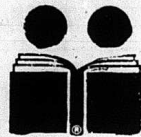

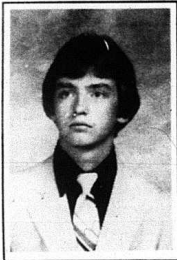

Four hurt in city limit collision

Four persons were treated and released at Rockcastle Hospital Friday after a two vehicle crash at the intersection of Richmond Street and US 150 in Mt. Vernon.

The van was struck on the driver's side and pushed against the embankment. The Jaws of Life was used to remove Bastin and his passengers, Ruth Stames, 60, of Middleburg, Neel Ellison, 63, of Eubank, and Geneva Dalton, 62, of Middleburg. Stames, Bastin, and Dalton were treated and released.

Harlow Neace's passengers, Ronnie Bullock, 11, and Renee Neace, 12, were not injured.

Assistant Police Chief Eddie DeLaney investigated the accident.

Audit says sheriff up to date

State Auditor Ben Chandler has released his audit of the financial statements of the Rockcastle County Sheriff. As Auditor of Public Accounts, Chandler is responsible for auditing the accounts and financial transactions of Kentucky's county governments and state agencies.

The Sheriff is responsible for collecting taxes related to real estate, personal property, bank stock, fire protection, and public service corporation property on behalf of the state, county, schools and special taxing districts.

The audit report states that the Sheriff's financial statements present fairly the taxes charged, credited and paid in conformity with the prescribed cash basis of accounting. The report further states that the Sheriff's financial statements, with respect to the items tested, comply with the applicable laws and regulations.

Growers get 3.4 cent increase

Burley tobacco growers will get the smallest average price support increase the formula allows -- 3.4 cents per pound -- for the 1993 crop. The formula used to set the support price indicated an average increase of 5.2 cents per pound, said Will Snell, Extension agricultural economist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

"However, the Secretary of Agriculture used his discretionary power to reduce the formula-based increase, by 35 percent."

"This minimum increase is a result of international and national factors in the tobacco industry," Snell said. "Internationally, we have an

excess supply of burley tobacco. Nationally, there is concern about the price competitiveness of U.S. tobacco and increasing pool stocks from the 1992 crop."

"The average price support will be \$1.683 per pound," he added. "The loan rates for individual grades will be made before the marketing season begins."

The price support is computed using a weighted formula that reflects changes in a five-year average of market prices and the previous crop's cost-of-production index. The five-year average increased six cents per pound. Last year's index of production costs was 3.7 cents per pound higher than in 1991, primarily as a result of higher labor, fertilizer and marketing costs.

The minimum price support increase, coupled with the 10-percent decrease in burley quota, will cut into

burley tobacco profits, according to Snell. Profits will be tight the next few years, he said. "Prices won't pull up the market. Farmers will have to cut costs to sustain profits in this type of marketing environment."

Tobacco farmers will have to pay two assessments again to market the 1993 crop.

The marketing assessment will increase just over two percent, to 1.683 cents per pound, according to Snell. This assessment, used to reduce the federal budget deficit, is shared equally by crop producers and purchasers.

The no-net-cost assessment covers the costs of grower-owned cooperatives, which buy tobacco that does not bring the support price. This assessment will be announced at a later date.

Snell said the tobacco program is the subject of much discussion. Quota changes, imports and price support adjustments are the primary areas under review.

Thief calls car owner

An accommodating thief called the owner of a Cadillac and told him his car was in the parking area at Dairy Queen in Mt. Vernon.

A 1985 Cadillac, belonging to Ernie M. Hill of Tonawanda, NY, was stolen earlier at Tonawanda.

Tonawanda police called city police at Mt. Vernon and asked them to check Dairy Queen's parking area for the car.

Sure enough, Officer Mike Peters found the car, undamaged. The owner drove it back to New York on Monday.

Berea College President to retire

John B. Stephenson, president of Berea College has said he will resign from the presidency July 31, 1994. Stephenson, 55, said he'd like to spend more time with his family and to write, despite rumors that he is resigning because of health reasons.

"We are very pleased to have a doctor the caliber of Dr. Cunningham, join our staff," Keene said.

