

## Middle School gears for 1994 campaign

With the new Rockcastle County Middle School also comes a new football team for the county.

They too, will be known as the Rockets.

Playing in what is called the Cumberland Valley Conference, the newly formed squad is anticipating the 1994 campaign.

"We are very excited and look forward to the season," said new head coach Troy Taylor.

Taylor will be assisted by Burley Burkhart and Chris Henrickson.

The Rockets will play seven conference games and two pre-season gridiron games. The conference is decided on the two schools with the best seasonal records playing for the championship.

Including Rockcastle the

conference has eight teams and is considered solid with strong competition. Corbin and Wayne County were the top two teams last year.

Forming the Rockets are 22 eighth graders and two seventh graders.

"We're making progress," Taylor said, "If we can keep everyone healthy, it looks optimistic."

"I'm really pleased right now," he added.

The team is considered big with a line averaging right at 200 pounds.

Candidates for leading the Rocket's offense are Andy Hale and Johnathon Burdette at quarterback. Brooks Ingram, Kevin Bradley and Josh Henrickson make up the backfield.

The Rockets will open the season at Lynn Camp Saturday, August 27.

Rockcastle will follow in their own Renfro Valley Jamboree Bowl the following week against South Western Pulaski. Pulaski was a young squad last year but return with speed and the best quarterback the Rockets will see this year.

As for the others, Larkey says Wayne County is a much improved team from last year.

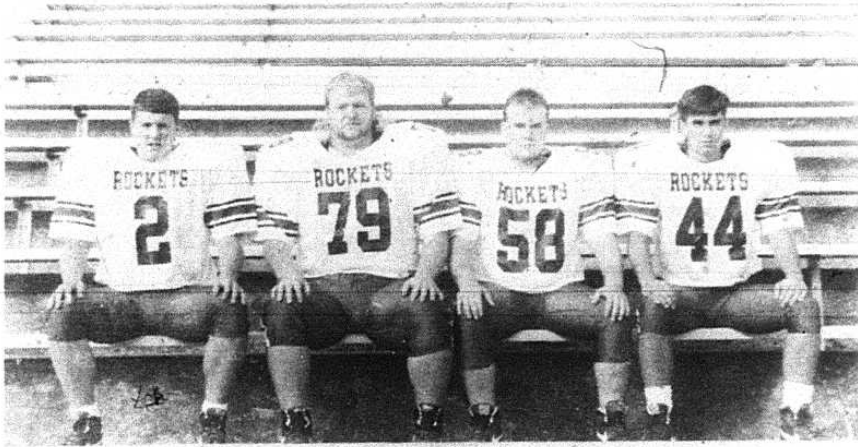
Somerset and Madison Southern are similar to The Rockets.

With our lack of experience, overall speed, skill and natural talent, it will be a challenge for this team to match some of the teams in the past."

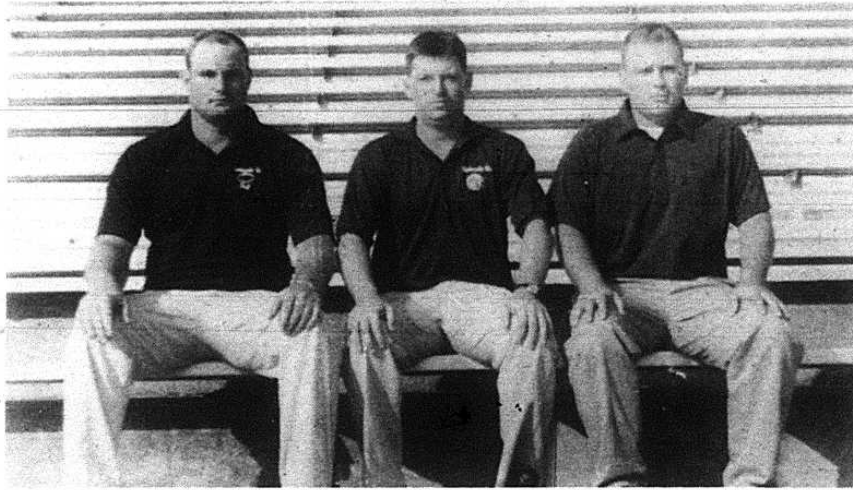
"I have faith in this team that they will come around and meet this challenge."

