ORDINANCE NO. 4-93

An Ordinance approving a joint and cooperative program for self-insurance, insurance and the investment of public funds among various cities, urban-county governments, and other public agencies within the Commonwealth of Kentucky; authorizing the execution of the "Interlocal Cooperation Agreement to Establish the Kentucky Municipal Risk Management Association;" approving the Articles of Association and bylaws of the Kentucky Municipal Risk Management Association and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, Section 82.082 of the Kentucky Revised Statutes (KRS) authorizes cities to perform any function and exercise any power within their boundaries that is in furtherance of a public purpose of the city and not inconsistent with a constitutional provision or statute; and

WHEREAS, cities are authorized by KRS 65.150 to expend public funds to insure their officers, employees and properties against any liability or property damage and to associate with other public agencies pursuant to the Kentucky Interlocal Cooperation Act, KRS 65.210 to 65.300, for insurance purposes; and

WHEREAS, KRS 65.210 to 65.300 authorizes cities to jointly exercise with other public agencies under an interlocal cooperation agreement any power or powers, privileges or authority exercised or capable of exercise by cities, and further authorizes the parties to an interlocal cooperation agreement to create an administrative entity which may be delegated powers for conducting and administering joint and cooperative undertakings on behalf of the participating public agencies; and

WHEREAS, the elected officials of this city have determined that it would be in the best interests of the city to join with other cities, urban-county governments, and public agencies for the purpose of taking joint and cooperative action to create and establish the Kentucky Municipal Risk Management Association (KMRMA) as a separate administrative entity, and through KMRMA to create and administer various self-insurance, insurance and investment programs to provide self-insurance and third party insurance coverages against all types of liability and property damage, and to establish programs for the investment of public funds; and

WHEREAS, the elected officials of this city have been provided copies of the Interlocal Agreement to Establish the KMRMA and the Articles of Association and Bylaws of the KMRMA and have reviewed these documents and found them to be acceptable.

Now, therefore, be it ordained by the City of Mt. Vernon as follows:

Section 1. The city hereby approves the joint and cooperative program for self-insurance, insurance and the investment of public funds as set forth in the Interlocal Agreement to Establish the KMRMA.

Section 2. The Mayor and the City Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute the Interlocal Agreement to Establish the KMRMA on behalf of the city.

Section 3. The city hereby approves and ratifies the Articles of Association and Bylaws of the KMRMA, as amended.

Section 4. It is understood by the city that by executing the Interlocal Agreement to Establish the KMRMA the city shall incur no liability for the payment of any funds, and that it shall be necessary for the city to take further action before becoming a participating member in any of the self-insurance, insurance, or investment programs which may be created and operated by KMRMA.

Section 5. The city's current workers' compensation insurance coverage is due to expire on June 30, 1993. Under the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, the city is required to maintain workers' compensation insurance coverage on its employees. It is understood that KMRMA will begin operating a workers' compensation self-insurance group effective July 1, 1993, which will enable the city to obtain the necessary workers' compensation insurance coverage. However, unless the city acts immediately to enact this ordinance, there will be insufficient time for the city to take the steps necessary to become a member of KMRMA and a participant in the workers' compensation self-insurance group to be operated by KMRMA. Therefore, an emergency is declared to exist by the legislative body of the city. This ordinance shall become effective after its first reading and upon the affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the legislative body.

Section 6. The city clerk shall cause this ordinance to be published in accordance with KRS 83A.060(6) and KRS Chapter 424 within ten (10) days of its enactment by the legislative body.

Introduced, Seconded, Given First Reading and Approved by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members of the city legislative body at a duly convened meeting held on the 10th day of June, 1993.

