# Doan quits sheriff's office; Thomas full-time deputy

Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith shuffled his staff last week in the wake of the resignation of Deputy Darrell Doan.

Doan, one of the busiest of the deputies, was also the most experienced in law enforcement. He was deputy under Clarence "Jib" Hasty during Hasty's term in office, and spent one term under Sheriff Smith, for a total of about 8 years and 9 months.

Moved into his position was Deputy Doug Thomas who joined the department several weeks ago, and who at one time was employed at Carter's Market.

The sheriff's office is left with four fulltime officers in addition to Thomas. They are:

Karen Alcorn, Randall Reynolds, T.J. Parsons and Libby Smith the sheriff's wife.

Parsons is currently at St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington suffering from pneumonia.

Parttime deputies are Bryan Anderkin, Leonard Miller, Greg Brown, a student at Eastern Kentucky University and Darren Allen.

Raymond Miracle, 26, of Mt. Vernon is accused of stealing a four-wheel drive vehicle from the farm of Darrell Whitaker at Wald on July 8.

Miracle is free on bond until a October 28th arraignment.

# Rape charges dropped after local man pleads guilty to lesser charge

Charges of rape against a local man have been reduced to lesser charges after a plea agreement was worked out between the complaining witness and the defendant.

Holden Farlie Barnett, 24, of Floyd Street, Mt. Vernon had been charged with two counts of second degree rape and one count of unlawful transaction with a minor.

However Monday Barnett pleaded guilty to one count of sexual misconduct and one count of unlawful transaction with a minor in the third degree. Both crimes are misdemeanors.

According to Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette the incidents that led to the charges, and the eventual guilty pleas, occurred on September 6 when Barnett apparently engaged in sexual intercourse with a 13-year-old female at his home in Mt. Vernon.

According to the arrest warrant Barnett had consensual intercourse with the juvenile on at least two occasions.

But, on September 6 Barnett was arrested after a plea agreement was brought the case to police.

Under the plea agreement between the two parties involved and the county attorney's office, Barnett was sentenced to six (6) months on each charge with the sentences to run concurrently. The defendant shall serve sixty (60) days with the remaining time probation. The sixty (60) days shall be served on consecutive weekends. The defendant shall receive three days credit for each weekend served.

Further, the agreement states that after the defendant has served five weekends in the county jail, he may serve the remainder of the sentence (15 weekends) by home detention.

Barnett has also agreed to have no contact with the minor or her family until she is 16 years old and he also agreed to take counseling and to pay for counseling for the minor.

# Appalachian Harvest Festival this week

Life in the hills and hollows of Kentucky's Appalachian country was not without difficulties and challenges.

In spite of these hardships--or perhaps because of them--mountain folks developed a spirit of endurance and creativity which influenced not only their lives, but also the lives of their urban neighbors.

This spirit and creativity is the foundation of Renfro Valley's Appalachian Harvest Festival, Sept. 30 through Oct. 2.

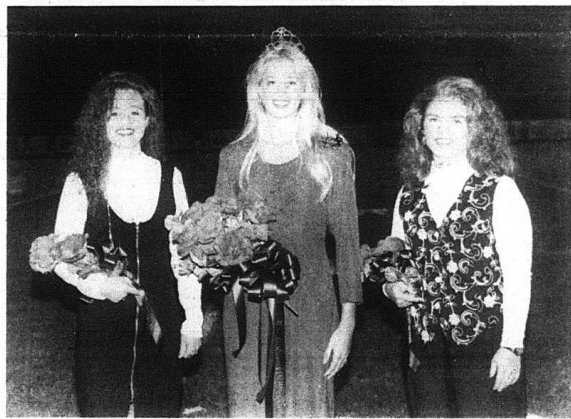
A focal point of the festival will be live demonstrations of the skills and crafts which made life in the Kentucky foothills a little easier. Visitors will see crafts people make wagon wheels and quilts, brooms and pottery, and weave baskets and rugs. Old-fashioned lye soap will be made on-site and an old mule will power a mill wheel turning to crush cane to make molasses. Antique steam engines and farm machinery will share the field with covered wagons and a blacksmith will demonstrate the skills that helped both survive.

