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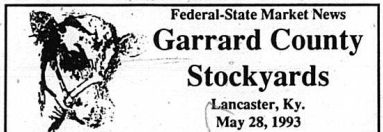

## Wind storm, rain race across Rockcastle

### Body in lake was man from Ohio

A slip of the tongue has led to the identification of a man found floating in Lake Linville April 20, 1987. He has been identified as Terry Dean Leatherman of Lima, Ohio, and when found he was partially clothed and had no identification on his body. He had been shot.

According to State Police, an unidentified woman was arrested for a parole violation and, during her interrogation, she mentioned a body in a lake in Rockcastle County.

A check at the post revealed the story of finding a body in Lake Linville in 1987. The body was then identified by dental charts.

When the body was discovered it caused a stir in the area. Questions were asked: was he local? Was he someone's husband? Father? Brother?

Then State Police Detective Ernie Boggs dived in the lake in search of some evidence. As time went by no identification was forthcoming. Slowly the incident became a passing memory.

The body was found by David Stewart of Orlando and son Boyd, when the man's clothing got caught in the propeller of their boat while they were fishing near the dock.

Deputy Coroner Roy Martin estimated the body had been in the lake six to eight weeks. But the results of the autopsy indicated the body could have been in as long as six months.

Many opined that a car drove up on I-75 at the lake dam and rolled the body into the lake or at some other spot.

### Trees down, lights out

A savage windstorm raced across Rockcastle Friday afternoon downing trees, damaging houses and knocking out electricity to many homes.

As of Monday not all electric was back on in some Jackson County RECC areas.

The wind, clocked by the National Weather Service at 100 miles an hour in some places, sent trees toppling, roofs blown away and outbuildings flattened.

Brodhead looked like a "tossed salad" someone said. The same with the Cove Branch area where lines were twisted and broken.

Every area in the county was affected, and most people had a "storm story" or "tree story" to tell.

A mobile home belonging to J.E. Robinson on Maple Grove Ridge was virtually destroyed. Lori Burdette lost part of her house and porch at Brush Creek. She had another house damaged on Brindle Ridge. Mike Halcomb of Brodhead lost his Dodge truck to a tree. Gilbert Dawson lost his pontoon boat at Lake Linville. Sowder Nursing Home had to use a generator while policeman Joe Bussell worked on it.

The storm came from the west-southwest, preceded by a black, threatening sky. "I knew it was going to be bad," someone said. "But I couldn't do anything about it."

There was a heavy spiral of rain as the storm passed. A total of .73 of an inch fell at Cox Funeral Home, and the funeral home lost a large tree in its front yard.

People huddled scared when caught in stores in the area. Customers in E.C. Porter store in Mt. Vernon were moved to the back of the store in case the large front windows blew out. They were still intact after the wind passed. "But everyone was sure scared," one customer said.

Many county roads and highways were blocked by trees and limbs. U.S. 150 east and west in Brodhead was blocked for an hour and a half. So were many other roads throughout the county.

K.U. officials in Mt. Vernon reported power back on across Rockcastle except in spots where trees or limbs crushed or fell on buildings.

Only one death was reported in the state due to the storm. A Franklin County man drowned when he went to open a gate on his farm near a creek. The water swept him away.

Auto accidents were numerous due to the wind and sleet and rain. Brodhead there was no hail reported in Rockcastle although it was numerous in other areas of the state.

The storm dumped 2.6 inches of rain on Lexington, a record for June 4. The old record 1.03 inches fell on June 4, 1908.

### Holbrook will be write-in candidate

Incumbent first district magistrate Charles D. "Boom Boom" Holbrook has filed his papers in the Rockcastle County clerk's office as a write-in candidate in this fall's general election.

Holbrook, a republican, was defeated by Shannon Bishop in the primary election. 231 to 213. On the printed ballot Bishop will face democrat John Holbrook, who defeated Jerry Ross.

"I am the only true republican on the ballot in this fall's general election," Holbrook said Tuesday.

"I have worked very hard to represent all the constituents in my district and I believe that I will be the best man for the job, the next five years," Holbrook said.

### Escapes captured

Two escapees from an Illinois Minimum Security prison were arrested at the home of a relative in Rockcastle Monday.

