place lost tobacco income. There are, nevertheless, opportunities available to farmers to diversify. For example, conventional crop and livestock can be used to partially offset lost tobacco income. Moreover, supplemental crops and animal products, including, but not limited to, fruits, vegetables, aquaculture and specialty products can be pursued. A fundamental obstacle to farm diversification in Kentucky is the absence of a suitable infrastructure for transporting, storing, and selling fruits and vegetables. Policymakers can help facilitate farm diversification by targeting rural development funds toward several different infrastructure investments. Some basic examples include coolers, storage facilities, and trucks to haul produce to markets. A specific example would include the proposed farmers' market in Northern Kentucky. By ensuring that projects such as this reach fruition, the state can play a positive role in facilitating farm diversification.

Work to enact legislation to have domestic content labeled cigarette packages. Approximately 50 percent of Kentucky's burley is used in the production of cigarettes that are consumed in the United States. However, the domestic content legislation that took effect in January 1994, which is designed to increase the level of U.S. grown tobacco leaf in cigarettes, will likely be ruled inconsistent with the free trade provisions of the GATT. Pressure will then mount on the United States to abolish this legislation. The same desired end (i.e., increasing domestic content) can be achieved through market forces if burley growers can capitalize on their comparative advantage of higher quality leaf, but this can only be done if domestic content is labeled on a pack of cigarettes.

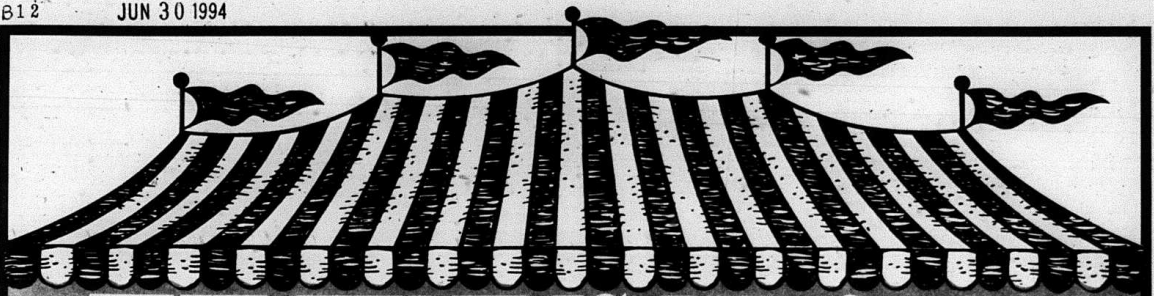

Renfro files suit against Mt. Vernon again

The City of Mt. Vernon and Mayor Gary Cromer have made it clear that they will exhaust all means available to try and collect a 3% ticket tax from the Renfro Valley Entertainment complex.

And Renfro Valley Entertainment Inc. is just as determined to continue to fight the 3% tax in court.

In January the Ky. Court of Appeals ruled against Mt. Vernon striking the ordinance down as being arbitrary and unconstitutional.

In February the city of Mt. Vernon voted to amend their business license ordinance and try once again to collect the 3% entertainment tax from Renfro Valley.

When the Ky. Court Appeals ruled against the city, they in effect said the city was singling out Renfro Valley Entertainment.

In 1990 the city annexed the Renfro Valley property into the city of Mt. Vernon and found that their business license fee ordinance did not cover entertainment centers and campgrounds.

So, Mt. Vernon amended their original ordinance to include these businesses and established the business license fee on entertainment

centers at 3% of ticket receipts, payable quarterly.

Renfro paid \$842.86 for the first quarter of 1991, but thereafter refused to pay the tax, declaring they believed it to be unconstitutional because the new ordinance pinpointed Renfro Valley in order for the city to get more revenue.

Renfro filed their first suit against the city in Rockcastle Circuit Court seeking a permanent injunction to keep the city from collecting the tax.

Circuit Judge William T. Cain ruled against Renfro Valley, saying that 3% tax was valid, but the court of appeals disagreed.

In February the city passed an amended business license tax and expanded its definition of entertainment centers as being those that "sell or provide entertainment or amusement including, but not limited to, musical performances, pool rooms, arcades, bowling alleys, movie theaters, carnivals, circuses, skating rinks or golf courses. The new ordinance has been in effect since February 24th of this year.

