

Rockcastle Grand Jury indict two for murder

Two local men have been indicted for murder by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Paul Wayne Senter, 27, of Carter Drive in Mt. Vernon was indicted in connection with the April 16th death of his infant child, Buster Wayne Senter.

According to court documents, six-month-old Buster Wayne Senter had been hospitalized since February 9th, suffering from massive head trauma brought on by "shaking baby syndrome." According to police the only neurological function Buster Wayne Senter had when he was admitted to the University of Kentucky Medical Center was breathing.

A Rockcastle County Grand Jury had earlier indicted Senter on five counts of assault in connection with the apparent beating of Buster Wayne and his twin brother Lester.

A condition of Senter's release from jail was that he stay away from his children pending court proceedings.

Besides the massive head trauma, doctors at U.K. said that Buster Wayne had previously suffered a broken collar bone and broken ribs. Senter is currently being held in the Rockcastle County jail under a \$50,000 cash bond.

He is scheduled to be arraigned in before Circuit Judge Dan Venters on May 28.

Earl Brent Kirby, 37, of Mt. Vernon was also indicted for murder in connection with the March 28 shooting death of his uncle.

Kirby is charged with shooting Lester Frankie Griffin to death on that Sunday afternoon, near Griffin's Chestnut Ridge home.

Kirby has been held in the Rockcastle County jail since the shooting and will be arraigned June 11, in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

A Word to the Wise

No electioneering at polling places in county

No person shall do any electioneering at the polling place or within a distance of five hundred feet of an entrance to a building in which a voting machine is located, according to County Clerk Norma Houk.

Electioneering shall include the displaying of signs, the distribution of campaign literature, cards or handbills, or the solicitation of votes for or against any candidate on the ballot in any manner.

This means all signs and posters must be removed before election day that are within 500 feet of the entrance to the polling places. Also all yard signs or signs on porches must be removed, she said.

This law does not prohibit electioneering conducted within a private residence or establishment by persons having an ownership interest in such property. However, the signs, posters, etc. must not be seen from the street outside.

This is a requirement by law.

Bumper stickers can be allowed to remain on a car if the person has come to vote and leaves his car there only long enough to vote. However, a car cannot be parked within 500 feet of the voting place for longer than it takes for a person to vote if there is a bumper sticker on the car.

Vote haulers cannot have any bumper stickers on their car due to the fact that they will be at the polling place more than once during the day.

Voters in Rockcastle will trek to the polls Tuesday to elect county officials for the next five years.

In Rockcastle, County Judge/Executive Roland Mullins is seeking a second term. He is challenged by Buzz Carolitis of the Livingston area. Both have mounted spirited campaigns.

Another spirited campaign is between County Attorney James Lambert and his challenger Jeffrey T. Burdette, a newcomer to politics.

Incumbent Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham of Somerset, is challenged by another attorney from Somerset Ray Carmichael.

Four are running for sheriff. Incumbent Shirley Smith is running for a second term. If he wins, he will be the first sheriff to serve consecutive terms. The law was changed by voters at the last county election.

Challenging the sheriff is former Deputy Ronnie Roark, former sheriff Clarence "Jib" Hasty and Craig Clark. Up for jailer is incumbent and appointed Jailer Joseph L. "Joe" Howard who is seeking his own term after Billy Kirby retired. He is challenged by Buck Farthing, Ralph Powell, John Bullock, Thomas J. Wagner and Leo Hayes.

In the Circuit Court Clerk race Incumbent Denver Miller is seeking another term. He is challenged by Cleidith Ray Thacker and Wanda Jean Chattelle.

District Judges are nonpartisan and are voted on in the November election along with mayors and city councilmen in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston.

Final voter registration figures from the state have been reported to County Clerk Norma Houk.

There are 1,786 Democrats and 7,619 Republicans. 15 have no preference, 38 others and 2 blacks, making a total of 9,458.

In the county, there are 4,742 male voters and 4,716 female.

Jennifer commenced insisting that tennis was something she wanted to take up several weeks before basketball season had ended. She kept hinting to me that she needed a better racket than the one her mother had handed down and I finally told her that I would look around.

Someone at work told me I ought to go to Sports Unlimited in Lexington and it was coming home registered. I was just home from the airport and I still had over seventy five dollars in my pocket left from my travel advance and the place just came looming up at me on Man O' War Blvd. I decided that I was going to have to buy the darn tennis racket sooner or later so I pulled on in.

