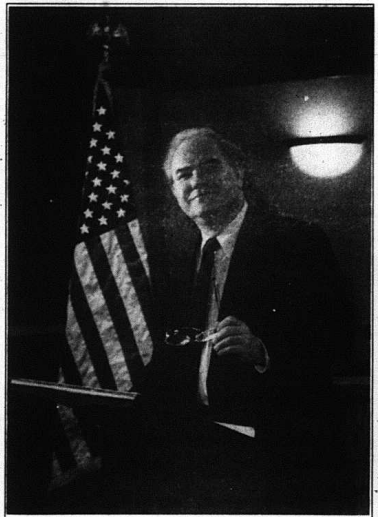

## Four men arrested Stolen parts found in Laurel Co.

Four men, including one from Rockcastle County were arrested last week in a London body shop and charged with receiving stolen property.

Carlos McClure, 28, of Mt. Vernon, James Frankie Hasty, 34, James Dale "Bo" Miller, 19, and William Dean Rader, 21, all of East Bernstadt were arrested by Kentucky State Police at a garage being rented by Hasty on Hopper Creek Road, eight miles south of London.

According to KSP public relations officer Gilbert Accardio, Jr., the arrests stemmed from a two year multi-county investigation by state police and F.B.I. agents.

Accardio said that parts of seven stolen trucks were recovered from the garage. All four men were lodged in the Laurel County jail. McClure has since made bond. McClure's father, Delno, who had indicated that he would be a deputy sheriff, if Clarence "Jib" Hasty was elected, has publicly announced that he will no longer serve in that capacity, if Hasty is elected.



A Mt. Vernon sixth grade student was injured Friday afternoon, after he walked into the path of a vehicle on West Main Street in Mt. Vernon. Tim Kirby, 14, of Mt. Vernon was trying to cross the road, at what has become known as "Malfunction Junction," where Williams Street and West Main come together. Kirby was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and later transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center. He was treated for a fractured pelvis and lacerations to the liver. The 16-year-old RCHS student that hit Kirby was traveling toward Mt. Vernon. Kirby has been released from the hospital.

## Hardee's plans to build here

A domino effect seems to be taking place on Interstate 75 at Renfro Valley.

That is if you are planning to build a new fast food restaurant. Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer announced this week that one Hardee's restaurant will open this summer on the property where the former Belly Acres Restaurant was located years ago.

The site is south of the I-75 bridge and across from the present Derby City South Truck Stop. Cromer said that he is not sure how long it will take to build the Hardee's or how many people will be employed. A firm from North Carolina will operate the new restaurant. The new Hardees will join a new McDonald's which is scheduled to open on Memorial Day. The McDonald's will be located on U.S. 25 at the former Red Top Restaurant site.

## School Board holds April meeting at Roundstone Elementary

A 2% increase in the 1992-93 salary schedule for certified employees was approved during the school board's regular monthly meeting, held at Roundstone Elementary.

The board was welcomed to Roundstone by Kathryn Howard, principal, who escorted the board members on a tour of the school.

Two upcoming special board meetings were approved - the first will be April 22 at 7 p.m. in the central office and will be dedicated to a discussion of the District's instructional programs. On May 20th, also at 7 p.m. at the central office, the board will meet for the purpose of reviewing and discussing with each school their respective School Transformation Plans.

Richard Bray, District School Business Administrator/Finance Officer, discussed with the board the procurement of an administrative and student management technology system to be used by the entire district in order to accommodate the immediate need.

Nine change orders for the new Rockcastle County High School construction project was approved by the board, on the recommendation of the architect and construction manager. The net effect of the change orders was a reduction in the cost of construction of \$136,243.40.

approved an application by RCHS and Harry Sparks Vocational School for a Kentucky Tech Prep Education Program.

reviewed policies to be voted on at the May meeting.

reviewed an updated District Organization Chart.

recognized that all staff positions in the Family Resource/Youth Services Center are classified employees.

reviewed the Superintendent's Personnel Actions Report since the last board meeting.

approved the 1993-94 school year calendar.

approved contracts with surrounding school districts for non-resident pupils for school year 1993-94.

approved the Bank of Mt. Vernon and Citizens Bank as board depositories for the period July 1, 1993 - June 30, 1995.

## Six-month-old dies Friday at UK hospital

A six-month-old Rockcastle County boy died Friday April 16, at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington, as a result of what doctors described as "shaken baby syndrome."

