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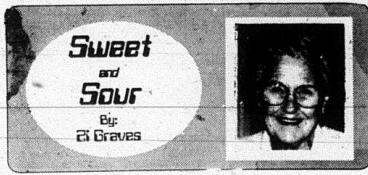

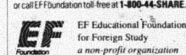

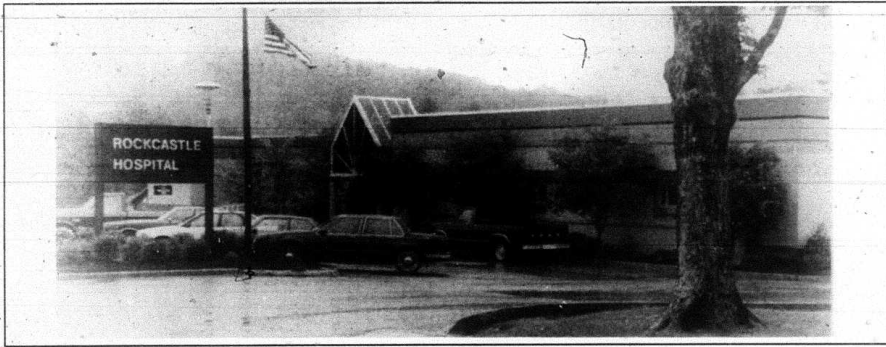

Local family sues ER doctor, hospital

A Rockcastle County woman has filed suit against the Rockcastle Hospital and an emergency room doctor on behalf of her deceased mother.

Gwen Flannery of Roundstone filed suit in Rockcastle Circuit Court on June 7th of this year seeking damages in connection with an October 24, 1993 incident involving her mother Dorothy Pearl Bullock, 77, who died the next day.

According to the suit, Dr. Rollin F. Snide an employee of Coastal Emergency Services and an emergency room doctor at Rockcastle Hospital, was negligent in the care he provided Mrs. Bullock on Oct. 24, 1993 when she was taken to the emergency room. "As a result of Snide's negligence Mrs. Bullock died on Oct. 25, 1993," the suit claims.

"The care provided Dorothy Pearl Bullock by Rollins F. Snide was a gross deviation from the requisite standard of care and constituted recklessness or gross negligence," the suit continued.

According to Flannery's attorney, Jerry Cox, Mrs. Bullock had classic signs of a heart attack when she was taken to the emergency room on Oct. 24. "She was treated and sent home and she died the next day," he said.

In their answer to the suit, the hospital, Snide and Coastal Emergency, deny that improper treatment was given Mrs. Bullock and have asked that the suit be dismissed and that a judgement be rendered against Flannery for their legal expenses.

Bootlegging charges against Orlando man

Another Rockcastle man has been charged with bootlegging. This time, an Orlando man was arrested last week and charged with illegal possession of alcoholic beverages in a local option territory and sale of alcoholic beverages.

James Michael Clark had 27 cases of beer, 16 pints of vodka, 9 pints of gin and 16 pints of whiskey.

Also confiscated were a memo book and \$135 in money. Clark was taken to the Rockcastle County Jail and later released on bond.

Three Rockcastle County men are due in Rockcastle Circuit Court for charges ranging from sexual abuse to assault in the first degree.

Everett Higgins, 65, of Poplar Gap is charged with shooting James Alexander in the face on Poplar Gap Road on March 7. According to police reports, Higgins shot Alexander twice with a .38 caliber pistol loaded with buckshot. Higgins told police at the time he was arrested that he was provoked by Alexander who was blocking the road, carrying a gun and making obscene gestures toward Higgins.

Mason indicted, bench warrant issued

A bench warrant has been issued for a man indicted in May for sexual abuse.

Carl Mitchell Mason, 58, of Ramsey Trailer Park in Mt. Vernon failed to appear at his arraignment to answer charges that he sexually abused an eight-year-old neighbor girl who was left in his care in March.

The child was examined at the Rockcastle Hospital after she told her mother of Mason's actions while she was in his care. Police and social service workers were notified after the exam.

