After seven hour stand-off

Police kill local man at Purr Rigsby Road home

A routine search for marijuana plants turned deadly Sunday afternoon when members of the Kentucky State Police Special Response Team gamed down a Rockcastle County man in the front yard of his Purr Rigsby Road home.

According to Gilbert Accardo, Jr., public affairs officer for the KSP post in London, Gary Shepherd, 45, of Rt. 3, Brodhead was shot several times with a nine millimeter weapon after he refused to lay down his assault rifle.

Shepherd was pronounced dead at the Rockcastle Hospital at 6:30 p.m.

by Rockcastle County Deputy Coroner Roy Martin. Martin said that Shepherd was hit once in the head and twice in the chest. "He was hit at least three times and possibly more, we will know for sure when we get the results of the autopsy back," he said.

According to Accardo, the incident began around 11 a.m. Sunday morning when members of the Governor's Marijuana Task Force were flying a helicopter near Shepherd's mobile home. Accardo said that Shepherd motioned for police to land and they did in a field near his trailer.

According to Accardo, police apparently told Shepherd that they had observed several marijuana plants growing near his mobile home and that they were going to cut them down.

Accardo said Shepherd then told police that they would have to kill him before they attempted to cut his marijuana.

Shepherd then reportedly returned his mobile and got a camouflaged semi-automatic assault rifle. Accardo said that police got their helicopter back in the air and called for assistance.

Members of the KSP special response team from Frankfort, arrived at the scene around 3:30 p.m. and a hostage negotiator attempted to talk with Shepherd around 4 p.m.

Police say that attempts to talk Shepherd into surrendering peacefully failed. Around 5:30 p.m., police fired a concussion canister at Shepherd in an attempt, they say, to disorient him and make it possible to disarm him. That failed, and around 5:45 p.m., police say that Shepherd returned to his front porch where he had laid his assault rifle. "Officers repeatedly ordered him to drop his weapon, but Shepherd refused,"

Accardo said.

"He then pointed his rifle toward officers in a threatening manner as he walked toward them," he said.

"At this time officers fired approximately four rounds of nine millimeter ammunition, fatally wounding Shepherd," Accardo said.

Mary Jane Jones said after the shooting that her boyfriend did not fire a shot at troopers and that he was holding his gun in the air and not pointing it at troopers who had positioned themselves in the tobacco patch beside the couple's mobile home.

When the two troopers shot Shepherd Jones says she was hit by a stray bullet or fragment and that blood splattered on her and the couple's four-year-old son, Jacob. Jones was treated for a laceration at the Rockcastle Hospital and released. Jacob was not injured.

Police searched the area extensively following the shooting and found 55 marijuana plants growing in the area.

But, neighbors said Tuesday that 37 of the 55 plants found in the area were on another farm and that as far as they knew Shepherd had only about 10 or so plants growing around his trailer and in his garden.

"We all knew Gary grew a little pot for his own use, but he never bothered anybody and was a good neighbor," said Bruce DeBorde, who like many other people think that police acted too hastily in Sunday's shooting.

Ricky Kirby, a longtime friend of Gary's, said that his friend was a victim of overzealous actions by some trigger happy police officers. "It was handled, very poorly. I don't think Gary had to die," Kirby said. "Gary was a Vietnam veteran, who had served his country, stepped on a land mine and come home with a crippled arm. He was of the belief that if he wanted to grow a little pot for his own use, it was O.K. He certainly didn't grow marijuana to sell," Kirby said.

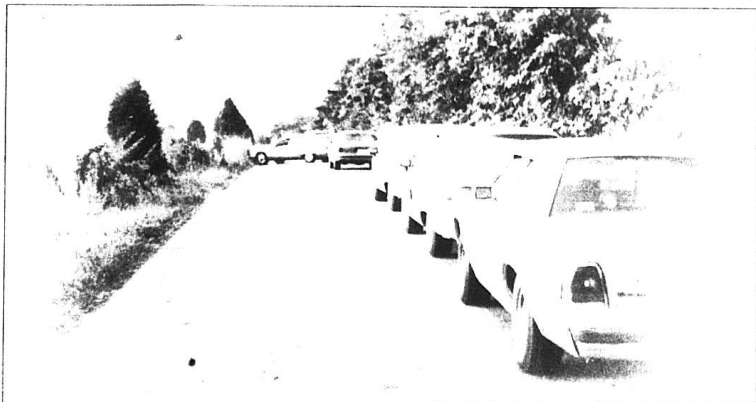
Kirby, among others, is circulating a petition, that harshly criticizes the state police's handling of the incident.

