



Language is a system of symbols ipeople use in communicate with each other. It is one way to receive and give information. Three systems work together to produce language:

"The input system-called recepture language-which takes in enformation through the senses.
"The output system-speaking, gesturing, or writing.
"The symbol system, which allows the input and output to work together.

Receptive language is the input system of language. It is what we see and hear and the information that we take in. Receptive language is the comprehension of information.

Language does not improve according to age alono—it develops as one skill helps the next. One can early skill develops, it allows more difficult skills to be learned. Language develops in a way similar to physical or movement skills. One stage leads to the next. Receptive language skills begin as early as birth and get stronger with each stage in development.

When your child speaks or points to an object, be sure to imitate the sound and then give your child the label (the name of the object). For

label (the name of the object). For example, if your child points to doe, give the label, "dog,"
Talk at a speed your child can understand. You may need to talk more slowly than xou usually do. Stress the words you are teaching by saying them louder, longer, or in a high voice. Produce your words clearly without exaggerating them too much.

Enlarge on your child's topic by adding related information to whatever your child is talking about. If your child shows you a dog, talk about what a dog sounds like or eats. Don't ask your child too many questions! Comment on your child encivities, speak clearly, and provide more information. Also, don't make your child imitate all your words. Language stimulation should be fun, not work.

Stress testing is a very important step in evaluating cardiac function. The patient has lead wires hooked to electrodes placed at various spots on the chest. He/she will then be asked to walk on a treadmill while the technician and physician carefully monitor the function of the heart during the "stress" of walking.

to keep their coats on inside. In fact, one of Mrs. Scoggin's duties, besides enriching young minds, was to build a fire in that old castiron stove on frosty mornings - a rustic contrast to modern teaching facilities.

After the one room schools After the one room scinosistated in 1958, Mrs. Scoggins began teaching elementary classes at Brodhead. After being aclassroom teacher nearly 40 years. Mrs. Scoggins retired in 1974, and began substituting.

When asked her opinion about the recent education reforms, she maintained her belief in the effectiveness of the old ways. As for KERA and block scheduling, Mrs. Scoggins states, "I guess those things are good if you like them, but I don't care much for them."

them, but I don't care much for them."

In Mrs. Scoggins' opinion, one of the most unfortunate changes in educating since she began her career in the days of one room schools involves a lack of caring about education that seems to have developed. The parents don't seem to care as much as they sixed to. Some kids don't seem to care as much as they should either."

Mrs. Scoggins said that this will probably be her last year for substituting. Afterwards she plans to devote more time to her hobbies: sewing and cooking. If so, she will certainly be missed by many Rockeastle County students.
