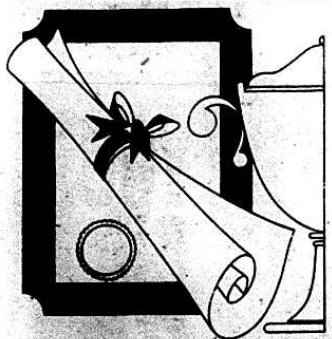

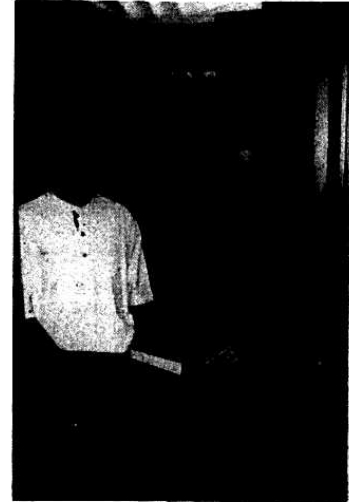



Ten inches of rain in May

It's been wet, wet, wet.

A total of 10.04 inches of rain fell at Mt. Vernon during May, according to figures at Cox Funeral Home.

The 10.04 brings the total for the year to 27.27 inches, far ahead of most years. Most rain usually falls in April but this year's 3.98 inches in April was low.

A total of 2.79 fell on May 13 and 14. One inch fell on May 9, and .95 on May 1 and 2. .86 on May 25 and .75 on May 28 and 29.

There will be a racking horse championship and walking horse championship.

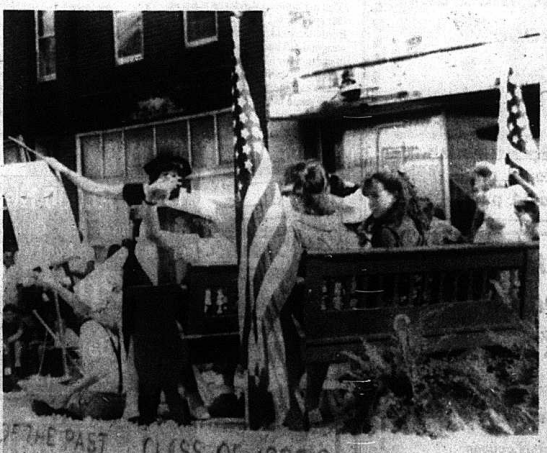

Search for new superintendent now underway

The search is underway for a new Rockcastle County school superintendent, but it may be later than July 1, before the new person is hired, according to school board vice-chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith.

July 1 is the date current superintendent Big Towery, Jr. is scheduled to retire.

The vice-chairman said that it could be as late as July 25, and no earlier than July 21 before Towery's replacement is actually hired by the board.

"Until a new superintendent is hired, the board must appoint an interim superintendent, who has the correct certification, but the person who is appointed to the temporary position cannot be hired as the new superintendent," Griffith said.

Griffith said the board will likely appoint Towery to serve as interim superintendent.

Griffith, who will serve on the screening committee as the board's representative, said Thursday that board members had voted to employ a Kentucky School Board Association facilitator, who will help the board and screening committee with their proceedings.

All applications for the job will go to the facilitator who will in turn deliver them to the board and the screening committee that is currently being formed.

The last date to apply for the superintendent's job will be June 22.

Besides Griffith, two teachers, a principal and a parent will form the screening committee.

Rockcastle Education Association President William Lynch has scheduled a meeting of teachers for 4 p.m. Thursday at RCHS, to elect the teacher representatives.

The parent representative will be chosen by a popular vote of the county P.T.A. presidents and the principals in the school system will choose the principal representative. No date has been set for their meetings.

The committee may or may not conduct interviews, but the board will interview potential candidates July 17-21.

The screening committee will make a formal recommendation to the board, but the board is not bound by their recommendation.

Court rules in Gibson's favor

Gibson Greetings announced today the receipt of a favorable decision regarding unfair labor practice charges brought against the company as an outgrowth of a strike at its Berea, Kentucky facility which commenced May 1, 1989. The United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia in its unanimous decision of May 19th reversed a National Labor Relations Board's (NLRB) finding which would have resulted in approximately 240 strikers being entitled to reinstatement and/or back pay. The Court found that the strike was not an unfair labor practice strike and that a significant number of strikers had been permanently replaced and thus not entitled to reinstatement or back pay; the Court remanded to the NLRB for a factual determination, the issue of permanency with respect to approximately 52 replacements hired after June 29, 1989. The company did not contest the reinstatement of six employees terminated for alleged strike violence and the Court ordered reinstatement of four others in the same category.

