State says Livingston audit shows shortages



Patients that benefit from the WHAS medical van and two nurses, Sharon McFerron and Edna Harper stand proudly beside the van that is used by the local hospital to transfer patients. Proceeds from last year's road block helped buy the van. This year's road block to raise money for WHAS crusade for Children is May 29-May 30 at the junction of Hwy. 461 and Hwy. 150.

State Auditor Ben Chandler called on the City of Livingston to explain discrepancies in financial records for the city from July 1, 1991 to Dec. 31, 1992 and pointed a finger at former city clerk Sheila Flannery.

Chandler's report questions over \$4,000 in city checks written by former city clerk Sheila Flannery payable to herself or to her husband, James, the former water superintendent.

"Most of the questioned checks did not match the information recorded on the corresponding check stub, and involve either an overpayment of salary by several hundred dollars per pay period or purported reimbursement for expenses," said Chandler.

The available city records contained no documentation authorizing the questioned amounts, Chandler said. "Apparently the former city clerk whose responsibilities included paying city bills and payroll, added about \$200 to her paychecks," he noted.

Chandler's report also found that the deposit slips for city bank accounts did not include any "cash" deposits during the eight months that

the former city clerk handled the city's finances.

The report showed that Livingston bank accounts had received an average of \$450 a month in cash deposits during the seven months before, and three months after, the former city clerk handled the city's finances.

"I find it hard to believe that not one resident of the City of Livingston paid his or her bill in cash during the tenure of the former city clerk," Chandler said, "especially since the city recorded cash receipts before and after the former city clerk worked there and our auditors witnessed residents paying bills in cash during their examination in the city office."

The financial transactions of the City of Livingston for the eighteen month period had to be reconstructed by auditors because most city records for the period under review were missing from the city office.

Copies of the city's checks and deposit slips had to be obtained from the Bank of Mt. Vernon.

"Our auditors had a difficult job checking the city's receipts and expenses without most of the city rec-

ords," Chandler said. "Fortunately, the city's check stubs for the period under review, which were found to be inconsistent with the actual checks written in many cases, were discovered to be still within the city office," he said.

"It appears that as much as \$8,000 in city tax money is unaccounted for."

"The taxpayers of Livingston should receive the highest level of city services for their tax dollars, and they deserve to know whether they have been cheated out of approximately \$8,000," Chandler said. "City officials must be held responsible and accountable for the tax money entrusted to them," he said. Chandler's report has been forwarded to the Rockcastle County Attorney's office for appropriate action.

Sheila Flannery was the city clerk of Livingston from Feb. 1, 1992 through Oct. 9, 1992. As city clerk, Mrs. Flannery was responsible for administering the financial transactions of the City of Livingston and maintaining proper financial records. Mrs. Flannery's employment as city clerk was terminated by the City Commission on Oct. 9, 1992.

County budget down from last fiscal year

A proposed county budget of \$1,658,128 for 1993-94 fiscal year was handed to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court last week for review.

The budget is down slightly from last year's budget of \$1,690,524 or \$32,396 less.

The decrease in appropriations is due to one bridge scheduled to be built this year. Last year two bridges were constructed.

Revenues equal appropriations at \$1,658,128 which is mandated by law.

When the court has a first reading of the budget, it goes to the state for review then is returned to the court for a final reading. The process must be completed at the beginning of the fiscal year July 1.

Most money in the new budget is earmarked for the road fund. Roads will get \$418,628. Debt service is \$85,750, general government is \$105,242, capital projects, \$42,713, and \$18,000 for magistrates expenses for a total of \$670,331.

Next big appropriation is \$478,446 for the jail fund. It lists \$254,880 for protection of persons and property and \$223,566 for administration which includes salaries.

The general fund makes up the next big appropriation. It shows general government, \$252,737; protection to persons and property, \$25,757; general health and sanitation, \$23,957; social services, \$3,000; recreation and culture, \$19,202 and

administration, \$78,100 for a total of \$478,446.

Local government economic assistance fund show appropriation of \$60,250. It breaks down as general government, \$8,893; protection to persons and property, \$500; general health and sanitation, \$2,500; social services, \$1,357; roads, \$47,000.

Economic development fund shows \$3,538 for general government; \$21,600 for debt service and a surplus carried over of \$15,110 for a total of \$40,248.

