We have been getting a lot of new books for the children to read and enjoy, especially R.L. Stine books. Some new adult fiction books available are, *The Witness* by Sandra Brown...one of the most popular writers of the decade, Sandra Brown is a proven master storyteller who brings to life strong, authentic characters, powerful suspense, and absorbing plots that explode with the unexpected. Now in her newest contemporary novel, she spins a tale of danger, excitement, and compelling relationships.

After Kendall Deaton pulls herself and her baby out of a wrecked car, a mixture of courage and terror gets her to the top of a ravine, where she flags in for help. But she doesn't dare give the hospital her real name or the true identity of the car's injured driver. She tells them only that he is her husband. And as quickly as she can, she starts to plan their escape.

Kendall's nightmare began when she came to Prosper, South Carolina, to be the best public defender the county ever had. She quickly fell in love with Prosper's most eligible bachelor, and after a whirlwind courtship had a fairy-tale perfect wedding. Her father-in-law made her feel like part of the family, the kind of close, loving family she had always dreamed could be hers. When she became pregnant, Kendall's happiness seemed complete.

She never suspected that coming to Prosper had plunged her into the midst of a chilling conspirator of bigotry and hate or that she had become a player in an aberrant deception. I have just finished this book and it is the best book that I have read lately. I'm sure that many of you will enjoy it also.

Another excellent book that we have just received is *Don't Cry Now* by Joy Fielding...Ms. Fielding is the bestselling author of *Tell Me No Secrets* and once again unfurls her extraordinary talent to keep readers turning the pages—with the lights on and the doors bolted—in a domestic thriller in which terror and devotion spar for a place in a mother's heart. Fielding handles her material with finesse.

A new western book is *Murphy's Ambush* by Gary Faulson...When Al Murphy left his job as sheriff of Cinch-

erville years ago he thought his life as a lawman was over. But within the fairly short time since he had arrived in Turrot, New Mexico, Murphy had become a sheriff again and was rebuilding his life. He had friends, he could trust with his life and he had done so on more than one occasion. He was even falling in love again.

Life in Turrot was normally rather quiet, so everyone was shocked when Travis Price rode into town wounded. When Doc Woods tried to patch up Travis, Murphy rode out to the Price homestead and found the bodies of Travis' wife and two children. Murphy set out tracking the killers, determined to follow them as long as he had to and wherever he needed to in order to bring the killers to justice.

Bring your children in and while they are enjoying the programs look over the good selection of books, magazines, videos and other materials that we have to offer.

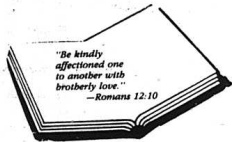

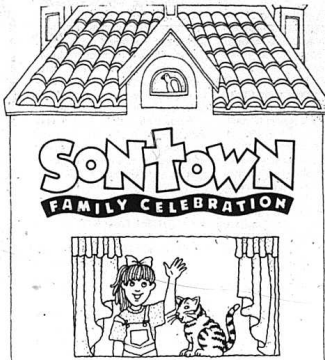

## The Caring Connection

### Cause and Effect

#### Make Things Happen

Understanding cause and effect is an important part of your child's intellectual development. It is meaningful because your child begins to wonder how things work. He becomes a "little scientist" learning through trial and error. Because of their drive to explore, young children seek new ways to manipulate objects. They seem to ask themselves, "What else can I do with this?"

This exploration usually starts at about six months of age, and by 15 months, children understand that something happens because of their action. If your child flips the light switch, the room will become dark. Or, if she pulls the cat's tail, the cat will move. Because of what your child did, something else happened. Children are not born understanding this connection.

To nurture your child's interest in how things work, provide opportunities for her to experience the relationship between cause and effect. Playing with simple materials such as dirt, sand, water, paints, blocks, and crayons offer children the opportunity to make things happen. When he moves crayons or paints on paper, lines and marks appear. When she puts dirt or sand in a pile, a mountain is created. Splashing water gets Mom and Dad wet.

