**Speech, Pronouncing—  
Enunciating**

We don't always hear what we think we are hearing or understand what is being said for a simple reason, it is not being spoken in our own language. Oh yes, the words are spoken in English, that is, most of the time it is English unless the foreigner speaking it sometimes lapses back into his own language.

These many people from far away lands entering our country and beginning a new life for themselves are probably having as rough a time twisting their tongues around the words of the English language as we who have spoken it from birth have understanding those speaking it. This may be a handicap to them but to some of us it presents a serious problem.

There are some places where words, carefully chosen and pronounced and enunciating correctly should be mandatory. Hospitals, pharmacies, and restaurants are the three I especially have in mind.

I have had experience with a couple of doctors whose diagnosis was not very clear nor their instructions for us with hearing or understanding problems. The pharmacies present the same problem. The field of medicine is one place where every word should be understood clearly for the life and well being of the person being spoken to is at stake.

Fast food restaurants, the third one I mentioned is my bone to pick today. A recent happening in one emphasized the problem of not understanding the waitress. I like Chinese Food and eat it every chance I get so Lora and I, whom I was visiting for a few days in Hamilton, Ohio, stopped at one for our lunch. The special for the day was, "Golden Chicken." This sounded good to me for their chicken dishes are always good. When I placed my order the waitress made a few remarks that I never plainly understood so I let my order stand. Lora ordered something else and we went to our table and waited for our order. Hers came quickly but mine was a bit slower and when it did come I was surprised at what I saw. Here was a big deep platter filled to the brim with steaming hot chicken legs in sweet sauce with a few chunks of zucchini

deep in the sauce. It looked and smelled delicious but how in the world could I get those chicken legs out of the sauce? The only utensil with it was a weak little plastic fork which didn't even penetrate the zucchini much less the chicken legs. The Chinese food I have been accustomed to eating has always been made with white meat and cut into eating size pieces and I simply did not know how to handle these chicken legs. I tried picking one of the legs up with my fingers but it was so hot it burned them and the sauce dripped all over the place. Finally in desperation Lora asked for a knife, it didn't help a bit for the legs just slid to another spot when I tried to use it and the big chunks of zucchini joined them.

The only solution we could come up with was to get another plate and share her meal and ask for a "doggie bag" and take this home where we could use a real knife and fork to get the meat off the bones. The one bite that I had been able to get, with hot brown sauce dripping onto my blouse, was just as delicious as it smelled so we didn't want to send it back. By now the waitress and her manager were at the table wanting to know what the problem was. The waitress said, in her broken English, I tried to tell you you would like the chicken chow mein better. She also said when I asked how one was to eat it, "pick it up with your fingers by the projecting bones." I haven't figured out yet how one could pick up those steaming hot bones with bare fingers nor how one got the zucchini out of the sauce, and even if one did what would catch the syrupy hot sauce as it dripped from these morsels except the lap (and I had white slacks on). Anyway, with a few additives, we had a very good dinner that night. And if I had understood her when she wanted to change my order from Golden Chicken to Chow Mein I would never have known how very good chicken legs can be if prepared in a hot sweet sauce, nor how frustrating and embarrassing it is to have a delicious smelling and attractive meal before me and not be able to eat it.

This is one of the little problems we have in the melting pot of the United States of America where all races have been made welcome.

they have to deal with the experience of birth. Then they face a new world of sights, sounds and feelings. Take a few minutes to watch a hungry baby. Notice how the baby's head automatically turns toward the breast or bottle -- the baby has just solved the very important problem of eating.

Childhood is full of problems that adults may not even notice. But children do, they are constantly challenged by new situations. To move, a baby needs to learn to control the whole body. Rolling over becomes important to get something that is out of reach. For a child, getting others to understand is a very complex problem. Each of these difficulties brings important opportunities for learning.

Children need to learn to solve their own problems. You need to provide support, but only when it is needed the way it is needed.

Watch your child. What interests your child? What problems come up? How does your child solve them? Some children will try very hard; others are easily frustrated. Knowing how resourceful your child is and how much stress your child can handle will help you know when your help is really needed.

Wait. Problem solving takes time. First, the child must know there is a problem. If you do everything for your child, this won't happen. Then allow enough time for your child to think up a solution. Sometimes the solution will be based on previous experiences and sometimes it will simply be trial and error -- a guess. Finally, your child needs the chance to carry out the plan. It might work or it might not, but your child will know how to handle other, similar problems. If it doesn't work out well, the child can try another way. Don't offer unneeded help; there is a great deal of learning from these small struggles.

