**Last 60 days crucial to
 weak calf control**

The last 60 days of pregnancy for beef cows are crucial to preventing weak calf syndrome. Many area beef herds are on spring calving seasons with the majority of calves born in late February through March. Feeding cows adequate energy and protein now through early March is crucial to preventing weak calf syndrome. As the name suggests, calves displaying the syndrome are weak at birth; often too weak to stand and nurse which can result in their death. Farmers must be certain their cows

are getting enough energy and protein during the final two months of pregnancy. Research studies have found that herds receiving enough energy and protein during the last 60 days of pregnancy had no problems with weak calf syndrome. When protein intake was two pounds or more per day, herds had no problems with weak calf syndrome. But in herds with protein intake was only 1.8 pounds per day, 3.4 percent of the calves born displayed symptoms of the syndrome. At a protein intake of 1.21 pounds per day, the incidence of weak calf syndrome was 9.8 percent. It seems clear that protein intake is associated with

the syndrome.

Farmers should know the protein content of their feed, how much their pregnant cows are receiving, and be prepared to provide a supplement if it is needed. One caution regarding supplements is that producers should be sure that any protein supplement they feed to their cows is made up of high quality protein. Some supplements have high levels of non-protein nitrogen that can be utilized by the cow only if other high quality feeds with adequate energy are used with them.

Feeding low quality fescue hay and a convenient lick block or large protein block may not be meeting your cows needs. Protein blocks high in Urea should be supplemented with corn to provide energy for the utilization of non-protein nitrogen. With current shelled corn prices, farmers may find it economical and advantageous to their beef herds management to provide protein and energy through feeding corn.

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Motor voter rules. . .

County clerks across Kentucky begin a new system of registering voters Tuesday to comply with the national "Motor-voter" law.

The system will be used to the renewal of driver's licenses and include voter registration at many federal and state offices.

George Russell, state Board of Elections director, said most of Kentucky's 120 county clerks have been trained in the system.

Jefferson County Clerk Rebecca Jackson estimated the new system will cost up to \$1.38 million.

The county has 370,000 registered voters. In four years, when all drivers are to have renewed licenses, an additional 130,000 might be added to the rolls, Jackson said.

County clerks or their representatives in Fayette, Bullitt, Oldham and McCracken counties said they aren't sure how many, if any, more employees will have to be hired or how much they will cost.

People still will be able to register with the county clerk on their own initiative. But the new system is intended to register as many people as possible, as easily as possible.

Fayette County Clerk Don Blevins said the motor-voter bill could add thousands to the voter registration rolls by the next presidential election in 1996. There are 180,000 people in Fayette County who qualify to vote, he said, but the number of registered voters in recent years has fluctuated at 105,000 to 112,000.

While registering to vote will be easier, it is still voluntary, Blevins said. NO one can be forced to register.

Here's how registration will work: The names of people getting a driver's license will be checked against a state database to see whether they are registered to vote. This will be done by matching Social Security number and birth date in the driver's

license file and in the Board of Elections voter register.

Those not based will be asked whether they want to apply. If so, the computer will print out a form with information from the driver's license. The person will be asked to check its accuracy, then mark a party preference and sign the form.

The forms will be given to the county clerk's election officials. They will process the registration and mail a notice within 30 days informing the person that he or she is registered and telling them where to vote.

The system cannot verify whether a person has a criminal record, is a citizen or meets any residency requirement. Signing a falsified form could be grounds for a perjury prosecution.

The 1993 National Voter Registration Act requires many state and federal offices to sign up people -- including military recruiters, agencies that serve the disabled and offices that administer food stamps, Medicaid and other aid programs.

One hitch: Federal offices aren't tied in to the state database; most people will be asked to sign up on their word alone.

There are fears that many of those already registered might think that if they don't register again, they won't get assistance. That could lead to wholesale duplication.

A former Rockcastle County man escaped serious injuries Monday afternoon, after he was involved in a head-on collision on interstate 75.