Renfro has called the amended ordinance a, "thinly veiled attempt to again single out Renfro Valley Entertainment Center for unfair tax treatment."

Renfro filed another suit in Rock-

castle Circuit Court last week, seeking yet another injunction.

Attorney John Clontz, who represents the city in this case, said Tuesday that after reviewing Renfro's last suit, "it certainly doesn't appear that Renfro Valley Entertainment is trying to be the good citizen they say they want to be. There are other businesses in the city engaging

in the same type of business as Renfro, who are paying their business license tax. Why should Renfro be treated any different," he said.

"Renfro has even filed a motion to get their \$842.86 back from the city, they paid in 1991. They haven't paid a dime sinceto do business in the city. That doesn't sound like a good citizen to me," Clontz said.

Renfro Valley generates sub-

stantial employment for this area. Every year we attract tens of thousands of visitors whose expenditures boost the local economy. We pay significant amounts of taxes to the county, school district and city of Mt. Vernon. We create a positive image with which the community can identify and of which it can be proud. We do not desire to be in litigation with the city, however the singling out of

Renfro Valley for taxation in excess of those charged other local businesses leaves us no choice but to again seek appropriate relief through the judicial system." Renfro said in a prepared statement released after they filed their last suit.

The latest litigation will take the same identical course as the last suit and be heard in Rockcastle Circuit Court by Circuit Judge Dan Venters.

Ballinger listed in critical condition

Well-known Rockcastle County ASCS Director Harold Ballinger suffered a severed a cerebral hemorrhage Tuesday morning.

According to ASCS office staff, Ballinger's wife Edith found him lying in the kitchen floor of their Three Links home early Tuesday morning. Ballinger, 59, was taken to Berea Hospital and then flown to a Lexington hospital, where emergency surgery was performed.

Ballinger's son, Harold Jr., said Wednesday that his father was in

very critical condition, with paralysis in one side, but that he was responding to treatment.

"He is in the fight of his life and he needs everyone's prayers," Harold Jr., said.

"Dad loves Rockcastle County and the people here," he said.

Ballinger, who is the preacher at Sand Gap Christian Church in Jackson County, has been ASCS director since 1969. He is scheduled to retire on Oct. 6.

Lifeline wants to do business here

An application for a certificate of need to expand home health services in Rockcastle County has been made by Lifeline Health Care of Somerset, a private facility.

A decision will be made no later than Sept. 21 to approve or disapprove the application which calls for a satellite office in Rockcastle with a capital expenditure of \$94,000.

Cumberland Valley Health Department operates in 5 counties and operates Rockcastle Home Health Care out of a Mt. Vernon office. Lifeline

Health Care would be in competition with Rockcastle Home Health, a non-profit organization funded by state, federal and local agencies.

Rockcastle Home Health Care is currently having a building constructed in the Industrial Park.

53 laid off at Parker Seal

The Parker Seal Co., in Berea laid off 53 employees last week, 45 of whom had been on temporary leave since September.

In late August, Parker Seal said it would move 70 jobs to Mexico. But union officials protested the move so the company decided to lay off 45 employees on a volunteer basis. Four others were on personal leave, reported Bo Bullock, unit manager.

All 49 employees were receiving company benefits, he said.

"We can't carry those benefits anymore," Bullock said. "So we had to say it wasn't a temporary thing any longer.

The four others laid off had the least seniority," Bullock stated. The company had to cut back because of a drop in sales, he said.

Parker Seal, makes O-rings-round, rubber seals used to keep engines and other machines from leaking. Before the layoffs the company employed 340.

Several Rockcastle countians who work at the plant will be effected by the lay-offs.

A total of 25 marijuana plants were found and destroyed Thursday on Brindle Ridge.

