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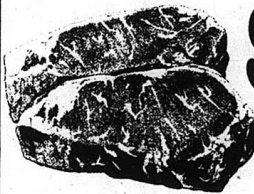
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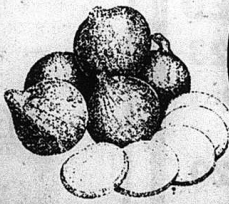

Infant Stimulation (Birth to Eight Months)

Parents can help their child get the best possible start in life. The time to begin is as soon as the baby arrives! A baby's most important need is to be fed. But you also need to provide "food" for your baby's mind and senses. That is what experts call "infant stimulation."

We now know that the early months (birth to eight months) are of great importance in developing the basis for good social skills, emotional growth, and intelligence. It is also during this time that a baby forms an attitude about life, an understanding which will last for a lifetime. To get off to a good start:

- * Respond quickly to your baby's cries. All babies learn how to respond by having someone respond to their cries. If the response is quick, the baby will feel safe and comfortable. If the adult waits too long or ignores the infant's signals of distress, the infant will feel the world is a cold and hostile place. Responding to your baby's cries, holding, handling, and talking to the baby are actions that show the world is a good place. It is a place where people can be trusted, a place where you can get help when you need it.

- * Talk to your baby from the time of birth. Your infant can't understand what you are saying. But your voice and words will help teach your baby the sounds of language. On some level, your baby does understand your tone of voice. Words of praise, love, and encouragement will help your baby grow.

- * Handle your baby as much as you can. A baby needs to be fed, changed, and comforted. A baby needs to be touched. Give your baby lots of hugs and cuddling. Close contact will help both of you develop the special emotional tie called "bonding." It will give your baby good feelings about being loved.

- * A baby needs help in developing skills. A newborn is totally helpless at birth, but starts to develop skills quickly. Your baby will be developing physical, language, social/emotional, and "thinking" skills. A baby starts to gain body control after the first six weeks. By seven months, babies can usually sit up and may have started to crawl. At this time, the eyes and ears are working well. Simple problem solving is starting, your baby can recognize family members and may prefer them to "strangers." You can help your baby develop some of these skills by doing the following:

- * Be knowledgeable about child development. Read about which skills will be developing next and help your baby learn them. Physical skills and using them will be developing most quickly.

- * Talk to your baby. Sing to your

baby. Don't be shy about singing! Anything you are comfortable with will do—nursery rhymes, folk songs, country music, etc.

- * Provide experiences that will help develop their senses. Your baby should be exposed to a variety of things to hear, see, smell, and touch. But or make a mobile for the crib. Provide sturdy crib toys which can be held, touched, grabbed, thrown, or hit with hands and feet.

- * Let your baby look in a mirror. Play music. When your baby is awake, place the child in a sturdy infant seat near you. Take your baby for outings and talk about everything you see. Place your baby in different positions, on both the back and stomach. Learn how to do baby exercises or massage.

- * A baby needs to have a variety of experiences. Every infant develops at a different rate. Some skills develop early, and some late. It does not matter a great deal if your baby learns to sit up at five months or at seven months. What is important is that you provide lots of play activities and lots of different kinds of experiences. This is different in a child who is more alert, cheerful, and interested in the world.

- * Babies have an inborn interest in learning. That makes it easier for parents to help them learn. By providing stimulation for the baby's senses and physical development, you are encouraging and rewarding the baby's natural curiosity. This helps it become stronger, here are some tips for stimulating your baby:

- * Give your baby a variety of toys to look at and handle. Be sure the toys are safe, have no sharp edges, and have no small parts that might come loose in your baby's mouth. Sometimes the younger baby's best toy is you! A baby who has reached six months of age needs toys to bang, throw, and drop. A soft stuffed animal is also nice to touch and cuddle.
- * Play games with your baby. Simple games like peek-a-boo will help the baby do some simple problem solving. Cover up your face, or an object. Or, place a favorite toy so that your baby must move something else to reach it.

- * Stimulating a young baby takes time. There are many parents who are working and do not have a great deal of time to spend with their babies. The good news is that baby stimulation can be done by any caregiver who is willing to give your baby the time that is needed.

- * Working parents can keep two things in mind: Budget your time so that you can be with your baby as much as possible. Be as careful as you can about selecting a caregiver for your baby in your absence. A caregiver should be an affectionate person who is willing to take the time to play and talk with your baby.

Be careful planning you CAN make a difference in your child's physical, emotional, and intellectual development.

