Blue mold, a fungus can devastate unprotected tobacco fields, has been confirmed in 15 Kentucky counties. Those counties include: Hart, Clin-

Those counties include: Hart, Clin-on, Larue, Wayne, Casey, Garrard, Madison, Robertson, Harrison, Jackson, Morgan, Owen, Washing-ton, Marion and Powell.

The blue mold warning that was issued two weeks ago remains in effect for all of the state, according to Bill Nesmith, an Extension plant pa-thologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

A blue mold warning means that there are spores in the air and weather ánd growing conditions would sup-port infection.

and growing contains what support infection.

"Weather conditions from June 3 through June 7 have been nearly ideal for the rapid dissemination and development of blue mold. Traditional plant beds and transplanted crops are being exposed to significant inoculum at this time. Hot temperatures June 8 should slow the spread of the disease." Nesmith said.

Nesmith said that symptoms of plants submitted to the University of Kentucky Plant Disease Diagnostic Laboratory and field visits suggest the initial infection occurred in late April or early May.

Ridomil, a fungicide labelled for control of blue mold in tobacco beds and fields, appears to be controlling the disease in protected plant beds and fields, Nesmith said.

He noted that most of the confirmed cases of blue mold have been

mold have involved commercial ransplant production, so the tobacco flustry must appreciate that move-ent of blue mold inoculum by means

Blue mold-infested transplants have been set in fields causing out-breaks of the disease, he said.

Tobacco growers are advised to maintain blue mold controls in plant beds and fields and to contact their county extension agricultural agent if they suspect blue mold in their tobacco, he said.

Tobacco planting lags behind in county

Many Kentucky tobacco farmers are still struggling to get their crops out after a wet, cool spring followed by onslaughts of hail, high winds and an outbreak of blue mold. All that after a disappointing 1992 season.

"Nowadays you've really got to like to farm to be a farmer," said Leo Bezold, a southern Campbell County bacco grower.
Now it's got to be almost a hobby."

Hail two weeks ago hit Bezold's farm especially hard, "Practically destroying" two acres of tobacco and leaving him about two weeks behind schedule in setting the plants. A lot of other farmers are in the same situ-

The Kentucky Agricultural Statis-tics Service estimates that as of Mon-

day, only 80 percent of the 200,000 acres of burley expected this year had been set, compared with 92 percent at this time last year.



Local woman wins national award

A 29-year-old mother has a devasto speak. She cannot tell her children and her husband that she loves them. What would it feel like to help a speak to her family again

What would it feel like to help a mother speak to her family again?

"That gives you a lot of personal satisfaction," said Linda Fairchild Peavie, director of speech services at Rockeastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center in Mt. Vernon.

Doubly satisfying is the national hopor Peavie was accorded recently by her peers when she was presented the American Speech and Hearing Foundation's Louis-M. DiCarlo Award, which honors accomptishments in the advancement of clinical service in , speech-language pathol-ents in the advancement of clinical service in , speech-language pathol-goy and audiology. Peavie, one of 25 candidates for the pressigious saward, also received a 51,000 grant to further the innovative programs she has developed over the past three years. "It's really amazing that I wom when I was competing with people who

"It's really amazing that I won when I was competing with people who wrote some of the textbooks that I used in college," said Peavie, who earned her bachelor's and master's degrees from Eastern Kentucky University in 1983 and 1986, respec-

versity in 1983 and 1986; respectively.

Nancy Swigert, newly-elected American Speech and Hearing Association (ASITA) vice president for governmental affairs, said: "Linda has opened up a communication fink. She changes the patients and it's even more remarkable in a rural area because she doesn't have much help." One innovative program at he Rock-castle Hospital that currently serves an outpatient program at the Rock-castle Hospital that currently serves speech disorders. The children gase 2.5 with severe speech disorders. The children, who must be refarred. The children application, come must be referred by a physician, come from many different counties across Kentucky. Before the program was

launched, patients would try to use services available through a local school system.

