Dairy Products are so versatile, appetizing, and nutritious it's hard to imagine planning a meal without them. Even between meals, when friends drop by unexpectedly, the kids want a little something before dinner, or when you're just hungry for something good to eat, dairy products fill the bill.

YOGURT. Keep a supply of yogurt on hand to make a wide variety of dishes in no time. Plain or vanilla are the most versatile flavors.

Combine your favorite cold breakfast cereal (bran flakes, frosted or fruit variations) with vanilla yogurt for a crunchy, refreshing, change-of-pace breakfast.

Zip up vegetables with a topping of plain yogurt mixed with seasonal herb's and spices such as

fresh basil, dill, or parsley.

Blend 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard with 1 cup plain yogurt, salt and pepper to taste, and use as a sandwich spread and for tuna and chicken salad recipes.

Combine 1 cup fruit-flavored yogurt, 1/2 cup milk and 1/2 cup crushed ice in a blender. Process until smooth for a delicious snack-time fruit drink.

Alone, or as an ingredient, cheese is a popular menu item for millions of families. Keep a variety of brick and grated cheeses on hand to whip up satisfying snacks, or use in soups or casseroles, and as toppings.

Serve an attractive appetizer consisting of a thin slice of Swiss cheese and smoked ham wrapped around a whole green onion.

Fruit and cheese make a

terrific team. Pair up a piece of Cheddar with a pear or apple slice and serve on whole wheat crackers.

Thread chunks of Mozzarella cheese and fresh tomato on toothpicks or short wooden skewers. Marinate for 1 hour in prepared Italian dressing and fresh chopped basil. Drain and serve.

Cut Large Round Bale Hay Losses

Decisions now on where and how large round bales of hay are stored will determine how much and of what quality this winter's feed supply will be. One should also look at the financial consideration for using round bales by measuring hay losses.

Studies on the weathering effects of hay stored in different ways show some interesting facts. A round bale that is 4-5 feet in diameter and 4 feet wide occupies a total volume of 64 cubic feet. Even though 4 inches is only 7% of the bale diameter, a weathered layer 4 inches deep over the entire surface of the bale, including ends, would contain 39% of the total package volume. Even a layer that was only 2 inches deep over the surface would occupy 22% of the bale volume. Losses on the ends of exposed round bales do not penetrate as far into the bale as on the outer circumference of the bale. When losses on the end of the bale are disregarded, a 4 inch deep layer contains 28% of the total bale volume. Since the ratio of surface area to volume decreases with

increasing bale size, larger round bales should have smaller storage losses on a percentage basis.

With these facts in mind, what can be done to save hay? Whenever possible, store hay inside. Better quality hay and alfalfa hays should be stored inside first. Long stem fescue will bale tighter and shed water better.

Bale storage sites should be well drained. Any method such as crushed stone, poles, tires, and pallets which will keep round bales off the ground will prevent damage from ground water. And don't forget the obvious. Store hay so that weeds and trees do not prevent good air movement for drying. Bale storage areas located under trees or allowed to grow up in weeds will have even higher losses than reported earlier.

New bale tarps are on the market that allow large stacks of hay to be covered. Special pockets allow pipes and ropes to secure the sides to prevent wind damage. Farmers find, with care, that bale tarps last up to 5 years and store hay just as

well as barns. One might look at hay loss like a mowing machine or rake that left 25% to 30% of the hay in your field. Most farmers would not stand for a shoddy job, but accept large bale storage losses as unpreventable.

INSPECTION PERIOD

For the Property Tax Assessment Roll

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from June 26 through July 11. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January, 1995, assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1995 will be due about September 15, 1995. The tax roll in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing the appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals. Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Property Taxation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Revenue Cabinet may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Local man arrested after shooting incident

A Buffalo Hollow man was arrested Monday evening after he apparently shot a neighbor in the chest with a handgun.

William Harper, 50, was charged with first degree assault and receiving stolen property after he apparently got into an argument with a neighbor over a property boundary.

According to Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Doug Thomas, the arresting officer, Isidro Cadena, 30, also of Buffalo Hollow was shot once in the chest at close range with a .38 caliber pistol. The deputy said that Cadena's wife witnessed the shooting and called police.

Thomas said that Harper was arrested following the 6 p.m. incident and lodged in the Rockcastle County jail.

Cadena was treated at the Rockcastle Hospital and transferred to the University of Kentucky Medical Center where he was listed in satisfactory condition on Tuesday.