Children's Choir to sing at Carnegie Hall

The Danville Children's Choir has been selected to participate in the International Children's Choir Festival which will be held May 24-29 at Carnegie Hall in New York City.

Four members of the choir are grandchildren of Rockcastle Spokians: Les Hamilton Durham Speaks, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. H. Lee Durham; Chase Boggs, grandson of Hazel Miller and the late Curtis Miller; Mathew Osborne and Caelin Osborne, grandchildren of Renfro Valley's own Jim Gaskin.

The 50-voice Danville choir will join choruses from Nova Scotia, Toronto, Washington, Tennessee, South Carolina, Mississippi and Ohio. The chorus of 350 will perform on May 27 under conductor Jean Ashworth Bartle of Toronto after spending several days in rehearsal.

The invitation choir festival is held each year in Carnegie Hall. Bruce Richardson, director of the Danville Choir, said that the historical hall is where nearly every major musician or musical ensemble has performed over the past 100 years.

"The experience of walking out onto the stage for the first time is unlike any these children will ever experience in their musical careers," he said. "The accumulated spirits of countless famous musicians are alive within the walls of what is certainly the best known of all music halls in the world. It will be a week they will never forget."

The members of the Danville Children's Choir are selected after an audition. The fourth through sixth graders who make up the current choir come from five counties and represent 15 schools.

The group was invited to perform for the Kentucky Music Association Convention in February, for the

Kentucky Baptist All-State Children's Chorus Retreat at Codorus, and the Victim's Rights Ceremony in the State Capital Rotunda, Frankfort in April. They joined the Northern Kentucky Children's Chorus in a concert with the Keith McCutchen Jazz Trio in a concert in Wiesiger Theatre, Centre College last week. Concerts are given locally throughout the year. The final concert for the 94-85 year will be for Kentucky ACDA-85 Convention, Lexington with Guest Conductor Henry Leck.

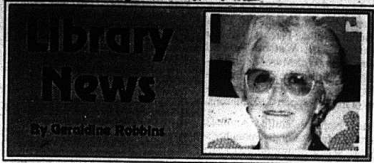

Some new fiction books that we have for you to enjoy are: *Rainmaker* by John Grisham... Mr. Grisham tells the story of a young man barely out of law school who finds himself taking on one of the most powerful, corrupt, and ruthless companies in American aid exposing a complex, multibillion dollar insurance scam.

In his final semester of law school Rudy Baylor is required to provide free legal advice to a group of senior citizens, and it is there that he meets his first "clients," Dot and Buddy Black. Their son, Donny Ray, is dying of leukemia, and their insurance company has flatly refused to pay for his medical treatments. While Rudy is at first skeptical, he soon realizes the Blacks really have been shockingly mistreated by the insurance company, and that he just may have stumbled upon one of the largest insurance frauds anyone's ever seen and one of the most lucrative and important cases in the history of civil litigation. The problem is, Rudy's flat broke, has no job, and is about to go head-to-head with one of the best defense attorneys in America. Grisham weaves a powerful, and at times quite humorous tale of legal intrigue and moral bankruptcy.

Beauty From Ashes by Eugenia Price... From one of America's most treasured writers comes the long-awaited final volume in the popular Georgia trilogy, 1852. After recovering from the death of her husband and her parents, Anne Cooper Fraser is devastated to learn that she has also lost her home on St. Simons Island. Adjusting to a new life in Marietta, she is caught off her guard when the chill of war sweeps in.

All We Hold Dear by Kathryn

Lynn Davis... In this poignant, powerful sequel to Davis's bestselling, critically acclaimed *Too Deep For Tears*, Eve Crawford leaves her small Scottish island in 1988 and sets out on a journey of discovery—no uncertain truth about her learning, her mother, and her family.

Two non-fiction books are *Learn to Quilt: The Traditional Way* by Annies Landman... Learn the basics of the quilter's art in cutting, piecework, applique and quilting. Included are graded skill levels, step-by-step, easy-to-follow instructions, many projects that may be finished in an afternoon, giant floor cushions and soft toys and *Days of Darkness: The Feuds of Eastern Kentucky* by John Ed Pearce.

Also *Charmer* by Jack Olsen... Charmer brings together all of the Olsen trademarks that make him the Master of True Crime: a spellbinding case of murder and sex, a story with genuine sociological importance, and a richly textured narrative.

An articulate young African American, he was a cheerful companion, flashy dancer, and urban sophisticate. George was a local favorite. MAXIMIZE THE EFFECTIVENESS OF BLOOD PRESSURE MEDICATION

High blood pressure affects more than 50 million American adults. Left uncontrolled, it increases the risk of serious health problems such as heart attack, stroke or kidney failure.

