The U.S. Department of Agriculture, Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD) is considering a preapplication for financial assistance sponsored by the Rockcastle County Water Association. Tips to Help Toddlers Overcome Awkward Moments in Development

All Parents Have Weathered the Humiliation. The family is eating at a nice restaurant or a friend's house and your toddler fingerprints the table and himself with mashed potatoes and gravy; then, knocks his milk over and onto his sister, screaming that he doesn't like mashed potatoes.

It's easy to become embarrassed or mad at your child during such eating fiascos. But it isn't fair to become upset at behavior that's normal for a child at this stage of development.

Toddlers have not developed the motor skills to eat with the "good manners" yet. Their insistence on feeding themselves indicates independence and learning activities. They must try and gain again.

What can you expect from your toddler at various stages of development?

At one year, a toddler likes to feed himself; he enjoys picking up bits of food with his thumb and finger and putting them in his mouth. Although he can use a spoon, he often spills and drops food. He chews food fairly well and can drink from a cup with help.

At age two years, the toddler feeds himself using his fingers, a spoon and a cup, but needs help when tired. He creates less mess when younger and can handle a glass or cup well, but spills do happen.

At three years, the toddler feeds himself well with only occasional spills, and gets his own drink of water from the faucet.

By four years, the young child serves himself at the table and carries food without spilling, most

of the time. He feeds himself without help and enjoys eating with the family, but can't sit through long meals.

At five years, he uses and knife and fork and eats at the table "like a big boy."

What can you do to help the toddler get through these times with a minimum of frustration?

Provide small utensils appropriate to your toddler. Use plastic dishes with rims so mishaps don't end in breakage or spillage. To help with stability, use cups that are wider at the bottom than the top.

If possible, seat the toddler so his feet are supported. This provides physical security so he can concentrate on eating.

Give small servings of food. Toddlers have strong taste preferences and will spit out food they don't like. It is normal for them to eat less than infants. When a toddler plays with his food, he is no longer hungry, it's time to remove the food.

Offer finger foods, such as soft vegetable sticks, crackers and sandwiches. These are enjoyable and easier to eat.

The less you make of a toddler's eating behavior, the less inappropriate behavior you will see. Just tell the toddler that throwing or spitting food is not appropriate. Be a good example at the table.

Putting a sheet under the toddler's chair at eating time will save a lot of carpet cleaning.

When eating at someone else's house, bring some items to make it a less embarrassing experience. These can include a bib, easy-to-use and familiar plates, cups and utensils and even the sheet.

insurance. One concern is that many people who rent their tobacco to tenants will not be aware of the new change. Anyone who will receive a check from the tobacco warehouse will need insurance, or complete the filing process. As with any program, there are exceptions. Anyone with total gross income less than \$20,000 will NOT pay \$50 but will still complete the filing process by March 15th.

What type coverage does the basic CAT Insurance give tobacco growers? On a 1,000 lb. basic allotment, the government guarantees 45% of 60% of the average price support (\$1.71). This means a farmer who has greater than 55% loss before they would qualify for disaster assistance. For example, if the farmer only produced a yield of 200 lbs. which sold for \$1.84 per pound, his total income would be \$368 (200 x \$1.84). The government guarantees \$461.70 (1,000 lbs. x .60 x 1.71). The difference of \$93.70 would be paid as a disaster payment. If you ran a yield of 250 lbs. sold at \$1.84 per pound, then only \$1.7 would be paid as disaster payment.

This brings up a point that CAT coverage is very basic and would only help the farmer cover production cost. If you wish to insure at a higher rate, you must contact someone who sells federal crop insurance. Anyone purchasing insurance from a private company must bring a copy of the contract to the CFA office and complete the filing process by March 15th.

Staff members of the CFA

office are encouraging farmers to contact them as soon as possible due to the large number of people who need to complete forms. The office will be open after hours on Thursday, February 23rd for anyone attending the TOM Beef Programs.

DO I NEED CROP INSURANCE?