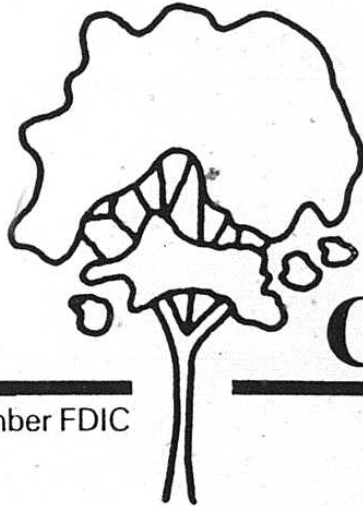
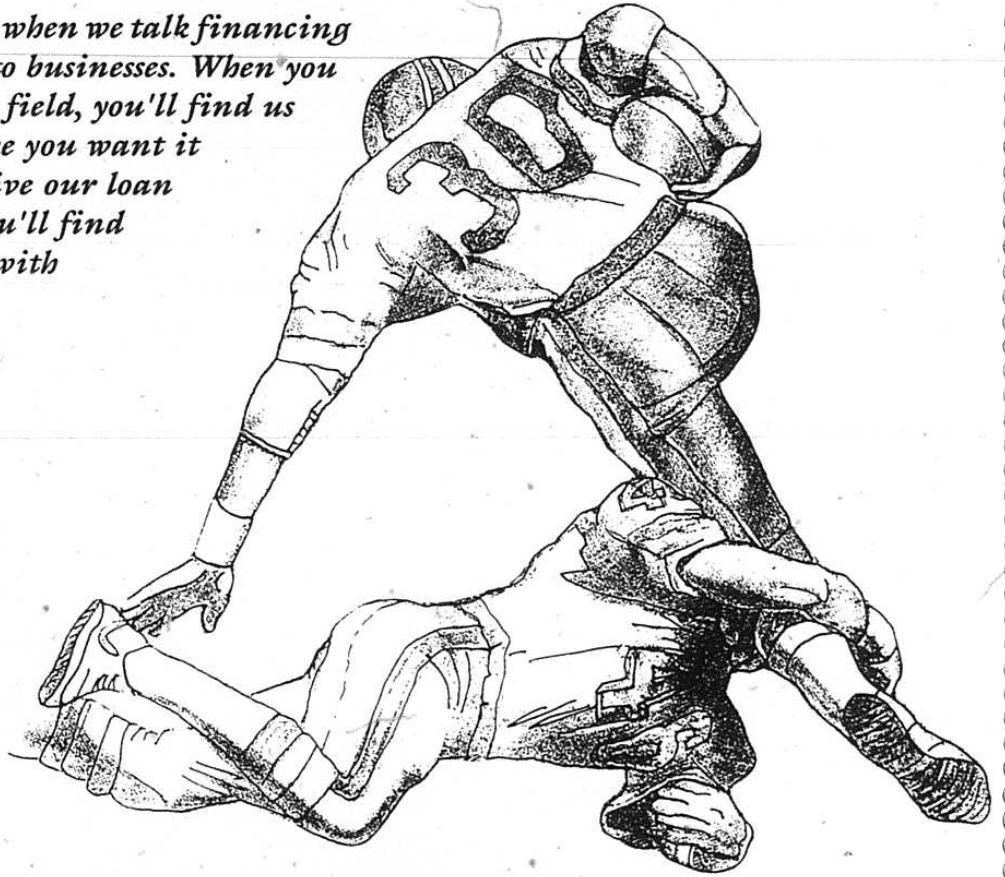
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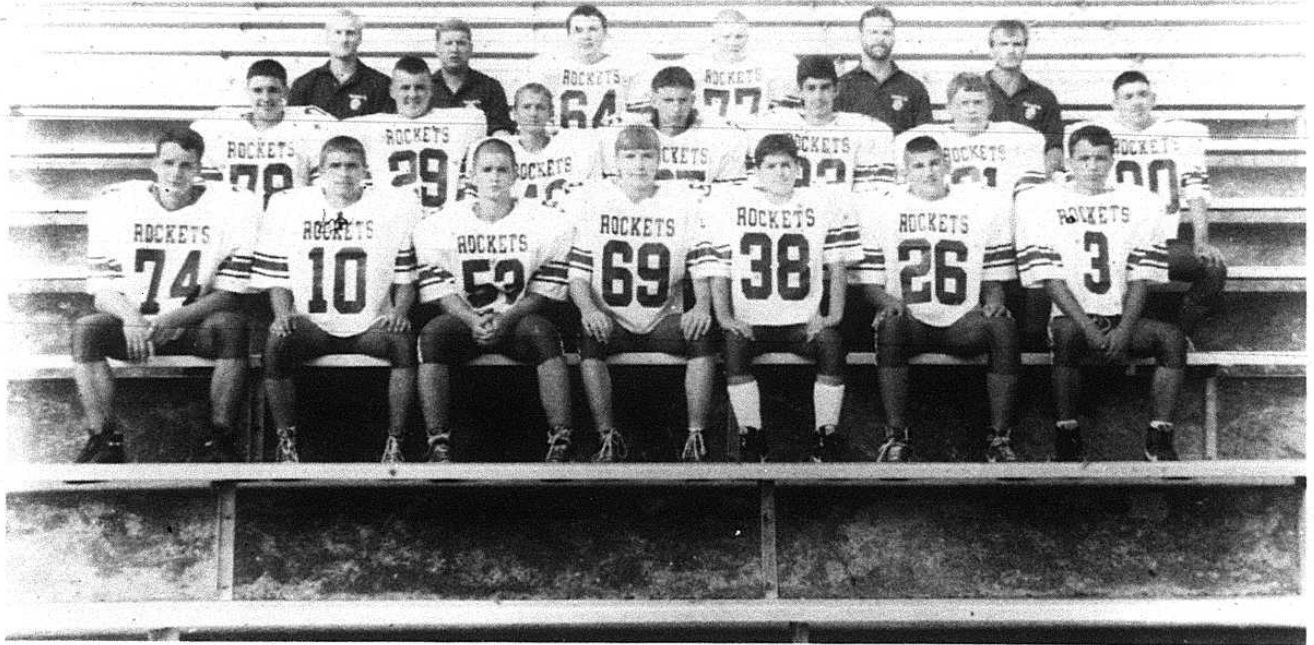

### Rumor false about school cancellation

The rumors that the Rockcastle school officials will call school off until after labor day, once they have enrolled students today, (Thursday) is "simply not true".

"There have been no such discussions with my staff about delaying school any further," said Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bige Towery, Jr., Tuesday.

"Construction crews continue to work at the high school, but we have been issued a temporary occupancy permit by the state fire marshalls," Towery said.

Rockcastle County High School students have attended two days of orientation at the new school and according to Towery everything has gone well.

"I'm sure a lot of the rumours started last week after Blevins Electric, the electrical contractor on the new high school, filed for bankruptcy

protection and walked off the job," said finance officer Richard Bray, who has headed the construction of the new school for the local board.

"Blevins' bankruptcy filing has not caused us any further delay," Bray said. "Our construction managers have already found a new contractor to pick up where Blevins stopped."

