RGHS seniors will protest prayer ruling graduation night

Making every effort to abide by the U.S. Constitution and a 1992 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that strictly forbids organized prayer in school, Rockcastle High School Principal Ronnie Cash has found himself in a precarious situation. "The ruling is quite clear on what we can and cannot do," Cash said. "If it was left up to me, it would be business as usual, just like we have for the past 21 years," he said.

"We would have had Baccalaureate Services at the high school last Sunday and prayer would be a part of our graduation ceremonies," Cash said. However for the first time since RGHS has been in existence, that was not the case.

Baccalaureate was held at the new barn in Renfro Valley, Sunday afternoon, it was not school sponsored and the local ministerial association chipped in \$200 to help clean up afterwards.

The court ruling strictly forbids Baccalaureate from being held on school property.

And a 130 seniors at the high school are planning a protest march on graduation night. The march will come immediately following a prayer service at a local church, and many of the students will wear white crosses on their graduation gowns in protest of the ruling.

"We were polled and 95% did not object to prayer at graduation," said Callie Mullins a senior at RGHS, who has written many articles for the school newspaper detailing the seniors' dilemma.

And at Sunday's Baccalaureate ceremony only 10 of 185 students did not attend.

"Most of feel like our rights are being violated and we think we have every right to protest any type of ruling forbidding prayer," said Amy Sears a member of the senior class council.

"We know that other groups, whether it be for a singing, play, even night class, are allowed to use the school and it simply is not right to forbid us, just because we are Christians," she said. "We realize there is nothing school officials can do, but we can show our unhappiness with the ruling, by the march," she said.

Businesses get crank calls

What was termed a "crank call" and a bomb threat was received by the Sowder Nursing Home and Brothead Dairy Mart Sunday.

Brothead Policeman Joe Buswell and Brothead firemen responded and searched both places. No bomb was found.

Patients at the Nursing Home were not evacuated from the premises while it was searched.

State Police to investigate Livingston City shortages

The investigation unit of the Kentucky State Police is to look into funds missing from the City of Livingston from July 1, 1991 to Dec. 31, 1992.

County Attorney James H. Lambert, who received an audit of the City of Livingston, said this week.

"I have reviewed the report of the Kentucky State Auditor with respect to funds missing from the City of Livingston, Kentucky. The report raises serious implications of wrong-

doing. I have today contacted the Kentucky State Police and requested that an investigation be commenced and requested that the State Police be prepared to testify before a Rockcastle County Grand Jury as soon as its investigation is complete."

"I will fully cooperate with the State Auditors, the Kentucky State Police and the Commonwealth's Attorney in pursuing this matter," Chandler's report questions over

Every spring the folks who run Cumberland Falls State Park have a "Photography Weekend."

Shutterbugs from all over show up and enter a contest to see who can take the best nature and scenic photos over a period of 24 hours or so. Photos have to be taken on slide film that can be processed overnight. You start taking pictures on Friday afternoon and turn your film in at 4 p.m. on Saturday.

By 7:30 a.m. Sunday morning your slides are ready and they give you an hour and a few minutes to look them over and enter live in the contest. They have two divisions; for Novice and Accomplished; and usually four categories of pictures. Generally the categories are pretty broad.

This year, for example there were categories for "wild flowers in bloom," "wildlife in motion," "water," and "man and his environment." In other words, anything that you could photograph within a 20 mile radius of Cumberland Falls had a category.

Loretta and I have been going to these weekends for a dozen years or so along with hundreds of other folks from all over the midwest. We've taken photographs alongside professionals from *National Geographic*, *The Smithsonian*, *Arizona Highways*, *Nature*, and several other national publications. And we've learned a lot about photography along the way.

Over the years we've encouraged friends to go with us to these events. We'll loan out a spare camera or promise someone who just bought one to come along and we'll show em how exposure works.

Five or six years ago we talked our good friend, Martha Wheeler into coming along. Martha didn't even have a 35mm camera at the time, but she had borrowed one of ours to take a picture of some old church some where and she liked the way her roll of film turned out. She entered a photo weekend with us using a Yashica camera that cost less than a hundred bucks brand

new. And she took a photo with it that won a trophy!!
Hooked!!!

Martha went out and bought her own camera, a Minolta in the same league that Loretta and I use. Vintage 1979 models. Last year she borrowed a top-of-the-line Canon and won a first place finish at Cumberland Falls. Over the summer she bought a top-of-the-line Minolta and we all started talking about the Spring Photo Weekend at C. Falls right after Christmas.