She also developed a full-time inpatient program in 1989 for ventilar-dependent individuals. Rock-castle Hospital and Respiratory Carette, the only hospital in the state with a long-term care facility for entilator-dependent patients, attracts people from all over the eastern U.S. Although none of the ventilator-dependent patients at Rockcastle are expected to be weaned away from the machine, a "high rate" of approximately 30 percent of the patients eventually are.

ventually are.
Adult ventilator-dependent patients learn how to use a communication board or talk again. Ventilator-de-

board or talk again. Ventilator-de-pendent children must work on feed-ing and swallowing, and learning to speak with the help of a valve. For example, Peavie works regu-larly with a 2 I/2-year-old child with Down Syndrome who is slowly being weanned away from the ventilator so that he can breathe on his own. She helps him to eat on his own. She helps him to eat on his new and learn communicate his needs and wants.

neips min to eat on his own and learn to communicate his needs and wants. His family is eager to take him hore, whether on a wentilator or not. A Monticello native and Wayne County High School graduate who now lives in Somerset, Peavie joined Rockeastle Hospial in 1989 after completing some contract work there. At that time, the hospial had no full-time speech pathologist. Although she had worked in the Pulaski County School District, Peavie saw a great need for speech communication services at the hospial, and eventually convinced the hospital axecutives to hite her full time.

hire her full time "My purpose is to help people mmunicate," said Peavie. "Although people are on a ventilator, they still have a heart, feelings and a will to live. It doesn't matter whether they have two years or two weeks left. They still need to communi-

Dr. Lori Gonzalez, a communica-Dr. Lori Gonzalez, a communica-tion disorders professor at the Uni-versity of Kentucky, nominated Peavie for the DiCarlo award. A member of the Executive Board of the Kentucky Speech-Hearing Asso-ciation (KSHA), Gonzales worked with Peavie when she way a language ciation (KSHA), Gonzales worked with Peavie when she was a language aide in 1981 and encouraged her to go back to college. "Linda was a very good clinician even without training," said Gonzalez. "She treats the whole person rather than just the symptom."

The bus allows the patients to take trips that they would not ordi-narily be able to take. Peavie, who credits her grandfa-



LOCAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

In 1992 the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education approved 702 KAR 1:001 which provides for the development and adoption of a written plan by the local school district describing both the school facilities and construction needs of the district. The regulation requires the local school district assume responsibility for development of a Local District Facility Plan. This process requires the selection of a Local Planning Committee to develop a Master Educational Facility Plan and District Facility Plan for capital construction.
The Master Educational Facility Plan contains an assessment of

various facts of the school district's attributes and operations

including the district profile, educational program, demographic information, facility conditions, transportation information and finances. This plan provides a comprehensive view of the overall program needs of the district and facility improvements needed to provide an equitable educational opportunity to all students in the district. The District Facility Plan for capital construction is developed subsequently to the Master Educational Facility Plan. The school district's local facility plan shall be developed and submitted for approval to the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education no later than March 1994. Local facility plans are to be developed once every four years and shall remain in effect until any changes have been approved by the State Board. The local facility plan shall be implemented to the extent the financial ability of the district shall permit as determined by the chief state school officer and the School Facilities Construc-

The individuals selected to serve on the Local Planning Committee will be placed in a very strategic and important role as relates to the school district and community. Once school commences in August 193 the committee will need to begin meeting to assimi-late all the district's data as the regulation requires. Therefore, each committee member should allow-for some time consump-tion in order to-prepare a desument, as required, to make recommendations to the local Board.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education is, in the process of

acquiring membership, as the regulation requires, for the Local Planning Committee. The regulation states that membership on the district committee shall consist of 4 parents, 4 teachers, 4 school building administrators, 1 central office administrator, 1 board member. 2 Community/Business leaders as nominated by themselves or the general public and selected by the School Board, and the Superintendent as a non-voting member. Also, the regulation states the makeup of the district committee shall include representation from at least 4 SBDM Councils.
