**City of Brodhead, Kentucky**

An Ordinance of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky, amending provisions of existing ordinances as to water and sewer rates.

**THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRODHEAD, KENTUCKY DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:**

That Section 2 of an ordinance of the City of Brodhead, Kentucky enacted Feb. 8, 1994 and amendments thereto enacted Feb. 8, 1994, be amended as follows:

**SECTION 2. WATER AND SEWER RATES**

**A. Monthly Water Rates**

Number of Gallons of Water Per Month	Monthly Charge to Properties within city	Monthly Charge to Properties outside city
For first 2,000 gallons or less	\$9.75	\$13.00
For next 8,000 gallons	\$3.25 per thousand gallons	\$4.31 per thousand gallons
For next 40,000 gallons	\$2.50 per thousand gallons	\$3.31 per thousand gallons
For next 50,000 gallons	\$1.75 per thousand gallons	\$2.31 per thousand gallons
At over 100,000 gallons	\$1.25 per thousand gallons	\$1.69 per thousand gallons

**B. Monthly Sewer Rates**

The charges for sewer service shall be one hundred per cent (100%) of the monthly water bill as determined in Section 2.A. above.

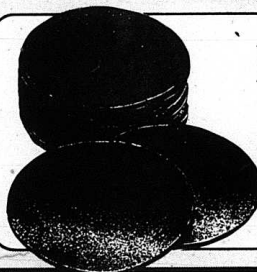

## Could eventually employ 250

### Data processing firm is definitely locating in Rockcastle County

It is definite! Rockcastle County has a new employer. Image Entry, Inc., a London, Ky. based data processing firm will begin doing business in Rockcastle County, possibly as early as Monday.

As a temporary base of operation, the company has rented the museum building at Renfro Valley. And, if things go according to plans, and there appears to be no reason they shouldn't, Image Entry's permanent home will be in the Rockcastle County Industrial Park.

Wayne Stewart, chairman of Kentucky Highlands Investment Corp., said Tuesday that his corporation was working closely with Image Entry's president, William Deaton, and local officials to put together a package to obtain funding for a new 6,000 square foot building.

"We think the new plant will be located on the corner lot across from Rockcastle Manufacturing and will probably face Hwy. 461 bypass," Stewart said.

At present, Image Entry has 33 employees in Rockcastle County. They have another 75 trainable applicants.

Image Entry owner, William Deaton, told officials Wednesday that he hoped to have 100 employees by July 1 and long-range plans call for 250 employees at his Rockcastle plant.

Rockcastle Co. Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotus said Deaton and local officials hope to break ground for the new building by March 1 and to be at the new location by June 1 of this year.

Carlotus said that he and Deaton met with state officials Wednesday at Harry Sparks Vocational School to encourage them to develop a training program which would provide employees for the company.

Presently, Image Entry does data processing work for the state of Illinois, McDonald's Corp. and the ad agency which handles Phillip Morris and Oldsmobile corporations.

## Approved last week

### Brodhead customers to pay 25% higher rate for water

For the first time in several years city of Brodhead water and sewer customers will be paying a higher rate.

The 25 percent rate increase was unanimously approved at last week's council meeting. Brodhead City Clerk Becky Bussell said the increase was necessary because of rising costs incurred by the city to provide water and sewer to their customers.

Brodhead customers, inside the city limits, who have water and sewer will pay a minimum charge of \$19.50 per month (for the first 2,000 gallons). Water and sewer customers outside the city limits will pay a minimum combined rate of \$26 per month. The next 8,000 gallons used will cost \$3.25 per thousand gallons (in the city) and \$4.31 outside the city. The new rates reflect a 100% sewer charge which depends on the amount of water use. (A complete breakdown of rate increases can be found in this week's Signal on page B7)

The new rate will go into effect March 1.

Bussell also said the council is taking applications for a full-time water and sewer department employee. Anyone wishing to apply, can drop application/resume at Brodhead City Hall Monday through Friday.

## Freezing rain proves devastating

### Ice turns lights out in county

It started as light rain, then turned to ice and out went electric power for Kentucky Utilities and Jackson County Rural Electric Coop (RECC) customers in Rockcastle.

Before it was over, virtually every KU and RECC customer was out of lights and heat.

But with a lot of help everything was back on by Sunday for KU customers, except maybe a little more repairs on a transmission line between Brodhead and Crab Orchard, now complete.