As soon as I walked in the door I was met by a rack full of 9-foot Fenwick Fly Rids of quality that I have never seen displayed in a store. I've seen pictures of them in some of the upscale sportsman's catalogues that come through the mail, but I'd never actually laid eyes on one before.

But there they were in profusion and behind them was, perhaps, the widest array of fishing tackle currently on display in the free world.

You know how most discount stores have a couple of little short aisles about ten feet long where they put their fishing tackle. Rods and reels and hooks and line and bait buckets and lures and other angling paraphernalia are all generally right there where you can shop everything they have by standing in one spot and just glancing around. Usually in a space about the size of a big pool table.

Go into Wal-Mart, for instance, looking for a Countdown Rapala and within two minutes you know whether they have it or not. It's either there in that one little spot on the rack or it ain't. You don't have to call a salesperson or look all over the rest of the store. If it ain't there they ain't got it.

At Sports Unlimited, they got it. You may not be able to find it because they have a fishing tackle section nearly as large as some high school gymnasiums I've been in. I'm talking about racks of deep-sea and surf casting stuff. I spent ten days tooling around places on the Gulf of Mexico last spring inhabited by retirees who do nothing but sleep on the shore and fish in the ocean. Sports Unlimited has as good an assortment of ocean fishing tackle as anyplace I stopped right on the pier.

And it's a long, long way from Lexington to the deep blue sea. Maybe they stock the stuff so still living in Kentucky can buy presents for their elders who now live along the coast. I don't know.

Maybe they've snuck around and stocked tuna and marlin in Lake Cumberland. Maybe the tuna and marlin will eat the darn worthless, striped bass that are eating all the crappie in what was once the best crappie lake in the south.

Local folks call those big striped bass that weigh up to 60 pounds in Lake Cumberland, Buckeye Carp. A plain old carp grows just as big and fights just as hard. Neither one is fit to eat but a striped bass does have a lot of chrome on him. Local folks wonder why, instead of paying a million dollars a year to stock striped bass, the state didn't just seine up some carp and spray paint 'em. The buckeyes would still kill to get after 'em and pay big guide fees and stuff like that and those of us who like to fish after table fare could still catch a mess of crappie when we go to Lake Cumberland.

Anyway, behind the rods there was a long, long row of freshwater reels under glass cases like you'd see in a jewelry store. Again, we're talking about stuff that you normally see only in specialty catalogues or read about in the "new equipment" section of *Outdoor Life*, *Sports Afield*,

Field and Stream, etc. magazines. At prices far below mail order. And it occurred to me that I hadn't bought Jennifer a new fishing pole since she was in the sixth grade.

So I bought her a top-of-the-line magnesium Shimano ultralight spinning reel and a palm balanced Fenwick rod that matched it's weight. It's certainly the best ultra-light weight outfit I've ever had in my hand and I got it at a wonderfully discounted price. I even bought her twelve Mepps spinner baits and, best of all, three little Rapala countdowns that I thought they stopped making back in the seventies. After talking to the salesman, I also decided she needed two extra reel spools so that she could switch back and forth from two-pound, to four-pound, to six-pound test line on a whim.

Jennifer's a sophomore in high school now and she used to go fishing with me when she was in the fourth grade. I figure that she can give up tennis and cheerleading camp this summer and catch night crawlers on cool rainy nights and we can spend an evening or two each week trying to fool the ever-wary smallmouth bass that hide in the riffles of Paint Lick Creek. With an outfit like the one I bought her, I can't understand why my daughter would want to do anything else this summer except fish, fish, fish!

On the other hand, in case she doesn't, I also bought a \$27.95 (had been \$39.95) tennis racket at Wal-Mart and I decided that if tennis is so important to Jennifer, I ought to take it up to her. So I bought myself that racket and brought it home about a week after presenting Jennifer with her new fishing pole.

Grave robbing or archaeology? KET program examines W. Ky. incident

In December 1987, ten men were arrested at a farm near Uniontown, Ky. and charged with "desecration of a venerated object" -- or grave robbing. Littered among the 450 crates left from the digging were the skeletal remains of more than 1,200 Native Americans. The site was both the largest Native American burial ground uncovered to date and the largest incidence of grave looting in U.S. history. The diggers had paid \$10,000 to lease the site to search for artifacts.

