

Some deli-type sandwiches layered with fat and sodium traps

Although deli-style sandwiches provide a quick lunch fare, some traditional ingredients often are fat and sodium traps.

The classic una sandwich is among the worst fat and sodium offenders. Vegetarian sandwiches also often contain unnecessary fat.

A tuna salad sub can contain un to 60% of the fat and over 50% of th

to oU% of the fat and over 50% of the daily sodium quotient. Vegetarian sandwiches can be a mixed bag of healthful and high-fat ingredients. Tomatoes, sprouts, cucumbers and onions are healthy; but avocado and regular cheese and dressings are fat traps. To reduce

small portion. Avoid croissants.

To lower sodium intake, avoid processed nears such as boon, corned beef and ham. Many processed meats have an extremely high sodium content, supplying up to 1,000 milligrants or more, which is almost half the daily requirement. Ask for unsaited or low-sodium meats. Traditional pickles and potato chips also add sodium.

It's always good to increase the fiber in your diet. You can boost fiber by requesting extra lettuce, tomatoes and onions, or asking for

tomatoes and onions, or askiffg for whole-grain or whole-wheat bread. Eat a six-inch sub with a cup of soup or fresh fruit instead of a foot-long sub. If the deli has a salad bar, stuff a pita pocket with fresh togetables and low-fat dressing.

Bringing lunch from home is an increasingly popular alternative to eating in a deli or restaurant. This low-fat, low-sodium veggle pocket is perfect for brown baggers:





The no-till method involves chemically killing all the weeds and plants in the field a few weeks prior to planting the crop. The dead weeds and plants form a mulch that conserves moisture for the crop and keeps rainfall from washing away topsoil,

Old advice is sage advice when it comes to tobacco transplants

to tobacco transplants
Conventional wisdom in the culture of tobacco production calls for growing transplants on the farm. That dold-time advice is still important.

"Movement of diseases on transplants is a major means by which diseases spread in Kentucky," said Bill Nesmith, Extension plant pathologist with the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

Many growers, he said, recycle diseases from beds to fields because of poor plant bed management. Producers also spread new diseases to their farms when they obtain plants from their neighbors. Still others "import" diseases from better states when they purchase out-of-state transplants.

"These are the major reasons that
it has long been advocated that growers produce their own transplants.
The wisdom is still sound," he said.
He noted that while some transplants are produced locally now many

We should be especially concerned about Ridomil-resistant strains of the blue mold fungus. 

Fletcher's Grocery to close after 54 years

Fletcher's Grocery has been in Brodhead since the beginning of World War II. In a couple of weeks it will closs forever. The Fletchers are retiring. The store was established by Jack and Virginia Fletcher in 1941. Jack first started out selling eggs, then sold chickens, leed and groceries as well.

The business first opened at the corner of Main and Church Streets in a woodfe building and later moved to a building on Church Streets in a woodfe building and later moved to a building on Church Streets. The wooden buildings were tom down and W.O. Yadon built the brick buildings where the store is currently located.

The Fletchers have seen a lot of changes in Brodhead and have a lot of fond memories of the fifty plus years they have been in business. The following story is mostly a recounting of the life and times of Brodhead and Fletcher's grocery as recalled by the Fletchers.

"We can remember when there were few car's here because of the war. Back then people came to town in wagons to trade and most of the time stayed in town all day," Mrs. Pasty Fletcher said Tuesday.

Current owners Charles and Pasty Fletcher took over the store in July of 1971. Charles had always wanted to come back to Brodhead. She always came with a kiss and a hing.

Other people that we have known throughout the years and who visited with us just about every day included Dan Gray who always had a funny story to lell. His wife Elizons atill lives in Brodhead, but she doesn't get out much. We still talk by phone a lot.

Mary McWhother has been missed so much. She would come by our store for news for the Signal.

De Alva Robbins was one of a kind, always cleaning ditches out, burning leaves, picking up trash and trying to make Brodhead took agood as possible allers. Brown, always made us an apple stack cake for Christmas and although she is on a walker now she still bakes us a pie every two or three weeks.

weeks. One time our niece from Ohio came to visit us and wanted to work in the store. After a couple of weeks Traci asked if anyone ever paid for groceries, because we ran a lot of redtil. It was funny to see her reaction. When we took over the store from Jack and Virginia we sold nails, black salt, seed potatoes, seeds loose sugar and beans, but in time all of that stuff was discontinued.

In 1990, the store caught fire and we almost did not reopen, but with the

Another service we have done over the years with the help of many in the community was to provide a food basket for any family in town that lost a loved one. About forty-five different people donated money for the baskets and Charles delivered the food.

Perhaps one of the most enjoyable things we have done is weigh babies on our scales. Charles has kept a chart to make sure all of the babies were growing. The smallest baby I can remember was Angie Brown, daughter of Curtis and Cheryl Brown. Angie will griduate from high school next week. Uncle Bob Hendricksion would spend hours with us, especially after hereited from teaching. He usually ater ound cheese for lunch and often times met us for dinner after work. We really cherished the time we spent with him. Some other fond memories include one of a town dog everyone called Red. 'He stopped by the grocery almost everyday for a piece of bologna. We also fed our share of town casts and are currently feeding two casts in the back of the store. Besides dogs, we have always helped out hungry people who have shown up on the store's doorsteps.

There are many things we will miss, maintly our friends and neighbors that we visit with and york with every day.