Doctors plan suit over taxes

The Kentucky Medical Association is going to sue the state over a new tax on doctors that raises money for the state-federal Medicaid program. Doctors believe they were unfairly singled out by the provider tax, which is used to raise matching federal funds, said Dr. Ardis Hoven of Lexington, president-elect of the KMA. The suit apparently will challenge the constitutionality of the tax. But Dr. William Monning, the current KMA president, said the organization has not decided whether to ask the state to immediately halt collection of the tax. Meanwhile, a state legislator who sponsored the provider tax bill argued yesterday that it conforms to federal regulations. The KMA, which represents more than 5,000 Kentucky doctors, announced yesterday that its board had voted to challenge the tax. But Hoven said she did not know when the suit would be filed. The Kentucky Hospital Association also has said it might challenge the tax in court. But a spokesman said the association has not yet decided whether to sue. The new provider tax was enacted by the General Assembly during the recent special session on health-care reform. Kentucky previously levied a provider tax only on doctors who served Medicaid patients. But federal regulations outlawed that practice. The new law taxes all medical providers whether or not they take Medicaid patients. But doctors think the tax unfairly leaves them footing the bill for indigent patients. (Cont. to 3)

Wreck takes life of Flat Gap man

A Rockcastle County man was killed Saturday when his pickup truck was struck head-on on I-75 between Berea and Richmond. David B. Smith, 48, of Flat Gap Road died instantly. An Ohio woman was driving north and swerved to miss a piece of tire in the road, according to Emory Curry, Madison County coroner, lost control of her car, crossed the median and struck the Smith truck. Three other vehicles were involved in the accident. He was born in London, England, the son of Clyde and Myrtle Goodwin Smith, who survive. He was a heavy machine operator listed as David Smith Excavating. He is also survived by his wife, Jane; a daughter, Angela Smith of Berea and a brother, Don Smith of Lexington. Lakes Funeral Home, Berea, is in charge of arrangements. Private services will be held for the family at a later date. Pallbearers will be Jim Blevins, Jane Smith, Bobby Short, Eldon McGuire, Glen Brock and Harvey Whitamore.

Five more indicted by grand jury

Indictments charging five persons were returned by the Rockcastle Grand Jury June 11. David York of Brodhead is charged with wanton endangerment in the first degree by shooting a rifle into the house of Darrell Mason, just missing him. Mike Quinley of Route 2, Mt. Vernon is charged with theft by unlawful taking over \$300 by taking three guns and a chain saw owned by Ralph Johnson. He is also charged with burglary in the first degree by unlawfully entering the dwelling of Ralph Johnson and leaving armed with guns. Jason D. Bullock of Mt. Vernon is charged with burglary in the first degree by unlawfully entering the residence of Buck Vance and leaving armed with a .22 pistol. He is also charged with criminal mischief in the first degree for allegedly destroying the doors of the house belonging to Buck Vance, causing over \$1,000 in damage. Timothy Martin of the Quail area is charged with assault in the third degree for reportedly kicking Joe Bussell, a law enforcement officer in Brodhead, with his boots. He is also charged with operating a motor vehicle while his license was revoked or suspended and for driving under the influence, third offense. His license was revoked as a result of his conviction for a violation of KRS 189A.010. Mathew Blevins was charged with assault in the second degree. (Cont. to 3)

County man dies after boat mishap

A Rockcastle County man died Monday while on a fishing trip to Owlsey Fork Lake near Big Hill in Madison County. Carpenter, 59, of Livingston was fishing with Ernest Mink, also of Livingston around 6 p.m. Monday when Carpenter apparently got a cramp in his leg and stood up in the small fishing boat, causing it to capsize, according to Madison County Coroner Emory Curry. Both Carpenter and Mink were thrown from the boat. Mink who cannot swim, held onto the boat and Carpenter swam to shore. Curry said that Carpenter stood up in shallow water and then collapsed. Carpenter was pronounced dead at the scene from an apparent heart attack. Carpenter was born in Jackson County Oct. 28, 1933 the son of Fieldon and Virga Holt Carpenter. He was a retired truck driver for Overnite Express. He is survived by his wife, Anna Lois Carpenter and two sons, Ronnie Carpenter and David Carpenter, both of Livingston; two brothers, Clyde Carpenter and Russell Carpenter and a sister, Bernice Burkhardt, all of Livingston and two grandsons. Services will be held Thursday, June 24 (today) at 2 p.m. at Denevel and Martin Funeral Home by Bros. David Patton and Michael Chism. Burial will follow in the Bales Cemetery. Log truck loses brakes, overturns