Procedure for Septic System Approval

1. Person chooses a building site for home, mobile home or commercial establishment.
2. Person, or their designer or contractor, makes an application for a site evaluation from the local Health Department (Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. through 4:30 p.m.). The applications are available at the Health Department and applicants need to provide, and have available, the following information in order to complete the application.
 - a. Specific address and location of the site.
 - b. Site boundary lines and dimensions of site.
 - c. Location of existing structures, wells, ponds, streams, easements, roads, drives, etc., present or planned.
 - d. Proposed (or existing) location of structure to be served by the system/proposed system
3. A site evaluation fee payable to Cumberland Valley District Health Department is required prior to evaluation.
4. Person seeking approval will be responsible for backhoe pits in proposed designated area, if necessary and seek appointment with Health Department, if they desire to be present during evaluation for consultation.
5. If the site evaluation reveals that the applicable requirements of the Kentucky onsite sewage disposal regulation are met, the area designated for system installation shall be approved by the inspector.
6. A copy of the site evaluation will be provided to the person seeking approval. Any site limitations will be noted and any modifications to overcome those limitations noted. The owner or installer shall provide a diagram of the proposed installation.
7. If the site receives a Suitable or Provisionally Suitable reading, and the proposed system meets the Kentucky onsite regulations, and the owner or the certified installer may get a permit to install the system. **(THIS PERMIT IS REQUIRED BEFORE AN INTERIOR PLUMBING PERMIT CAN BE OBTAINED FROM THE STATE PLUMBING INSPECTOR).**
8. A permit of \$55, payable to Cumberland Valley District Health Department.
9. When the installer constructs the system, he must request an inspection from the Health Department before any of this work is covered. Approval shall be granted if the installation is correct.

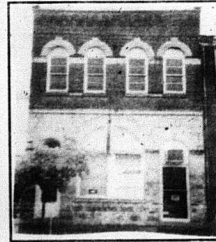

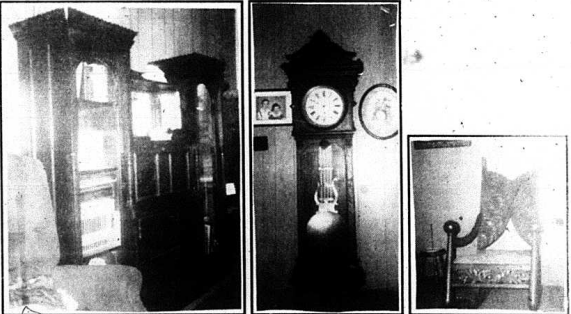

Solid waste collection steadily increasing

The number of households in Rockcastle County properly disposing of household garbage is steadily increasing.

Nancy Meadows, the solid waste secretary, reports that 69 percent are registered with a garbage hauler or the transfer center at Burr compared to 567 percent in April of last year. Records show that 5,215 tons of waste from Rockcastle County were taken to the landfills in 1992.

Recycling is also showing a significant growth. Over 250,000 pounds of materials were dispensed for recycling during the first quarter of 1993. This consists of plastic, glass, newspaper, aluminum, and cardboard. Bee Garbage is in charge of recycling.

County Ordinance, effective Oct. 1, 1990, states every household must register with a hauler or transfer center. If your household or place of business does not have garbage serv-

ice, please contact one of the permitted haulers listed below:

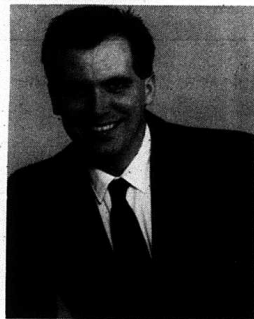

- **County Employees** Affordable, real health care for these employees could be received by joining with other counties. Many of these men are the breadwinners for their families whose children depend upon them.

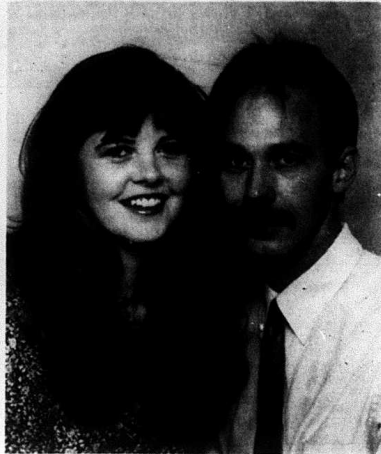

It's followed at 2 p.m. by *Down in the Dumps: America's Garbage Crisis*, a comprehensive examination of our country's solid waste crisis.