Nearby, a farmers' market shares the bounty of the harvest season. Sweet cream will be churned into butter and corn transformed into hominy. Branches of willow, hickory and cane will become useful decorative furniture and the lost art of salt-making will be shared.

The beauty of the valley, the crispness of fall days, live music from festival stage, hands-on demonstrations of skills and arts from days gone by all contribute to a memorable weekend. It is possibly this combination of factors which draws America's Television to Renfro Valley's Appalachian Harvest Festival.

The cable network, based in Branson, MO, will film the festival to feature in a 60- or 90-minute special. Americana was launched in 1993 and won a prestigious Cable Ace nomination in its first year of broadcast. The network reaches a national audience of more than 25 million households.

Admission to the Appalachian Harvest Festival is \$4, half-price for children. Cont. to 16

# Rockets escape with 8-7 win over Indians

By just looking at the score you could say the Rockcastle County Rockets just slipped by. It could also be labeled as narrowly escaping a loss. But, on further review, you would have to give the Rockets the nod, an 8-7 nod over the visiting Madison Central Indians Friday night.

It was more than enough to give Rockets head coach Tom Larkey his 100th career win at the high school level. An impressive milestone in its

own right.

But what highlights the achievement is the fact that Larkey has more than doubled his total 48 losses.

Larkey has compiled the marks while at both Laurel County and Rockcastle. From 1974-77 he accumulated 21 wins and 20 losses at Laurel. At Rockcastle Larkey has posted an impressive 79-28 mark from 1985 to the present.

In modesty, Larkey labels Friday's homecoming victory as just

another important win for the team.

"I am pleased with it (100th win)" said Larkey Monday. "But every win is important to me, whether it's your 100th or your 50th," he added.

Fortunately, the win came at home in front of a homecoming crowd. But to get it the Rockets had to work hard.

They moved the ball well from the ground against Central garnering 240 yards in the game, 73 of those in the first half. However, the Rock-

ets could not cap off their drives.

They advanced the down inside Central's 20 yard line on their first three drives but were shut down all three.

"I was disappointed in our offense for not scoring on a couple of drives," said Larkey.

Turnovers also took their toll as a result of the rain. The Rockets had four fumbles in the game. Junior quarterback Jamie Linville dropped the football two of the four times. But not because of a slippery football but an ailing broken finger on his left hand suffered last week.

"We fumbled the ball four times, Linville lost two of those," Larkey said. "Linville's finger caused both of those, he played with a lot of pain," he added.

The Rockets' strongest suit in the game was their defense. They were stung only once when Central connected for a 91 yard touchdown pass with 9:49 remaining in the first half. Excluding that one play, the Rockets kept Central's offense in check.

Neil Sparks and Donnie Eversole led the defensive cast with 10

tackles each.

"Our defense played well, Central had a good offense yet we were able to stop them," commented Larkey.

The Rockets managed to counter Central's score with 4:07 left in the first half. From their own 28 yard line the Rockets kept to the ground with short gains behind workhorses John Cromer and Jarrod Singleton.

Cromer capped off the drive on a two yard run for the Rockets' only touchdown during the game. It was his second time in the end zone during the drive after his previous 13 yard touchdown was called back on a holding penalty.

Cromer, who led all rushers with 112 yards, followed successfully with the two-point conversion to put the Rockets up for good, 8-7.

The Rockets will travel to Somerset Friday night.

"Somerset is a very good team returning a lot of good players," Larkey said. "They have not set the world on fire and are 1-4 but could have won every game they have

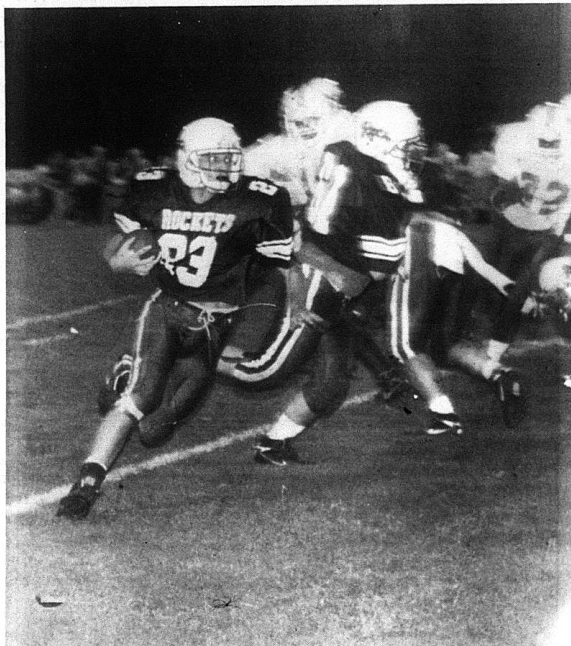

**Free hunter education course offered**

A free Kentucky Hunter Education course will be held on Sept. 29 and 30 from 6 to 9 p.m. and Oct. 1 at 9 a.m. at the Agricultural Center meeting room.