Buster Wayne Senters, of Mt. Vernon was admitted to the University of Kentucky Medical Center on February 12. At that time the child was suffering from massive head trauma, according to Kentucky State Police Detective Eddie Pierce who charged the infant's father with child abuse.

Paul Wayne Senters, 27, of Carter Drive, of Mt. Vernon, was later indicted on four counts of assault by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

The four separate charges involved Senters other two children as well as Buster Wayne. Senters has been ordered to stay away from his children pending court proceedings. No other charges have been filed against Senters at the present time. He is free on bond until his next court appearance which is May 14.

Buster Wayne was born, October 20, 1992. Besides his father, Buster Wayne is survived by his mother Billinia Mason Senters.

## Points East

Put me up to my knees in cold clear water on the lower end of Silver Creek with a bait can full of freshly shredded crawdads and I promise you I'll be there till dark if the bait doesn't run out. I'll hunker down somewhere in a thunderstorm blows in. I'll just go ahead and get wet if there's no thunder and lightning involved and I'll be fishing just as hard when I quit as when I started even if six or eight hours have gone by without so much as a nibble.

I have all the confidence in the world that I am at least as intelligent as your average smallmouth bass. And, if I can get a tender crawdad up under their noses, most of the time I can catch my supper. This time of year, however, it's sometimes difficult to find a smallmouth at home. So, I just make sure my bait gets into places where he oughta be. And sooner or later, he's gonna show up. In the meantime, the creek is covered, in its still spots, with the tiny, copper-colored husks that encased leaf buds and fell when it was time to turn green again. Sure, it would be nice to catch a fish in the middle of all this but it's not necessary. Far more important than catching fish is simply being in Silver Creek at this time of year. Fishing is the best excuse I can come up with unless I'm willing to answer a bunch of questions.

"Let me get this straight," Loretta would say. "You're going to go wade around in Silver Creek even though the water is still under 50 degrees and you're red out because the leaves are coming out. Why don't you just pull a chair up under the trees in the backyard. Honey, so you won't catch a cold and strow muddy clothes all

over my house and worry me so much?"

It would take me half a day to answer that and she still wouldn't believe me. But, going fishing is a different matter altogether. Wading the creek this time of year might look a little goofy, but, hey, they have to start buying sometime. It's self-explanatory.

"Loretta", I will yell. "I've gone fishing." And I never wait around to find out how she's going to reply. I've gone fishing and that's really all she needs to know. I do like to catch fish and I love to fry em up in bog lard hot enough to light a match on and we do that pretty often through summer and fall here on Fairview Ridge. But, nobody really expects you to come home with anything worth cleaning in April unless they like suckers. And suckers are real good to eat if you know how to fix em. I dig mine but you can fish after em with a hook and line if you want to. And that's all beside the point.

And the point is that people like me need desperately to be out among the stuff that is growing and coming to life again. To be on the creekbank when literally billions of leaves and sprouts are bursting into life is, to me, the ultimate witness of birth. It's an experience that I try to give myself at least a couple of times every spring. It's remarkable to me that, over the last 25 years, no two of those experiences have even been quite the same.

I used to go "dry land fishing" two or three times every spring. Looking for Morel Mushrooms in old growth forests. Morels, or Dry Land Fish or Cow Titties as they are sometimes called, are pretty common in stands

of poplar or where old orchards used to be and they are a delicacy in the same league as caviar except they taste better.

Loretta lets me go mushrooming once or twice every spring if she can go too. Rain or shine, we'll be going this week end even though we haven't found a morel in three years now. I made the mistake of letting some out-of-work folks know where I was finding mine and they've been beating me to them ever since. But it's supposed to rain on Thursday and stay warm the rest of the week end. Prime time for dry land fishing. And there we can talk William McClellan into taking us to a new patch of woods.

I bought one of those pre-potted Easter Lilies at Lowe's on Good Friday. It had four big buds just ready to blossom and I got it for three bucks or so. Two weeks ago, it would have cost ten dollars. But I brought it home and stuck it right in the middle of the kitchen table. I melted three or four of those little waterplant fertilizer sticks down in a cup of hot water, let the solution cool off and poured it into the pot. Then I added water till it was running out into the foil that the pot was wrapped in.

On Easter Sunday morning, two of the bulbs had blossomed into perfect flowers -- from globs of green vegetation into wonderful, unique, perfect, works of art in 48 hours. I will never cease to be amazed when I can be so close to that transition. I don't need to understand the biology and the botany in scientific terms. In fact, I don't want things to seem any more complicated than they already are. Let just want to see and smell and listen and be, if not part of, very near the very happening of spring.

