

Farmers may have to make adjustments

Manganese is an essential nutrient to burley tobacco. But in excess amounts it causes a disorder commonly referred to as manganese toxicity. This usually occurs early in the growing season just after transplanting commonly rete toxicity. This in the growin transplanting.

However, growth may be reduced by manganese toxicity ven when other symptoms are not visible. The key to reducing losses due to manganese toxicity is prevention. Proud men each other things and contean not to wholesome words, even the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the doctrine which is according to godiness, he is proud knowing nothing: Tim. 63-4a.

Second, there is a 1,000-acer maximum limit for enrollment and landowners can expect to receive the angroised agricultural value of the land for easement.