A runaway log truck careened through a parking lot, a service station and overturned in a ditch at Burr last Wednesday, the Sheriff's office reported. James Goforth of Mt. Vernon was coming from the Brush Creek area on Ky. 1004 near the Country Kitchen Restaurant when his brakes failed. Unable to control the truck, he went through the restaurant parking lot and into Shell Service Station where he hit one car, plowed into two more parked cars and went into a ditch overturning and scattering logs. Siting in the first parked car was Larry Shumate of Corbin. His car was heavily damaged, but he was unharmed. The truck hit a second car owned by Steven Howard of Mt. Vernon. The 1982 Honda was damaged. He was not in the car. Also hit was a third car, a 1979 Buick owned by Ouis Ray Howard of Livingston. He was not in the car. Both Howards are employees of Bee Garbage. The logs and truck were in the ditch and did not block traffic on U.S. 25.

Livingston men charged with cultivating marijuana

Two Livingston residents were arrested for cultivating marijuana on U.S. Forest Service land in Rockcastle County over the weekend. Law enforcement officers from the U.S. Forest Service and the Kentucky Division of Fish and Wildlife Resources observed Roland Dean Wynn, 33, and Tony Smith, 33, cultivating approximately 250 marijuana plants. The individuals will be brought before the U.S. Magistrate Monday. The U.S. Forest Service works in cooperation with 18 federal, state and local law enforcement agencies to eradicate marijuana from Forest Service land in Kentucky. "Our number one priority is the safety of our visitors," said Forest Service Special Agent Harder Corder. Approximately 12,000 plants have been eradicated from the Daniel Boone National Forest during the 1993 season. In Rockcastle for the week ending June 21, a plot with 185 plants and another with 503 plants was found on Sand Hill. A total of 49 plots with 1,391 plants was discovered and destroyed at Livingston. Members of the Governor's Task Force (state police) destroyed all the plants. In the London Post area of the State Police, 237 plots were discovered and destroyed. They contained 30,464 plants.

Points East

My friend, Mary Allen Peake, who lives in Louisville has a friend in Atlanta who recently jumped ahead of the hoops to get good seats at a Grateful Dead Concert. So she's standing in line, waiting to get into the arena the night of the concert and, like thousands of other fans who were celebrating their good fortune, she waved her ticket in the air.

Seemingly from out of nowhere, a guy dashes by and flees the ticket out of her hand and fleeing to the crowd. Goodby twenty-five dollars. Goodby rock and roll.

It doesn't do any good to scream or call someone when something like that happens. Oh, they'll be sympathetic but they're not going to reissue a ticket or even check to see if someone else is sitting in the seat you thought was yours. Because, chances are you aren't going to know much about that seat until you get to it anyway. Who had time to memorize stuff like Level 1, row 2, aisle D, entrance SST, Sec. 7 (red), seat 161777?

Finding your specific seat at an event that's playing to 30,000 people is actually part of the entertainment. The ticket not only gets you in the door, but it also gives you vague clues about how to find wherever it is you're supposed to be sitting. Hunting down that particular spot is like trying to find the prize egg on Easter Sunday, particularly if it's in a big arena you don't frequent very often. All of which is beside the point.

And the point we're working on here is that you have to be careful if you're going to events in the big city. Out here in the country, we worry about rogues breaking into our homes when we're gone for the week end, but we seldom have much concern about somebody dashing up and jerking the tickets to the county fair or the tobacco festival out of our hands and making off with them. I'd bet a bunch of money that it's never happened once in Garrard County, or for that matter in Letcher, Laurel, Whitley, Madison, Rockcastle or the half dozen other counties where folks find this column in their better weekly papers.

Last year at Kings Island, while I was standing in line with my brood, a fellow who was apparently the youth leader from Blue Springs Baptist Church, according to his tee-shirt, was at the window and he purchased 28 tickets. He had them in a big clump in his left hand. Meanwhile, patiently stamping the pavement and muttering the things that adolescents mutter when they are asked to stand still in one place for more than 30 seconds, 27 kids were attempting to stay together until he returned. Unfortunately, one kid started to stray away and the chaperone collared him just in time. While he was wagging his finger at his right hand, a street-smart teenager grabbed all 28 tickets from his left and fled and melted into the gathering crowd.