Jeffrey Hyde, 19, no address, and William Singleton, 24, of the Red Hill area, were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan at the home of his grandmother, Vivian Singleton.

Officers at the State Police Post at London reported the two walked away from a work release program in Illinois. Police said they stole a pickup

truck in Illinois, came to Marshall County, Kentucky and stole a Kentucky license plate and drove to Red Hill where they were arrested.

The two were charged with receiving stolen property. They waived extradition and will be returned to Illinois.

Hyde was serving time on a theft conviction. Singleton was serving a sentence on six counts of armed robbery.

### City council meets

Public hearings and first and second readings of various housekeeping items occupied the Mt. Vernon City Council at its Monday night meeting.

Public hearings on municipal road aid, (\$25,000) Local Government Economic Assistance (\$4,000), a public hearing on the general fund and on water and sewer.

First readings on the city budget which was reported earlier as was worker's compensation contract. Jack Rowe came to the council to ask for a lower speed limit on West Main Street.

The council was sympathetic but told him West Main Street is a state highway and signs or changes must come from the highway department. Mayor Gary R. Cromer said he would step up patrols on the street and contact the highway department in Somerset.

Kenneth Hopkins presented a petition to the council from residents in the West Main Street and Williams Street area protesting early morning deliveries and pick-ups by trucks especially at E.C. Porter store.

Hopkins' petition noted "a number of times each week from 5 a.m. to 6:30 a.m. a tractor-trailer with a gasoline engine refrigerated, backs into E.C. Porter parking lot. This gas engine runs sometimes as long as two hours. This disturbs and wakes up the residents in this area. We request that these trucks not be allowed in the area before 7 a.m. We want to be a good neighbor to E.C. Porter, but we think E.C. Porter is obligated to be a good neighbor to the citizens in this area."

The petition also noted BEE garage pickup at the store between 4:30 a.m. and 5 a.m.

The mayor said he would contact Porter's since a formal complaint had been filed with the city.

The petition contained eight residents in the area. Councilman Clark "Joe" Mullins asked the mayor to ask the state highway department to post a crosswalk on U.S. 25 at Renfro Valley asking visitors to be careful when crossing the road after Barn Dances.

### RECC talks about storm

The Jackson County RECC issued a statement Monday concerning the storm. It noted:

Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation was hard hit by the winds that accompanied the severe thunderstorms that raged across the state.

Along with extensive damage to many homes and businesses, the storm caused tremendous damage to power lines and equipment across the entire service area of Jackson County RECC. This resulted in a large number of RECC members being without electric service.

By the time the storm was over late Friday afternoon, Jackson County RECC had a total of 14 sub-stations down and around 25,000 members out of electric service. Since cooperative crews were still on the job at the time the storm hit they were able to begin some of the repairs immediately, however the damage was so extensive and so widespread that it also took some time to identify all the different areas that needed attention.

From that point the process began of organizing crews and dispatching them to the primary distribution lines leading from the sub-stations.

These primary lines are the main lines that must be repaired before the other line sections can be restored. From there crews begin to work their way onto the different line sections to repair them and then to the individual home services that may be down.

Crews have been working around the clock since the storm hit to restore service. We have had extra crews with cooperatives and also contractors from Tennessee, Ohio, Virginia and from within the state working along with our own co-op crews to try to repair the widespread damage.

I am attempting to mold the behavior of two Dalmatians that are ten months old today. They are litter mates, brother and sister, but as Harry Caullid might have observed, they seem to have come from a pretty thin gene pool. They are particularly deficient in those genes that have to do with intelligence.

I've tried all the gentle persuasion stuff. I've said, "Good Dog," a million times, 999,997 of which were well intentioned lies. I've tried using dog biscuits. Heck I've even tried chunks of Polish Sausage which they relish above all other food forms. But not much of the stuff they need to know has sunk in very deep. And most of that hit empty space instead of brain tissue.

So I've resorted to violence. By climbing up in a maple tree in our front yard I can get pretty much out of sight of the dogs and still have a clear, straight view along the shoulder of Highway 52. I also have an old Daisy BB rifle that can raise a blister at 40 yards. I turn the dogs loose, get up in my blind and wait for them to head for the road. When they get within three feet I yell "No" at the top of my voice and commence throwing lead.

