

Lice control on beef cattle

Lice populations build up on livestock in the colder periods of the year when the environment on the animal is more conducive to lice survival. The entire cattle lice life cycle (eggs, nymphs and adults) exists only on cattle. None of the life stages can survive off the host. They cannot survive on other types of livestock or humans.

Lice are transferred from animal to animal by body contact. In this fashion, an entire herd can become infested. During the summer, lice numbers are very low and usually concentrate on a few "carrier" animals. Late summer and fall is a good time to try to eliminate lice from the herd. However, if this is not followed, there is still time to eliminate lice before they have a great effect on cattle. Lice biology makes it feasible to totally eliminate these pests from a herd if all animals are thoroughly treated. 1. All animals must be treated... if only one animal is left infested, that animal can serve as the reinfestation source for the rest of

the herd.
2. Treat each animal twice -- the first insecticide treatment kills the adult and nymph stage lice but leaves the eggs unaffected. The second treatment, 2-3 weeks after the first, kills the nymphs that have hatched from these eggs.
3. Keep the herd isolated from non-treated cattle -- any non-treated animal serves as a potential reinfestation source. Any new animals brought into the herd must be put through the "Double Treatment" program before they are allowed to join the herd. Also, cattle should be kept out of contact with neighboring herds unless those animals have also been put through a similar "lice elimination" program.

As you think about controlling lice, there are many effective ways and the cost varies with products used. Contact your local vet for the proper type of compound to use. Many products are available in a pour-out form which will allow you to treat animals without using

a head gate. As cattle line up at the feed bunk, pour-on's can be applied with very little work.

Using the "Double Treatment" on all cattle can assure you very

little chance of lice problems in your beef herd.

Judge says county can't afford to pay senior bills

A snag has developed in county funding for the Senior Citizen Program. Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotis says he cannot pay utilities for a new building to be leased by Senior Citizens on U.S. 25 south (the skating rink building). Not enough money. Shirley Cummins, who directs the program for Senior Citizens, said if the county can't pay utilities for the building she doesn't see how she can use the building.

It is estimated heat in winter and air conditioning in summer could cost between \$500 and \$800.

"We'll be cold in winter and hot in summer," she said. "This is a surprise to me. The Board of Directors of Rockcastle Senior Citizens and I haven't talked about it or made any kind of decision."

The state bought the skating rink but apparently no deed has been signed and indicated Senior Citizens would lease it for 20 years or a long term.

Robert Philbeck then began the remodeling of the building with the letter of commitment and will soon finish.

"I can put pencil to paper and beg if I have to," Mrs. Cummins said. "But I can't comprehend the county is not going to continue paying utilities, as it has been doing in the Library building."

The library is a county building. The new Senior Citizen building is not a county owned building.

The county pays electric on all three Senior Citizens centers at Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston. The county pays the water bill at Brodhead and Mt. Vernon, and the telephone bill at Brodhead.

Livingston pays their rent on their building. The county owns Brodhead and the Rockcastle Library.

Program support for seniors comes from the Economic Assistance Fund (the state). It's about \$7,000 annually.

ally, plus the amount the county picks up for utilities.

"We own the Mt. Vernon and Brodhead buildings. But we do not own the new building. If the utilities

are paid by the county, as long as the \$7,000 lasts, it might be that we could pick up the remainder. The Senior Citizen program is getting 10 percent election.

Only four of fourteen pass state exam

Offutt, Thacker file for PVA seat

Only four of fourteen potential new property valuation administrators in Rockcastle County, passed the mandatory state test, held last week at the Rockcastle Hospital.

According to Rockcastle County Clerk, Norma Houk, Cleth Thacker, Margaret Offutt, William Reynolds and Doug Bullock were the only four to pass the test.

"Two of the four have filed for the May election.

Thacker and Offutt have filed for the Republican nomination. Reynolds, a Democrat and Bullock the other Republican had not filed as of Tuesday, January 24. Bullock and Reynolds have until January 31 to file for the May 23rd primary election.

Gov. Jones has yet to appoint anyone to fill the vacancy in the PVA office that was created when Elmer Hale resigned in December.

