dren of that family committed murder and murdered themselves in payment for a long lineage of ruin. Mikal is the brother of Gary Gilmore who murdered innocent men. After his murders he campaigned to end his own life and in January 1977, he was shot to death by a firing squad in Draper, Utah.

Many people, of course, already know this part of the story. What is less generally known, and what has never been much documented, are the origins of Gary's violence, and the true history of this family. These parts of the story remained unknown, until now, because no one would talk about them. Gary flatly

refused to discuss the secrets when asked about the family's past, but answered in maddening and evasive riddles.

For many years Mikal, too, avoided the past, distancing himself from it, hoping that whatever had turned his family's hopes to wreckage would not destroy his own life. He was

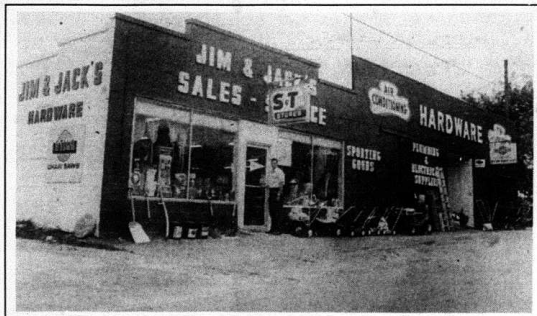
different from them, he thought. He could pursue his own family dream. Then, one day, that dream dissolved into nightmare. Mikal realized he had not escaped his family's ruin after all, and that the only way to do so, to bring an end to the horrible legacy, would be to go back into the family history and, finally, crack open its

god-awful secrets. And so he did. *Shot In The Dark* exposes and explores a dark vein of American life that most of us would rather ignore. It is a book that will leave no reader unchanged.

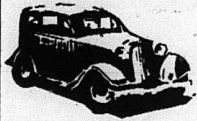

Nicole Blair, 16, of Fairview was seriously injured last Thursday morning on her way to Rockcastle County High School.

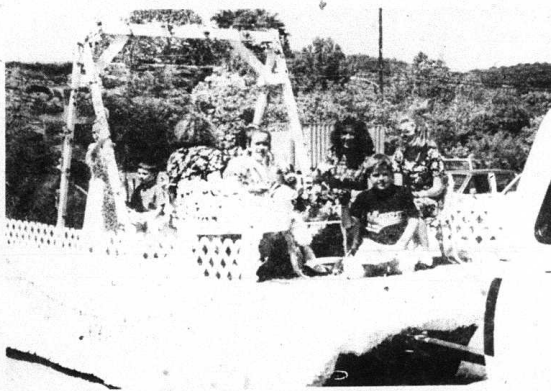

Follows jury recommendation

Venters gives Gilpatrick life

Rockcastle and Pulaski Circuit Judge Dan Venters sentenced convicted Mt. Vernon murderer Allen Gilpatrick to life in prison during sentencing last Thursday in Somerset.

Gilpatrick, 49, was convicted in April by a Pulaski County Circuit jury of the brutal beating to death of his wife, Virginia "Ginny" Gilpatrick, 55, in their West Main Street Mt. Vernon home.

Allen Gilpatrick admitted during the trial that he made the club that was used to beat his wife to death, but he testified that he did not kill his wife on February 7, 1993.

Circuit Judge Venters said during sentencing that from the evidence presented during the trial that he believed that Allen Gilpatrick committed murder. "I don't know what happened with Mr. Gilpatrick, but I will say that by the evidence, I believe he committed this offense," Venters told the *Lexington Herald-Leader* last week.

Gilpatrick's attorney, John Clontz, has appealed the murder conviction to the Kentucky Supreme Court. Clontz said that his appeal is based mostly on questions about the evidence gathered in the case.

But Judge Venters told the *Herald-Leader* that the evidence introduced was proper and convincing.

Gilpatrick will be eligible for parole in 12 years. He is currently being held in the Pulaski County jail, but he is scheduled for transfer to the Kentucky State Reformatory in LaGrange.

Clontz had requested for his client to be released on an appeal bond while the case was awaiting to be heard by the Kentucky Supreme Court, but on Friday Judge Venters denied Clontz's request. According to Venters' ruling, in Kentucky when a person receives a life sentence or a death sentence state law does not allow for an appeal bond.

A spokesperson in Judge Venters' office said Wednesday that there was no set time frame on how long it would take for the case to go before the state's highest court.