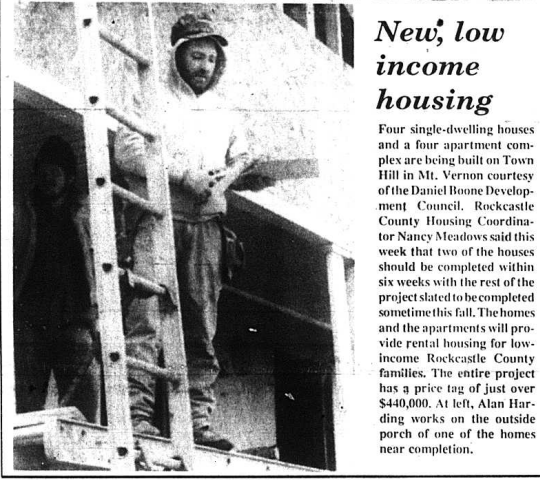

Ford named to top post in Frankfort

Rockcastle County Republican State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon was elected House Minority Leader of the Kentucky House of Representatives in Frankfort Tuesday afternoon.

Ford, who co-owns Ford Brothers Auction Company, which has offices in Mt. Vernon, London and Somerset has been a state representative since 1982, being sworn in for a seventh term on Tuesday.

Ford defeated Woody Allen of Morgantown 24-13 for the top GOP post in the house. The minority leader's position came open after Tom Jensen of London, declined to run for re-election.

Ford said in an interview with the Lexington Herald-Leader Tuesday,

that because of recent gains by the Republicans in Frankfort, the party can't just sit back and snipe at the Democrats, but must show voters it can develop a positive program to better government.

Republicans have long complained that Democrats refuse to let GOP legislators air their proposals and lock them out of the process, but Ford said that the increase in Republican numbers should also be a signal to Democrats that it's important to treat Republicans fairly and consider their proposals.

Ford said that while his party is still in the minority in both chambers, there are enough Republicans to influence legislation.

PVA test set for January 18, 10 a.m.

The state test to see whether or not you are qualified to be a property valuation administrator in Rockcastle County will be given on Wednesday January 18, at 10 a.m. in the conference room of the Rockcastle Hospital, according to Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Houk.

Mrs. Houk said that anyone interested in running for the unexpired term of Elmer Hale, who resigned last week, must first pass the PVA exam before he or she can be placed on the May ballot.

Anyone interested in being appointed to fill Hale's term until the

November election, must also pass the test.

Interested persons must be 24 years of age, a resident of Kentucky for two years, a resident of Rockcastle County for one year and have a valid picture identification.

According to Mrs. Houk, the PVA job in Rockcastle County will pay approximately \$20,000 a year to start.

Mrs. Houk said that until someone is appointed by the Governor to fill Hale's position until November, a state field representative from Frankfort will be working out of Hale's office.

The events that shaped the news of 1994; the good and bad

1994 was filled with good news for many, some bad news for others, but overall it was a productive, eventful year once again in Rockcastle County.

January

In January a new Rockcastle County Fiscal Court was sworn in. Among the new members were County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlisle and Magistrates Bill McKinney and John Holbrook and County Attorney Jeffrey T. Burdette.

Also in January the City of Mt. Vernon learned that they had lost a law suit brought against them by Renfro Valley Entertainment Center. The Kentucky Court of Appeals ruled that Mt. Vernon was unfairly assessing a 3 percent license fee tax on Renfro.

A London businessman announced that he would locate a data process factory in Rockcastle County if he could get 80 qualified workers and, in sports, the Lady Rockets beat Corbin 61-57.

In the second week of January, Dr. George H. Griffith, who had practiced medicine in Rockcastle County for over 35 years, died at age 77.

Debra Whitehead was elected chairman of the Rockcastle County School Board.

Kentucky Supreme Court Justice Joe Lambert of Mt. Vernon announced his intention to seek a second term as the state's highest court and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted to pay Architect Garland VanHook a final \$7,000 for plans on the Rockcastle County jail that would never be used.

A local school facility planning committee changed a recommendation to reopen the Rockcastle County Middle School in August.

Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, Science Hill and Wayne County advanced in the first round of the Brodhead Invitational Tournaments, while the Lady Rockets defeated Bell County and the boy Rockets won over McCreary

Central.

The Rockcastle Hospital opened a new renovated wing and old man winter began what could be a relentless assault on Rockcastle County.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education accepted a local planning committee's recommendation to close Livingston School and Interstate 75 was closed after 13 inches of snow fell in a two day period.