"The petition reads: 'We, the people of Rockcastle County and Citizens of the United States of America, are appalled and outraged at the murder of our neighbor, friend and relative Gary Shepherd. We fear for the safety of ourselves and our families, when this type of injustice occurs, at the hands of the police, as evidenced by the murder of Gary Shepherd on Sunday August 8, 1993. The police are supposed to be public servants who protect us, not murder us, and then gloat about the murder, they have committed unnecessarily.'

"We, the people of Rockcastle County, and citizens of the United States of America, refuse to accept this type of incident and plan to organize ourselves to insure that this type of tragedy and brutality never occurs again to any of us or our families."

Bill Shepherd, Gary's brother said that he attempted to talk with his brother but that police would not allow him to do so. "When I talked with Sheriff Shirley Smith he told me

Points East

I've just returned from the annual Adams-Thompson-Blair Reunion held each year on top of the mountain in the head of Still House Fork of Blair Branch in Letcher County. I like to tell folks that the only qualification for attending is that they are directly descended from Noah. It's an everybody's welcome sort of affair staged largely by cousin Den Arthur Adams who coordinates things during the off season from his home in Paulding, Ohio, some seven hundred miles or so from Blair Branch.

This year more than 500 people signed the guest register and it's probably safe to say that another 200 showed up who never managed to get the pen in their hands.

Every year at least half a dozen women, older cousins who look younger than me, will make a point of letting my wife know that they used to change my diaper. Loreta tells me that everything still looks about the same now as it did then. My face gets red and I run off and try to see who's been catching any big fish.

I also make a point of letting the kids know how tough things were back when I was growing up on Blair Branch. My kids complain about having to walk fifty yards out the driveway to catch the school bus. I tell about walking over a mile each way to school and I swear that it was up hill both ways.

I show them where the old school house used to sit and they want to know where the gym was. I explain that we had basketball goals mounted on locust poles outside and we played ball in all kinds of weather. If it was raining and the court was muddy you simply didn't dribble unless the feller guarding you started crowding too much. Then you could bounce the ball one time and splash water in his eyes before you passed off to someone else.

Gym my eye. I tell 'em about the

outdoor toilets and how ripe they'd get around the first of May before school closed for the summer.

"You mean you had to sit on them in cold weather without a heater?" they want to know and I swear again that it got so cold sometimes that your behind would actually freeze to the seat. They want to know how I got loose and I tell 'em you had to count to three and jerk real hard and that sometimes it would rip the skin right off.

My kids won't set foot in the garden and I point out hill slides where I spent most summers hoeing corn and picking beans and stumping a ton of soil at least once a week. My kids who have several pairs of shoes can't understand why it was necessary to spend so much time in the corn field in the first place and certainly not why you'd do it barefooted. They don't believe it when I tell 'em that I had one pair of shoes and they were expected to last till my feet got too big for 'em.

My kids complain if the television remote control isn't lying beside whatever place they choose to sit. Heaven forbid that they have to get up for anything except a trip to the toilet and they'd pee by remote control if that were possible. I tell them about having nearly a mile of television line strung up the side of the mountain to a couple of antennas on the very top. If a limb fell on the line or a bird lit on it, both stations would go out. Sometimes the wind would blow the antennas off signal so you'd not only have to walk to the top of the mountain after dark, but climb to the top of a tree after you got there to reset the antennas. Walking the television line had to be done at least once a week.

I remember discovering that the smart thing to do before you took off walking up the mountain side was to unhook the television line from the back of the television and plug it into

an electric outlet. Television line was pieces of plastic, about an inch and a half long. Imagine a miniature toy ladder a mile long and you get the picture.

Anyway, if a bird was roosting on the line, he'd usually have a foot on each strand and that would cause the signal to short out. By plugging the line into the electric circuit, you could persuade birds to leave in a hurry. You could walk the line when that didn't work and find big piles of feathers they had left behind when it did work.

Then he paid someone small to drag the dead critter out.

Corporations have until Oct. 30 to file report

Corporations in Rockcastle County that missed the June 30 deadline to file their annual reports have a reprieve until Oct. 30, according to Secretary of State Bob Babbage.

