Dear Editor,  
National service is a program which has enjoyed and should continue to enjoy bipartisan support in these times when the size of government needs to be reduced. National service is built upon initiative and collaboration at the local level. In addition, it provides an incentive and a structure to elicit community involvement from citizens young and old.

An excellent example of a local national service program is the AmeriCorps/Student Service Consortium which is coordinated by Eastern Kentucky University's College of Education.

AmeriCorps/Student Service Consortium, a regional collaborative partnership of 20 Southeastern and Central Kentucky school districts and Berea and Cumberland College has had a tremendous service impact upon this region in its first five months. Consider the following: At midyear, the Student Service Consortium has already accomplished its objectives for the year and then some.

Its first objective was to involve 2,500 students in service-learning projects. At midyear, the Student Service Consortium has already involved 5,734 students, K-postsecondary in service-learning projects.

The Student Service Consortium's second objective was for students to perform 12,500 service hours in their community. At midyear, the students have performed 30,536 hours of service.

Its third objective was to impact (serve) at least 5,000 community members. At midyear, 11,523 community members have been served!

A fourth objective was to infuse service-learning into 100 classes. At midyear, service-learning has been infused into 226 classes.

Though the AmeriCorps/Student Service Consortium - students, K-postsecondary, throughout Southeastern and Central Kentucky are learning the joy of serving their communities and that they can make a difference in their community; that one person can contribute to service for his/her community may, through individual action, begin a process which will produce positive community changes. That that person's service action can be envisioned as a pebble, which upon impact upon the surface of a pool, produces ripples which multiply and expand until the surface of the pool is changed.

Dear Editor,

In response to John C. Curtis' letter last week in the *Mt. Vernon Signal*, let me make some observations. Mr. Curtis assures that "no true member of The Catholic Church" has ever made a statement that "God did not give a Book (The Bible) that could be understood and reach everyone!" Let me quote from the book *The Faith of Millions* by John A. O'Brien. On pg. 139 he said "from all of which it must be abundantly clear that that the Bible alone is not a safe and competent guide because it is not new and has never been accessible to all, and because it does not contain all the truths of the Christian Religion."

Notice he said it is not clear and intelligible, and it's not accessible to all. Does that not sound a whole lot like the statement I made above? In the book *The Faith of Our Fathers* by James Cardinal Gibbons, we read on pg. 73, "We must, therefore, conclude that the Scriptures alone cannot be a sufficient guide and rule of faith because they cannot, at any time, be within the reach of every inquirer; because they are not of themselves clear and intelligible even in matters of the highest importance, and because they do not contain all the truths necessary for salvation." Notice he said the Scriptures are not clear and intelligible, nor within the reach of every inquirer. Does that not sound a whole lot like the statement I made above? Do these quotes by these Catholic authors, sound like I was making "false statements and accusations?" No, I believe in honesty and fairness in describing another's belief.

Let me focus on three points from the above two authors, they both made:

1. The Bible is not understandable or intelligible.
2. The Bible does not contain all truth necessary for salvation.
3. The Bible is not accessible or within reach for all.

Yet we are told that the New Catechism of the Catholic Church can:

1. Clarify the true teachings of the church, be a beacon to prevent us from moral and spiritual shipwreck.
2. It fulfills the needs for a com-

prehensive and authoritative statement of what the church teaches.

3. Is addressed to all and must reach everyone.

That is the point that amazes me, a book written by men can do what the book written by God cannot do (as affirmed above).

The truth is that the Bible is an understandable, complete book for every man!

1. "As I wrote afore in few words, whereby when ye read, ye may understand my knowlege in the mystery of Christ." Eph. 3:3-4.

2. "Howbeit when hee the Spirit of truth, is come, hee will guide you into all truth." Jn. 16:13

3. "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature" Mk. 16:15. So will our Catholic friends stop their rebellion and dissent from these authentic Bible teachings from Christ?

Let me list a few of the Catholic doctrines that I cannot find in the word of God (besides the three mentioned above from those two books I quoted).

The doctrine concerning the Pope; the doctrine of the sacraments; sprinkling for baptism; the doctrine of mass; images and relics; the doctrine of purgatory; devotion to Mary and the rosary; a separate priesthood; the doctrine of original sin; the clericality distinction.

Now if Mr. Curtis can show these doctrines to be true, from the Word of God, I'll be glad to accept them.