### Judge jails parent

A Rockcastle County man was sentenced to ten days in jail Monday after he was found in contempt of Rockcastle District Court.

District Judge Walter McGuire sent Fred Durham, 51, of Linville Road, to the Rockcastle County jail for not sending his child to Roundstone school during last school year.

Earlier, this year, McGuire had

ordered Durham and his wife Phyllis to send their eighth grader to school or face jail.

Monday McGuire sent Durham to jail and gave his wife two days to produce a doctor's statement that she was not emotionally stable enough to stay in jail. If Mrs. Durham can't produce such a statement, she too will have to serve ten days in jail.

## Local woman beaten, robbed

A Mt. Vernon woman was beaten and robbed last Thursday night, by two men at the Hawaiian Tropical Ice stand on Hwy. 25 North of Mt. Vernon.

According to Mt. Vernon Police Detective Eddie Delaney, Stacey Henderson, 26, of Mt. Vernon was getting ready to close the stand at around 10 p.m. when two unknown men tried to drag her out of the stand and put her in their car.

Miss Henderson told police that she did not know either of her assailants and that one of them actually allowed her to get away. Miss Henderson said that she did not see a gun,

but that the men indicated they had one.

Delaney said that Miss Henderson received a black eye, bruises and abrasions and was very emotionally upset when police interviewed her.

Delaney said that the money taken by the two men was from Miss Henderson and that they did not get any money from the shaved ice stand.

Delaney said that Miss Henderson gave police a description of the car and that police do have suspects in the case.

Miss Henderson, who will teach pre-school at Mt. Vernon Elementary this fall, has quit her job at the ice stand.

• Story time by kids professor book store at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m., east end of the mall between JoAnn Fabrics and Crafts & More.

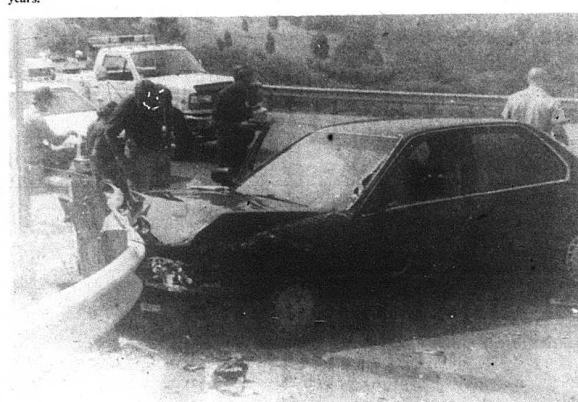

Autumn seems to be coming early to the knobs of central Kentucky. Over the last two or three weeks we've had several days when the daytime temperature barely reached 80 degrees. We've had nights down in the lower sixties and even a couple that broke the 50's barrier. Here on Fairview Ridge we can turn off the air conditioners and listen to the crickets in times like these and when we listen closely, we can hear owls whooo-who-ah-who-ah on the nearby ridges that are not troubled with major roads.

After midnight, on week-nights there's almost no traffic on highway 52 which happens to be the major east-west thoroughfare between Lancaster and Richmond. We have a normal run of drunks on Friday and Saturday nights in the wee hours of the morning with their stereos blasting and booming, shaking the timber and scaring the cattle but that's the price you have to pay for living right beside a main road.

We also have the occasional touring family from Michigan or Wisconsin or Indiana or Maryland or wherever pull into the driveway to ask how far they are from Berea or Fort Boonesborough and we do our best to make them feel welcome to

our neck of the woods before we write down directions and send them on their way. And that's the price we pay for living right on top of the ridge at the end of the six curviest miles in Kentucky. Actually it's not a price at all because I love to do it.

One of the kids will answer the door and then come running for me. "Dad, they will yell. There's somebody out here lost again."

And that's where I take over. I take great pride in telling lost souls that Uncle Tom's Cabin used to be right over the ridge and that they are in a part of the State that was well settled before the Revolution. I tell em not to worry about my dog because she doesn't bite, but to watch out for Fat Cat because he's trained himself to kill anything that doesn't feed him these meals or this.

Fat Cat is the ancient, skinny, yellow feline that came with the place when we moved in three years ago. When a stranger reaches out to shake my hand, every hair on Fat Cat's back sticks straight out and he hisses a threat that would put a rattlesnake to shame. Dogs that weigh upwards of a hundred pounds walk a wide circle around Fat Cat because he'd give his life for his meat ticket. And I'm that ticket.

One of the farm hands told me that he'd been working here fourteen years and Fat Cat was grown when he started. He also told me that nobody he'd ever known had ever touched the cat before. Along Fat Cat never had a name or a human friend before I came along but he's my best buddy when I work outside.

All four of his legs have been broken several times and his tail is a series of knots caused by chewed-up vertebrae in the fights he's had with dogs, but when I sit down on the cistern he sidles up beside me and goes to purring. It occurs to me that one day I too, will be very old and I'll need someone to rub my worn out carcass the way that I rub Fat Cat's

now. I hope that, in my old age, I'll have a younger friend who will pay as much attention to me as I do this old cat and he to me. And I hope that I can love that person as much as Fat Cat loves me. In the final analysis, nobody can expect more out of life than that because what else is there???