Local Democrat Chairman Larry Doyle has not indicated if Jones will appoint anyone before the November General Election is certified. Once Houk certifies that election, the winner will take office. Usually that occurs the Monday after the Tuesday election.

Mrs. Offutt is currently the chief deputy in the PVA office, a position she has held for 13 years.

Thacker, who is a former Rockcastle County businessman, has sought this office once before.

Officials say fiscal court must implement basic 911

It is known as the phone number for help in the majority of the United States and in at least 85 percent of Kentucky's counties, but in Rockcastle when you dial 911, there is no help on the other end of the line.

"It is way past time to move along, get with the program per se, move Rockcastle County emergency services to a central dispatch," said Mt. Vernon City Councilman Les Keene. "We desperately need 911 emergency dispatch in this county," he said Tuesday.

Keene, Livingston Mayor Ed Lie and Brodhead councilman C.B. Owens asked the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court in December to begin work on 911 for Rockcastle County.

The three said that each city council was more than ready to work with the court on the problem.

But, nothing has been done. About a year ago, Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, in effect, told the fiscal court that they could possibly be held liable in the event that emergency services were delayed by poor dispatching.

In August, Rockcastle County Jailor Joe Howard told the court that because no one in the jail was certified to dispatch emergency calls, he would stop dispatching calls from the jail.

"But, Howard later told the court that he would keep the radios until the first of the year and then he would stop.

"The first of the year has come and gone and emergency calls are still being dispatched through the sheriff's office from the jail."

"At the last Jailor Association's meeting I attended in October, they told us that we were opening ourselves up for a lawsuit, dispatching calls from the jail, without certified dispatchers," Howard said.

"We may be the only jail in the state that still dispatches for the sheriff. I hate to leave the county in a bind, but I have given them plenty of time to do something, and they haven't done anything," Howard said.

"They told me last summer they would fix this problem, but it doesn't seem to me they have made one move to get the radios out of the jail," he said.

But, Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis said Wednesday that 911 was definitely in the works.

"We (the fiscal court) are in support of this project and G.T.E. is currently working on cost estimates, a

potential site and other pertinent information that must be gathered before 911 can be implemented.

"It could take 18 months to two years before 911 is actually in operation in Rockcastle County," Carlotis said.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer has offered to contract with the county to provide the central dispatch for the entire county, at a cost of around \$40,000 a year.

But, Carlotis said that Tom Surdavant of G.T.E. had looked at the Mt. Vernon City Hall building, where Cromer had proposed to put the central dispatch, and that he also looked at the courthouse as a possible site.

"He liked the courthouse better, mainly because there is more room and because it would be easier to secure," Carlotis said.

Councilman Keene said Tuesday that he and Gary Asher, head of the local disaster and emergency services, toured the enhanced 911 dispatching facilities at Laurel County this week.

"It would be nice to be able to start out with an enhanced 911 system, but right now we are probably going to have to settle for basic 911 coverage, mainly because of the cost," Keene said.

The difference between enhanced 911 and basic 911 is actually the information that shows up on the computer screen when a call comes in for emergency service.

Basic 911 simply shows the dispatcher a phone number, but enhanced shows phone number, address, and, in a lot of cases, if a person living at that address has a severe medical problem.

From all indications the cost of the service will range from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per phone customer per month in Rockcastle County.

The phone company would collect the fees from phone customers and then reimburse the county.

Keene suggested Tuesday that the fiscal court pass the required ordinance to collect the 911 tax, at their next meeting, so they could put the money in escrow, while the system is being put into operation. "If they will do that the county would have plenty of money when it comes time to begin actually begin operations.

But, Carlotis said that until he had some concrete figures on the actual cost, he doubted if the court would pass the required ordinance at the next meeting.

Carlotis said before the 911 service can go into operation, every road in the county must be named, every house numbered and the entire county measured for exact distances.

"That is the reason for the 18 month to two year delay," he said.

"No matter where the county decides to locate the central dispatch, or how much it actually costs the 5,300 telephone customers in the county, I think the fiscal court is not in compliance with state law until they actually implement 911," Burdette said.