And, if they cannot be shown to be true, will Mr. Curtis and all our Catholic friends, stop their rebellion and dissent from authentic Bible authority and stand for the truth of Jesus

Christ?  
Let's all get busy studying the Word of God and standing together upon the truth of Christ!

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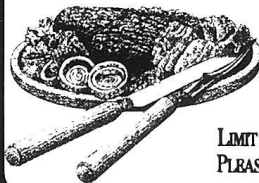
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

## Jackson passes insurance tax, Rockcastle will keep prisoners

With hours to go before Jackson County's prisoners were to be set free and with the promise of a jail sentence staring magistrates in the face, the fiscal court unanimously passed one of the highest insurance tax rates in the state. The passage of the tax was a drastic turnaround from the previous week, when magistrates defied state threats and chose to ig-

nore over \$13,000 in jail related expenses.

The court passed a ten percent insurance premium fee in three rapid-fire meetings Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. With state-mandated compensation to insurance companies, most Jackson Countians can expect to pay 11.5 percent more on all insurance except life and health policies when the law takes effect July 1. The court was facing pressure to pass the tax from different sides. Last Wednesday, Rockcastle County informed Jackson County officials that the would take no new prisoners and would release current prisoners - including one accused murderer and three felony suspects - at noon Monday.

## Gayheart indicted for murder

A Brodhead man was indicted last week in connection with a February shooting that left a Copper Creek man dead.

Paul V. Gayheart, 35, was indicted for murder and is being held in the Rockcastle County jail under a \$150,000 cash bond. He will be arraigned in Rockcastle Circuit Court on Friday.

He is charged with the February 18th shooting death of Clayton Frith, 33.

Frith died after being shot in the chest with a .38 caliber pistol at close range.

Gayheart, who received a small abrasion when he was scraped by a bullet from the same gun, was defended when he was acting in self-defense.

Another Copper Creek man was indicted by the same Grand Jury for apparently shooting at his ex-wife.

Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas said that Olen Robinson, 29, of Copper Creek apparently shot in the direction of his wife and son on October 24.

He is being held in the Rockcastle County jail under a \$10,000 cash bond and will be arraigned on April 14.

A Rockcastle County man was also indicted on eight counts of possessing a forged check.

### Governor Jones announces

## County to get \$950,000

Kentucky Governor Brereton Jones brought good news to Rockcastle Countians on Friday when he announced that he was recommending to the Appalachian Regional Commission that they approve two grants for Rockcastle County.

One, a \$600,000 grant would help extend Rockcastle Water Association's lines to serve an additional 300 or so new customers and the other, a \$350,000 grant for the City of Mt. Vernon, would help improve its wastewater treatment plant and extend collection lines to serve 42 additional households.

The \$350,000 grant for Mt. Vernon is only part of a \$1.3 million dollar project that will build a new pump station for the existing industrial park and the new Rockcastle County High School as well as bring in the residential customers in that area.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Gary Cromer said that funding is complete for the project and bids will be let in the next few weeks. The Mayor said that he hoped the project would be completed by year's end.

"If we had not received the \$350,000 grant we were going to have to borrow the money because there is no way we can continue to operate with our current system," the Mayor said.

However, the \$600,000 grant for

county water lines has a few more strings attached.

It is part of a \$1.73 million dollar project that is being funded mostly by a grant and loan from Farmers Home Administration.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolus said Monday that the \$600,000 grant money cannot be used until the entire project is completed and all funding is in place.

"It is certainly a step in the right direction and virtually means that the project will be approved by Farmer's Home," Carlolus said.

The Judge-Executive said that the original request for funds from the Appalachian Regional Commission was \$300,000, but Governor Jones took it upon himself to increase the grant to \$600,000 because he thought the project was too costly for the county to handle without the additional free money.

Rockcastle County Water Association president David Ballinger said Tuesday that although the project has not been completely approved, FHA officials have told him that if the ARC money is actually there the project will be funded in its entirety.

"If the money is part of ARC's next budget we could get started on this project in the next year," Ballinger said.

Friday's announcement by the Governor virtually assured the completion of this water project," Ball-

ger said.

"Our biggest concern now is that Congress will cut ARC funds or even cut out ARC all together.

The \$950,000 in grants for Rockcastle is one eighth of the entire money that will be spent in Kentucky by ARC.