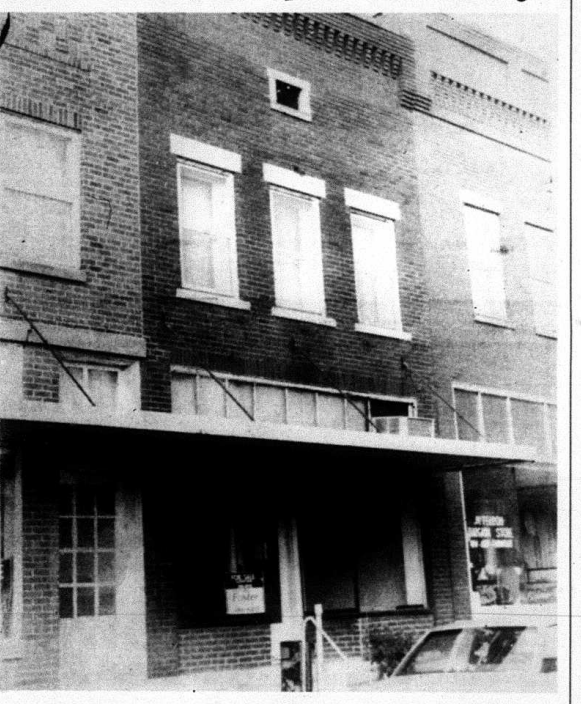
The plants were about two-foot tall police reported. Deputy Sheriff Randall Reynolds investigated.

A homeless shelter for county

Rockcastle County will have a homeless shelter in the near future. On June 1, Robert W. Adams, Executive Director of Kentucky Housing Corporation in Frankfort, notified the Daniel Boone Development Council, Inc. (DBDC) in Manchester that a \$50,000 grant had been awarded for use in Clay and Rockcastle counties.

The DBDC will spend \$41,500 on the purchase and renovation of the building at 105 Main Street in Mt. Vernon where Dr. Lee Cain had his optometry office before moving to a new location on Richmond Street. The Red Cross and REAP (Rockcastle Emergency Assistance Program) will occupy the first floor. Two upstairs apartments will provide transitional housing for Rockcastle County families who become homeless due to burnouts, natural disasters, etc.

The building will be called the Ashlee Carter Homeless Shelter. Ashlee, a student at Rockcastle County High School, died as a result of multiple injuries sustained in an automobile accident in December of 1993. The shelter will be named for her in memory of her concern for homeless families, and children in particular. Ashlee's mother, Betty Carter, is the director of the Rockcastle office of DBDC.



The former Dr. Lee Cain's office building will be the new location for REAP and the Red Cross and will also serve as a homeless shelter for county residents. It is located on main street in Mt. Vernon.

Board keeps 3% raise

The board had voted in the spring to give all employees the raise as part of the '94-'95 budget, but without the actual figures board members were afraid the money would not be available for the raise.

years will recall that that I am intrigued that other folks have doors in their homes that actually work.

We've installed numerous varieties of thumbblaches, hooks and springs that only members of our family understand in our attempts to gain security and turn the elements.

Anyway, I broke some glass out of the kitchen door which also serves as the principal entry to our place. It occurred to me that instead of replacing the glass that I would go out and buy a door that actually worked the way a door is supposed to work.

The particular door to be replaced was made well before the outbreak of World War II. I'd bet any amount of money on that. It hung crookedly, would not close tightly, and required instruction on precisely how to twist the knob half a turn in one direction and then a whole turn in the other if

you wanted it to come open. Jennifer's boyfriend, Paul Reynolds, is the only non-member of our family who had ever mastered it. Paul could knock on the door and someone could yell "come in" without anybody having to get up.

Any other visitors had to literally be let in and out.

So I hustled over to Lowes and bought one of those steel, pre-hung doors and all new hardware. The instructions said that I should be able to install it within an hour.

Sure enough, within thirty minutes I had a huge hole in the wall where a door ought to be and it was obvious that I was in big trouble because the hole was also big enough to drive a full-size pick-up through. My new door and another one just like it would have fit in the hole.

I finally called Loretta at work and admitted that I would have to call a carpenter.

I wound up back at Lowe's purchasing variously sized eight foot boards; roughly enough to build a decent two-hole out-house which is

PRECIOUS SOULS, CHILDREN OF AN EVIL AGE, greetings and similitudes from the tranquil Plains of Wabab, where Nancy and I dwell on Nod's Little Acre -- and where we finally got some relief from the heat!