Dr. Cunningham also has attended New York University, and was a College Professor at Southern Connecticut State University.

Dr. Cunningham has practiced medicine since 1981. He was Chief of Staff at the Monroe County Medical Center in Tompkinsville in 1987.

He and his wife, Sue, have four grown children and say they are looking forward to making a new home in Mt. Vernon.

Dr. Cunningham's office is located in the basement of the Rockcastle Hospital, where Dr. Carl Kesner's office was located. He will see patients Monday through Friday. Call 256-4525.

The 15 year veteran of the United States postal service has been a rural mail carrier and most recently was postmaster at Salyersville.

Culbertson said that longer hours and more accessibility to post office boxes are among the changes he has in store for the Mt. Vernon office. He and his wife plan to make their home in Berea.

Books close with 9,495 registered to vote in primary

So you plan on voting for your candidate in the May Primary - maybe, maybe not.

A check with County Clerk Norma Hook, shows that if you changed party affiliation between the November general election and the May Primary you are ineligible to vote in the May Primary.

New registrants are not affected. Also, everyone who changed parties, and there were lots of them, the ineligible problem was explained to them. Clerk Hook said, that is, if they came to her office for the change.

However, no one knows how many were registered elsewhere. Candidates can even sign up voters as well as the general public.

"In that case, we don't know if this was explained to them when they changed parties," Mrs. Hook said. Most who changed parties were Democrat to Republican, she reported, because they probably wanted to vote Republican in the May Primary.

"We have no final total of any kind," Clerk Hook said. "That must come from Frankfort. They make the list and send it to us. If they are ineligible to vote it will be noted on the computer printout we get."

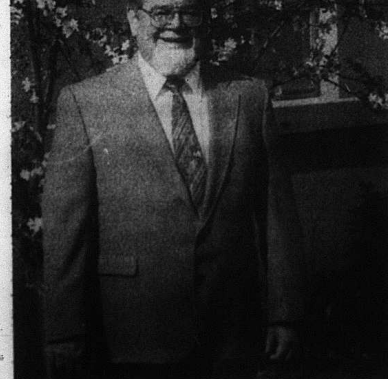
Mt. Vernon Police Chief Bill Mink, who was hospitalized after a mild heart attack is back home and doing well, city police reported.

He was treated at St. Joseph's Hospital in Lexington.

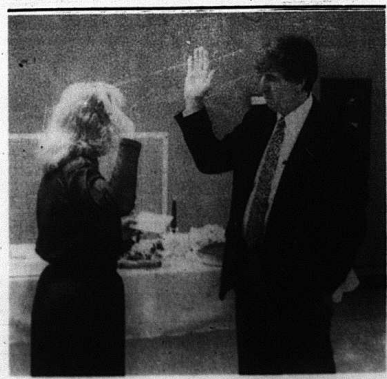

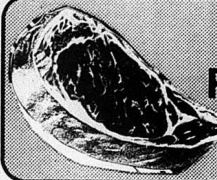

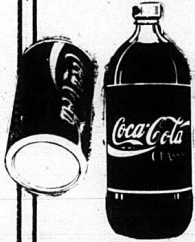

Grazing period closes June 1

The official grazing and haying period will close June 1, for acreage conservation reserve (ACR) and conservation uses (CU) acreage for payment including the required 8 percent, according to Harold Ballinger, CEO of the Rockcastle County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

He explained that cropland designated as ACR or CU for payment must have been devoted to a row crop, small grain, or another annually planted crop in one of the last five years, and must meet certain size and width requirements.

Fall-seeded crops may be reported at sign-up

When producers apply for the 1993 farm programs, Ballinger says they may report the acres and intended uses of their wheat, oats, barley, rye and their fall-seeded crops. The sign-up period ends April 30.

Fall-seeded crops which are not reported by May 15, will be ineligible for program benefits. Farm program participants are required to report their actual acres planted for harvest to be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and other program benefits.

Ballinger said producers who may be undecided about the 1993 programs, or who have questions about certifying their fall-seeded crops should contact the Rockcastle County ASCS office for more information.

Pre-Measure and be sure, ASCS says

To avoid unnecessary worry over the loss of 1993 farm program benefits, farmers may want to request pre-measurement of the acreage before planting, says Harold Ballinger, CED of Rockcastle County ASCS.