Many people are asking, "Do I need crop insurance for 1995?" If you are in doubt, the best thing is to contact staff members at our local CFAA (former ASCS) office

and discuss your cropping plans. Please keep in mind the deadline for completing paperwork is March 15th.

The following will attempt to cover some of the details related to crop insurance but cannot cover all the different details.

In Rockcastle County, tobacco and corn will be the major crops being covered. Anyone receiving price support for tobacco, growing corn for grain purposes and set aside or deficiency payments on corn will need a minimum of catastrophic coverage.

This coverage will be financed by the government for a \$50 filing fee for each crop or can be purchased from private insurers selling Federal crop

Farm loans require crop insurance

Any producer who anticipates applying for a farm loan from USDA must obtain at least Catastrophic (CAT) Crop Insurance coverage on all crops of economic significance.

This coverage must be obtained before the sales closing date for the producer's particular crops. The requirement applies to both direct and guaranteed farm ownership, operating, or emergency loans administered by the former Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) offices, now using the working name Rural Economic and Community Development (RECD).

This change is required by the Federal Crop Insurance Reform and Department of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1994.

The act also authorized the reorganization of USDA, which combined the programs of the former ASCS and FCIC with the farm loan programs of FmHA, under the newly created Consolidated Farm Services Agency (CFAA).

The sales closing date in this area is March 15, 1995. This date is crucial because once it passes and the loan applicant has crops without CAT coverage they will likely have to wait until the following crop year to be eligible for loan assistance.

For further information about the coverage can be obtained from any local crop insurance agent of the CFAA (formerly ASCS) office. Questions regarding the loan requirement can be answered by the local RECD (formerly FmHA) office.

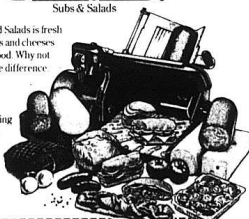

No charges will be filed in altercation

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotfis said this week that he would not seek legal action against former County Judge Roland Mullins, for a February 3 incident, in which Mullins apparently hit Carlotfis in the face, while the two were discussing county business in Carlotfis's office.

In a prepared statement Carlotfis said that Mullins had issued a written apology to him, assuming all responsibility for the altercation, which left Carlotfis with a black eye.

"There are no winners in this type of incident, and I am convinced that protracted litigation and subsequent adverse media attention for a misdemeanor could only damage Rockcastle County's image at a time when several important county projects could be placed in jeopardy. Because of my position, I must therefore place the county's interests above all other considerations and put my full attention on much more important matters at hand," Carlotfis said in the statement.

Commonwealth Attorney Ray Carmichael, who investigated the altercation said Monday that as long as Carlotfis was satisfied with Mullins written apology there would be no further involvement by his office.

Offutt appointed to fill PVA post until Fall

The chief deputy clerk in the Rockcastle County Property Valuation Administrator's office has been appointed to the top post in that office by Kentucky Governor Brereton Jones.

Margaret Offutt, who has worked in the PVA office for thirteen years will fill the vacancy created when H. Elmer Hale, resigned in December.

Mrs. Offutt, who will fill the post until the November general election is also a candidate in this May's primary. She is facing opposition from Republicans Doug Bullock and Cleldith Thacker. The winner in the Republican primary will face Democrat Billy Reynolds in the November general election.

County attorney collects \$14,022 in property taxes

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeffrey T. Burdette announced this week that his office had collected over \$14,000 in delinquent property taxes during the last three months.

Burdette's office has filed several law suits and mailed numerous notices of intent to enforce lien. Burdette said Wednesday that more law suits are slated to be filed in February and March.

The \$14,022 collected is a 57% increase in the amount collected a year ago.

Brodhead sewer rates to increase by \$6.61

The Brodhead City Council is in the process of raising sewer rates.

According to city clerk Becky Bussell the new rate will be effective with the March billing.

The new minimum sewer rate is \$16.36 for users of 2,000 gallons of water or less. The old minimum rate was \$9.75. Mrs. Bussell said that council members voted to keep water rates the same.