They still ain't afraid of fog truck going sixty miles an hour, but they have figured out that the road is a bad place to go.

My garden, on the other hand, is a subject they have not yet comprehended. So when I turn my dogs loose I have to stand guard with a five gallon bucket full of big hard dirt clods. When one of 'em gets in the garden I do my best to break him/her down and I throw a tantrum. In the meantime I'll sit on the tailgate and read and, best of all, watch song birds.

Song birds, by the way is really what the column is about this week. However, if I didn't have dogs that I can't trust out by themselves, I wouldn't have caught onto the birds. Almost every place we've lived we've had bluejays, robins, cardinals and the occasional wren, sparrow or bluebird. And the ever present starling/cowbird curse.

Anyway, the back side of my garden has a wire fence that runs 150 feet or so and separates it from the pasture. The fence is strung on big locust posts that somebody's ancestors put in the ground many years ago. The posts still have a lot of life left in them but they are cracked and slowly rot-

ting which means that they attract bugs and worms and stuff that birds like to eat.

And the birds show up every day, from dawn till nine o'clock and from 6:30 till nearly dark. Or anytime that it has been raining and suddenly the sun pops back out and when a storm is brewing. I've told the family that I either want a fully equipped bass boat for Father's Day or a decent field guide that will help me identify several species of birds that I see every day. I've seen photographs of hairy woodpeckers, for example, and I'm pretty sure that the redheaded, white collared and underlined, dark gray topped couple shown us regularly.

We also have a different sort of wren than I've ever seen nesting in the shed. Meadow larks (I think) show up every day. Baltimore Orioles I can recognize and brown thrushes, but we have something light brown with a yellow ring around its neck and some black highlights on its crown that has me baffled. We also have five or six species of swallow (I think), or flycatcher (maybe), grosbeak (perhaps) that show up regularly along with purple martins. All these guys fly all the time except that they will occasionally stop atop one of the posts

to catch their breath.

They'll also hop through the garden and snatch up potato bugs that I've just squashed.

Loretta and the kids have worried about me of late. I have in fact, spent a lot of time out beside the garden sort of stanning out into space at first glance. But actually I watch an aviary display that's better than anything I've ever seen on The Discover Channel.

Maybe, if they think I really am going nuts, they'll get me the bass boat. So keep this to yourself for a week or two if you don't care. And if you like to watch birds, give me a call. I wonder what they'd think if they drove up and saw half a dozen of us staring out across the garden.

Gardening tip: Good friend and fellow gardener, Steve LeBrun, from Lancaster suggests using damp newspaper covered with grass clippings and a bit of dirt to keep it from blowing away as much around your garden plants. ## Heresay

Last Sunday my pastor delivered a superb sermon on the fall of King Saul—said there's some Saul in us all. And he wisely employed *circumlocution* ("talking around") to explain what Saul was doing when Samuel, the prophet, found and anointed him. Actually, Saul was searching for the "lost asses" of Kish, his father.

How that one animal has affected the public reading of Scripture! Even preachers who insist on using only *The King James Version of the Holy Bible* (KJV) substitute "donkey" for "ass." And they should! It keeps the hearers from cracking up. (Likewise, the preacher who habitually says, "Simon Peter," avoids many a gaffe.) We normally use the term "ass" to

denote the *gluteus maxima*, a set of muscles located in the lower, posterior portion of one's torso—talk about circumlocution!—or to denote a hardy animal that is the symbol of the Democratic Party. (All the same to some.)

The force of Scripture is often weakened, however, by bashful substitution of synonyms and such. For example, "The Book of Acts" tells how Simon Magus tried to buy the power of the Holy Spirit (Acts 8:14ff). According to the KJV, Peter said to Simon Magus, "Thy money perish with thee, because thou hast thought that the gift of God may be purchased with money." The *New King James Version* says, "Your money perish

with you."

Other versions read somewhat the same: "May destruction overtake thy money and you," etc. Even *The Living Bible*, a popular and fairly good—though theologically flawed in places—paraphrase, from which you expect "freeing up," only has Peter reply, "Your money perish with you."