Last is the Forestry Fund which shows forest fire protection (to Forest Service) \$2,600 and a carry-over surplus of \$53,500 for a total of \$56,100.

Renfro fails to post performance bond in entertainment tax suit

Renfro Valley Folks has filed to post a bond as required in their suit against the city in an entertainment tax dispute.

A ruling in Circuit Court by Judge William T. Cain on January 8 favored Mt. Vernon. Renfro appealed.

Mayor Gary R. Cromer told the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night the city asked Renfro to post a "reasonable" bond pending the ruling by the Kentucky Court of Appeals on its suit.

Since they had not done so, then the city's attorney John Clontz, has prepared a citation bringing Renfro into court where a date will be set for further action.

Mayor Cromer told the council a contract had been signed between the city and Western Water Association to furnish city water for the district.

Mt. Vernon will furnish a 5 million gallon monthly purchase agreement at \$1.07 for 1,000 gallons. The contract also set rules to figure future rate increases without redoing the city/association contract annually.

The council gave a first reading of an amendment to an ordinance setting a \$200 fee and permit when development property in the city is involved (subdivisions).

The \$200 fee calls for inspections of various phases of construction of water and sewer systems. Further cost over the \$200 fee will be passed along to the developer.

The city voted to continue its connection with the Job Training Tom McCracken of the Rockcastle Coon Club appeared before the council and reported considerable work had been done on the club house at Lake Linville.

He asked the council to help with the cost of work by reducing rent payments.

The council agreed if the club would present receipts for the work

Partnership Act through Cumberland Valley Area Development District.

JTPA funds expended in Rockcastle shows \$473,912 for classroom training; \$208,135 for on-the-job training; \$705,983 for the summer youth program, totaling \$1,388,031.

The city voted to buy a new police cruiser for \$9,500 with money through area development funds.

The council also voted to allow the club to develop a parking area at the west side of the club house.

McCracken told the council that the club often held hunts for charitable causes including persons burned out, deaths and other causes.

The April police and fire report showed 287 complaints, 49 arrests, 7 motorist assists, 21 traffic accident investigations, 21 citations, 6 cases opened and 37 charges.

The Mt. Vernon Fire Department made 24 runs. Livingston Fire Department did not report runs. If any,

Logging could come to halt in Daniel Boone Forest

There's good news and bad--good if you're an environmentalist, bad if you're a logger.

The U.S. Forest Service is considering a halt to logging in Kentucky's Daniel Boone National Forest.

The reason: Logging costs the government more than it makes, according to a story in Sunday's Lexington Herald-Leader.

A memorandum from Forest Service Chief Dale Robertson to regional foresters proposes stopping logging in 62 of the 120 national forests that have timber sales.

Marie Walker, a public affairs specialist for the Daniel Boone, said the list is tentative -- one of several plans being considered to meet requirements laid out in President Clinton's proposed budget.

The Forest Service is working to phase out below-cost sales in four years, but there is no final below-cost policy," she said.

The proposal brought a sharp response yesterday from the timber industry.

"There's no question it's going to put people out of business," said Bob

Asher of Begley Lumber Co. in Hyden, a town in Leslie County.

A portion of the money from timber sales goes to county governments. McClary County, where 75 percent of the land is owned by the federal government, received \$133,704 last year through such sales. Rockcastle received \$11,922 this year from the forest business.

That was enough to pay for the county jail and half the ambulance service, McClary County Judge

Debate: Mullins vs. Carloftis

Questions concerning roads, indebtedness, jobs and the possibility that the magistrates have lost their power, were asked and answered during a candidates' forum Tuesday.

About 20 candidates and 225 people turned out for the debate between Rockcastle County incumbent Judge Executive Roland Mullens and challenger Buzz Carlottis. The debate was held at the Mt. Vernon Elementary School and sponsored by the Mt. Vernon Signal.

Challenger Buzz Carlottis raised many questions about incumbent Roland Mullins' ability to run county

government and he also questioned some of the advertising that Mullins has done during the campaign, hammering the hardest at the 1,700 new jobs that Mullins says has been created during his term.

However Mullins responded to each question with statistics and facts and in the end asked his challenger what qualifications he actually had to run county government.

Mullins told the crowd that the state sets down the laws that he must govern by and that the magistrates have the same power they have had all along. "They have certain powers

and responsibilities and the county judge has certain powers and responsibilities. These are all laid down by the state," he said.