The Rockcastle County Extension Homemakers wish to thank everyone who contributed to the project. Whether you contributed one tab, a gallon or a box of tabs, you have been very helpful with this worthwhile project.

Some of the largest contributors were the Mt. Vernon Senior Center, the Roundstone Baptist Church Youth Group, Broadhead Elementary students and several workites and factories. The Kiwanis Club also contributed \$109.10 from their aluminum can drive. A special thanks to Mt. Vernon Scrap for weighing the tabs from this project.

All of the proceeds from the Tab Project are used for the direct benefit of more than 50 children with cancer who will attend the Indian Summer Camp in June. The cost of running Indian Summer Camp is approximately \$300 per child due to the medical staff that must be employed for the week. ### CHILDREN'S FOOD CHOICES CARE GIVER / CHILD DECISION

Results of one frequently quoted study indicated that children who

are allowed to choose their own foods will eat a variety of healthy foods and adopt a well-balanced diet - over time.

Does this mean your child should have total control of what, when, or how much to eat?

No. What the study failed to state was that children were given choices of only healthy foods.

Other studies have shown that given a variety of foods, including high-fat and high-sugar items, children will choose 25% of their calories from high-fat and high-sugar foods. However, given the choice of only healthy foods, children eventually will choose a well-balanced diet.

This indicates, and dietitians will tell you, that adults should decide what foods to offer and when children should eat. For a certain meal or snack, it's okay to let children choose how much to eat or whether to eat at all and which foods to eat from those offered.

A newborn infant decides when to eat by using internal cues that indicate he is hungry or full. When full, he stops eating; if hungry, he cries. It's the caregivers' responsibility to recognize signs that an infant is full or hungry, and to respond appropriately.

However, as children get older, caregivers tend to start prodding them to eat by using external cues, such as "eat one more bite, clean your plate, or eat that for me".

Caregivers should learn to recognize signs that a child is full. If a child doesn't tell you verbally he is full, he will tell you with body language, such as playing with the food, looking away from the food and paying attention to things around him, or even becoming fidgety or cranky.

When a child shows signs of being full, remove the uneaten food. A child who says he is hungry shortly after eating might be eating only enough to take the edge off hunger. The child might need to be encouraged to eat more so he learns to recognize the "full" feeling.

Healthy children will eat a variety of foods in moderation if caregivers decide what and when the child should eat, and allow the child to decide how much to eat.

**Cattle Farms Need To Be Aware of Grass Tetany**

Adult beef cows nursing young calves while grazing grass or small grain pastures in late winter or early spring are especially susceptible to an extremely acute disorder known as grass tetany. Affected cattle can die suddenly and in fact are frequently found dead before the disorder is discovered.

Although in some seasons Kentucky farmers experience losses due to grass tetany from November to April, cows are more susceptible in the late winter and early spring when the grass heavily on the new growth of grass and refuse other feed offered to them. Each loss is especially damaging, because it is invariably a big, sleek cow with a healthy young calf that dies.

Grass tetany is a result of a magnesium deficiency in the cow. Weather and soil fertility seem to be factors. Grass tetany occurs when soil temperature is between 40 and 60 degrees and often during changeable weather. High levels of nitrogen, potassium and moisture in the soil increase the incidence, because they apparently decrease the level of magnesium found in plants naturally.

Symptoms of the disorder usually begin with nervousness and then

progress to a stilted gait, staggering, convulsions, coma and death. It always requires immediate veterinary treatment.

About 2/3 of cows treated intravenously with magnesium and calcium compounds recover. However, to prevent relapses, treated cows should be removed from the pasture. They should be fed hay and grain plus 2 ounces of magnesium oxide daily for at least a week.

Because animals do not store up magnesium, their dietary requirements have to be supplied on a day-to-day basis. The only way to prevent grass tetany is to supplement the diet with additional magnesium. This can be done with commercial mineral mixes containing magnesium or with home-made mixtures. Mixing 1 part magnesium oxide, 1 part trace mineral salt and 1 part distillers dried grain will do fine if it is the cattle's only source of salt.

### Your new baby-

Where your baby will sleep... You can use a crib, a car bed or a cradle. Here are some things you should look for in new or used cribe.