If you want the outright thrust of what Peter really said, read *Today's English Version*, better known as the "Good News for Modern Man" version. Translator Robert Bratcher, who caught the connotation of the original Greek, hit the nail on the head with "May you and your money go to hell!"

Because we are afraid of the language of certain Scriptures, we don't read them aloud at all. Consider these "not-for-the-public" lines from the KJV of "The Song of Solomon" (also called "Cantic"; "Song of Songs," and "The Song").

"Let him kiss me with the kisses of his mouth: for thy love is better than wine." (1:2)

"A bundle of myrrh is my wellbeloved unto me; he shall lie all night betwixt my breasts." (1:13)

"His left hand is under my head, and his right hand doth embrace me." (2:6)

"Behold, thou art fair, my love.... thy hair is as a flock of goats, that appear on Mt. Gilead..."

...Thy lips are like a bundle of scarlet... Thy neck is like the tower of David... Thy two breasts are like two young roes that are twins, which feed among the lilies." (4:1-5)

(Hello, young suitor, whoever you are. Try these whimsical words on your board: "Your hair is like a flock of goats bounding under the slopes of

Gilead." She'll bless you forever!) How do we deal with such language and imagery? Usually, we totally ignore them. But even when many interpreters do confront them, they turn "The Song" into an allegory about the love of Christ for his Church and vice-versa. Bernard of Clairvaux, a Roman Catholic monk and mystic (1090-1153) made that exposition popular. And Protestants (includes Baptists) have taken up Bernard's approach without giving him any credit.

Is that what "The Song" is about? I doubt it. What sense would such an allegory have had for the Israelites before the time of Christ? The Hebrews welcomed this world and its material and sensual life. They saw nothing wrong in a healthy enjoyment of all the "joys" of the flesh. It was only when sex was twisted to wicked ends, as in the ceremonies of their Canaanite neighbors, that Israel's prophets wailed "Whoa!" or "Woe!"

As I write this column, I have open before me a biblical commentary. Listen to what one knowledgeable scholar says: "Above all, we have in the Song of Solomon an erotic and joyous celebration of sexual love, which in its explicitness and its essential cleanness is unsurpassed in the love poetry of any literature."

Now that rings right to me! If only someone had told me so when I was a child. (At one time I actually believed "Buckley" Bales when he said a couple had to have sexual intercourse four times in order for the woman to conceive!) Who knows how much perversion and vice-gripping guilt might not exist today had

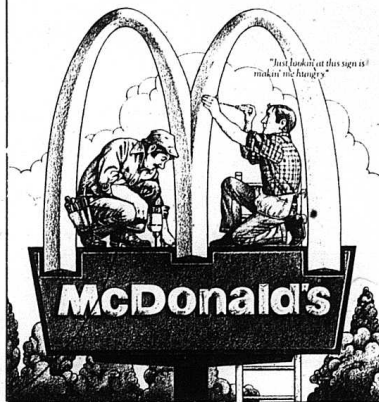

Dear Editor,

When your neighbors are talking about you, sooner or later their words will get back to you. It seems that there are some who consider me to be a heathen. The truth is they may be right.

I am an advocate of laissez-faire capitalism, of individual rights (there are no others) of individual freedom. It is on this ground that I oppose any doctrine which proposes the sacrifice of the individual to the collective, such as communism, socialism, the welfare state, fascism, nazism and modern liberalism. I oppose the conservatives on the same ground. The conservatives are advocates of a mixed economy and a welfare state. Their difference from the liberals is only one of degree, not of principle. Does that make me a heathen?

It is ideas that determine social trends, that create or destroy social systems. Therefore, the right ideas, the right philosophy, should be advocated and spread. The disasters of the modern world, including the destruction of capitalism, were caused by the altruist-collectivist philosophy. It is altruism that man should reject. Does that make me a heathen?

Ethics is a system of moral principles to guide man's choices and actions—the choices and actions which determine the purpose and course of his life. Altruism is a moral system which holds that man has no right to exist for his own sake, and self-sacrifice is his highest moral duty, value, and virtue. This is the moral base of collectivism, of all dictatorialisms. In order to seek freedom and capitalism, men need a non-mystical, non-altruistic, rational code of ethics—a morality which holds that man is not a sacrificial animal.

that he has a right to exist for his own sake, not by sacrificing himself to others nor sacrificing others to himself. Does that make me a heathen?