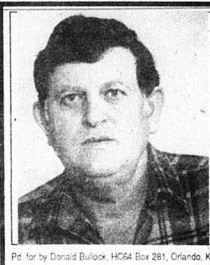

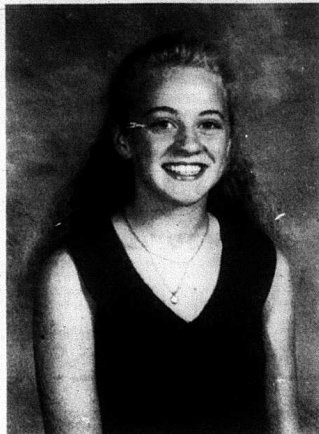
Seven students from the Rockcastle Chapter were regional winners and advanced to state competition, competing against 14 other regions.

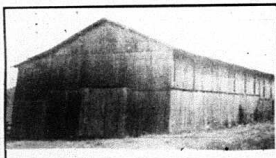

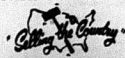

Of course, if we tried to fulfill every one of this child's wishes, this year, we would have attended the Derby, preceded of course by the Governor's Breakfast, the Rodeo, the Easter Egg Hunt at Renfro, the Barn Dance each Saturday night, and so on, and so on. And, these are not unreasonable requests -- if I were just twenty years younger.

Travis, our twelve-year-old is not quite as adventurous. In fact, if you can't do it with a bat or ball, he isn't really interested. We did bestir ourselves to drive to Disney World (or is it Land, I never can remember), in Florida last year. The minute, and I am not exaggerating here, we walked through the entrance gate, Travis' first question was, "How long do we have to stay?" We found no problem with making a U-Turn and going out the exit then but Allison had other ideas so we paid many, many dollars and wandered around for three hours, with Travis queries as to departure time getting more strongly worded each fifteen minutes, and then left. I don't think it was a memorable trip for Allison.

Of course, the flip side of this quandary is that she will not be a jaded teenager who has been everywhere and done everything so that nothing excites her.

It seems there are support groups for everything these days, has anyone heard of one for over-the-hill parents?

A final thought that has absolutely nothing to do with the above. Next Tuesday is Election Day. You should consider it both a right and privilege and make the extra effort to bestir yourself. 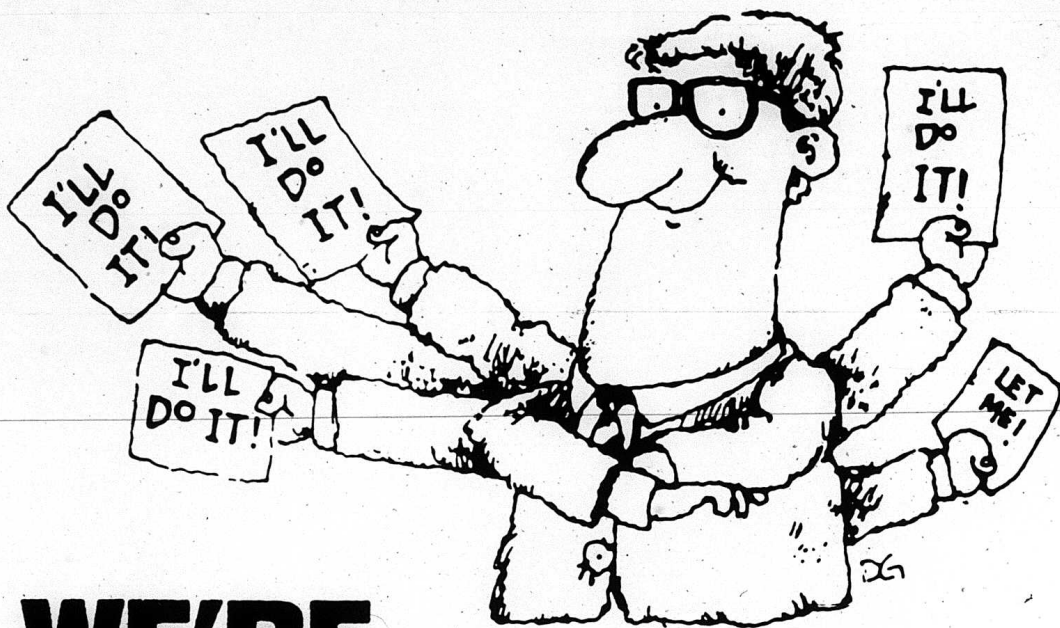