A total of 19,772 corporations are classified in "bad standing" for failure to file their required reports by the June 30 deadline. A total of 60,271 corporations met the filing deadline.

The corporate annual report is required by law and is sent to each corporation at the address given by the corporation as its principal office address. The annual reports are mailed by the Secretary of State's office between January and May annually.

When a corporation misses the fil-

ing deadline, a 60-day notice of pending revocation is mailed to the registered office address. Failure to file the annual report within the 60-day time period results in administrative dissolution of the corporation.

A change in the registered office or registered agent must be on the forms supplied by the Secretary of State, accompanied by a \$10 filing fee for profit, stock corporations and \$5 for nonprofit, nonstock corporations.

A total of 2,627 new corporations filed their papers with the Secretary of State during the second quarter of this year. During the first quarter, 2,732 new corporations filed their papers with the Secretary of State.

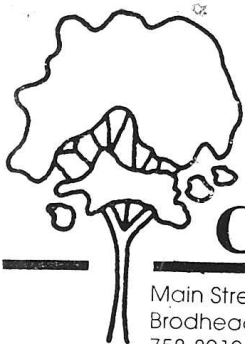

"What Saith the Scriptures"

Peter said, "For the time past of our life may suffice to have wrought the will of the Gentiles, when we walked in lasciviousness, lusts, excess of wine, revelling, banquetings, and abominable idolatries." I Pet. 4:3. Excess of wine is one who is overflowing with alcohol, totally drunk. Revelling suggests the 1,2 drunk, who is loud and boisterous. Banquetings is translated drinking parties in the NAS, the social drinker. All three categories are after the will of the Gentiles, not after the will of God.

Alcohol and drugs can be used for medical purposes. Timothy was told to drink a little for his stomach's sake, 1 Tim 5:23. Pr. 31:6 suggests using it as a pain killer or sedative under sorrow and grief of a heavy heart.

Folks are deceived by the devil into thinking that the bottle will solve their problems and drown their sorrows. Booze never solves anything, it only adds more problems. We can be forgiven through Jesus Christ, as some of the Corinthians were, 1 Cor. 6:9-11. Friends, let God influence and take control of your life, not the bottle.

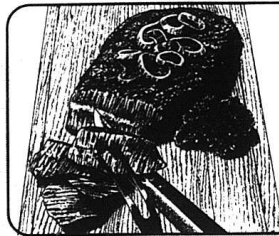

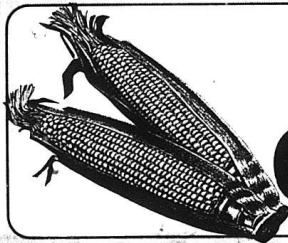

Farm Credit Services hosts tobacco forum

Jack Martin and Darlene Martin, Clay Colson and Barry Hurst all of Rockcastle County, got an update on the tobacco industry and how pending legislation may affect future tobacco prices through Tobacco Forum sponsored by Farm Credit Services (FCS). FCS hosted forums in Lexington on July 27 and Bowling Green on July 29 which were aimed at increasing farmers' awareness of the potential changes in the tobacco program.

The legislation is calling for capping the amount of tobacco foreign companies may import to the U.S. The legislation also sets standard measures to level the playing field on the treatment of the import of tobacco once the tobacco reaches the U.S.

The tobacco bill will become law at the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act passes. "It's interesting to note that internationally, tobacco has changed from a severe oversupply situation to a significant oversupply

in two short years," said Jack Martin, London Office FCS advisor. FCS sponsored the Tobacco Forum to get to latest information on the tobacco program and the pending legislation to tobacco growers," he added.

Several well-known agricultural authorities participated in the panel including Jack Crowner of the Kentucky Farm News Network, Danny McKinney of the Burley Co-op, G.B. Midden of the Burley Council, Dr. Will Snell with the University of Ken-

tucky. Dr. Gary Palmer with the University of Kentucky's extension service, Marshall Cole with the Farm Bureau and Rob Mangus of Sen. Wendell Ford's office. The panel answered questions on issues such as the pending legislation, cross county leasing and why tobacco farmers are facing so much black shank disease this year.

Lacefield said, "However, a third gas which may be present in ethyl gases, nitric oxide, is colorless."

A few simple precautions should be considered to minimize problems, Lacefield said.

"Run the blower 15 to 20 minutes before entering a partly filled silo and keep the blower running as long as anyone is inside."

"Stay out of the silo for at least a week, preferably two weeks after it is filled."