Cause and effect toys that would be of particular interest to your child at this time include balls of different sizes, cars or trucks, pull toys, jack-in-the-box, surprise box and toys or objects that make sounds. When a ball or car is pushed, it moves across the floor. When a knob is turned on a jack-in-the-box, music plays and jack jumps out. For younger infants unable to sit up alone, crib gyms will spark the interest in causality. Crib gyms are of particular interest when they feature a noise-making device.

Learning about cause and effect can be delightful when your child discovers that a toy can be brought closer to him by pulling on a string at the end of a toy. Or, it can be disastrous when he can "reach" a plate of cookies on the kitchen table by pulling on the tablecloth. The important thing to remember is that your child is learning!

#### Who's Sad First?

A grumpy child can bring any parent down. Or is it the other way around? A mother's low spirits may be at the root of a child's crankiness, according to Dr. Morris Green, a professor of pediatrics at the Indiana University Medical Center in Indianapolis. In a recent report in *Contemporary Pediatrics*, Green links depression in mothers to irritability, excessive crying, and frequent tem-

per tantrums in their children. "If mom is depressed or withdrawn, a child will often act up to get her attention," says Green.

#### Hugs For Health

A hug-a-day, not an apple, may be the best preventive measure for an aging doctor away and even lengthening one's life span, according to *Health* magazine.

People in this century are living longer because of improved mental health, says epidemiologist Leonard A. Sagan, M.D., author of *The Health of Nations* (Basic Books, 1987). And the foundation for a healthy mind and a hopeful personality is laid in infancy, he asserts. "Imagine two babies crying," says Dr. Sagan. The mother of one picks it up, cuddles it, and asks, "What's wrong?" As a result that baby feels he has some mastery over his environment. The other baby is left to cry alone in his crib. He feels hopeless, worthless, and unloved.

Warmth and affection received in childhood, whether it's expressed with a hug, a pat on the head, or an attentive and sympathetic ear, is an important to help your child stay healthy. (*American Baby*, January 1990).

#### Diapering Time is Talking Time

Little babies do not understand the words people say, so why bother to talk to them? We should talk to babies because of the caring message it sends. "You may hear your own tone of voice and can sense how you feel, he hears how much you care and learns the sounds he needs for his own language.

Infants are more interested in the human voice than any other sound. They will turn to Mom's voice instead of other women, and turn to Dad's voice instead of other men when they are less than a month old.

Diapering time is an ideal opportunity to talk to your baby. As you change your baby's diaper, look at him and tell him that you love him. Hearing you say these words is much more interesting than hearing other sounds.

What else can you say during

diapering? Tell your baby what's going on around him. Tell him what you are doing and what is happening to him. Just say, "It's time to change your diaper. Ooo, you're going to feel so much better with these dry pants on. Now I'm putting on your yellow pajamas, they're so nice and soft."

Take advantage of diapering time. Talking to your baby sends a message of love. Submitted by the Family Resource Center - 256-2156.

## "What Saith the Scriptures"

In Luke 20:27 we read, "Then came to him certain of the Sadducees, which deny that there is any resurrection; and they asked him, 'They went on to give a scenario of a woman who married a man and he died, she married his brother and he died, and she married another brother up to 7 different men and lastly she died. 'Therefore in the resurrection whose wife of them is she? For seven had her to wife.'" vs. 33. This was a puzzle to the minds of the Sadducees and "proved" there was no resurrection to them. Resurrection is a word that means "a rising up." To the Sadducees, a resurrection concept was foolish, for with them, when men die, they are dead all over. There is nothing that continues to exist after death, they thought, and thus to their minds no need for a resurrection. They denied angel and spirit (as well as the resurrection). Ac. 23:8.

But Jesus answered their mistaken notions and erroneous concepts on this matter. "The children of this world marry, and are given in marriage; But they which shall obtain that world, and the resurrection from the dead, neither marry, nor are given in marriage." vs. 34-35.