Provide support when it is needed. Know when your child has had too much. Be ready to give help and encouragement. By being available and responsive you will teach

your child to trust you. Your child will have the confidence to try new things if the child knows someone will be there if things get to be too much.

Be flexible. Expect your child to use the skills already learned. But children, like everyone else, have good days and bad days. It is not unusual for them to stop doing something they know how to do. Just try again later. As long as your child is generally working in the right direction, there is no need to worry.

Encourage your child to try. Show how you feel when you see things working well. Children really appreciate a smile or hug for a job well done.

Structure situations so it makes sense to try new things. As your child develops, change each situation so it becomes more challenging. Place a toy a little farther away or do a little less to help with an activity. See if your child tries to do a little more because you expect a little more.

Join in your child's play. Let your child set the pace sometimes. Share the things that interest both of you. Let your child know that you really value the things your child likes.

Show how you solve problems. If a shoe is too far away, talk about the problem. Then work together to find a solution. ("Oh, oh, the shoe is too far away. How can we get it?") See if your child knows what to do. If not, go together and find a sock of something to get the shoe. Your child will learn from listening to what you say and watching what you do.

Make sure the area is safe. Look at the room from your child's point of view. If you need to, get down on the floor and crawl around. Check for hazards that make exploring unwise or unsafe. Arrange the room so there are few restrictions. It's okay if some things are still off limits. But if you need to stop your child's play often, make some changes in the way things are set up.

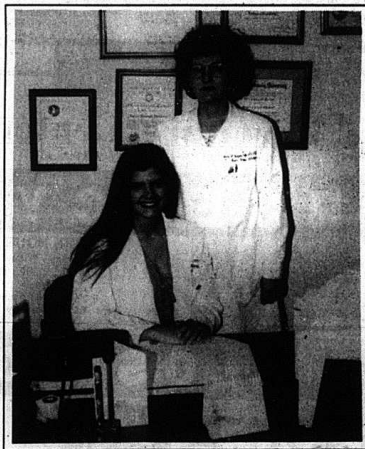

**Problem Solving**

To borrow an ancient proverb, if you solve a child's problem, you help the child for the moment. Teach the child to solve the problem and you help the child for a lifetime.

Life is full of problems. Some are big and others are small. But no matter who you are, solving problems is a big part of life. How this is done affects what is learned and how one

feels about oneself.

Adults face the problems of providing for their families, keeping a home, working with others. Brothers and sisters have to figure out how to share their room, their toys, and their parents' attention. A developmentally delayed child might need to work quite hard to keep up with siblings and to adapt when keeping up is just not possible.

Even babies and young children have big problems to solve. First,

### Some deli-type sandwiches layered with fat and sodium traps

Although deli-style sandwiches provide a quick lunch fare, some traditional ingredients often are fat and sodium traps.

The classic tuna sandwich is among the worst fat and sodium offenders. Vegetarian sandwiches also often contain unnecessary fat. A tuna salad sub can contain up to 60% of the fat and over 50% of the daily sodium quotient. Vegetarian sandwiches can be a mixed bag of healthful and high-fat ingredients. Tomatoes, sprouts, cucumbers and onions are healthy; but avocado and regular cheese and dressings are fat traps. To reduce

fat content, ask for reduced or no cheese, and low-fat dressing on the side.

You can reduce the fat content of a chicken salad sandwich by asking for an all-white meat mixture, which contains less fat than dark meat. Also request low-fat mayonnaise on the side. Low-fat alternatives include turkey breast and lean roast beef or lean ham.

Another way to reduce fat intake is by substituting mustard, horseradish, reduced-fat mayonnaise or fat-free dressing for regular mayonnaise or sauces. Skip potato chips, or ask for a

small portion. Avoid croissants. To lower sodium intake, avoid processed meats such as bacon, corned beef and ham. Many processed meats have an extremely high sodium content, supplying up to 1,000 milligrams or more, which is almost half the daily requirement. Ask for unsalted or low-sodium meats. Traditional pickles and potato chips also add sodium.

It's always good to increase the fiber in your diet. You can boost fiber by requesting extra lettuce, tomatoes and onions, or asking for whole-grain or whole-wheat bread. Eat a six-inch sub with a cup of soup or fresh fruit instead of a foot-long sub. If the deli has a salad bar, stuff a pita pocket with fresh vegetables and low-fat dressing.