Meanwhile, RECC customers were having troubles. Power stayed on at Mareburg during the ice storm but was off in some parts of Renfro Valley. But, it was on at Hardest's Restaurant and Derby City Truck Stop at Renfro where customers lined up for food early Friday. It took some nearly an hour to get through the line.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotus who was out once again overseeing road work said the worst or seemingly the worst was Possum Kingdom, Trace Branch and Poplar Gap.

"We were out all day Friday and all day Sunday trying to clear as much as we could," he said. "But it took time."

Some RECC customers were still out Wednesday mainly wherever there were pine and cedar trees.

KU Manager Ron Cain said the first trouble occurred about 10:30 p.m. Thursday on Gauley Branch near

Livingston. At 11 p.m. Livingston's lights went out, followed by Pine Hill at 11:30.

A short time later 75 people had converged on the system working on lines, and trimming downed trees. Cain said there were people working 30 hours, who took off for a nap and went back to work. He reported 60 hours of overtime by many of his people.

Cain said he appreciated the courtesy and patience of customers of KU.

"They did very well to be so inconvenienced," he stated. "We didn't have too many complaints. I just hope we don't have another ice storm."

An RECC spokesman said Tuesday that there still were about 200 homes without electricity in Rockcastle, down from 500 homes on Monday.

## Plan to speak out at Thursday's public forum

### Livingston alumni, citizens still want to save the school

Livingston-area residents, alumni and students still have not given up hope that they can keep Livingston Elementary School from closing.

Livingston Mayor Ralph Hamilton said Tuesday that he is urging everyone who does not want the school to close, to attend a public hearing scheduled for Thursday, February 17 (tonight) at Rockcastle Co. High School at 7 p.m.

In December, the Rockcastle Local Planning Committee (LPC) voted to recommend the closing of Livingston Elementary.

"This is a public forum which is vital for the future of the Livingston Elementary School. We need as many people as possible to speak out in support of the school. Unless we change the minds of the local board of education, the school may be permanently closed," Hamilton said in a pamphlet distributed among Livingston citizens. "In order to make this work, we need to work together," the pamphlet said.

"Many small Kentucky communities have been successful in keeping their small schools open, despite the wishes of the local and state boards of education. We can still keep our school open," the pamphlet continued.

The pamphlet encourages citizens to speak out Thursday saying it may be the last chance to try and save their school.

Hamilton said that reporters from the Lexington-Herald and Lexington TV station will be at the hearing which will give Livingston citizens the opportunity to let thousands of people see what can be accomplished by pulling together.

The last public hearing on the school facilities plan is scheduled for February 22.

The LPC recommended the closing of Livingston Elementary "because of the few (about 120) number of students which will be attending there with the opening of the new middle school.

## Legislative Update

A serious crime happened every 4 minutes in Kentucky. Murder was committed every 37 hours. A rape was reported every 4.6 hours, and a robbery every 2.7 hours, according to the most recent crime report released by Kentucky State Police. Statistics confirm, what most of us realize, that violent crime in this Commonwealth needs to be addressed.

Scores of bills are being introduced before the 1994 Kentucky General Assembly that could make sweeping changes regarding crimes and punishments. Lawmakers will examine closely pieces of legislation intended to curb violence, strengthen juvenile justice codes, and tighten punishment for violent offenders.

First, let me outline a few juvenile bills introduced this first six weeks of the session:

- House Bill 359 overwhelmingly passed in the House of Representatives this week, and will now go to the Senate. This bill provides for handgun bans by juveniles under the age of 18 except for sporting events. This bill has the endorsement of the National Rifle Association.

- House Bill 130 would lift confidentiality rules to allow the exchange of information between agencies that work with juveniles, such as social workers and school officials. Another bill, House Bill 204, permits the publication of records of juveniles convicted of felony offenses or in which a deadly weapon was used.

- House Bill 205 would allow crime victims, their relatives and attorneys to attend juvenile court proceedings, which are closed to the public.
- House Bill 224 would allow children 14 years or older to be tried and sentenced without parole. Senate Bill 155 would allow the sentence of life imprisonment without parole as an alternative to the death penalty. House Bill 210 would prohibit parole or any form of early release if a crime is committed with a firearm. House Bill 96 prohibits shock probation for those convicted of serious crimes. This bill easily passed 86-0 in the House and now goes to the Senate.

The most comprehensive package presented is House Bill 390, the Omnibus Crime Bill. It addresses the classification of firearms such as assault rifles and machine guns; sets guidelines for possession and sale of weapons to juveniles; and outlines penalties. Two important provisions under this bill would require school employees to notify law enforcement agencies of any offenses involving firearms on school grounds; and require school officials to send state penitentiaries to notify victims, who have requested in writing, information about inmates released in their district.