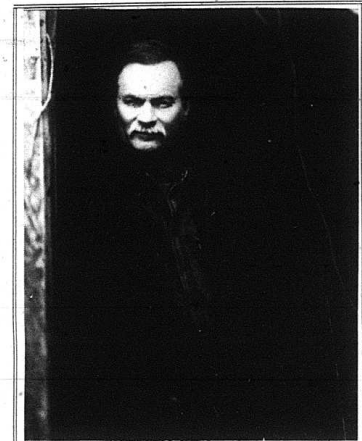

- UPSIDE DOWN PEACHY PECAN COFFEECAKE**  
 (8 servings)
- 3 tablespoons margarine or butter
  - cup firmly packed brown sugar
  - 1 can (16 oz.) sliced peaches in juice, drained
  - cup coarsely chopped pecans
  - cup all-purpose flour
  - cup whole wheat flour
  - 2 teaspoons baking powder
  - teaspoon salt
  - teaspoon ground allspice
  - cup margarine or butter, softened
  - cup firmly packed brown sugar
  - 1 egg
  - cup milk

1. In 8-inch round glass cake dish, microwave the 3 tablespoons margarine at HIGH (100%) for 30 to 45 seconds or until melted. Stir in the 1 cup sugar. Spread evenly over bottom of dish. Arrange drained peaches over sugar mixture. Sprinkle with pecans. Set aside.
2. Stir together all-purpose flour, whole wheat flour, baking powder, salt and allspice. Set aside.
3. In medium bowl, mix the softened margarine, the 1 cup sugar and the egg until well combined. Add flour mixture alternately with the milk, mixing well. Spread batter evenly over peaches.
4. Microwave at MEDIUM (50%) for 10 minutes, rotating dish 1/2 turn halfway through baking. Rotate dish again. Microwave at HIGH for 4 minutes or until center is no longer doughy. Let stand 5 minutes. Invert onto serving plate. Serve warm.

## Homer and Jethro were part of Renfro Valley gang

Because John Lair, founder of Renfro Valley, had an unquenchable knack for finding exceptional talent, many well-known entertainers got their start in show business with the Renfro Valley Folks. Two of those whose names became household words nationwide were the music and comedy team, Homer and Jethro.

Most folks remember them for their hilarious songs and antics, but both Homer, whose real name was Henry D. Haynes, and Jethro, or Kenneth C. Burns, were first-rate musicians. In fact, at their audition for Mr. Lair, they presented themselves as straight musicians and singers. But, it was when Mr. Lair heard their comic version of "Somewhere Over the Rainbow," done in the dressing room, that he hired them on the spot. Thinking it may all be a joke, since they had been hired so far, the boys nearly went back home to Knoxville instead of returning to Renfro Valley the next day!

Mr. Lair sent the team to Chicago as a guest act on the NBC network. It was their first visit to a city larger than Knoxville, and they were an immediate hit with radio listeners. Reports said they got more mail after one performance than the rest of the cast had gotten in a year. According to "The Illustrated History of Country Music," Jethro's mandolin style—syncopated, rhythmic and heavily influenced by jazz—made him, in the thirties, the only challenger to the great Bill Monroe. And, Jim Gaskin, present musician/singer/emcee in Renfro Valley, tells us Homer played an incredible slap-rhythm guitar.

While they were at Renfro Valley, during World War II, both Homer and Jethro entered military service, and their musical careers were put on hold for a time. Jethro reported that he had tried to get into Special Services as an entertainer, but after his audition, he was assigned to the Infantry!

Over the years, the team of Homer and Jethro were regulars on the WLS "National Barn Dance" in Chicago, on the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville, and they made personal appearances nationwide. They appeared numerous times on television and even made a series of commercials for -- what else -- corn flakes. Their specialty was their parodies of popular songs, such as "How Much is That Hound Dog in the Window?" One of their first hits was "Baby, It's Cold Outside" with June Carter. "I'm in the Jailhouse Now" was also a success and, in 1958, they had a best-selling album "The Worst of Homer and Jethro."

Many folks remember other favorites such as "Hernando's Hideaway" and "The Battle of Kookamonga."

Folks thought Homer and Jethro were brothers, but they were simply life-long friends. They were born on the same day, July 27, in the same town, but in different years -- Homer in 1918, Jethro in 1923. The partnership they formed as youngsters, when they were heard on WNOX in Knoxville, lasted 39 years, until Homer's fatal heart attack in 1971.

Jethro went on by himself as an entertainer. He never tried to replace Homer in the act because he felt it would be impossible. As he said, "No matter how good the guy might be, I'd find myself comparing him to

Homer, and he'd be a loser."

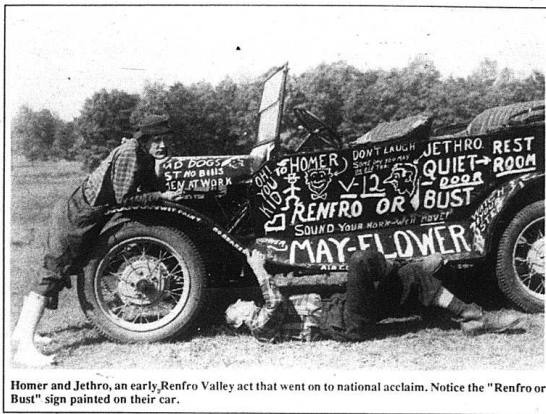
As a single act, Jethro remained successful. Always ready with a funny line, even about his own talent, he referred to himself as a "finished musician with a great voice for cooling soup." Regarding his man-

dolin playing, he said, "I have great tone, great technique, but as for my execution, I'm in no hurry. I can wait!"

Jethro died Feb. 4, 1989, in Evanston, Illinois. Both he and Homer left an indelible mark on country music.

### For all history buffs

Brodhead businessman Rhuell Thomas was a fixture on the Renfro Valley Barn Dance for many years. Besides emceeing the Sunday Morning Gatherin' in John Lair's absence, he conducted singing schools, where the shape-note singing system was used. Rhuell's wife Flossie also sang at Renfro Valley.