Marilyn Spence, 40, was on U.S. 25 when a white 80's GMC pickup truck with dual wheels pulled out in front of her.

The truck struck the 1983 Ford Escort and left the scene going south. Police called it "hit and run." Ms. Spence received a cut on her face. Deputy Sheriff Bryan Anderkin investigated the accident.

Burley tobacco co-operative says small increase needed

Burley Co-op directors formally recommended to U.S. Ag Secretary Dan Glickman today that he approve a 1.2 percent increase for burley tobacco's 1995 basic quota and just over one-cent-a-pound increase in price supports.

The basic quota is the total number of pounds U.S. burley growers may grow and market during the upcoming crop season. Price supports are the safety net above which buyers must bid in order to purchase U.S. burley.

For 1994, U.S. burley's quota was 543 million pounds.

If Glickman's quota announcement -- due Feb. 1 -- honors the Co-op's request, then U.S. burley growers can market 549 million pounds during the 1995-96 season.

Of the three options allowed by the USDA, we chose the smallest increase. It promises that the least amount of unsold tobacco will go under loan during next year's auctions," said Danny McKinney, CEO of the Burley Co-op. "And just coming off the buyout, farmers aren't eager to build up pool stocks too quickly."

According to the USDA formula, Glickman has the discretion to increase burley's basic quota within a range from 1.2 percent to 7.4 percent.

If the ag secretary also agrees with the Co-op's price recommendation, then the basic support price for 1995 burley will be \$1.725, or just above a cent higher, pound than the 1994 price support of \$1.714.

"This board will not endorse a price cut for burley," said William M. "Rod" Juegel, Jr., the newly elected Co-op

president. "But from the relief we've already received in the buyout, the smaller price hike may be a tool we can use to keep our tobacco competitive against imported burley."

According to the UDA formula, Glickman has the discretion to hike burley's price supports within a range from 1.1 cents to 1.7 cents.

Farmers must buy insurance for crop

Farmers wanting price supports for their 1995 tobacco crop must now purchase crop insurance.

Gloria Robbins, a program assistant with the local Consolidated Farm Service Agency, said Wednesday that the insurance was called for in the Federal Crop Insurance Reform Act of 1994.

The insurance can be purchased at the local farm service agency office for \$50 per crop per county. If a farmer has multiple crops, he or she will not have to pay more than \$200 per county or \$600 total for multiple counties.

The insurance can also be purchased locally at Dabney Feed Supply, through their Dabney Crop In-

urance program or from the Kentucky Farm Bureau Insurance Agency.

If a farmer decides to go through a private insurer, they must still go to the Consolidated Farm Service Agency and file proper forms to show they have purchased the insurance. Farmers have until March 15 to get the insurance.

The insurance covers crops destroyed by natural disasters. If a tobacco farmer does not have the necessary insurance, they will not be eligible for tobacco price supports and other USDA program benefits, such as food grain and wheat programs and FmHA loans for farm ownership, operation or emergency.

A brief business report was given by R.C.R.T. President, Gailiff Craig and our District President-elect, Sue French.

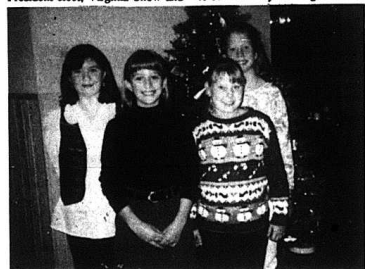
We were happy to have K.R.T.A. President-elect, Virginia Show and

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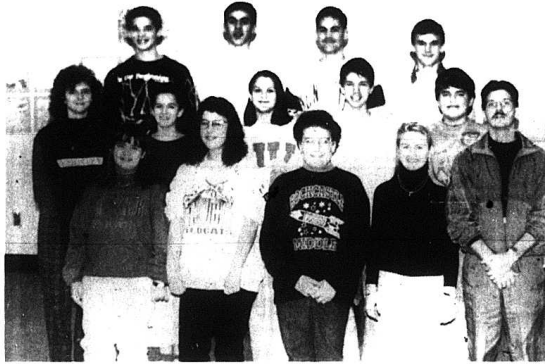

CFSA reminds foreigners of AFIDA requirement

"Foreigners who have bought or sold agricultural land in Rockcastle County are reminded to report the transaction to the local CFSA County office," Warden Alexander, County Executive Director of the Rockcastle County Consolidated Farm Service Agency (formerly ASCS), said.