The United States Postal Service was unable to deliver mail on January 17 and Roger and Tammy Brock's home burned at Slaley Branch.

Dr. Joanne Guilfoil a Rockcastle resident was named art educator of the year in Kentucky and a record 24 degrees below zero was recorded at Cox Funeral Home weather station.

Brodhead placed second in their invitational journey and Larry Bradley's home was damaged by fire.

Former Mt. Vernon Mayor Clyde Linnville died and several members of a Rockcastle County family who had been charged with insurance fraud pled guilty in federal court.

Russell Ramsey is serving a 51 month sentence in the federal penitentiary after pleading guilty to insurance fraud.

The Lady Rockets beat Monticello 62-59 and the Rockcastle County Grand Jury was set to hear evidence surrounding the August 1993 shooting death of a Brodhead man by Kentucky State Police.

February

State Representative Danny Ford and Supreme Court Justice Joe Lambert found out they would be unopposed in the 1994 elections and James Dooley was sentenced to 2 1/2

years in the state penitentiary for cultivating marijuana and setting a booby trap to help protect it.

The Lady Rockets routed Paris 73-34 and Lindsey Dowell was named basketball Homecoming Queen. Mt. Vernon School principal John Hale was hired as the new principal at the new Rockcastle County Middle School and the first public hearing concerning the closing of Livingston School was scheduled for February 17.

The Kentucky General Assembly passed the highly controversial mandatory seat belt law and the Mt. Vernon Academic team placed second in the Governor's Cup competition.

Bill Deaton announced that he would definitely locate a second data processing firm in Rockcastle County and a freezing rain storm paralyzed the county.

Brodhead water customers learned they would pay 25 percent higher water bills and Livingston residents and alumni began their futile fight to save their school.

The next week after a two night public hearing the Rockcastle Board of Education voted to close Livingston School and Livingston residents voiced their deep displeasure with the decision.

Rockcastle Judge/Executive Buzz Carlolis blasted former Judge Roland Mullins and Mickey McClure scored 31 points to lead the Rockets to their second win of the season.

The RCHS Academic team placed second in the team competition at the University of Kentucky and Danny McNew received the E.O. Robinson Scholarship.

March

In March the Rocket basketball teams lost in the first round of district play and the Mt. Vernon City Council discussed a \$450 raise for Mayor Gary Cromer.

Former Judge/Executive Roland Mullins pointed out several inconsistencies in charges made by Judge Carlolis.

A late winter snowfall stranded

several students at local schools for a short time and Ford Bros. held their annual farm machinery sale at Brodhead.

Also in March Loretta Powell was named principal at Mt. Vernon School and a Brodhead couple was arrested for sexual exploitation of minor children. (Allen Charles and Charlotte McClure are still awaiting trial.)

Local coal hauler Robert Seltsie died in a wreck at the interstate and the Rockcastle fiscal court finally approved jail renovation plans to the tune of \$360,000.

Bridgette Lear was the top money raiser for Easter Seals in the state and the 9 and 10 year old basketball all-

stars won an invitational tournament at Mercer County.

Livingston school supporters descended on the Rockcastle County High School for a state sponsored public hearing and Alonzo McCoolter was named Republican Volunteer of the year.

Josh McKibben competed in the Kentucky-Indiana Spelling Bee in Louisville.

A new state highway plan would make U.S. 25 three lanes from Renfro Valley to Mt. Vernon and two RCHS students Paula Wilmont and Becki Newcomb received statewide honors.

April

In April Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer broke a tie to give himself a \$450 a month raise. Mary Loudermilk and her son Virgil Lee died in a house fire and a Rockcastle County Grand Jury said that Kentucky State Police were justified in the August, 1993 shooting death of Gary Shepherd.

Although the council passed the raise for the Mayor, he has never taken it.

Robert Lear Jr. and Jack Russell Terrier took first place in the Open Category of the Bluegrass Working

Points East

Bert Phillips, a friend I made in London back in the seventies and who moved to the Great Northwest to become an Oregon logger so that he could indulge in his passion for steelhead and salmon fishing, was the ultimate New Year's resolution maker. I haven't heard from Bert in more than a decade, but unless a redwood has fallen on him, I imagine that he still spends a great deal of time making and following up on his resolve to become a better person.