As for the road question, Mullins quoted Kentucky Department of Labor statistics as a basis for his advertising and defending animatedly his advertising that unemployment during the last year has stayed around 4 percent.

The debate was originally set up to have a question and answer format, but during opening remarks both candidates strayed from the format

Fiscal Court approves bridge

An apparent low bid of \$33,717 by N&N Construction Co. of Mt. Vernon was the lowest of four bids for a new Conway/Copper Creek bridge.

The bids were approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday.

The other bids were Lincoln County Redi-Mix of Stanford for \$41,240; Bluegrass Contracting of Lexington, \$45,321 and Strict Con-

tracting of Lexington for \$48,435.

The bids will be examined and finally approved at a later meeting.

When work on the bridge is to begin was not revealed.

The court received the county cooperative extension service budget for 1993-94.

It shows anticipated expenditures at \$75,807 and income at \$75,807. A breakdown of income shows

\$54,805 from a district tax, a carry-over of \$20,000 and interest of \$1,000.

The court left up to the circuit judge a decision on a road controversy on Kincaid Bridge.

Lester Bullock closed a road, keep out 4-wheelers and other vehicles through his wildlife sanctuary, by putting a cable and a pile of dirt across the road.

This modern brick home of the Clarks was a better dwelling than the old two story buildings where the Phillips lived.

On this day, I knocked on the back door, one of the daughters invited me in. I had talked to Catherine and asked permission to visit them so she was expecting me.

It was of the old Sexton house that I had seen in Climax the reason I had come down. I told her and also talk of her family.

Catherine had had a bad fall and had to be on a walker until she got better.

The Postal Department decided to close all small post offices. Now the folks get their mail on a rural route from Mt. Vernon.

Tuesday morning I had to go to the Signal office early about my column. When I walked in to the front office, Sara and Krista were doing business with some man.

When Sara called my name, he turned to me and then held out his hand saying, "Hello, I'm running for county judge. My name is Buzz Carlotius."

I wasn't paying much attention to him until I heard the word "Carlotius" and then I turned to see a smiling, handsome man!

"Oh, no, I didn't think I would ever see you when I wrote about you being such a handsome candidate!"

I bent over on the counter, so embarrassed I could hardly look up. Sara and Krista were laughing so hard and were having a ball seeing my trouble.

"Oh, that was fine with me," said Carlotius and I saw deep brown eyes laughing at me.

Executive Jimmie W. Greene said, "Man, oh, man, I don't know what we'd do here if they did that to us," Greene said.

Ben Ross, executive director of East Kentucky Corp., said 8 percent to 9 percent of Kentucky's timber is on public land. If timber sales are losing money, he said, the government should find a way to make them profitable instead of eliminating them.

Logging loses money because it often costs the Forest Service more to prepare a tract for sale than the lumber brings.

Steps taken to protect the environment, such as searching for endangered species before logging, can drive up the costs, Robertson said in his memo.

Environmental groups have waged a continuing battle with the Forest Service about below-cost timber sales.

The Wilderness Society, which opposes below-cost sales, said the Forest Service lost \$300 million on 101 forests last year.

By the Forest Service's accounting, the 38 million board feet of lumber cut on the Daniel Boone brought in \$2.16 million, but the timber program cost \$2.96 million to operate.

Of the money brought in, \$646,000 went to county government.

The Wilderness Society says losses are actually greater but are hidden by the way the Forest Service handles accounting.

The Daniel Boone has a committee looking at ways to improve efficiency and cut costs, said Beth Merz, assistant district ranger at the Morehead district. The committee's work is too preliminary to discuss publicly, she said.

Robertson's memo, first reported in The New York Times recently divided the 62 forests into four groups according to "negative net revenues" for each million board feet of lumber cut. Those losing the most money would end timber sales soonest.

The Daniel Boone was in the third group. That means, if the plan were put into effect, the forest would reduce timber sales by 10 percent in fiscal year 1994 (which begins Oct. 1 of this year). Sales would be cut 25 percent in 1995 and eliminated in 1996.

Wilderness Society spokesman Richard Hoppe said he suspects the memo was leaked as a "setup by the Forest Service to create a backlash" against the Clinton administration's plan to end below-cost sales.

"They're putting this out with the idea that it will be shot to hell, and that's pretty much what's happening," he said.

