City Budget

A proposed budget for the general fund for the City of Mt. Vernon for 1993-94 totals \$238,000 according to a city report.

The water/sewer fund totals \$700,000, municipal aid is figured at \$71,000 and economic assistance at \$94,400.

A public hearing on the budget will be held June 7 at 7 p.m. at city hall regarding the proposed use of municipal aid and local government economic assistance program funds for the upcoming fiscal year.

This year's general fund is only slightly higher than last years which was \$237,962.

Last year's water/sewer fund was \$698,400; Municipal Aid was \$86,000, and economic assistance was \$13,200.

All elementary school eighth grade commencements are scheduled for Tuesday, June 1 at 7 p.m.

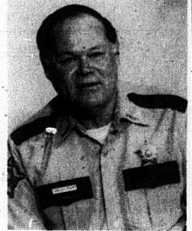
Last day of school

Apparently unhappy with the way Rockcastle County government is being administered, local voters ousted incumbent Roland Mullins of Mt. Vernon and handed newcomer Buzz Carloftis, of Livingston the local judge-executive seat.

Carloftis handily defeated Mullins, 2,675 to 1,942. A republican, Carloftis will run unopposed this fall.

Joseph L. "Joe" Howard, incumbent judge, defeated his nearest opponent Buck Farthing, 2,195 to 1,238. Howard had replaced Billy Kirby when Kirby retired.

Mullins was trying for a second term. He won over Carloftis in 1989.

In another surprise, Jeffrey T. Burdette, a newcomer to politics, defeated old hand at the poles County Attorney James H. Lambert 3,021 to 1,619.

Burdette led the Republican ticket in votes.

Three of five incumbent magistrates survived Tuesday's primary. Second District Magistrate Jack Bradley, Fourth District Magistrate Amos Burdette and Fifth District Magistrate Donald Bullock all scored victories. Bradley got 528 votes, Amos Burdette got 248 and Bullock, 318.

There are two newcomers, Shannon Bishop won in the First District race over Charles "Boon Boon" Holbrook 321 to 213. In the Third District, Bill McKinney won on the GOP side with 246 votes over Bentley Durhams 200. McKinney will face T.G. Laswell, Democrat, in November. Laswell won his primary with 113 votes.

Bishop will face another Holbrook this fall. Democrat John Holbrook won his first district race over Jerry Ross.

A more detailed look at the precinct totals for all candidates will be found on an inside page.

For the major vote getters the handwriting was on the wall when the absentee votes were counted.

Almost a top voter, incumbent Circuit Court Clerk Denver Miller handily defeated Wanda Jean Bullock Chattlee 2,996 to Chattlee's 1,173. Cleidith Ray Thacker got 408.

In the race for Commonwealth Attorney in Rockcastle, Ray Carmichael won his election over Benny Ham in the three counties 8,296 to Ham's 5,314. In Rockcastle, Carmichael got 2,824 and incumbent Benny Ham got 1,220. The 28th District includes Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski Counties.

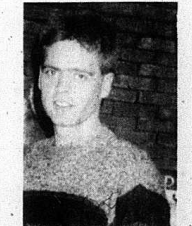
Carmichael lost Lincoln County of the District to Ham. Carmichael got 769, Ham got 829.

Carmichael said Wednesday he wanted to "express his gratitude to the people of Rockcastle for this vote of confidence. I feel it came from the hearts of the people."

Two candidates in law enforcement, both incumbents, won easy victories.

For the first time in history a sheriff will succeed himself in office.

Incumbent Sheriff Shirley Smith won handily over former sheriff Clarence "Jib" Hasty Jr. Smith got 2,691 votes to Hasty's 1,539.

Points East

The word, "reform," literally implies drastic change. If you're going to "reform" something, according to us old hippies, that means you're going to kick out the bad stuff and replace it with something else that we believe to be good.

Like in "Education Reform," for example. Fifty or a hundred thousand of us Kentuckians got to growling for a decade or two about the fact that power politics was getting a lot more education money than our kids were. Our school districts were crawling alive with superintendents who were hired by boards of education who needed an expensive "yes man" to legitimately divide up the dollars. And the power.

You have to have a few graduate courses in education to qualify for a superintendency and you have to have kissed many a warty behind, but if you are well connected and legally educated, hey, it's possible to have a job like the one Jack Burkich has in the Letcher County School System. In short, you can be paid upwards of a hundred thousand dollars a year in salary and benefits to do whatever it takes to make sure that nothing changes.