"I'm perfectly happy with my understanding that putting seeds into proper soil will make them sprout and that, if I am diligent enough to keep the weeds down and perhaps water and fertilize a bit from time to time, I can eat vegetables and flowers to grow and blossom and bear fruit.

When I was growing up, I took all that for granted. It was simply something that had to be done to fend off starvation. Now it's probably less expensive to go to the produce stands or the canned good shelves and purchase vegetables than it is to grow them.

However, there is one obvious miracle at work in the grocery stores. The miracle is in the fact that a tiny seed can, in fewer than sixty days, be producing pounds and pounds of home-grown tomatoes.

As the song goes, "there's only two things that money can't buy and that's true love and home-grown tomatoes."

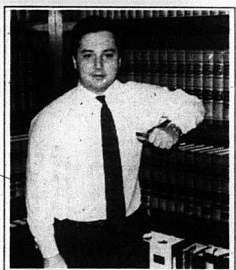

Afterwards, Moses went up to Mount Cyanide and came down with two tablets and the Ten Commandments.

David was a Hebrew king who killed Goliath and died of an arrow. Also, he was skilled at playing the harp. Several times he fought the Philistines, a race of people who lived in Biblical times and drove chariots. Delilah, a beautiful broad who did Samson in, was one of them. Solomon was a son of David and owned 500 hundred wives and 300 concubines.

The Greeks invented history. They had three kinds of columns --- Corinthian, Doric and Ionic. They also had myths. A myth is a female moth. One myth says that the mother of Achilles dipped him in the river Styx until he became invulnerable, except for his heel. Achilles appeared in Homer's *The Iliad*. ## Youth Yak Youth Services Center Update

The Rockcastle County Youth Services Center is currently involved in several projects that we would like to bring to the attention of those in the community. Some of these you may already be aware of and some are just beginning.

We are presently sponsoring a six week course in Western Line Dance that is being taught at the High School. The success of this program is obvious by the number of those attending which has averaged 115 each Monday night.

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month. This was a project that our STEP Club (Students Together Encouraging Peers) spent many hours working on. These students gave time and effort to advertise, cut ribbons, fold pamphlets or do whatever was needed to increase awareness of this problem in our county.

A Health Fair is scheduled for May 18 from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the RCHS gymnasium. Youth Services is sponsoring this along with the high school and the health educators. We are in the process of putting together some very interesting booths. The public is invited from 3 to 5 to take advantage of all the information that will be on hand. We are also combining this with a Youth Services Center Open House at our high school offices. We are pleased to be located in the high school and would like for everyone to stop by and become familiar with our program.

Currently in the planning stages is a project for high school students called Job Link. The idea is to link students with community adults who are in need of temporary help. These jobs could include lawn care, housework, car maintenance or any necessary work agreed on between the student and adult. Youth Services will compile a list of students willing to participate and adults will be able to call our office throughout the summer for referrals. This will be a great way for students to pick up some extra money without being tied to full time job.

These activities are only a small portion of those in which YSC is involved. Some other past and future projects in brief are: seat belt campaign in conjunction with FHA to promote seat belt use, Self-Defense Class taught by Mike and Matt Bryant, Baby Sitting program to provide student sitters for school functions and referral, development of RCHS courtyard for student use, sponsoring special speakers who encourage healthy lifestyles, i.e. Doug Flynn, Sandy Queen, Jeff Parret, continuing an active role in Champions Against Drugs, sponsoring a county beautification project which planted all those gorgeous flowers along the RCHS driveways, as well as many other programs, projects and activities.

For those of you who are still unfamiliar with the Youth Services Center and what we do, let me explain our program. We were created as a part of the Kentucky Education Reform Act. The intent of the center is to enhance students abilities to succeed in school by assisting youth and their families in meeting some of their basic needs. We link with existing agencies to help provide physical, emotional, and psychological care so that students and adults can function more effectively in their daily tasks. Many people cannot reach out for the help that they need and our attention and support can make the difference. We also coordinate and provide community services and community education, examples of which are listed at the beginning of this article. We serve grades 7 through 12 with our main office located within the high school as well as having offices across from the Board of Education in the old bus garage. We invite parents and community adults to come by or call and offer their services as volunteers. We want to have the most successful and effective program we can possibly have and encourage efforts to help make this happen. Our high school number is 256-4818 and our Board of Education number is 256-2156.

With material the students received from the sewing factory on their recent field trip, they are sewing the strips of material into a pillow. In computer lab, the students are working on stories for their portfolios.