Several Rockcastle countians were affected by Gibson's actions in 1989. Some have returned to work and others have never gotten their job back.

Now, the above tale is a joke, but I'm not putting you on when I tell you there is a segment of Baptists who hold that it's possible for non-Baptists to gain heaven. And then (I know this is so) some

Sir, I don't recall "pickin' on Pentecostals." Why, several years ago I even considered becoming one. I only backed away when I admitted to myself that I would never be able to "live above sin." As for Robert Tilton—a and a passel of charlatans who "rack 'em up" on TBN (some are Baptists)—I'm irate that they have polluted the Gospel by turning it into entertainment and are flirting with heresy by tacking the attainment of wealth to the Good Word.

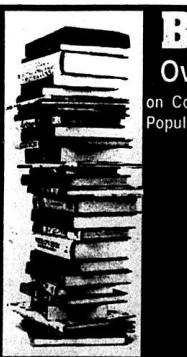
AARP news

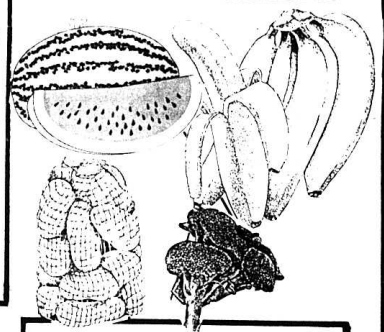

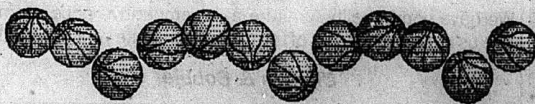

Farmers may have to make adjustments

Rainy weather has set back Central Kentucky's corn planting. As a result, producers may have to plant shorter-season hybrids to make sure their crop matures before frost.

The time is at hand in which more delay will result in less than optimal yields. Late planting results in losses of 1% per day for each day's delay after 15th.

It is best to switch to shorter-season hybrids if plantings are made past late May. Although full-season hybrids have the highest yield potential at early planting dates, yields decline rapidly as the planting date is delayed.

By early to mid-June, the yield potential for early season and full-season hybrids is about equal. A shorter-season hybrid for delayed plantings not only helps assure maturity before frost, but also provides lower grain moisture at harvest.

Late-season hybrids (maturing in 120-130 days) should not be planted after June 1 for grain or June 5 for silage. The last planting date for mid-season hybrids (maturing in 108 to 120 days) is June 5-10 for grain and June 10-15 for silage. Use early season hybrids (maturing in less than 108 days) if planted after June 10 for grain and June 15 for silage. Corn should not be planted after June 20-25 because of low-yield potential.

Growers who haven't planted their crop by June 10th should consider their corn yield potential in relation to alternative crops such as soybeans. (Looking at past records, farmers were faced with this same problem in May, 1990)

It is estimated that manganese toxicity costs burley tobacco producers \$30 to \$40 million per year in lower yields and quality. But these losses could be reduced.

Manganese is an essential nutrient to burley tobacco. But in excess amounts it causes a disorder commonly referred to as manganese toxicity. This usually occurs early in the growing season just after transplanting.

Visual symptoms of manganese toxicity are characterized by a light green or yellowish color between the vein and stunted growth. However, growth may be reduced by manganese toxicity even when other symptoms are not visible.

The key to reducing losses due to manganese toxicity is prevention. Once symptoms become visible in the field, damage has already occurred.

The use of large amounts of nitrogen fertilizers causes soil pH to decrease one-half to one unit below the initial pH level. When soil pH drops below about 5.5, manganese toxicity may occur.

Prevention may be as simple as annual soil testing and lime addition to bring the soil to a pH of 6.4 to 6.6. Ideally, lime should be applied at least one year prior to transplanting to allow time for lime to react. For this reason, if a field has a borderline pH of 5.8 to 6.4 and lime has not already been added to correct this problem, then use the following practices to reduce manganese toxicity.