In the meantime, I talked my friend, Robyn Renner into coming to the shoot and Martha talked her friends Dan and Terry from Cincy into coming along with her. Martha and I were on the phone trying to work out the cheapest lodging accommodations the six of us might come up with when I mentioned that I was going to use the same equipment I'd been using for 15 years.

That's when she told me she was going to loan her new camera to Terry and shoot old fashioned too.

"If you were really going to be old fashioned," I told her, "You'd use the old Yashica." She immediately asked me to bring it along.

When we checked in at DuPont Lodge on Friday afternoon, Martha was there waiting with a roll of film in her hand. The first thing she asked was whether or not we'd brought the Yashica. Then she wanted to know how fast I could get film in it and cheat her into 37 or 38 exposures off a 36 exposure roll of film.

The Yashica has a little 40-75mm zoom lens on it and it was manufactured especially for a camera club rip-off. I bought it from a service man who had agreed with some processing company to send in two rolls a month for a year and they'd give him the camera for free. It was valued in 1976, the year it was made, for \$99.95. I bought it in 1987 for \$50.

Many, if not most, of the folks who show up to photo weekends have

top of the line, made this year, Nikon and other top brand equipment. It's not unusual for a camera bag to contain more than \$12,000 worth of equipment. We're talking about serious photographers here.

So our little group spent Friday afternoon and Saturday cussing the wind and rain as we tried to catch butterflies and wild violets still enough to photograph. We went to waterfalls and overlooks and we crawled around on the ground looking for spiders. We turned our film in on Saturday evening at 13 minutes past 7 on Sunday I picked it all up.

Robyn, Loretta, Martha and Terry were all shooting in the Novice Division. I've been entering the Accomplished class for several years now just to be obnoxious. So we selected our slides and entered them.

Loretta got an Honorable Mention trophy for a butterfly and I got a first place for a wolf spider and then they got around to best of show. In as few words as possible that means the best single photograph taken over the weekend. I pulled it off last year and I know for a fact that it means something. Loretta was trying to find a U-Haul to haul my head home in.

This year's best of show was a photograph of a pulpit in a little country church. The photographer had not used a flash, just the light-

coming in a window and it was, in fact a work of art.

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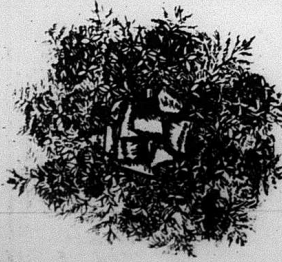
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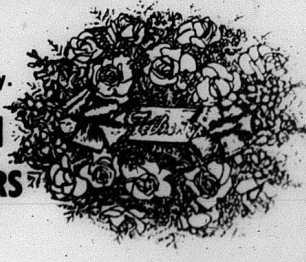

currently resides in Flemingburg, plans to move to Lexington to direct the agency.

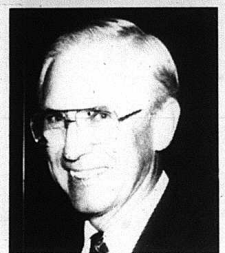
Fern replaces James H. Dunsmore who has been the Acting State Director for the past year.

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, as of June 30, 1992, and the related statement of cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in cash balances for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for Fiscal Court Audits issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

Rockcastle County, Kentucky, prepares its financial statements on a prescribed basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the cash basis and laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Consequently, certain revenues and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when a liability is incurred. This cash basis system does not require the maintenance of a general fixed asset group or general long-term debt group of accounts. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities, and fund balances arising from cash transactions of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, as of June 30, 1992, and the related statement of cash receipts, cash disbursements, and changes in cash balances for the year then ended, in conformity with the cash basis of accounting described above.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, taken as a whole. The accompanying additional information, provided on Schedules A through E, including the schedule of Federal Financial Assistance is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. This information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on the results of our audit, we make the following comments and recommendations:

Compliance With Laws and Regulations of All County Programs:

1) The County Treasurer Should Maintain A Budget Appropriation Ledger And Cash Disbursement Ledger For All County Funds

The County Treasurer only maintained a budget appropriation ledger for the Jail Fund during our audit in this newspaper. It states that the County Treasurer shall keep an accurate detailed account of all money received and disbursed by him for the county and shall keep books of accounts of financial transactions of the county in the manner required by the Uniform System of Accounting prescribed by the State Local Finance Officer. We recommend the County Treasurer maintain budget appropriation ledgers and a cash disbursement ledger for all county funds.