HELP takes fight to Frankfort

By: Richard Anderkin Members of Hometown Education for Livingston Pupils, (H.E.L.P.) took to the pavement in Frankfort Wednesday in yet another attempt to save Livingston school.

Members of the local organization joined other disgruntled Kentuckians in a state-wide rally held in conjunction with the state school board meeting on July 7 and 8.

Elizabeth Bos, a member of (H.E.L.P.) who has spoken to the local board of education on several occasions told the group that local planning committees, such as Rockcastle's, "are the state and local board

in disguise." "They (the local board and state board) never intended to allow communities a fair seat in the decision-making process, and they have done a wonderful job of keeping our opinions and ideas and concerns completely out of the picture," she continued.

"We have attended public meetings, state hearings, presented petitions with thousands of names, held demonstrations and now a state-wide rally... and the outcome has been the same."

Ms. Bos said that schools are a center to most small communities with few immediate economic op-

portunities. "Our schools provide a link throughout many generations, they are a source of pride and identity and they serve as a support network," she said.

Ms. Bos said that in large consolidated schools there is more alienation among the students themselves, their relationships with their teachers and the parents to the teachers.

"Many experts, from Ivy League schools to state universities to independent analysis institutions, can testify to the fact that bigger is not better in light of a child's education," she continued.

Ms. Bos said that the state is doing

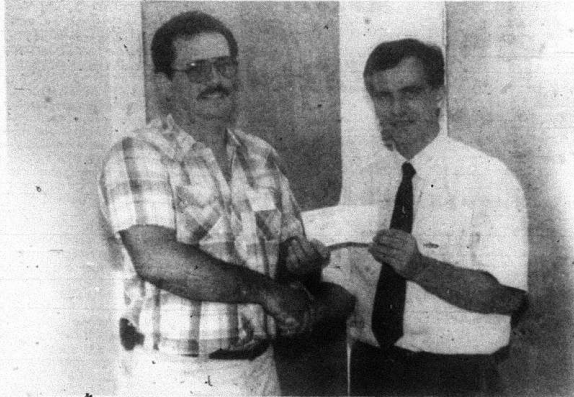
nothing to prevent the negative impact on children and communities and that bigger schools will bring about higher drop-out rates, more substance abuse and a huge drop in parent volunteer hours.

Ms. Bos is also scheduled to speak to a state school board sub-committee on Thursday and members of (H.E.L.P.) have said they will file suit in Rockcastle Circuit Court seeking an injunction that will allow Livingston to remain open while the case can be heard in the courts.

This spring the state school board approved a recommendation by the local board that Livingston close.

New water pump for industrial park, new high school

A new pump for a section of sewer in West Mt. Vernon has arrived and will be installed that will take better care of the industrial park as well as the new high school, which is set to open in August.

Richard Moore, city engineer, told the Mt. Vernon City Council at its meeting Monday night that the new pump should eliminate problems with the lift station in West Mt. Vernon and take care of additional lines on Jerri and Hunter Streets.

The council heard new sewer line installation will begin as soon as bids are called for about Aug. 8, and opened about Sept. 6.

The council put off until later a decision on Mt. Vernon's three parking lots.

Councilwoman Karen King told the council the lot at the depot could be closed off with a pay to park gate across for a cost to the city of about \$15,000, in fact, all three lots.

But the council tabled the discussion until the meeting Aug. 1 when they could finally determine how many spaces would be available for parking.

Babbage praises efforts educators at annual Campbellsville College awards ceremony

Commonwealth of Kentucky Secretary of State Bob Babbage told a group of nearly 200 central and southeastern Kentucky educators that Americans are more concerned than ever before about delivering values and ethics-based education in the classroom.

His address was given during the Eighth Annual Excellence in Teaching Awards Luncheon and Ceremony sponsored by and held at Campbellsville College recently.

"Our process today (in the classroom) is building young lives from the inside out. Education is important to providing students with values and ethics."

