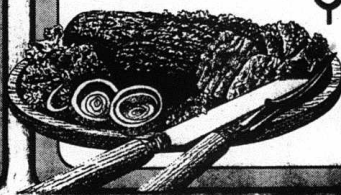

**Babbage notes increase in women candidates**

The number of women seeking nomination for elected office in the May 24 primary election has increased substantially since the last legislative race two years ago, according to Secretary of State Bob Babbage.

At the filing deadline the women candidates for congress this year doubled, from two in 1992 to four this year. Since then Barbara Gregg, D-Louisville, withdrew from the race. The figure tripled—from three to nine—for women candidates seeking their party's nomination this May for the state senate.

Women seeking election to the House of Representatives increased to 22 this year, double the number of women candidates in 1992, Babbage said.

Since the filing deadline passed on January 25, 1994, nine candidates have withdrawn from the primary. Five of the nine were female.

The Justice of the Court of Appeals seat vacated when Justice Janet Stumbo was elected to the state Supreme Court originally drew three candidates, two women and one man. Since the filing deadline, candidate Debbie McCarthy of Hindman has withdrawn leaving the race between Stephen Hogg of Pikeville and Sara Combs of Stanton.

Originally five persons were candidates for the 16th district first-winner district judge race. Four of the five were women. Since the filing deadline has passed two of the women candidates have withdrawn their names from the ballot.

In 1992 Kentucky held the distinction of having fewer women in its state senate than any other state. After women were elected in the November 1993 general election and special elections to fill vacancies in office, Kentucky now ranks 49th in this category. Alabama now is in last place.

Currently one woman serves in the state senate and seven women hold seats in the House of Representatives.

Women have always been vital forces in the democratic process. In recent years their role as leaders and candidates has increased," Babbage said.

Babbage noted that March was Women's History Month and the Kentucky Research and Education Institute for Women has begun a fund to erect a statue of Emma Guy Cromwell.

Cromwell was elected by the Kentucky Senate to the position of

state librarian in 1896, 34 years before women were permitted to vote.

In 1924 she earned the distinction of being the first woman elected by popular vote to a constitutional office—Secretary of State. In 1927 Cromwell became the first woman elected to state treasurer, a post currently held by Frances Jones Mills.

**Water patrol joins Wildlife Department**

The Kentucky Division of Water Patrol is the newest division of the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR). The change became effective April 16, the result of an executive order issued by Gov. Breton C. Jones and confirmed by the 1994 General assembly.

The water patrol division is funded by boat registration fees. Officers have full police powers, enforce boating regulations and educate the public about boating safety.

KDFWR Commissioner Tom Bennett is glad the division is on board.

"Since state conservation officers (COs) and water patrol officers share

the same turf," Bennett said, "we can eliminate duplication of efforts and better serve the public."

"Cross training between the law enforcement divisions means water patrol officers will be more alert to game law violations, while COs will

be more alert to boating violations," added Bennett.

The water patrol division was formerly administered by the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet. The KDFWR is part of the Tourism Cabinet.

**USA penpals sought for former USSR residents**

The organization "SAPE" (formerly "The Soviet-American Penfriend Exchange" in New York) is looking for 100,000 Americans between the ages of 10 and 40 who would like to strike up a penpal friendship with someone in the former Soviet Union. Since its inception in 1989, SAPE has linked up more than 20,000 pairs of penpals. News of that success has spread via word-of-mouth all across the former Soviet republics. This has resulted in an avalanche of mail—more than 100,000 letters—which has completely overwhelmed the small group of volunteers who operate SAPE.

Penpals are matched up on the basis of age, gender, choice of male or female penpal and, in the case of the small percentage who do not know English, common language. Because of the wide variety of mail, SAPE is usually able to fulfill requests for penpals from a specific geographic area. Letters have arrived from every major city in the former USSR, as well as from remote Siberian villages.

Despite the recent backlash against western-style reforms in Russia, the

## Says he did not kill wife Gilpatrick admits he made weapon found by police

Mt. Vernon social worker Allen Gilpatrick made the weapon that was apparently used to brutally beat his wife to death on February 7, 1993, it was learned in the first day of testimony in the much talked about, widely publicized case.

Gilpatrick, 49, is on trial in Somerset, charged with the murder of his wife, Virginia "Ginny" Gilpatrick, 55, on that Sunday evening.