Jesus begins to show that after the resurrection, marriage will no longer be an institution for mankind as it is in this world. So a woman who had been married to 7 different men is not a significant point. Jesus goes on to show death will not be around after the resurrection, "Neither can they die any more: for they are equal unto the angels; and are the children of God, being the children of the resurrection," vs. 36. Of course, Jesus is only talking of the righteous here in particular, but he did say all would be raised at the judgment in the 5:28-29, but the wicked will be raised and at the judgment will be consigned to hell which the Bible describes as the second death, Rev. 20:14, 15 and Rev. 6:23. Jesus went on to prove the necessity of a resurrection by proving that the spirit of men continues to exist after physical death. "Now that the dead are raised, even Moses showed at the bush, when he called the Lord the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. For he is not a God of the dead, but of the living: for all live unto him," vs. 37-38. Abraham, Isaac and Jacob had been physically dead for many years when God spoke at the bush in Ex. 3:6. Yet if the dead cease to exist then God is a God of nothing! But, since he said "I am," not "I was" or "I will be," there was a part of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob that continued to exist; i.e., their spirit and that necessitated a resurrection. You will be raised to life or you will be raised to damnation, depending on whether you have done good in serving Christ or done evil by rejecting Christ and living your way.

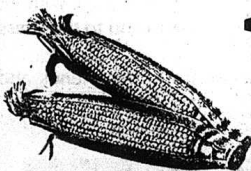

## Farm News

### What is Blackshank?

Blackshank is a fungal disease which affects the roots and lower stem of tobacco plants. By damaging the roots ability to absorb water and the stems ability to move water up into the plant, this disease can lower production or even kill plants.

The first signs of blackshank are very similar to drowning. A wilted plant scalds and dies. Blackshank affected plants will wither during afternoons but return to normal overnight. After 2 to 4 days wilting, many plants will scald and die. Upon further investigation, the roots and lower stem may show dark brown to black diseased areas. The key to positive identification is splitting the stem and finding pith separated in disk. You could describe this as if dimes were stacked one upon the other with a small space between. A lab test is available to confirm visual identification. Only one other thing normally causes disking of the stems pith. When lightning strikes tobacco, disking will occur. However, the mid-vein of leaves will turn black, distinguishing it from blackshank.

The fungus which causes blackshank is moved from one infected field to another by several methods.

Anything that can move dirt or plant trash can move the blackshank fungus. Most typically, we see blackshank moved to a farm by borrowing infected transplants from a farm with blackshank. However, this is not the only means. Sharing plows, disk harrows and setters can allow soil from one field to be moved to another. Mud and dirt clinging to tires can move soil from infected fields. Even cattle can possibly move soil from fields. Fields located in flood prone areas allow soil to be moved in to streams as well as downstream fields in the flood plane. Farmers themselves can be the biggest mover as they spread stalks and stripping room trash on fields.

Blackshank has the ability to survive in soil for many years. Farmers consider this the worst of tobacco diseases because it stays around and causes such high losses. The best method for control is to return infected fields to sod. Move to fields that have not been in

tobacco and use resistant varieties. If you are limited in land for rotations, use resistant varieties plus Rotomul.

Since blackshank can cause large losses, require lower yielding resistant varieties and expensive amounts of chemicals, the best

control method is one of prevention. Do not borrow plows and clean all equipment used in other tobacco fields.

## A Living Trust Instead of a Will?

A living trust is one of the newer estate planning tools that takes the place of a will. A living trust is a legal trust of assets. It is an alternative that avoids the costs of probate when a loved one dies and saves the heirs money.

Other names for the living trust are revocable trust, changeable trust, inter vivos trust, family trust and grantor trust. All of these names refer to the same trust. The Clifford Trust and the Constitutional Family Trust are not the same as a living trust and should not be confused with it. Under probate, whether one dies with or without a will, the estate must be probated to distribute the property of the deceased to the heirs. Probate costs include probate fees, federal and state inheritance taxes (depending on the size of the estate), and other fees associated with settling the estate.