To avoid Federal penalties and monetary fines, foreign owners of U.S. agricultural land must report their holdings, acquisitions, dispositions, leases of 10 years or more, and land use changes to CFSA within 90 days.

"The report is required by the Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act, (AFIDA) which is still in effect," Mr. Alexander said. Foreign investors are required to file a

report if all or part of any agricultural land is sold, or the title is transferred to another person.

Failure to file the AFIDA report could result in a civil penalty of up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the interest held in the agricultural land, he said.

For reporting purposes, agricultural land is any tract of more than 10 acres in the aggregate now in farming, ranching, forestry, or timber production, land used for forestry production is land exceeding 10 acres in which 10 percent is stocked by trees of any size, including land that formerly had such tree cover and will be naturally or artificially regenerated. "This includes land in agricultural use when purchased, as well as land

later converted to agricultural uses" the ASCS official said.

County government offices, realtors, attorneys, lending institutions and others involved in real estate transactions are asked to notify the foreign investor of these reporting requirements.

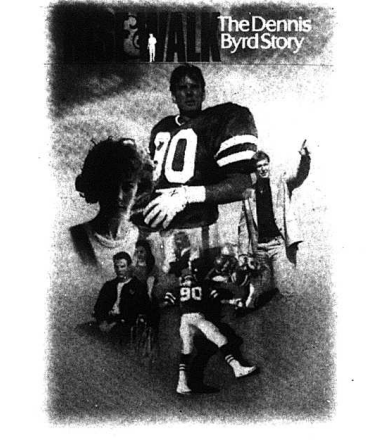

The Rocket Jayvees, winless except for one outing this season, hit the dust again Tuesday night at the hands of the Southern Jayvees 50-27.

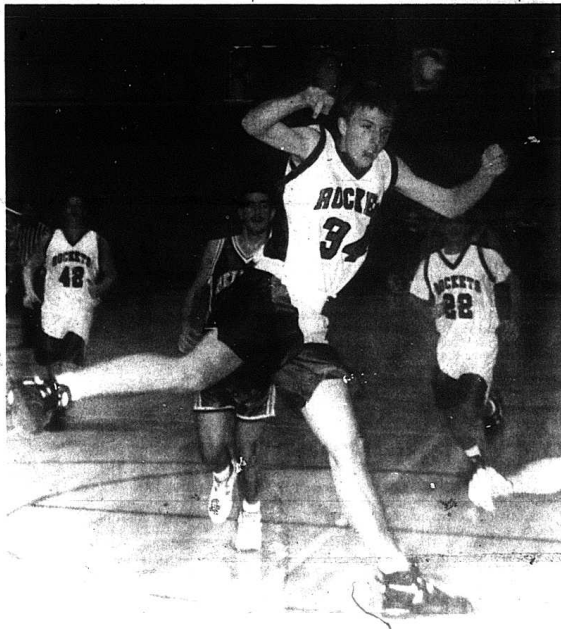
The Jayvees just couldn't get their shots to go down, due in large part to a tenacious defense by the Eagles, and numerous turnovers helped seal the Jayvees doom.