Jury selection lasted all Monday morning and Commonwealth's Attorney Ray Carmichael began presenting evidence after a lunch break to a Pulaski County Circuit Court jury.

"What you're going to hear, ladies and gentlemen, is a story of love, betrayal and murder," Carmichael told the jury during his opening statement.

Mt. Vernon Police Officer John Bradley was questioned extensively by both Carmichael and John Clontz, Gilpatrick's attorney. Bradley said he was the second officer to arrive at the Gilpatrick residence the night of the killing.

Bradley testified that the weapon police believe was used to beat Virginia Gilpatrick was not found until the day after the killing, when police and Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell conducted a more extensive search of the house.

Dowell found a paper bag that held the bloody, homemade club, Bradley said, in a corner of a room on the opposite end of the house from where the killing occurred. After donning a pair of surgical gloves, Bradley demonstrated how the weapon was apparently put together to form a three-pronged club.

Two curved strips of metal were fitted together at one end to form a "Y," with a wooden dowel in the middle, Bradley explained. A piece of metal tubing fitted over one end to form a handle, which was wrapped in silver tape.

Bradley testified that he and Mt. Vernon Detective Eddie Delaney interviewed Gilpatrick the following day, and questioned him about the device.

"He said it was his, that he had made it... in the basement of his house," Bradley testified. "He said that's just for... just in case."

The officer also testified that he had seen a similar device in Gilpatrick's car sometime prior to the killing.

Clontz said Gilpatrick, as a family service worker for the state Department of Social Services, was required to make house calls in remote areas

of the county. "Didn't (Gilpatrick) tell you about an attack in Brodhead by a dog?" Clontz asked Bradley, implying that was the reason he made the club. "No, I don't recall that," Bradley testified.

Clontz also questioned Bradley about a statement he took from Ann Lee Rigby Linginfelner, who may have been involved in an extra-marital affair with Gilpatrick. Mrs. Linginfelner was a co-worker of Allen Gilpatrick.

"Was she a suspect that night?" Clontz asked. "No, we were just trying to get witness statements," Bradley testified.

"You just picked her out at random to go talk to?" Clontz asked. "I was just following orders," Bradley said.

### Pathologist says:

### "Ginny" Gilpatrick struck 16 times with blunt instrument

Family members and friends of "Ginny" Gilpatrick were silent Tuesday in Pulaski Circuit Court as state forensic pathologist described the injuries Mrs. Gilpatrick received on February 7th, 1993, when she was beaten to death in her Mt. Vernon home.

Mt. Gilpatrick suffered massive, blunt force head trauma, Dr. Carolyn Coyne, testified in the second day of testimony in the trial.

Allen Gilpatrick, 49, is accused of beating his wife with a homemade club 16 times. The Rockcastle County trial was moved to Pulaski County at the request of defense attorney John Clontz.

Rockcastle County Coroner Billy Dowell, Dr. Tim Wilson, the emergency room doctor who tried to resuscitate her; and Dr. Coyne, who performed the autopsy on the victim, all testified Tuesday morning. Eddie Delaney assistant chief of the Mt. Vernon Police Department and lead investigator of the case spent the rest of the day on the witness stand and was expected to resume his testimony Wednesday.

Coyne spent several minutes describing the lacerations and bruises all over Ginny Gilpatrick's head and said the base of her skull was fractured in two places.

Coyne also testified about a stab wound on the right side of the victim's neck, which penetrated 1 5/8 inches. However, Coyne said the "blunt force impact injuries" to her

head killed her before the stab wound caused her to bleed to death.

Under cross examination of Gilpatrick's co-counsel Carl Clontz, the forensic pathologist testified that the injuries to Mrs. Gilpatrick could have been caused by a ball bat or wooden club.

Coyne also testified that the homicide club introduced at the murder weapon could also have caused Mrs. Gilpatrick's injuries.

Coroner Bill Dowell testified about finding the club the day after the killing in a brown paper bag. The bag was in a corner of a room on the opposite end of the house from where the killing occurred, Dowell said.

"I looked down in the bag and said, 'Well, looky here,'" Dowell testified. Dowell also testified that Allen Gilpatrick was distraught the night of Mrs. Gilpatrick's death.

The nine-woman, four-man jury, which includes an alternate juror, watched a videotape of the bloody crime scene filmed by Delaney. The jury also listened to a taped interview Delaney had with Allen Gilpatrick at Rockcastle County Hospital the night of the killing. Gilpatrick, at times, was difficult to understand as he was overcome by obvious emotion.