High blood pressure (hypertension) is often called "the silent killer" because most people have no symptoms. People do not realize they have high blood pressure until a serious health problem develops.

Fortunately, hypertension usually can be treated successfully with medication. However, 10% - 30% of the people diagnosed with high blood pressure do not take medication properly; they don't

take it at all, or fail to follow prescription instructions.

It is extremely important to take prescription medication exactly as instructed. Be sure to discuss any changes in dosage, reaction to the medication, or personal health with your physician. And tell your physician about side effects, cost, fear or other factors that might interfere with your successful use of the medication.

Many times minor lifestyle changes help maximize your blood pressure medication's effectiveness. Some changes are to reduce sodium and alcohol intake, slim down weight, and avoid other medicines that interfere with the effectiveness of blood pressure medication.

* Excessive sodium aggravates high blood pressure. A high-sodium diet also increases potassium loss, accelerating the potassium that occurs with diuretics that are a part of medication treatment.

* Consuming more than 4 alcoholic beverages per day significantly increases the risk of hypertension. If not treated in time, it can become a chronic problem. Even modest alcohol intake can raise blood pressure.

* Excess body weight increases blood pressure and makes the heart work harder. Losing weight helps many people lower blood pressure.

* Regular exercise promotes weight loss. Exercise alone has been shown to lower blood pressure in some individuals.

* Regular use of non-steroidal and anti-inflammatory drugs, such as ibuprofen, causes metabolic changes that limit the effectiveness of blood pressure medication. Aspirin has similar metabolic effects, but studies haven't proved that aspirin interferes with the medication.

A crop acreage report will be required on the following farms in 1995: (1) any farm that will MARKET tobacco in 1995, whether it be carryover from last year, or planted this year, (2) any farm that is participating in the Wheat and Feed Grain program, (3) any farm in the Conservation Reserve Program, and (4) any farm that has corn planted for grain.

All crops must be planted in order to complete the crop acreage report. It is the insured's responsibility to report all acreage planted, who shares in the crop, and the planting dates. Farmers are urged to contact CFSa for an appointment time at their convenience as soon as all crops are planted. We stress the need for an appointment time, due to the overwhelming number

of crop reports that have to be taken this year. If it is a hardship for a farmer to come in during office hours (7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.), contact the office and a time can be worked out after office hours for reporting. July 1st is the deadline to buy or sell barley quota for crop year 1995. Producers who have bought or sold part of a farm and the farm's tobacco quota resulted in less than 1000 lbs. must take action concerning the quota prior to July 1st. Contact the office to find out your options.

Producers are reminded they must file or update the AD-1026 Highly Erodible Land Conservation (HEL) and Wetland Conservation (WC) Certification to receive program benefits for crop year 1995.

Rotated pastures have higher phosphorus and potassium levels removed by livestock; they return most of it as dung and urine. Phosphorus and potassium levels tend to rise near shade, water, and gate areas.

Nutrient removal is much less when pasture is grazed than when it is used to make hay. Thus, starting a good rotational system reduces fertilizer topdressing needed compared to making hay.

Forage quality improves when pasture areas rest between grazings: Animals allowed continuous access to a pasture, trample and defecate on significant amounts of forage. These areas often grow up becoming more mature and lower in quality.

Rotating puts livestock on pasture when the forage is at or near its peak nutritive value.

Rotational Grazing Means More Money

Rotating livestock on pastures improves a grazing system and increases income. Rotating can be as simple as closing gates. The manager should determine when animals graze a field instead of running over the entire farm. All grass needs a recovery time, and rotating between fields allows grass to re-grow between grazing cycles.

The cheapest feed on a livestock farm is the feed animals harvest for themselves. Nutrients harvested by grazing cost less than half as much as nutrients harvested and fed as stored feed like hay or grain.