In other legislative matters, public hearings were held for a second week on the controversial subject of legalizing casino gambling in Kentucky. The question is whether the General Assembly will vote to place the issue on a statewide ballot for Kentuckians to decide if casino gambling should be legalized.

Kentucky may join 46 other states which have seat belt laws. Last week, House Bill 215 was passed by the House in a 66-to-29 vote, and passage is likely in the Senate.

Just introduced this week was House Bill 470 which addresses Workers' Compensation. This bill would group all offices under the Labor Cabinet; limit attorneys' fees at \$10,000 per claim; and permit mediation to resolve disputes. It would create certified centers where physicians would assess illnesses or injuries, and report conditions and treatments to an ombudsman for Workers' Compensation. Under this bill, medical services would be provided by employers through a managed-care system. The bill would also establish a State Fund that would offer Workers' Compensation insurance in competition with insurance carriers.

## Movie -Review-

## Health Dept. News

Walking is something we have worked very hard to avoid. We have cars, elevators, escalators and buses to get us to where we want to go through the least possible physical exertion. Modern modes of transporta-

tion are useful and needful; however, a regular exercise program is also needful to maintain physical fitness.

Walking is an everyday activity that you can use on a regular basis to

give you more energy and increase your resistance to fatigue; improve your self-image; relieve tension and help you relax and sleep; tone muscles; increase stamina; and condition the heart and lungs.

If performed at the proper intensity for 20-30 minutes at a time, at least three times a week, walking increases the oxygen available to the body and enables the heart to use oxygen more efficiently. A regular exercise program can be a positive step toward a happier, healthier life.

Before participating in a vigorous, regular walking program you should see your doctor first if you are a male 45 or older, or a female 50 or older

and not accustomed to regular exercise - or if you have any physical problems. Otherwise, you should be able to develop a walking program on your own.

To ensure a successful walking program, you need to choose a specific time of day to walk and stick with it. You need to find a place where you can walk all the time; avoid heavily traffic areas such as main highways, rough terrain such as wooded areas, and don't walk at night unless it is in a well lit area such as a mall. If you want to walk alone, do so. But a partner may be more enjoyable and help you stick to your program. You need to wear comfortable

clothing that suits the weather you are walking in. Shoes are very important: choose shoes with thick, flexible soles that cushion the sole of the foot and absorb shock for the rest of the body.

Before walking you need to warm up which will limber up your body and prepare it for more strenuous exercise. The warm up should consist of stretching and moderate exercise, such as walking slowly for five minutes. You should end your walk with a cool down by walking slowly for five minutes.

There are other incentives for those who walk other than physical and (Cont. to A6)

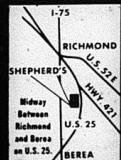

# It's almost time to buckle up or pay consequences; Senate bill kept alive

Kentuckians who are not used to fastening their seatbelts when they get in their cars may soon have to think twice about buckling up.

A State Senate committee kept alive a bill that would require people to buckle their safety belts or face a \$25 fine per seatbelt violation. Fines would be levied against drivers of cars instead of passengers, and would be \$50 for small children found not fastened in child restraint seats.

Sen. Tim Shaughnessy, D-Louisville, amended the bill to set up a Kentucky Spinal Cord and Head Injury Commission that would research spinal cord and head injuries. Motorists caught violating the seatbelt law and who were caught exceeding the speed limit by 10 or more miles-per-hour would be fined an additional \$15 that would go to the research commission.

Willie Ramsey, a minister from Somerset, disagreed with legislators about the importance of passing a seatbelt law.

"It is what I consider a corrupt use of government," Ramsey said. "People can wear seatbelts without there being a forced law."

The Senate Health and Welfare committee passed the seatbelt bill last week. It now faces debate and a vote on the Senate floor, before the House will get a chance to approve changes made in the Senate committee.

As expected, the bill faced a tough vote in the House last week, where it eventually passed 66-28. Speeches about "liberty" and "freedom" were intermingled with talks about "health care costs" and "public safety."

"I've had people say to me, 'It only affects me. Why should I have to do something when it only affects me?'" said Rep. Richard Lewis, D-Benton and sponsor of the bill.

Lewis pointed to a University of Louisville survey which said the

average medical bill for people wearing seatbelts when in an automobile accident is \$399, compared with \$1,541 for those not wearing seatbelts.

"The statistics are clear," Lewis said. "You, me and other Kentuckians are not islands. We're all in this together. Everyone's insurance is impacted by it."