Tuesday afternoon, the jury watched a nearly two-hour, videotaped interview Delaney had with Allen Gilpatrick the day after the killing. At that point, Gilpatrick had become a suspect and Delaney read his Miranda rights and the accused signed a waiver of those rights on

clay said. "Did you take any fingernail scrapings?" "No."

"Did you check her clothes for blood?" "No."

"Did you ask to look at her shoes?" "No."

Clontz also asked Bradley if Mrs. Linginfelner had told him she was in Mt. Vernon on Sunday, driving her mothers car. Bradley said, "No."

Bradley also said he did not notice any scratches on the woman's arms and did not search the driveway at the house, two vehicles that were parked there when police arrived or the area in front of the house for blood stains, under questioning from Clontz.

during both interviews, Gilpatrick told Delaney he had gone to his office in the Scott Building, near his home that Sunday afternoon. Later, when he tried to call his wife to check on supper around 6 p.m., the line was busy, he said. He walked home and smelled a pot of soup on the stove when he entered the house, he said.

He went into the kitchen and noticed the telephone there by the stove was off the hook, so he hung it up after checking to see if anyone was on the line.

He turned around, he said on the tape, and noticed the dining room tablecloth was askew, then saw his wife lying on the floor between the dining room and living room.

Gilpatrick, visibly upset, told Delaney he checked to see if his wife was breathing and tried to find a pulse, then tried to give her CPR. He then went through the house to see if anyone else was there, he said, and then back to his wife.

"I tried to make her breathe again and I picked her up... I tried to pick her up and couldn't and opened the back door and yelled for help from Harold Wallace (a man who was staying with his father-in-law in a cottage behind the house), he said on tape.

He laid his wife back on the floor and noticed a knife lying nearby, he told Delaney on the tape. He picked it up, yelled for his wife's attacker to come out and ran through the house, finally throwing the knife in the kitchen sink. Then he called the police from the kitchen phone, he said.

Under Delaney's questioning, Gilpatrick said, on the tape, he had not wiped his hands off and did not wash his hands until he went to the hospital later. Commonwealth's Attorney Ray Carmichael entered the telephone as evidence after Delaney testified he did not find any blood on the telephone.

During the last hour of the videotaped interview, Delaney and Officer John Bradley tried to get Gilpatrick to confess to the killing. Gilpatrick, however, consistently denied he had anything to do with her death. Delaney and Bradley questioned Gilpatrick about his relationship with Mrs. Linginfelner, who is expected to be called as a witness at some point during the trial. Gilpatrick acknowledged he had an affair with the woman during the taped interview.

Gilpatrick admitted he helped support the woman financially. "Allen, did you kill Ginny?" Delaney asked.

"No," Gilpatrick said on the tape. Delaney and Bradley asked him if he had killed his wife several times.

"Did you put the knife beside Ginny?" "No."

"Did you hurt Ginny?" "No."

"Did you stab Ginny?" "No."

Delaney and Bradley showed Gilpatrick the homemade club and asked him how it got from his car to the house. Gilpatrick, admitting the club was his and that he had made it, said consistently he did not know.

"Your story's just not standing up," Delaney said on the tape. "(There's

too many people that saw you yesterday. It just doesn't coincide with what you're telling us, Allen."

Later, the officers pressed Gilpatrick for a confession. "We've got a brutal assault. I just don't understand why," Delaney said on the tape. "What she went through she didn't deserve. I think you have a lot to think about."

"I didn't see anybody... I didn't hear anything," Gilpatrick said.

Testimony concluded for the day after Carmichael introduced into evidence framed photos of Mrs. Linginfelner and her daughter, that Delaney found on Gilpatrick's desk during a search.

The trial is expected to continue all week.

He was a character in class also. One day in Hebrew under Dr. John J. "Redtop" Owens, our able teacher and taskmaster, a student sitting next to Grady managed to fall asleep sitting straight up in his chair. That tired "Redtop" no little bit. He was into a lengthy explanation of Hebrew *paronomasia* ("punning"), his favorite subject -- the very mention of which I'm sure will spawn intense

For a moment, "Redtop" looked at Nutt, somewhat like those disgruntled deacons at Graefenburg, I suspect, and then burst out in laughter. And then we all did.