- Bumper pads around entire crib should be tied in place with six straps or more. Slats should be no more than 2 3/8 inches apart.
- Mattresses should be tight-fitting. If you can slip two or more fingers between mattress and slats, pup rolled up towels between them. Or replace with snug-fitting mattress. No pillow.
- Safety latch to drop crib side should be one that baby can't work. (Foot release is handy for parents). Sides should be high enough so baby can't climb over.
- All wooden surfaces should be smooth and free of splinters with no rough or sharp edges.

- Damaged teething rails on used cribs should be removed and replaced.
- All plastic packaging from new cribs should be removed. Before throwing such materials away, tie them in knots. (Children have suffocated while playing with plastic.)

What your baby will wear... Your baby doesn't need an expensive wardrobe. Here are some suggestions for your baby's clothes:

- 2 to 3 one-piece stretch suits or long gowns
- 3 to 4 small undershirts (ones with snaps are easier)
- 4 pairs of waterproof pants
- 2 to 3 dozen cloth diapers (or supply of disposables)
- 4 diaper pins for cloth diapers
- 3 to 4 cotton blankets
- 1 to 2 warmer blankets

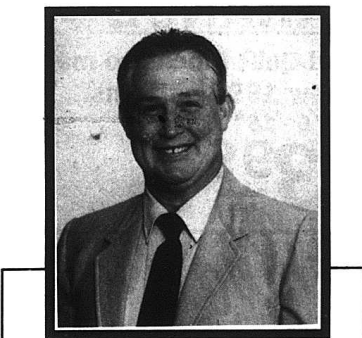

Automobile accidents are the number one killer and crippler of children after the critical early weeks of life. Make riding in a car as safe as possible for your baby.

Since July 15, 1988, it's been the law. In Kentucky, children under 40 inches tall must be properly secured in an approved child restraint system when riding in a car, van or truck. The

only exception to the law is trucks in which seats are occupied by a person over 40 inches tall. Violators may be fined up to \$50 for failure to comply.

Worse than the fine, violators expose their children to the risk of serious injuries or even death in the event of an accident. Ninety percent of these deaths as well as 80 percent of these injuries could be avoided if parents would take the time to buckle their children into proper child restraints.

The most dangerous way for an infant to travel is in an adult's lap. A sudden stop of the car can throw a baby against the dashboard or through a car window. If the adult is not belted in, the child will be crushed between the adult's body and the windshield or dashboard. At 30 miles per hour, a 120-pound adult moves with the force of 2,400 pounds. Car seats, when properly installed and used, greatly reduce the likelihood of death or serious injury from a car accident. Children weighing less than 20 pounds should be placed in seats especially designed for infants. Safety seats are available for loan from our local Rockcastle County Health Department (256-2242). These seats face the rear of the vehicle. In an accident, the back—the strongest part of the baby's body—absorbs the shock rather than the chest or abdomen. Generally, the seat is equipped with a 5-point harness—a pair of straps over shoulders, a lap belt and a crotch strap—to secure the infant to the safety seat.

Larger children (up to 5 years old) should be placed in a front-facing toddler seat. Most toddler seats are designed to secure the child into the seat with a harness system that comes across both shoulders. A few toddler models employ only a full-shield system that replaces the harness system. Full-shield devices are designed to provide upper body restraint. Lap or lap and shoulder belts are fastened across the shield part of the seat. No additional upper body harness or strap is necessary.

Children too large for car seats should use the vehicle's lap belts. Be sure to fasten them low and snug over the hips—not the stomach. If the shoulder belt crosses the child's neck or face, place it behind the child's back and only use the lap belt.

Whether you select an infant, toddler or convertible (designed for infants and toddlers), the seat must be

secured to the car by means of the car's safety belt. Be sure to use the seat according to directions.

- Safety Tips**.....
- \* Never leave sharp or heavy objects loose in the car. A sudden stop or collision could turn them into lethal weapons.
- \* Set a good example—buckle up every time you travel in your car.
- \* The safest location for your child's car seat is in the center position of the rear seat.
- \* Don't use an infant carrier as a car seat. They are not safe.
- \* Don't leave children alone in a car.
- \* Don't leave car doors unlocked when riding or driving.

Infant Carrier Seats and Safety Babies love to be the center of things. They also love to be close to you. With an infant carrier seat, a baby can be a part of family life. Use

the infant carrier when feeding or carrying your baby. The carrier seat is not for use in a car. (You can spoon feed babies in a safety seat but when bottle feeding, holding your baby encourages bonding.)