Keeping this in mind, Babbage said that this could be the "decade of transition" for students in Kentucky's classrooms.

Babbage said that all Kentuckians need to thank their teachers for the jobs they perform in the classroom. The point here is that the depth of our gratitude for you is missing. It took the ethic and spirit of Campbellsville College to say "thank you" on behalf of all of us. This day is all about thanking you for the impact teachers in Kentucky are made on their students."

As for the Kentucky Education Reform Act, Babbage criticized its authors for not including teachers in its formation.

"KERA's one big mistake was that it didn't include teachers and their opinions. Now that there are concerns about its reforms, teachers are being asked for their opinions," he said.

Babbage presented to Campbellsville President Kenneth W. Winters and Board of Trustees Vice Chair John Chowning of Campbellsville a state flag which will be flown on the pole.

He later said of Winters that, "This president is one of the great leaders of higher education in our state. You can look around this campus and see the difference he and his team have made."

Eighty-six teachers in 32 school districts received the Excellence in Teaching Award. The program began in 1987 with 50 teachers receiving awards from 17 districts.

The award was begun with assistance from Earl Aaron and the Ward, Cumfitt and Aaron Memorial Fund at Campbellsville College. The purpose of the program is to recognize the quality teaching and learning that are taking place in the school systems of central and southeastern Kentucky.

At Rally Ky. Residents strive to put "Public" back into public education

What: A state-wide rally and press conference in support of small community schools which are currently in danger of being consolidated into a larger school.

When: Wednesday, July 6 at 1 p.m. The event took place in Frankfort in front of the Capital Plaza Tower on Metro Street.

Who: A coalition of concerned citizens from counties that have faced or will face the consolidation of small community schools. Counties participating include Lewis, Knott, Rockcastle, Carter and Bath.

Why: For the past few years, many small communities in rural Kentucky have found themselves in a struggle against their county Board of Education to keep their schools from being closed. In most situations, the rationale for closing these valuable schools has nothing to do with the quality of education, and everything to do with the concentration of money and power.

Thus far, the struggle against such school consolidation has come in the form of voiced opposition at local town meetings and school board hearing, local rallies, and more recently, court injunctions against some county's Board of Education. But if Board officials have listened to citizens concerns, they have taken no action. Now, citizens from all over the state have networked into a state-wide movement, and are taking their message to Frankfort.

The time has come for the county and state Board of Education officials to acknowledge the importance of these schools and the communities in which they exist, not just look for more concentrated power. These officials' agenda has nothing to do with children and education, but with construction of monuments.

It is time to put the "Public" back into public education!!!!

An open letter to tobacco farmers

Since some politicians have chosen to misrepresent my position on tobacco, I wanted to take the opportunity to give you the true facts of my position:

(1) My wife and I raise over 150,000 pounds of tobacco a year, so

our crop is very important to the economic well being of our farm.

(2) I have never proposed a tax increase on tobacco. I oppose a tax increase on tobacco.

(3) Since more than forty states do not raise burley tobacco and since

tobacco is seen as causing health problems, it appears that some tax increase will take place at the national level. I believe this increase will be between 25¢ and 50¢ per pack of cigarettes. I do not favor this, but I see it coming.

(4) We must fight to get at least 10 percent of any tobacco tax returned to the farmer. I have been fighting to get this done. I have even spoken with the President about this, and he was receptive. All of our leaders need to join in this effort.

(5) In addition, we must fight to limit imports of foreign tobacco. I will continue to fight for Kentucky farmers.

inning from first base on a stolen base and a throwing error.

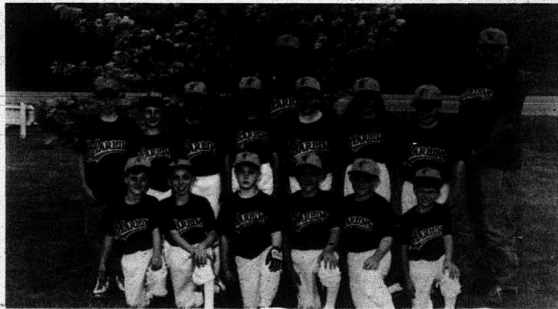

Danny McNew completes OT studies at UK

Danny McNew, Mt. Vernon, a senior occupational therapy major at Eastern Kentucky University, is achieving a significant educational milestone this summer and fall.