## Points East

For those of you who smoke, chew or dip tobacco and have wondered how these many years why it is so difficult to give up those habits; and also for those of you who live with folks who use tobacco and aggravate the heck out of you by burning holes in the carpet, on the couch and good clothing, who spit amber in your houseplants and cause your homes to smell and risk disorder to maintain their rights to do so, I have some solemn news.

Some hot shots from the government have announced that the last couple of weeks that nicotine is addictive.

Whoda thunk it???

Up 'til now, apparently, the conclusion has been that half a million people a year are willing to die the horrible, painful, expensive deaths by

cancer and spend billions of dollars in health care, just because tobacco tastes so good. I've been in hospitals to visit cancer patients who can't wait to get outside and light up. I've been told dozens of times by folks whose days were numbered that they knew certain things that tobacco smoke had rotted out their lungs and all they wanted at the moment was another taste of the very thing that had them on the deathbed.

What if lettuce caused cancer? Or chocolate ice cream? Or even soup beans? If word got out that any of those caused cancer, they'd be gone from the food shelves overnight. Nobody would miss them either. It's a safe bet that far more people eat lettuce than those who smoke. It's also a safe bet that hardly anybody would even touch lettuce if they knew for a fact that it caused cancer.

The difference between lettuce and tobacco is that lettuce doesn't contain nicotine. Nor does chocolate ice cream or soupbans.

I was watching a television talk show a couple of weeks ago, and by the way, I am convinced that many soap operas do contain nicotine, but anyway this was one of those legitimate things on CNN. Two or three scientists were explaining in great detail to the moderator that they had proven beyond doubt that nicotine was addictive. And they were acting like was the biggest damn discovery since Columbus sailed the ocean blue.

They said that it had only cost the government slightly less than a billion dollars to establish that fact.

And I'm still wondering why they didn't ask me 25 years ago. I could have told them then and saved all that money. The queer thing is that if people hooked on heroine or cocaine or any of numerous other addictive drugs required no research at all. When you can't just lay it down and walk away, you're addicted. When you spend hundreds of dollars on therapy and medicine designed to help you quit and the urge still overcomes you as it does millions of Americans every day, you're addicted.

When you come to realize that every time you light up or put a dip of snuff in your lip or a wad of chew in your jaw you're risking a premature death but you do it anyway, you're addicted. I guarantee you that you'd quit lettuce and ice cream and even soup beans in an instant if you knew that they had such killer consequences.

I'm addicted to nicotine. I haven't smoked a cigarette since I was 16. I spent nearly \$500 on nicotine patches trying to wean myself from the habit but I cheat big time. By giving up cigarettes and taking the smoke out of my lungs, I find that I have more "wind" and energy to walk long distances. But I have to take a puff or two of a wood-tipped cigar every hour or so to get my fix.

I don't even have to inhale the smoke. My tongue and nostrils can absorb whatever it takes to keep my system in balance and, as a consequence, keep me level-headed enough to pursue my daily routine without bothering anybody. And while I fear that nicotine will kill me, I feel an obligation that my habit not kill someone else.

We addicts do not have the right to smoke in our workplaces if our smoke is going to be a nuisance to anybody else. We don't have the right to poison restaurants and public buildings and our smoke, as surely as we walk, is poison. That we be regulated to going outdoors to kill ourselves is appropriate. Maybe younger kids really get the message that smoking really isn't cool. (Cont. to A4)

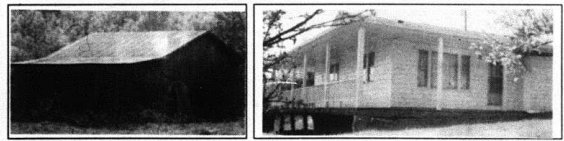



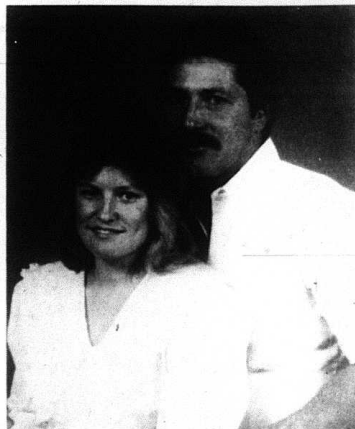

## International No-Diet Day

As May quickly approaches, it is a good time to rethink your dieting practices. May 5, has been declared International No-Diet Day. On this day, people are urged to give up their dieting and think about whether they are helping or hindering their health.