The ten-hour course, sponsored by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and Rockcastle Co. Sportsman Club and Rockcastle Co. Extension Service, will include classroom instruction in hunter ethics, wildlife identification, outdoor survival, first aid, firearms, bow hunting and ammunition. The last session will include actual range firing and an examination.

Upon successful completion of the course, a graduate card will be issued which is valid in any state where such certification is required. Attendance at all sessions is required for certification.

Effective March 1, 1991, all hunters born on or after January 1, 1975, shall, while hunting, carry a valid hunter education course graduate card in addition to the appropriate Kentucky hunting license requirements. A bow hunter not in possession of a firearm may carry a "National Bowhunter Education Program" course completion card in lieu of the hunter education card. Children under age 10 and persons exempt from purchasing a hunting license are not required to possess the card while hunting. Children under age 10 shall be accompanied by an adult of at least 18 years of age while hunting.

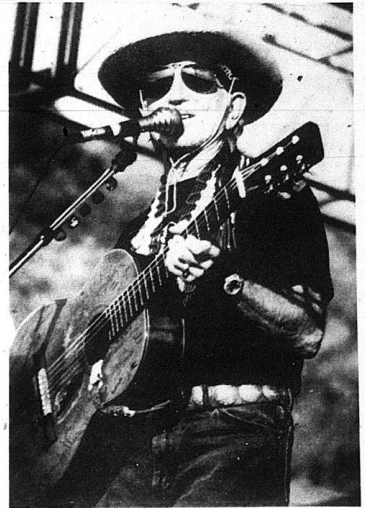

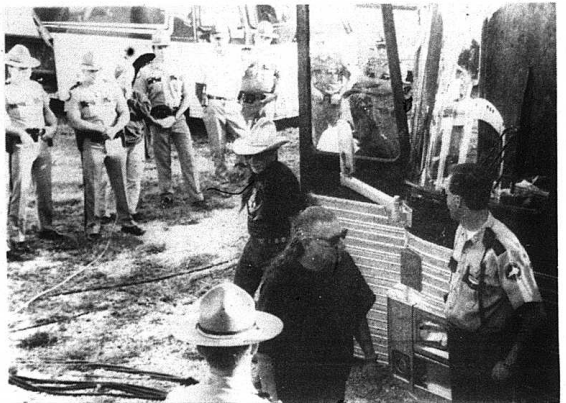

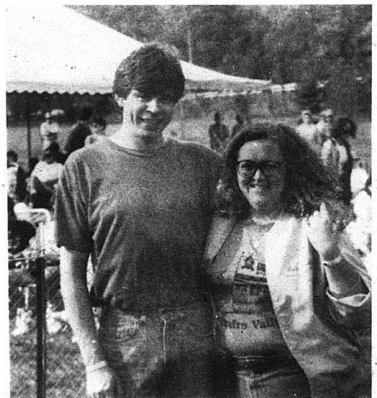

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## Making A Clothing Purchase Complaint

What do you do if a permanent press shirt isn't really permanent, a fabric in a garment fades when washed, or colored trim bleeds onto the garment?

Bringing your problem or complaint to the attention of the textiles and clothing industry can result in better merchandising practices and products. Failure to complain can cause you aggravation and unhappiness. The industry cannot learn what consumers want unless they speak up. Consumer interest has brought about changes in how fabrics and garments are made and marketed.

As consumers, we have a responsibility to speak up in order to ensure desirable merchandise and marketing practices.

Before you complain, ask yourself these questions to make sure you can defend your position:

- 1) Did I abuse the garment in any way?
- 2) Did I wear it as the manufacturer intended?
- 3) Did I follow the care instructions?

