Miss Hammond awarded doctor of medicine degree

Rebecca Hammond was awarded a Doctor of Medicine degree from the University of Kentucky College of Medicine at commencement ceremonies held Saturday, May 15, 1993, at UK's Singletary Center for the Arts. Dr. Emery Wilson, dean of the College of Medicine, presented members of the thirty graduating class with their degrees and doctoral hoods.

The class received greetings from Dr. Peter P. Bosomworth, chancellor, UK Chandler Medical Center. Following commencement, a reception for the new doctors and their families was held in the foyer of the Singletary Center.

The College of Medicine was ranked among the nation's top 10 best primary care medical schools for the third consecutive year by *U.S. News and World Report* magazine. The ranking appeared in the magazine's annual "America's Best Graduate Schools," issued in March 1993.

More than half of the students who participated in the 1993 National Residency Program have chosen to receive postgraduate residency training in primary care medicine. Of the 87 UK graduates, 54 percent will enter programs in primary care medicine.

Primary care residencies include family practice, internal medicine,

pediatrics and a combined program in medicine and pediatrics.

Thirty-four students will enter residency programs in Kentucky including 26 at the UK Medical Center, four at St. Elizabeth Medical Center (Edgewood), one at Trover Clinic (Madisonville) and one at the University of Louisville.

Hammond was a member of the American Academy of Family Physicians. She graduated with distinction and will begin a family practice residency in Savannah, GA. Hammond is the daughter of Leonard and Demie Hammond, Mt. Vernon.

State lifts ban on water line extension

A water line extension ban in effect in the Western Water Association has been lifted by the State Division of Water.

A letter to Charles Burton, president of the association from John T. Smither, manager of the division, said the lifting of the ban on new lines is due to a purchase agreement with Mt. Vernon for 10 million gallons a month.

The letter stated that since Western already purchases about 89 percent of the 10 million gallons a month allotment, the lifting of the ban is subject to certain requirements.

It said, "Plans submitted to this office (Division of Water) for the construction or modification to the public water system shall include a

letter submitted by the utility (association) stating the expected additional daily water demand from the proposed project; the average daily water purchased for the previous year; and the resulting excess capacity available for future use without exceeding the purchase contract.

Smither wrote that "any amendment to the purchase agreement between Western Water Association and Mt. Vernon which increases the amount of water available for purchase will be reviewed by this office (Division of Water) and may result in lifting of the above requirement.

The ban went into effect March 13, 1990 amid reports of water shortages in the area.

There was reportedly an argument between several individuals at 1:25 a.m. gathering which resulted in the double shooting, police reported.

Jerry Lee Denny, 26, of Mt. Ver-

non was arrested Monday for the shooting of Payne and charged with murder. He was also charged with assault in the first degree.

He was lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail under \$300,000 bond. The shooting is being investigated by Kentucky State Police Detective James Vanhook.

State Trooper Jimmy Silvers and Sgt. Doyle Stogisdill, Rockcastle Sheriff's Department and Mt. Vernon Police Department assisted in the investigation.

Payne was born Nov. 4, 1974 in Rockcastle County the son of Paul "Toddy" and Connie Sowder Payne of Pine Hill. He was a logger and a member of the Maple Grove Baptist

Church.

Survivors besides his parents are two brothers, Derrick and Rodney Payne, both of Pine Hill, his paternal grandparents, Ada Hines Payne of Mt. Vernon and the late Cecil Payne; his maternal grandparents, Ulyssis and Betty Sowder of Pine Hill; his great grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Taylor of Pine Hill. Three uncles and seven aunts also survive.

Services were June 16 at the Maple Grove Baptist Church, with Bro. Tim Hampton officiating. Burial was in Elmwood Cemetery. Cox Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Blue Mold gets closer to county

Blue mold, a fungus can devastate unprotected tobacco fields, has been confirmed in 15 Kentucky counties. Those counties include: Hart, Clinton, Larnie, Wayne, Casey, Garrard, Madison, Robertson, Harrison, Jackson, Morgan, Owen, Washington, Marion and Powell.

The blue mold warning that was issued two weeks ago remains in effect for all of the state, according to Bill Nesmith, an Extension plant pathologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

A blue mold warning means that there are spores in the air and weather and growing conditions would support infection.

"Weather conditions from June 3 through June 7 have been nearly ideal for the rapid dissemination and development of blue mold. Traditional plant beds and transplanted crops are being exposed to significant inoculum at this time. Hot temperatures June 8 should slow the spread of the disease," Nesmith said.

Nesmith said that symptoms of plants submitted to the University of Kentucky Plant Disease Diagnostic Laboratory and field visits suggest the initial infection occurred in late April or early May.

Ridomil, a fungicide labelled for control of blue mold in tobacco beds and fields, appears to be controlling the disease in protected plant beds and fields, Nesmith said.