Bringing lunch from home is an increasingly popular alternative to eating in a deli or restaurant. This low-fat, low-sodium veggie pocket is perfect for brown baggers:

- 1/2 cup non-fat yogurt
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/8 to 1/4 teaspoon cayenne

pepper  
• 4 cups mixed vegetables (carrots, radishes, mushrooms, sweet peppers, onions, alfalfa sprouts, spinach or cabbage)  
• 4 whole wheat pita pockets  
Mix yogurt, lemon juice and cayenne pepper. Put 1/4 of the vegetable mix in each pita pocket. Top with 2 tablespoons of the dressing. Per Serving: 197 calories, 2 grams fat (9%); 0 grams saturated fat, 54 milligrams sodium.

## Agricultural News

Wheat and Feed Grain program set aside will begin June 1, and extend until October 31. Participants are unable to pasture land that has been designated as set aside for program purposes. 50% of the set aside acres must have cover. (Weeds are not considered cover.) Erosion, insects, weeds, and rodents must be controlled through December 31 of the program year. Final seeding date for set aside acres is June 1.

Crop reports are required in '95—A crop acreage report will be required on the following farms in 1995: (1) Any farm that will market tobacco in 1995, whether it is carryover from last year, or planted this year, (2) any farm that is participating in the Wheat and Feed Grain

program, (3) any farm in the Conservation Reserve Program, and (4) any farm that has corn planted for grain. All crops must be planted in order to complete the crop acreage report. It is the insured's responsibility to report all acreage planted, who shares in the crop, and the planting dates. Farmers are urged to contact CFSA for an appointment time at their convenience as soon as all crops are planted. We stress the need for an appointment time, due to the overwhelming number of crop reports that have to be taken this year. If it is a hardship for a farmer to come in during office hours (7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.) contact the office and a time can be worked out after office hours for reporting.

Carryover tobacco spot checks are currently being completed by county office personnel. A percentage of farms with carryover tobacco is chosen at random each year for spot check.

Beginning June 5, Andy will begin a twelve month internship at Southeast Christian Church in Louisville.

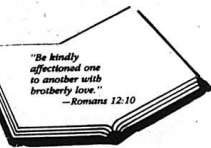

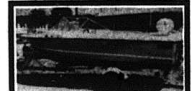

Alexander found shot near home

By: Richard Anderkin A Rockcastle County man was found dead last Thursday evening near his Crooked Creek home.

J.B. Alexander died from a single gunshot wound to the left chest area, according to Rockcastle County Bill Dowell.

Dowell said that Alexander had been dead for more than 24 hours when his body was found.

According to police Alexander's body was found around 6:30 p.m. in a wooded area just off Crooked Creek Road by a neighbor.

Rockcastle County Deputy Sheriff Randall Reynolds said the shooting probably resulted from a dispute between Alexander and neighbors over a wagon Alexander had reportedly borrowed. Reynolds said that the and state troopers responded to a shooting incident in the same area on Wednesday, but that no arrests were made.

But, Saturday Adrian Robinson, 36, of Orlando was arrested in connection with the case.

According to the arrest warrant Robinson was charged with theft by unlawful taking for allegedly stealing Alexander's wallet after he had been shot.

Robinson pleaded not guilty in Rockcastle District Court on Monday and his bond was set at \$5,000 cash or property.

Kentucky State Police Public Affairs Officer Gilbert Accardo, Jr., said that no one has been charged with Alexander's murder and the investigation is continuing by Detectives Mike Hopkins and Gary Lane.

Superintendent Towery retires

By: Richard Anderkin County School System to statewide recognition, has retired.

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Bige Towery, Jr., told members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education on Monday that he was retiring after thirty years in the school system, the last eight as superintendent of schools.

Towery's announcement was somewhat of a surprise since in April he accepted a four year contract from the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

The local board acknowledged

Towery's retirement at a special meeting Tuesday night and began the search for his replacement.

Towery's retirement is effective July 1 and school board vice chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith said that he felt the board has plenty of time to have Towery's replacement in place by July.

Superintendent Towery took over an embattled Rockcastle County school system eight years ago after the board of education and then Supt. Charles Parsons had just lost a federal lawsuit for sex discrimination in hiring. Two factions were struggling for control of the school system and

morale was at an all time low. Towery immediately began the difficult task of rebuilding the system and bringing all factions together.

His efforts seem to have paid off with the latest test results showing Rockcastle as one of only 42 school systems in the state to show improvement.

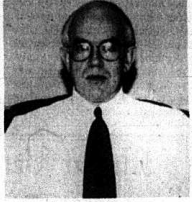
Superintendent Towery said Tuesday that he had thought long and hard about the chances of his being able to complete the four years of his new contract. "I am not the kind of person who starts something and doesn't finish it, I sincerely do not believe that I would have been able to

work all four years of the contract," he said. "Now seemed to be the best time to retire," he added.