Some buyers make unjustified complaints which may only interfere with a company's handling of legitimate complaints. If you have met your responsibilities in the use and care of the garment, you are ready to begin the complaint process.

First, get your facts together:

- What was the date and place of purchase?
- Do you have a copy of the sales slip?
- How often was the garment worn?
- What type of wear did the garment receive?
- What did the directions say on the care label?
- What specific care did you give the garment?
- Why was the garment unsatisfactory?
- What would you like done? (refund, exchange, repaired, etc.)

If you purchased the garment in a local store, present your complaint to the salesperson with whom you did business. If the store is large enough to have a consumer service department, take your complaint or problem there. If you are not satisfied with the response, ask to see the manager.

Usually a business with a reputation for dealing fairly with its customers will make a fair adjustment. The business has an image to protect

and is willing to take responsibility for the products sold. Contact the manufacturer if you don't know where the garment was purchased, or if you purchased it a distance from home, or if you were unsuccessful in dealing with the local store.

When you have a problem or question about a garment or textile product, you can look up the manufacturer's address by using the manufacturer's name or RN number.

Every garment label must tell who the manufacturer is either by name or registered number. To look up the manufacturer's address, check your public library for either the Thomas Register or the WPL/RN Directory published by the Federal Trade Commission.

To use the Thomas Register, you must have the manufacturer's name. It lists products and services and the information includes both the address and phone number of the company.

The WPL/RN Directory contains listings by the manufacturers' names and the RN numbers. Only addresses are given. Your local Federal Trade Commission Office and some public libraries have copies of the WPL/RN Directory. You may also locate the manufacturer's name and address by registered number (RN or WPL), by contacting the Federal Trade Commission, Sixth and Pennsylvania Ave., N.W., Room 701, Washington, D.C. 20580. Examples of registered numbers are RN 29962 and WPL 04378.

Write to the manufacturer clearly stating your complaint. A letter makes your complaint a matter of record. State the nature of your problem and what you would like done. Refer to the facts stated earlier. Keep the letter brief. If at all possible, type your letter. If handwritten, make sure your handwriting is easy to read.

Sending the faulty garment along with the letter may bring a quick response. If you do this, be sure to insure the package. Attach your letter to the outside so everything will arrive at the same time.

Be sure to keep copies of any letters you send, as well as insurance receipts, etc. Your letter preserves your rights under the law and it insures that the manufacturer knows your side of the story. When the company sees your complaint in writing, they know you are serious about your complaint.

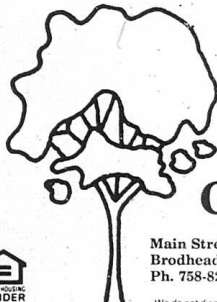

## Free booklet describes benefits of trees on farms

You don't need to have a tree farm to benefit from trees on your farm.

That is one of the messages the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) hopes you will get from a new publication that it helped prepare with the National Arbor Day Foundation.

The booklet, "Trees For Your Farm, Family and Future," uses colorful photographs, illustrations and descriptions to help you plant and care for trees.

Randall Templeman, district conservationist in Rockcastle County, says SCS in recent years has taken a broader approach to farm planning. Instead of being concerned only about soil and water, the agency also helps landowners take a look at how they can maximize all resources on their farms, including animals, plants and air.

"Trees are and can be a part of regular farm operations," Templeman says. "You don't need entire farms in trees. Trees can improve the resources of any farm in Kentucky in addition to helping with the econom-

ics of farming."

The booklet is part of a multi-organization effort to help farmers and ranchers make trees an integral part of sustainable agriculture. The booklet includes features outlining 12 productive uses for trees: Riparian Filter Strips; Alley Cropping; Tree Plantations; Wildlife habitat; Living Snow Fences; Trees for Livestock; Farmstead Windbreaks; Woodlot Management; Field Windbreaks; Specialty crops; Trees for Recreation areas; and Multi-purpose Plantings.

Also involved in preparing the booklet were the National Association of Conservation Districts, National Association of State Foresters, Agriculture Research Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service; University Extension and Forest Service.

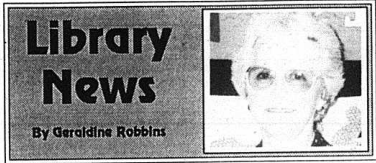