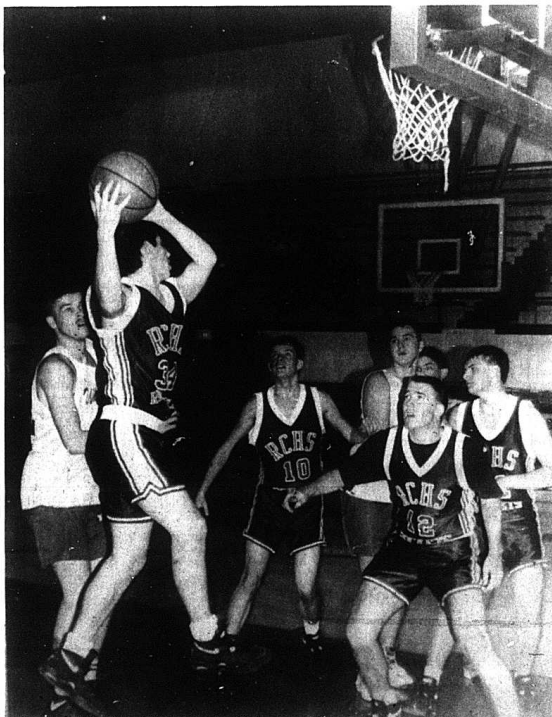

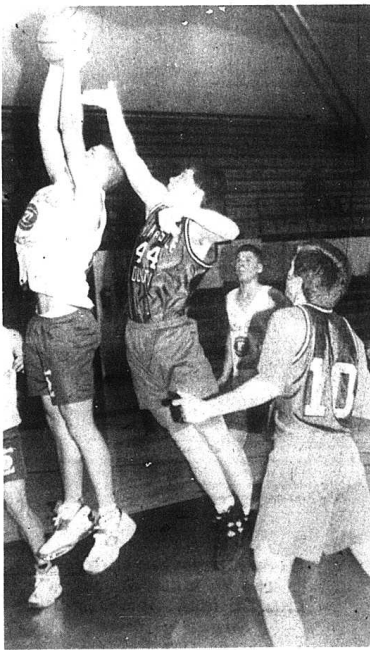

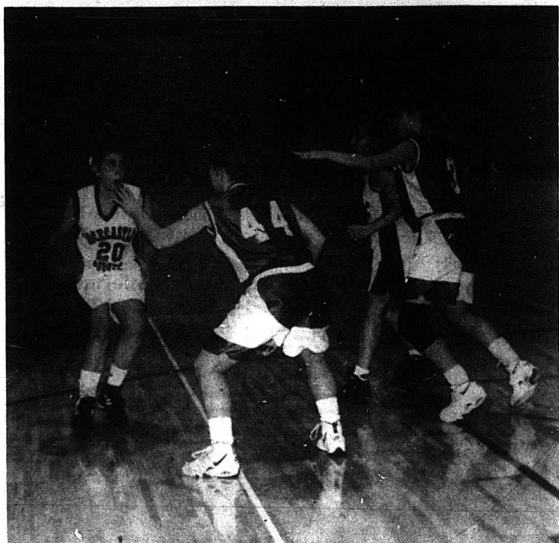

Kirby 5 and John Brown 2. Thursday night, the freshmen host McCreary Central and are also at home, Monday night, to Richmond Model.