"The new high school is completely finished, the move has been made to the middle school formal, with renovation of that building started to begin this summer and we have completely implemented all aspects of KERA in our schools," the superintendent said.

"I feel it is simply a good time to step aside," Towery said.

Supt. Towery's letter to board members reads as follows: "After lengthy and intensive

A small number went to the polls in Rockcastle Tuesday, including Arnold McGuire, who voted at West Brodhead precinct Tuesday afternoon. Assisting McGuire were election officers Ruby Brock and Angie Henrickson.

Margaret Offutt, deputy property valuation administrator (PVA) for the past 13 years, won the nomination on her own over two opponents in Tuesday's Primary.

She defeated Douglas Glyn Bullock by 943 to 666 votes and Cleidith Ray Thacker who received 200 votes.

At present, Mrs. Offutt has no opposition in the November General Election. Democrat William D. Reynolds withdrew this week and will not appear on the ballot in November.

Mrs. Offutt claimed she was "someone, you can depend on." Political pundits had predicted a closer vote but it never materialized.

Thacker campaigned very little, leaving the race to Offutt and Bullock.

The three were running for the unexpired term of Elmer Hale, who resigned last December.

Another Rockcastle countian won his primary nomination.

James H. Lambert defeated John Glascock for state treasurer on the Republican ticket. Lambert polled 1,135 votes in Rockcastle to his opponents 492. Statewide, Lambert defeated Glascock about 56 to 44

Offutt wins PVA seat

Lambert got 52,404 and Glascock 41,330 votes unofficially.

Lambert will face John Kennedy Hamilton in November. Hamilton narrowly defeated Pamela Carroll Farmer 81,666 to Farmer's 81,026.

Lambert, a Rockcastle attorney

and, at one time county attorney, said "To the best of my knowledge, no Rockcastle countian has ever been nominated or elected to a state-wide office while living in the county. Therefore, this election could be historic."

Forgy defeats Gable

Larry Forgy, a Lexington lawyer, won the Republican nomination for governor by a wide margin over Bob Gable and Tommy Klein in Tuesday's primary.

Forgy got 82 percent of the vote defeating Bob Gable 97,191 votes to Gable's 17,095.

Gable said, following Forgy's

victory, "I fully believe in Larry Forgy's chances in the fall."

Forgy, 55, had as his running mate, Tom Handy of London.

In the secretary of state race, Steve Crabree defeated Charles Hellebusch 70,029 to 20,348 votes.

No Democrat run-off

Paul Patton, a Pikeville millionaire, and former county judge/executor, won the Democrat nomination for governor by the largest majority in two decades.

Patton, the lieutenant governor, defeated Bob Babbage 151,523 to Babbage's 81,299 votes. John "Eck" Rose got 72,040, Gatewood Galbraith, 28,828 and Steve Maynard 4,293. With this majority, Patton

And one of the older deacons expressed his fear that "the Campbellites'll get a lot of mileage out of this. I can hear 'em now. Once huggin', always huggin'."

The deacon board didn't take any official action, agreeing rather to pray about the matter first—and pray "without ceasing" that our preacher's huggin' was a one-time thing.

Now, dear hearts, most everything that happens in a Baptist church has a history, and the "huggin' controversy" is no exception. The average Baptist is pretty much in the dark when it comes to church history. Apparently, they think church history ended with *The Book of Acts*. Every church library should have several copies of Hiram L. Hurlbutt's *The History of Baptists and Lesser Denominations*. And members should be commanded to read both volumes of that epochal work. Let those who refuse be made to sit on the front pews and shunmed for forty days and forty nights.

Doctor Hurlbutt (volume two, pp. 898ff.) explains that around 1559 a band of French Protestants, known as "Huguenots," advocated the custom of hugging fellow members of both sexes as a substitute for the Apostle Paul's injunction to "greet one another with a holy kiss" (2 Corinthians 13:12). So doing, they contended, would curtail the spread of "the plague and gingivitis."

Well, as you might suspect, not everyone went along with the change, especially those who insisted on taking the King James translation literally. They fled France, sailing to England where they organized themselves into a Baptist church (because the Huguenots acted too much like Presbyterians). History, as Hurlbutt

the YOEB, which contained Shonefeld's notes, encouraged each other to maintain holiness at all times and "keep their hands off each other, not even shaking hands, lest physical contact lead them to sexual promiscuity or worse." And for that belief they were driven out of the Huguenot congregations and eventually were persecuted by both Huguenots and Huguenots, who gave them the nickname, "Touchmenots." They, however, took that moniker as a badge of honor, and because they carried themselves with nobility and decorum, the British Parliament named a lovely, little flower after them.