Harper is free on bond pending a hearing in Rockcastle District Court in July.

Robinson died of apparent heart attack

Rockcastle County Deputy Coroner Roy Martin announced this week that Linzil Franklin "Tensley" Robinson, 46, who was found dead last week in Ice Cave Hollow died from a heart attack.

Martin said that state medical examiners in Frankfort said that no foul play was involved in Robinson's death.

Robinson had been missing for nearly two weeks when a gopher hunter found his badly decomposed body.

Robinson, who received the bronze star and purple heart while serving in the Vietnam War, will be buried Thursday in the Briarfield Cemetery at Brush Creek. (See complete obituary on Page A-3)

12-year-old cave explorer slightly injured in fall

A Greenville Ohio, girl on a week long cave exploring trip in Rockcastle County, was slightly injured Tuesday when she fell from a ledge while exploring the Climax cave.

Garry Hansel, of the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad, said that the youth was about a half mile back in the cave when the accident occurred and that supervisors, taking no chances after the fall because of possible neck injuries, did not move her until she could be removed by rescue workers and ambulance attendants.

The young spelunker received only a minor neck injury in the fall. She was part of a group from Ohio that is exploring caves this week in Rockcastle.

According to court records, no new trial date has been set and Senters was released on bond, with the condition that he stay under house arrest.

Because of price-fixing scheme

Milk companies will pay \$250,000

Suppliers who victimized 68 school districts will have to pay nearly \$8 million dollars for price fixing.

The money is part of a \$11.2 million antitrust settlement, said Attorney General Chris Gorman.

Companies involved are South-em Belle, Flav-O-Richard and Pe/Land-O-Sun.

Rockcastle will receive an initial payment of \$150,297 and a three-year annual payment of \$33,577.

Rockcastle County School finance officer Richard Bray said that it had been suggested by the state that at least one-third of the money received

by each school be spent in the food service budget. "The board may opt to spend all of it in that program, since that is where the money was paid from to begin with," he said. "It is totally up to them."

Jackson will receive \$121,346 and \$27,109 annually. Laurel will get \$202,199 and \$45,172 annually. Pulaski will receive \$261,275 and \$58,370 annually. Lincoln will get \$201,576 and \$45,033 annually and East Bernstadt will get \$8,811 and \$1,968 annually.

For ten years, the companies "carved out for themselves areas of

the state in which they would have no competition," Gorman said at a news conference.

The settlement resulted from a federal lawsuit filed by Gorman's predecessor, Fred Cowan, in 1990. The suit was divided into three cases in U.S. district courts at Covington, Owensboro and London.

The announcement stemmed from the London case, the largest of the three. The Covington and Owensboro cases are pending.

The affected districts are mainly

in southeastern and Central Kentucky. Gorman said each would receive an initial lump-sum payment, followed by three annual installments.

Sixteen districts will get initial payments of more than \$100,000. The largest - \$319,814 - will go to Harlan County schools.

James Jay, administrative assistant to Pike County Superintendent Roo Johns, said the district will use its \$523,997 share of the settlement (a lumpsum of \$313,730 plus \$70,089

Tobacco support program under attack again in Washington

In what might be the most serious congressional threat Kentucky tobacco farmers have faced, a California Republican has proposed an amendment to eliminate all money for the federal tobacco program.

U.S. Rep. Scotty Baesler, D-Lexington, said recently that if the proposed became law, it would cause tobacco prices to plummet and undercut trade measures designed to protect foreign tobacco.

"This is a serious threat," Baesler said. "We could lose" if the measure comes to the floor for a vote by the full House.

A floor vote is likely because U.S. Rep. Bob Livingston, R-La., the powerful chairman of the Appropriations Committee, has promised to block efforts to prevent it.

The amendment to the agriculture appropriations bill was co-sponsored by U.S. Rep. Frank Riggs, R-Calif., who was born in Louisville, and Rep. Richard Durbin, D-Ill., a longtime tobacco opponent.

There have been other moves to cut off funding for the federal tobacco program. But this promises to be the first time, at least in recent years, that there has been a floor vote on the issue.

Riggs and Durbin proposed the

amendment during a subcommittee meeting.

U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers, R-Somerset, said that the proposal took him by surprise and that he was working to defeat it. Rogers said he spoke with House Speaker Newt Gingrich about the farmers' predicament.

"He said he would be helpful," Rogers said of Gingrich.

Because of anti-tobacco sentiment in Congress, tobacco state-lawmakers will have to work hard to educate their colleagues to win a House vote, Baesler said.