The clerk said that the new rate is needed because of shortfalls in revenue in the water and sewer department and an increase in demand for service. Some of the money generated will also be used to run new service lines and generally upgrade the city's sewer system to meet ever changing environmental protection agency regulations.

No week long Spring break, school out June 2

Rockcastle County schools have been closed a total of sixteen days this school year, due to inclement weather, a delay in the opening of the new RCMS and a chemical spill on interstate 75.

The high number of days missed means Rockcastle students will get only two days for Spring Break in April, according to Larry Hammond, Director of Pupil Personnel for Rockcastle schools.

The next regularly scheduled vacation day for the system will be Monday February 20 when the school system will observe President's Day, according to Hammond, who also heads the local calendar committee for the system.

Court tables 911 again

County will get \$450,419 for roads

The County Road Aid Cooperative Agreement for the county for fiscal year 1995-96 was presented to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its meeting Tuesday.

The agreement shows \$450,419 is coming to Rockcastle beginning July 1, 1995 less three percent set aside for an emergency fund.

The court decided it had rather have a lump sum than 12 installments and took the \$450,419.

Bids in three construction projects for the Northern Rockcastle Water District were opened. The bids included a water storage tank, painting of existing water storage tank, and water line replacement. The court took the bids under advisement.

A delegation came to the court to express their interest in a 911 emergency telephone number.

County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotfis said GTE, which will supply the number will attend the March meeting of the court with all necessary information including costs.

Lee Keene, hospital administrator, and a member of the delegation told the judge they got the same information in December, January and February, and asked if they depend on March.

The judge reiterated that a GTE representative would attend in March. County Attorney Jeff Burdette said he has "supported both a central dispatch system and 911 since taking office over a year ago."

He said he had "submitted in writing to the fiscal court this need. I believe now with community support we will get it."

Again he replied he "had carried the ball" and suggested he would go ahead and draft several options.

They included setting up a board to administer 911; that the City of Mt.

Vernon central dispatch on behalf of the county, or the county operate the system exclusively.

Ford Brothers was given permission to use Brodhead Fairgrounds for their farm machinery consignment auction March 2 to March 6.

The court accepted a quarter-mile of road in King Subdivision and 5/10 of a mile of Gary Denny Road into the county road program.

Will Linder and Associates of Berea presented the court with a

\$12,500 final bill for Western Rockcastle Water Improvement Program.

The court was told various funds were expended on roads in the county from July 1, 1994 to Jan. 31, 1995.

The court agreed to purchase a copy machine from Cumberland Valley Office Supply of London for \$999.

County Clerk Norma Houk told the court she had good news and bad. The good was she had \$11,711 in excess fees to give the court, and the bad was likely a run-off primary sometime in June.

Cain appointed to council

Former City Councilman Lloyd Cain was appointed city councilman by the council at a meeting Monday night replacing councilman Wayne Gregory.

Gregory thanked the council and voters for their help in a letter to the council. He has moved to Alabama, his old home and sold Gregory's Motel.

Cain was city councilman in 1990-91. He will serve until the Nov. 8 election, unless he decides to run for re-election. He has until Aug. 8 to file.

Cain was principal at Harry Sparks Vocational School until his retirement. He currently is with Don Foster and Associates of Berea.

In an executive (closed) session the council dismissed the city attorney because of a conflict of interest. Attorney John Clontz has been the city's legal representative, but his firm has a case in court of which the city has an interest.

In response, Clontz stated he was surprised at the council's decision since the only information he had

received from the city was that it was well pleased with the legal representation he had provided. "Needless to say I was not contacted before the council's vote and I think it sets a bad precedent for city employees since it appears the current city council may elect to terminate an employee merely because he or she has fallen out of favor with a particular councilman," he said.

"A policy of this kind is clearly not in the city's best interest," Clontz said.

"I certainly hope the council's action was not intended to be a retaliation against my office for the lawsuit filed against city police officers Barry Adams and Lufe Owens and if we determine that it was the council's purpose we will review the matter and see if any illegal action has occurred," Clontz said.

Councilman Lee Keene asked the council, when money is available, to mail two patrol cars at night. Mayor Gary R. Cromer agreed there is no money now but the patrol would be a high priority in the future.