Mrs. Hubbard's primary class has had a very busy week. They have written their own play which they will perform for the whole primary in May. Tryouts for parts will start sometime this week. They will also make their own props. The students are starting a unit on endangered animals. Mr. Pensol came Wednesday and showed them how to make picture on fabric of endangered animals. At the square they will be put together to make a banner. In lab the students are finishing up their portfolios. The students sent two share boxes this week. One to Iowa and one to Minnesota. They sent tobacco, rocks, leaf, books about Kentucky and various other items to their friends. On Friday, they received a share box from Minnesota. It contained wild brown rice, ag rocks, pheasant feather and pictures of the class and various places in Minnesota. In math, the students used the map to figure out how many miles from Kentucky to

## Farm and Home News

### Kentucky springtime and fertilizing laws

It is Kentucky's April awakening, and everyone is ready to fertilize their lawns. But, hold that nitrogen, springtime may not be the best time to fertilize a Kentucky lawn. The bulk of fertilizers on lawns of cool-season grasses should be applied during autumn months, not during springtime.

Leaves of cool-season grasses grow fast enough in the spring on their own. Any excess nitrogen fertilization during the springtime causes abundant leaf growth on grasses as well as summer weeds. Fertilizing in the spring can mean more mowing in the summer as well.

In addition, excess nitrogen can aggravate certain diseases, such as brown patch on tall fescue and leaf spot and melting out of Kentucky bluegrass. An acceptable amount is a light springtime application of not more than one-half pound of nitrogen per one-thousand square feet. This is 1 1/2 pounds ammonia nitrate per 1,000 sq. ft., almost too small an amount to spread. Most nitrogen fertilizer should be applied after Labor Day. The best time is late October up to Thanksgiving. Nitrogen applied in the fall strengthens fescue root systems without fertilizing weeds. Excess nitrogen leaches out over winter and doesn't cause excessive mowing.

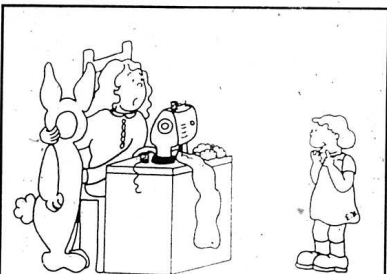

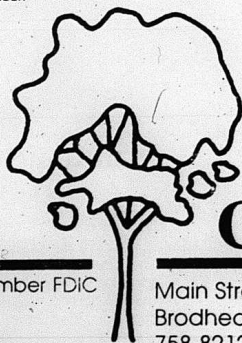

But the Rockcastle bats excelled in the third to regain the lead for the remainder of the game.

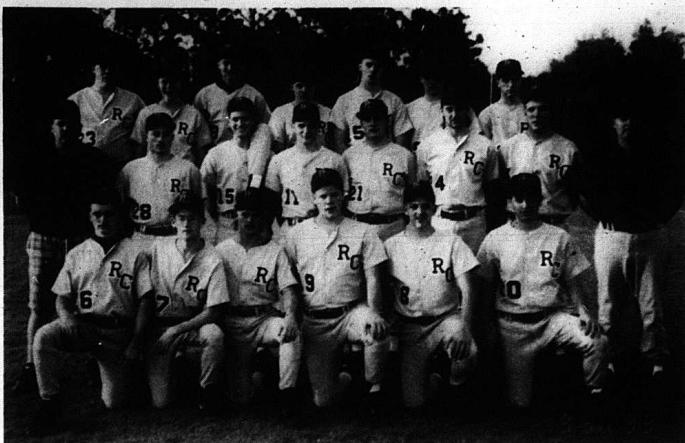

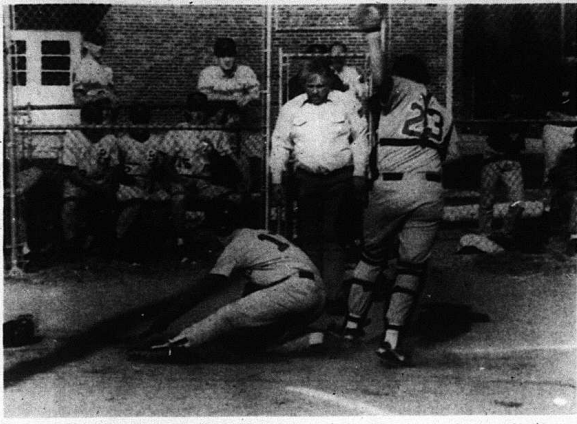