Most estate planning attorneys recommend the revocable living trust as a solution to avoid the probate process. In a revocable living trust, the trust owns all of your assets. You do not hold title to them, but you are the trustee of the living trust. Thus, even though you have relinquished ownership of your assets, you still retain control of them. As the trustee, you continue to have the power to buy, sell, transfer, borrow and do whatever you wish with your assets. Provisions in a living trust can be changed at any time. At your death, since you don't own anything, there is nothing to probate, changes can be made to the living trust at any time.

In a living trust, surviving

trustees are named to take over management of the trust upon your death. Thus, you can specify your surviving trustee at your death. A trusted friend or relative to be responsible for the trust after your death.

Probate can be avoided only if you place all of your assets in the living trust. Any assets that are held outside of the trust become subject to probate at your death. Whether your estate is large or small, simple or complex, a living trust can be used if you want to avoid the costs of probate.

Another advantage of a living trust is that you can provide for the continued care and education of minor children or dependent adults by preserving the size of your estate. Through the living trust you can specify your desires just as you would in a will.

Unlike a will, a living trust is not made a public document at your death and therefore remains confidential. Thus, privacy is another advantage of a living trust. With a probated estate, all documents become public information during and after the probate process, including a will if one exists and an inventory of assets.

Special provisions can be made in a living trust to provide for a surviving spouse as long as he or she lives. Upon the death of the surviving spouse, those assets can then go to the individuals specified by the original spouse.

Although a living trust is more expensive to create than a will, the savings to your estate come through the elimination of probate fees and taxes. The average person will modify his or her will 4 or more

times during his or her lifetime. The lifetime cost of having an up-to-date will ultimately is as costly as creating a revocable living trust.

A revocable living trust usually terminates when the assets are distributed from the trust to the heirs. A revocable living trust

must specify a termination at some point in time.

If you think you want to establish a living trust, consult an attorney for details and help. Be sure to find an attorney who is familiar with estate planning.

Beginning in 1994, burley tobacco quotas will be permanently cancelled on farms that have not produced or

leased away in 2 of the 3 previous years. If this applies to your farm and you do not produce tobacco on your farm or lease away the basic quota by July 1st, your quota will be permanently lost. There is no appeal and no extension for late filing.

Remember July 1st is the deadline to lease or sell your quota.

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

## Twenty-two apply for school's top position

Twenty-two educators have applied for the Rockcastle County Superintendent's job, which came open last month, when current superintendent Biggs Towery, Jr., announced that he was retiring.  
Ken Scott, assistant director of the Kentucky School Board Association, who is helping the Rockcastle

County Board of Education in their search, said Wednesday that five women and seventeen men, had applied for the job.  
Among the applicants are six current superintendents, two assistant superintendents, nine principals and three central office personnel. Eight of the applicants currently hold doctorates.  
Scott said that members of the local screening committee had copies of each application and were currently going over them. The screening committee will meet on Thursday to discuss each application, according to Scott, who said that the committee would try between now and around the middle of July to

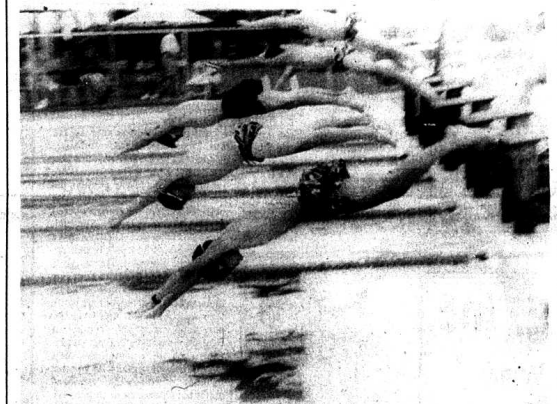
come up with five to six applicants for interview.  
"Of course the board will have access to all the applications and may decide to interview someone other than an applicant the committee recommends," Scott said.  
Only one local educator has applied for the position. Larry Hammond, Rockcastle Director of Student Services is one of the twenty-two applicants.  
Other applicants include former Rockcastle County teachers and two of the applicants are from Ohio and two are from West Virginia. The board's search was basically confined to the state of Kentucky, but

Scott said that the four out of state applicants had some ties to the state.