Lumber King buys Thrifty property for \$130,000

A Whitley City based lumber company has purchased the Thrifty Lumber Company property in Mt. Vernon and plans to open a new lumber store.

Lumber King with stores in Oneida TN, and Whitley City paid a top price of \$130,000 for the real estate when it was sold at public auction last week.

Sam Ford, of Ford Bros., who conducted the auction said that the real estate and equipment brought a total price of around \$187,000.

"It is my understanding that Lumber King plans to tear down all of the buildings on the present site and build a new complex," Ford said. Lumber King officials were unavailable for comment.

Points East

It occurs to me that, for the most part, environmental efforts begun in the seventies and toughened in the eighties are already paying huge dividends. Those dividends are particularly obvious to those of us who enjoy catching and eating freshwater fish and catching them by wading streams up to our straddles without worrying that we'll encounter enough acid to burn off our skin and other extremities.

Streams too numerous to list by name in the mountains that were literally devoid of edible marine life as recently as 1975 now hold admirable populations of smallmouth, largemouth and Kentucky bass. Fat channel catfish and redeyes, shellcrackers and red-eared sunfish seem to have risen from the dead. Linefork Creek in Letcher County which, just a few years ago, was one long silt basin is now regularly stocked with trout and there is evidence that some of them

are evading fishermen and growing into the two pound class.

Nobody is yet claiming that our streams will ever again be in the condition that ole Dan'l Boone found them, but the point is that they are no longer being ruined by irresponsible mining and farming practices. Nor are we here to suggest that coal companies and even some farmers somehow became environmental saints overnight. The destruction of our streams in order to accommodate commercial production of coal, limestone, and various agricultural products has been turned around largely by average Kentuckians and it's been an often bitter fight every step of the way.

You don't hear or read about much of that fighting anymore because we have laws on the books and agencies to enforce them that make it criminal to pour industrial pollution into the streams as though they were designed

to be nothing more than private sewer lines. I remember one hearing in Frankfort in which the president of a large mining company declared that he wouldn't trade two truck loads of coal for every fish in Rockhouse Creek. He went on to tell the committee that they were about to trade 50 high paying jobs for a few carp and suckers that nobody would eat anyway. And several sage heads of the General Assembly were nodding agreement.

Needless to say, snar msnrds prevailed and it's doubtful that strip mine reclamation laws have cost the industry a single job. In fact, the argument could be substantiated that responsible reclamation has created numerous jobs in the coal industry because it takes a lot of labor to pull it off.

Anyway, the bottom line is that the

fish are coming back and with them, a host of birds and muskrats, turtles and otters, crawdads and musseles and yes, even the ever fearsome brown water snake which I, for one would not have missed. You folks who read the Bible know that Christ walked on water. As much as I love the Lord, I'm not impressed with that fling feat because I've performed it myself on several occasions. Let a four foot water snake drop off a willow stump and head directly toward you when you're up your waist in Silver Creek and you will too.

I once saw a big snake come out of a culvert on Goose Creek in Clay County right in the middle of a baptizing. Two preachers and the lady they were getting ready to dip under somehow got out of the water by leviathan. Instead of walking on water, they simply rose and flew



Cadet trooper class for State Police scheduled

The Kentucky State Police is planning to start a cadet-trooper class in October of this year.

Applications for enrollment can be obtained at any Kentucky State Police post or Driver Testing Station (a station is located in both Lexington and Louisville) beginning June 1.

Listed below are the qualifications necessary to apply:

Citizen of the United States; not less than 21 years of age; of good moral character and in good health; possess a valid driver's license against which no more than five driver-incident points have been assessed; Possess a minimum of 60 hours of credit or an associate degree from an accredited college or university; or be a high school graduate with at least two years experience active duty military or two years experience full-time law enforcement as a sworn officer.

To compete for the next cadet class, applications must be returned to the location where they were obtained no later than June 27.

My sons were reading the dates on some headstones and one son said, "Why there are children who were born and died the same day."

In the side part of the cemetery, the headstones were so old, the names and dates were faded until they couldn't be read.

Then we left Scaffold Cane to visit other places and went to Cleve's and Blanche's house on Clear Creek next.

Cleve said no had visited them Sunday and they would be with themselves. We made pictures as we always do when the last few of us get together as we did when brother Bluford visited us last fall. He died two months later!