This is the first time for this type of exhibition but I know we do have a lot of people that are interested in

handicrafts so I think you will enjoy seeing the different kinds of crafts that some of our local people make. There may be some items for sale and orders may be placed for others.

Those of you that did not visit the library and see the Art Show certainly missed seeing some fine art work. We had some new exhibitors this year and their work was excellent. All of the paintings were very good and our patrons and visitors have expressed their appreciation for the beautiful work that you have done. The Library Board and I wish to thank all of the artists for allowing us to display your art work.

I, along with five other librarians from this region and four librarians from the Pennyrile region, attended a Director's Retreat at Lake Cumberland State Park last week. The two regional librarians were also present. Susan Smith presented a lesson on

Developing Your Professionalism and Pamela Kalbfleisch's program was on Coaching and Developing Employees. Both of these were very informative but, for me the informal period of sharing ideas and problems was the most valuable. Everyone has problems at one time or another and we all found our problems were not unique but with input from different librarians, we found some answers. Also different types of programs that librarians have were discussed and some of these ideas I am hoping to use here in our library at a later date.

One of the things that was discussed was the KET Satellite. Several of the librarians said that this was used quite frequently. I'm sorry to say that ours has not been used very much. Maybe I have not publicized this enough and you were not aware of this service. Many programs are available for college credit and

others for specialized information and professional development. For example, KET Star Channels will deliver an important teleconference "Math Basics" at 4 p.m. on May 18th. This national teleconference is designed to help adult educators use KET's new adult math series, more effectively. This series is for adults with only rudimentary math skills and is designed to move them toward a level which will enable them, if they choose, to begin GED study.

Some other seminars and programs that are scheduled for May and June are: Real Estate Training, KERA Notebook, Food Safety for Senior and Day Care Homes, Workplace Literacy, Bringing Integrated curriculum into the Elementary Classroom and Kentucky's Story. The schedule for May and June is posted in the library. Please come in and allow us to help you with this service.

We have just recently received 32 new books from the Department of Libraries. Eleven of these are non-

fiction and the others are juvenile fiction and non-fiction.

Some new novels we have purchased are: *I'll Be Seeing You* by Mary Higgins Clark...Meaghan Collins, a television news reporter, is covering a story in the emergency room of a large metropolitan hospital when a young woman is rushed in on a stretcher, victim of a stabbing. Meaghan stares down at the dead Jane Doe. What she sees in that terrible moment begins a chain of discovery that exposes the secret lives of the people closest to her.

That fateful night in the emergency room sets Meghan off on a path of deceit and death involving her missing father, the stabbing victim, and the Manning Clinic and does not end until she comes face to face with the truths that may cost her her life. 

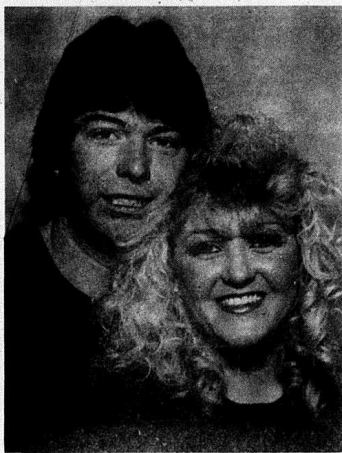

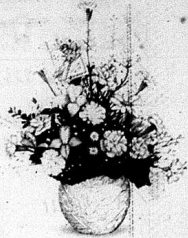

R-TEC may go into Somerset

A Mt. Vernon based company is studying the feasibility of providing mass transit from three McCreary County communities to Somerset for

workers and students. Rural Transit Enterprises Coordinated Inc. (R-TEC) is conducting a community survey in McCreary

County to determine the demand for the service, according to a recent story in Pulaski Week.

Tentative plans include three pickup points, Pine Knot, Whitley City and Parkers Lake, to meet work shifts in Somerset that begin 7 a.m. and 8 a.m.

"There seems to be a lot of things out there for the unemployed" R-TEC representative Mike Reed said. "Here's something for the working man."

McCreary County Judge-Executive Jimmie Greene said he supports the program.

"We feel it's a good thing," he said. "It will save gas, cut down on pollution problems. We have a great

number of our residents that commute daily. This is the element out there we're trying to reach."

A survey was published in last week's edition of The McCreary


County Record. Greene said there have been "a couple" of inquiries, but no completed form returned yet.