## 1995-96 county budget just over \$2 million

The final reading of the 1995-96 county budget totaling \$2,024,165 was made by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a called meeting Wednesday.  
Figures show the general fund budgeted at \$551,168. Nearly a million dollars of Rockcastle County taxpayer change will go to the road fund, which is budgeted to spend \$967,950 in 1995-96.  
A Northern Rockcastle Water Improvement Project will take \$36,442 of the budget, these funds are being funneled through the county budget from state grants. The jail budget for next year totals \$339,315, while the local government economic development fund will spend \$36,225. \$86,665 will be spent in the local government economic assistant fund.

## Legislation killed that would have hurt tobacco

U.S. Rep. Harold "Hal" Rogers today led the charge to defeat an attempted elimination of the tobacco program in the full House Appropriations Committee.  
Rogers' efforts defeated a proposal by anti-tobacco advocate Rep. Richard Durbin, 30-17, which would have eliminated the program that provides assistance to tobacco farmers.  
Although the tobacco program costs \$16 million, it operates at no net cost. Tobacco farmers pay a marketing assessment which contributes more than \$32 million toward deficit reduction. As well, the tobacco program contributes over \$12 billion in revenue to the federal and state government in excise taxes.  
"Tobacco means jobs for Kentucky," Rogers said. "This proposal would have hurt the tobacco farmers more than anyone else. While anti-tobacco zealots always aim at the large companies, they end up putting farmers out of business."  
"Tobacco is Kentucky's heritage," Rogers said. "Ever since the time of Daniel Boone, tobacco has generated jobs and dollars for our communities. It is a way of life."

Conducting the search and investigation were members of the Sheriff's department, KSP and Brodhead police officer Joe Bussell.

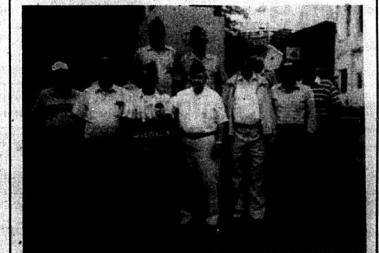
## County may get \$370,000 of \$50 million

"If lawmakers approve the money in a Special Session called by the governor, Rockcastle will get about \$370,837.  
Jackson would get \$395,971; Laurel, \$626,720; Lincoln, \$403,888; Madison, \$516,648 and Pulaski, \$788,353.  
Rockcastle Judge/Executive Buzz Carlifos is happy over the prospect since some county roads need work.  
"I hope the special session of the Legislature does look at more than just redistricting," the judge said. "There are more things affecting all our counties in adverse ways that need to be looked at by the Legislature with regards to money that the state says will be allocated to counties."  
"Contracts will be let by the state on designated county roads. This will make more money available for that purpose," he stated.  
The judge added, "If the Legislature does not act on the roads during the special session, that money could go to other projects in the state and not get here."  
"Regardless, which way, I am for it because a bird in the hand is worth

more than a flock in the bush. In other words, I would definitely want the Legislature to make money advanced to our county now, instead of later."  
Jones, with about five months left in his administration, also announced new guidelines for the state road program, which has been influenced by his political supporters.  
The guidelines will keep Jones' county supporters from dominating how the road money will be spent, but will still allow them and others to make recommendations, said Franklin Jelama, Jones' chief of staff.  
Jones plans to call a special legislative session July 31 to redraw boundaries of legislative districts as required by the Supreme Court and possibly to consider building projects, a tax cut, classroom computers and other budget items.  
Also on his wish list is putting an extra \$50 million in the Road Fund into the Rural and Secondary Road Program.  
The program, created in the 1948 General Assembly, got about \$85 million in the fiscal year that ends June 3. It uses a formula to determine how much money each county should get for its rural roads. The formula takes into consideration how many miles of rural roads a county has.  
Under Jones' plan, the counties actually would get about \$45.5 mil-