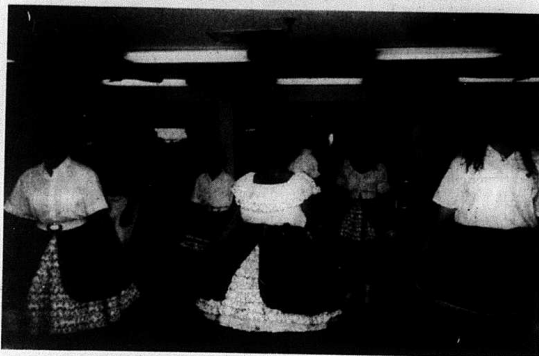

No U.S. Troops in Bosnia

By Congressman Harold Rogers

A military quagmire similar to Vietnam could be on our hands if President Clinton goes forward with plans to send U.S. troops into the former Yugoslavia.

Whether he chooses air strikes of Serbian positions, or the much more dangerous option of ground troops, my answer on this issue is the same -- no U.S. troops should be sent to Bosnia.

Unlike the Persian Gulf War, where Saddam Hussein was looking to control a majority of the world's oil supply, there appears to be no vital United States interest at stake to justify sending our troops into the centuries-old fight between the Muslims and Serbs, despite the heart-breaking pictures of human suffering.

Like many of my colleagues on Capitol Hill, I am not convinced that air strikes against Serbian positions in Bosnia will improve the situation. In fact, air strikes by American bombers could put at risk the lives of U.N. peacekeeping troops on the ground.

And what if one of our planes gets shot down and an American pilot is taken hostage? Do we escalate?

The case for American ground troops is going nowhere because there is wide agreement that our troops would be at a disadvantage against an enemy that knows the rugged terrain and thick foliage -- much like the Viet Cong during the Vietnam War.

But perhaps the best reason for staying out of the Muslim-Serb conflict is that these people have been fighting each other for centuries. This is a multi-sided civil war. Our military leaders tell us they can neither define a military mission nor establish goals for withdrawal.

Granted, the ethnic cleansings and other atrocities are horrific and an abomination. But trading American blood for Muslim blood will not bring us one step closer to resolving this conflict.

I believe that we can help the Muslims by lifting the U.N. embargo against allowing them arms with which to defend themselves.

We should also keep applying pressure to the Europeans to take the lead on resolving this conflict. Until the Europeans come forward with a plan for resolving this issue -- it is in their backyard, after all -- the United States should stay out of the fray.

None of us likes to see the kind of human rights violations that are taking place in Bosnia, but we must not let emotion rule our decision to send American troops.

When the lives of American soldiers are at stake, I want us to rely on our heads, not our hearts. In this situation, my head says keep our troops at home.

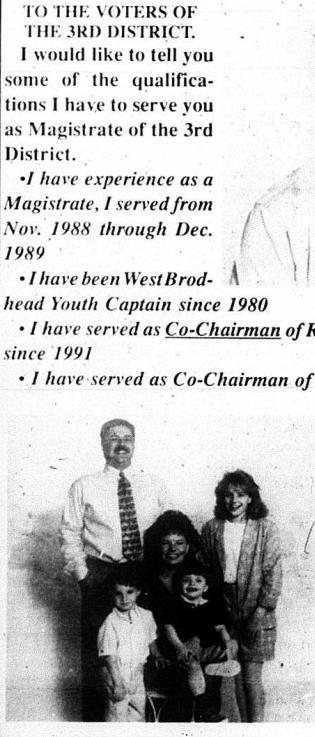

Patient aid program for Leukemia victims

The Leukemia Society of America's Patient Aid Program provides supplementary financial assistance to patients with leukemia, the lymphomas, multiple myeloma and Hodgkin's disease, as well as referral services to other sources of help in the community.

The Society's Patient Aid program, supported entirely by public contributions, is administered through the Kentucky Chapter. Monies from the Society can be used towards drugs used in treatment of leukemia and allied diseases, the processing, typing and screening of blood components, transportation to doctor's offices and some x-ray therapy.

