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

## Mullins "hits" Judge Carlotis with more than harsh criticism

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis has joked all week that last Friday was a rough day at the office.

As evidence for just how rough, the County Judge still sports a very black eye, the result of an altercation with former Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Roland Mullins.

The incident, which occurred Friday morning in the judge's office is currently under investigation by the Kentucky State Police and the Commonwealth Attorney's office.

Former county Judge-Executive Roland Mullins reportedly threw more than a verbal punch at present Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis.

Mullins, who was defeated by Carlotis in 1993 Republican Primary, pinned Carlotis behind Carlotis' desk last Friday and "pummeled him," Carlotis reported.

Mullins went into Carlotis' office and, according to Carlotis, as Mullins

walked over "I stood up and greeted him. He told me, he didn't like the way I was doing things," Carlotis said.

"I was totally surprised," Carlotis recounted, "he didn't seem angry."

Mullins reportedly said "you've misquoted me in the local paper." "When I tried to talk to him, Mullins said, 'I'm doing the talking.'"

Mullins accused me of "trying to destroy the best senior citizen center in the state and said I was trying to run down the mental health agency (Cumberland River Comprehensive Care) which has had numerous awards for frugality," Carlotis questioned "frugality."

"He said I had 'sunk to a new low,' and then rammed the desk into me and pinned me against the wall. I called for help. It was an unfortunate incident. I'm amazed and embarrassed."

## Rockcastle students meet state expectations on tests

Among state's 42 districts to show marked improvement

The final test scores have been calculated and Rockcastle County students are apparently making the grade, at least by statewide standards.

Rockcastle County schools have been listed among the 95 percent of Kentucky schools that showed improvement on last year's assessment test.

Statewide, Rockcastle was among 42 districts that showed marked improvement and actually had the twelfth most improved scores in the state.

Rockcastle also improved more than any bordering school district.

Assessment results for the 1992-94 accountability biennium were released Tuesday by the department of education.

"The Rockcastle County school district has reason to celebrate and feel very positive about these results. To be a district eligible for rewards is highly significant," said Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bigge Towery, Jr.

"I feel very fortunate to be a part of a school district which can report

assessment results at such a high level," Towery said.

"The performance of students in Rockcastle County schools is what has been measured and we must applaud their performance and recognize that parents and community members have contributed so very

## Cash for educators

Some Rockcastle County educators are in line for cash rewards because of the recent good test scores in the county.

Teachers at Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and the former staff of Livingston school will receive part of the \$26 million set aside by the state for incentive payments. The central office staff is also in line for cash rewards as well.

There were more schools in Kentucky eligible for cash rewards than were anticipated so the amount that will be received by local educators will be reduced from first estimates.

Brodhead and Livingston are in line for maximum cash rewards, which at first had been \$3,600 a teacher. Mt. Vernon teachers are eligible at level twenty-one, which was \$2,500 a teacher and the central office is eligible at level 13, which was previously drafted at \$2,300 per staff member.

The faculties at each school and the central office will vote on how to spend the money they receive. Under state law teachers and administrators can keep the money if they so desire.

"These reward amounts will be reduced considerably because more schools have qualified for rewards than had been expected," Superintendent Bigge Towery Jr., said Tuesday.

According to the state Department of Education, money should be forthcoming to educators by May 1.

doctorate from Vanderbilt University. His degree is not some Mickey Mouse title he received from a mail-order degree mill, nor is it a politically-wrought, honorary degree from some college that wants his influence. Nor is it a "doctor of ministry" degree from one of our Baptist seminaries where a man reads several books and writes a "paper" on some subject like "The Placement of Restrooms in a Baptist Church: A Critical Factor in Undisturbed Worship" or "A Poor Sound System in a Baptist Church: How to Keep the Hearing-Impaired at Home."

In one of our Wednesday evening sessions, I encouraged our church to call the man "Doctor." That will not likely be the case, however, because of an unexamined "anti-intellectual" attitude we have inherited. And the modern, conservative emphasis promotes the same attitude. Somewhere along the way we got into an attitude that learning and godliness are incompatible. Let me illustrate.

In 1988 I attended the annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in San Antonio, Texas. In a morning session, we came to "devotional" time. Our speaker was Dr. Roy Fish, a professor at Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas. The convention president introduced him as "a brilliant scholar but a man whose heart is on fire for God." I don't think the president even noticed what he had said, nor did many others. But I did. The word "but" in that introduction told everything. It said deep-thinking and Christianity aren't compatible. How much better it would have been had he said, "A brilliant scholar and a man whose heart is on fire for God."