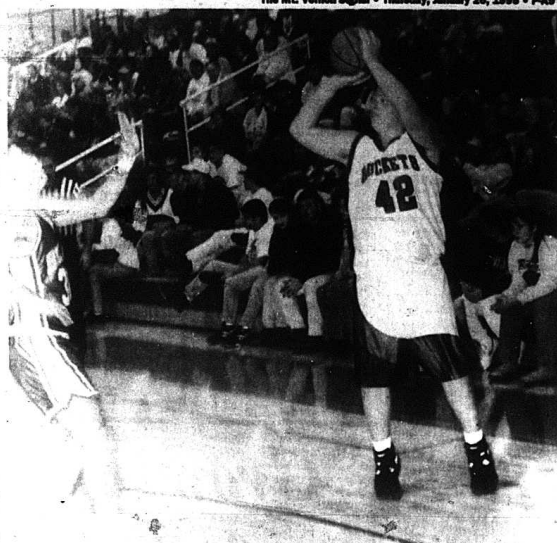

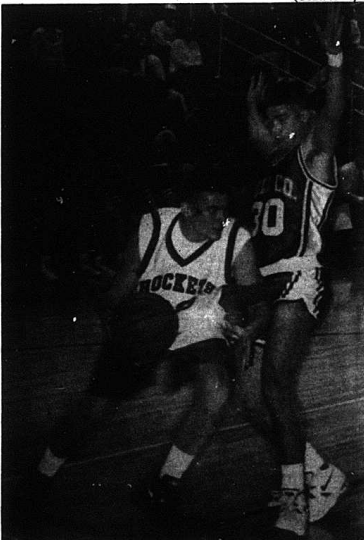

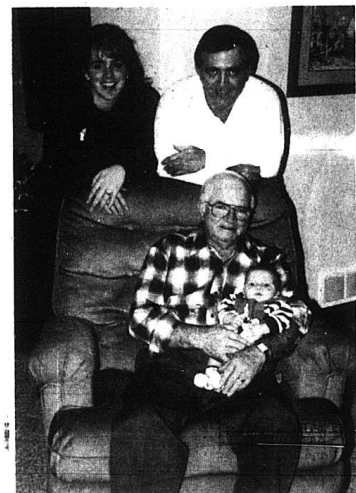

Burley Referendum

A burley tobacco marketing quota will be conducted this year. Persons eligible to vote are those producers who were engaged in production of the 1994 crop harvested. If you do not receive a ballot and feel you are eligible, please contact the office.

1993 Overpayments

Letters have been sent to producers with overpayments due to unearned deficiency payments in the 1993 Feed Grain program. The deadline for making the refund is March 15, 1995. Producers who want us to offset the refund from future payments received from this office should complete the offset request form included with the letter and return it to the office.

of the entire Economics Assistance Fund.

The judge suggested the heating and air be cut down when the center is not in use. "Turn the thermostat down," he said.

In a prepared statement the judge noted:

"I, personally, support the programs for our Senior Citizens Centers. It is obvious, likewise, that our county's magistrates have been supportive of these programs.

"Our county can presently allocate only \$1,300 each year for these centers' utilities - electric, water and telephone bills.

"To show you how much we have left in this small fund, the Senior Citizens Centers have already spent \$1,000 of that during the first six months for utilities.

"I'll be the first to admit that our county's support to these programs has been small and I wish it could be greater, but the county's resources do not allow us to provide yet greater support, unless, we lower the budgeted amounts for other programs supported in whole, or in part, by the local government Economic Assistance Fund, such as money for crushed stone for roads, library support, fair-ground maintenance, emergency dis-

patching and fuel for five fire departments to name a few.

"To put it more simply: if all these other programs are willing to receive less support from our county government then, and only then, can the Senior Citizens programs receive more funding.

"After all, there are only so many slices you can get from a pie, and I would not be honest if I said you could.

"I will not do anything to jeopardize those Senior Citizens programs we now have. After all, I hope to become a senior citizen myself someday.

"I think a major concern of the Senior Citizens Board is whether the county will pick up the heating and cooling bill for their new building. The question is this: can county taxpayers pay these extra utilities? Common sense says we can't increase funding unless another area of the county's responsibility suffers. This will be entirely up to the magistrates.

"We will always support Senior Citizens but, I will not jeopardize any other area funded by the Economic Assistance Fund. It's not a matter of not wanting to, we have limited funds," Carlifotis said.

"If the fiscal court's magistrates are willing to lower any other budgeted amounts for other funds, (fire, departments, etc.), then - and only then - could the senior citizens' fund be increased. They must not, however, draw from the small reserve that is there in case of emergencies for any fund," he said.

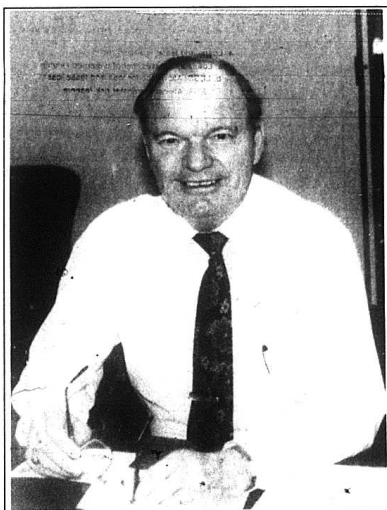

Following food guide pyramid ladder to great health

The Food Guide Pyramid emphasizes five major food groups needed for good health. Each group provides some, but not all, of the essential nutrients required for a healthful diet.