Rep. Bill Lear, D-Lexington and co-sponsor of the bill, agreed.

"I've got one other thing to say about this mythical constitutional right to fly through your windshield," he said. "This mythical person must be someone who doesn't have any friends or relatives that depend on them in any way. We all know that person doesn't exist."

Not every House member, however, favored the seatbelt bill.

"This is not an easy vote to make, and it's not all one-sided," said Rep. Herbie Deskins, D-Pikeville.

Although wearing seatbelts does save lives, Deskins said Kentuckians should be taught to wear seatbelts instead of being told to wear them.

While seat belts would be mandatory statewide if House Bill 215 passes, local ethics codes could be left up to the discretion of Kentucky's counties.

The Senate passed last week the House bill that would allow county governments to set up their own ethics codes. The codes must set standards for conduct and for dealing with the hiring of relatives, although no minimum standards are given in the bill.

Sen. Philpot, R-Lexington, said he thought uniform codes should exist across the state and that this bill was "the easy way out" for legislators.

"I think it is the duty of the General Assembly to put some minimum standards for the codes," Philpot said.

In other action:

• The House passed a bill that would

make it illegal for juveniles to carry handguns for any reason other than sport. The bill is part of anti-crime measures proposed earlier in the session by Attorney General Chris Gorman.

• Sen. Land Sexton, R-Pine Knot resigned from the Senate Tuesday citing health and legal reasons, only to be indicted by a federal grand jury Thursday for failing to claim a \$3,000 contribution from a humana lobbyist on a campaign report. Sexton has not been present a day this legislative session because of injuries he sustained in a car accident last May.

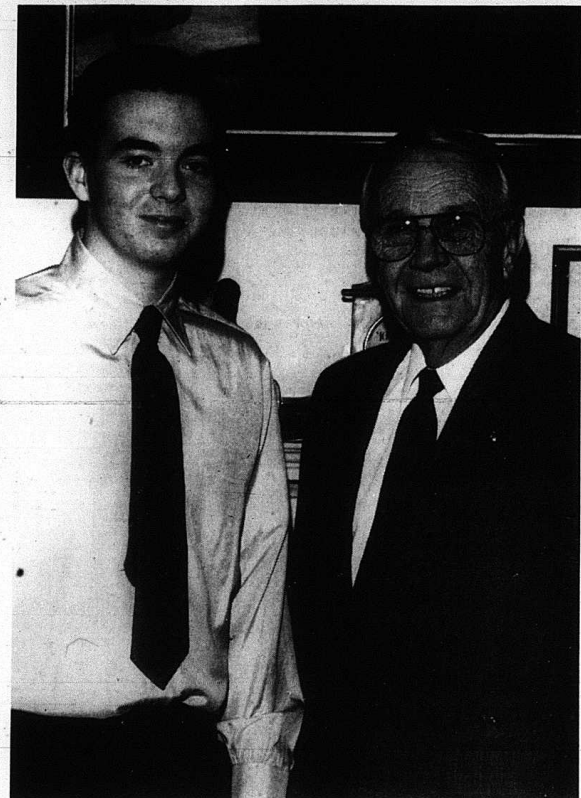
## News from the Rockcastle Saddle Club

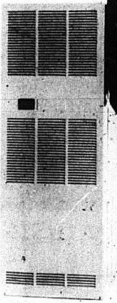





## Snow not really factor in recent harsh weather

The weather figures for February 1994 show a fair amount of precipitation but not enough to account for the trouble folks have been in.

There was a trace of snow on Feb. 1 followed by 2.20 inches of rain on Feb. 9.

Then on Feb. 10, a total of 2.5 inches of snow melted down into .43 inches of water and 1.5 inches of snow on Feb. 11 melted down into 1.47 of precipitation which included freezing rain and ice.

There was freezing rain and drizzle on Feb. 12 and a trace on Feb. 13.

Bud Cox, who keeps weather records for Mt. Vernon, went back to 1979 in the records but did not find much ice.

The most snow in that period was 13 inches on Feb. 3, 1985. Incidentally during January and February 1985 there was snow on the ground for 49 days.

Looking back unofficially, in 1928 there was a foot of snow on the ground topped by a crust of ice.

The agent said he thought there were only a very few dairy farmers in Rockcastle County unable to milk their cows either by hand or by using a gas-powered generator. "Some farmers did have to pour milk out, but not many," Mills said.

## Dairy farmers help each other during recent disaster

Last week's winter storm caused some inconveniences for many people, but for some area dairy farmers, it was a nightmare.