Enough history! But, beloved, you now understand that the clandestine meeting of deacons mentioned above was just another blurb on the continuum of ecclesiastical conflict. But, our little historical tour does leave us with a burning question, viz., from which group do the deacons of my church descend?

Let's be logical. (1) They aren't Huguenots because they, being literate, wouldn't dare substitute hugging for kissing. (2) They clearly are not Huguenots, who stayed with the "holy kissing" command of Paul. They take Paul literally but just don't obey him. (3) Are they Touchmenots, who refrain from hugging and kissing, and even shaking hands? That doesn't seem to be the case. Most of our deacons, if cornered, will shake. (4) Logical deduction leaves us with only one conclusion: the deacons of my church are just Nots.

## Baker and Brown advance to state

Rockcastle's Jason Brown and Matt Baker advanced to the State Track Meet after qualifying in their events at the Region held at Jessamine Co. on Saturday, May 20.

Brown, a sophomore, placed second in the 200 meter dash, while Baker, a senior, placed first in the High Jump.

Several others performed well during the meet but failed to finish first or second in their events, which is required to advance to the State. The boys team finished fifth out of a field of nine teams with 53 pints, while the girls scored 17 points to finish eighth.

Brown was clocked in the 200 meter dash at 23.56, which also broke a three year old record held by his brother, Jay. The old record stood at 24.01. Brown also finished third in the 100 meter dash with a time of 11.15, breaking his previous school record of 11.39 he set earlier this season. "It is unusual to have speed like this at our school, but Jason has worked hard to bring his time down in the 100 from 12.04 to his current time of 11.15," said Tom Larkey, Rockcastle's head track coach. "He also has brought his clocking down in the 200 from 25.01 to 23.56 during that time," he added.

Meanwhile, Baker has also set a school record, which was held by Jason Hunt, in the high jump. Baker beat Hunt's 6'0 leap in 1992 with a vault of 6'4 earlier this month and jumped 6'3 at the Regionals. "Matt is a great athlete and just a natural jumper. I could see his potential as a state contender in his first day of practice," said Coach Larkey. Matt also took sixth in the Long Jump with a leap of 18'3. In his first year of track, Matt has finished the season as the high point scorer for the boys with 123 points.

Other boys to place in the Regional, but failing to advance to the State Meet were: Casey Blaney, third, 300 low hurdles, 44.95 and sixth, 110 high hurdles, 18.04; Dallas Rigby, third, 400 meter dash, 54.25 and sixth, 200 dash, 24.18; Chris Bullock, third, Discus, 12'14 and fourth in the shot put. The 1600 relay team placed fifth with a time of 3:49. Members of the relay were Rigby, Jon Croimer, Blaney, and Josh Bowles.

The girls did not have anyone to advance to the State, but performed well in the Regional meet. Theresa Chisium, who has been a top performer as a sixth grader this season, placed third in the 100 High Hurdles with a time of 19.2. Dee Reams,

another top performer this year as a sophomore, placed sixth in the 400 meter dash with a time of 1:07.25. The 800 relay team made up of Cheyenne Carmack, Melinda Alcorn, Dee Reams, and Theresa Chisium finished fourth with a time of 2:00.26. The 400 relay made up of Cheyenne Carmack, Holly Norton, Jennifer Carmack, and Chisium finished fourth at 59.70. The 1600 relay made up of C. Carmack, Alcorn, Reams and Bethany Hammond finished sixth at 4:50.

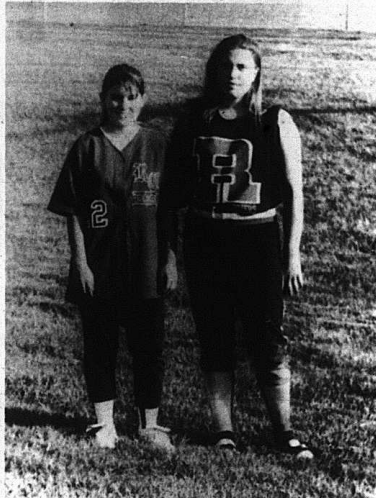

## Girls lose to Yellow Jackets in Region



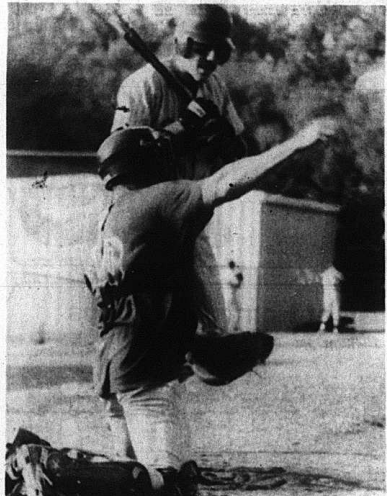

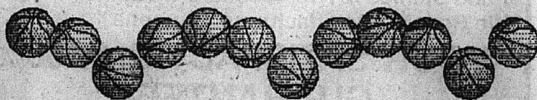

# Storm affects local RECC customers

Approximately 5,000 Jackson County RECC customers were without power May 18 because of damage from thunderstorms and high winds.