Band 80 to 90% of the nitrogen fertilizer, at least 10 to 12 inches from the tobacco row ten days after transplanting. This separates the bulk of acid-forming fertilizer from young plant roots. Use ammonia nitrate instead of the more acid-forming Urea as your nitrogen source.

Apply molybdenum in set water at transplant. Use 1/4 to 1/2 pound sodium molybdate per acre. This usually amounts to the number of barrels of water used per acre.

Finally, soil test early for next year's tobacco ground and apply lime in fall as needed to bring soil pH to 6.6. By following these

management strategies, growers should be able to avoid tobacco crop losses due to manganese toxicity.

Food safety tips for warm weather

During the warmer months, food safety becomes a special concern. Warm temperatures, cook-outs and potluck dinners increase the likelihood of food poisoning because of mishandled food. Here are some safety tips to keep you and your family safe from foodborne illness during the summer months.

Serving Foods Safely.
*Serve cooked foods on clean plates, using clean utensils. Never put cooked meat back on the platter that held raw meat.

*Keep cold foods in the refrigerator until it is time to serve them.

*Keep hot foods above 140 degrees F., but not for more than 2 hours.

*When environmental temperatures are 90 degrees F. or warmer, hold cooked foods no longer than 1 hour before reheating, refrigerating, or freezing them; below 50 degrees F., no longer than 2 hours.

What To Do With Leftovers.
*After a meal, refrigerate or freeze uneaten food promptly but throw it out if the food was held too long or was a reheated leftover at this meal.

*Refrigerate or freeze cooked leftovers in small, covered, shallow containers within 2 hours after cooking. Leave airspace around the containers for quick chilling.

*Remove stuffing from meat or poultry before it is refrigerated or frozen.

*Date packages of leftovers and use them within a safe period.

*Cover and reheat leftovers thoroughly before serving them

(bring sauces, soups, and gravies to a rolling boil; 165 degrees F. for other foods).

*Reheat only the amount of food needed for one meal and never reheat a food more than once.

*Don't taste leftovers to determine if they are safe to eat.

*If in doubt, throw it out. Discard outdated, unsafe, or questionable leftovers in the garbage disposal or in tightly wrapped packages that cannot be consumed by people or animals.

Cleaning Up.
*Wash dishes, utensils, and equipment by hand or in a dishwasher with hot soapy water after every meal (or put them in the dishwasher on rinse and hold until you have a full load).

*Clean the table and counter tops and the stove with a soapy cloth after each use.

*Wipe up spilled food and keep dry food containers tightly closed to discourage roaches and other unwelcome "visitors".

*Keep keys of the kitchen, especially cats than can climb onto counters and table tops.

*Keep doors and windows closed, when possible, to avoid letting flies and other insects into the house.

*Store insect sprays and cleaning supplies in their original containers or appropriately marked bottles away from food.

Taylor was also indicted on four counts of possessing a forged instrument.

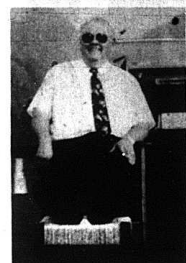

Local resident killed in fire

An 86-year-old Casey County man and his housekeeper died early Monday morning after a fire at the man's residence.

Herman Peyton of Hustonville was pronounced dead at the scene of the 12:52 a.m. fire.

Mr. Peyton was the husband of the late Nina Cox of Mt. Vernon and brother-in-law to Mrs. Cynthia Cox, also of Mt. Vernon.

Coroner J.C. Atwood said Peyton and his housekeeper, Betty Deloach, 50, of Stanford, died of smoke inhalation. Ms. Deloach died at Ephraim McDowell Regional Medical Center in Danville.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation by Tommy Smith, an arson investigator with the Kentucky State Police. Smith was not available for comment but Atwood said the fire is believed to have started in the kitchen area.

Atwood said the cause of the fire has not been determined because the ruins of the home were still too hot Monday afternoon for Smith to look through them. Foul play is not suspected, he said.

Deputy Sheriff Jeff Coffman said the blaze was apparently discovered by a neighbor who saw the glow from the flames. The neighbor alerted Peyton's son, Bill, who lives next door.