It may be that we're afraid to give a

human his due because that would make him or her "better" than us - which is not unlike the attitude that we shouldn't pay a preacher "More than I make."

It may be that we think because God is no "respector of persons," we should do likewise. (It's fun to play God.) I don't fully understand our reluctance to recognize human achievements, but if we intend to do so, let's be consistent and honor *no one*, which means we won't applaud in church.

I said all that to say this, dear hearts: it's no big deal with me about calling our pastor "Doctor." It does disturb me, however, if our reason for *not* doing so is in any way related to the notion that when we enter a church building we have to hang up our hats and brains before we can approach God - that learning and faith don't

## Fog Collector

The Atacama Desert in northern Chile is one of the driest spots on earth, a place where the 350 villagers who live in Chungungo see no rain for years on end. So when atmospheric scientists from Environment Canada worked with scientists and engineers from Chile to devise a way to harvest drinking water from the clouds that drift in off the Pacific Ocean, their feat was hailed as a miracle akin to the patenting of desalination in 1869.

Scientists draped 75 sheets of plastic meshing over a line suspended seven feet off the ground, like a washline facing into the wind, along the El Tofo ridge above Chungungo, explains Robert S. Schemenauer. A cloud physicist from Environment Canada in Toronto, he helped find an efficient way to trap billions of tiny fog droplets in the mesh sheeting, each piece of which is about 40 feet long and 13 feet high.

It was a daunting task because it takes about 10 million droplets to yield a single drop of water about the size of a match head, according to Schemenauer. But it worked. An average 3,000 gallons of fog water a day now run down the meshes into collecting troughs, a pipeline then carries it to a storage tank.

Schemenauer says the nets, which cost about \$400 each, collect anywhere from 20 to 65 percent of the moisture available in the dens *camanchacas*, as the Pacific fogs are called by rural Chileans. Unlike desalination, used extensively and expensively in the Middle East, the nets cost nothing to operate.

"This system could be applied in arid zones all around the world," says Schemenauer. The Chilean nets yield a gallon of potable water per square yard of the double-folded mesh.

The system works best at altitudes of 1,500 to 3,000 feet, where prevailing winds reach speeds between 5 and 20 miles per hour. He admits that the technique, which was tried experimentally in the 1950s, is not exactly new. "Pliny the Elder, the Roman historian, mentions collecting water that dripped from trees in catch basins," he says.

Schemenauer and his colleagues have obtained funds from Canada's International Development Research Center to evaluate the fog collection potential in several dry countries, such as Eritrea, Yemen, Kenya, Tanzania, and India, where it could have immense possibilities for agricultural use. —George Nobbe

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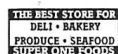

Miller said Monday that he was in his office, which is located near the judge's when he heard something being against the wall in the judge's office.

Miller said that he proceeded to the judge's office where he found Mullins and Carlotts. Miller said that he stopped the altercation and Mullins left the office.

Mullins had apparently hit Carlotts several times before being stopped by Miller.

Carlotts explained that it was editorial comment when the *Signal* story said "at one time, Rockcastle funded the program \$10,000 over 4 years. Judge Hubert Thacker did not. Judge Roland Mullins did. It was being funded when Judge Carlotts went into office, but he cut the money off." Mullins resented the comment, Carlotts said.

A check of court records show Comprehensive Care was funded in 1989-90 fiscal year, \$2,500; in 1990-91 it was funded \$2,500; in 1991-92 there was no funding and in 1993-94 funding was \$1,625. Judge Mullins had to leave money in the county treasury by state law.

"I had not had any contact with Roland since before the election (Spring, 1993)," Carlotts continued.

Mullins is now executive director of the Adanta Group in Somerset, which provides outpatient psychiatric services to 10 south central counties.

In his prepared statement, in the *Signal*, Carlotts wrote, "While I support the work of such agencies (Comp. Care) please permit me the right to disagree with the method of handling public funds. If they are going to ask our county for funding, then I retain the right to question how they will use our taxpayers' money, and I will not apologize for taking this stand."

In reference to senior citizens, Carlotts said the county could not be responsible for paying for utilities in a new building on U.S. 25 south, they plan to move to soon. The state purchased the building, Robert Philbeck remodeled it.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Blauette, has removed himself from the case because of a conflict of interest. Burdette is a member of the

Rockcastle Fiscal Court, as is, of course, Carlotts.