When choosing an infant carrier, make sure the seat is deep enough and has a chest or crotch strap so your baby won't slide out. Look for a seat with a wide base and nonskid bottom.

Here are some rules for safe use of infant carrier seats:

- \* Always use the seat belt or crotch strap.
- \* Stay within arm's reach when the infant carrier seat is on a high place such as a table, sofa or store counter.
- \* Be careful when using an infant carrier seat in a shopping cart. Your baby may wiggle and fall out of the cart.

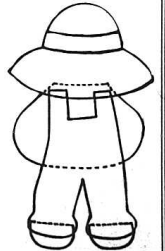
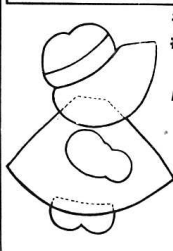

## Spring turkey season

Kentucky turkey hunting just keeps getting better and better, and the 1995 spring season should be no exception with 4,000-plus turkeys and most of the state open to hunting.

The shogun and archery spring turkey hunting season opens April 19 and runs through May 2. The limit is two turkeys with visible beards, but hunters can't take both turkeys on the same day.

Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to 1 p.m.

Shoguns between 10 and 20 gauge must be plugged to hold no more than three shells. Only number 4 shot or smaller is permitted.

Youth quota hunts for youngsters ages 10 through 15 are available on the following wildlife management areas (WMAs): Ballard County; Grayson Lake, Carter County; and Green River, Adair and Taylor counties. In-person drawings will be held on each area April 1 at 1 p.m., local time. The drawing on Grayson Lake WMA will be at the Camp Webb office off Highway 1496.

An annual hunting license and

turkey hunting permit are required of all turkey hunters unless license exempt. While hunting, any turkey hunter under age 16 will be accompanied by an adult. Hunters born after Jan. 1, 1975, (except youngsters under 10) must carry a valid hunter education card while hunting in Kentucky.

Cassey County is closed to turkey hunting due to restocking. The following WMAs are also closed to Turkey hunting: the main block of Robinson Forest, Breathitt and Knott counties; Swan Lake, Ballard County; and West Kentucky, McCracken County.

The 1995 Kentucky Turkey Hunting Guide contains complete information about hunting turkeys in Kentucky, including the fall archery season and a list of turkey check stations. The guide is available from county court clerks' offices, sporting goods stores and the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources' Louisville office at Bowman Field and the central office at #1 Game Farm Road, Frankfort, KY 40601; phone 502-564-4336.

31, except during the quota hunt.

The quota hunt at Paintsville Lake WMA moves from its former December dates to November 4-5, 1995. Except during the quota hunt, archers at Paintsville WMA will be allowed any deer from October 1 through December 31, 1995.

Green River WMA will allow 500 quota hunters to pursue antlered deer only. Last year 400 hunters were drawn.

Deer hunters on Higginson-Henry WMA will have opportunity to take two deer during upcoming quota and archery hunts. Last year hunters were

limited to one deer.

The following WMAs will be open only on weekdays during the November deer gun season: Kentucky River in Henry County; Curtis Gates Lloyd in Grant County; and Lapland WMA, including a 400-acre tract on Highway 376 in Meade County.

West Kentucky WMA will offer deer archery hunting October 1 - November 2, November 6-16, 20-24, and December 4-7, 1995 on tracts 1-7. Additionally, tracts 1-7 plus 2A and 7A will be open December 11, 1995-January 15, 1996 for archery hunting. Crossbows may be used to

hunt deer November 6-17, 1995.

While West Kentucky WMA's youth quota hunt will be November 4-5, 1995, the area's two conventional quota hunts will be November 18-19 and December 9-10, 1995.

## More areas open for spring squirrel hunting

All wildlife management areas (WMAs) owned or managed by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources will open to squirrel hunting this spring.

These are the only areas open to squirrel hunting during the June 1-15, 1995 season.

Last spring the fish and wildlife department opened four of its WMAs to squirrel hunting on an experimen-

tal basis. Opening more areas in 1995 gives hunters more opportunity without harming the resource.

Limits, shooting hours and legal hunting equipment are the same as for the fall squirrel hunting season. For more details contact the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, I&E Division, 1 Game Farm Road, Frankfort, KY 40601; phone 502-564-4336.

## Commission adopts 1995-96 deer seasons

Stepping up hunter orange requirements and providing more deer hunting opportunity were highlight actions of the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission at its March 3 meeting in Frankfort.