Mayor Cromer told the council, Industrial Park 2 (former Henderson

property) plans to upgrade the park and install roads, curbs and utilities.

The mayor advised the council a gravity system would be installed instead of a forced main.

He said a forced main would be cheaper in the beginning but in the long run a gravity system would be cheaper to operate.

He indicated the state would eventually require residents to hook on to the system and said "we should require them to use the gravity system."

The council gave second reading to an ordinance allowing local insurance companies to sell flood damage insurance. The ordinance is final with publication.

The Mt. Vernon Police Department activity report for January showed: citations issued, 32; total charges, 48; DUI arrests, 7; calls for service, 161; accidents, 15; other agency assists, 48; motorist assists, 8; criminal cases opened, 1; Mt. Vernon fire runs, 13.

The Bank of Mt. Vernon and Citizens Bank of Brodhead and Mt. Vernon will be closed Monday January 20, in observance of President's Day.

I became involved, (embroidered may be a more accurate term), over the weekend in a discussion having to do with other things that should be changed about Kentucky now that the education reform act (KERA) has gained a foothold. There's still some disagreement about KERA's effectiveness among the crowd with whom I debate, but the results seem obvious enough to me. Kids are performing better and learning more than they ever have and our local school systems are finally being set free of the political patronage that got them in such a mess to begin with.

That's not to say that the jobs done by any stretch of the imagination. Somehow we have to find a way to reverse the trend of building bigger schools. Now that the results from the last round of testing are finally in, it's obvious that kids learn better in small schools than they do in larger ones, especially at the elementary

level. I don't quarrel with the fact that small schools are more expensive to operate than large complexes when you measure the cost on a "per-student" basis but somehow we have to find a way to afford small community-based schools. We have to stop all this consolidation because several of the top performing schools in the state are scheduled for close-downs in the next couple of years.

Livingston Elementary in Rockcastle County, for example, showed more improvement than any other school in the state. It has already been closed. Campbell's Branch Elementary didn't even have any close competition in Letcher County and it has already been told that the end is near.

If your child or grandchild or any kid you know attends a school that showed marked improvement in test scores over the last two years, please take time to drop a note of congratulations to the principal and better

still, ask if there's anything you can do as a volunteer to make things easier for teachers or otherwise help the schools to keep on growing. It might be nice and acceptable, for instance, to offer to help grow a small vegetable crop or radishes, lettuce, spinach, green onions, etc that would ripen before school closes for the summer so that the kids could experience both the growing and the eating. It's also great way to teach pride to your own observation kids need to learn how to take pride in what they do as much as anything.

There are dozens of science lessons that could be taught in such an undertaking, but teachers don't have time to shop for seeds and plants nor to till the garden spot. And maybe it's not gardening. Maybe it's finding

space somewhere to set up a quilting frame so that every kid in the school could participate in sewing a comforter that could be presented to a retirement home. Such an exercise could go far in teaching kids a bit about their culture and the importance of doing community service. The point is that if you have time on your hands, you could probably be an asset to your local school and help to make it even better when the next round of test scores are compiled. A little pride now and then doesn't hurt the adult ego either.

While we are on the subject of change, it is interesting to me that Kentucky Democrats, most notably those running for governor, are undergoing tremendous change too. Except for poor ole Gatewood, the

a church where I was pastor in the
early sixties. I recalled that the dea-
con, named Willie, was not far from
being a fatidie. While visiting one
evening with Willie and Florence, he
said, "I'm glad I won't have to live in
the world you're going to face." He's
still alive, and I'd be interested to
know what he thinks of this world
now.

I am now about the age Willie was
when he made that statement. And,
bless Bess, there are more than a few
times that I share Willie's thinking
about the world my grandsons will
inherit. For one thing, I'm told that
the next generation will not be as
prosperous as mine. Worst of all, it
is, the fact that the two genera-
tions after me, which I already see,
have inherited a couple of essential
ingredients for catastrophe from my
generation - greed and indifference.

I've seen too much of that, too much
to want to live in the world I see
coming (not that I have a choice).