On and off "crash" diets do much more harm to the body than good. The American Medical Association says that it is unwise to attempt to lose more than two pounds of weight per week. Most dieticians suggest one pound per week. Excessive weight loss can leave a person tired and vulnerable to illness. Some vitamins and minerals may also be deficient in very low calorie diets.

When thinking about a diet, consider this - one pound of fat is equal to 3500 calories. So to lose one pound of body fat per week, a diet restriction of 500 fewer calories per day or expend 500 more calories in physical activity than needed. The average female needing 2000 calories per day could decrease her intake of calories to 1500 per day. After seven days, this would equal a pound of weight loss. It is not suggested that an individual expend 2000 calories take in less than 1500 calories per day.

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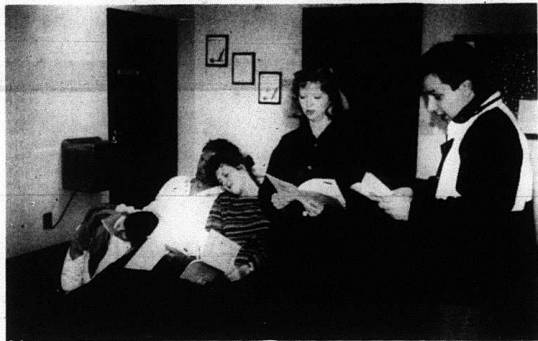

On the other hand, it still is a legal crop and it's the only crop that keeps most of the farms in Garrard County operating with black figures on the bottom line. While users are hooked and dying on the habit, growers depend on it for their very livelihood. Take tobacco out of our farm economy and Garrard County is literally dead meat.

I don't know that there is an easy solution. But if I were depending on tobacco right now, I'd sure be looking to sell my farm.

In the meantime, many of my friends and neighbors who make their livings growing tobacco are going to be very upset that I make such disparaging remarks about their crop. It's very interesting, if not confounding to me, that most of the folks I know who raise tobacco, don't use it. Most farmers, have more sense than we common addicts.

### Extension District Board Budget Hearing

A public hearing has been set by the Rockcastle County Extension District Board for Thursday, May 5th at 4 p.m. in the Agriculture Service Center Meeting Room.

The 1979 General Assembly has required such a hearing with the enactment of House Bill 44.

The purpose of the hearing is to inform the public that the Extension Service is proposing to take the compensating rate plus the allowable 4% increase. The current rate of .00025 would increase by .00001 to .00026. This would increase the property tax on a \$50,000 property value by 50 cents.

The anticipated revenue at .00026 is \$58,535.66 which includes 1,082.06 from net new property. The tax rate for the preceding year was .00025 with revenue of \$56,625.67. The compensating tax rate is .00025 with revenue of \$56,625.67.

Additional funds generated from the increase would be used for secretarial salaries, equipment and program monies in the Agriculture, Home Economics and 4H/Youth areas.

The Rockcastle County Cooperative Extension Service is a unique informal educational system which works with farmers, families, youth, business and community organizations. Programs in Agriculture, Home Economics, 4H Youth Development and Community Development are tailored to local needs through help from local leadership. Workshops, demonstrations, personal consultations and publications based on University of Kentucky research are provided to local residents and most are free.

### Controlling bagworms

**Description and Biology**  
Bagworms are the larvae or caterpillar stage of a moth that is rarely seen. In fact, only the males develop into typical moths capable of flight. The adult female is grub-like and remains inside the bag until just before she dies.

Bagworms pass the winter in the egg stage inside the bag that contained the female. In late May or early June the eggs hatch, and the small larvae crawl from the bag in search of food. By using silk and bits of leaves, bark or twigs, they soon build a small bag around their hindpart. As the larvae grow, they add to the bag, making it large enough for them to withdraw into the bag when disturbed. By early September the bags reach their maximum size of 1 1/2 to 2 inches. At this time the larvae permanently suspend their bags from twigs with bands of silk. The larvae then transform into the pupa or resting stage before becoming an adult.