McNew, one of 57 senior OT majors performing their final internship, is tentatively to complete his work at Univ. of MS Medical Center, Jackson and Pitt County Memorial Hospital, Greenville.

For six months, EKVU's occupational therapy interns get to put their classroom lessons to practice, working under the guidance of established OTs in various health care settings. The interns meet a graduation requirement in Eastern's four-year occupational therapy program, the only program of its kind in the state. Each student works three months with persons with psycho-social disabilities and three months with persons with physical disabilities.

"Ask any occupational therapist out there," said Kathy Splinter, coordinator of the internship program, "and they'll tell you about their internships. It's that significant in their educational process."

A pass/fail grade puts the premium on the experience.

"I can guarantee they're getting an education at the site," said Splinter, an assistant professor in Eastern's Department of Occupational Therapy. "At the end of their internship, the student will have reached the level of a competent entry-level therapist."

Some of the internships are as far away as Arizona, New York, Texas or Florida. Many, though, stay closer to home, some in eastern Kentucky, an area lacking in OTs. Sometimes, graduates are able to gain full-time employment where they interned.

EKVU's Department of Occupational Therapy offers both bachelor's and master's degrees. Following successful completion of the undergraduate program, including fieldwork, the graduate is eligible to sit for the National Certification Examination of the American Occupational Ther-

EFFECTIVE JULY 15, 1994 - New regulations that will affect the County Clerk's Office.

Before a vehicle can be transferred, the buyer must present a proof of insurance card showing the buyer has obtained insurance on the vehicle being transferred to him. Also, new vehicles and those being licensed for the first time in Kentucky must have proof of insurance.

In determining a reduction in value for usage tax purpose for wrecked vehicles, the owner must have two estimates by uninvolved persons and the wrecked condition of the vehicle must be physically inspected and verified by a certified inspector as designated by the sheriff.

All boats having motors must be titled and licensed if operated on public waters. This includes boats with electric motors of any size.

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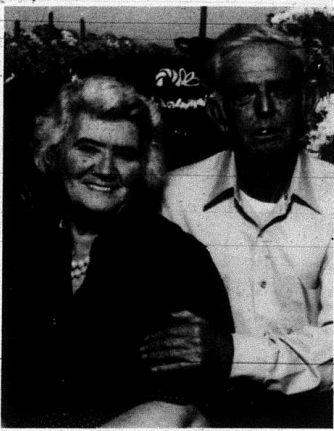

The Junior Team members, Matthew, Hayes, Eric Adams and John Dyehouse placed second in the Holstein Division. Matthew Hayes also

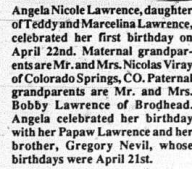
placed second overall in the Holstein Division and was second in the overall junior contest, a very good accomplishment.

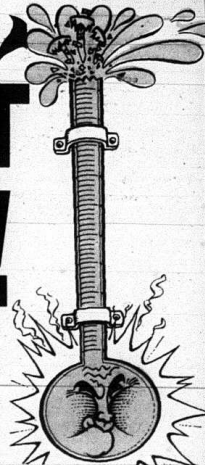





Money made available for low-income Kentuckians

The funds will be made available to local governments, housing authorities, nonprofit organizations and

or statewide housing assistance organizations on a statewide competitive basis. Projects will be selected based on area need, community cooperation, willingness to serve very low-income persons, additional funding leveraged, geographic distribution, long-term affordability, and housing/service experience.

The selection process will be conducted by the Affordable Housing Trust Fund Advisory Committee appointed by Kim Burse, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Housing Corporation. This committee is made up of housing industry professionals, as well as state and public officials.
