

Venters gives Gilpatrick life

By: Richard Anderkin Rockcastle and Pulaski Circuit Judge Dan Veniers sentenced con-victed Mt. Vernon murderer Allen Gilpatrick to life in prison during sentencing last Thursday in Somerset. Gilpatrick, 49, was convicted in April by a Pulaski County Circuit jury of the brutal beating to death of his wife. Virginia "Ginny" Gilpatrick, 55, in their West Main Street Mt. Vernon home.

Allen Gilpatrick admitted during he triall that he made the club that was used to beat his wife to death, but he testified that he did not kill his wife on February 7, 1993. Circuit Judge Venters said.dur-ing seatencing that from the evi-dence presented during the trial that he believed that Allen Gilpatrick

dence presented during the trial that he believed that Allen Gilpatrick committed murder. "I don't know what happened with Mr. Gilpatrick, but I will say that by the evidence, I believe he committed this offense,"

believe he committed this offense," Venters told the Lexington Herald-Leader last week.
Gilpatrick's attorney, John Clontz, has appealed the murder conviction to the Kentucky Supreme Court. Clontz said that his appeal is based mostly on questions about the evidence gathered in the case.

Allen Gilpatrick has appealed his

But Judge Venters told the Her-ald-Leader that the evidence intro-duced was proper and convincing. Gilpatrick will be eligible for parole in 12 years. He is currently being held in the Pulsaki County jail, but he is scheduled for transfer to the Kentucky State Reformatory in LaGrange.

Clontz had requested for his clent to be released on an appeal bond while the case was awaiting to be heard by the Kentucky Supreme Court, but on Friday Judge Venters denied Clontz's request. According to Venters' ruling, in Kentucky when a person receives a life sentence or a death sentence state law

does not allow for an appeal bond.

Nor are we here to suggest that coal companies and even some farmers somehow became environmental saints overnight. The destruction of our streams in order to accomodate companies and respectively. commercial production of coal, limestone, and various agricultural prod-ucts has been turned around largely by average Kentuckians and it's been an often bitter fight every step of the

way. You don't hear or read about much You don't hear or read about much of that fighting anymore because we have laws on the books and agencies to enforce them that make it criminal to pour industrial pollution into the streams as though they were designed

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to be nothing more than private sewer lines. I remember one hearing in Frankfort in which the president of a large mining company declared that he wouldn't trade two truck loads of coal for every fish in Rockhouse Creek. He went on to tell the comminities that they were about to trade 50 high paying jobs for a few carp and suckers that nobody would eat anyway. And several sage heads of the General Assembly were nodding agreement.

Needless to say, saner minds pre-vailed and it's doubtful that strip mine reclamation laws have cost the indus-try a single job. In fact, the argument could be substantiated that responsible reclamation has created numerous jobs in the coal industry because it takes a lot of labor to pull



The Kentucky River from Neon to Carrollton and the Cumberland from Eolia to the lake and the Rock-castle from the mouth of Indian Creek to Bee Rock are littered with hundreds of tons of garbage that people just like you and me toss into them every day.

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We are much more than a long-term facility. Are you aware of the other services offered by your community hospital's Respiratory Care Department?

There are EEG (electroencephalograph) services for all ages. These tests allow a physicians to detect any abnormalities in the brain waves. These tests are transmitted to Lexington where they are read by a neurologist.

Pulmonary Function testing is also available. This type of test helps determine if lung function is impaired and to what degree. Another use of these tests is to determine eligibility for Black Lung Benefits. You can also see the amount of improvement achieved after using a bronchodilator.

Stress testing is a very important step in evaluating cardiac function. The patient has lead wires hooked to electrodes placed at various spots on the chest. He/she will then be asked to walk on a treadmill while the technician and physician carefully monitor the function of the heart during the "stress" of walking.

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





Other products to make life more pleasant include tactile board games for Scrabble and checkers, large-print cards, pens that light up, Braille watches and "talk-ing" calculators.