Bert did contract logging in the Daniel Boone National Forest when he wasn't fishing for trout below Laurel River Dam during those years before the hydro electric plant became operational. For four years or so after the dam was completed, Laurel River tumbled over a series of cliffs some six hundred feet almost straight down and poured back into its original basin over a beautiful falls some seventy-five feet high. The basin stretched about a mile and was lined by huge boulders larger than most homes before it ran into Lake Cumberland.

During those years Lake Cumberland was kept at or below winter pool year round because repair work was being done on its dam. As a result the Laurel River tributary was inaccessible by boat. In the meantime, government sources had been stocking Laurel Lake with trout for most of the decade. Many of those trout escaped the traps via the aforementioned waterfalls and took up residence in the river basin.

Bert and I learned how to hike a couple of miles and get to it and for

three years we considered the very best trout fishery in Kentucky to be our own personal secret. Catching fish that weighed 2 to 4 pounds was almost self-defense. However, in 1977 the generator went on line and what once had been a wonderful trout stream became a dangerous tailwaters devoid of marine life. So much for progress.

So Bert's major resolution in December, 1977 was to move to bigger trees and bigger fish in the coming year and by May '78 he was sending me postcards of both from some little burg located a few miles from the Pacific Ocean.

Like yours truly, Bert had spent a few months in law school and decided that a fishing pole was far more important to his well being than a key to the courthouse and a vocabulary of legalisms. I decided that I was going to write fiction anyway, I wanted it to appeal to and be understood by a far larger audience than the Bar Association. Bert decided that he would rather cut trees. However, he also decided that he learned into the preparation of his annual New Year's Resolutions. He would begin with a rough draft of the document around the first of October. It would be titled something like "The Bert Phillips irrevocable resolution and agreement with the world for that period beginning January 1, 1977 and ending December 31, 1955." Like most lawyers he would spend an hour or two each day mak-

ing sure that it contained as many words from the "Current Volume of Legal Terminology" as he could make fit in. Also, like most lawyers, he would come up with 30 typewritten pages in a document that the average intelligent human being could have written with a pencil on half a page of a memo pad.

Bert covered all the bases. He thought and rethought, revised, edited, proof-read, compared to other writers, sought outside counsel and spent time walking around the house reading aloud and talking to himself. He carried a little tape recorder in his shirt pocket and would stop his chainsaw midway through a tree trunk if a subtle alteration popped into his mind.

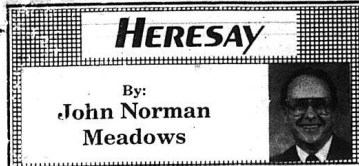
In 1977, for example he resolved, among other things, to stop smoking and Bert was a hard core, 3 packs a day smoker. Camels, unfiltered. Luckys or Pall Malls if they were out of Camels. That one alone required five pages. "Resolved: that the principal party herein named will cease and desist and subsequently refrain from the disgusting, revolting, unhealthy, and polluting practice of consuming that vile and noxious, etc. etc." The resolution identified all the ways and means that he might get about quitting including not even being in a zip code where anyone else smoked or where tobacco

was sold. And on and on and on. Once he was finished with his "Resolution," and had it perfected to the best of his ability, he took the entire document to the county courthouse and filed it in the clerk's office as a permanent record.

He was terrible to be around for about six weeks. Both his social life and his social standing went to pot. If he got invited to a party, he'd call and ask if any smokers were going to be present and how long it had been since the house had been smoked in. He'd go out and saw down trees in the middle of the night. We'd go fishing and drive separate vehicles. He'd go upstream and I'd go down. But by the middle of February he had whipped the habit and for several years thereafter the first thing he'd ask me when we got on the phone was, "Are you still smoking Adams?"

Bert Phillips has probably written more resolutions than most of us. And I'd bet even money that he's kept every single one of them. I'd also bet that wherever he is there's a etker in some courthouse and wondering what in the heck is this??

I don't know about you all, but I didn't bother making any resolutions at all. I figure that I'm about as close to perfect now as I'm ever going to be so why bother.