Carlotts, said Tuesday that he would have no further comment this week concerning the incident, but that he would have a prepared statement at a later date.

Mullins, through his attorney Jerry Cox, had no comment.

much in this improvement process," Towery said.

The scores of students in the fourth, eighth and twelfth grade are used to determine a district's actual score, although the assessment is taken by each student.

Broadhead Elementary school had the best overall test scores, Livingston school, which is now closed, had

the second best scores. Mt. Vernon was third, Roundstone fourth and students at Rockcastle County high school brought up the rear.

RCHS has been classified by the state as a school, "In decline."

The rest of the county schools are listed as being in good favor with the state.

Broadhead and Livingston attained the highest maximum level possible, while Mt. Vernon and Roundstone exceeded their threshold level.

Teachers and administrators at Broadhead, Livingston and Mt. Vernon are now eligible for cash rewards from the state.

Even with the poor showing at RCHS, district wide Rockcastle test scores were up almost ten percentage points from their baseline established in 1991-92. That will make central office administrators also eligible for rewards.

The good news at RCHS is that test scores improved almost ten percentage points from a year ago. The bad news is that a year ago, RCHS test scores were deplorable, falling almost five points from their baseline of 39.4 established in 1991-92.

RCHS was to have reached a threshold level of 45.5 in the past two years, but when the last two years were computed together, RCHS seniors scored only 39.1. The 1992-93 score was 34.8 and the 1993-94 score was 43.4.

RCHS principal Ronnie Cash has blamed much of the problem on senior apathy and a statewide decline a year ago suggests that he may very well be right.

Cash said last year when test scores were so low, that teachers and administrators at RCHS were not going to bury their heads in the sand but that steps would be taken to improve scores.

Scores did improve almost ten percentage points, but it was not enough to keep RCHS from being listed as a school, "In decline."

Superintendent Towery said that RCHS had been receiving help from the state Department of Education in the form of a Distinguished Educator who has been on site at RCHS for several months.

RCHS administrators and the distinguished educator will also be required to develop a comprehensive improvement plan for RCHS over the next two years. That requirement is based on the fact that RCHS is considered a school in decline by the state department.

RCHS assistant principal Jim Cox told the Site Based Decision Making council at RCHS last week that Ms. Jane Harris, the distinguished educator had suggested certain strategies to help improve assessment scores at RCHS.

They include: English teachers collaborating with content area teachers in writing, having social studies teachers writing and teaching a two-week unit for economics and implementing seven, 25 minute lessons to prepare students for the assessment.

"I am proud of the accomplishments in our schools, but we must always keep in mind that each school is different and faces its own unique problems and obstacles to change and that the rate of progress will vary from year from school to school each time assessment results are reported," Towery said.

"It has not been easy for our teachers, administrators and all other staff members to comply with the mandates of education reform since 1990," Towery said.

The challenges have been numerous and the transformation that has occurred in the operation of our schools the past several years is unprecedented in the history of Kentucky education," he said.

Cumberland College Head Football Coach Tom Dowling received an honor from Big Dipper Sports, which covers Eastern Kentucky High School Sports.

A plaque, which was presented at a banquet honoring the 1994 All-Mountain team on Jan. 29 in Hazard, was inscribed with the following, "Our children must never lose their zeal for building a better world... You have instilled our mountain youth with a strong community spirit and encouraged them to be active participants in their own destiny. You have coached us well, ensuring us a secure future." On receiving the award Dowling was humbled. "This is an award to the program and college which recognizes the hard work of our assistant football coaches, and especially Freddie Maggard who is responsible for recruiting in the southeastern Kentucky area. He is well known and all of his hard work is directly responsible for the attraction

of mountain players to Cumberland College and its football program. It further recognizes the commitment of Cumberland to the students in the Southeastern Kentucky Mountain area."

The Big Dipper commented about Coach Dowling, "I have a tremendous amount of respect for Cumberland College and Tom Dowling. He recruits the mountain kids more than any other school. Coach Dowling really appreciates the relationship between academics and athletics and his interest is genuine and sincere. A lot of mountain kids go to larger schools and don't finish their education, but when they go to Cumberland they seem to stay. Coach Dowling is an outstanding human being and coach. It is a pleasure being associated with him and Cumberland College."

Another area that Coach Dowling is involved in, is the NAIA Football Coaches Association of which he is the president.