Improving a grazing system increases pasture utilization and fertility, as well as forage quality and supply. Rotational grazing can increase pasture utilization by at least 10%. Depending on the forage, rotating results in pasture use of 60% or more, compared to use of 50% or less when pasture is

continuously grazed. Nutrient cycling reduces the need for fertilizer on grazed pastures. Less than 10% of the forages'

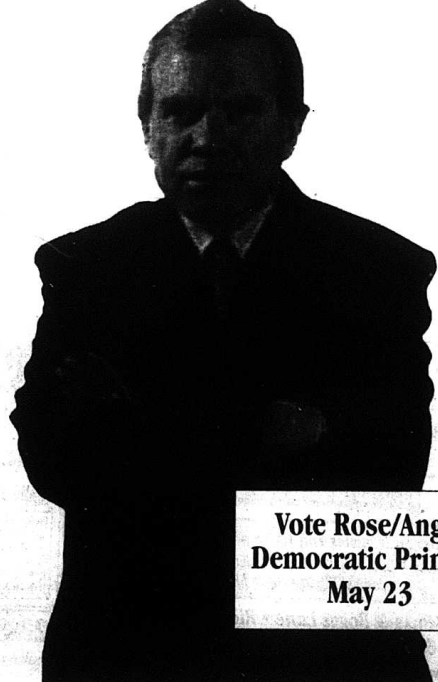

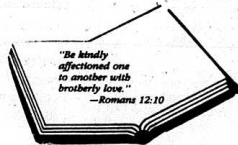

Points East

Last Sunday afternoon I drove from Paint Lick to Prestonsburg, a distance of some 140 miles by my route. And my route crosses numerous creeks and four rivers all of which were near or above flood stage as a result of all the rain we've been getting.

Paint Lick Creek and Silver Creek in Madison and Garrard Counties were running high and muddy. Both of these streams are virtual rivers but they are normally tame enough to wade when I get an appetite for a mess of the smallmouth bass that call them home. I crossed several other creeks in Estill and Powell Counties that probably afford good fishing too but last Sunday large tree stumps and logs were being hastily carried along their mid-stream currents. I even saw an unlucky cow being swept down Silver Creek.

I crossed the Kentucky River at

Irvine and I assume that it, too, was muddy. I know that it was high and raging but there was no way to tell what color the water may have been because it was covered, bank to bank with every sort and size of plastic jugs, aerosol cans, disposable diapers, sanitary napkins, toilet tissue, old refrigerators and assorted other human waste that had been dumped into it by pigs who live in upstream.

Just outside of Prestonsburg I crossed the Big Sandy River and it mirrored what I had seen in Irvine some 75 miles back. A flowing, oozing, garbage dump. The fastest flowing cess-pool in the country.

You don't see much garbage in the central Kentucky streams. We have a few families who live like pigs here too, and once in awhile you'll see a jug or diaper on our creeks when they're in a tide. And you don't see much filth floating down the Red

River or The Licking. Apparently folks who live along those watersheds have enough self respect and enough respect for nature—maybe even respect for the folks who live downstream—that they choose to behave responsibly when it comes to getting rid of their garbage.

Every time the Kentucky River floods I am embarrassed to tell anyone that I am a native of eastern Kentucky. And if you want to know why folks who live in the flatlands look down their noses at eastern Kentuckians all you have to do is come here and visit when the water gets high. Last Sunday, in Irvine, the river was more than 600 feet from bank to bank and probably 30 feet deep, but a non-swimmer could have crossed it without getting his hair wet by grabbing hold of the crap that the mountain counties are too sorry to dispose of the way the law requires.

The Kentucky and the Big Sandy could be beautiful works of nature and either could attract untold numbers of tourists to our neck of the woods if the folks who live along them and their tributaries treated them like the gifts from God that they actually are. But instead of treating them as that gift, thousands of slob treat them like flush toilets.

If the folks who live in Lexington had a few cargo planes and they dumped their garbage in the planes' cargo holds and we flew the stuff up to Whitesburg or Neon or Hazard or

lized. And people like me, because I grew up in the mountains, aren't even supposed to get mad.

"Civilized", is, in fact, the word we need to use here. Eastern Kentuckians need to start acting civilized if they want to be treated that way. And civilized people simply don't dump their garbage in the streams and rivers. Nor do they flush their toilets into them.

I hear remarks having to do with how mountain use the bathroom. "Do you all just lean up and take a leak against the parking meters when you get the urge?" they ask.

"Does your butt ever get frostbit when you hang it out over the river bank?"

And those are legitimate complaints. If you're going to throw diapers into the river, you may as well hang your bottom over a bridge rail when you need to relieve yourself. That would certainly be no less disgusting.

If I were in charge of things a few thousand people in Lecher County alone would have six weeks to install sanitary septic systems instead of letting whatever goes into their commodes go straight into the river. And if they didn't fix it they'd pay hefty fines and spend some time in jail. Anybody caught disposing of normal garbage over the creekbank could expect nine days of hard labor cleaning up the lower Kentucky River.