As teachers and parents at the schools in Letcher County finally got fired up about the prospects of instituting councils to take over school management, the superintendent and the Board of Education took every step they could to discourage the process and block reform.

When Tom Boyesen was first hired to head up Kentucky's Department of Education, one of the first quarrels he got called in to settle was happening in Letcher County. One school was chomping at the bit to get on with the reform legislation while the board and superintendent were

scouring around to do everything they could to block it or to make it as akin to the existing patronage system as possible. Boyesen delivered a pep talk to the powers that be and suggested that Letcher could be a model for the rest of the state.

Letcher County has, in fact, become a model but not along the lines that Boyesen had in mind. Boyesen was suggesting that Letcher could demonstrate to the rest of the state how a rural system could take advantage of the reform legislation to make the schools better for children, teachers, parents and the rest of the community. Instead, Letcher has become the model for any and all systems who wish to impede, aggravate and confuse schools desiring to implement reform.

I do feel confident that eventually the parents and teachers in Letcher County will take control of their schools but they will have to fight the Board of Education at every turn. Education Reform is a difficult undertaking, an uphill battle under the best of circumstances, even in systems where boards bend over backwards to make it happen. Unfortunately Letcher County folks have to deal with a board that has absolutely no intention of relinquishing the iota of control unless it is forced to do so by the courts.

As other systems implement curriculum changes and management practices designed to improve both the quantity and quality of education for their children, the Letcher County Board has effectively made sure that it's kids are already two years behind the more progressive systems. As long as Jack Burkich and the other scalawags remain in control, the kids will keep slipping behind and that's

a crying shame.

And speaking of reform, we made a prediction in this space some months back that not much of anything would come of Brer Horse's notion that he could revolutionize the pitiful way that health care is delivered in Kentucky. From my observation, Brer Horse has received about what he can expect in the way of cooperation from the green mongers who are largely in control of our General Assembly.

The current special session is providing an opportunity for the more ambitious money grubbers to get back into the pockets of the health care and insurance lobbyists but there is little hope that anything is going to happen in the way of cost containment or, for that matter, making sure

that all Kentuckians have access to health care.

Brer essentially traded his birthright for a bowl of porridge in the form of special legislation that would make horse racing more lucrative and ultimately put hard cash in the Guv's hip pocket. The Legislature complied and figured that it had "taken care of Brer." And everytime a new off-track betting parlor opens they figure Brer is getting what he wanted and all he deserves out of state government in the first place.

They wish he'd go away and hush up about this reform stuff. I suspect that eventually he'll do just that. In the meantime, if you don't have health insurance, try real hard to keep from getting sick.

grammarian at MVHS, who didn't hear well, caught that part of the prayer. Word has it that she whispered to Miss Ruth, "Only God can help some of them."

Miss Ruth, not one to whisper, replied, "Myrtle, some of them God won't help!" Her response is understandable when you realize how hard she labored with some of us for four years in a row.

Next, a mixed chorus performed, led by Miss Ruth, of course. (How "mixed" was it? It was so "mixed" that John Coleman Stokes sang all four parts and a descendant, at the same time, in a minor key.) We rendered two appropriately religious tunes: "I Believe" and "Moonlight and Roses."

Then came the sermon, delivered by Bro. Ray, one of the most able and eloquent pastors ever to mount—and occasionally ride off—on the pulpit of the First Christian Church.

At this point, I must interject an historical aside. In those days doctrinal rivalry between First Baptist and First Christian was fierce and unbridled. (Thank heaven it eventually ceased.) On a given Sunday, Bro. Lawrence would preach on "Once Saved, Always Saved," and the next Sunday Bro. Ray would sermonize on "Falling from Grace—Over and Over."

The controversy even reached into the classrooms of MVHS. More than once, Jack Laswell purposely initi-

ated a debate between the Baptists and "Christians" in his American History class of juniors and seniors. Then he sat on his desk, coupled his hands around one knee, leaned back, rocked—and grinned—the hour away. One day the melee got so intense that Carol Ann Fred, a lovely Jewess, got involved and took up for the "Christians."

Bro. Ray announced his sermon topic: "What Goliath Didn't Know!" Right then, something rather mysterious happened, something that roundly rubbed Bro. Ray the wrong way. Seated up front, I watched a turn-nip-red hue flush over his face. And his eyes, rarely winking, barely blinking, meted out a glassy stare.

I'm told someone from FBC gave him the infamous Baptist leer. It's a look that says, "Tell me something I don't already know—if you can." That'd tick you quick, for sure. (In 1989 Prof. A. Galut Pole, a sociologist at the University of Muhlenzinski, wrote that "dentists, deacons, and hotel detectives are more vulnerable to the disorder than run-of-the-mill parishioners.")