Like Willie, I'm not far from being
a fatalist, but my prognostication is
nothing new. The seventh century
B.C. prophet, Jeremiah, trying and
failing to get five kings and the people
of Judah to see the errors of their

ways, said, "O that I had in the desert
dweller's lodging places that I might
leave my people and go away from
them!"

Now, lest you misunderstand,
dearly beloved, I want to make it
clear that I'm not prophetic, and for sure
I'm not the man Jeremiah was. Nor
am I better than my fellow man.
Nonetheless, I share Jeremiah's prop-
hecy of flight. It's difficult to think
otherwise, unless you're ignorant,
which isn't easy in this informa-
tion age. (Some, however, do manage!)
Look at the world! At any given
moment, thirty-eight active wars rage.
Ethnic hatred abounds everywhere.
Churches, content with religion rather

than Christianity (a costly thing), are
ineffectual where they need most to
make a difference. The heavens and the
hells care nothing for each other,
yet they live off each other.

Recently, for the second time, I
saw the movie, *War Games*, in which
the world came to the brink of nu-
clear holocaust. One of the charac-
ters, a brilliant scientist, gave up on
civilization, faked his death, and went
to a Northwestern state to live alone,
where he waited for the world to do
itself in. An overwhelming sense of
futility and personal tragedy, the loss
of his wife and son, were factors. I
identify with that man.

The problem for those who think
as I do is that we can't get away. You
have to live or die; you can't escape.
So, you plod on, doing the best you
can with what you have.

Well! What I've said this Valen-
tine's week is not my usual offering
of blither and dither. But I dare say
many think as I do, although they
may not admit it. Mark Twain was on
target when he wrote about "man's
inhumanity to man." But so also was
the anonymous poet who wrote,

"I sought my soul,
But my soul I could not see.
I sought my God,
But my God eluded me.
I sought my brother,
And I found all three."