Adults emerge from the pupal stage in early September. Males are black, furry, clear-winged moths without a 1-inch wingspan. They are active fliers and move in search of mates. The creamy white females lack wings and legs and appear to be no more than grubs. The male flies to the female bag, inserts his abdomen in the hole in the bottom of the bag and mates with the female. Once the fertilized female has laid her 500 to

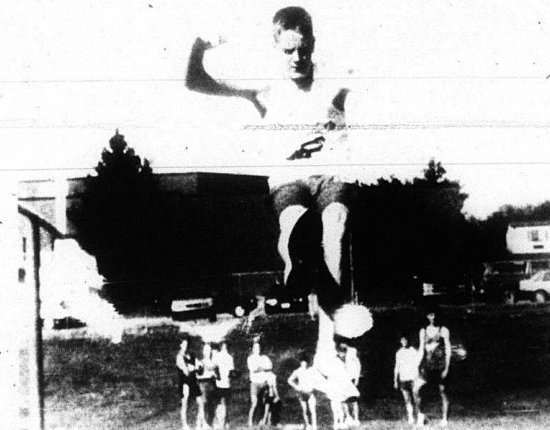

# Rogers pleads not guilty to conspiracy

Federal prosecutors have turned over 28 audio tape recordings to the defense of Senate Minority Leader John Rogers, whose trial is scheduled to begin June 20.

Rogers, 53, pleaded not guilty yesterday before U.S. District Judge Joseph M. Hood to charges of conspiracy, attempted extortion, mail

fraud and lying to FBI agents in the continuing investigation of corruption in state government known as Operation BOPTROT.

The charges deal with a 1984 banking bill backed by former Gov. Wallace Wilkinson.

The indictment says Rogers lied to the FBI about money he thought Wilkinson owed him for his support of the banking bill that allowed banks to expand beyond county and state lines. Wilkinson has denied any wrongdoing.

Rogers, a Somerset Republican who has been a lawmaker since 1976, said nothing to the judge at his arraignment. His attorney, Jack Smith of Louisville, entered the plea for Rogers, whose wife, Debbie, sat in the courtroom. He was released on his own recognizance, with no restrictions on his travel.

Federal prosecutor Steve Pence said the government has 62 pieces of evidence to introduce in the trial, including at least 28 audio tape recordings. He would not say whether there are more tapes.

The charges carry a five-year statute of limitations, but that limit runs from the point of the last act in the conspiracy. When that allegedly occurred is not clear.

A key piece of evidence in the case is a photograph showing a smiling Rogers with three other men and a life-size cardboard cutout of Wilkinson.

The black-and-white photo was mentioned prominently in the mail

fraud charge against Rogers. It was taken during the 1992 General Assembly by a photographer for the Legislative Research Commission.

The indictment against Rogers describes it as "a photograph depicting all known members of the conspiracy" to help assure passage of the 1984 banking bill.

Aside from Rogers and the Wilkinson cutout, the photo shows bank lobbyist William S. Wester of Lexington; the late Frank Miller, a Bowling Green democrat who was chairman of the Senate Banking and Insurance Committee in 1984; and former lobbyist John W. "Jay" Spurrier III.

Spurrier was placed on probation for two years yesterday for corruption charges.

During the bribery trial last year of Wilkinson's nephew, Bruce Wilkinson, Spurrier said that in 1984 Wallace Wilkinson promised Rogers, Wester, Miller and himself interest in a bank if they would help get the banking bill passed.

All four have said the allegation is without substance.

"We don't deny the photo was taken but it was set up by Spurrier, a government informant," attorney Smith said yesterday.

### Famed crooner performs at Bronson

Rogers' indictment is the first dealing with the 1984 banking bill in Operation BOPTROT. So far, 18 defendants — including 14 legislators — have been convicted or pleaded guilty.

If convicted, Rogers faces a maximum penalty of 50 years in prison and a \$1 million fine.

1,000 eggs in the bag, she is forced toward the bottom. Finally, she drops from the bag and soon dies. The eggs remain in the bag until they hatch the following May when the cycle begins all over again.

Bagworm larvae have two means of spreading from plant to plant. Very young larvae may release a small amount of silk and be carried relatively long distances by air currents, a phenomenon sometimes called "ballooning." Larger larvae may move short distances by crawling.

### Management and Control

Bagworms are often kept in check by several species of wasp parasites. Management practices should conserve the benefits of these natural controls. If your bagworm problem is limited to only a few small trees or shrubs, removal and disposal of the bags during the winter or spring may be sufficient to minimize the problem.

When many small bagworms are attacking evergreens, insecticides are needed to prevent serious damage to the trees. The best time to apply an insecticide is before the bags are 1/2 inch long or greater or as soon as there is noticeable damage to the trees. This usually is late June or early July. Do not wait for extensive damage. Thoroughly wet the foliage to obtain the best results. Some of the insecticides available for bagworm control are Dipel (bacillus thuringiensis products), Seven, or Malathion.