For a fee, ASCS will guarantee field sizes for the program year and help producers plan which fields to plant to various crops. The service consists of measuring, staking and referencing fields.

Farmers should never take a chance on losing program benefits by failing to comply with the acreage requirements," the ASCS official said.

In order to service pre-measurement requests on a timely basis, ASCS encourages farmers to apply early. Eligibility for participation in ASCS programs is open to all applicants as established under law without regard to age, color, gender, disability, marital status, national origin, race, religion or sex.

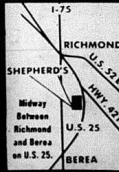

## Spring commencement is Saturday, May 8 at EKU

More than 2,100 students are expected to participate Saturday, May 8, in Eastern Kentucky University's 86th spring commencement ceremony.

The traditional commencement program will be held at 1:30 p.m. at Hanger Field.

EKU will recognize 810 students who completed degree requirements in December and 1,302 spring semester degree candidates. Of those, 143 are associate degree candidates, 1,009 bachelor's degree candidates, 143 master's degree candidates and seven specialist degree candidates.

"Completion of a university degree is a milestone in these young people's lives," said EKU President Hanly Funderburk. "We're proud of their accomplishments, and we encourage them throughout their careers to be strong advocates for higher education and the benefits it provides to them and society."

The commencement speaker will be Dr. John D. Rowlett, EKU vice president for academic affairs and research and dean of the faculties. Rowlett will retire June 30 after more than 42 years of service to Eastern.

James T. Gilbert of Berea, who chairs EKU's Board of Regents, announced that the University will grant to Rowlett an honorary doctor of laws degree during the afternoon ceremony.

Rowlett, a native of Denton, Texas, earned bachelor's and master's degrees in industrial arts from North Texas State College and a doctoral degree from the University of Illinois.

He came to EKU in 1951 as an instructor of Industrial Technology.

He has served as director of research (1963-65), dean of the School of Technology (1965-66) and the College of Applied Arts and Technology (1966-69), vice president for research and development (1969-73), and vice president for academic affairs and research (since 1972).

During Rowlett's tenure, Eastern grew from about 1,200 to nearly 17,000 students, the number of faculty increased from 89 to more than 600, and the physical plant expanded in value from about \$3.1 million to more than \$192 million.

EKU holds no normal commencement in December, so all December graduates are invited back to participate in the May graduation program.

## INSPECTION PERIOD

FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 3 through May 17, 1993. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 1993, assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1993 will be due about September 15, 1993.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours 8:00 AM and 4:00 P.M.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Taxation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

homerun, for six runs batted in to lead the Orioles over the As, 11-6. Teammate Josh Martin also added a long ball in the game.

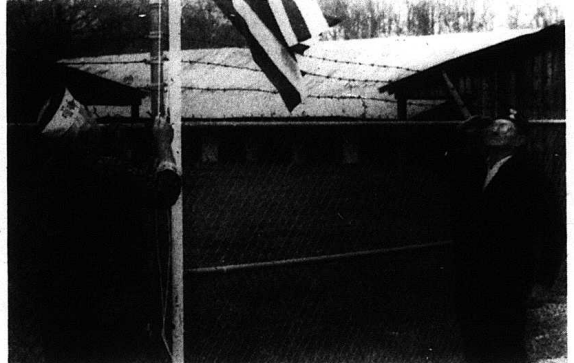
The White Sox defeated the Cubs, 11-1, to conclude Major League play Saturday. Jacob Burdette garnered the Cubs' only run with a homerun.

In Minor League action, the Reds and Cubs faced off in first game. Highlighted by a Jerome Wilson homer, the Reds won the game, 10-6.

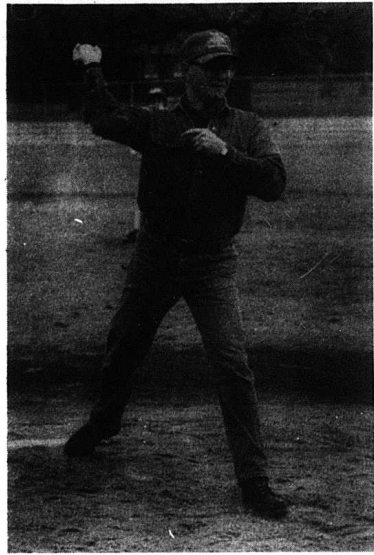
The final game of the day was called on a time limit ruling. It was the Yankees edging out the Angels, 20-17, in the year's first slug-fest.