lion. The rural roads formula requires about 9 percent of the money to be spent for administrative and emergency purposes.  
"We have bridges that need to be repaired, dangerous roads that need guardrails and many counties that have critical needs for gravel and blaktop," Jones said in a statement.  
"Putting the additional funds into the rural roads program is the best way to ensure that each county receives its fair share and no one is left out."  
The two-year budget bill approved by the 1994 General Assembly spelled out how to spend any surplus in the Road Fund.  
It said any extra money should be used to match federal money for which the state might be eligible, spent up to \$5 million for parkway, rehabilitation, use up to \$2 million a year for resurfacing, spend up to \$2 million a year for snow and ice equipment and put the rest into a Road Fund surplus account.  
Jelama said the governor is following the budget bill by earmarking \$2 million for parkway rehabilitation and \$2 million for snow and ice equipment.  
By using the rural roads formula for allocating money, Jelama said, Jones is "not injecting politics into this situation. Every county benefits."

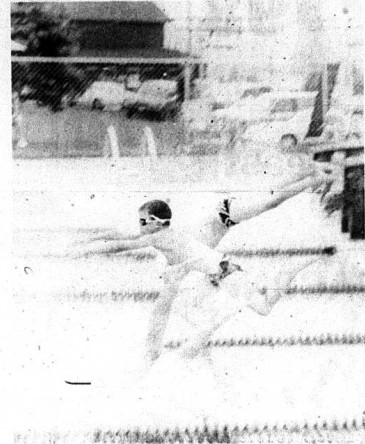

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### Health Care Changes

A few days ago I went to see Tommy Graves who is in the Humana Hospital in Somerset and it suddenly hit me the changes that have come about in the last fifty years since I was a patient and frequent visitor in the old "Somerset City Hospital" and the newer and more modern one I was now in. In case some of my readers know Tommy Graves, and don't know about his illness, he is in serious condition with cancer.

Anyway, when I entered the big front doors of Humana Hospital, that opened automatically when we approached them, a wave of nostalgia swept over me. The broad white tiled hallway ahead was a far cry from the entrance way into the old Somerset City Hospital I was so well acquainted with some fifty years ago. Here there was no desk where one was greeted by a familiar smiling face and told, sometime without being asked, how the patient was that was being visited. A short way down this hall, full of doors leading to the mysteries of the management of big business, we found the elevators and as Polly pushed the button for service she asked if I remembered the little table that used to stand at the foot of the stairway to the patient's rooms upstairs at the old hospital. Something had also triggered her memories of a time before everything, including medical treatment, was automated. A volunteer, usually a "Grey Lady," would be sitting at that little desk giving out visiting cards and one could not get into the upper level where the patients were without one. That is unless he sneaked up the back stairs. And woe be unto the one that was caught trying to do this. He or she would be soundly scolded and marched right back out. Visiting hours were twice a day, two hours in the afternoon and two in the evening and these were strictly adhered to. The cards had a time limit on them, usually five minutes, and each patient was allowed two visitors at a time. If there were several visitors they had to take their turn and wait till the card was returned to the desk. Once in awhile when visitors would overstay their limit a call would go to the floor nurse and they would be asked to leave so others could use the card. The spouse or parent of the patient had priority over all other visitors.

And no children under twelve years old were allowed to visit. I often wonder if the "Grey Ladies" are still active. I haven't seen or

heard of them in years and they were a wonderful organization of volunteer women serving others in their time of need. Their neat grey uniforms were always a welcome sight to me whenever I was a patient in the hospital where they were volunteering their services. On one of these occasions I had to stay several days longer than the doctor had planned and I became quite worried for I had promised to make Polly a Halloween outfit for her trick or treating and Halloween was only a few days away. One morning a cheery "good morning" from the door got a cool greeting back which was enough to alert the lady in grey so she quietly sat down beside my bed and asked why I was depressed. When I told her my problem she patted my face and said, "Now now, you just quit that worrying. I can solve that little old problem in no time." Then getting the description of the costume Polly wanted she left promising to be back before Mat got that that evening. Sure enough there she was just before visiting hours with a package. In that package was the cutest black cat costume I have ever seen. Even to the long tail that could drag the ground or be tossed over the shoulder. Plus candy treats that I hadn't mentioned. Later I found out this special lady was on the board of directors at our bank and also owned a dry cleaning business. She had simply stopped all work for a short time and put her seamstresses to work creating and completing a costume for a little girl she had never met so the little girl's mommy could rest easy while she recuperated from surgery, knowing her promise of a Halloween costume had been fulfilled.