"Ventilate the silo for at least two weeks after filling."

"Keep doors between silo and barn closed to protect livestock."

"If anyone inside the silo notices the slightest throat irritation or coughing, he should get into fresh air immediately and seek immediate treatment by a doctor."

Breed cows earlier for better profits

Farmers who begin to breed their beef cows after the traditional recommended May 20 start-up date may be hurting themselves in the pocketbook.

By starting the breeding program a month earlier, University of Kentucky research suggests farmers may achieve a significantly higher pregnancy rate among their cattle herd than which grass leuc pastures.

"Two years ago, we began to notice poor breeding rates across the state," said Roy Burris, Extension beef specialist with UK's College of Agriculture. "We noticed that most cows were being bred earlier or they weren't conceiving at all."

So Burris looked at 10 years data on weather patterns and found that after June 20, the weather typically hovered over 90 degrees. Temperature that high apparently interferes

with cattle breeding, especially for cattle feeding on high endophyte leuca.

Kentucky has 5 million acres of leuca, Burris said, and most of it is the high endophyte fescue type. We're not going to get rid of it, so we may have to learn to live with it. Earlier breeding is one way to do that."

Last year, Burris conducted a study on UK's herd at its research and education center in Princeton.

"We started our breeding program a month earlier, on April 20," he said. "From April 20 to May 20 we had 17 of 20 cows successfully re-bred. From May 20 to June 20 we had 17 of 21. Then from June 20 on, we had eight of 16, only 50 percent, of our cows successfully re-bred."

He added, "That certainly supports

my thesis that an earlier beginning to the breeding program is better."

UK's is continuing the experiment again this year, but Burris believes last year's data will be repeated.

Why would a farmer not want to begin his breeding program earlier? "Many people don't want their cows to calve in February because it's cold," Burris said. "My feeling is that much colder than March and might be less muddy which would be an advantage during calving time."

February is also a less busy month for most farming activities which would be an advantage. Also, if the calves were born earlier, the farmer would have increased weaning weights in the fall, because the calves would be a month older.

of weeks, Lacefield said.

"The best time to harvest for highest yield and quality is when the kernels have all dented and a black layer is forming near the base of the mature kernel," he said. "Harvesting for silage should occur during the first few days of this period while the leaves are still mostly green above the ear."

Moisture content of corn used for silage should be near 65 percent, he added. If silage is too dry, extra water must be added to prevent mold from

developing in storage. If it's too wet, excessive drainage will result in loss of most nutrients. Excessive water also increases chemical and microbial changes that lower nutrient content.

Silage should be chopped at lengths from three-eighths to one-half inch to ensure proper fermentation and to permit better packing.

Lacefield added that excluding as much air as possible from the silo is very important in making and preserving silage. Oxygen, like excessive water, allows destructive microbial and chemical actions to lower nutrient content.

Be careful of dangerous gases in feed silage

It's not too early for Kentucky farmers to be alerted to a potentially fatal dangerous problem in silage feeds.

Lethal gases may accumulate in upright silos, said Gary Lacefield, Extension forages specialist with the

that I was obstructing justice and to get out of the area.

Earl Shepherd, Gary's father, said Wednesday that he too felt police acted hastily in dealing with his son.

"I think the entire situation was handled very, very poorly. It seems like they wanted to kill Gary," he said.

Earl Shepherd was most upset by the fact that Gary's cousin, Charles Shepherd Jr., who is a trained negotiator, was not allowed to speak with his son.

"Charles tried to get the Police to let him talk to Gary, but they told him that it was their ballgame and they would do it their way," Earl Shepherd said Wednesday.

Accardio said that state police are conducting an internal investigation into the shooting and that the two officers that fired the shots have been placed on administrative leave until the investigation is finished.

Commonwealth's attorney Benny Hain has said that he has not made a final decision on what if any action his office will take. "We may let a grand jury look into the case," he said.