"What we've got here is people who don't know a damn thing about the tobacco program," he said.

The federal government does not subsidize farmers for tobacco the same way it does for corn, wheat and other crops. Tobacco farmers and cigarette companies pay into a fund

Have they ever been told that if they don't "straighten-up" they'll have you sent to "reform school," or "Greendale," or "the pen"? Has that ever come true?

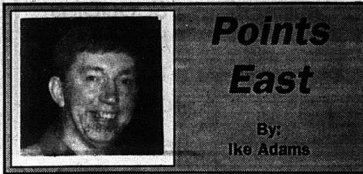
Can they recall some people going berserk when they heard "The war's over!" Like dancing in the front yard or shooting out the street light?

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Rockcastle Co. Schools to operate Jr. Reserve Officers Training Corp

On March 8, 1994 the Rockcastle County Board of Education approved an application with the United States Army to establish a JROTC Program in the school district.

Superintendent Big W. Towery, Jr. was notified on March 22, 1995 that the Rockcastle County High School had been approved to host an JROTC Program starting in School Year 1995-96.

The JROTC Program prepares high school cadets for responsible

leadership roles while making them aware of their rights, responsibilities and privileges as American citizens. The program is a stimulus for promoting graduation from high school and it provides instruction and rewarding opportunities which will benefit the cadet, community, and nation.

The JROTC Program is a cooperative effort on the part of the Army and the host institution to provide secondary school students the oppor-

tunity for total development. Control of the curriculum at host institutions is the prerogative of school officials and faculty.

The flexibility of the program allows it to bear scrutiny of professional educators and to meet the need of the community. Satisfactory completion of the program can lead to advance placement credit in the Senior ROTC Program or to advance rank in the armed forces.

Overall Program Desired Learning Outcomes:

1. Appreciation of the ethical values and principles that underlie good citizenship which include integrity, responsibility and respect for continued authority.
2. Development of leadership potential with the abilities to live and work cooperatively with others.
3. Ability to think logically and to communicate effectively both orally and in writing.
4. Appreciation of the importance of physical fitness in maintaining good health.
5. Knowledge of the effects and dangers of substance abuse, ways to resist pressures to try drugs and how to help others to avoid them.
6. Development of mental man-

agement ability, include goal setting, visualization and positive self talk. (Cont. to 6)

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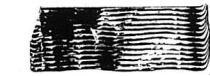

a year for three years) to improve the cafeteria and lunch programs.
"Every nickel you get in the school system will help," Clay said.
About \$3.3 million of the settlement will go to attorneys hired by the state to handle the years long litigation, Gorman said.

One of the attorneys, W. Gordon Hamlin Jr. of Atlanta, said the affected districts bought more than 300 million half-pints of milk, during the 10 years of conspiracy which ended in 1990.

A competitive price during much of the period would have been about 12 cents a half pint, but the districts typically paid about 2 cents more, Hamlin said.

Officials in the districts "were given false answers" whenever they questioned price increases, Hamlin said. They would be told fuel or raw milk costs had gone up or a new labor contract had raised costs, Hamlin said. "They were excuses...that the school district people couldn't track down because they didn't have access to the internal records of the company," Hamlin said.

Flores-Rich and Southern Belle pleaded guilty to criminal charges in Kentucky. Pet pleaded guilty in five other states but not in Kentucky "and contested liability throughout the lawsuit," Hamlin said.

Money to be shared by the districts - nearly \$7.9 million - represented triple damages for money lost in the last four years of the conspiracy, Hamlin said.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has recommended that districts put at least part of the money back into school lunch programs, but the awards are unrestricted, Hamlin said.

The conspiracy involved dozens of suppliers and allegedly stretched across 24 states. The settlement announced yesterday was the third largest, Hamlin said. Florida has collected \$33 million and Texas \$15 million, he said.

Cowan, who left office in January 1992, returned to the Capitol for the news conference. He said it was "a great victory for the children of Kentucky. It's a great thing for the attorney general's office as an institution to do."

that is used to keep the price of tobacco stable and high enough to be profitable. The government tells farmers how much tobacco they can sell each year.

According to figures provided last year by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the federal government spends \$16 million to administer the program.

But U.S. Sen. Wendell Ford, D-Ky., said tobacco farmers pay the government \$23 million a year in assessments on their tobacco. So the government will lose about \$7 million by eliminating the federal tobacco program, Ford said.

Baessler says Agriculture Department figures show the government would lose even more - \$30 million a year.