Coffman, who lives five or six miles from the Peytons, was one of the first to arrive on the scene. He

said Bill Peyton was already there when he arrived.

"I tried to get in the front door, but there was so much smoke I just couldn't go in," said Coffman.

Coffman said Bill Peyton showed him the side of the house in which his father's bedroom was located. It was found charred in flames, Coffman said. On the other end of the house was the bedroom used by the housekeeper and Bill Peyton broke a window to gain access to the housekeeper's bedroom.

"I went in with the firefighters and could see a body lying there on the floor," said Coffman. "I had to come to the window two or three times because the smoke was so bad and then we finally dragged her to the window."

Coffman said Ms. Deloach was found near the bedroom window. A Lincoln County firefighter equipped with an air pack found Peyton's body about 10 feet away in a small bathroom.

"If he went in there to get her up," said Coffman, the smoke just trapped both of them."

"He sure was a nice guy," said Coffman of Herman Peyton. "Everybody in that community just loved him."

Peyton lived just across the Lincoln-Casey line on Ky. 906. He was a tobacco and cattle farmer. Last Friday night, he was reelected to the board of directors of the Inter-County Rural Electric Cooperative.

"What Saith the Scriptures"

There are various words used in the scriptures when we discuss the problem of pride, such as, high minded, arrogant, haughty, puffed up, swelling, vain glory, conceited. These words suggest the meanings of: to be lofty in mind, to inflate with self-conceit, showing oneself above others, braggadocio and boastful, to be inflated. Thus pride is that disposition that one feels lifted up, more important or to feel better than others, to be conceited, arrogant and haughty.

Paul charged the rich not to be highminded or proud and arrogant in 1 Tim. 6:17. Pride hides the truth of the scriptures from men's eyes, "I thank thee, O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because thou hast hid these things from the wise and prudent, and has revealed them unto babes." Mt. 11:25. Proud men teach other things and conceit not to wholesome words, even the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the doctrine which is according to godliness, he is proud knowing nothing." 1 Tim. 6:3-4a.

Proud men stir up trouble, "He that is of a proud heart stirreth up strife" Pr. 28:25. Pride can cause us to deny God and his place in our lives as Nebuchadnezzar did in Dan. 4. Pride goes before a destruction and a haughty spirit before a fall. Pr. 16:18; 1 Cor. 10:12. Sometimes we have what we could call, "I'm not as bas" as kind of pride as Luke 18:9-14 teaches us.

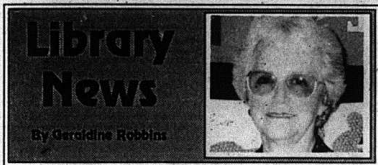

Some new books recently added to our collection are: *Strange Highways* by Dean Koontz....This extraor-

inary book is a first ever collection of two complete novels, plus a compilation of twelve novelettes and short stories. You are about to travel along the strange highway of human experience: the adventures and terrors and failures and triumphs that we know as we make our way from birth to death, along the routes that we choose for ourselves and along others onto which we are detoured by fate. As profound as it is mesmerizing, *Strange Highways* is a remarkable achievement by one of our most powerful mystery writers.

For our science-fiction readers: At last! An all-new epic Anne McCaffrey novel, set in an extraordinary new world, *Freedom's Landing*...Kristin Bjornsen was expecting a normal life, right up until the day the Catteni ships floated into view above the University of Denver. As the enormous door opened at the top of the ramp, and millions were herded into the maw of a vessel that made the Queen Elizabeth look like a bathtub toy, Kristin let her mind go blank and realized that nothing would be normal, ever again.

But on the whole she has survived rather well. The Catteni value strength and intelligence in their slaves. Soon they will find themselves on opposite sides in every great action of the war, with a stunning conclusion at the Battle of Gettysburg.

An excellent non-fiction book is *Reader's Digest Who's Who In The Bible*. This book offers in-depth portraits of more than 500 biblical characters, from Moses' brother Aaron to

Child's Play From Birth To Age 3

Babies play at every stage of development. Infants learn about how the world works by looking at their own hands, grabbing rattles or hitting objects. Actions that are repeated many times, such as playing with toes, soon become more constructive as babies continue their physical development. Being able to sit up or move around the room allows babies to explore different kinds of play things.

Toddlers use toys more creatively. As they approach the second year of life, playing alone—solitary play—isn't as much fun as parallel play with other children.