After nearly two weeks of that humid stuff, I was beginning to think a passel of people hadn't "paid the preacher." That's an old-time way of saying folks hadn't given the Almighty a proper portion of their income. In other words, if you don't contribute amply something "evil"

might come your way. So it seemed to happen when I was a student at Cumberland College.

I had just been "called" as pastor of the Oswego Baptist Church, a mile or three south of Jellico, Tennessee. Oswego didn't pay a salary. Instead, they gave the preacher seventy percent of the Sunday school offering. The upshot of that method of ministerial remuneration is that if the offerings are "up," a pastor can assume he's in good standing with the congregation. However, if on a given Sunday the receipts are "down," a preacher can presume some parishioners are not pleased with his performance. If the offerings do down and stay there for several weeks a person had better get on the horn and see to it that his name is dropped into some pastorless church pots so the Lord can call him to another place of service.

I got off to an ominous start at Oswego. On my first Sunday the church burned to the ground! Honest! Cross my heart and hope to die! So, the congregation immediately made plans to build a new meeting house. We met for several months in an abandoned store building that was serviceable enough for the interim.

And the offerings went up. I was doing well financially -- so well that I bought a new '57 Ford from "Cotton" Foley in Berea. And the offerings continued up even after I showed up in my "new" car. It was as fine a car as any in the congregation, and finer than most.

Friends, that Ford was fantastic -- creamy white, four door with a bold, gold stripe on each side running the length of the car. And it had a "bat out of hell" V-8 engine, which I needed as a preacher in a case I had to "drag for the Lord" against some unbeliever. However, I soon came to the conclusion that my car was not as slick as it could be. So I added fender skirts, paying for them with my church offering money and telling the Lord I'd make it up later.

Our song leader at Oswego was sixty-some year old "Specs" Brown. He didn't own a car and counted on someone for a ride to church. I took a liking to him and "Mrs. Specs." Every Sunday I picked them up and drove them home, often taking dinner with them, especially when they served country ham. One Sunday at the dinner table, "Specs" came right out and told me that the congregation didn't mind my having a good car. "But some members," he said, "think them there fender skirts are showy and set a wrong example, seeing as how everyone will have to sacrifice to pay for our new building." That was a warning. The offerings stayed up.

Later on that spring I got the notion that my Ford still needed something more. I decided to have the rear end lowered, which was the "finishing" in those days -- once again "borrowing" the Almighty's money. And I added dual exhausts, which would give me ten to fifteen more miles per hour top speed in case I got in a race with some Philistine from Clay County or a Hiltie from Harlan. Then, in the ultimate touch, I had glass-pack muff

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

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Sweet and Sour

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"What Saith the Scriptures"

Book details a Kentucky town's ongoing sacrifice to the Vietnam War

The sons of Bardstown: 25 years of Vietnam in an American Town (Crown Publishers, June 8, 1994), by Jim Wilson, records the disproportionate loss of a small (population 5,030) town in Kentucky -- a loss that became a symbol of how deep into America the war had reached. In their patriotic commitment to serving their country, 17 Bardstown boys lost their lives in Vietnam, 5 in a single encounter on Tomahawk Hill. *The Sons of Bardstown* is being published on the 25th anniversary of that tragic battle. "In another, much larger, place, this concentrated loss or life might be assimilated much more easily," says Wilson. "But Bardstown is so small that everyone was related to, or friendly with, the boys who died in the war. It decimated a generation."

Bardstown, had a long history of commitment to fighting for our country. Since the Civil War, their young men had signed on with the military, but when Battery C of the Kentucky National Guard got called up for active duty, it sent shock waves throughout the state. "At that time, it was unheard of for a National Guard unit to be called up for federal service," says Wilson. "That's why many of the young men here joined the Guard -- to escape the draft. Worse, they were trained for riot control in the big cities, not for war -- the reason Battery C was activated." *The Sons of Bardstown* recounts the town's fevered pitch of preparation to send the boys out, with round-the-clock weddings and quick plans made as to how the families left behind -- many of them farming families -- would get by in their boy's absence.