2) County Treasurer Should Be Bonded

Our review of the official Bonds indicated that the County Treasurer had not executed a bond. KRS 68.010 requires the County Treasurer to execute bond with at least two sureties. We recommend this official bond be obtained promptly and the fiscal court approve the bond.

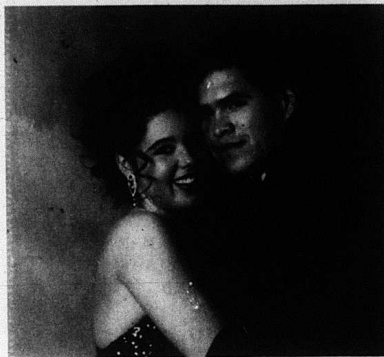

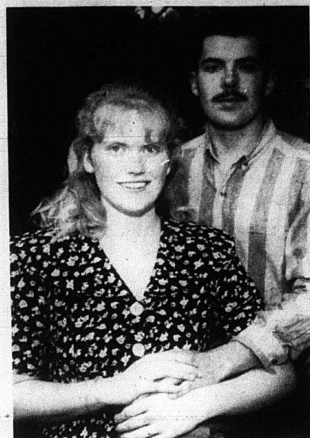

Where are the tax refunds?

Many taxpayers are questioning the whereabouts of their 1993 state income tax refunds, according to officials at the State Treasury.

"The Treasury is currently waiting for the approval from Finance to cut over 100,000 refund checks. State Law mandates that the Finance Cabinet issue an official authorization for all state checks before being cut by the Treasury," said Frances Jones Mills, State Treasurer.

The Revenue Cabinet accepts and processes the state income tax return and then notifies the Finance Department if a refund is to be made. Once an authorization, called a warrant, is issued by Finance, the Treasury then writes a check.

"It's my standing order in the Treasury that all state checks are processed within 24 hours from when the official Finance order is received," said Mills. "After we print the refund check, it will be returned immediately to the Revenue Cabinet for their immediate attention."

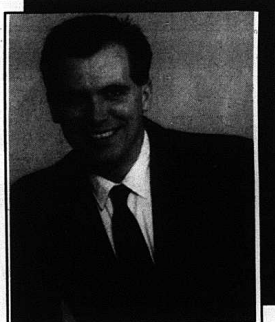

reimbursement for expenses," said Chandler.

The available city records contained no documentation authorizing the questioned amounts, Chandler said. "Apparently the former city clerk, whose responsibilities included paying city bills and payroll, added about \$200 to her paychecks," he noted.

Chandler's report also found that the deposit slips for city bank accounts did not include any "cash" deposits during the eight months that the former city clerk handled the city's finances.

The report showed that Livingston bank accounts had received an average of \$450 a month in cash deposits during the seven months

before, and three months after, the former city clerk handled the city's finances.

"I find it hard to believe that no one resident of the City of Livingston paid his or her bill in cash during the tenure of the former city clerk," Chandler said, "especially since the city recorded cash receipts before and after the former city clerk worked there and our auditors witnessed residents paying bills in cash during their examination in the city office."

During the audited year, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court received \$4,493,606 from federal, state, and local sources; including a balance of \$2,635,185 from the prior fiscal year. The county's total receipts included \$216,096 in local taxes. County expenditures totaled \$3,411,316 resulting in \$1,082,290 balance to be carried over to fiscal year 1992-93.

Chandler's report found that the county's financial statements, in all material respects, present fairly the financial transactions of Rockcastle County during the period July 1, 1991 through June 30, 1992. The report further states that the county's financial statements, with respect to the items tested, comply with the applicable laws and regulations. The report also contains comments and recommendations regarding the administrative procedures of the Fiscal Court.