The government also could be left holding the bag because it guarantees loans by tobacco cooperatives, which use their huge stocks of tobacco as collateral. Baessler said the value of that tobacco might fall by \$1 billion if the program is abolished.

If federal money for the program is cut off, presumably it would be up to the farmers and cigarette companies to run their own price-support program, Rogers said. But he said the program would have to be set up so it did not violate antitrust laws, which generally prevent price-fixing.

Baessler does not think a price-support program would succeed if the government was not involved. He said there would be nothing to

keep farmers from cheating in a variety of ways and that the program would become unworkable. "You don't have the arm of the law behind you."

If the proposal is approved by the House, it goes to the Senate. The Senate's rules give each senator more power to block legislation, and tobacco-state senators usually have been successful in defending the program.

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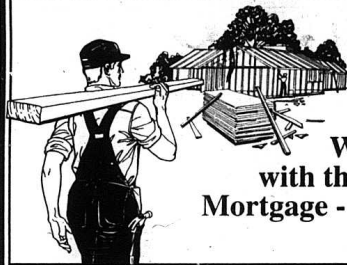

Nathan DeLeon and David King took home run honors for the senior league for the season. Both are Braves and both parked four over the fence to tie for the record.



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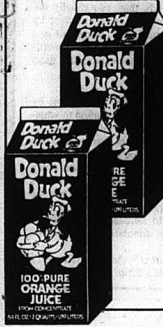
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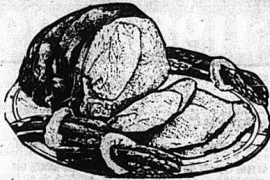

Normal development of receptive language

Language is a system of symbols people use to communicate with each other. It is one way to receive and give information. Three systems work together to produce language:

- The input system—called receptive language—which takes in information through the senses.
- The output system—speaking, gesturing, or writing.
- The symbol system, which allows the input and output to work together.

Receptive language is the input system of language. It is what we see and hear and the information that we take in. Receptive language is the comprehension of information. Language does not improve according to age alone—it develops as one skill helps the next. Once an early skill develops, it allows more difficult skills to be learned. Language develops in a way similar to physical or movement skills. One stage leads to the next. Receptive language skills begin as early as birth and get stronger with each stage in development.

A newborn baby responds to sound. Loud or sudden sounds startle the baby. Within weeks the baby can tell the difference between happy and angry voices. This is seen when the baby coos in response to a pleasant voice.

Auditory perception—when the baby associates meaning with a sound source—is developing now. At 6 months a baby looks around to find the source of a sound. At 9 months, the baby responds to "no." A 1-year-old can follow simple directions. Here

are some points in the sequence of receptive language development:

- 1 Months - Responds to voice
- 2 Months - Eyes follow movement
- 3 Months - Coos in response to pleasant voice
- 4 Months - Turns head toward source of sound
- 5 Months - Responds to own name
- 6 Months - Appears to recognize words like daddy, bye-bye and mama
- 7 Months - Shows interest in sounds of objects
- 8 Months - Recognizes the names of some common objects
- 9 Months - Follows simple directions ("Find the ball." "Give me the ball.")
- 10 Months - Understands no and stop
- 11 Months - Appears to understand simple questions ("Where is the ball?")
- 12 Months - Recognizes names of objects, people, pets, and action verbs
- 13-18 Months - Understands some new words each week - identifies pictures in a book - identifies a few body parts - identifies some common objects
- 19-24 Months - Recognizes many common objects and pictures when named - Understands possession ("Where's Mama's shoe?") - Follows many simple directions
- 25-30 Months - Understands the use of objects - Understands prepositions (in, on, off, out of, up, down) - Understands simple questions - Understands pronouns (I, me, my, mine)

Enlarge on your child's topic by adding related information to whatever your child is talking about. If your child shows you a dog, talk about what a dog sounds like or eats. Don't ask your child too many questions! Comment on your child's activities, speak clearly, and provide more information. Also, don't make your child imitate all your words. Language stimulation should be fun, not forced.

Della Scoggin has seen a lot of changes in 50 years of teaching

Mrs. Della Scoggin is a friendly and familiar face to most of us here at RCHS. She is not only currently a popular substitute teacher, but also has nearly 50 years of experience in educating.

Mrs. Scoggin graduated from

the Langdon Memorial Presbyterian School, an all girls boarding school which was located in Mt. Vernon.