I heard the guy explaining to security that the thief was wearing cut-off jeans and a white t-shirt that said something on it. In other words, there were several thousands suspect within a hundred yards. I learned later that the guy was able to convince security and management they had been ripped off and that King's Island gave the group replacement tickets an hour or so after the waiting line to ride. The Band had gotten up 90 minutes long. But I'd bet even money that I know one guy who won't be taking groups of teenagers to amusement parks again.

Snatchers used to confine their efforts mostly to elderly ladies with long hair and a wig. It's now easier to pack anything of value in your hand if you're even close to a city unless you have it handcuffed to your wrist.

In New York, the best place for your wrist watch is in your front pocket. I had a Times watch cost \$19.95, and all I needed was a tight off my wrist in broad daylight while I was waiting for a light to change on 42nd Street in mid-town Manhattan. The guy went tearing across four lanes of moving traffic. I didn't even yell. In fact, I was amazed that I still had my brief case. I even took satisfaction in knowing that he was going to be awfully disappointed because he

had broken the band and the watch had water under the crystal.

Folks like us stuck out in a crowd when we get to the city. We might as well have big red 'X's drawn on our backs or light bulbs over our heads. We're naive because we trust our neighbors and we feel reasonably safe in our community and, even when we go grocery shopping at the county seat, we're not normally worried that a thief is going to get us right out in the open.

So, here are some tips for those of you who intend to make a pilgrimage to Cincy, Nashville, Atlanta, Louisville etc. this summer. Because blatant thieves find a way of life to some folks in these places.

- Don't wear wrist watches that cost more than twenty bucks.
-Don't carry purses.
-Don't pack anything in your hip

pocket that you can't afford to lose.

If you're packing a camera or camcorder, make sure you have a strap around your neck.

Invest \$10 in a good fancy pack, but, instead of putting the cargo on your fanny, try to keep it centered over your belly button.

Don't buy anything, particularly entrance tickets at discounted prices in the parking lot. Chances are a thief ripped them out of my hand or they're counterfeit.

Don't leave anything of value in your car unless you have deflated a tire, placed your valuable inside the cavity, reinflated the tire and welded the wheel to the brake drum.

- Don't trust anyone unless they talk like you do. Even the best beggar in Manhattan can't fake a genuine hillbilly accent.
-Hold on tight.

gent health care, Hoven said yesterday.

"A special segment of the population has been singled out to fund care for the indigent. That is a societal problem that all of us should be responsible for, not one select group."

Hoven said the KMA favors some type of general levy under which all taxpayers would help support indigent care.

It was not immediately known whether the KMA suit would attempt to overturn provider tax, or only the part applying to doctors. Abolishing the tax would be a blow to the state, which already faces several financial setbacks.

Under a ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court last week, the state might have to fund \$76 million in taxes to federal retirees. Another pending suit challenges state taxes on private pensions. Also \$200 million might have to be cut from the budget because of funding shortfalls.

But state Rep. Marshall Long, D-Shelbyville, who sponsored the original provider tax legislation, predicted yesterday that the tax would survive a court test.

"Other states have passed these taxes... The federal government has said it's legitimate."

"I don't think the KMA has much of a lawsuit."

basis for disaster and emergency programs payments; As a record of land use and crops planted; To verify responsibilities regarding conservation compliance provisions; To prevent reduction of loss of future crop acreage bases.

Producers are urged to file a crop report, as this will protect your crop acreage base if you report zero planted, or will build up your base if you report your planted acres. A crop

report is also required when filing for disaster purposes on crops such as corn, burley tobacco, peppers, etc. Please schedule an appointment at your convenience to file your crop report by contacting the Rockcastle County ASCS Office at 256-2525.

Reminder for wheat and feed grain participators

The Non-Grazing and Non-Haying period for set aside acres will begin June 1, and continue through Oct. 31 for the 1993 program year.

Producers are reminded to keep your set aside acres in compliance during these months, and do not pasture or cut for hay. Set aside acres must also be maintained for weed control through Dec. 31. Noxious weed and erosion must be controlled and kept from going to seed at all times prior to Dec. 31.