"We ran a diesel powered generator for more than four days in order to milk our cows," said Linda Reynolds, who runs a large dairy with her husband Eddie at Bee Lick. In normal weather it takes the Reynolds 14 hours a day to milk their 200 head, with the generator it has

taken a little longer.

The rest of the time the electricity has been off, the Reynolds have loaned their generator to Robert Brown and James McFerron, both dairy farmers, and both without electricity.

## Power Outages and Food Safety

With the recent power outages, thawed and spoiling food has become a fact of life for many across the county.

You may safely refreeze foods that have thawed:

- 1) if they still contain ice crystals
  - or
  - 2) if they are 40 degrees F (refrigerator cold) and have been at this temperature no more than 2 days
- Partial thawing and refreezing does reduce the quality of foods so use refrozen foods as quickly as possible.
- Meats can become unsafe to eat when they start to spoil. Examine each package individually. If the color or odor is questionable, discard it. Be especially careful with ground meats and poultry because their contamination level is high. Discard any packages which contain blood on the outside of the package, from leakage within the package or from other packages in the freezer. Meats may also be cooked and refrozen as a finished dish as well.

Other foods that should be discarded if thawed:

- any combination (home prepared or purchased) with eggs as an ingredient
- egg substitutes
- frozen desserts
- frozen vegetable that include a sauce
- any cooked foods
- pizzas with meat
- cream pies
- cookie doughs

Remember, if food is not safe for you to eat, it is also not safe for your pet!!!

### Infant seats and airbags can make a danger zone

Parents who use those automobile infant seats that face toward the rear should not use them in the front seats of cars that have passenger-side airbags.

Those rear-facing seats are too loose to the air bag. If an accident deploys the air bag, it can inflate with a force powerful enough to seriously injure a baby.

The U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration now requires a warning of the possible hazard on sun visors of cars and in the owner's manual. In addition, a new regulation will be issued soon to require a warning label on rear-facing infant seats.

But there are a lot of older cars and infant seats now in use that may not have those warnings. It is important for parents to recognize the potential danger.

The danger is potential. The safety agency's accident statistics do not reveal that any infant has been severely injured by an airbag deploying. However, laboratory tests have demonstrated the potential danger.

About 1.5 million cars are now on the road equipped with passenger side airbags. That's not a lot compared to the total number of cars on the road. But that number is expected to grow as more and more manufacturers continue to equip new cars with them.

"Snow mold is a potential problem on fine specialty turfs, such as golf courses and croquet courts, primarily in new seedlings," he said. The average homeowner or landscape manager does not need to be as concerned about this.

Pink snow mold is the most common snow mold disease, but there has been a diagnosed case of gray snow mold this year in Kentucky, which is unusual this far south; Vincelli added. Normally there is not enough snow cover to favor gray snow mold.

Extremely heavy snowfalls do not arrest snow mold activity, he said. In fact, heavy snow cover provides good insulation and allows soil temperatures to stay in the range of 32 to 34 degrees. Snow mold diseases can be active at these temperatures.

Golf course superintendents should scout for snow mold outbreaks this winter, particularly in new seedlings of creeping bentgrass or perennial ryegrass," Vincelli said. "Evaluate the situation and see if an active outbreak exists, which may justify a fungicide application prior to the next snowfall or an extended period of cool, wet weather."

Most products are labeled and can be effective, but some fungicides have been the most consistent in controlling pink snow mold in published studies, he added. These include fenarimol, iprodione, PCNB, propiconazole and thiophanate methyl. PCNB is generally a good choice for gray snow mold control, although other, good products are also available. The EC formulation of PCNB may cause phytotoxicity in some cases.

To help control snow mold, mow regularly if warm weather later in the winter promotes growth, remove mulches of fallen leaves and provide conditions favorable for good drainage," Vincelli said.

## Attention! Corn and Sorghum producers

Corn and sorghum producers with 1993 disaster losses are reminded they must request disaster assistance by March 4 to be eligible for possible forgiveness of advance deficiency overpayment.

Even if the disaster loss was not large enough to qualify for disaster payment, it may mean eligibility for some advance deficiency overpayment forgiveness.

Final deficiency payments will not be calculated until early March, but it is almost certain, given current prices, that the final will be less than the advance. To be eligible for forgiveness of any overpayment, the producer must request disaster aid at the local ASCS office.

## Dairy refund payment program

The Rockcastle County ASCS office announces the Dairy Refund Payment Program. Those eligible include persons who were commercial producers of milk at the farm level, those who received milk proceeds that were reduced by the statutory reduction, and those who did not during the year for which the reduction was made exceed their milk marketing from the equivalent months and days of the preceding calendar year.

