Some Rockcastle County educators are in line for cash rewards because of the recent good test scores in the county.

Teachers at Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and the former staff of Livingston school will receive part of the 256 million set saide by the state for incentive payments. The central office staff is also in line for eash rewards as well.

Brothead and Livingston are in line for maximum cash rewards, which at first had been \$35,000 a teacher. Mt. Vernon teachers are eligible at level twenty-one, which was \$25,000 a teacher and the central office is eligible at level 13, which was previously drafted at \$22,000 per staff member.

The faculties at each school and the central office will vote on how to spend the money they receive. Under state law teachers and administrators can keep the money if they so desire.

These reward amounts will be reduced considerably because more schools have qualified for rewards than had been expected," Superintendent Bige Towery Jr., said Tuesday.

According to the state Department of Education, money should be forthcoming to educators by May 1.

Anyway ... I'm glad to have a pastor! And I'm very glad his first name isn't "John."





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

It was a daunting task because it takes about 10 million droplets to yield a single drop of water about the size of a match head, according to Schemenauer. But it worked. An average 3,000 gallons of fog water a day now run down the meshes into collecting trouble a piceline then collecting troughs, a pipeline then carries it to a storage tank.

Schemenuer says the nets, which cost about \$400 each, collect any-where from 20 to 65 percent of the moisture available in the dens cameraheza, as the Pacific flogs are called by trural chileans. Unlike desalinization, used cattersively and expensively in the Middle East, the nest cost nothing to operate.

This system could be applied in aird zones all around the world, says schemenauer. The Chilean nets yield a gallon of potable water per square yard of the double-folded mesh. The system works best at altitudes of 1,500 to 3,000 feet, where prevailing winds reach speeds between 5 and 20 miles per hour. He admits that the technique, which was tried experimentally in the 1950s, is not exactly new. Pliny the Elder, the Roman historian, mentions collecting water that dripped from trees in catch basins," he says. Schemenauer alby countries, such as Ericea, Yeman, Kenya, Tanzania, and India, where it could have immense posibilities for agricultural use.

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



Thee Pigg was a gift to Rockcastle County

Reprinted from the Jan. 1995 Rock-castle Historial Society newsletter.

In 1810, The Pigg family was a resident of the part of Rockcastle County which later became Laure County, Paul Pigg (born about 1768), the apparent patriarch of the family, married Elizabeth davenport (born about 1770) on October 7, 1806, in

about 17/0 on Cease 7, 1800, at Lincoln County.

As for Theophilus Pigg, we pickup hishistory in Clay County, KY, where he was born on October 8, 1861, the son of Gabriel and ElviralHensley Pigg. Thee" and family removed from Clay County to Rockeastle County, where helived until his death on January 7, 1949. He was lain to rest in the Red Hill Cemetery. Some

of his brothers and sisters were: Sarah May, John Franklin, Martha Harri-son Turner, Emily (Emma) Neely, Eliza Mathis, George Harvey, and Dora. We know of no others but, there possibly could be. Theophilus Pigg was married three times. His first marriage was to Rebecca M. Williams on October 3, 1886 in Clay County. KY. The sec-

Rebecca M. Williams on October 3, 1886 in Clay County, KY. The sec-ond was to Bettia Joseph on February 17, 1896 in Clay County, KY and the final one to Zella Myrtle Mullins on Aug. 7, 1909 in Rockcastle County, KY. Myrtle was born on May 8, 1886 in Rockcastle County and died Sep-tember 20, 1971 and is buried in the Fairview Cemetery in Mullins Sta-

the father of at least thirteen children. They were: Lois, Robert, William, Nora (Tucker), Ray, Virgil, Homer, Minnie, Mary, Märtha, John, Gabriel and David. Myrtle was the mother of the last six of the children.

Many descendants of Theophilus

can still be found living in Rockcastle County. He was a well known

person about the county. His claims

to fame were earned as a school teacher, photographer, poetry collector, etc. In his will, he left money to tor, etc. in his will, he left money to publish a book of poetry and songs that he had written and collected. Many children of the county have been "scared out of their wits" by Thee Pigg and his camera, especially when he put the black cloth over his head and said "Smile." Who could smile into such a contraption. Many pictures of school children and people, in general, would be non-existent today, had it not been for Thee Pigg and his famous camera.

He is known to have taught school for a while at Red Hill and one of his students, now 92 years of age, remembers him well. White teaching at Flat Rock School, he did a beautiful job of painting the letters of the alphabet, in beautiful script form, on the interior wall of the building. Those same letters remained there for many years.

same letters remained there for many years.

In later years, Thee became some-whan Nomadie, travelling about the county collecting poetry and taking pictures. He slept wherever he could-whether in someone's home or out under the stars of night. Of his time, he was one of the few people who knew sign language. A brother, Robert, was educated at a school for the deaf and in turn, taught Thee signing, so that they would be able to communicate.

Thee Pigg was a gift to Rockeastle County and he will not soon be fogotten.

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

Producers are required to purchase catastrophic crop insurance coverage in order to be eligible for USDA Program benefits for 1955. Programs involved include: Price Support on burley tobacco, CRP, FMHA programs, Production Adjustment Programs, and Price Support Programs. Catastrophic risk insurance "CAT"

Catastrophic risk insurance CA i provides 50 percent yield coverage and 60 percent price coverage. This

and on percent prace coverage. Inst is available through either the county CFSA (formerly ASCS) office or a private reinsured agent. Additional coverage of up to 75 percent yield and 100 price is available through the private reinsured agents only. CAT coverage carries a SSO per crop county fee, with a maximum of \$200 per county or \$600 per produce. Additional coverage has a premium

attached as well as optional units. Yields for most crops are based on actual yields furnished by the pro-ducer or percentages of the estab-lished yields at the CPSA office. Burley tobacco is based on the effec-tive marketing quota and planted acres. All crops that are determined to be

All crops that are determined to be of economic significance in either the current or prior year will require at least CAT coverage on all insurable crops within the county where benefits are requested. Economic significance is defined as 10 percent of the total income from all crops for the producer. Crops insurable in county include: burley tobacco, corn, wheat, barley, grain sorghum, soybeans and nursery stock
Deadline for purchasting crop insurance is March 15, 1995.



Is it cost effective to seed better varieties of red clover? Research from the Agronomy Department of the University of Remixely has footbased to be university of Remixely has common or unimproved red clovers of certified varieties at research farms throughout Kentucky. Their results found that the certified improved varieties yielded an average of 1.000 pounds more forage per acre in the first year of production for a spring seeding. Don't settle for anything less than an improved, certified variety of red clover. You can tell if the variety is certified by the presence of a blue tag on the bag. The blue genetics in the bag match the name on the tag. Contact your farm supply dealer 6 to 10 days before on the variety of the seed so they can be sure to have a certified variety on hand.

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