## Disappearing Landmark

The man that entered the L&N depot in Brodhead was tall, unshaven, sunburned, and looked as if he'd been "on the road" for many a week.

He looked steadily and coolly at Agent J.R. Cress. Suddenly, as if to make up his mind, he drew a gun and levelled it at the agent.

In the minutes that followed, he tied Mr. Cass, gagged him, took an undisclosed amount of money, and left. A conductor found the bound agent a considerable time later and released him. The Railroad reports the "culprit" is still at large.

Such were the "hazards of the business" in railroading in 1902, and especially for agents in small depots across the land.

In a short time, the sound of hammers will be heard, and the old Brodhead landmark, that could tell many a violent story, will be torn down.

The depot is near Renfro Valley.

Maurice Howard, who operates a funeral home in the depot building, and Wilson Green are taking bids on the wrecking work. Mr. Howard plans to move the usable lumber to Crab Orchard to contract a display room at his funeral home there.

Many people in the area will still remember the "good old days" of the Brodhead depot. It was to the depot that everyone headed when it was time for a train.

"Who got off?" was a popular question if someone happened to be late. "I wonder who they're going to visit?" could become or be expanded into a general talk-fest.

In those days, the railroad boomed with passengers. Many Rockcastle residents still remember the fare was 15 cents from Mt. Vernon to Brodhead; and many caught old 21, 22, 23, and 24 between the two towns to do business, or to go to the fair, or to court the pretty Brodhead girls.

It was easy and convenient for Mt. Vernon people to catch the Louisville-bound train late in the afternoon, ride to Brodhead, and return about 11 p.m.

on the Corbin-bound train. It also worked just as well for Livingston residents.

Charlie Hurt, of Brodhead, who was an agent at the Brodhead depot was constructed in two parts and at two different times.

The freight room was built in 1880 and used only for that purpose. Offices were built and passenger service initiated in

1914, and the company maintained 24 hour service with three operators, an agent, and assistant agent and a freight handler.

At that time, the depot served as a water station for engines and for all trains on the Lebanon Branch of the Louisville and Nashville.

The depot also served as a lunch stop. Many people still remember the box lunches of sandwiches or chicken that were available to passengers and prepared by local restaurants. Freight train crews also rested at Brodhead.

Then a man named Henry Ford came along with a contraption called a car, and from that day on things were never what they used to be at the Brodhead depot; or, for that matter, on the entire branch; or, for that matter, anywhere.

Passenger service gradually declined until Dec. 31, 1954, the order came through that the Brodhead depot was closed to passenger service. A freight station was maintained for a few more years, then that too was closed.

Ironically, the depot became a funeral home.

Ironically again, (and though it would be adding insult to injury to the old building) undoubtedly the land will at times serve as a parking lot for that contraption called a car.

## Wreck of Old 97

Few people recognize the name of Joseph A. Broady, but most folks in this part of the country know the song that was written about him. Joe Broady was the engineer who died in the wreck of Old 97, near the Virginia town of Saltville.

Little is known about Broady, but due to the record of two reprimands given him at Norfolk and Western and to the nickname "Steve" given him by his co-workers (the name of a man who had jumped off the Brooklyn Bridge), it can be assumed he was a daredevil.

Train No. 97 ran under government contract and was fired for each minute it was late. Therefore, it was given "clear track," meaning all other trains had to take a siding and await the passing of 97. On that fatal day, September 27, 1903, Old 97 was running late.

According to Robert L. McKinney, a writer who has researched the wreck of Old 97, the song written about the tragedy is wrong on most points. It states Steve's orders were to pull into Danville on time, but they actually forbade him to make up the lost time. One stanza stays, "it's a mighty rough road from Lynchburg to Danville," whereas it was no more dangerous than much of the line. The song also says he lost his air brake, but the brake on that particular engine was brand new and was used to control trains much heavier than Old 97's four cars. Investigators could find no evidence of brake failure.

Folks wise in the ways of trains feel that the line about "90 miles an hour" could not possibly be right. Old 97's speed was estimated to have been 45 to 50 mph, but even that was well over the posted limit for the curve at Still House Trestle, the site of the wreck.

Witnesses saw Broady inside the locomotive's cab as he roared past. He appeared to be trying to pull on the controls. Broady was in the wreckage, "scalded to death by the steam," but his hand was not on the throttle. He was caught, by the legs, beneath the train.

The wreck of Old 97 may have been forgotten except for the song, written by David Graves George. George never copyrighted this work however, and -- even though his song sold millions of copies -- he died in poverty.

The songwriter took the occasion to warn wives to "never speak harsh words to your true loving husband," but Joe Broady was unmarried. He left no heirs, no memorabilia; but he will be remembered, just as long as someone, somewhere sings "The Wreck of Old 97."

### The Wreck of Old 97

Oh, they gave him his orders at Monroe, Virginia, Saying, Steve, you're way behind time, This is not 38, it is old 97. You got to pull her into Danville on time. Oh, he looked around his cab at

his black greasy fireman, Saying shovel in a little more coal, And when we cross that White Oak Mountain, You're going to watch Old 97, roll! Now, it's a mighty rough road from Lynchburg to Danville, And it's lying on a three-mile grade, It was on that grade that he lost his air brake, You can see what a jump he made.

He was agoing down the grade making 90 miles an hour, When his whistle broke into a scream, He was found in the wreck with his hand on the throttle, And scalded to death by the steam, Now, all you ladies, you'd better take fair warning, From this day on and learn, Never speak harsh words to your true loving husband, He may leave you and never return.

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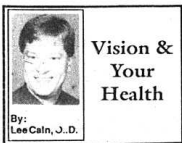
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## Vision & Your Health

For a more effective exam and better visual results, tell your optometrist the demands on your eyes at work: the available lighting, a computer screen, any close work. For greater comfort, the eye doctor may prescribe different glasses for different visual tasks.