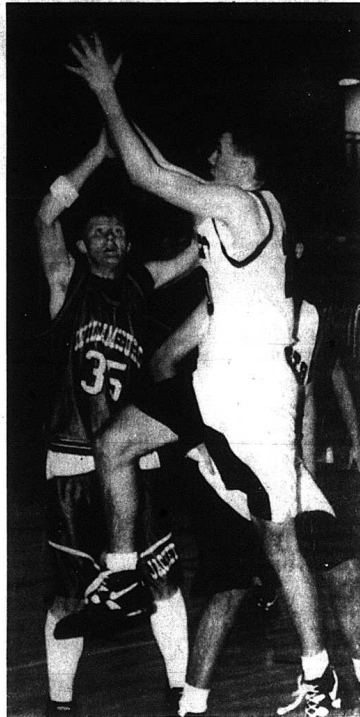

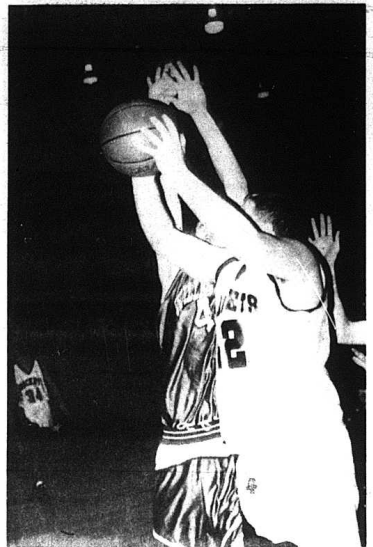

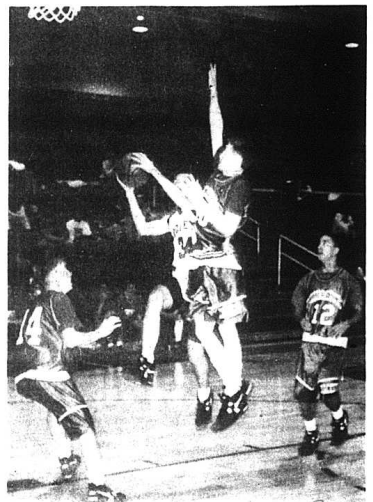

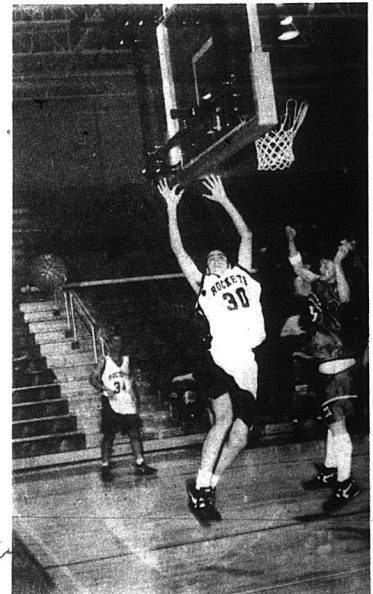

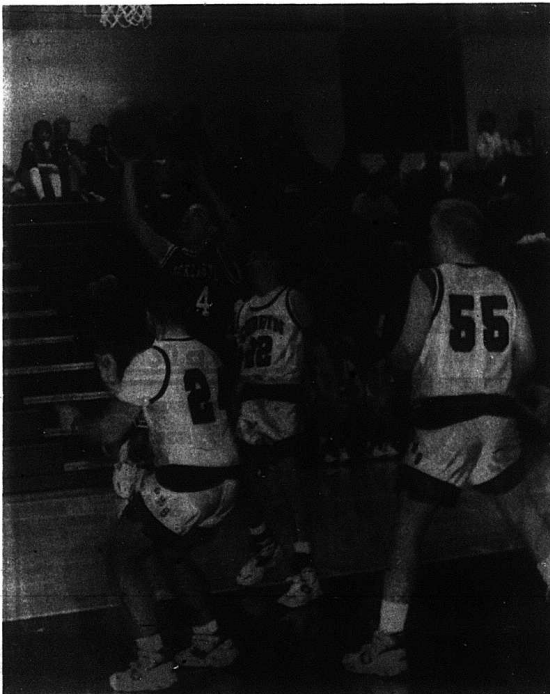

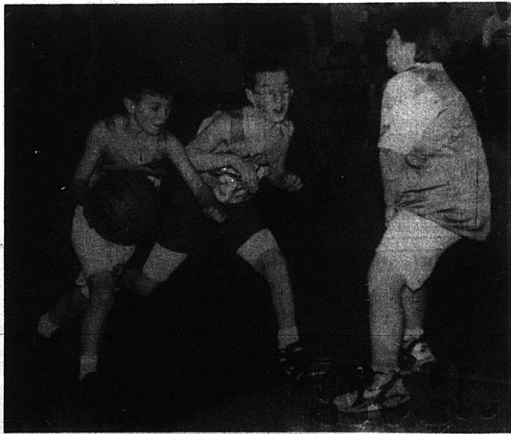

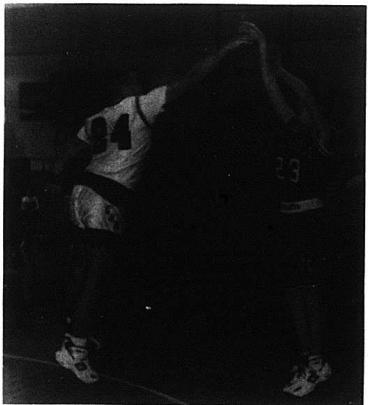

This money invested was called "Capital" and was used to buy supplies toward the voyages of ships coming to America to found colonies. If the colonies were successful and their business ventures such as the growing and "exporting" of tobacco profited, the investors would receive returns or "profits" on their shares of stock. However, many colonial investors suffered losses, just as investors do in our modern times! Through studies like these, students gain an economics awareness.

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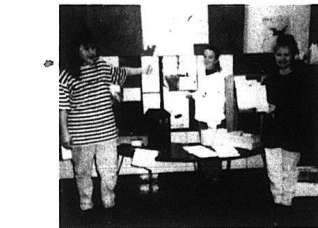