Wearing hunter orange on the head, chest and back will be required of all hunters, except migratory bird hunters, hunting during daylight hours and during any deer hunting season when firearms are permitted. Additionally, an adult accompanying a juvenile deer hunter will be required to wear the appropriate amount of hunter orange while the youngster is hunting.

During the 1995 Youth Hunt Day, archers may take any deer on Oct. 28 in Zones 1-4. Oct. 28 hunters under age 16 will be allowed to take under-

less deer with a firearm in Zones 1-4.

The commission adopted changes for deer hunting on several wildlife management areas (WMAs). Peabody WMA will open to muzzle-loader hunting Oct. 21-22, 1995.

Yellowbank WMA will offer a quota youth hunt Nov. 4-5. Barren River WMA won't have a quota youth hunt this year, but the area will be open on the statewide Youth Hunt Day.

Archery season on Beaver Creek and Cane Creek WMAs will open Oct. 1 instead of the 15th as in the past.

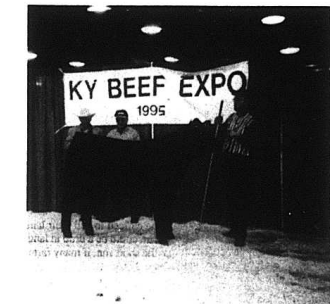

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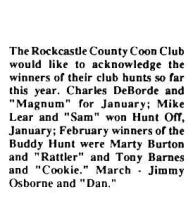

### Disease control for landscape plantings

Kentucky gardeners often seek solutions to health care problems for their landscape plantings during the summer growing season. Summer is the wrong time to take care of their plant's disease problems. "For some diseases," said John Hartman, Extension plant pathologist for the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, "we have little choice but to explain that if preventive measures had only been done earlier, the gardener would not be in the mess he finds himself in."

Some disease prevention activities done now will provide health dividends for the rest of the growing season, he said.

What should the landscape gardener do now to help ensure a disease free growing season? Prune out dead and diseased twigs and branches from trees and shrubs, he said. Also do not leave brush stubs. Do the work of pruning out diseased plant parts where the twigs and foliage are dry. And most of all, be aware of the problems faced last year.

For example, if Sphaerotheca blight was a problem with pine trees last year, in addition to pruning, prepare to spray fungicides now when buds swell," Hartman said. "Then

spray once more as candles begin to elongate and again as needles begin to emerge through needle sheaths."

If a flowering crabapple tree was defoliated by mid-summer last year, it was susceptible to scab and will have to bloom this year, he said. The owner has the option of continuing with the poor appearance, selectively prune out branches to provide better air movement to reduce the disease, or start an appropriate fungicide spray program as the leaves begin to emerge just before bloom.

"The best option might be to plant a scab-resistant crabapple tree to replace the susceptible variety," Hartman said.

If serious anthracnose disease attacked valuable plantings of dogwood, ash, maple or sycamore last year, the gardener should plan on spraying fungicides at bud break, again with 10-day intervals from bud break through bud break to bloom and a third time when leaves are fully expanded.

If Hawthorn had cedar-hawthorn rust problems last year, they should be sprayed at bud break, when leaves are half expanded and a third time when leaves are fully expanded. Also prune out cedar-apple, cedar-hawthorn and cedar-quince galls as they appear in their bright orange color on cedars and junipers.

### Farmland prices to rise 13 percent next year?

Early in February, a chief analyst at a large Wall Street firm predicted in a nationally released news story that farmland prices would rise an average of 13 percent per year for the next five years. But an agricultural economist with the University of Kentucky says such prognostications are highly speculative.

The analyst quoted in the story is fundamentally flawed, Barton Biggs, chief analyst Morgan Stanley based his prediction on charting, a technique which ignores economic factors," said Craig Infanger, agricultural economist.

The problem with Biggs' prediction is that it assumes that land values follow a cycle similar to some other commodities. That is, they can become undervalued over time and then rise sharply to compensate for their undervaluation.

the farm economy looks less promising, they drop," Infanger said. The latest U.S. Department of Agriculture survey of farmland values showed an increase of 6.4 percent nationally, and 5.5 percent in Kentucky, both figures just slightly ahead of inflation, he said.

"Most credible analysts believe that the next survey, slated for June, will show only a modest land value increase - perhaps just less than five percent because net cash income to agriculture has been falling," he said.