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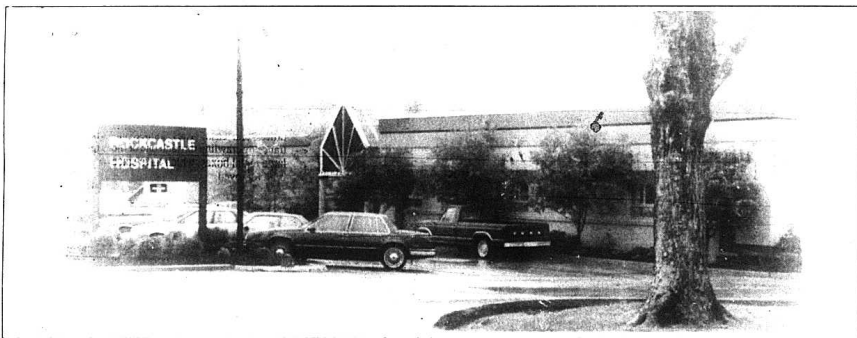


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Girls beat Williamstown; lose to Mercer, Lexington Christian and Corbin

Rockets lose to Madison Southern 79-53

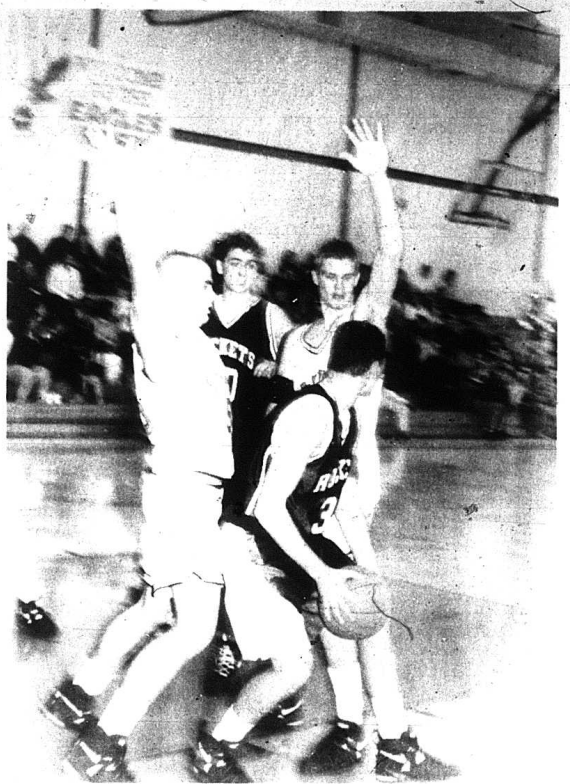

The Rockcastle County Board of Education committed \$60,000 to help renovate Brodhead school, former Rockcastle County Judge, Mt. Vernon City Councilman and longtime businessman Bob Jasper died.

Charlotte McClure and Allen Charles were indicted for using minor children in sexual performances and bus driver Greg Bullock told the local school board that bus drivers were underpaid and needed a raise.

A new policy was introduced that would cause RCHS students to lose their license if their grades drop or they have poor attendance.

Mt. Vernon and Roundstone schools held their annual Spring Festivals and Jeff Owens, Warren Cash, Mark Bishop and Roy and Wavelene Combs won the memorial day golf tournament at Cedar Rapids held each year in honor of the late Mrs. Barbara Owens.

June

Judge backs credit for city license fee

A Pulaski County circuit judge ruled that Somerset attorney should get credit for a city license fee when he pays a county occupational tax. Judge William Cain wrote in his opinion that both the city and county ordinances imposed license fee taxes upon the right or privilege of playing a trade in the area. Thus, the judge ruled, Michael Louis Duncan could credit his city license fee against the county license tax. Duncan had filed a class action lawsuit in August against Pulaski Fiscal Court. The Tuesday ruling could have a significant economic effect on the county, which has collected \$138,550 in license fees in 1994. The county has collected close to \$500,000 in license fees since 1991.

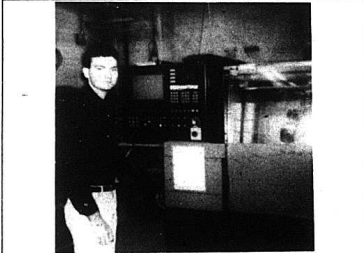