The Sons of Bardstown introduces the families affected by the call-up, from Leon and Dorothy Collins, who had two sons ship out together and only one return, and even he badly wounded; Deanna Simpson, who was

told her husband was MIA when everyone knew he was dead; Charlene Chappel Hardt, whose father died on Tomahawk Hill before she ever got to meet him; Jerry James, a member of Battery C and a wounded survivor of the carnage on Tomahawk Hill; and others. These people's lives -- and many others like them --

changed forever when they read a tiny item in the *Louisville Times* that briefly mentioned a struggle engaged in by Battery C.

On October 11, 1969, the rest of the unit was shipped back home, and Bardstown could begin its lengthy healing process. "The war is always here, in my head," says Rebecca Crawford, widow of Captain James Crawford. "It always will be there, in my head." The battle of Tomahawk Hill meant nothing within the scope of the Vietnam War, says Wilson. "But for the people in Bardstown, it meant everything."

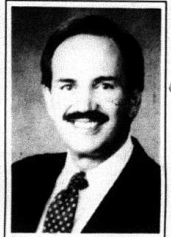

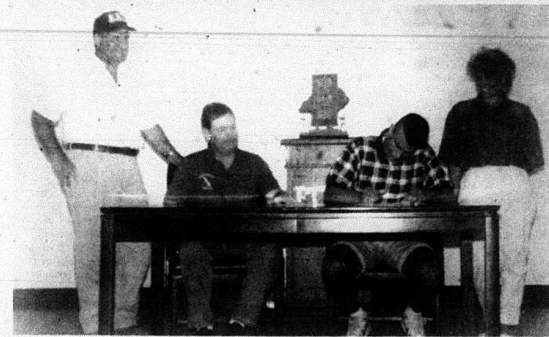

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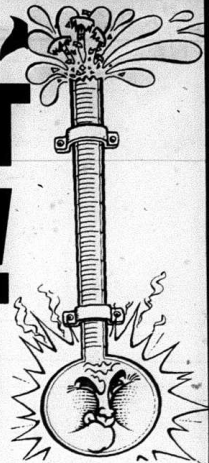

John Cox: Lifelong public servant, merchant

Tourists in Mt. Vernon like to visit Cox's Hardware on Main Street because of its "old-timey" atmosphere. In several ways it has not changed since Claude C. Cox opened it in 1908. It's most noticeable feature is the Cole's Stove that dates back to 1940.

What tourists probably do not know is that the white-haired man behind the counter is a character as colorful as the store itself, namely John Christopher Cox, who has worked in that store since 1937.

John became a member of the Mt. Vernon Fire Department in 1937 and has been Fire Chief since 1974. At age seventy-four, he might be the oldest active fire chief in Kentucky.

When asked what fires he remembers most, he will tell you the worst was the Vernon Theater fire in the mid-fifties in which pharmacist, Robert Harry Miller, lost his life. John also recalls a costly fire that totally destroyed Cox's Old Springs Resort. The Mt. Vernon Fire Department was called to assist in fighting that blaze. In the early fifties, M.V.F.D. also assisted in putting out a raging fire on Main Street in Broad in sub-zero weather. The firemen's clothes actually froze on their bodies. Another notable fire, one that usually brings a grin to John's face, was the one in which the fire house itself burned. And the fire truck wouldn't start and had to be pushed

out of the burning station! That fire began when a tenant who lived upstairs in the building let a pot of beans boil over and then burn.

John is a veteran of World War II. He landed on Omaha Beach about a month after D-Day and went on to spend most of his tour of duty time in Germany. John's brother James was killed in Italy during that same war. Consequently, John and his wife, Francis, named their son after James.

John is quite a fixit-man. He can often be found working at his "fixit bench" in the rear of the store. His specialties include window glass, screens and locks.

John's ancestors were English, known then as the Cocks family. His grandfather, William Henry Cocks, and some great uncles came to America to drill for oil. The venture was not successful and the uncles returned to England. William Henry met and married Matilda Jones and remained in the states.

John is very community minded, having been a member of the Mt. Vernon Chamber of Commerce since 1932. He is also a patriot who finds time to display the American flag.