Outages were reported throughout the cooperative's service area—Clay, Estill, Jackson, Laurel, Lee, Owsley, and Rockcastle counties, according to Lee Dunsil, Jackson County RECC Operations Manager.

More than 2,000 Clay County consumers were affected by a power outage when co-op crews shut down the Fall Rock substation for repairs. Repairs were completed and the substation was brought back on line within 20 minutes, Dunsil said.

The majority of the outages occurred around 8:45 p.m. as heavy thunderstorms moved through the area.

A tornado was also reported in northern Laurel County's East Bernsstadt area.

contract crew employees worked through the night to restore power, and by 8 a.m. Friday, only 135 consumers were waiting for repairs. Jackson County RECC provides electric power to approximately 41,000 consumers in its service area.

Roger Witt, manager of the co-ops Laurel District office, said at the height of the storm, about 2,000 Laurel consumers were without power.

Witt said four electric poles were broken as a result of storm damage and most of the outages were reported in the northern end of the county.

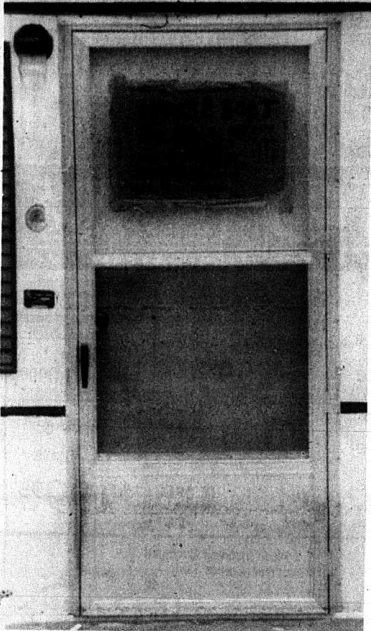

build a progressive school system," he said.

"I am also proud of the aggressive building program we have been able to promote which has provided Rockcastle students with some of the best facilities in the state," he said.

"We have always put a strong emphasis upon quality instruction and I certainly appreciate everyone's efforts in that area," he said.

## Kentucky tops nation in no-till acreage

Kentucky leads the nation in the percentage of farm land cultivated using the no-till method, a technique that significantly reduces erosion into streams and rivers.

"Some 44 percent of Kentucky's crop land was farmed using no-till techniques in 1994," said Scott Smith, chairman of the Agronomy Department at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

The no-till method involves chemically killing all the weeds and plants in the field a few weeks prior to planting the crop. The dead weeds and plants form a mulch that conserves moisture for the crop and keeps rainfall from washing away topsoil, Smith said.

The fact that Kentucky leads the nation in the percentage of land farmed using no-till techniques, Smith said, should not be a surprise. University of Kentucky agronomists developed the technique in the 1950s, and continued to refine it throughout the 1960s and 1970s.

"Agronomists and farmers in other states had conducted a few trials with no-tillage before Shirley Phillips, retired Extension agronomist, and the late Harry Young, an innovative Kentucky farmer became interested in the technique," said Smith said.

Phillips and Young were among the very first to demonstrate that the method would work on the farm. Through his writing and speeches on no-tillage, Shirley Phillips came to be regarded as the father of no-tillage in many parts of the world.

From the 1960s through the 1980s, a team of research agronomists at the University of Kentucky refined weed control, fertilizer management and other production practices related to no-tillage agriculture, he said.

"Systematic studies of soil properties under no-tillage verified that it is a sustainable practice which conserves soil and water," Smith said. In the 1990s, emerging environmental concerns about the impacts of crop production on water quality have changed the focus of no-tillage research, according to Smith.

"Robert Blewitt, UK professor of agronomy, currently leads a multidisciplinary team measuring the runoff of sediment, pesticides, bacteria and other contaminants from no-tillage and conventional tilled land," he said.

Bill Witt, weed scientist at the UK Department of Agronomy, and his colleagues are monitoring the fate of herbicides in no-till soils. Recent results confirm that no-tillage can help protect water resources in agricultural regions from contamination, Smith said.

"No-tillage has been enthusiastically adopted by Kentucky farmers because our cropping systems and much of the land is well suited to this practice. Our scientists in the College of Agriculture have provided an excellent base of research informa-

tion and Extension education required for producers to be successful with this technology," Smith said.