I'd like to see Paul Patton or any candidate for governor make some promises to enforce the environmental laws that are already on the books. I'd like to see the health departments in Lecher County and Knott County and Perry County cracking down on some of the violators but they are staffed with do-nothing, dead-heads who are far too afraid to enforce the laws they are sworn to enforce and uphold. And, of course, they get no help from the justice system. I'd bet even money that a number of judges in eastern Kentucky are flushing the toilets in their homes straight into a blue-line stream.

If you live in Lecher or Knott or Perry or Breathitt or Wolfe or Pike or Floyd Counties, and this piece has made you angry, I'm glad. I hope your face is red because it certainly ought to be. You ought to get mad if you're living in slop and you sure ought to be ashamed. And if you're really mad, you ought to be doing something about cleaning up your own streams and rivers and you ought to be holding people who ruin them accountable.

It's time to get responsible folks. It's time to get respectable. In fact, it's way past time, especially if you live in the head of the river. If you want to start getting some respect, read this column again. The recipe is pretty obvious.

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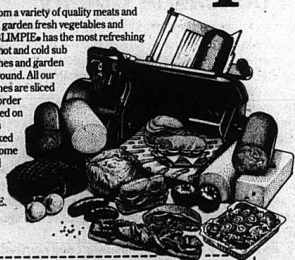
Tech Prep implementation

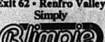

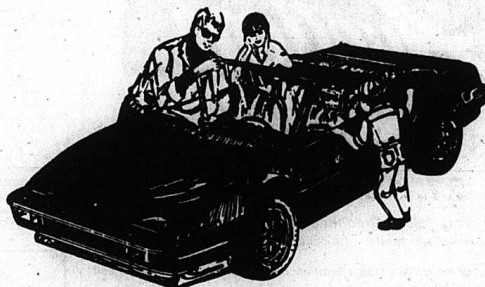

Competition is open to all Kentucky athletes meeting the amateur requirement of the state and national governing body for each sport.

Individuals with any type of disability may compete in any of the Bluegrass State Games events. These individuals will compete with non-disabled participants when ability levels are comparable. If the athlete feels that his/her ability level is not comparable with non-disabled participants, he/she will compete against other participants with similar disabilities provided enough entries are received to hold competitions. The Rockets will now face Clay Co. in district finals. The first and second place teams both advance to regionals at Middlesboro. Game times will be set Sunday.

The Rockets own back-to-back district championships for the 93-94 seasons and would really enjoy a three-peat.

Clay got to the finals with a 17-0 rout of the Oneida Mountaineers in the first game Monday.

The Rockets got two wins last week—against Lynn Camp and a confidence-building 13-1 win against the Knox Central Panthers.

Knox Central, one of the top-rated teams in the region, was minus four seniors but the pitcher was the regular-scheduled one and the Rockets bombed him and his reliever brought on in the fourth inning—to the tune of 13 hits—three of them homeruns.

The Rockets scored in the first inning when Scottie Cotton doubled, scoring Travis Anderkin.

After being held scoreless in the second, the Rockets bounced back for a three-run third highlighted by Thomas' three-run homer, scoring Anderkin and Cotton who had both singled. The score was 4-1 at that point and, after a shaky first inning, lefty George Durham was keeping everything under control with four strike-outs in three innings.

The fourth inning saw the Panthers score two runs on a home-run of their own and tightened the score to 4-3 but that would be their total offense for the game. In their half of the

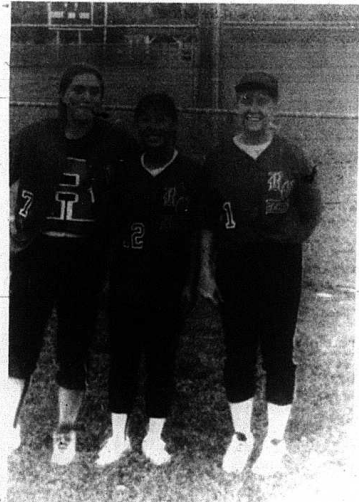

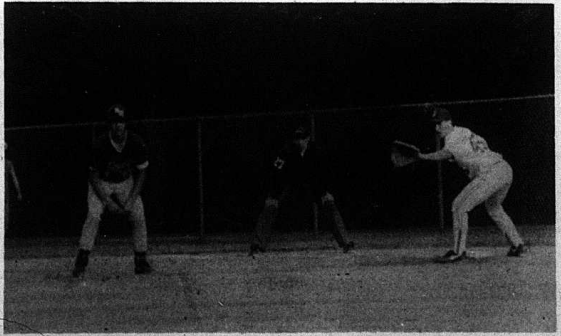
The Rockets needed three runs in the sixth to go home early and that's

Members of the 1995 All-District tourney team are from left: Susie Carpenter, Melinda Smith and Amy Robinson.