It's no smoke screen: Tobacco may aid advances in health care

"In a sweltering greenhouse in the Appalachian Mountains, Dr. Carole Cramer fingers a fat tobacco leaf that is incubating a vital human blood protein.

Early tests suggest the leafy pariah can actually grow complex medicines, from blood thinners to a possible AIDS drug. And while years of research lie ahead, Cramer predicts the day farmers set aside a little tobacco to help health.

"We're on the cusp," said the Virginia Tech plant pathologist. "There are a lot of hurdles still, but there's a real opportunity here."

Tobacco is under attack from all sides, as doctors revile its capacity to kill, Congress tries to ban indoor smoking and the Food and Drug Administration considers regulating nicotine as a drug.

But scientists from the United States to Holland are discovering a good side to tobacco that could provide cheaper medicines and might help the small tobacco grower survive.

"Tobacco is like the white mouse of the plant world," said Bob Erwin, president of BioSource Genetics, a new California company dedicated to pharmaceutical tobacco.

"You can do nearly whatever your imagination can come up with," Cramer agreed.

Tobacco contains about 4,000 chemicals, some are dangerous. Others have commercial use.

•DNA Plant Technology Corp. has

patented a variety that produces high levels of sclerol, which is used in place of animal musk in deodorants and aftershaves.

• North Carolina State University is producing Fraction-1, a protein found in all green vegetables but that tobacco produces in higher concentrations. Scientists could use the gelatin-like substance in cosmetics in as little as two years. They hope later to turn Fraction-1 into a non-allergic infant formula or perhaps even food for kidney patients, because it is so pure that it may help them avoid dialysis.

More intriguing, tobacco grows foreign genes so easily that it one day could do what scientists now depend on expensive bacteria systems and transgenic animals to provide: bio-engineered medicine.

Cramer took an aggressive tobacco-

attacking bacteria and added to the She is now extracting that protein, purifying it and testing it to see whether the tobacco has processed it the same way the body would. If it hasn't, the protein might not work. But if it does, doctors could get human blood proteins much more easily and cheaply."

She infected pieces of tobacco leaf with the bacteria, sprouted the leaf bits and in a matter of weeks had grown dozens of transgenic tobacco plants -- with human blood protein growing inside their leaves.

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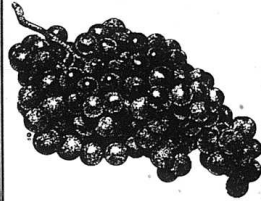
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## Avoiding food-borne illness

Your most sublime dinner party can turn into a disaster within a few hours if you don't take caution to prevent food-borne illnesses.

The most common cause of food-borne illness is improper handling of food, which allows harmful bacteria to go grow. Mishandling usually occurs in the home but also can happen in quantity food kitchens or in the food processing plant.

Salmonella has been one of the leading causes of food-borne illness in recent years. Poultry, eggs and dairy products are the most important vehicles of transmission. Kittens, turtles and ducklings also can transmit the bacteria. Wash your hands after touching any of them.

The bacterium causing salmonellosis, however, can be killed with cooking to a temperature of 165 degrees F. for a few seconds.

Escherichia coli, another much-publicized bacterium causing illness, is found in foods of animal origin or water contaminated by sewage. Foods that are inadequately cooked or refrigerated are especially vulnerable because the bacteria population can increase rapidly. Most E. coli bacteria also are killed by thorough cooking. Proper hand washing also helps guard against this illness.

Clostridium botulinum is sometimes found in incorrectly canned or poached foods and sometimes in thick foods stored in a too large container. Toxin produced by this anaerobic bacterium is deadly, but are inactivated by bringing food to a full boil for at least 15 minutes.

Staphylococcus aureus is found in 40 to 50 percent of all humans at any given time. It grows rapidly in foods such as custard and cream-filled bakery goods, potato salad and sliced meats. Most outbreaks are caused by not keeping foods cold or by not cooling the cooked foods quickly enough. Throw away leftovers that have not been kept cold. This bacterium produces a heat-stable toxin which is not inactivated by any amount of cooking.

How can you avoid food-borne illnesses?

- Cook all foods to the proper temperature to kill whatever bacteria may be contained in the food.

- Handle foods appropriately. Keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. When refrigerating leftovers, divide large amounts into several smaller containers to assure that they will cool fast enough to avoid rapid proliferation of bacteria.

- Use proper hygiene in the kitchen.

Wash knives and cutting boards frequently and disinfect them using two tablespoons of household chlorine bleach in one gallon of water. The utensils need to be dipped in the solution for 2 minutes. Wash utensils before using them on another food.

For example, if you cut up a chicken, make sure you wash and sanitize the knife and cutting board before you cut up any other food.

Designate two different cutting boards -- one for meat and one for fruit and vegetables.

- Wash your hands thoroughly and often -- especially between handling different food items

- If using a microwave oven for cooking, use a thermometer to make sure that the product is evenly cooked to the desired temperature.

- When buying prepared foods, such as in a delicatessen or cafeteria, select carefully. Avoid problem foods if they appear to be improperly held. Remember, hot foods should be held above 140 degrees F. and cold foods should be kept at below 40 degrees F.

- Buy eggs from refrigerated cases. A void cracked or dirty eggs that might harbor Salmonella. Eat eggs only that are well cooked. Avoid milk that is not pasteurized.

- Thaw frozen foods in the refrigerator and not on the kitchen counter at room temperature.

## Forums scheduled to reinvent soil conservation service

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in Kentucky has scheduled two forums to solicit recommendations on the agency's future direction.