You can help your child develop skills and progress to more advanced kinds of play—encouraging more complex play helps children with important thinking skills and with the social understanding of what they can do and how competent they are. As soon as babies can grasp with their hands they explore toys by putting them into their mouths. By nine months, mouthing toys is not as important or as much fun as banging, shaking, and dumping things.

By age one, babies are putting objects into containers, and they understand that pushing a button or pulling a string can make things happen. The toddler learns what to do with a spoon, a cup, and a telephone.

It's exciting to watch how an eighteen-month-old child uses objects to act out familiar activities like eating, drinking, and telephoning.

By age two, children are able to use pretend objects in place of real

ones. A block becomes a piece of pie, some paper becomes a cookie. At this age, children pretend to be the adults they see in their lives—mommies, daddies, and even doctors! Learning how to pretend is the beginning of dramatic play and is an important first step in learning how to play pretend games with other children. In learning how to play make believe, the toddler is becoming a creative individual.

As a parent, you have an important job in the development of your young child's play skills. Babies need you to talk and sing to them, and to provide many kinds of materials for them to explore. Most importantly, you must let the baby choose the toys and activities. Offer many kinds of toys and activities, but stop when the baby is tired and no longer wants to play.

Toddlers need you to play with them in games they choose themselves. You can help by giving suggestions and helping children play in more complex ways. Withdraw from the play when your child can handle the activities alone.

It's fun to "play house" with a two-year-old when the toddler is able to eat the pretend food you offer and feed you in return. The way you play helps your child learn about appropriate behavior.

Children with mild or severe disabilities may not develop play skills as quickly as other children. Their

play develops in the same stages, but more slowly, and at later ages. If your child has a disability or developmental delay, you should provide lots of (Cont. to B8)

WRP sign-up begins May 30 at NRCS

Landowners in Rockcastle County will have the opportunity to sign-up for the Wetlands Reserve Program at the Natural Resources Conservation Service (formerly, the Soil Conservation Service) office during the sign-up period (for the program beginning May 30, 1995).

"The Wetlands Reserve Program or WRP is a voluntary U.S. Department of Agriculture program that is now being administered by the natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)," said Randall Templeman, NRCS district conservator for Rockcastle County. "The Wetlands Reserve Program offers landowners a chance to sell an easement to the federal government and to receive payments for restoring and protecting wetlands on their property. Our office has detailed information about the program and our personnel can respond to inquiries or questions about WRP."

The WRP sign-up will last for thirty days from May 30-June 30, 1995. During that time, landowners who feel that they may want to enroll acreage into the program need to do so at the NRCS office in Mt. Vernon.

"There are a number of factors about WRP that landowners should know about before applying for the program," said Templeman. First, at the time of application, landowners who wish to enroll in the WRP must provide a copy of the legal document by which they took title of the land. The document can be a deed or other legal item. Second, there is a 1,000-acre maximum limit for enrollment and landowners can expect to receive the appraised agricultural value of the land for easement.

The third major factor is that the landowner may sell either a permanent or 30-year easement with priority being given to permanent easements."

A landowner must have owned the land, that is to be enrolled in the WRP, at least 12 months prior to June

30, 1995, the last day of the WRP sign-up period. The land has to be an eligible wetland as determined by the Natural Resources Conservation Service and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The landowner controls public access and use of WRP lands. The WRP easement does not open these areas to public hunting, fishing, or other forms of recreation unless allowed by the landowner.

Some compatible land uses, such as hunting, fishing, timber harvest and oil and gas exploration, may be permitted on the restored acreage when such uses are consistent with the long-term protection and enhancement of wetland functions and values.

Landowners will be responsible for protecting and maintaining the wetlands within the boundaries of the WRP easement. Also, landowners will receive full payment for the easement upon closing or recording of the easement.

Landowners are incorporated, copies of organizational documents such as articles of incorporation, partnership agreements, trusts and other similar items must be provided when the parties own the property sign the application.

Landowners will be working with the soil and water conservation districts, US Fish and Wildlife Service, and others to assist landowners apply and participate in the program.

The Wetlands Reserve Program provides a unique opportunity for farmers to retire marginal cropland and reap the benefits of having wetlands on their property. For more information on the WRP sign-up, call the Natural Resources Conservation Service office at 256-2541.

help and direction for play skills to move along from stage to stage.