How do we know what is true? Perhaps the answer to that question was best answered by the Dutch rationalist and philosopher Spinoza. It was he, Spinoza, who said, "That which contradicts nature contradicts reason and that which contradicts reason is absurd and ipso-facto to be rejected?" Was Spinoza a heathen?

We might just have a better nation if there were more heathens and a lot less liberals and conservatives.

My neighbor was right—I am a heathen, and now that I think about it I am damn proud to be called one.

We offer our sympathy and condolences to her family who buried her last week.

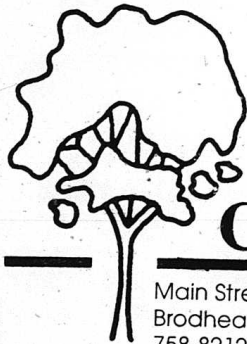

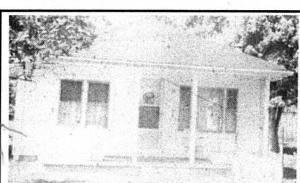

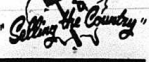

### ORDINANCE 2-93

#### SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE

An ordinance of the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky (City) augmenting Ordinance No. 287 as amended by Ordinance Nos. 5-87, 5-89, 1-0-90, 4-92 and 8-92, and the city's sewer use ordinance, Ordinance No. 2-87, all of which pertain to the water and sewer utility services provided to people living within the service area of the city's municipal water distribution system and municipal sanitary sewer collection system and setting forth policy, definitions, rules and regulations concerning the design, construction, and the connection of water distribution systems and/or sanitary sewer collection systems to the city's municipal water distribution system and municipal sanitary sewer collection system, respectively.

Upon request, the City of Mt. Vernon has permitted water distribution systems and sewer collection systems to be connected to the City's municipal water distribution system and its municipal sanitary collection system. To ensure protection of the public health, safety and welfare of the users of the systems and to protect the individual water and sewer systems, the City of Mt. Vernon has adopted Ordinance No. 2-93. The ordinance describes the minimum criteria and standards required for the design and construction of water distribution system and sanitary sewer system before connection to the City's systems. The requirements included water pressures, pumps, materials, water mains, depth and slope for sewer lines, pipe size, manholes, force mains inspection and testing of liens. The ordinance describes the process required to obtain a permit to connect to the City's systems and authorizes the collection of a permit and inspection fee:

#### Section 3 Permit:

No unauthorized owner of a water distribution system and/or sanitary sewer collection system shall uncover, make any connection with or opening into, use, alter or disturb any municipal water line or municipal sanitary sewer line or its appurtenances belonging to the City of Mt. Vernon without first obtaining a written permit from the City. In all cases, the owner of a water distribution system and/or sanitary sewer collection system shall make application for a permit to connect to the City's municipal water distribution system and/or municipal sanitary sewer collection system, respectively. The permit application shall be supplemented by information required to administer this ordinance and assurances from the owner of the water and/or sewer system that they will comply with all City ordinances pertaining to the City's municipal water distribution system and/or municipal sanitary sewer collection system. A permit and inspection fee of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) plus all reasonable costs incurred by the City to provide the permit and to perform the inspection(s) shall be paid to the City. The two hundred dollar fee shall be paid at the time the permit application is filed.

No permit will be issued if the connection will adversely affect the City's ability to serve its present customers. The ordinance also allocates the other costs and expenses incidental to the connection of a water or sewer line to the City's systems and requires the owner of the system to indemnify the City from any loss or damage occurring from the installation of a system subsequently connected to one of the City's systems.

## Some farms could lose Burley Tobacco quota

Beginning with the 1994 burley tobacco crop, farms with no planted or considered planted credits in at least two of the past three years will be dropped, according to Harold Ballinger, CEO, of the Rockcastle County ASCS office.

"We are notifying the owners of farms with no burley tobacco planting credit in 1991 and 1992, that they may sell their quota by July 1, 1993, to avoid being dropped," Ballinger said.