The first one, a joint meeting with the State of Tennessee, was held in Jackson, Tennessee, on July 26, 1994. A second forum is scheduled for Wednesday, September 14, 1994, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the William D. Gorman Education Center, 601 Main Street in Hazard.

A survey form is available for those who are unable to attend the forums.

"The Soil Conservation Service is at a crossroads, and we and our customers have an unprecedented opportunity to anticipate future needs and refocus the agency's mission," said Kentucky SCS State Conserva-

tionist Billy Milliken.

Nearly 60 years ago, the Soil Conservation Service was created to address a national resource crisis called the Dust Bowl. Since then, the agency has undergone a number of changes, resulting in the agency now known as the Soil Conservation Service. In its reinvention process, the agency aims to create the natural resources conservation agency of the future.

"Predicting the future is a difficult task. However, we believe that one of the best ways to prepare for tomorrow is by looking at the past and by asking our customers and employees what they anticipate will be needed in the future," Milliken said.

## Tobacco growers reminded of pesticide restrictions

Sue Hignite, acting CED of the Rockcastle County ASCS office reminds tobacco growers that all pesticide products used on their tobacco must be approved by the Environmental Protection Agency for use on tobacco, and must be applied in accordance with label instructions.

Pesticide sampling may be made on 1994-crop tobacco to determine whether pesticides have been misused. Pesticide support will be withheld on tobacco treated with non-approved

pesticides, or if pesticides are not used according to label instructions. If price support is withheld, a "No Price Support" marketing card will be issued for the farm and all price support advances received during the current year must be refunded.

ASCS official Hignite said all false certification cases will be referred for prosecution and could result in a \$10,000 penalty or imprisonment for not more than 5 years, or both.

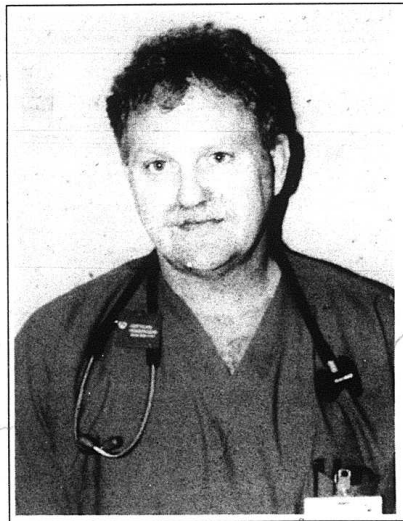

Stress testing is a very important step in evaluating cardiac function. The patient has lead wires hooked to electrodes placed at various spots on the chest. He/she will then be asked to walk on a treadmill while the technician and physician carefully monitor the function of the heart during the "stress" of walking.

Another interesting part of the trip was seeing the Hopewell Indian burial mounds. A lot of these are found in eastern Ohio. I have been reading and found that not only do they bury their dead in the tall burial mounds but some of their possessions also. Their culture lasted from about 300 B.C. to 600 A.D. These mounds are still well preserved. We saw a lot of beautiful country but as usual we were glad to get back to Kentucky.

We have a beautiful state also.

A new novel for your reading enjoyment is *Runaway* by Heather Graham. Ms. Graham brings alive the history of Florida in this breathtaking, passionate love story of two remarkable people.

Framed for a crime she did not commit, Tara Brent is on the run for her life. Barely escaping the man who is chasing her, Tara finds herself in New Orleans, where she meets Jarrett McKensie, a widower still mourning the death of his beautiful wife.

McKensie is on his way home to the unspoiled beauty of his Florida

farmland. Torn between the loyalty to his Seminole half brother and his own white way of life, Jarrett feels the forces of change pulling him. ## Forums scheduled to reinvent soil conservation service

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service (SCS) is launching a series of forums to gather customer and employee input for its reinvention process. SCS Chief Paul Johnson said that recommendations gathered in the forums will be used to anticipate future needs and to refocus the direction of the agency's mission. "If we are to continue to meet the needs of an ever-changing Nation, it is vital that we ask those who have a stake in natural resource protection to help craft a new natural resources conservation agency. And although change is never easy, we believe it is time to ask, 'Is there a better way?'" Johnson said.

Forums will be conducted throughout the nation from June through December 1994. A survey form will also be available for those who cannot attend one of the formal sessions. Anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation is invited to participate in a forum, especially current and potential SCS partners and customers, agricultural and environmental groups, and employees of the agency. Information about forum schedules and copies of the survey form may be obtained from SCS offices. They are listed in telephone directories under U.S. Government, Agriculture Department.

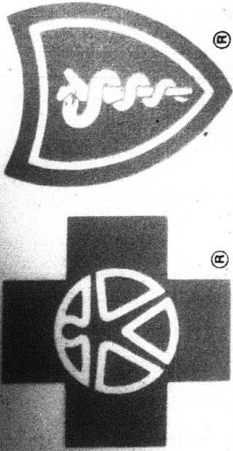

# Pearl Harbor remembered in Lexington on Dec. 7

The activities commemorating the 53rd anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor will be held at the Radisson Plaza Hotel Convention Center in Lexington, on Dec. 7.

In addition to marking the anniversary of the Pearl Harbor attack on Dec. 7, 1941, the day's activities will commemorate the 50th anniversary of World War II campaigns fought in 1944.

Ceremonies will be dedicated to veterans of those campaigns, including: "The D-Day invasion at Normandy Francy, Saipan, Anzio Italy, ..."

## Hunt Applications accepted Aug. 14-31 at Fort Knox

Applications for the annual bow and deer hunt at Fort Knox will be accepted Aug. 14-31.

The bow hunt will be conducted at Fort Knox this year on Oct. 1 - Nov. 13; the gun hunt, Nov. 19 - 20, Nov. 26 - 27, and Dec. 10 - 11. The bow and gun hunt each require separate application and permit.