Current plans call for R-TEC to provide vehicles and be responsible for fuel and maintenance costs. The company will also provide drivers.

Greene said if the program is successful, the project could be expanded to include several daily trips to Somerset, for shopping or medical purposes.

Reed said his company will consider similar services in other rural counties, if the project is successful.



"What Saith the Scriptures"

With gardening season upon us, I thought it might be timely for us to consider Gods Law of harvest in Gal. 6:7-10. Let's look at the passage. "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for what soever a man soweth, that shall he also reap. For he that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; and he that soweth to the spirit shall of the spirit reap life everlasting. And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap if we faint not. As we have therefore opportunity, let us do good unto all men, especially unto them who are of the household of faith."

My grandparents are Fannie Holbrook of Brodhead and the late John H. Holbrook and the late Jim and Becky Burdette of Brindle Ridge. I am a member of the Brindle Ridge Baptist Church. Born and raised on the farm, I learned early on the value of honest hard work.

QUALIFICATIONS
I am a 1980 graduate of Rockcastle County High School, a graduate of Cumberland College and Chase College of Law in Northern Kentucky. I worked my way through college and law school and began working in the Department of Local Government's Kentucky Municipal Law Center in 1988. While there, I worked on issues and problems facing local governments, such as our own county government. I then began working at the law firm of Farmer, Keller & Kelly in London where I gained valuable experience working in the District, Circuit and Federal Courts. DUTIES OF THE COUNTY ATTORNEY

However, the responsibilities of the County Attorney can influence felony cases, such as murder, rape, robbery and other matters that could end up in Circuit Court. Many cases require the County Attorney to write warrants and prepare complaints. After arrests for either a misdemeanor or

felony, many cases are brought into District Court for the setting of bonds and reductions of bond. In Rockcastle, the County Attorney many times represents the citizens at the Preliminary Hearing which is a crucial stage in the case. If then, at this hearing, the County Attorney cannot carry the burden of proof through witnesses and the proper introduction of evidence, the case can be dismissed.

I WANT TO IMPROVE OPERATIONS OF THE COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE
Politics as usual can never solve the problems that face our District Court system. We have seen and heard it all before and it's time for good, honest hard work for a change. Cases should not be dealt with by a certain formula, but should be evaluated on the facts. The County Attorney's office should take the responsibility and care to write warrants correctly. The citizens, as well as law enforcement should be able to find their County Attorney when the need arises. Cases should be fully prepared with necessary witnesses subpoenaed and presented properly before the jury. (The last District Court jury conviction was March, 1992). Many times cases are disposed of through plea bargains and it must be a priority that the penalty fits the crime. There shouldn't be a need for out-of-county prosecutors to come into our county to dispose of backed up bases, that's the job of your elected County Attorney. The County Attorney should be actively involved in Juvenile Court, and take care to instill a sense of responsibility in those that are before the Court. Furthermore, the County Attorney should give up to date, competent, reliable legal advice to the Fiscal Court. My plans to improve the services to the citizens, to have more effective and efficient prosecutions and to increase collections of delinquent taxes and child support, at legal salary levels, will create a County Attorney's office of which you can be proud.

LET'S WORK TOGETHER FOR OUR COUNTY'S FUTURE

Folks, I am sincere in my commitment to create a better County Court system. All of our citizens, from all parts of this county, deserve a full-time County Attorney who cares deeply about seeing that justice is done. Josh Hale takes first place Six students win poster/essay contests

Six young Kentuckians from across the state, including one from Rockcastle Co., showed they had the winning touch in the 1992 "Color Me Beautiful" poster and "Everybody's Alike" essay contests, sponsored by the Kentucky Developmental Disabilities Planning Council (KDDP). Entries by students from Mt. Vernon, Adairville, Ashland, Carlisle and Inez were selected for the six first-place awards. A total of 162 posters from 31 counties and 502 essays from 21 counties were submitted.

The annual art contest for children in grades one through six and writing contest for grades seven through 12 are conducted to help Kentucky's youth better understand people with disabilities and the problems they may face. First place winners and their parents, teachers and principals were honored April 19 at an awards luncheon at the Holiday Inn Hotel in Frankfort.

First-place poster winner from Mt. Vernon was Josh Hale, primary grade at Mt. Vernon Elementary School, son of John and Nancy Hale.

