Tourists in Mt. Vernon like to visit Cox's Hardware on Main Street be-cause of its "old-timey" atmosphere. In several ways it has not changed since Claude C. Cox opened it in 1908. It's most noticeable feature is the Cole's Stove that dates back to 1940.