If your child has severe physical or intellectual delays, you may need to help your child use feet, hands, eyes, and ears to explore objects. A child with disabilities—or any child at early stages of play—needs to experience how things feel (soft, rough, bumpy, smooth) and have the senses stimulated. You could stroke your child with feathers, or join in water play.

You may need to help your child focus attention in a mirror, or wiggle fingers and toes in the sand or water. Lots of smiles, hugs, and praise will encourage new play behaviors.

If your child has a milder developmental delay, you need to be aware of the next steps in play development and help your child reach those steps. A toddler playing alone needs encouragement to play near other children. The child needs help in learning how to play for longer periods of time with the same toy.

Your child may need help in learning to play appropriately with toys. Show how dolly can be fed and put to bed, or that mommy can be called by turning the dial on the telephone and talking into the receiver.

For babies, it's good to have toys that you and the baby can look at together. Talking about and playing with toes, fingers, and other body parts is just as wonderful as having rattles or soft animals to touch, chew on, or shake.

After the first few months of life, give toys which your child can use to make something happen rather than just watch or listen to. A toy that pops back up when it is pushed over is

better than a wind-up toy.

For a toddler, rings to stack are better than a toy that talks when a string is pulled.

Children are playful by nature. They want to play every chance they get, and they learn each time they play. Take advantage of that! Encourage play at every level to help your child develop better physical, mental, language, and social skills.

Solitary play. Children play alone with their own toys or activities and do not try to make contact with nearby children. This is the first kind of play; it continues with varying levels of sophistication as children develop.

Some play behaviors are—manipulating, banging, shaking, visually exploring, filling-dumping, simple means-end play, such as pushing a button to make something happen.

The child is interested in the play of other children—functional use of common objects, functional play. Acts out familiar activities, understands "pretend" (such as eating imaginary food), simple representational play—uses objects appropriately, such as feeding doll or putting it to bed.

Children play independently but near each other. There is close contact but little if any mutual play. The toys may be similar but one children doesn't try to influence the other's play—representational play with objects. Manipulates doll to do common things, such as look in mirror or kiss another doll. Combined representational play—child does series of pretend activities, such as pouring and drinking pretend milk. Symbolic play—pretend objects are used for real objects. Sand becomes a piece of cake, and a block can be a car. Role play—child takes on role or familiar people.

Associative play. Children share, borrow, and lend play materials

among themselves. There is usually no common goal, even though the materials may be the same or similar.

play is sequential—they act out simple daily routines, such as un-

dressing a doll, washing and diapering it, drying it, and putting clothes back on.

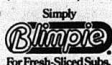

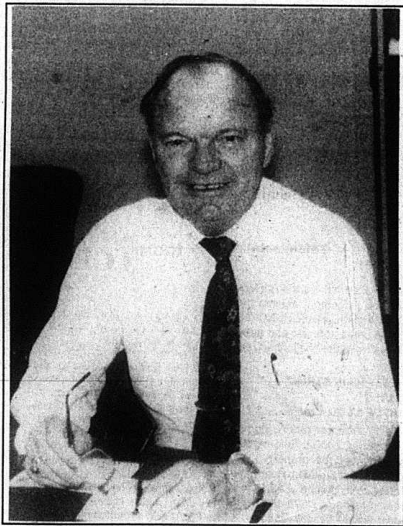

Producers are reminded that July 1st is the deadline to sign burley tobacco leases and sales of quota. Farms leasing away their quota must ensure that ALL owners have signed the lease, or it cannot be approved. Farms leasing quota should check the County Office to be sure that all signatures have been obtained.

Wheat and Feed Grain set aside begins June 1st and extends until October 31st. These acres cannot be hayed or pastured during this five

month period. Participating farms are randomly checked for compliance, failure to comply will result in a penalty.

Crop reports are REQUIRED this year on farms that will market tobacco in 1995. As soon as crops are planted, please contact CFSA at 256-2525 to schedule a convenient time to file your report. Deadline is July 15, but if you come in as soon as planting is completed you are sure to miss long lines of waiting, if it is impossible for you to come in during office hours (7:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m) contact us and we will work out a time after hours for reporting.