Whatever it was, Bro. Ray was so perturbed that he switched sermon horses at the head of the stream and spent forty-five minutes pontificating on liquor, pre-marital sex, and the necessity of good works "unto salvation. What a forceful argument (Cont. to A5)

Rockets' baseball team captures first ever district title

Write it down as a win, a command performance, and a district championship. But most importantly, recorded as the first ever district crown for any baseball team at Rockcastle County High School.

The Rockcastle County Rockets put a long awaited district championship trophy in their trophy case Thursday as they defeated the Jackson County Generals 9-0 at Clay County.

Following an 11-1 win over Oeida Monday in the first round of the tournament, the Rockets had little difficulty in downing the Generals behind a solid pitching performance of junior J.D. Bussell.

Bussell worked seven innings facing 26 batters to allow only three hits and allowing no runs. He struck out eight and walked only four in the outing.

The Rockcastle bats were also alive in the game garnering ten hits to produce runs in five of the seven innings of the game. The Rockets posted two runs in the first, two in the second, one in the third, two in the fifth and two in the sixth.

Individual statistics for the game were: Jason Payne, two for three with three runs, one double and two walks; Mickey McClure, three for five with three runs batted in; J.D. Bussell, zero for zero with one run and four

walks; Jason Hunt, zero for three with one run batted in and two walks; Jason Goff, zero for four; Scottie Cotton, two for three with one run, two doubles and a walk; Greg Goff, zero for four with one run; Eric McKinney, two for four with a double; Greg Bowman, zero for one with two runs and two walks and John Martin, one for one with one run.

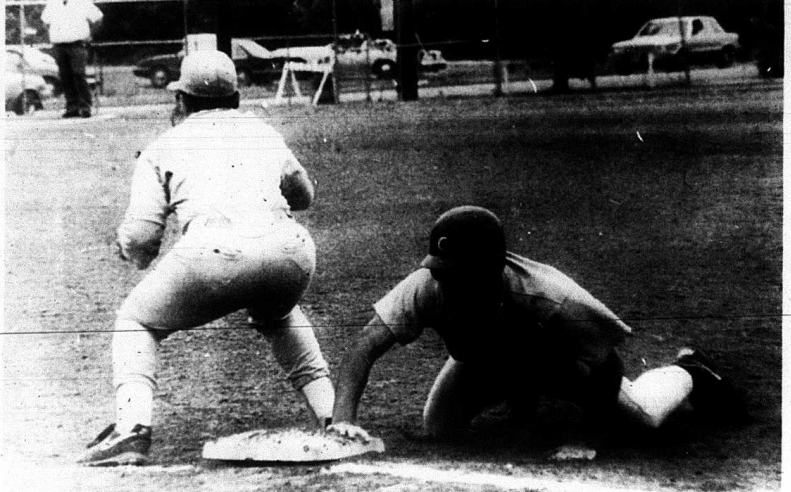
In regional action Tuesday, the Rockets were eliminated 10-2 by a solid Middlesboro team.

Middlesboro produced one run in the fourth and three runs each in the final three innings.

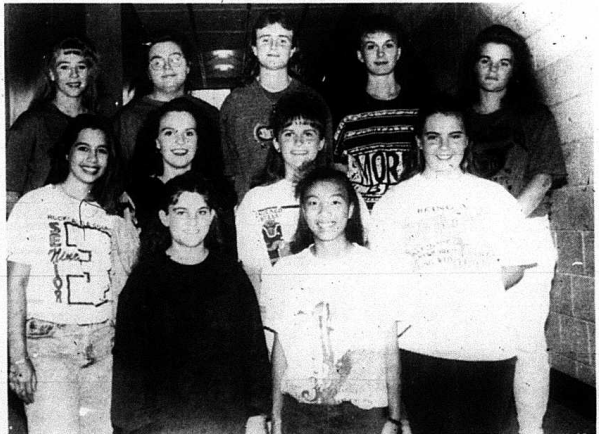

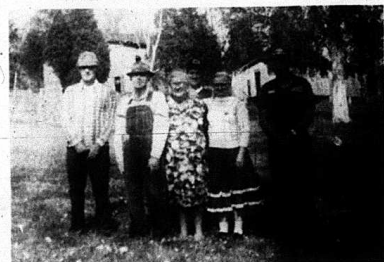
Thursday at 8 p.m., the Homemakers Club of Brodhead met at Sowders Nursing Home on the Bird Watching Room.