## Old advice is sage when it comes to tobacco transplants

Conventional wisdom in the culture of tobacco production calls for growing transplants on the farm. That old-time advice is still important.

"Movement of diseases on transplants is a major means by which diseases spread in Kentucky," said Bill Nesmith, Extension plant pathologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. Many growers, he said, recycle diseases from beds to fields because of poor plant bed management. Producers also spread new diseases to their farms when they obtain plants from their neighbors. Still others "import" diseases from other states when they purchase out-of-state transplants.

"These are the major reasons that it has long been advocated that growers produce their own transplants. The wisdom is still sound," he said. He noted that while some transplants are produced locally now many are produced in at least 16 other states and then shipped into the Commonwealth, Nesmith said.

"Although the risk of any one lot of transplants harboring a disease may be low, it is not zero. The potential for introducing infectious plant diseases into Kentucky's tobacco is real," he said.

Nesmith said that new strains of old diseases already present in Kentucky, as well as exotic diseases, may enter the state and cause real problems for Kentucky producers.

He should be especially concerned about *Ridomil*-resistant strains of the blue mold fungus. For example, *Ridomil*-resistant blue mold has been confirmed in transplants in southern states that may be destined for Kentucky. Importation of such plants is very risky.

"Such diseases could arrive much earlier on transplants than they might

through normal airborne routes. Strains of viruses, such as Potato Virus Y which affects tobacco, exist south of Kentucky and some are much more damaging than strains already in the state," he said.

In addition, pathogens arriving on transplants could become more widely distributed throughout the state, the plant pathologist said. Certification of transplants does not make them disease free. Preventing disease importation through prohibitive legislation is probably not the solution. Instead, each grower must weigh the cost and the risk involved and make decisions to his best judgement," Nesmith said.

Included in the package are courses in and around Rockcastle County including Cedar Rapids Recreation Center in Mt. Vernon.

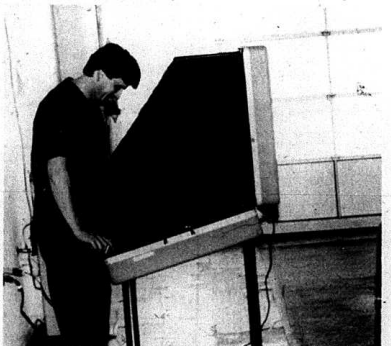

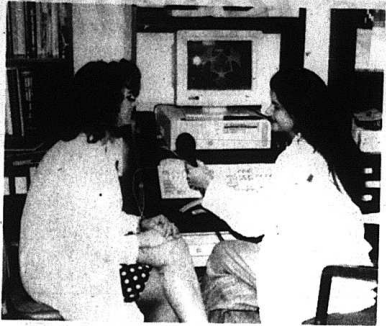

In other county races, Larry Forgy, Republican candidate for governor won his nomination with ease garnering 82 percent of the vote - 97,191, to Bob Gable's unimpressive 17,095. In Rockcastle, Forgy got 1,635 to Gable's 99 votes.

Also in Rockcastle, Steve Crabtree defeated Charles Hellebusch 853 votes to Hellebusch's 188 for the GOP nomination as secretary of state.

In the attorney general's race, Will T. Scott defeated Eunie Smith III, 817 to 226.

In the auditor's race in Rockcastle, Don Bell defeated Tom Buford 513 to 475.

Incidentally, Forgy carried all 120 counties in the state. Only 1 in 5 registered voters, voted in Tuesday's primary, the lowest in 16 years.

In Rockcastle, only 25 percent voted out of over 9,000 registered voters.

## Fletcher's Grocery to close after 54 years

Fletcher's Grocery has been in Brodhead since the beginning of World War II. In a couple of weeks it will close forever. The Fletchers are retiring. The store was established by Jack and Virginia Fletcher in 1941. Jack first started out selling eggs, then sold chickens, feed and groceries as well. The business first opened at the corner of Main and Church Streets in a wooden building and later moved to a building on Church Street. The wooden buildings were torn down and W.O. Yadon built the brick buildings where the store is currently located.

The Fletchers have seen a lot of changes in Brodhead and have a lot of fond memories of the fifty plus years they have been in business. The following story is mostly a recounting of the life and times of Brodhead and Fletcher's grocery as recalled by the Fletchers.

"We can remember when there were few cars here because of the war. Back then people came to town in wagons to trade and most of the time stayed in town all day," Mrs. Patsy Fletcher said Tuesday.

Dan Gray and his wife Elнора had opened the picture show in 1940 and you could see a movie for \$.10 and \$.19.