He noted that most of the confirmed cases of blue mold have been

in float transplant, rather than traditional plant bed, systems of production, but some activity is occurring in traditional plant beds and unprotected fields.

"Some of the outbreaks of blue mold have involved commercial transplant production, so the tobacco industry must appreciate that movement of blue mold inoculum by means of other than wind is of significant

concern," he said.

Blue mold-infested transplants have been set in fields causing outbreaks of the disease, he said.

Tobacco growers are advised to maintain blue mold controls in plant beds and fields and to contact their county extension agricultural agent if they suspect blue mold in their tobacco, he said.

Tobacco planting lags behind in county

Many Kentucky tobacco farmers are still struggling to get their crops out after a wet, cool spring followed by onsets of hail, high winds and an outbreak of blue mold.

All that after a disappointing 1992 season.

"Nowadays you've really got to like to farm to be a farmer," said Leo Bezdol, a southern Campbell County tobacco grower.

Now it's got to be almost a hobby.

Hail two weeks ago hit Bezdol's farm especially hard, "Practically destroying" two acres of tobacco and leaving him about two weeks behind schedule in setting the plants. A lot of other farmers are in the same situation.

The Kentucky Agricultural Statistics Service estimates that as of Mon-

day, only 80 percent of the 200,000 acres of burley expected this year had been set, compared with 92 percent at this time last year.

Recent rains did not help farmers make up the lost time.

"It seems like every time we get a chance to get out and get some work done, we get another shower," said Kenton County Extension agent L.J. Osborne.

Despite the problems, farmers and officials are saying they can still pull off a good season.

John Berry Jr., president of the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association, said it's too early to panic. Ideally, he said, all tobacco should be set by mid-June, but farmers can plant it as late as the first week of July and still be productive.

Marijuana season starts

The marijuana season is about to get underway.

State Trooper Craig Sutton and Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan found 72 plants at Burn and destroyed them.

Trooper Sutton located about 325 plants in the Pine Hill area and confiscated them.

Deputy Doan also pulled up 11 plants near Brodhead recently.

There's a story there. Keep reading.

Former Magistrate Danny Serpant was cutting hay. Looking across the

field he saw what appeared to be a deer. He went closer and two men jumped up and ran away.

Deputy Doan responded and found 11 marijuana plants that had just been planted. It was muddy around them where they'd just been watered.

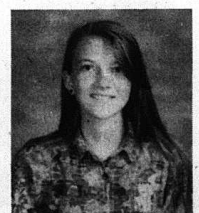

A few weeks back I lit into the Letcher County School system for discouraging the formation of School Councils and impeding real school reform as mandated by law.

I received a few calls and some hate mail from one corner and some amen brothers from the other and I kept holding up Garrard County, where I live and worship, as the example that non-conformist school systems might, after repenting, do well to copy.

I'm here this week to rescind that. I'm sorry to my friends and foes alike in Letcher County that I went around bragging on our school system. I still think we're more honest but somewhere along the line you have to start putting a value on competence, values, and common sense. Please don't come to Garrard County if that's what you're looking for. Those commodities are scarce here and we don't have any to pass around.

We have kids in one of our schools who earned straight A's on her report card last semester. Well-behaved and generally the kind of kid who you wish your own was just like. The sort of kid that every teacher loves to educate but only coming along about twice out of every hundred. Honor student, you'd think, if you spent more than ten minutes with the kid.

And honor student she is. Except for this semester. Her parents took vacation this year when every other school system in the Commonwealth was on Spring Break. They planned the time off because they both work for different companies and it's very difficult to schedule time off when the kids are also out of school, but they pulled it off and made plans.

Then, two weeks before the rest of you went away, our school system cancelled three days of spring break.

They had to do it because they cancelled classes county wide while our high school girls' basketball team participated in the all A state basketball tournament. That's right, even the elementary and middle schools were shut down with one day's notice. A thousand kids were turned out of school for two days while maybe 200 went to a basketball game. I was at both games and 200 hundred students is probably stretching it.

But anyway, the kid I've been talking about has parents who had made vacation plans without much allegiance to the high school girls' basketball team because their kid is in elementary school. So they took it for a week and took the kid with them. As a consequence the kid had two or three days of unexcused absence. And does not qualify for the Honor Roll in spite of straight A's.

The kid I'm talking about has parents who believe making Honor Roll is important enough to bring the matter to the attention of the Superintendent and the Board of Education, because it turns out that numerous other kids are victims of the same circumstances.

Now common sense would dictate to any sane person that a couple of high school girls' basketball games should not have much affect on the academic standing and achievement verification of elementary school students. A couple of basketball games should not affect the way that every family in the county lives...