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# Thee Pigg was a gift to Rockcastle County

Reprinted from the Jan. 1995 Rockcastle Historical Society newsletter.

In 1810, The Pigg family was a resident of the part of Rockcastle County which later became Laurel County. Paul Pigg (born about 1768), the apparent patriarch of the family, married Elizabeth davenport (born about 1770) on October 7, 1806, in Lincoln County.

As for Theophilus Pigg, we pick up his history in Clay County, KY, where he was born on October 8, 1861, the son of Gabriel and Elvira Hensley Pigg. "Thee" and family removed from Clay County to Rockcastle County, where he lived until his death on January 7, 1949. He was laid to rest in the Red Hill Cemetery. Some

of his brothers and sisters were: Sarah May, John Franklin, Martha Harrison Turner, Emily (Emma) Noely, Eliza Mathis, George Harvey, and Dora. We know of no others but, there possibly could be.

Theophilus Pigg was married three times. His first marriage was to Rebecca M. Williams on October 3, 1886 in Clay County, KY. The second was to Bettia Joseph on February 17, 1896 in Clay County, KY and the final one to Zella Myrtle Mullins on Aug. 7, 1909 in Rockcastle County, KY. Myrtle was born on May 8, 1886 in Rockcastle County and died September 20, 1971 and is buried in the Fairview Cemetery in Mullins Station, KY.

Theophilus is known to have been

the father of at least thirteen children. They were: Lois, Robert, William, Nora (Tucker), Ray, Virgil, Homer, Minnie, Mary, Martha, John, Gabriel and David. Myrtle was the mother of the last six of the children.

Many descendants of Theophilus can still be found living in Rockcastle County. He was a well known person about the county. His claims to fame were earned as a school teacher, photographer, poetry collector, etc. In his will, he left money to publish a book of poetry and songs that he had written and collected. Many children of the county have been "scared out of their wits" by The Pigg and his camera, especially when he put the black cloth over his head and said "Smile." Who could smile into such a contraption. Many pictures of school children and people, in general, would be non-existent today, had it not been for Thee Pigg and his famous camera.

It is known to have taught school for a while at Red Hill and one of his students, now 92 years of age, remembers him well. While teaching at Flat Rock School, he did a beautiful job of painting the letters of the alphabet, in beautiful script form, on the interior wall of the building. Those same letters remained there for many years.

In later years, Thee became somewhat Nomadic, traveling about the county collecting poetry and taking pictures. He slept wherever he could - whether in someone's home or out under the stars of night. Of his time, he was one of the few people who knew sign language. A brother, Robert, was educated at a school for the deaf and in turn, taught Thee signing, so that they would be able to communicate.

The Pigg was a gift to Rockcastle County and he will not soon be forgotten.

the group that the (KHSAA) had been contacted and the coaches had received permission for those affected students to participate. The matter concerning "open gym" had been discussed at an earlier SBDM council and addressed.

-EQUALITY IN ENFORCING RULES: This concern was illustrated

by parents comments about certain players being allowed to talk disrespectfully to the coach with no reprimand or disciplinary action being taken to correct the player.

-LACK OF COMMUNICATION: With players pertaining to practice and game night bus departure times. Several parents stated that their son had missed practice due to not knowing the designated times.

-LACK OF POSITIVE ESTEEM BUILDING PRACTICES: Some of the parents and guests stated that the perception was that a good, positive, program and learning experiences were missing. Several instances were listed when demeaning or negative remarks were made to players.

SBDM member Ronnie Sears posed the question as to what procedure was to be followed if the council was unable to discuss personnel, who would substantiate allegations and take follow-up actions? Cash stated that the principal must recommend action to the superintendent who then would take final action. The SBDM council could decide positions and time lines for filling any which were vacant.

Sears then asked the group what they wanted to accomplish by expressing their concerns to the council.

Different individuals responded with the following remarks:

"Satisfaction, what it takes to improve the program."

"Look at the program, if it is in bad shape, make the corrections."

"Question the team members through anonymous questionnaires."

"Stop the questionable recruiting practice."

Principal Cash responded to the group by stating, "every item will be dealt with and if any of these things are truly happening none of us (SBDM Council) would support these actions." Cash further stated that "because of parental and community concerns another program issue would be addressed at the end of the school year." (The minutes did not reflect what specific issue this was in reference to).