Breads, cereals, rice and pasta form the base of the Food Guide Pyramid. These foods supply most vitamins the body needs to use energy provided by other foods. You need 6 to 11 servings of these grain foods daily.

The fruit and vegetable group comprises the next level. These foods supply the majority of vitamins, minerals and fiber required in your diet. You need 5 to 7 servings of these plant foods daily.

Primary food groups derived from animals make up the third level of the food pyramid. One group is milk, yogurt and cheese, the other is meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts. These food groups provide most of the protein, calcium, iron and zinc needed in your diet. You need 2 to 3 servings of both these food groups daily.

These two food groups are nutrient dense because they contain large amounts of minerals, vitamins and proteins. As a result, you need fewer servings.

The small tip of the Food Guide Pyramid depicts fats, oils and

children, teenage girls, active women and sedentary men - 2,200 calories; teenage boys, active men, and very active women - 2,800 calories.

Women who are pregnant and breastfeeding might need more calories. While young children need fewer calories, they do need the same variety of foods as older individuals. This means they eat smaller servings to attain variety; but they must have at least 2 cups of milk per day.

This list will help you determine what constitutes a serving from the various food groups:
Grain Food Group - one slice of bread, one ounce of ready-to-eat cereal, 1/2 cup of cooked cereal, rice or pasta.
Vegetable and Fruit Food Group - one cup of raw leafy vegetables; 1/2 cup of other vegetables, cooked or chopped raw; 3/4 cup vegetable

juice; one medium apple, banana or orange; 1/2 cup of fruit; 3/4 cup of fruit juice.
Dairy Food Group - one cup of

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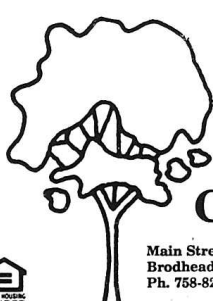
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"What Saith the Scriptures"

In Mk. 16:17-18, we read "And these signs shall follow them that believe; in my name shall they cast out devils; they shall speak with new tongues; they shall take up serpents; and if they drink any deadly thing, it shall not hurt them; they shall lay hands on the sick, and they shall recover." I don't know of any churches around close, but there are several churches that have "snake handling" services. I was watching a program on KET (I think), that was showing a religious service of church in Est Tennessee and some were holding rattlesnakes and copperhead snakes; and even had a fellow drinking out of a Mason canning jar, marked "Strychnine" on it. The claim for such actions is the verses we quoted above, but what about such activities, are they Biblically correct? To answer briefly, No! Let's look at the scriptures to see this answer.

Notice vs. 17 said these signs shall follow "them" that believe. In vs. 19 it said the Lord spoke to "them" and then in vs. 20, it said "they" went forth preaching, the Lord working with "them." Now, who does he have in mind? If we look up to vs. 14 it says the "eleven," i.e., the Apostles. The Apostles worked these miracles, but why? We are not left in doubt, for vs. 17 said they were "signs." In vs. 20 we read, "And they went forth, and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them, and confirming the word with signs following." The miraculous works of vs. 17-18 were signs to confirm the word that was preached. The gospel in the first century was a new message from God, how would people know for sure that it was from God? God worked these miraculous signs to confirm that the word was from God, that it could be trusted, and that it should be obeyed! But after the word was fully revealed and was fully confirmed, and recorded for us in the scriptures, the age of miracles passed, the miraculous would have finished its work. If the miracles of confirmation are yet at work, then that necessarily implies that more revelation is being given and that it must be confirmed. Thus the Bible is an incomplete revelation from God. But in view of II Pet. 1:3, Jude 3 and II Tim. 3:16-17, who can believe such a conclusion! If I said that people will endanger their lives and jeopardize their souls for such a foolish practice of "snake handling" at a religious church service.

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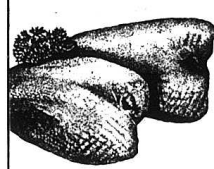
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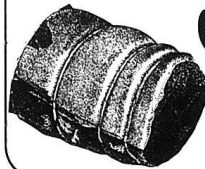
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