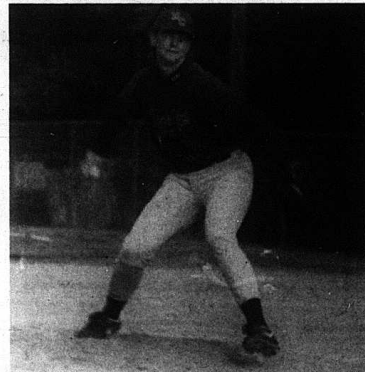

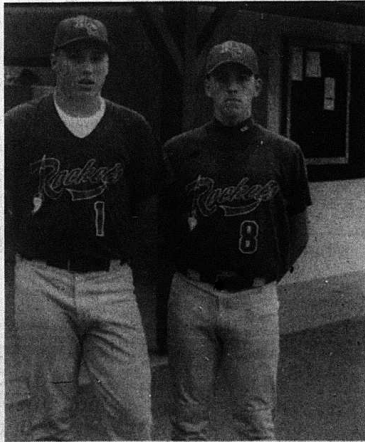

throughout the state.

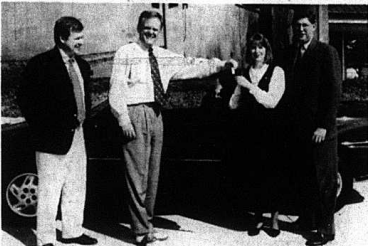

"What Saith the Scriptures"

I've never seen God with my eyes, or heard him with my ears, or reached out and touched him, but I believe in him based on the evidence seen in nature. Ps. 19:1, Ps. 139:14, Ac. 14:15-17, Rms. 1:18-20.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ gives strong, compelling evidence for belief in God. The empty tomb argues conclusively that Jesus is who he claimed to be, the one who came from God, into our world, to redeem us from sin. We have no problem in believing in other historical figures, like Nero, Julius Caesar, and Alexander the Great, based on historical records. Should it not be hard to believe the New Testament records, of the men who were eye witnesses of the resurrected Lord, and gave the testimony and recorded in the N.T. documents? The N.T. has more manuscripts than any other book of antiquity. Some 24,000 manuscripts in part or whole, of the N.T. books, compare this with just a few hundred of works by Plato, or Tacitus, or with Homer. Can any destroy the credibility of the apostles who saw the Lord? Can any offer a reasonable explanation for the empty tomb? Yes indeed, our hope rests upon the resurrected Lord. (Cor. 15:12-19) but those have been able to shake the foundation of our hope! Truly may we diligently seek the creator of the universe!

Dear Editor,

As anyone who has ever met me, you will know, one of the biggest problems facing companies today is the high cost of workers' compensation insurance. As I've travelled the state, I've talked with many concerned citizens and business owners, including several in Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County, about workers' compensation and shared their frustration regarding fraud within the program. Unfortunately, one reason workers' compensation premiums are so high is that some people are cheating the system. That's simply not fair, and it's something that we are committed to eliminate.

My message is simple: we will not tolerate workers' compensation fraud in Kentucky. If you are cheating the system, we will catch you and we will prosecute you to the full extent allowable by law. It doesn't matter if you are a worker, an employer, an insurance agent, a lawyer, or a health care provider, if you are cheating the system, you will be caught.

National experts say \$100 billion a year is spent in the United States on workers' compensation premiums, and that as much as 20% of that goes to pay for fraudulent claims. In Kentucky, that means cheaters could be costing business owners as much as \$160 million per year. Business owners have to recover their costs and so they pass the cost along to us by way of higher prices. In short, you and I pay more because a few people are taking advantage of us.

Last week in Frankfort, we announced a new plan to crack down on workers' compensation fraud. We now have more people investigating claims to make sure that the money goes only to those who really deserve it. We are so committed to catching these cheaters that I have asked State Police Commissioner Jerry Lovitt to head the new investigating team.

In addition, we have set up a statewide toll-free hotline to accept calls from people who suspect workers' compensation fraud. If you know of someone who is cheating the system, call 1-800-554-8601, and we will investigate.

Our goal is to reduce costs for Kentucky's employers, catch the people who are taking advantage of the workers' compensation system. As Governor, I believe you deserve nothing less.