Financial assistance of up to \$750 a year per patient is given by the Society to outpatients. Outpatients are those not confined to a hospital, although they may be treated at various times at a hospital. Assistance is available to all qualified patients without discrimination as to age, race, color or creed. It begins on the date the application is received in the chapter office, provided that the application is approved by the Chapter's Patient Aid Committee.

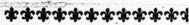
Aid is limited in all cases to expenditures not covered by other sources. However, patients receiving federal, state, county and local aid, Social Security, Blue Cross/Blue Shield or Medicare may be eligible for aid from the Leukemia Society. The Society assistance cannot be a duplication of funds received from other sources.

An application form may be obtained from the Kentucky Chapter, 710 West Main Street, Suite 201, Louisville, Kentucky 40202. The form should be completed by the patient, or, in the case of a child, by a parent or legal guardian. The form must include the patient's diagnosis and be signed by the attending physician. 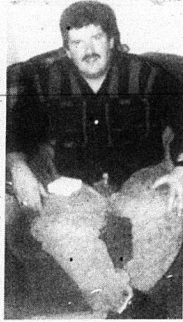

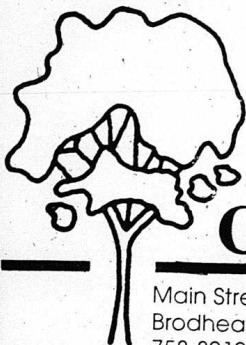

Join in "Operation Nighthawk" Police agencies are watching for DUIs

Kentucky State Police Troopers assigned to the London Post, along with the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and Clay County Sheriff's Department have recently jointly participated in "Operation Nighthawk" activities in the London district.

"Operation Nighthawk" is part of an ongoing D.U.I. enforcement program occurring statewide.

Law enforcement here have used designated locations for roadchecks in our seven county area which were previously identified to the public.

In the seven county area we have arrested 22 D.U.I.'s, and issued cita-

tions to 262 persons for other violations. 27 citations were issued for children not in a child restraint in vehicles and 41 courtesy notices were issued.

We inspected 1,021 vehicles and assisted 6 motorists who were broken down.

"The program has been successful in reducing accidents," officers said. With summer and vacation traffic approaching as well as the Memorial Day Holiday, we will again continue to use "Operation Nighthawk" sobriety checkpoints and enforcement to attempt to reduce accidents.

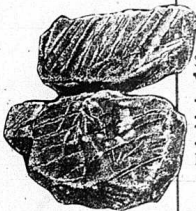

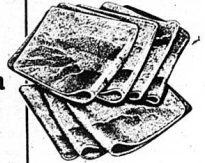

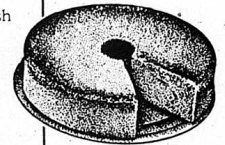

County, City get "Blizzard of 93" compensation

On March 13th to 17, Rockcastle County was engaged in a snow emergency call the "Blizzard of 93" nationally.

The county unified its resources to meet local needs to get medicine and other essentials to local residents. They also provided emergency shelter for hundreds of stranded motorists that found refuge here.

Private citizens joined with the local emergency response agencies, the American Red Cross, local school officials and county and city government to provide these emergency needs.

Gary Asher, the Rockcastle County Disaster Emergency Services Director, D.E.S., has been recognized by the regional and Frankfort offices by Kentucky Disaster and Emergency Services for his coordination of resources during the incident.

On May 12th the county received a reimbursement check from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and Kentucky State Government.

The check was based on a 75 percent federal, 12 percent state and 13 percent local expenditure rate. The amount was \$14,093 to replace the extraordinary expense of the operation. The City of Mt. Vernon received \$1,282 for the same operation.

Governor Jones requested the reimbursement for over 70 Kentucky Counties to replace fiscal expenses. This is Kentucky's first presidentially declared snow emergency.

Cave folks hold open house

Visitors came from far and near Sunday to take a look and explore Great Saltpetre cave and its many artifacts.

They wanted to squeeze through Fat Mans Misery, see a Civil War Hospital, the graves of Revolutionary soldiers and to try to wake up a few bats hanging from the ceiling.

The tours are only about once a year and about 300 turned up Sunday for the event.

Up until four years ago the cave where once saltpetre was mined for use in gunpowder, the public ventured through the cave when it interested them.