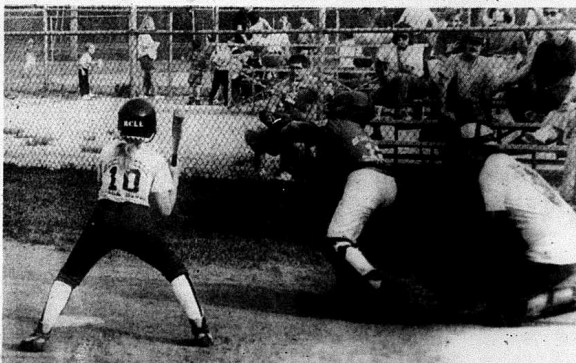

Nationwide poaching hotline now operational

The National Anti-Poaching Foundation, Inc., has begun operating its nationwide, anonymous toll-free hotline for reporting wildlife law violators. The toll-free number is 1-800-800-WARDEN.

The hotline is accessible to anyone from any telephone in the United States without cost to the caller or state wildlife agencies. The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR), along with other state fish and wildlife agencies, will be linked together through this communication to better combat illegal poaching and other unlawful activities related to wildlife.

Persons who observe violations can report that violation through the national toll-free number, regardless of where the violation is observed. Those calls will immediately be relayed to the appropriate state wildlife law enforcement agency. Persons reporting violations need not give their name. Operators will be on duty from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. seven days a week.

Officials with the Kentucky fish and wildlife department encourage the use of either the national or state poacher hotlines (1-800-25-ALERT) to report wildlife law violations. And callers should also be reminded that these numbers are for violation reports only. Operators are not equipped

to provide general hunting or fishing information. -48.30

On behalf of Parsons Gas I want to express my thanks and appreciation to John Cox and the Mt. Vernon Fire Department for their work during the incident last week with our tank at City Hall. The uncontrolled leakage of propane gas is always a matter of serious concern and so I believe they acted with the kind of caution that was appropriate under the circumstances.

I did not speak with anyone from *The Signal* at any time during the incident nor at anytime after it. I do not recall having made a statement to anyone else quite like the one attributed to me in *The Signal's* reporting. Though I feel sure it was an unintentional error on the part of the *Signal*, I have been concerned that the good people of the Fire Department could be offended by the comment attributed to me. When the health and safety of the public is at stake those responsible for protecting it should not be cavalierly second-guessed or criticized for their effort, except for gross excess or abuse of authority.

Because I believe the Fire Department acted with sound judgement and entirely appropriately, I want to correct any impression to the contrary which might have been created by the statement I didn't make.

New Law For Farmers

A new federal law in effect beginning May 10 requires farmers to maintain records on their use of restricted-use pesticides. Farmers are required to record the following information:

The brand or product name plus the EPA registration number.

Name and certification number of the person who applied the restricted-use pesticide.

Amount, location and specific date of application.

The commodity, crop, stored product or site treated.

No special forms for the records is needed, but the information must be noted within 30 days of application and kept for two years.

The state Division of Pesticides is responsible for monitoring compliance with the new federal rules. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has stressed that emphasis should be on education during the first year.

Restricted-use pesticides are those classified for limited application by

either the EPA or the state Pesticides Division. Anyone using those chemicals must be certified as a private applicator through the Pesticides Division.

Under a pending agreement with USDA, the Pesticides Division will agree to conduct a number of random inspections of applicators' records. The division will continue to respond to complaints.

"The new recordkeeping requirement is an inconvenience to farmers, but is in everyone's best interest because it will help provide further assurance that our farmers are good stewards of their resources," said Agriculture Commissioner Ed Logsdon. "This will enable us to do an even better job of regulating and promoting the proper use of restricted-use pesticides."



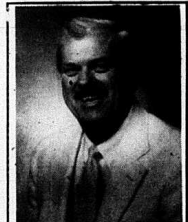

Dear Editor,
In the last few months, there have been accounts of Canadians robbed or killed while traveling in the United States. More recently, there have been horror tales of the "storm of the century," but where are the accounts of good deeds of the American citizens and the American Red Cross?

It is said that out of everything bad, there can be something good. We, too, became stranded tourists. Unable to go any further on I-75, we found all motels full. We were sheltered in a high school with 530 people. The Red Cross said they would provide us with shelter and food. They also told us they had never had this situation before.

As we were sheltered in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, I thought of our own small community and wondered how we would cope. Would there be

enough people to volunteer to give us their weekend to care for stranded motorists? How many of us would give up our blankets and pillows? Would we leave our families to go, prepare meals for all these travelers?