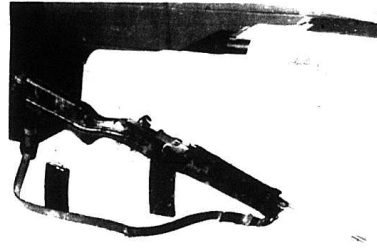

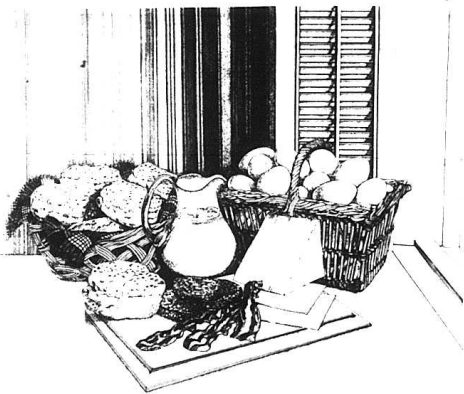

Train passengers were plentiful then since automobiles were just coming into their own and cross country driving was almost unheard of. One caught the train to go to the next town or across the country. It was a motel on wheels. Admiring car was available to those who needed to eat on board and bunks were for those who traveled long overnight distances. The chicky clack of the wheels going over the joints in the rails would soothe some to sleep and the conductor hawking his wares up and down the rails would tempt the rest.

The road in front of our place was the main highway to all the little towns scattered up and down the Ohio Valley but it was by no means a super highway. Street car tracks were bedded in the roadway and street cars ran about every twenty minutes. This was the only way people had to get to work or go shopping. The clanging of the bells as they stopped to let off the passengers was just another sound of the busy world of life as now. There was the airplane's whine in the sky and the contrails flowing behind it to add to our sights and sounds of progress.

Even though we had all these ways of travel available we went back then we still used the old fashioned way of getting around, walking. We walked to school, and the grocery store and carried our groceries home in paper bags. There was no such thing as the shopping mall of today with parking lots filled with cars. That was a time when the grocery clerk filled your order and politely asked, "Is there anything else for you today?" That was also the time when every school had a play ground for the children to play on and only the most sophisticated schools had a gymnasium. And

children played games for the fun of it, not for the glory of winning. The strange language of todays youth, computers, software, word processors and dictaphones would have been like a foreign language to them and they probably would not have understood what they were talking about. But nonetheless they learned how to cope with the world and most of them became good honest citizens, the backbone of our nation.

And so, we have come a long torturous way from sifting the fields, doing our own work, and watching progress form another kind of life as the automotive world took precedent over the toiling of the past. The gymnasiums of today where only a small portion of the children participate in the sports has taken away the sleek look of kids who have been running all over the playground working up a healthy sweat as they play hopscotch, marbles, catch the ball, skip rope and go back to class after recess refreshed from the exercise and ready to get down to books.

And so, the world goes on, kingdoms fall, and whole countries collapse while we search for even more ways to allow machinery to do the work of humans while mankind rests from inactivity.

Recent news of freakish highway accidents, such as the one where a helicopter bumped into a car traveling on the expressway puts one to thinking of times past when to most of us, helicopters and expressways, were words used only in the dictionary. We've come a long way since then, not only by means of travel but by the way dictionary words have become a tangible reality to every day living.

The first airborne vehicle was called a flying machine and now it has graduated to a "super jet" and the whirlybird is the helicopter. "The flying machine," lifted into the air by propellers, took its rightful name of "airplane" and became a household word when I was yet a child. How well I remember the sound of that special whine and hum in the sky as an airplane approached the valley we lived in. This was a narrow valley between two foothills of the Allegheny Mountains, and was the transportation artery that joined the east coast to the heartland of the country. This when in the sky drew us all out to look at the miracle in the air of yet another means of transportation added to our already busy thoroughfare between Pittsburg, Pa., and Cincinnati, Ohio.

This was the valley the Ohio River flowed through as it meandered its

way to the great Mississippi River and was a popular way of traveling. The big paddlewheelers "steamboats" filled with people going to far away places held to the center of the river and sent waves of beautiful music from the calliope floating on the air. The boats, full of travelers and the lilting music were always a pleasure to watch and listen to. At night the strange sound of the steam whistle could be heard for miles as it blew its warning of approaching the dam where it had to wait for the changing of the water level before it could proceed on its way. This was not only a river for pleasure trip it was also used to transport coal and timber from the coal fields and mountain sides of Ohio and Pennsylvania. Long strings of barges filled with these products and manned by strong husky men constantly plied the river. The sounds coming from these barges was not soft charming music but was the sound of sweating men giving orders and sometimes calling out to those they saw on the beaches.

Another mode of transportation was the railroads. This also ran close to our house and we could hear the train whistles blowing day and night as they stopped to unload their burdens at the steel mill in back of our place. The passenger trains whizzed