A producer is eligible to receive a refund payment of withheld amounts if evidence is provided that the producer, and all dairies in which that producer has an interest, did not increase milk marketing in the refund period, when compared to the immediately preceding calendar year.

The producer seeking the refund payment shall be responsible for providing that the refund payment is due by submitting all relevant data

needed to establish eligibility of the refund payment amount. Acceptable evidence of marketings and reduction amounts shall be payment receipts or statements from milk handlers and address of producer, pounds of milk marketed during the refund and base period (1992 and 1993), amount of assessment deducted for CCC during the refund period (1993), and the name and address of the milk handler.

Those interested in the Dairy Refund Payment Program should come to the Rockcastle County ASCS Office no later than March 15, 1994, with the needed documentation to file an application.

ASCS Programs are open to all persons regardless of race, age, sex, color, religion, national origin or handicap.

## Farmers Home has large block of funds available

Funding is available through the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) to help very low income homeowners finance improvements to their homes.

According to State Director, Thomas G. Fern, Kentucky received a substantial increase in the allocation for Fiscal Year 1994 in the 504 loan and grant program.

The program provides assistance to help health or safety hazards from homes owned by low income and elderly families. Examples of how these funds may be used include:

Provides an adequate water supply and sewage disposal system;

Insulation, storm windows, doors and screens;

Repair or replacement of electrical wiring, roof, heating system, deteriorated siding or structural supports;

Repairs or improvements to make a dwelling accessible to a disabled or elderly person.

Loans at an interest rate of 1 percent with a repayment period of up to 20 years are available to those persons who currently own their home, need repairs to the property, lack the resource from which to make the repairs and meet very low FmHA income guidelines.

Grants up to \$5,000 may be made to those persons 62 years old who currently own their home or have a life estate, who lack the resources from which to make the repairs, lack repayment ability for a loan at 1 percent and meet very low income guidelines.

The maximum adjusted income for household in Jackson and Rockcastle County is: 1 person - \$8,700; 2 persons - \$9,900; 3 persons - \$11,150; 4 persons - \$12,400; 5 persons - \$13,400.