A story in the Thursday, February 2nd issue of the Courier Journal reported that RCHS had conducted an

in-house investigation of the program to ascertain if any infractions had occurred. The story said that, according to Cash, no violations had come to light.

Cash said this week that he had already discussed the parent's concerns with head basketball coach Clayton Cash and that he (the principal) had contacted the Kentucky High School Athletic Association himself detailing for them the parent's concerns. Cash said the KHSAA said they did not feel there was any reason to open an investigation into the program.

Also, in September, the RCHS SBDM Council addressed the open gym question and passed a motion to

follow the KHSAA's open gym rule to this letter which says:

Cash announced to the council that both boys and girls basketball coaches were allowing open gym, which is allowed under KHSAA regulations. The council directed Cash to discuss with the coaches that if he had reason to suspect any KHSAA regulations were being violated that he (Cash) would take action to cease the violation. If any violation was investigated by the KHSAA and resulted in charges being brought against RCHS resulting in suspension or penalties against RCHS, then Cash should recommend to the SBDM council that the individuals responsible have their coaching contracts terminated.

# Jayvees lose in overtime

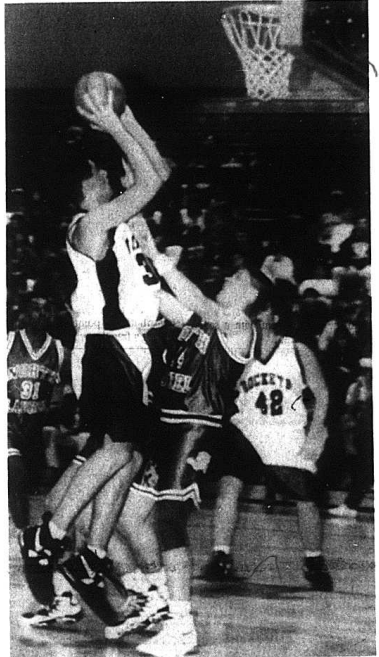

## Correction from last week: It was Brandon Falin who actually scored the 2 points in the T-Wolves 8-2 loss to the Hornets.

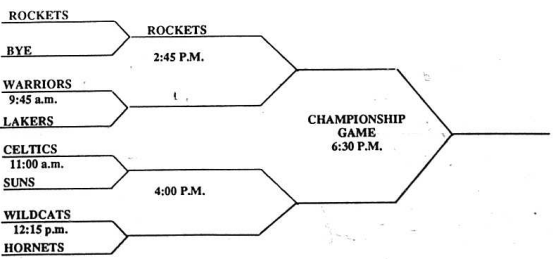

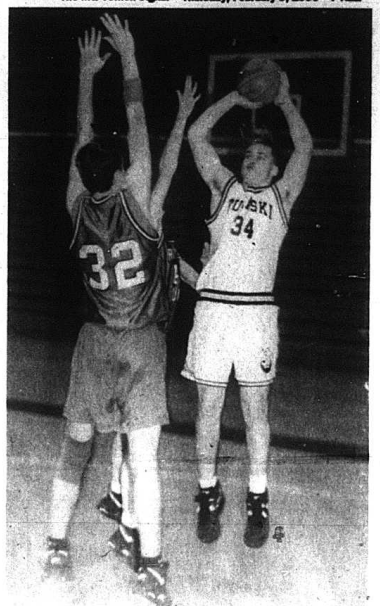

## Crop insurance required for 1995 USDA benefits

Producers are required to purchase catastrophic crop insurance coverage in order to be eligible for USDA Program benefits for 1995. Programs involved include: Price Support on burley tobacco, CRP, FMHA programs, Production Adjustment Programs, and Price Support Programs. Catastrophic risk insurance "CAT" provides 50 percent yield coverage and 60 percent price coverage. This is available through either the county CPA (formerly ASCS) office or a private reinsured agent. Additional coverage of up to 75 percent yield and 100 price is available through the private reinsured agents only. CAT coverage carries a \$50 per crop per county fee, with a maximum of \$200 per county or \$600 per premium. Additional coverage has a premium

attached as well as optional units. Yields in most crops are based on actual yields furnished by the producer or percentages of the established yields at the CFSA office. Burley tobacco is based on the effective marketing quota and planted acres. All crops that are determined to be of economic significance in either the current or prior year will insure at least CAT coverage on all insured acres within the county where benefits are requested. Economic significance is defined as 10 percent of the total income from all crops for the producer. Crops insurable in county include: burley tobacco, corn, wheat, barley, grain sorghum, soybeans and nursery stock. Deadline for purchasing crop insurance is March 15, 1995.