Two students from Adairville School, Drew Dodson and Kimi French, fourth and fifth grader, respectively, placed second and third. Josh's winning poster was based on the first and second grade theme of "The Wonderful World Where Everyone is Different."

Many of the students drew from their experiences with other students, family members and friends who have disabilities. Some observed physical and attitude problems in their schools

and society that limit the access people with disabilities encounter and tried to come up with possible solutions," said Prudence Reilly, executive director of the KDDP. Council.
It may have been the first time many of these students seriously considered the challenges people with disabilities face and that helps open their eyes and change their attitudes. For those students, that's the real reward in participating in these contests.

In addition to the luncheon, poster winners received \$250 and a trophy. The winners' schools also received \$100. Winning posters will be displayed at various events throughout the state including the Kentucky State Fair. Artwork from a poster will be used for pamphlets.

Wheat and Barley Crop certifications due

On April 30, ASCS closed the 1993 farm program sign-up period.

Producers who enrolled in the wheat and feed grain programs should now prepare to certify their program areas, ASCS official Harold Ballinger said.

Rockcastle County farmers have until May 15, to report the acreage and intended use of their wheat, oats, barley, rye and other small grains that are not reported by this deadline will be ineligible for program benefits.

Before reporting, farmers can request that ASCS measure their program acreage. The measurements are furnished at cost, and guaranteed for the crop year. "Measurement

service is not only valuable to farm program participants, but to any producer who desires an accurate acreage for any reason," Ballinger said.

Farm program participants are required to correctly certify their entire farm after planting to be eligible for price support loans, deficiency payments and other benefits. The reports contain crops and acreage planted, the uses to be made of these crops, acreage removed from crop production to the acreage conservation reserve, and conservation use acres for pay.

Producers who have not certified their fall-seeded crops are urged to do so before the May 15 deadline, ASCS official Ballinger said.

Babbage discusses absentee voting

There are several circumstances which will permit Rockcastle Countians to use an absentee ballot to vote in the May 23 primary election, according to Secretary of State Bob Babbage.

An absentee ballot may be used when the voter will be absent from the county on election day and the ballot is to be mailed to an address outside of the county.

Voters who work out of town and whose work hours will not permit voting the ballot in the clerk's office during normal working hours may apply for and use an absentee ballot.

When the voter will be absent from the county on election day but not for the reasons noted in the other two situations, the voter can vote the ballot in the county clerk's office up until the day before the election. Voters in this circumstance must still make application for an absentee ballot at least seven days before the election.

Recent changes in the laws regulating the use of absentee ballot have been expanded to allow any qualified voter who finds, within the last seven days before the election, that they will be unexpectedly absent from the county on election day may apply for and vote on an absentee ballot as late as the day before the election.

Persons using the emergency absentee ballot are allowed to vote the ballot in the county clerk's office up to the close of business the day before the election.

Disabled voters, who are unable to go to the polls due to age, infirmity or illness, may vote using an absentee ballot.

The 1992 changes in the law included medical emergencies. Now, if a voter, due to a medical emergency, which occurs after the normal deadline for an application for an absentee ballot, finds that they will be unable to vote in person at the polls on election day, may use a special application to obtain an absentee ballot.

The voter's signature must be notarized on this ballot and it is the only one which can be voted on election day. It must be in the county clerk's office by no later than 6 p.m., local time on election day.

Kentuckians who are members of the armed forces or their dependents and those who are working overseas may apply for an absentee ballot by means of the federal post-card application.

Also, election officers who are assigned to work outside their own precinct are permitted to vote by

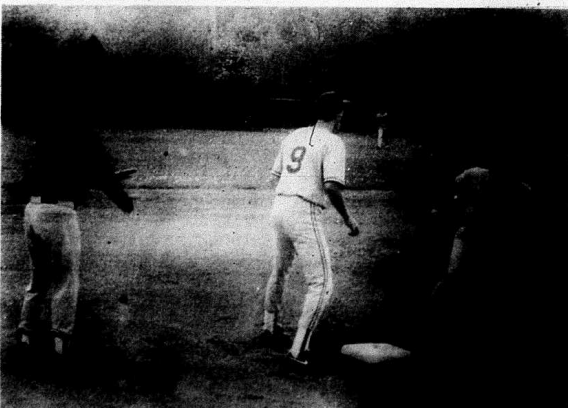