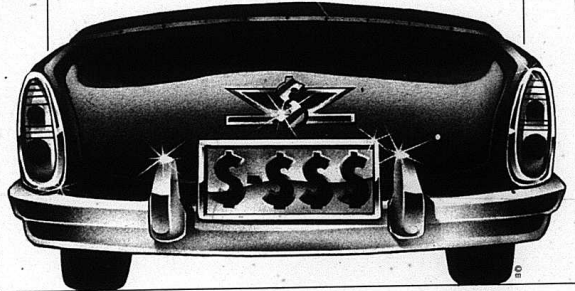

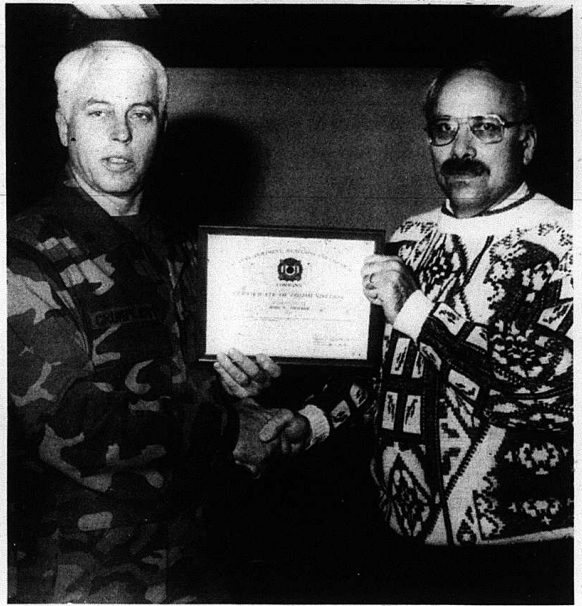

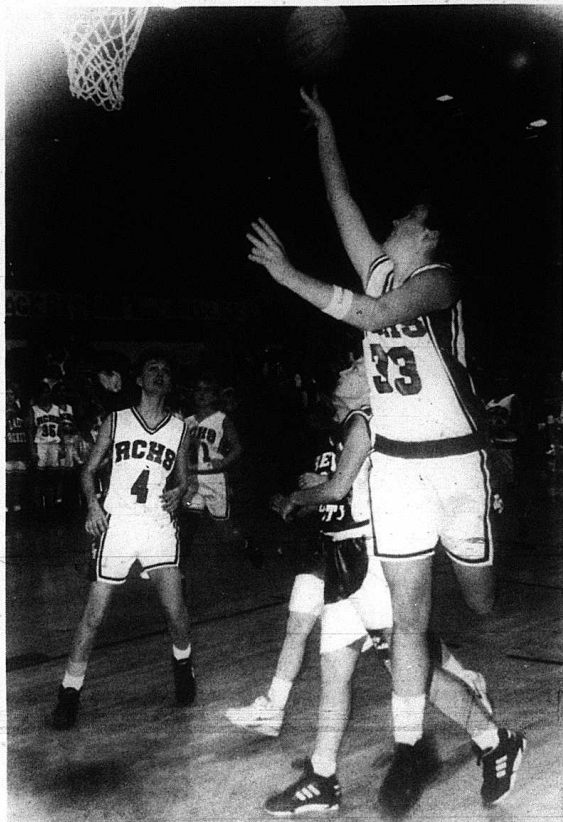
Pulaski cut the lead to one by sinking two freethrows off a foul by senior Janetta McLemore.

Another Rockcastle foul sent the Lady Maroons back to the line with 28 seconds to go, this time to take the lead by one, 66-65.

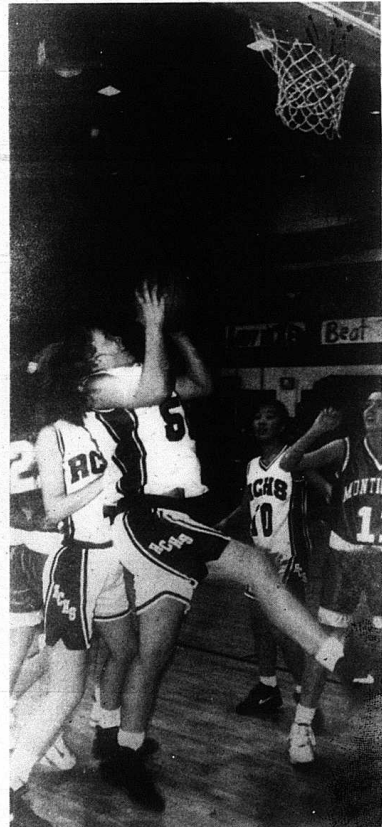
Pulaski turned the ball over with .5 to go, but the Rockets could not convert the turnover into a needed basket, losing a close one, 66-65.

Lincoln County fought back, however, with two key three point shots, taking control of the game, 6-4.

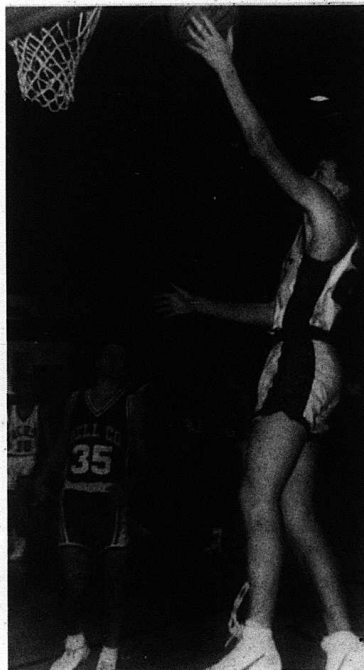
Rockcastle then had to play catch-up to the Patriots for the rest of the quarter, ending it down by four, 20-16.