A change in federal tax policy, Infanger said, could also mean a substantial change in land values -- downward.

If the capital gains tax is eliminated in the Congressional tax cutting this year, older land owners may be enticed to sell their land. The result could be a drop in land values in the short run, if many farms actually go up for sale. In the long run, however, the dropping of capital gains taxes may make farm land a more attractive investment," Infanger said.

### CRP program providing much needed habitat for growth

Across the country, land put into the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) has provided much needed habitat to promote wildlife growth.

That success has not been duplicated in Kentucky, however, according to a wildlife specialist with the University of Kentucky.

The CRP program was implemented by the U.S. Department of Agriculture in 1985 to pay farmers to retire highly erodible and other lands for 10 years and to establish perennial vegetation on those lands. Although the main objectives were to promote soil and water conservation,

benefits to wildlife have been widely recognized -- especially in the Great Plains area.

But not in Kentucky, said Tom Barnes, Extension wildlife specialist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "That's because the CRP lands in Kentucky were seeded mostly with tall fescue," Barnes said. "Fescue cover is not good for providing cover for quails, rabbits and other wildlife."

Fescue is a dense, sod-forming grass which doesn't provide a favorable habitat for animals to take cover.

he said. In addition, fescue doesn't meet the nutritional requirements for most wildlife such as quail and rabbits. "We've done studies that show quail prefer fxtall and ragweed," Barnes said. "If quail are in a position where they can eat only fescue seeds, they die."

A chemical in the fescue apparently disrupts the birds' mental characteristics and causes them to attack each other, pecking them until they die.

The 10-year CRP program begins to expire in 1995, and landowners who would like to convert their CRP lands to more suitable habitats for wildlife do have options, Barnes said. "The state has a program to help farmers convert by paying a portion of the costs," he said. "Farmers can check with their county Extension agent for details on that program."

Barnes agreed that the CRP program has been very beneficial for wildlife in other parts of the country. So successful, in fact, that many wildlife organizations are lobbying to continue the program in the future.

"Pheasants are up 400 percent in the Great Plains," he said. "Waterfowl are up tremendously there. It could have been more effective in Kentucky if the cover had been something other than fescue."

Court members also received a letter over the weekend from District Judge Oscar House threatening to cite magistrates and County Judge/Executive William O. Smith with contempt of court if the prisoners were released.

In the letter, House told the magistrates that he could sentence them to jail for six months for each day that prisoners were allowed to go free.

"Do you again intend to grace the front page headlines on our state papers?" the district judge scolded court members, reminding them of the negative publicity they would face if prisoners were released.

In addition, County Attorney George "Tommy" Hays gave fiscal court members notice that he would probably not be able to defend them if they faced civil litigation or criminal prosecution.

Faced with these dilemmas, magistrates reluctantly agreed to pass the tax. "I can't see us sitting back here, letting these drunks hit the road wide open and maybe kill somebody," said District 1 Magistrate Leon Bingham. "We would be responsible. I can't see that happening."

District 2 Magistrate Chad Vaughn echoed that sentiment, saying, "If we let (drunk drivers) run these roads and kill somebody, we've got to live with that."

District 3 Magistrate Vester Rose expressed his concern about a possible cut in county services if the state were to take over the county's finances. He said that Central Dispatch and other services are too important to jeopardize losing.

The insurance tax was passed in unusual fashion. Rather than asking for a motion and a second, Smith asked those of the court in favor of the tax to raise their hands. On both Monday and Tuesday, all four men raised their hands.

The ten percent raise passed by the court is among the highest in the state. Of the 16 counties which already have an insurance premium tax, only Henderson County's rate is the same as Jackson County's. No county has a higher rate.

After the first reading of the tax ordinance Monday, Rockcastle County took back its threat to release Jackson County prisoners.

"We will continue to accept prisoners from Jackson County," said Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotta.

Carlotta said that if the court had not taken action to pass the tax, the Rockcastle County Jail would have had no choice but to release all Jackson County prisoners held within its walls.

The jail had not been accepting any new prisoners since last Tuesday, when magistrates agreed not to pay Rockcastle County. However, Carlotta said that two Jackson County prisoners were inadvertently accepted Saturday night by a deputy who had not been informed of the Jackson County ban. They were released Sunday. At press time, the court was set to meet again Wednesday to pass an emergency amendment to the tax ordinance.