Eligibility for participation in ASCS programs is open to all appli-

cants as established under law without regard to age, color, disability, marital status, national origin, race, religion, or sex.

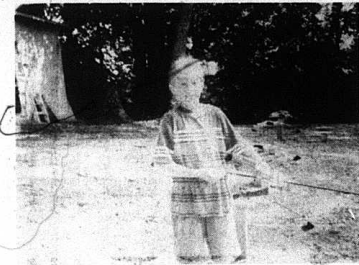
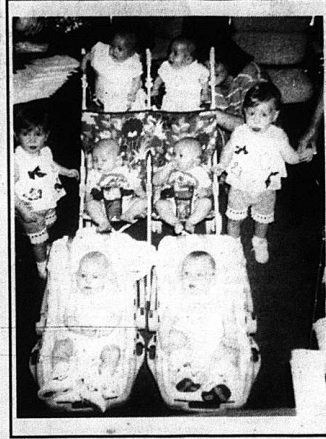

Run for the Arts Race Course

The race will begin on MAIN ST. in front of the Courthouse. All streets listed will be closed to traffic for safety. The crosswalk at 1st and Main will serve as the STARTING LINE. Runners will proceed up Main, which soon slopes downward - across the RAILROAD TRACKS (USE CAUTION!) - becoming WEST MAIN (keep to the left). Runners will turn LEFT onto Williams St. (slight incline) and then RIGHT onto Quarry St. (Again, always keep to the LEFT). Next, a LEFT turn (continuing up WEST MAIN) which will bring runners to a sharp RIGHT on OWEN ST. (keeping to the LEFT), ascending to a RIGHT on LANGDON ST. which slopes back down. On this descent, runners will pass the ONE MILE CUT POINT as well as the first WATER STATION. A LEFT on WILLIAMS ST. brings runners to a long flat stretch (keeping to the LEFT). Upon reaching MT. VERNON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL, runners will be directed RIGHT along the school's curved drive (to avoid another hill). Turning RIGHT onto SCHOOL ST. takes the runners through a steep dip (see why we skipped a hill?) leveling out to the MAIN TURNAROUND. (The bad news is-yup, the dip again).

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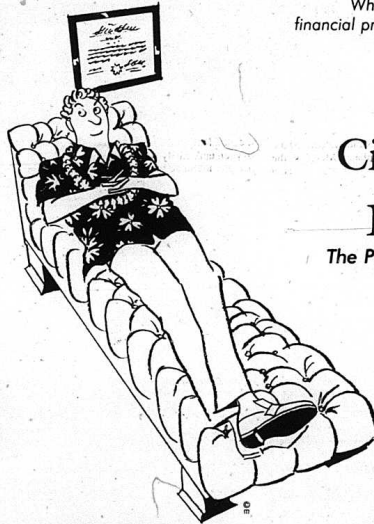

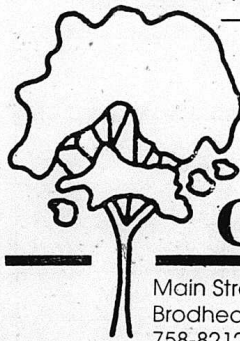
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Summer School News from R.C.H.S

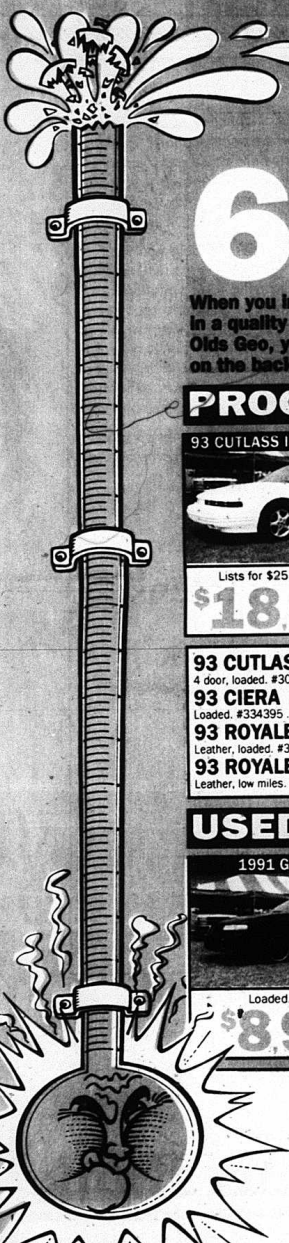

Carmen Clark, also a Sophomore, plans to attend Eastern Kentucky University and earn a Bachelor's Degree after graduation from high school. "I think there are a lot