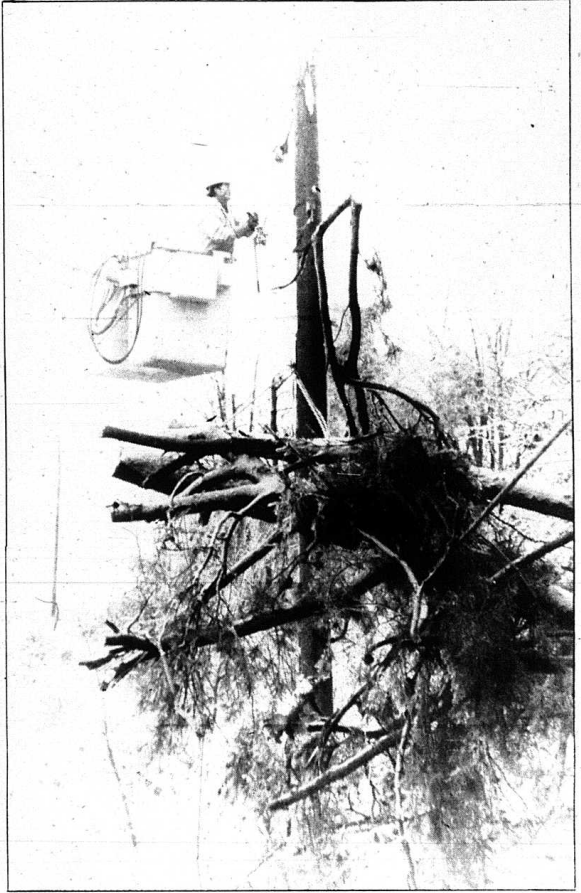

## Babbage announces deadlines

The Rockcastle County Republican and Democratic county executive committees have a March 15 deadline to submit names for the appointment of precinct officers to county boards of elections, according to Secretary of State Bob Babbage.

Each county board of elections has a March 21 deadline for appointing precinct officers for the 1994 elections. Both deadlines are set by state law.

The county board of elections appoints a total of four persons—two judges, one (election) clerk and one (election) sheriff to serve in each precinct for each election. Once appointed these individuals serve in all elections held in the county during the year.

Babbage, who by virtue of his office serves as the chair of the State Board of Elections, explained that the state board has the authority to review all county board of elections lists of precinct officers.

The state board, after a hearing, has the authority to remove any election officer who the board finds, based on clean and convincing evidence, would not fairly administer the state election laws.

The Secretary of State, the State Board of Elections and the Attorney General have successfully worked together during the past year to ensure fair elections.

Several indictments have been issued and investigation are on-going about allegations of election fraud during the 1993 elections.

Several recommendations made by Babbage and Attorney General Chris Gorman are the basis of legislation proposed during the current session of the General Assembly.

## Ford sponsors bill to help Kentucky military

Military personnel will have an easier time renewing an expired driver's license under a bill passed unanimously by the Kentucky House of Representatives today. Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon, sponsored House Bill 365, which would change the current law requiring military personnel to retake their driver's license tests after the expiration date.

According to Sandy Pullen of the State Transportation Cabinet, Kentucky currently allows military personnel up to a year to renew an expired driver's license without retaking the written or road test. But after one year, members of the armed forces are required to take a written test and

an eye test in order to have their license renewed. Under Representative Ford's plan, military personnel on active duty could renew the expired license 90 days after their return to the Commonwealth without taking any tests, including after the current one-year grace period has lapsed.

Ford says those affected by the current regulation brought the idea to his attention.

It is not fair to those serving their country on military assignment to have to be reexamined in order to drive. This is an injustice to those in the military."

At the present, thirty-two states have some type of expiration date

extension for military personnel. If the General Assembly passes House Bill 365, Kentucky would be the first state on record to waive the tests completely for military personnel.

The measure passed on the House floor 91-0. It now moves onto the Senate.

## Clear Creek Baptist Bible College on mission

Clear Creek Baptist Bible College, Pineville, will participate in a partnership with the union of Evangelical Christians-Baptists in Russia over the next five years. Clear Creek joins other Kentucky Baptists in response to the biblical command for Christians to "go into all the world and preach the gospel."

The partnership was approved earlier this year by Kentucky Baptist's executive board and subsequently by trustees of Clear Creek. Kentucky Baptists joined Baptists in Kenya from 1985 to 1987 when 779 Kentuckians went to Africa for religious and humanitarian aid. Eight hundred and fifty Kentucky volunteers completed a four-year partnership in 1992 with Baptists in Brazil.

Why travel to Russia? After 70 years of communist rule in the former Soviet Republic, Kentucky Baptists believe it is time to restore churches and provide theological education for Russian ministers. Clear Creek and other Kentucky Baptists will furnish lay and ministerial volunteers to assist with those needs. The Baptist faith, according to Paul Prather, religion writer of the Lexington (KY) Herald-Leader, has been present for more than a century in Russia where the Russian Orthodox Church is the dominant religious group. Russian Baptists, the second largest Christian denomination, have been persecuted by the orthodox Christians and Communists, partly because many Russians believe anti-Baptist propaganda.

The collapse of the Communist government led to dramatic changes in Russia's religious climate, with Russian authorities now more open to outside groups. Even public schools in Russia seek Bible teachers and Christian leaders to conduct classroom worship services, something not permitted in the United States.

Russians are embracing almost any spiritual movement they come across, and Baptists will attempt to educate the public about the differences in the many faiths.

Clear Creek president, Bill D. Whitaker, commented, "We are excited about joining Kentucky Baptists in this great effort to take the gospel to Russia at a time when the people there desperately need it."