She attended two years of college at Asheville Teacher's College in Asheville, North Carolina where she played forward for that school's basketball team. Of course, the uniforms back then were more modest than today's. They were a one piece knee-length uniform, which, according to Mrs. Scoggin resembled old-time "bloomers."

After attending ATC for two years, she transferred to Eastern Kentucky Teacher's College, (which is now EKU), and graduated from there in 1936.

Mrs. Scoggin's career in education began, nearly 60 years ago when she began teaching fourth grade at Livingston School in the 1937-38 school year.

She began instructing the next year in a one room school at Ottawa, where she taught all eight elementary grades. In the following years, she taught in other one room schools in the Brodhead area, including one at Quail.

In her early days of teaching in those primitive rural schools Mrs.

Scoggin earned a humble income of \$3.00 a day.

Mrs. Scoggin has many memories of the one room school era, a time now lost to a past that seems distant. There are many things that we now take for granted that they lacked at schools back then.

The Mt. Vernon Signal Thursday, June 22, 1995 P-85
There was no electricity or running water at the one room schools. The students all had to bring their lunches, and a cup to get a drink from a nearby well. During the 1930's, Mrs. Scoggin was able to go to Mt. Vernon and pick up containers of grapefruit juice, or whole

grapefruit, which the federal government distributed to one room schools. This was a part of early welfare programs initialized during the years of the Great Depression, and such citrus fruits were distributed in rural areas to fight vitamin C deficiencies.

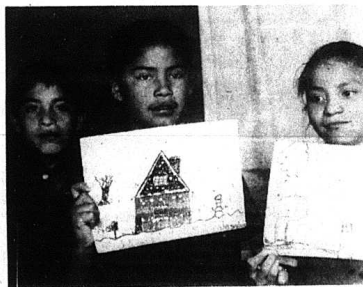

unless they travel to the top of a nearby volcano. We also found out that these children don't have heat or air conditioning. Their church does not have completed walls. We feel very lucky here in the United States, and have enjoyed sharing experiences with our south of the border friends. Here is one of our Spanish letters:

?Como estas? Gracias por esta carta. Espero que estes bien. Gracias por tu dibujo. Esta muy bonito. Me a hido muy bien en la escuela voy con buenas calificaciones que te valia bien. Con amor, Dan Miguel

Translation:
Hello Nick,
How are you? Thank you for the letter. I hope that you are well. Thank you for the drawing. It is very pretty. I am doing well in school with good grades. May things go well with you. With love, Dan Miguel

Many local people had never seen a grapefruit before, and often the whole fruits could be found left lying along side of roads. Apparently, the children, unconvincing of the edibility of the sour fruits, determined them to be better suited for balls.

Each school had an outhouse, and the families of students would take turns providing out-dated Sears and Roebuck Catalogs for toilet paper.

There was a large pot-bellied stove for heat, but schoolhouses were sometimes still drafty and cold, causing students to often have

to keep their coats on inside. In fact, one of Mrs. Scoggins's duties, besides enriching young minds, was to build a fire in that old cast-iron stove on frosty mornings - a rustic contrast to modern teaching facilities.

After the one room schools were closed and consolidated in 1958, Mrs. Scoggins began teaching elementary classes at Brodhead. After being classroom teacher nearly 40 years, Mrs. Scoggins retired in 1974, and began substituting.

When asked her opinion about the recent education reforms, she maintained her belief in the effectiveness of the old ways. As for KERA and block scheduling, Mrs. Scoggins states, "I guess those things are good if you like them, but I don't care much for them."

In Mrs. Scoggins' opinion, one of the most unfortunate changes in educating since she began her career in the days of one room schools involves a lack of caring about education that seems to have developed. "The parents don't seem to care as much as they used to. Some kids don't seem to care as much as they should either."

Mrs. Scoggins said that this will probably be her last year for substituting. Afterwards she plans to devote more time to her hobbies, sewing and cooking. If so, she will certainly be missed by many Rockcastle County students.

Shaun Jones participating in Appalachian Explorers

This summer, Shaun Jones from Mt. Vernon, is spending three weeks between June 11 through July 1 at the University of Kentucky as a participant in the Appalachian Explorers Program, a three week residential program for academically talented students from throughout the central Appalachian region.

Selection for the program is highly competitive and Shaun was chosen from over 150 applicants to participate in the Appalachian Explorers Program. Twenty-four rising ninth grade students were selected on the basis of their academic record, recommendations, and the quality of an essay examining a problem or a problem of scientific concern in their local community.

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