Many of the Red Cross workers were with us from the beginning. They would try to get a few minutes sleep on a couch in the office when possible. We were sure there were many, many other people involved: those calling to arrange for donating and collecting of food and blankets, those directing travelers in the storm and those rescuing people on the Interstate. The huge coffee pots were never left empty. Basketball games were organized. School showers were available to those with towels. Two large TVs, kept up to date with the weather.

On Sunday, we attended a church service in the gym. A local minister joined us as well as two ministers who were stranded. We gave thanks for our safety and the kindness and generosity of the Mt. Vernon citizens and the efforts of the American Red Cross.

As we left, we were so impressed by the Daniel Boone Chapter of the American Red Cross that we agreed they didn't need a practice session for a disaster because they had just done a terrific job. I know they stand tall in the eyes of 530 travelers.

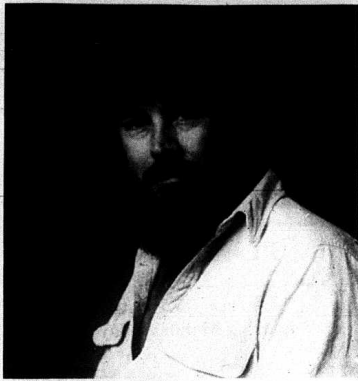

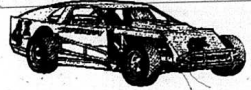

Sims to appear in Washington in quest of U.S. 150 funds

Lincoln County Judge/Executive John Sims was scheduled to appear in Washington before a congressional committee this week to plead for \$25.6 million to improve U.S. 150 from Crab Orchard to Mt. Vernon.

Carrying letters of support from business leaders and politicians from Rockcastle, Lincoln, Garrard, Boyle and Mercer counties, Sims was to testify about the value of the road to the area before the Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation.

Calling the 13.3 mile section of U.S. 150 the "missing link" in the corridor from I-64 at Frankfort to I-75 at Mt. Vernon, Sims said in remarks prepared for presentation to the subcommittee.

The estimated cost of the project is \$32-million and Sims is hoping the federal government will put in 80 percent of the total.

The Lincoln County Judge said that the route is a bypass for the heavily congested I-64, I-75 area near Lexington and a key ingredient in the

effort to improve the economy of the region.

"We feel the U.S. 150 corridor is crucial to the regional growth of the Bluegrass and Cumberland-Valley areas," Sims said in his prepared testimony. "Federal funding dollars would support the overall goal of improved quality of life."

Improvements to U.S. 150 from Stanford east have already begun with no federal participation. State tax

money is being spent on the first two-mile section of road with paving of the first stretch of relocated road scheduled to begin this month.

State funds also are being used to plan the second phase of construction, which will include a dam across Cedar Creek. The 750-acre lake to be created will also benefit from federal support for the Crab Orchard-Mt. Vernon leg of the road that Sims was in Washington to testify about. He said it would provide better and safer access from the east to the lake and proposed state park being talked about around the William Whitley House historical site.

Sims said that the sections of improved road between Stanford and Crab Orchard are all in the state's plans for the next six years. Improvements to the road east of Crab Orchard are scheduled for design work only beginning in 1998. Sims said he hopes federal funding of 80 percent of the cost of the road between Crab Orchard and Mt. Vernon could move that project up on the state's schedule.

While the road currently is planned for two lanes, Sims said the state is acquiring enough right-of-way to eventually widen it to four lanes.

While Sims was the only local official scheduled to testify before the congressional subcommittee, he took with him letters of support from Kentucky House Speaker Joe Clarke of Danville, Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins, Mercer County Judge/Executive Kenneth Kirkland, Boyle County Judge/Executive Mary C. Pendergraft

and Garrard County Judge/Executive Ray Hammonds.

Among the business executives who wrote letters of support were Max Sloeth, executive vice president of HKM East in Stanford; Harry R. Faulkner, president of Stanford Wood Products; Carlos Lee Vaughn, president of Lincoln County Pallet; George Greene, assistant plant manager of Rockcastle Manufacturing; Arthur E.

Genton II of Genton Tool & Die in Crab Orchard; Coy Cromer, manager of Rockcastle Ready-Mix and Glenn C. Alford, chairman of the Stanford-Lincoln County Industrial Authority.

Several people have asked me what District Court and Circuit Court do -- saying they don't understand the difference between the two.

I have explained it to them this way: As your County Attorney, part of my responsibility is to prosecute cases in the District Court or "lower court" as it is sometimes called. These cases are the ones involving a loss of property less than \$300 in value, traffic and other similar type offenses.