of kids in our county who have problems and need someone to talk to." Carmen plans to become a counselor "to help these kids understand their problems." Both Randal and Carmen plan to stay in Rockcastle and work. Randal would like to work at Rockcastle County Hospital. Our class recently toured the Respiratory Care Facility and Randal said, "I thought the tour helped me understand what I wanted to do in life." The next trip for summer school students is scheduled for June 25th, when they attend a career counseling seminar at EKVU.



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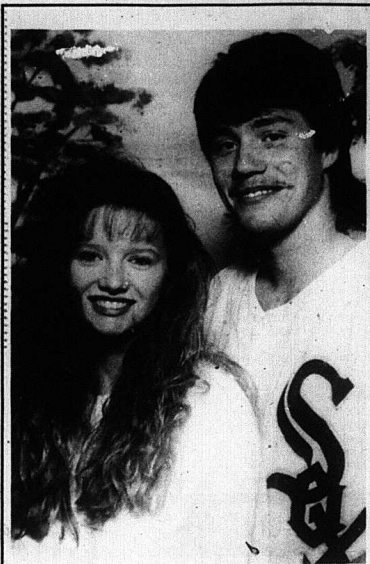

If so, then just wait around a little bit and I will see what I can do for you. You know, that little bobble seemed to know what I was talking about and waited for me to go into the house and get him some nuts I just happened to have handy. He wasn't quite brave enough to eat out of my hand but he would get close enough to catch them as I would drop them on the floor at my feet. All the time rolling those big marble-like eyes so he could see everything around and to be sure I wasn't fooling him and flirring that big bushy tail as if to say, "this is my propeller and will take me out of harm's way in a flash if you try anything funny." Nominations Now Being Accepted

The Rockcastle County Board of Education is accepting nominations from the General Public for community/business leaders to be selected by the Board to serve on the school district's local planning committee for school facilities.

LOCAL PLANNING COMMITTEE

In 1992 the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education approved 702 KAR 2:001 which provides for the development and adoption of a written plan by the local school district describing both the school facilities and construction needs of the district. The regulation requires the local school district assume responsibility for development of a Local District Facility Plan. This process requires the selection of a Local Planning Committee to develop a Master Educational Facility Plan and District Facility Plan for capital construction.

The Master Educational Facility Plan contains an assessment of various facts of the school district's attributes and operations including the district profile, educational program, demographic information, facility conditions, transportation information and finances. This plan provides a comprehensive view of the overall program needs of the district and facility improvements needed to provide an equitable educational opportunity to all students in the district. The District Facility Plan for capital construction is developed subsequently to the Master Educational Facility Plan. The school district's local facility plan shall be developed and submitted for approval to the State Board for Elementary and Secondary Education no later than March 1994. Local facility plans are to be developed once every four years and shall remain in effect until any changes have been approved by the State Board. The local facility plan shall be implemented to the extent the financial ability of the district shall permit as determined by the chief state school officer and the School Facilities Construction Commission.

The individuals selected to serve on the Local Planning Committee will be placed in a very strategic and important role as relates to the school district and community. Once school commences in August 1993 the committee will need to begin meeting to assimilate all the district's data as the regulation requires. Therefore, each committee member should allow for some time consumption in order to prepare a document, as required, to make recommendations to the local Board.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education is in the process of acquiring membership, as the regulation requires, for the Local Planning Committee. The regulation states that membership on the district committee shall consist of 4 parents, 4 teachers, 4 school building administrators, 1 central office administrator, 1 board member, 2 Community/Business leaders as nominated by themselves or the general public and selected by the School Board, and the Superintendent as a non-voting member. Also, the regulation states the makeup of the district committee shall include representation from at least 4 SBDM Councils.