### HOW SAFE IS YOUR CHIMNEY?

At home, we usually take for granted that all of our appliances will continue to work properly until they don't. We don't have our refrigerators, dishwashers or washer/dryers serviced until they break down. Same thing applies to televisions, VCRs and computers. Fewer than 10% of American homes have a certified chimney inspection system installed and checked regularly according to industry sources. Why, then, should we bother to have our chimneys regularly inspected and evaluated?

The answer can be summed up in one word: SAFETY. Every time you build a fire in your fireplace, whether you use wood, coal, manufactured logs, pellets or even gas logs, combustion products are released and vented up the chimney. Some of the products are released and vented up the chimney and are dispersed into the atmosphere. Others, like soot and creosote, cling to the sides of the chimney where they may eventually catch on fire. Still other such as carbon monoxide can leak into the living space of your home through cracks in the chimney.

Ironically, the hotter the fire is in your open fireplace, the less likely that you will have creosote and soot deposits in your chimney. However, complete combustion occurs at higher temperatures than can be maintained in the average fireplace. When "green" wood is used, you often get a lot of smoke, lower temperatures and incomplete combustion. In this case, a sticky, black substance called creosote forms and begins to coat the inside of the chimney. Creosote looks like small water droplets when initially produced.

Creosote burns at an extremely low temperature. So does this piece of paper!

You know how easy it is to ignite a piece of paper. When you start a fire in your fireplace, heat travels up the chimney, warming the creosote. A spark from the fire could ignite the creosote thereby starting a chimney fire. The best way to avoid a potential problem is by utilizing safe wood burning habits and by contacting a Certified Chimney Sweep® to inspect and evaluate your system annually.

When chimney sweeps are hired to clean solid fuel or gas heating systems, they also function as on-the-job fire prevention specialists—on the lookout for unsafe conditions that can cause home fires. If a fire does occur, fire investigators often request the expertise of a Certified Chimney Sweep to examine the chimney and solid fuel equipment involved for evidence of their role in the fire. In servicing gas systems, chimney sweeps examine the chimney connectors and joints for possible cracks where dangerous carbon monoxide can escape into the living area of your home. (Carbon monoxide poisoning, not burning, is the main cause of home fire deaths.)

When you are ready for chimney service, make sure the person you select is a Certified Chimney Sweep®. This information is provided compliments of:

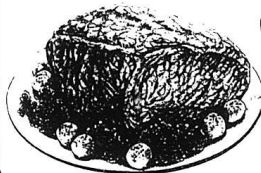

## What is Caffeine? What effect does it have?

Caffeine is a naturally occurring chemical substance found in the leaves, seed or fruit of many plants throughout the world. It can be a mild stimulant to the central nervous system.

Coffee and cocoa beans, cola nuts and tea leaves are the most common caffeine sources. The amount of caffeine in foods made from these plant materials depends on the serving size, type of food product and method of processing used.

To date, no research has linked caffeine consumption with cancer, miscarriages, birth defects, or low birth weights.

Caffeine has several different effects on the human body. It stimulates the brain and in small doses can improve a person's attention, concentration and coordination. It stimulates gastric secretions and the heart's action, causing blood vessels to widen everywhere in the body except in the brain where they constrict.

It also acts on the kidneys to increase water elimination. As a result, it is excreted within several hours of consumption and does not accumulate in the body.

As with other dietary habits, consume caffeine in moderation. A reasonable guideline is about 300

milligrams per day.

A 5-ounce cup of brewed coffee can contain from 40 to 180 milligrams of caffeine; decaffeinated brewed coffee, 2-5; tea, 20-110; cocoa beverage, 2-20; soft drink, 15-30. One ounce of milk chocolate contains 1-15 milligrams of caffeine; semi-sweet, dark chocolate, 5-35.

With regular use, an individual can develop a tolerance to the effects of caffeine because the body adapts to the amount consumed. The person must increase caffeine intake to continue any stimulant effect.

A caffeine overdose can cause several problems, including over-acute sensations, irregular heart beat, or muscular trembling.

If regular consumption stops abruptly, an individual can have symptoms such as headaches, fatigue, drowsiness or irritability as a result of physical and psychological dependence on caffeine. While these effects usually are temporary, they can generally avoid them by gradually decreasing caffeine consumption over several weeks.