And back then nurses were just that, nurses, with a beautiful white cap perched on their heads that not only identified them as being the professionals they were but the shape and make of the cap identified the school of nursing they had graduated from. They were no record keepers and office workers, their job was to take care of sick people and see that they were nursed back to health. They had been trained to take the vital signs, pulse and temperature, and look for signs of distress, give medication when needed, and soothe an aching feverish body with a gentle rub down. A restless patient, tossing and turning would often find a nurse slipping quietly into the room ready to straighten out the sheets and fluff up the pillows then gently rub down the aching body with lotion. These women were respected professionals

who had been schooled and well trained and lived up to their profession of caring for those who were dependent on their care. And these trained in office management took care of the paper work.

Then there was the doctor's care. I know the world of medicine has come a long way in the past fifty or sixty years but I miss the personal care of an understanding family doctor whose education had been more about the human body and its special needs than about x-rays and picture taking of the innards of mankind. Oh, yes x-rays were used but not to the extent they are today. My family doctor would be sitting at his desk when we had waited our turn and were admitted to his office and take the information himself that he needed to find out what the problem was. If it was something that needed more than some good advice and a dose of pain medicine he would ask the patient to go into the examination room, directly behind his office, and he would personally examine him. Seldom was an x-ray asked for and if it was needed he himself would take it, read it, and treat the problem or recommend hospitalization if it was needed. His probing fingers and questions usually found the problem without the use of x-rays. His simple lab work was done in his own lab and there was never an extra charge for it and he dispensed most of the medicine from his own stock. We never had to wait in a small cubicle undressed and uncomfortable while he went from room to room examining other patients. His concern was for the patient he was caring for at that time and they

got his full attention. Our doctor made housecalls when the patient was too sick to get to the office and the extra charge was minimal. Babies were delivered at home most of the time and the doctor would stay with the laboring mother until her baby arrived, sometimes all night long. Dr. Smith, our family physician, said he had to promise his father, who was also a physician, that he would never refuse to go on a call regardless of the distance or hour of day or night before he (his dad) would pay for his education in medical school. And he kept that promise. Our area of the country was twenty five miles from Somerset, where Dr. Smith lived and had his office, but he was a familiar sight in every home when a doctor was needed. After one of these calls to a neighbor of ours he stopped by our house late one night to watch the election news on TV that had been interrupted by the call he never once complained about it.

And back then patients were kept in the hospital while they recuperated from surgery or serious disease until they were able to take care of themselves at home. Sometimes this took several weeks if the surgery had been of a serious nature. A short forty seven years ago I was kept in the hospital for ten days after Polly was born and there had been no complications. At that time it was believed a woman needed ten days to recuperate from her long ordeal of carrying and bearing a baby. I recently found the bill and receipt of payment of that stay in the hospital and I could hardly believe my eyes, all I had to pay was for baby care and it was ten dollars

\$10.00. Can you imagine only a dollar a day for caring for a newborn baby? The whole bill including the doctor was less than a hundred dollars. (Oh for the good old days). The Somerset City Hospital was long ago turned into a nursing home for those who needed constant care and Humana Inc. built a new and fancier place for the ailing population. It is a beautiful hospital with all

the new fancied machines that have taken the place of an old fashioned doctor's common sense care of his patients. We need both of these, the technology of today's expanding knowledge and care of the human body and also the down to earth knowledge of the old fashioned doctor whose first and last concern was for the well being of his patients, whom he knew personally.

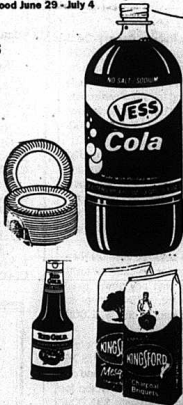