Current owners Charles and Patsy Fletcher took over the store in July of 1971. Charles had always wanted to come back to Brodhead. He had served in the Navy for 5 years, then he moved to Vandalia, Ohio and Charles worked for National Cash Register in Dayton, Ohio for 16 years. Charles' uncle was wanting to retire and Charles wanted to come back home. Patsy's mother Carter Hoskins still lives in Brodhead and until a year ago, she walked in town everyday. Charles' mother and sister Audrey live here also.

We have two children, Kevin Fletcher, who lives in Mt. Vernon and has a sign printing business and Kim Alcorn, who married Ed Alcorn and lives in Berea. They both teach in Madison County. They have three children, Tricia, Lindsey and Edwin. We have to babysit them at the store, sometimes for several days.

One of the saddest things about leaving the store is because they (the grandchildren) have loved it so much. They have slept in grocery carts and Edwin has a special shelf reserved just for him to sleep on. We have had birthday parties and Easter Egg hunts for them. When we were home, which is close by, we would have to keep the doors locked and their coats hidden so they wouldn't run off to the store by themselves. We are fixing a play store at the house for them to still have.

The first year we had our store, and Jack and Virginia before us, the children from Brodhead would come to town for lunch. It was nothing unusual for us to make 60 bologna sandwiches which we sold for \$.10 each. Then, they would buy whatever else they wanted. Some of these early students still stop by to see us.

One time a couple that lived in an apartment here in town got into a domestic feud and came out on the street and started waving guns at each other. We had a store full of students. We told them to get what they wanted and sent them out the back door, and told them to hurry back to school.

In 1972, we lost our high school and then this year the middle school opened and we lost more of our children.

We used to have a Post Office next to us and the men would gather in the store to talk and wait for the mail to be put up. They would sit on the counter, in the window and in some chairs we had. One day, George Brooks said "we have all sat here and talked and now we need to get up and trade some with Charles." George and Tillie, his wife, are now in the nursing home.

Elizabeth Mullins used to come down just to have us make her some lunch. Charles has always made deliveries. Elizabeth called in a grocery order and Charles went to her home and she was asleep on the couch. He put her groceries up and she never knew he was there. Of all people we have known, I believe she loved Brodhead better than anyone.

She loved to travel but all roads led back to Brodhead. We lost Earl Mullins long before Mrs. Elizabeth and he was an everyday visitor to the grocery.

J.C. Newland was a regular at the store. He came four or five times a day. When the Brodhead fair was in town J.C. and Charles would go out there several times each day just to see what was going on. J.C. and Loraine would be our last customers on Christmas Eve and when J.C. was ill and couldn't come anymore we went to their house. Loraine passed away recently. She always came with a kiss and a hug.

Uncle Bob Hendrickson would spend hours with us, especially after he retired from teaching. He usually ate round cheese for lunch and often times met us for dinner after work. We really cherished the time we spent with him.

Some other fond memories include one of a town dog everyone called "Red". He stopped by the grocery almost everyday for a piece of bologna. We also fed our share of town cats and are currently feeding two cats in the back of the store. Besides dogs, we have always helped out hungry people who have shown up on the store's doorsteps.

There are many things we will miss, mainly our friends and neighbors that we visit with and work with every day.

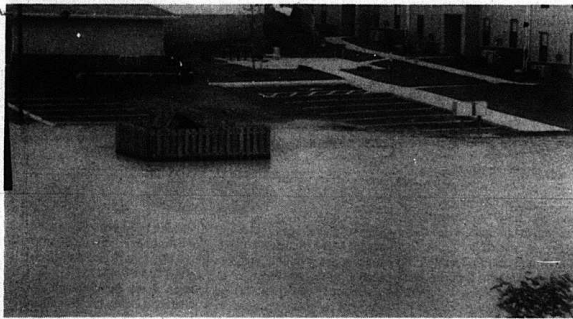

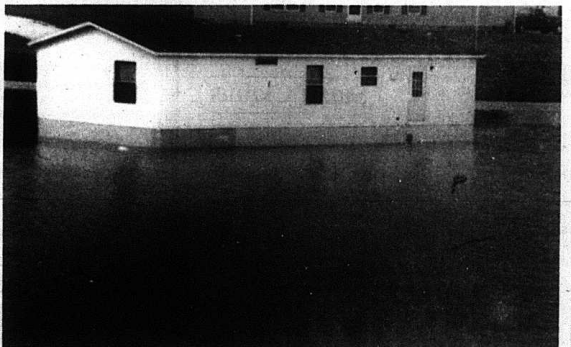