From Cleve's we went to the old Witt Cemetery, now called Macedonia Cemetery where my son, Barry Hamlin, and my baby sister, Edna Payne Smith, sleep. In line with them, John and I have placed our tombstone with space marked off for Russell and Chesley who are planning to be buried at our place. Once people didn't want to talk of the dead, or death, but now it seems to be the thing everyone does get ready so your grieving family isn't left to plan a funeral.

Russell and I walked out to the end of the Macedonia Cemetery to see headstones. These grounds were in good order, and clean, due to Jack Lakes who is caretaker for this cemetery. We walked the grass by the Himes family, Eligy, Susie and Bertha. Floyd Robinson who was killed in the war was the first of the family, being Gracie's young husband, to be buried.

John Abney and Ann, father and mother of Joe, who won't live anywhere else but on Clear Creek, lay sleeping under flowers.

We passed through the Shearer graves, Bill and Sudie, Taylor, Hez-zie and other children. My dear friend, Martha Shearer Hill, sleeps by husband, Luther, a beautiful flower blooming by their stone.

We came to the headstone of kin-folk Robert Allen who lived during the Civil War days and was buried there. Mother always said he had Indian blood in him and he looks it. A common thing in early days.

Next we came to my father's mother, Elizabeth Payne Pakes and husband, John Wesley Lakes lay. There was a beautiful headstone and flowers. Grandma had died first, he

living many years afterward, dying from a cancer in the mouth.

My cousin, Uncle Bradley Lakes daughter, Nellie Lake Veal, cares for the grave and keeps it so nice. This part of the cemetery used to be so bad looking but thanks to Jack Lakes and workers, it is kept neat and grassy.

Russell, Chesley and I had pictures made by the grave so the boys could say this was the burial stone of their "great, grandmother Elizabeth Clendenon Payne."

We had been to the Abney Memorial earlier where my beloved brother, Bluford, now lay sleeping between Grandma Taylor and Grandma Nancy Abney with dad, O.M. Payne and Martha Jane, our father and mother on the other side -- No longer is she alone in a far away state, he sleeps at home.

Last, we went to the Berea cemetery where Russell and Chesley's father, C.L. Cornett, with his father, A.B. Cornett and wife, Dora, along with son, Wilfred, are together in their last sleep.

Chesley was two years old when his father passed away, a young man with a heart attack. Chesley never knew him. So through the years, I have been father and mother both to my sons of whom I'm very proud.

The boys made pictures by the gravestone of their father.

We visited my sister, Virgie Payne Williams, husband Tine, and their daughter, Virginia Ann, who sleeps nearby. Then we stopped by brother John, and wife Mayme Payne's stone. A small tag fluttered over their grave because Mayme had been a member of the Eastern Star Society.

A car pulled up by us as we stood near the roadway. I was glad to see Daisy and Rosie Fennell, old friends whose husbands Bill and Jay were already under the sod/sleep.

Chesley remembered Daisy for when we lived near her and Bill when he was a little boy just before we moved north.

We came home after a wonderful day which my sons helped make for me.

My cousin, Russell Robinson passed away last week from cancer in the throat and I am deeply grieved over the sneakiness of this disease.

Russell was such a fine man. When he retired, he moved back to Berea with wife, Christine, and made a new life for himself by volunteering to do everything that would help people.

Not only was Russell a good servant of the Lord but he lived to be a friend to man.

Then cancer struck his vocal cords and I couldn't understand a word he said.

Russell took treatments and all at once he seemed to be getting better. I could talk with him.

Then it struck again. He was still doing volunteer work which he liked. I went to see him, happy that he was getting better. Christine looked as if she knew he wouldn't be here long as she told me later a few days before the end came.

Then Nyra Hart called me one morning and asked, "Did you know Russell Robinson died yesterday?" I could hardly talk for grief.

Next week, Chasteen Cemetery had Decoration Day on the first Sunday in June which is June 5th.

"Grace is God meeting us and accepting us just as we are!"

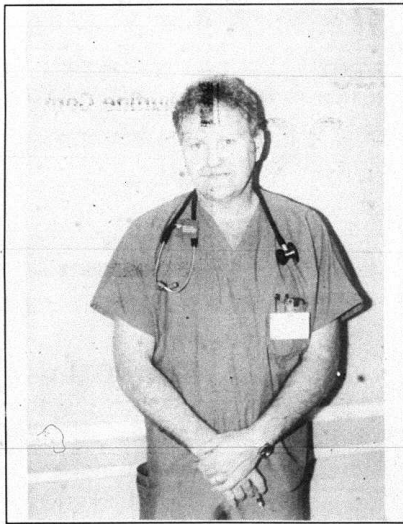

There are EEG (electroencephalograph) services for all ages. These tests allow a physician to detect any abnormalities in the brain waves. These tests are transmitted to Lexington where they are read by a neurologist.