## Farm News

Is it cost effective to seed better varieties of red clover? Research from the Agronomy Department of the University of Kentucky has compared the performance of common or unimproved red clovers to certified varieties at research farms throughout Kentucky. Their results found that the certified improved varieties yielded an average of 1,000 pounds more forage per acre in the first year of production for a spring seeding.

In the second year, seeding a better variety was worth 2,500 pounds more forage per acre.

Even if the improved seed cost \$0.75 more per pound and you seeded 10 pounds of seed per acre, that extra \$7.50 was worth over 3,500 pounds of forage over the first two years.

Stands of the improved varieties were thick and vigorous going into their second winter, while the commons were clearly thinning. A comparison of the lowest yielding common clover vs. the best

certified clover over a 3-year period showed a 11,000 pound advantage to the certified clover. Getting an extra 220 square bales over three years can easily pay the additional \$7.50.

Don't settle for anything less than an improved, certified variety of red clover. You can tell if the variety is certified by the presence of a blue tag on the bag. The blue tag is the only guarantee that the genetics in the bag match the name on the tag. Contact your farm supply dealer 6 to 10 days before you need the seed so they can be sure to have a certified variety on hand.

The bottom line is that seeding an improved, certified variety of red clover pays, period. Complete data on these trials are available at your local County Extension Office.

## "What Saith the Scriptures"

Secondly, Paul reasoned about temperance. Temperance means self-control, self-discipline, a much needed quality in the lives of men. Paul said that the man who "striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible." I Cor. 9:27. Just as an athlete is temperate or shows self control in all things, even so must we.

Thirdly, Paul reasoned with them about judgment to come. Indeed all mankind, is heading for this awesome day. Paul said "Because he hath appointed a day, in which he will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom he hath ordained: whereof he hath given assurance unto all men, in that he hath raised him from the dead." Ac. 17:31. Yes, all will be raised from the dead, Jn. 5:28-29, and all will give answer to God in the judgment day.

Felix was all shook up, about the teachings of Jesus, for the scripture saith that he trembled. But there was a problem, Felix professed obeying Christ, and waited for a convenient season. But the only really convenient season men have, is today, for today is the day of Salvation, II Cor. 6:2.

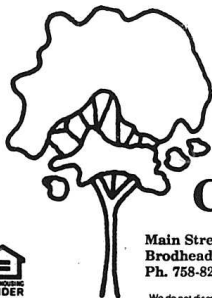

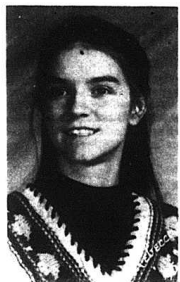

## Grant available for students in Rockcastle

Attention all high school seniors who live in Rockcastle County. You may be eligible for the Bert T. Combs Leadership Grant.

Cumberland College's Bert T. Combs Leadership Grant program honors the memory of an alumnus who served as Judge on the Kentucky Court of Appeals from 1951-1955, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky from 1959-1963, and Judge of the Sixth District United States Court of Appeals from 1967-1970. Governor Combs died in December of 1991.

The Honorable Bert T. Combs was a native of Clay County and attended Cumberland College in 1929-1930. When Combs first came to Cumberland College, he had little money to pay for his education. He went to see President J.L. Creech to seek a job on campus. Creech was a psychologist who believed that character could be seen in one's handwriting. He asked the young Combs to write on a piece of paper the following statement, "Cumberland College educates the

youth of the mountains." After viewing Creech's penmanship, President Creech obviously was impressed because he hired the Manchester native to stoke furnaces. Many years later, Combs reminisced that apart from

that job, "I would have never gone to college."

Today Cumberland College continues to serve the youth of the region. The Bert T. Combs Leadership Grant will make it possible for many mountain students to attend the College of the Kentucky Mountains. The Grant is designed to complement other available aid programs and will not exceed the cost of the tuition.

To be eligible you must meet the following conditions: must be a full-time student; must be in the top-half of your graduating class; must have a minimum of 19 ACT (800 SAT); must apply for and be eligible to receive a Pell Grant and students from the eligible Kentucky counties must apply for the Kentucky Tuition Grant, must be resident of Bell, Clay, Knox, Harlan, Jackson, Laurel, McCreary, Perry, Pulaski, Rockcastle or Whitley County in Kentucky, or Anderson, Campbell, Claiborne or Scott County in Tennessee.