But don't tell that to our Superintendent of Schools because he feels

and he has argued otherwise. Those of us who live in Garrard County have an obligation to elect some board members or convince the ones we have now that we would like to see a little bit of competence and appropriate values and common sense in the person sitting behind the desk of our chief school official. We don't need to be shelling out around \$100,000 a year in salary and benefits to anyone who can't do any better than let a

bunch of crap like this happen. Our school board needs to be apologizing to the kids who are being cheated and hurt in this folly. And we need to be looking for a superintendent with just a little common sense. In the meantime, if you read this column in a paper outside Garrard County, I'm sorry for leading you on. There's not much to brag about here after all. But please give us a couple of years and call again.

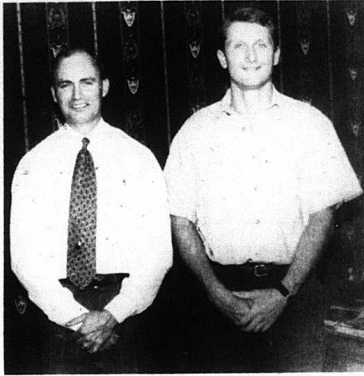

George Rafferty has been practicing veterinary medicine for 40 years in the picturesque highlands of Scotland. His way of life and that of the other inhabitants of his rural community recall a time past.

Local woman wins national award

A 29-year-old mother has a devastating car crash and loses her ability to speak. She cannot tell her children and her husband that she loves them. What would it feel like to help a mother speak to her family again?

"That gives you a lot of personal satisfaction," said Linda Fairchild Peavie, director of speech services at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center in Mt. Vernon.

Doubly satisfying is the national honor Peavie was accorded recently by her peers when she was presented the American Speech and Hearing Foundation's Louis M. DiCarlo Award, which honors accomplishments in the advancement of clinical service in speech-language pathology and audiology.

Peavie, one of 25 candidates for the prestigious award, also received a \$10,000 grant to further the innovative programs she has developed over the past three years.

"It's really amazing that I won when I was competing with people who wrote some of the textbooks that I used in college," said Peavie, who earned her bachelor's and master's degrees from Eastern Kentucky University in 1983 and 1986, respectively.

Nancy Swigert, newly-elected American Speech and Hearing Association (ASHA) vice president for governmental affairs, said: "Linda has opened up a communication link. She changes the patients and it's even more remarkable in a rural area because she doesn't have much help."

One innovative program she developed, especially for a rural area, is an outpatient program at the Rockcastle Hospital that currently serves 14 children ages 2-5 with severe speech disorders. The children, who must be referred by a physician, come from many different counties across Kentucky. Before the program was

launched, patients would try to use services available through a local school system.

She also developed a full-time inpatient program in 1989 for ventilator-dependent individuals. Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, the only hospital in the state with a long-term care facility for ventilator-dependent patients, attracts people from all over the eastern U.S. Although none of the ventilator-dependent patients at the center are expected to be weaned away from the machine, a "high rate" of approximately 30 percent of the patients eventually are.

Adult ventilator-dependent patients learn how to use a communication board or talk again. Ventilator-dependent children must work on feeding and swallowing, and learning to speak with the help of a valve.

For example, Peavie works regularly with a 2 1/2-year-old child with Down Syndrome who is slowly being weaned away from the ventilator so that he can breathe on his own. She helps him to eat on his own and learn to communicate his needs and wants. His father is eager to take him home, whether on a ventilator or not.

A Monticello native and Wayne County High School graduate who now lives in Somerset, Peavie joined Rockcastle Hospital in 1989 after completing some contract work there. At that time, the hospital had no full-time speech pathologist. Although she had worked in the Pulaski County School District, Peavie saw a great need for speech communication services at the hospital, and eventually convinced the hospital executives to hire her full time.

"My purpose is to help people communicate," said Peavie. "Although people are on a ventilator, they still have a heart, feelings and a

will to live. It doesn't matter whether they have two years or two weeks left. They still need to communicate."

Dr. Lori Gonzalez, a communication disorders professor at the University of Kentucky, nominated Peavie for the DiCarlo award. A member of the Executive Board of the Kentucky Speech-Hearing Association (KSHA), Gonzalez worked with Peavie when she was a language aide in 1981 and encouraged her to go back to college. "Linda was a very good clinician even without training," said Gonzalez. "She treats the whole person rather than just the symptom."

Peavie's dedication impressed Joyce Walker, director of EKU's Speech-Language Hearing Clinic, the first day they met. "Linda is one of the hardest-working students I've ever seen," said Walker. "She has been focused on her goals since the first day I met her and she's continually achieving those goals."

Peavie also used a \$10,000 grant from the WHAS Crusade for Children fund drive to purchase a bus that transports up to four people in wheelchairs. The bus allows the patients to take trips that they would not ordinarily be able to take.

Peavie, who credits her grandfather's encouragement for her success, decided to pursue speech pathology at EKU because of Gonzalez's support and enthusiasm about her work in speech communication.

"Eastern gave me a good knowledge base," she said. "They have a really good communication disorders program," she said.

Peavie might give herself some of the credit for that. She supervises EKU and University of Kentucky