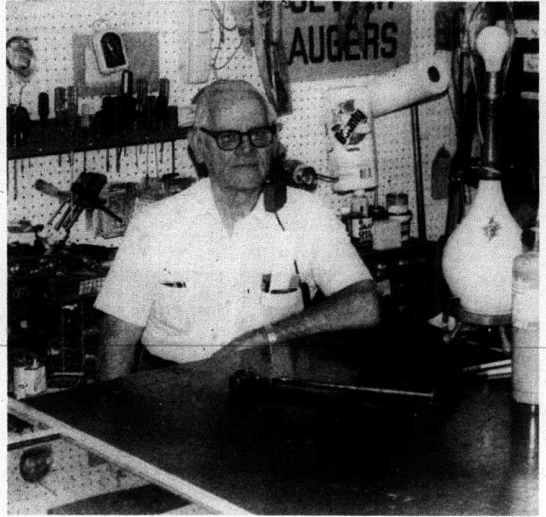
It is John's sense of humor that endears him to so many folks in the county. If he knows you, there's no telling what he might say to you in just one day a couple of years ago, Kenneth Cornelius rushed in the store to buy a walnut cracker. John was

working at his bench. Kenneth feigned frustration and said to John, "Get out here and wait on me. Sorry," John replied "What do you want, you ole drunk?"

John has gotten close to several ministers in Mt. Vernon over the years — ministers of his own Christian Church and of other denominations. Shortly after First Baptist minister, Wendell Belew, came to Mt. Vernon in 1949, John yelled out to him on Main Street as he was getting out of his car in front of Maggard's Drug Store, "Hey, preacher, have you got any beer?"

Once in a while a minister turns the table on John. When Wendell Romans, pastor of First Baptist in Mt. Vernon, came to town, he made it a practice to call on all businesses in town. Having gotten wind of John's penchant for jocular, he and his wife, Lena, went to the hardware store. Wendell introduces Lena to John, saying, "This is my mother." And he never told John otherwise. Several times John argued that Wendell was a single man before he found out otherwise!

What is the future of Ky's leading, legal cash crop

What does the future of tobacco look like, what does it mean for Kentucky and what can Kentucky's policymakers do about it? These questions are addressed by the Kentucky Long-Term Policy Research Center in a draft report, *The Future of Burley Tobacco: Likely Outcomes. Points of Leverage and Policy Recommendations.*

The draft report identifies and suggests the likely outcomes over the next 10 years of various factors that are expected to affect the future of burley tobacco. These trends include, but are not limited to, increasing taxation on cigarettes at the state and federal levels, decreasing domestic

cigarette consumption, declining levels of domestic content in U.S. manufactured cigarettes, and the increasing abundance of high quality (relatively cheap) burley in the world market. The trends are important to Kentucky because they could affect the burley quota, the amount of tobacco Kentucky's farmers can grow. A significantly lower burley quota could have serious economic and social consequences for Kentucky's tobacco-growing communities.

However, the report concludes that Kentucky's policymakers can exercise varying degrees of control over these factors and offers recommendations on courses of action.

According to the Center's analysis, there are many possible outcomes over the next decade for Kentucky's burley quota, but the most likely scenario is one in which structural factors will depress the quota by around 40 percent. Moreover, a decline of this magnitude is likely to occur even without a significant increase in the federal excise tax on a pack of cigarettes.

"Kentucky's basic burley quota could drop by as much as 30 percent within the next few years, but it could then rise once the pool levels are brought down," observed Michael Childress, executive director of the Center and author of the study. "The

center's analysis focuses on the long-term structural factors affecting future burley quotas, not the short-term oscillations. The economic and social impact will be felt unevenly across Kentucky; certain tobacco-dependent communities will be especially hard hit. Nevertheless, Kentucky's policymakers can mitigate the potentially harmful consequences of a declining burley tobacco quota."

The draft report lists other noteworthy findings from an informal survey of tobacco experts. These include:

- Over 95 percent believe there will be an increase in the federal excise tax on a pack of cigarettes. The cen-

ter's analysis focuses on the long-term structural factors affecting future burley quotas, not the short-term oscillations. The economic and social impact will be felt unevenly across Kentucky; certain tobacco-dependent communities will be especially hard hit. Nevertheless, Kentucky's policymakers can mitigate the potentially harmful consequences of a declining burley tobacco quota."

- Almost 60 percent believe the tobacco growing states can obtain a portion of the funds generated by an increase in the excise tax in the form of a "tobacco rebate".