The Commonwealth Attorney, Mr. Ham, and the Circuit Court handle felony cases such as murder, robbery, burglary and most break-ins.

I am the only elected lawyer in our judicial system living in Rockcastle County. The others - two Circuit Judges, two District Judges and the Commonwealth Attorney - are all from Pulaski County. Therefore, the duties I have are unusually demanding and require a great deal of expertise and maturity.

In the District Court, I am trying hard to represent you. With over 2,000 cases this past fiscal year, our office has dealt with and concluded about 99% of them.

Last fall, we all heard enough promises about changing the government to last a lifetime, and by now everyone knows that no one person alone can accomplish that. I certainly will not make any wild promises to that effect.

However, I do pledge to continue to draw on my experiences (as a lawyer of 17 years, a County Attorney, a high school teacher, a husband and father) to conduct the duties of this very complicated job in a courteous, fair and knowledgeable manner.

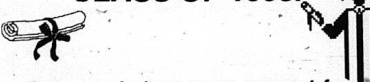

Expect Strawberry harvest soon, crop looks good

An early summer pleasure for most Kentuckians is the local strawberry harvest. And this year's crop promises to bring lots of pleasure to Kentuckians.

"This year's commercial crop will be abundant. Cool weather earlier has meant that the fields were slow to bloom, so expect a bit later-than-usual harvest," said Jerry Brown, an Extension horticulturist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Some backyard plantings may have a light crop this year, due to

mites that infested and killed some Kentucky honeybees necessary for pollinating the crop, he said.

Most commercial producers rented bees earlier in the season to make sure their blooms were pollinated," he said.

Harvest is expected in a week to 10 days in the west and just slightly later in the east.

"It's difficult to predict the exact time when any given field will be ready to harvest, but generally it is about one month after bloom," he said.

Brown said that consumers can usually find a strawberry producer in close proximity and can either buy the berries just picked or pick berries themselves.

"If you pick your own berries, remember not to pick green ones, since strawberries do not ripen after they have been picked," he said.

Put the berries in the refrigerator as soon as you can to help keep them fresh. When you are ready to eat them, rinse them with clear, cool water and then take the caps off.

"Capping berries before washing them results in a slight flavor loss," he said.

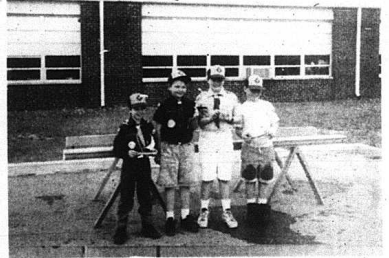

Destination Graduation Career Day focuses on opportunities

They heard about a variety of career opportunities. They saw how not to handle a job interview, and then the proper way.

And they were encouraged, in song, to "Dream the Impossible Dream."

But the overriding theme of the second annual Destination Graduation Career Day earlier this month at Eastern Kentucky University was the importance of first getting that high school diploma.

More than 100 at-risk students in Rockcastle, Estill and Jackson counties assembled at EKU's Perkins Building for four hours to learn more about the world that awaits them.

The purpose of Career Day is to provide these students with a variety of strategies for planning their future," said Nancy Thames, Destination Graduation director at EKU.

"It's geared to the student who participates in Destination Graduation and their needs."

"Our purpose with Destination Graduation is to encourage and facilitate graduation, but we also want them to get into productive careers."

Five special speakers talked for 15 minutes each about their respective fields: Lois Bobbert, Central Kentucky Tech; Elizabeth Hack, Bluegrass Area JTPA Program; Charlotte Robinson, Job Corps; Staff Sgt. Steven Krout, EKU Army ROTC and Herb Vesico, director, Student Financial Assistance, EKU.

Art Harvey, director of the Division of Career Development and Placement at EKU, gave the opening address and Gary Griesser, Kentucky Department of Education, gave the luncheon address.

In addition, Harvey, Dr. Sue

Strong, an education professor at EKU, and Patricia Martin, an EKU student and Destination Graduation tutor from Estill County, presented a humorous skit on the right way and wrong way to approach a job interview.

The Rockcastle, Estill and Jackson County school system participate in Eastern's Destination Graduation Program, which combines a six-week summer school project with tutoring throughout the school year by EKU students from the respective counties.