Then Filburn Foundation of Robbinsville, N. Car., bought it and closed it to the public which according to the Foundation was damaging the ecology of the cave.

The foundation turned it over to National Speological society to watch over and to partial out tours for interested groups who requested.

David Bales, a visitor Sunday, recalled that before the foundation came along, items were stolen from the cave.

"It had wiring stolen out of it and was abused," he said. "These people have done a good job with it. They cleaned it up."

Meaning pop and beer cans, and food wrappers.

Bill Simpson, a Cincinnati spoonlunker, said the cave serves as an educational tool for the community. "It's got lots of history for the families that live here," he said.

Local historians claim the first recorded history dates from about 1798 when Jack Baker stumbled into it and couldn't find the way out for three days.

It was also used briefly by the Renfro Valley Barn Dance as a radio remote from the cave.

One of the most visible of visitors has been the Greater Cincinnati Grotto, a group that visits nearly every week. The Grotto will also be remembered as a group who were trapped in the cave prompting considerable national attention.

Great Saltpetre cave is in Rockcastle County several miles from I-75 and the Burr interchange.

Twelve Kentucky schools to join national restructuring pilot project

Twelve more Kentucky schools are joining a national pilot project to promote and develop "break the mold" instructional practices consistent with comprehensive education reform, Education Commissioner Thomas C. Boysen said today.

The National Alliance for Restructuring Education, a network of five state systems and four big-city school districts, is funding a five-year program to speed up school transformation efforts.

Three Kentucky schools are com-

pleting their first year in the program: Ward Chapel Elementary in Bee County, Calloway County Middle School and Scott High School in Kenton County. They will serve as mentor schools for the 12 new alliance schools.

The 12 new alliance schools are: Elementary Squire Elementary, Fayette County; John F. Kennedy Elementary, Jefferson County; Greenwood Elementary, Jefferson County; Southwest Calloway Elementary, Calloway County Middle School

Woodland Middle, Kenton County; Barret Middle, Jefferson County; Eminence Independent Middle, Henry County; Willard School, Perry County High School

Pikeville Independent High School, Pike County; Rockcastle County High School; Bell County High School; Greenwood High School, Warren County

The new schools were selected because of their eagerness to embrace education reform, their positive work with students now and broad local support for systemic change.

"As the only state system engaged in systemic education reform, Kentucky is the national leader in school transformation," said Boysen. "The three, first-year alliance schools are integrating all major education reform programs and will certainly help the second-year participants get a jump start on moving forward faster."

Though the alliance program, Kentucky schools will receive assis-

Safety of ground beef

Properly prepared hamburger can avoid most of the food poisoning which gained so much recent publicity when a rash of western fast food restaurants experienced a number of cases.

More than 400 persons in the Northwest became ill after eating undercooked hamburgers. "If the beef had been properly cooked, these illnesses could have been avoided," said Fudeko Maruyama, Extension food specialist with the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture.

The problem arose when a fast food restaurant switched to thicker meat patties and did not increase cooking time. The undercooked burgers were contaminated with deadly strains of E. coli.

E. coli can be present in such foods as unpasteurized milk, contaminated water and apple cider, as well as beef.

However, cooking kills these bacteria, Maruyama said. Maruyama suggests the following guidelines to ensure safety in handling, storing and preparing raw meat.

- Pick meat packages that are not torn and that feel cold.
- Don't let meat juices contaminate

Grazing cattle affect soil mineral distribution

It's official now. Tests indicate Kentucky 31 tall fescue pastures mixed with ladino clover legumes are the most economical to put pounds on cattle.

Kentucky farmers have liked to use Kentucky 31 tall fescue, developed by the University of Kentucky

other foods. "Don't reuse meat packaging materials." "Use soap and water to clean utensils and platters that have touched raw meat." "Store ground beef at forty degrees or less if it is to be used within two days, or freeze at zero degrees for longer periods of time." "Thaw ground beef in the refrigerator." (Cont. to C-3)

Legumes in pastures make cheapest gains for cattle

Research indicates that potassium, phosphorus and other soil minerals are found in much higher rates near water and shade in pastures grazed by cattle than in other parts of the pasture.