- Nearly 90 percent of the experts believe that the domestic content legislation will not last because it is likely to be ruled inconsistent with free trade provisions of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT).

- Approximately 75 percent of the experts anticipate that cigarette makers will move manufacturing

The 24-unit for the elderly, handicapped and disabled will be completed in December, a spokesman for R.A. Williams Co. of Lexington, the developer, reported.

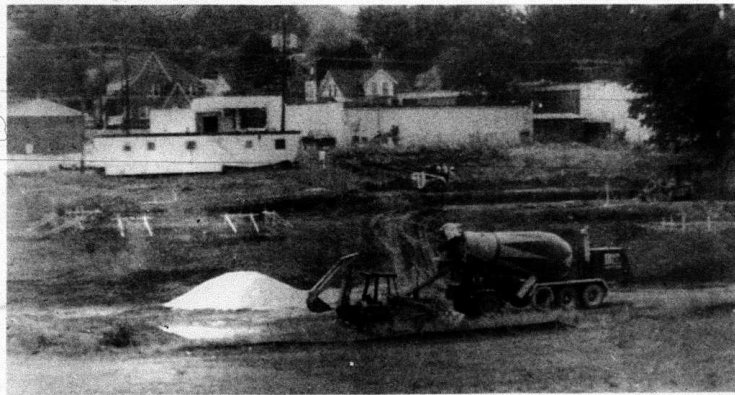
The Farmers Home financed project will be operated by Winterwood Housing Facility in Lexington. Trina Haskins, a spokeswoman, said the cost of rent will be based on income. Water, sewer, trash pickup will be furnished. Only responsibility for residents will be electric. Maintenance will also be furnished.

For residents, one person can make up to \$10,560 to live in the complex. Two persons can make up to \$12,120.

All spokesmen said the company is working closely with the city to make sure the complex will not cause any problems, especially water. Richard Moore is in charge of the city's interests.

The complex is located near the Mt. Vernon Elementary School where most of the city of Mt. Vernon's water drains.

Clarence Carter of Mt. Vernon sold the property to R.A. Williams.

Seat belt law will go into effect on July 15

Come July 15 two Kentucky house bills will go into effect that not everyone is happy about.

One is the seat belt law, which means you are supposed to buckle up.

Residents will also be required to have child restraints in the vehicle as well as seat belts for all passengers.

The House also noted a motorist cannot be stopped for failure to wear a seat belt, only in connection with another traffic infraction.

The law reads, "No person shall operate a motor vehicle manufactured after 1965 — unless the driver and all passengers are wearing a properly adjusted and fastened seat belt, unless the passenger is a child who is secured in a restraint system."

Exceptions for adults: A written statement from a physician or licensed chiropractor that the person is unable to wear a seat belt; a letter carrier of the United States postal service while

engaged in the performance of his duties; motorcycles, motor driven cycles, farm trucks registered for agriculture use only.

Failure to abide by the new law can cost not less than \$20 or more than \$100 for each offense.

The law explains that any person who abandons a vehicle upon the right-of-way of a state highway for 7 consecutive days shall be fined not less than \$35 nor more than \$100, or

imprisoned for not less than 10 days or more, than 30 days.

A second law is known as Kentucky's new disclosure law which means persons or firms in the used car salvage business must disclose damage to cars they sell.

Among those in Rockcastle who salvage autos are John Hamm of Brodhead, Jackie Burdine of Livingston and Mike Mink of Calloway. Burdine said he has about quit sal-

vaging cars for repair and sale.

The law says if your car had

damage of more than \$300 to fix, or estimates indicated it would cost that much, and the damage happened while you owned it, you have to disclose the damage in writing when you sell.

The disclosure must have the buyer's signature acknowledging the disclosure of damages and it must be

made before delivery of the car.

Individuals and car dealers must abide by the rule. Failure to do so constitutes a misdemeanor that could result in a \$500 fine and/or a year in jail.

Even under the new law, Kentucky will allow cars designated by other states as "junk" or as unrepairable to go back on the road after being rebuilt.

If you work at a computer
By: Lee Cain, O.D.

Long hours at the computer, whether for work or for fun, can cause eyestrain, headaches, even burning eyes. But it doesn't have to be-if you set up your terminal properly and schedule regular rest periods.