He said farm owners with planting credit in either 1991 or 1992, but

not both, must either plant burley tobacco in 1993, receive considered planted credit in 1993 by leasing the quota to another farm, or sell the quota by July 1, 1993.

The change in burley tobacco annual quota calculations for lack of planting credit is required by the Farm Foundation Quota Revisions Act of 1990. Producers with questions are urged to contact the local ASCS office, immediately.

## U.S. Court prayer ruling

The U.S. Supreme Court Monday opened the door for greater religious activity in public schools.

The court ruled that school officials may not exclude a group or speaker from their grounds just because they intend to offer a religious message.

To do so violates the Church group's free speech right, the court said.

In addition, permitting the Christian group to meet at the school cannot be viewed as the school endorsing religion or any particular creed.

The court refused without comment to hear a challenge to a federal appeal court ruling from Texas that permitted high school seniors to open and close their graduation with a prayer.

It allows a member of the senior class to deliver a prayer at graduation.

which through Sunday night included 53 poles that were reported as broken and needing replaced.

As earlier stated, there were approximately 25,000 members out of service on Friday night. This was reduced to around 9,000 by Saturday night, to 4,000 by Sunday night and as of Monday morning the number was down to approximately 3,500 members. By the time of this press release (approximately 12 noon on Monday) the number had been reduced to approximately 1,600 members.

The best estimate for replacement of the broken poles that have been reported and repair of all "primary" power lines (primary lines meaning the "main" service lines) was by late Monday evening.

This does not mean that all service will be restored by Monday night; there may still be line sections and individual services to be repaired. Please understand also that as crews continue to work through the damage and makes repairs, it is almost certain that they will find some other damage that has yet to be reported and may take additional time.

Damage in Rockcastle County was fairly widespread across the county with the areas of Brush Creek, Disputanta, and Scaffold Cane seemingly the hardest hit. At the time of this press release there were approximately 300 members still without power in Rockcastle County.

The cooperative wishes to express its thanks to so many who have been so understanding about the loss of their electric service and so helpful during this period of time. Also we wish to apologize for a problem we were having initially with our telephone system.

It seems that we had all eight of our phone lines ringing in, but only four of those lines were coming through our system for our operators to answer. Therefore to many of our callers it sounded as though no one was answering the calls even though our operators were standing by around the clock to receive those calls. This was corrected later on. We are sorry for any added inconvenience this has caused anyone.

May we also continue to caution our members and the general public concerning safety around "any" downed wires. Please report any wires down in your area and be sure to keep everyone away from the wires until the proper personnel can arrive. Do not touch any downed wire and never assume that a line is dead.

Please be aware of the number that you can call in Rockcastle County to report the outages in your area 24-hours-a-day. That Toll Free number is 1-800-262-7480.

## Ford named to Unions' Dean's List

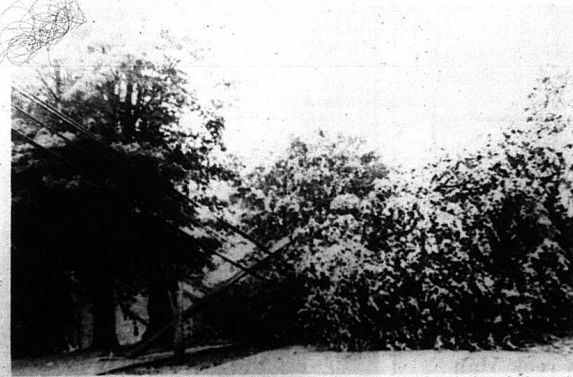
Dr. Paul S. Moore, vice president for Academic Affairs at Union College, recently announced the 1993 spring semester Presidential Laureates and Dean's List.

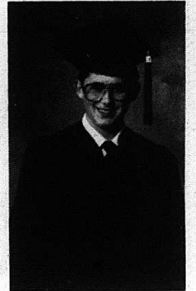

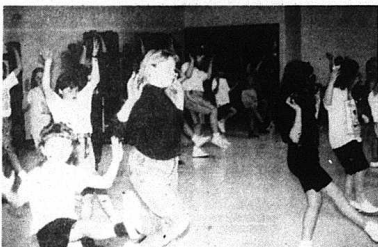