"Soil tests have shown that potassium frequently is found to be 10 times greater near the water or shade than in other parts of the pasture," said Lloyd Murdock, Extension soils specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

He added, "Phosphorus levels tended to be four to five times greater in those areas." Those results really are not surprising, he said, but farmers should be aware of them for planning purposes.

Grazing cattle consume large quantities of minerals, including

potassium, phosphorus, calcium and magnesium in the forage they con-

sume, Murdock said. Those minerals are lost in the soil through excretions from the animals.

"But those animals do not spread these excretions across the pasture uniformly," he said. "As you would expect, they tend to concentrate" (Cont. to C-3)

with UK's Research and Education Center in Princeton.

The only problem with the Ken-

tucky 31 pasture was that it carried the endophyte which resulted in the so-called "summer slump" during the hottest summer months.

"We've recommended for several years that farmers renovate their tall fescue pastures by adding either red or ladino clovers," Lacerfield said. "Our studies showed that helped improve efficiency not only over the summer slump period, but also during the rest of the year."

The new studies, which came from Auburn University, now show that Kentucky 31 with ladino clover pastures not only improve production efficiency, they also improve economic efficiency.

"The Kentucky 31 fescue and clover system produced a pound of gain for 10 cents," Lacerfield said. "The second best system, orchardgrass plus ladino clover, produced a pound of gain for 12 cents."

Both systems were grazed in the spring and the fall for the study to maximize forage use. "The importance of adding legumes, such as ladino clover, to most pastures was apparent in that seven of the top 10 systems contained legumes.

manure where the livestock tend to congregate—near the watering hole and near the shade."

What that means is that those areas tend to become enriched with nutrients while the more distant areas may decline fertility.

Farmers should take that into account when they plan to fertilize their pastures and realize that only areas away from the water and shade concentration points need to be fertilized, he said.

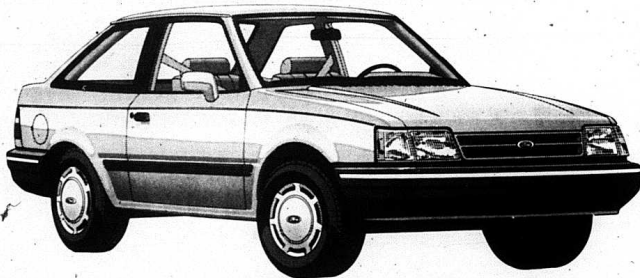

where the criminal's commit ever kind of crime that is covered under the law and always gets away to walk the street and continue their crime, then we as citizens are paying for a judicial system that don't work for us but for the criminals.

A book couldn't contain all the stories of citizens in this county who have had their homes robbed, burned, property and livestock stolen and many cases of tobacco crops stolen from their barns. In many cases the

citizen affected has investigated and taken proof to get warrants for the criminal only to never get out of the prosecutors office into the courts, and if some do get to court the "qualified" experience prosecutors have drawn up the warrants in such a way that the judges con rule that the warrants are "improperly drawn" and dismisses the case in favor of the criminal. Even when children are abused or killed, or murder or mistreatment of our older citizens, occur and the court system is our only hope, the criminal element always prevails. One example is of Shirley

Smith who we hired (by way of vote) to enforce our laws -- Sheriff Smith has made several major drug arrests only to have his cases thrown out and almost being sent to prison himself because he dared to stand up for what was right.

Even our Kentucky State Police, who are well trained and are very effective all over Kentucky, cannot get a conviction here in Rockcastle County because their warrants are improperly drawn or illegal seizure or unlawful raid.

I personally take heart from hearing from my own friends and neighbors that we are all fed up with our courts and their smoke screen. And that is time for us to hire a county attorney that is qualified to fill out warrants that are proper and will prosecute the criminal element, and hire ourselves a commonwealth attorney that can support our law enforcement officers in the court system instead of the criminals.

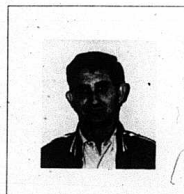

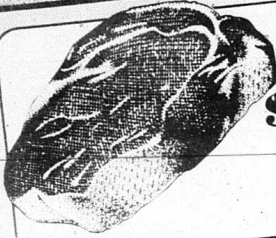

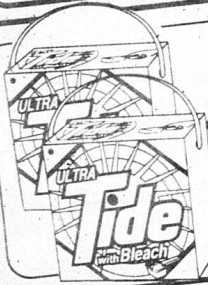