The hunt categories are: 1) military, including active-duty and retired military, Reserve Component members, Department of Army civilians employed at or retired from Fort Knox, and family members of those listed; and 2) non-military, including all others.

Non-military bow or gun hunters must apply by mail, including a completed form ATZK-EH3605 and a stamped, self-addressed envelope. Military bow hunters need not pre-apply; permits will be available beginning Sept. 19. Military gun hunters may apply by mail or in person at Hunt Control.

Military who wish to hunt with non-military must apply under non-military hunter category procedures.

Upon application, fees are due in the form of a money order, certified check, or cashier's check, payable to "U.S. Treasury" (no cash or personal checks). Fees for active-duty military are \$15 for grades E1-E6, \$16.50 for grades E7-E9, and \$18 for all others.

Kentucky residents age 65 or older and honorably discharged veterans with VA-certified 100 percent disability are eligible for free permits.

Entry requirements include a Hunter Education card for all active-duty military and for all other age 55 or under, plus a Commonwealth of Kentucky License and Deer tag.

Applications postmarked or turned in earlier than Aug. 14 or later than Aug. 31 will be returned without action. Applicants for all active-duty bow or gun hunt will be notified approximately two weeks before the hunt.

## Deadline for quota deer hunts is August 31

Applications for quota deer hunts offered by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) will be available around August 1. The deadline to return applications is August 31. The fee to apply is \$3 per applicant.

This year, quota hunts will be held on several wildlife management areas (WMAs). Youth hunts will be held on Ballard WMA, Barron River WMA, Dewey Lake WMA, Grayson Lake WMA and West Kentucky WMA. Hunters ages 10-15 and who are accompanied by an adult (18 and over) are eligible for youth hunts.

Conventional quota hunts (open to hunters 10 years old and up) are scheduled for Beaver Creek WMA, Green River Lake WMA, Higginson-Henry WMA, Kibler WMA, Lapland WMA, Mill Creek WMA, Obion-Creek WMA, Paintsville Lake WMA, Peabody WMA, Pennyrite WMA, Taylorsville Lake WMA, Tradersville WMA, West Kentucky WMA, White City WMA and Yellowbank WMA.

in the '94 campaign will be their line. It has a little bit of experience and is as big a line as the Rockets have ever had under Larkey.

From center to end they average a respective 229 pounds with most of the size in the offensive tackle slots.

Kirby, who has slimmed down to a solid 275 lbs., and 265 pounder Jason Weaver will help lead the team from the

tackle positions. Rotating in will be Jason Brock at 225 pounds and Slade Calhoun at an even 200 lbs.

Filling the offensive guard

slots will be Todd at 230 pounds and Saben Blair at 210 pounds. Alternating in for the Rockets will be Greg Mink and Jeremy Lane.

Donnie Eversole and Jason Childress will be the starting ends when the season starts. Two senior transfers will also rotate in the slots. They are Casey Blancy from Madison Southern and John Helton from Leslie County.

Holding the responsibility of snapping the ball at the cen-

ter slot will be Shawn Shearer. Backing up will be Brock.

"To win, we have to win on the line of scrimmage," Larkey said. "We have six or seven descent running backs but they need the support of the line."

Carrying the ball at the full-back position will be Neil Sparks and Dallas Rigsby while Zach Cromer will be the lone half-back.

As for tailback, Larkey feels that three guys could be used. Jason Cromer, Jarrod

Singleton and John Cromer are the candidates. All have reportedly done well but who plays the most may vary from week to week.

Heading the array of offense for Larkey this year will be junior quarterback Jamie Linville.

Of course, filling the shoes of J.D. Bussell won't come overnight. Linville first lacks the experience at his position as a varsity player. Varsity offenses are more complicated and opponents are tougher.

On the other hand, standing at 6' 3" and weighing 185 pounds, Linville has the build and arm to be successful.

"He's (Linville) made big strides," Larkey said. "I believe he can take the team down the field."

"He throws the ball as well as any quarterback I've ever had," added Larkey. "He just needs experience."

Sophomore Malcolm Shepherd, who took the freshman squad to an undefeated season last year, is the second-man-in for the Rockets. Shepherd has very good mechanics and is a tough kid according to Larkey.

Like the offense, the Rockets' defense will also depend on their line and their size. And they may be the most integral part of the team's success.

They will have to limit their opponent's time of possession to allow Linville and crew more opportunities to score.

Those with major roles are Stacey Kirby, Greg Mink, Shawn Shearer, Jason Weaver and Jeremy Lane on the defensive line.

Also, the linebackers will be Eddie Todd, Neil Sparks, Donnie Eversole, Saben Blair and David Coffey.

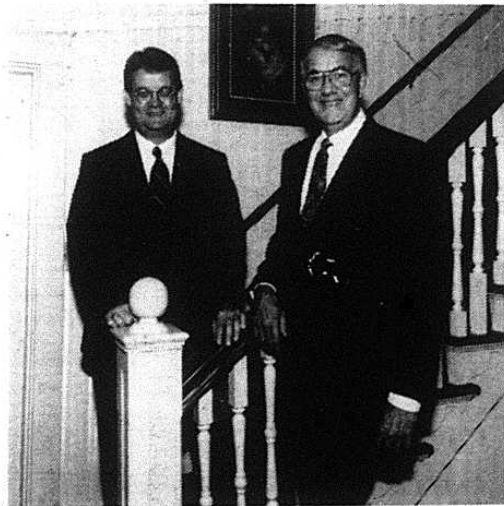
The defensive backs are Dallas Rigsby, Jason Cromer, Jason Childress and Casey Blancy.