The screen should be arranged so that the top is no higher than the operator's eye level and the bottom no more than 40 degrees below eye level. To avoid distracting and uncomfortable glare and reflections on the screen, shade any windows in the field of vision or those reflected on the screen. Lamps should be offset. Consider installing a hood and antiglare filter on the screen.

The computer terminal is generally situated 18 to 24 inches from your eyes-middle distance. If you normally wear distance or near-vision correction-or, most especially, bifocals-you may be more comfortable in glasses with a middle-dis-

tance correction. The better vision they offer helps avoid neck strain.

Tinted lenses may add to comfort, too. To rest eyes, look elsewhere for a few minutes each hour.

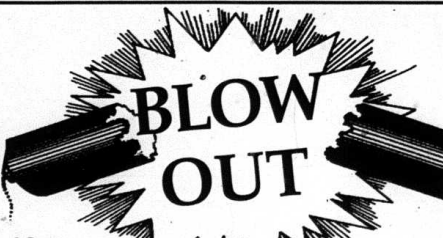

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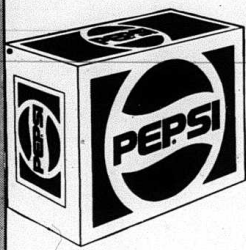

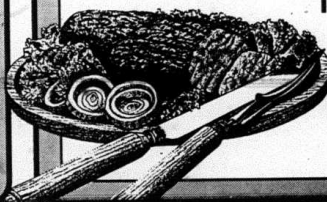

Ellen rents Ben a room, but what begins as a friendly business relationship slowly turns into something more.

Soon, life's expectations shatter on the rocks of the unexpected. Roles change in astonishing ways. Yet, ultimately, Ellen and Ben's love prove stronger than reason - in a powerful finale that will haunt the reader long after he or she has closed the book.

For our mystery readers; *Walking Shadow* by Robert Parker... With an unbroken string of suspense novels behind him, Robert Parker returns with his two-fisted sleuth, Spenser of *Paper Doll*. This is a twisty, ambitious whodunit, which finds them both breaking new ground.

Maintaining a good credit rating

It's a good idea for consumers to check their credit record at least once a year to be sure it is accurate.

The Fair Credit Reporting Act gives you the right to know what your credit file contains. You will be required to identify yourself to the bureau's satisfaction and may be charged a small fee. There is no fee, however, for anyone who has been turned down for credit within the last 30 days.

Everyone should receive a copy of their credit history reports from each of the three credit bureaus that maintain them. Requests must be in writing and include your name, address, a previous address (if within the last two years), your Social Security number, date of birth, phone number and signature.

If errors are found in a credit report from one bureau, make sure they

don't appear in reports from another. The three reports are not always the same. The three credit bureaus are: 1) TRW, Consumer Assistance, P.O. Box 2350, Chatsworth, CA 91313-2350; 1-800-682-7654. 2) Equifax, P.O. Box 74021, Atlanta, GA 30374-0241; 1-800-851-2674. TRW provides one free copy per year of your credit report. The other two charge no more than \$8 for a single credit report and no more than \$16 for a joint credit report of a husband and wife.

If you don't want to write to the three separate bureaus, a combined report can be obtained from Credco, Inc. of Carlsbad, CA by calling their Confidential Credit Line at 1-800-443-9032 and asking for an application.

The cost for a single report is \$24 plus 4.95 shipping and handling. If there is a joint report, two single reports must be ordered.

Information in credit files may be reported for seven years. Personal bankruptcy may be reported for 10 years. After seven or 10 years, the information can't be disclosed. However, when investigated for a credit application of \$50,000 or more, there is no time limit.

If you want a good rating, you must use credit with discretion. Limit borrowing to your capacity to repay and live up to the terms of your contracts.

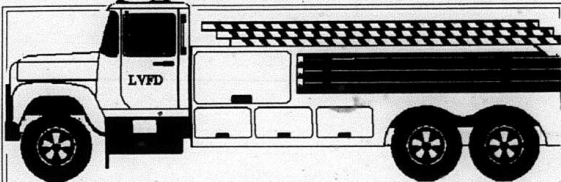