Pulmonary Function testing is also available. This type of test helps determine if lung function is impaired and to what degree. Another use of these tests is to determine eligibility for Black Lung Benefits. You can also see the amount of improvement achieved after using a bronchodilator.

Stress testing is a very important step in evaluating cardiac function. The patient has lead wires hooked to electrodes placed at various spots on the chest. He/she will then be asked to walk on a treadmill while the technician and physician carefully monitor the function of the heart during the "stress" of walking.

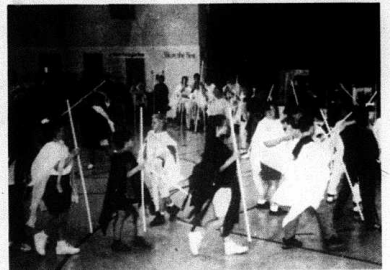

Your eyes.....

For most of us, ordinary eyeglasses or contact lenses can correct vision enough so we can see everything we need to. But for some people, visual acuity can be corrected only to 20/70, so they see at 20 feet what the average person sees at 70 feet; they are considered partially sighted. Those whose vision can be corrected only to 20/200, or whose field of vision is only 20 degrees, are legally blind.

Even though their vision is limited, these people can be helped to keep up with many of their normal activities. Improved low-vision aids include telescopic lenses, microscopic lenses, magnifiers that are hand-held or mounted, and specially designed reading lenses with stronger-than-usual powers.

Also available are services like "talking books" and large-print books and magazines. Other products to make life more pleasant include tactile board games for Scrabble and checkers, large-print cards, pens that light up, Braille watches and "talking" calculators.

Willie Nelson coming to Renfro Valley

Country music legend Willie Nelson and ACM Group of the Year Gibson/Miller Band headline Renfro Valley's outdoor Mega Concert on Sept. 25.

The Renfro Valley Jamboree stars and one additional national recording act round out the concert line-up. Willie Nelson, whose career spans more than 30 years, has won acclaim as a songwriter, singer and actor. Nelson wrote "Crazy" for Patsy Cline, "Hello Walls" for Faron Young and "Night Life" for Ray Price. With 35 of his own albums, 20 have been certified "gold," 12 attained "platinum" and 7 reached "multi-platinum." Nelson's trophy case holds 8 Country Music Association (CMA) awards and 5 Grammys.

The Gibson/Miller Band seems destined to echo Nelson's acclaim. Voted "Group of the Year" in 1994 by the Academy of Country Music, Band member Dave Gibson penned hits for Joe Diffie, "Ships that Don't Come In," Alabama, "Jukebox in My Mind," Tanya Tucker, "If It Don't Come Easy," and Steve Wariner, "Heart Trouble," "Midnight Fire." At the time of this article (5-20-94) we have all, we hope if not we need your help, of the south part of the county from Daniel Boone Parkway and the new West 80 in books at the Historical Society office. What is needed now is your help to finish the northern part of the county. When I began to help out at the office in 1991 they had about 20 cemeteries recorded. There was talk that we probably would find a total of about 80 cemeteries in the north part. But, we have to date a total of about

180 cemeteries that we know about. This is where you come into the picture, we need your help to find all that we can. As I go about the county looking for the cemeteries I meet some of you and as we talk I find out about many more cemeteries we had no idea were there, so with your help, we hope to have this research done by fall.

The interest that we have in the recording of the cemeteries is in recording some of them before they disappear. As some of you undoubtedly already know, some of the old cemeteries have been plowed up, bulldozed under and then had houses and crops put on them. Other reasons that prompt us to do this work, is that


when people from all over wish to research their families, one of the best way is to look at cemetery records. We need to know about the cemeteries even if there is nothing but field-stones there. This way we will have a record of the areas that people have lived in. We also would like to have a listing of the cemeteries outside of the "county proper" to within a mile of the Laurel County line. So with your help we will complete the work. I can not tell you how much your help will mean to us. Thank you.

"What Saith the Scriptures"