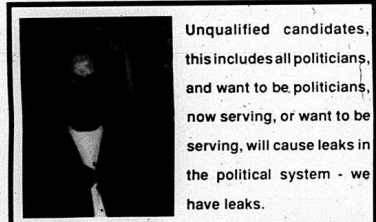

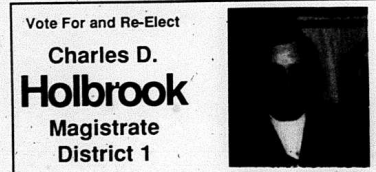

cleanup. "What's so important is getting local people to join us in protecting the river."

Jerry started RRR about two years ago and since that time, the group has worked to preserve the river and its wildlife. With the help of local people, they have been cleaning up existing dumps, thereby making immediate improvements in the river's health. Unfortunately, this can become an overwhelming task as new dumps appear almost daily, trashing restored sites almost as quickly as they are cleaned.

RRR's more long-term efforts are focused upon educating people in the region about the values of the river and the importance of keeping it clean.

Besides teaching people about the hazards of dumping, RRR is working to develop a renewed sense of pride and care for the river. It seems as though people will not stop trashing the river until they really begin to care for it as a part of their home, and care for those who share it with them. The Rockcastle meanders for 52.3 miles before it empties into Lake Cumberland, has 15.9 miles designated "Wild," and its designation as an "Outstanding Water Resource" pays tribute to how valuable it is to Kentucky and the nation.

RRR is also working to build bridges with other groups trying to preserve our river systems, such as

the Nature Conservancy. This is an important part of the changes necessary to produce long-term improvements in our rivers. In addition, RRR is co-sponsoring "River Day" on June 12 at ASP's Center in Livingston. This is an annual celebration of the River during which ASP invites people to tour their grounds and float on the river.

In his travels throughout the region, Jerry stresses the positive qualities of the river as much as he does the problems. Although many dumps exist so do many beautiful stretches, and Jerry knows that the trashed sections can regain their previous qualities if people work together to care for the river. He sees increased enforcement of anti-dumping laws as

a major aid to his efforts. Even more important though, is a commitment of positive support from local communities and the State government, as well. Last year \$13 million and the National Guard were used for a cleanup along the Kentucky River, and hopefully similar resources will be made available in the future for the improvement of other rivers in Kentucky. Jerry hopes that RRR's efforts spread to other damaged watersheds in Kentucky because he has seen the Rockcastle's troubles repeated in many other places. He is also working to get more funding from State agencies for struggling community groups like RRR committed to improving the quality of life in their region.

Mrs. Mary Gregory came and shared what she had learned about Japan. Ms. Gregory brought in a Kimmi, chopsticks and many other

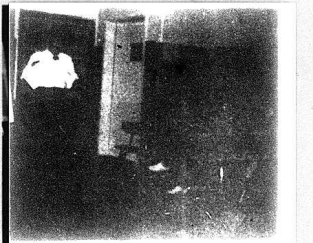
items for the children to see.

The purpose of the meeting was to begin nominations for the S.B.D.M. Council. The R.C.H.S.P.O. is responsible for placing three parents on the council through an election.

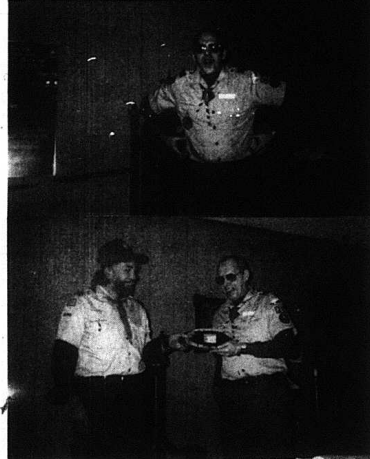