Destination Graduation is funded through the Council on Higher Education to serve at-risk high school students in the area with monies provided by the BellSouth Foundation and the Federal School, College and University Partnership Program. The majority of the summer school

funding is provided by the school systems through the Kentucky Edu-

Babbage announces registration record

The increase in voter registration in Rockcastle County has contributed to Kentucky now having more registered voters than at any time since statewide re-registration was required by law in 1972, according to Secretary of State Bob Babbage.

There are 2,160,192 Kentuckians registered to vote in the May 25 primary election.

Fayette and Madison Counties were the only two counties to show a decline in voter registration since the 1992 general election. The records show that registration in Fayette County declined by 7,138 and Madison County records 99 fewer voters than it did last November.

This is the second year in a row that registration records have been set in Kentucky. Last year 184,301 persons registered to vote between the 1991 and the 1992 general elections setting an all time high for new voter registration within a single year.

This is the fifth year since 1973 that voter registration has topped two million, Babbage said. The other years were in the 1984 general election (2,017,756), the 1985 primary election (2,086,773) and the 1983 general (2,102,765), the 1988 general election (2,026,307) and the 1992 general (2,076,263).

Democrats still hold more than a two-to-one lead in registration over Republicans. There are 1,430,766 persons registered as Democrats and 642,511 registered as Republicans.

A total of 61,882 persons are registered with no party preference and 25,033 are registered with other minority parties, according to the state board of elections.

Female voters still outnumber males by 1,134,971 to 1,025,224. Babbage noted that although more women than men are registered to vote, more men than women traditionally vote.

Babbage noted that voter registration declined by a total of 89,229 between the 1988 presidential election and the 1989 primary. In contrast, following last year's presidential election, registration in Kentucky has increased by 83,929.

Programs to promote voter registration in the workplace and special classroom projects to educate students about voting played an important role in the registration records, Babbage said.

Also the toll-free voter registration request line donated to Kentucky by MCI Communications which allowed Kentuckians to begin the registration process by telephone had also contributed to the record, Babbage said. Over 20,000 calls were made to the line during the three months last year that it was in operation.

Voter registration will resume in the county clerk's office on Tuesday, June 1.

However, the responsibilities of the County Attorney can influence felony cases, such as murder, rape, robbery and other matters that could end up in Circuit Court.

Many cases require the County Attorney to write warrants and prepare complaints. After arrests for either a misdemeanor or

felony, many cases are brought into District Court for the setting of bonds and reductions of bond. In Rockcastle, the County Attorney many times represents the citizens at the Preliminary Hearing which is a crucial stage in the case. If then, at this hearing, the County Attorney cannot carry the burden of proof through witnesses and the proper introduction of evidence, the case can be dismissed.

I WANT TO IMPROVE OPERATIONS OF THE COUNTY ATTORNEY'S OFFICE

Politics as usual can never solve the problems that face our District Court system. We have seen and heard it all before and it's time for good, honest hard work for a change.

Cases should not be dealt with by a certain formula, but should be evaluated on the facts. The County Attorney's office should take the responsibility and care to write warrants correctly. The citizens, as well as law enforcement should be able to find their County Attorney when the need arises. Cases should be fully prepared with necessary witnesses subpoenaed and presented properly before the jury. (The last District Court jury conviction was March, 1992).

Many times cases are disposed of through plea bargains and it must be a priority that the penalty fits the crime. There shouldn't be a need for out-of-county prosecutors to come into our county to dispose of backed up cases...that's the job of your elected County Attorney.

The County Attorney should be actively involved in Juvenile Court, and take care to instill a sense of responsibility in those that are before the Court. Furthermore, the County Attorney should give up to date, competent, reliable legal advice to the Fiscal Court.

My plans to improve the services to the citizens, to have more effective and efficient prosecutions and to increase collections of delinquent taxes and child support, at legal salary levels, will create a County Attorney's office of which you can be proud.

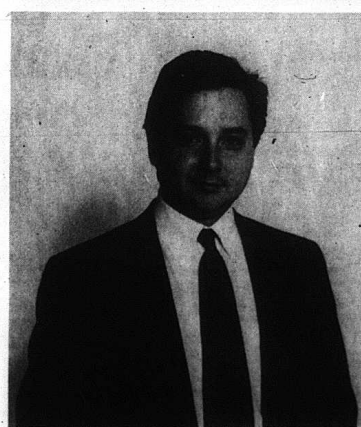
